Snow mixed with rain and sleet pelted areas in New Jersey, Maryland, West Virginia and western North Carolina, with snow on the way in some areas.

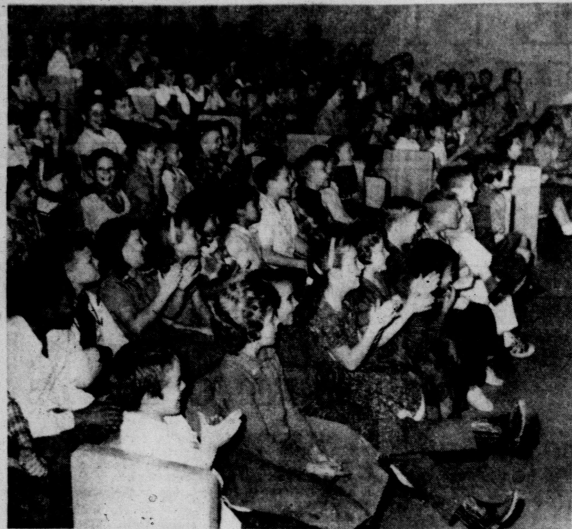

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—Discoverer XIX is in orbit today to take the earth's temperature. This knowledge will help future Midas satellites detect any hostile missile firings by reporting flashes of heat above the normal level.

Other Discoverers have carried a recoverable capsule but not this one. Instead, it has a load of electronic gear to measure the earth's normal heat radiation.

Scientists say they must know exactly how much background infrared light is reflected by the earth to Midas satellites so they can accurately tell whether a hostile missile has been fired.

Navy Plane Crashes Near Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (AP)—A U.S. Navy Neptune patrol bomber crashed into the sea off the south-east tip of Newfoundland today.

Rescue officers said there apparently were no survivors. The plane, a P2V, normally carries a crew of five or six. It was based at the U.S. Navy's base at Argentia, Nfld.

The bomber went down in the Atlantic about 17 miles northeast of Cape Race, Nfld. Rescue planes and ships were dispatched from Argentia.

Weather in the area was clear. The cause of the crash was not known.

Rites Held For Victim

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—Stephen Baltz, 11, who for some 24 hours was the only survivor of last Friday's tragic air collision over New York, was buried Tuesday.

Ironically, an airliner dived above the snow-covered pine trees in Memorial Park Cemetery in suburban Skokie as the boy's body was lowered into a grave.

Stephen died of burns and injuries Saturday, the 13th victim of the crash of two airliners. He was among the 84 passengers on one of the planes.

Stephen was buried after simple services in the Methodist Church

where he was baptized and in whose boys choir he sang. Three hundred persons filled the church.

The Rev. Dr. Harold Bosley said "Birth and death are part of God's plan. Love and loss go hand in hand." The pastor made no mention of the air disaster.

There were some tears among the mourners and a few muffled sobs. But Stephen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Baltz, and his sister, Randee, 9, sat dry-eyed and soberly attentive. His younger brother, William, 4, did not attend the services.

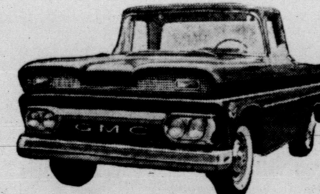
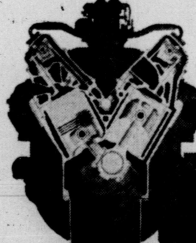

Tigers Smash Tom S., 59-47

Locals Look To Del Rio Ware, Fleming Spur Tiger Point Spurge

Snyder's spirited, free-wheeling Tigers slipped over the 500 mark for the first time this season here last night, as they put the stoppers to the 3-A Tom S. Lubbock Westers, 59-47. It was also the third win in a row for the inspired Bengalmen of Coach J. P. Ward, and boosted their season record to 4-3, while dropping the losers to 4-6.

The Tiger "B" team didn't have it quite so good in their preliminary fray against the Lubbock "B" Cowhands, as a late rally fell short and the visitors took home a 56-50 win.

The victory constituted a fitting "go away present" for the Del Rio-bound Snyder five, who were to have departed this morning at 8:30 for that South Texas city and the invitational tournament which is to be reeled off there tomorrow and Friday.

The Tigers will see their first action of the meet tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock, when they engage the Big Spring Steers of District 24A. In an earlier meeting between the same two schools the Tigers thrashed the Longhorns, 59-43, for their initial victory of the year.

A triumph in that first round would place Snyder in the semi-finals against the winner of the Del Rio-Marfa game of 2:30 tomorrow afternoon. That hypothetical semi-final bout is set for 10:30 Friday morning. On the other hand, a Tiger defeat would shuffle them in the consolation semi-finals of 8 o'clock tomorrow evening, with their opponent being the loser of the Del Rio-Marfa clash.

Upper bracket play in first round action will see San Felipe and Uvalde opening tournament play at 9 tomorrow morning and Eagle Pass and San Angelo meeting immediately after at 10:30.

