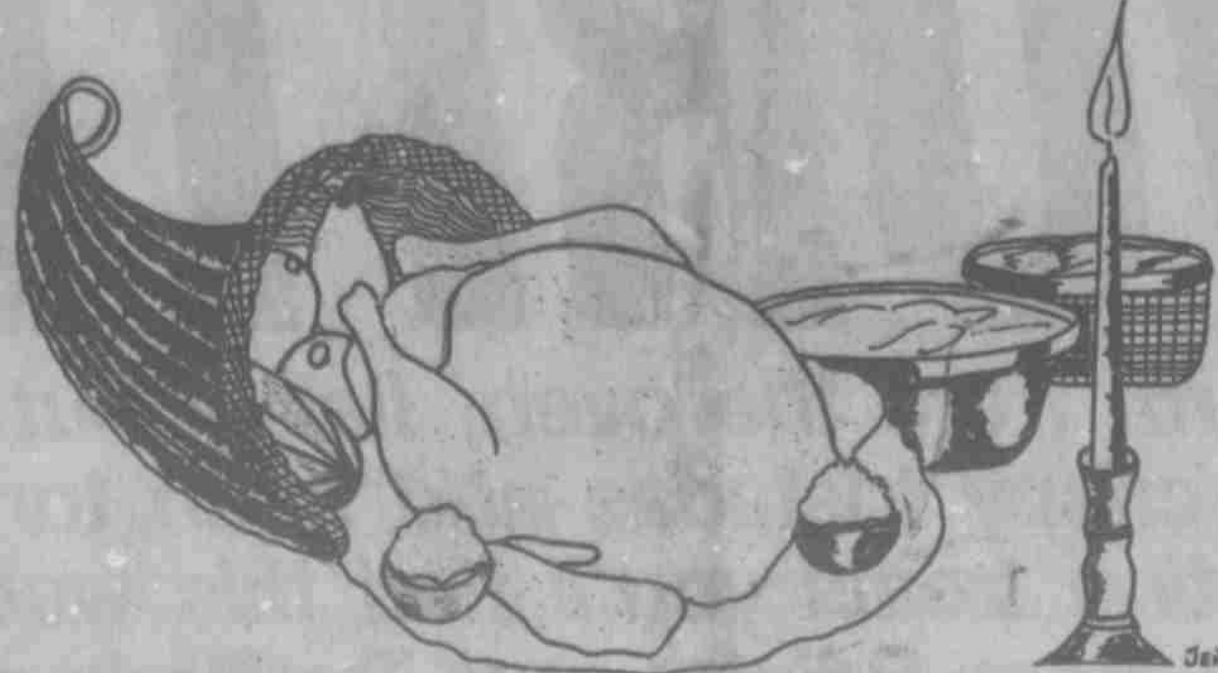

Black News Briefs

Farrakhan Attempts To Unify Black Muslims

Chicago, Ill. -- Controversial Black Muslim minister Louis Farrakhan has launched a campaign to resolve differences between his Nation of Islam and other Black Muslim groups in America. His efforts are aimed primarily at the American Muslim Mission which is headed by W. D. Muhammad - son of the late Elijah Muhammad who founded the Black Muslim movement. The two major divisions of the Black Muslim movement split shortly after Elijah Muhammad's death in 1975. W. D. Muhammad denounced some of his father's teachings which he felt advocated Black separatism and anti-white attitudes. The denunciations prompted Farrakhan and thousands of other followers to break away. However, in recent months Farrakhan has indicated a desire to resolve differences with fellow Muslims and improve relations with Christians and Jews. Farrakhan also says he will focus on Black economic development in America.

Black U. S. Ambassador Takes Up Post In South Africa

Pretoria, South Africa -- America's first Black ambassador to racially torn, white-ruled South Africa has officially taken up his new post. Edward Perkins was originally nominated to the position by

President Reagan in what proved to be a futile attempt to prevent the U. S. Congress from adopting economic sanctions against the racist Pretoria government. In taking up his post, Perkins expressed good will toward all people of South Africa but added that he intended to demonstrate American "intolerance of racial apartheid and abhorrence for apartheid." South Africa's population is over 70% Black but the white minority rules under a system known as apartheid.

Major Black Drug Figure Gunned Down In Chicago

Chicago, Ill. -- One of the nation's best known and most flamboyant Black drug kingpins was gunned down last week on Chicago's South Side. Willie "Fluke" Stokes and his bodyguard were shot as they stepped from a Cadillac limousine parked near the home of an associate. The 49-year old Stokes gained national attention in 1984 when he buried his slain son in a coffin shaped like a Cadillac and stuffed with \$50 and \$100 bills. Stokes had reportedly built an illegal drug empire bringing in hundreds of thousands of dollars a year. Police believe a rival gang arranged the killing.

Massive Racial Balance Program Offered For Kansas City Schools

Kansas City, Mo. -- A federal judge last week ordered that racial balance be restored to Kansas City public schools in response to a suit filed by Black parents. Judge Russell G. Clark directed the school

system to implement a "magnet" school system designed to attract suburban whites to city schools. The state of Missouri and the Kansas City School District will have to pay \$143 million and \$53 million, respectively to implement the plan.

Marchers Protest Treatment Of Black Cadet At The Citadel

Charleston, S. C. -- Several hundred protesters marched last week in front of South Carolina's military school - The Citadel - to protest the treatment of a Black cadet. Cadet Kevin Nesmith resigned last month after a hazing incident in which white cadets dressed as Ku Klux Klan members invaded his room, threatened him and burn a small cross. The protesters led by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference - demanded that the five white cadets be expelled and that Nesmith be allowed to return to the school.

Black Mayors Face New Election Threats

Philadelphia, Pa. -- The Black mayors of Chicago and Philadelphia both appear headed for major election challenges next year. White politicians in both cities are mounting campaigns to oust Harold Washington and Wilson Goode in elections scheduled for next year. Washington in Chicago appears to face the most serious challenge. Former mayor Jane Byrne and city council rival Edward Vrdoljak are both mounting campaigns to unseat him.

"New Law For Impounded Vehicles"

New law became effective in the State of Texas on January 1, 1986, which gives new rights to owners of impounded vehicles and requires companies that impound the vehicles to be licensed.

If you are the owner of a vehicle that has been moved and placed in a vehicle storage facility without your consent, you now have the right to a hearing before a Justice of the Peace or magistrate where the vehicle storage facility is located. However, the vehicle owner must act quickly because his time to ask for a hearing runs out after five (5) days from the time the vehicle is placed in storage. In adding up this number of days Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays will not be included.

In order to get a hearing, the vehicle owner must deliver a written request to the proper court. The request must contain the time and place from which the vehicle was removed and the names, addresses, and phone numbers of (1) the owner of the vehicle, (2) the person or law enforcement agency who authorized the removal, and (3) the vehicle storage facility where the vehicle was placed. There may be a \$10.00 filing fee.

Once the hearing is properly requested the Court has four (4) working days to hear the case. The judge will hear matters relevant to whether or not probable cause existed for the removal and placement of the vehicle. The Court's findings of fact and conclusions of law shall be made in writing. If the ruling is in favor of the vehicle owner the person responsible for removal shall pay the costs of the removal and the storing of the vehicle.

This right to a hearing holds a true in all cases except when the vehicle is towed to a government-owned facility. Neither the "right to a hearing" law or the "facility licensing" law apply to a facility owned by the government. However, it is still far more likely that the vehicle will be towed to a privately owned facility. For example, the situation in Lubbock, Texas, is such that all the government entities have vehicles towed to private storage facilities. This includes the Police Department, the Sheriff's Department, the Department of Public Safety, the Highway Patrol, and the City Code Administration. The only exception to this is the Campus Police at Texas Tech University. If your vehicle is towed away while on the Texas Tech University Campus it will be taken to a government-owned facility.