While taking part in the meet the Tigers will be housed at the Rowell Hotel, which is located a block from the high school gym where the tourney is being reeled off.

Determination and hustle combined to parlay Snyder into its record-setting non-district win of last night against the Lubbockites. Both teams jockeyed for position through the first quarter of play, which saw the Tigers trailing by as much as five points—3-8—at one early stage.

Prior to that the Bengals had held only one brief lead, 2-0, which resulted from a grab of the opening tip-off and subsequent drive-in by big Charlie Gladson. However, the "B" team's Pooch Hatter, plus a pair of free throws as lent by Jimmy Don Robinson, put Snyder back in contention after they had fallen to the five-point deficit. Gladson hit a jumper from the top of the key to knot the count at 11-11, after which Weldon Ware drove in on a lay-up with a minute left to play in the first stanza to up the tally to 13-11.

The Tigers were never behind from that point on, as a rousing 23-point second quarter allowed them to spurt out to a 15-point halftime lead and coast to it to victory.

The telltale second stanza saw everything going the way of the Tigers, as they cashed in on every opportunity during the surge. No less than six Bengals collected points in that one period, with Ware dropping in three field goals and a pair of free tosses to lead the way. Freddy Miller added a pair of two-pointers from close in to aid the effort, also, while peppery Bubba Fleming—a thorn in the Westers' sides throughout the contest—added two more goals to help in the application of the second quarter pincer movement.

Over the course of the contest each and every member of the 11-man Bengal squad notched at least two points with the exception of Steve Free, who saw only limited service. Ware hit for a total of 12 to lead the pack, while Fleming canned 11 to be just one point off the pace.

Westerner Jim Oldham copped game high point honors with 14, and teammate Jim Fullerton made good on 13 to be second high for the game.

Roger McMennamy wrote a fitting climax to the game as he arched in a 40-foot two-handed push shot which hit the meshes as the final horn sounded for the final two Tiger points.

Although losing the "B" contest the Tigers still managed to field the individual star of the game in one Tim Marcum, who marked up a total of 24 points to pace the losing effort. Most of the damage was wreaked by the junior shot-maker originated from medium-distance jump shots from the area of the free throw line.

Larry McNair also hit in double figures for the Snyder five with his 11 points for the evening.

Gary Dennett led the Westerner cause with 15, followed by Larry Christian and his 12.

"Holiday time" has arrived for the Tiger "B" delegation as last night's action is the last scheduled until January 5, when they take on the Abilene Bees in Abilene.

Brown Rush Leader Again

NEW YORK (AP)—Jimmy Brown, Cleveland's great back, has won the rushing title in the National Football League for the fourth straight year. He is the first four-time winner since Steve Van Buren of Philadelphia in 1945, 1947, 1948 and 1949.

Brown's gains against New York in Sunday's finale and the decision of the Green Bay team to emphasize passing instead of Jim Taylor's running nailed the title for the Cleveland fullback. Brown finished with 1,257 yards on 215 attempts, an average of 5.8 yards a carry. Taylor gained 1,107 yards for a 4.8 average.

John Crow of St. Louis, Nick Petrosante of Detroit and J.D. Smith of San Francisco followed in that order.

Milt Plum, the Browns' quarterback, won the passing crown. He was first in completions (60.4 per cent), first in average gain (9.19 yards), lowest in interceptions (2.0 per cent), and third in completions (151), yards gained (2,297) and touchdowns passed (21).

Passing standings are based on a formula that takes into consideration completions, yards, TD passes, completion percentage, interceptions and average gain.

Norm Van Brocklin, Philadelphia's line passer, edged Baltimore's Johnny Unitas for second honors. Billy Wade of Los Angeles was fourth and Bobby Layne of Pittsburgh fifth.

Ray Berry, Baltimore's star end was the best pass receiver, catching 74 for 1,286 yards and 10 touchdowns, the best mark since Tom Sears of Los Angeles set the record by catching 84 in 1950.

BOSTON (AP)—The final stamp of approval has been given Charles Finley as majority stockholder in the Kansas City Athletics by a unanimous vote of the American League club owners.

The verdict was announced Tuesday night by American League President Joe Cronin.

Finley, a Chicago insurance executive, had out-bid a Kansas City group by \$125,000 for the controlling 50 per cent. A's stock left in the estate of the late Arnold Johnson. Finley paid \$1,975,000.

Saga Of Max Webb--Sheep Or Goat?

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Max Webb, who has been a hero and a goat this season, hopes to make up for his last play in the Southwest Conference campaign when Rice meets Mississippi in the Sugar Bowl Jan. 2.

The Rice backfield stalwart became a goat when he let Ronnie Goodwin of Baylor get behind him, catch a pass and score the touchdown that cost Rice a share in the conference title and slipped it into a three-way tie for second place.

"If I hadn't have this bowl to redeem myself, I believe I would have pulled a freighter to China after the game," Webb said.

"When the ball sailed over my head into Goodwin's hands, I wished I could have died that instant."

But if Webb hadn't been the goat in the 12-7 Baylor victory he would have been the hero.

The Owls were leading, 7-6, when Goodwin faked the 185-pound Navasota, Tex., halfback out of position. Webb kicked the extra point that put Rice ahead and apparently had the game won for them.

But he also played the hero several times this year.

He kicked a 27-yard field goal that beat Tulane, 10-7. He kicked a 49-yard field goal—the longest college field goal in the nation this year—against Texas Christian. He ran hard and blocked well all season.

And he was the player who intercepted a pass in the Rice end zone in the final moments of play, with 72,000 people screaming, to choke off a Texas threat and give Rice a 7-0 victory.

Amateur Net Game Slapped

SYDNEY (AP)—U.S. Davis Cup stars Barry MacKay and Earl Butch Buchholz agreed to three-year \$50,000 professional contracts today and took a slap at amateur tennis hypocrisy.

"I feel wonderful for the first time," said Buchholz, who at 20 is the youngest player ever to join a tour.

"All our lives we were taught honesty. It gives us a dirty feeling to take money under the table as amateurs."

"What makes it worse is that amateur tennis officials know that these abuses are taking place and they accept them."

MacKay, 25-year-old graduate of the University of Michigan, said he gave the matter plenty of thought before making a final decision.

"Amateur tennis as now constituted is a farce," he said. "I think the future of the game lies in professional tennis."

Both players reached agreement with Jack Kramer shortly after the promoter arrived from Los Angeles. They open a tour Dec. 31 in New Zealand.

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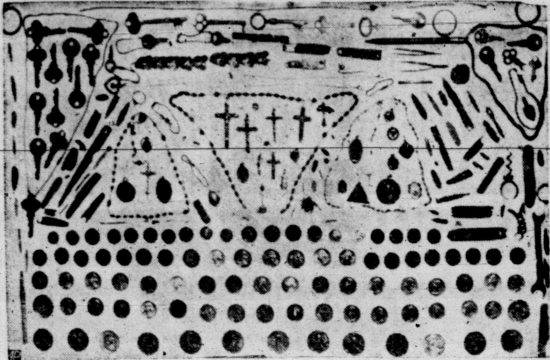

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Ex-Roommate Is Appointed To Fill JFK's Senate Term

BOSTON (AP)—Benjamin A. Smith II, 42, a former Harvard roommate of President-elect John F. Kennedy, has been tapped to fill out the two years remaining of Kennedy's Senate term.

Smith, a former mayor of Gloucester and currently a manufacturer in that seaport city, was notified of the appointment Tuesday night by Kennedy himself.

Democratic Gov. Foster Furcolo announced late Tuesday he would name Smith to the U. S. Senate "at the suggestion of President-elect Kennedy."

Smith said the first word he had received of the appointment was a direct telephone call from Kennedy from his winter headquarters in Palm Beach, Fla.

Smith said Kennedy will resign his Senate seat Jan. 3 and that Smith would take over on the same day, giving him seniority over other freshmen senators due to be sworn in a day later.

Furcolo said it was his understanding Smith would not seek a full six-year term to the U. S. Senate in 1964.

However, Smith refused to speculate on his political plans of two years hence.

Smith became acquainted with Kennedy when both were students at Harvard. They shared a room in Harvard's Winthrop House with Torbert H. MacDonald, now a Democratic congressman from Massachusetts.

Smith graduated in 1939, one year ahead of Kennedy, and like Kennedy served as a naval lieutenant in the Pacific during World War II.

Smith and Kennedy have been close, socially and politically, since their undergraduate days.

They were ushers at each other's wedding, and Smith has been an active campaigner for Kennedy in all of the latter's political bids.

Smith was a fullback on the Harvard football team. Later he gained prominence as a yachtsman and sport fisherman.

In 1946, Smith caught the biggest tuna ever taken on rod and reel in Ipswich Bay, a 718-pounder.

He is president of five Gloucester enterprises: Merchants Box Factory, Cape Ann Fisheries Inc., United Fisheries Co., Gloucester By-Products Inc. and the Gloucester Community Pier Association, Inc., which controls the big state fish pier.

He is an active member of the Democratic City Committee and with his wife—the former Barbara Mechem of Lake Forest, Ill.—and their five children, worships at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Gloucester.

Smith's interest in politics began in 1951 when he was elected to the Gloucester School Committee. His political activity was at the local level until 1956 when he

was a delegate to the Democratic National Convention.

In the last national convention Smith was in charge of the Kennedy drive among delegates from South Carolina and Kansas.

In Palm Beach, Kennedy's press secretary, Pierre Salinger, said in a statement: "Ben Kennedy is extremely pleased by Gov. Furcolo's announcement that he is going to appoint Ben Smith. He is also pleased by the cooperative spirit between himself and Gov. Furcolo which resulted in this announcement."

Furcolo twice was a candidate for the U. S. Senate. He was defeated six years ago by U. S. Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, R-Mass., and was beaten in the primaries by Springfield Mayor Thomas O'Connor this year. O'Connor was defeated in the November election by Saltonstall.