The other vehicle that was passed in conjunction with the article that gives the right to a hearing is an article that requires vehicle storage facilities to be licensed. This licensing is done through the Texas Department of Labor and Standards and will cost the applicant \$100.00 to file for the license. The license is good until December 31st of every year at which time it must be renewed. Renewal for the following year will cost \$100.00.

The only privately-owned vehicle storage facilities which do not need a license are those that are already licensed according to the Texas Motor Vehicle Commission Code. This exclusion applies to new car dealerships. However, new car dealerships that receive vehicles for storage without consent of the owner are subject to the owner's right to a hearing.

If a vehicle storage facility operates without a license they can be shut down by the State. If they do have a license they must comply with the rules that have been established for such a facility. For instance, a facility must be fenced in, it must have an all weather surface, and a sign at its main entrance giving the name, address and phone number of the storage lot and the hours that vehicles will be released to their owners. Also, the sign must give the storage facility's state license number. Under these requirements a

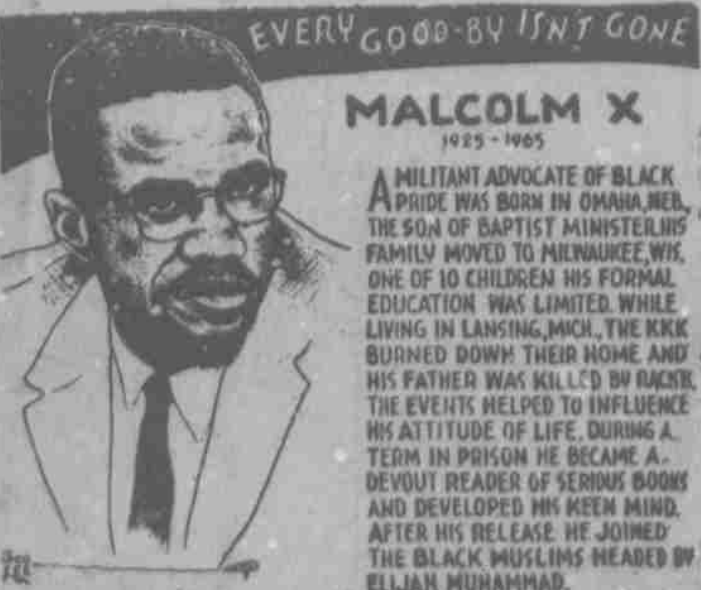

quick glance upon approaching the lot will show possible violations.

There are numerous other requirements. One of the more important being that a vehicle must be released from 8:00 a. m. to midnight Monday through Saturdays and from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. on Sundays except for nationally recognized legal holidays. Vehicles must be available for release within one (1) hour of the request within these time periods. Further, an additional sign is required with a fee schedule that is posted so as to be clearly visible to the vehicle owner prior to payment of the fees. Another important rule of the licensing act is that the facility have a publicly listed phone number. The facility must also be lighted for night-time release.

Numerous other rules have been established for storage facilities by the Department of Labor and Standards. If a violation is observed you can report it to a local investigator. In Lubbock the phone number is 765-6461 or 765-7221. In Amarillo the number is 372-6362. The central licensing office is in Austin at (512) 463-5520.

These two articles taken together give a great deal of added protection to those people whose vehicles have been moved and stored without their consent. The laws are located at Article 6687-aa and Article 6701-3 of Vernon's Annotated Texas Statutes.

Blacks Nationwide Learn Their Role In Making A Better America

Recently, more than six thousand Black people descended on Washington for the sixteenth Congressional Black Caucus (CBC) week-end. They were from all across the country—from various walks of life and different economic categories.

The Caucus theme was "Black America: Generations in Transition." For three days, forty-seven workshops were conducted on subjects that have special relevance to Blacks. At these workshops, panels of experts presented information which was followed by a dialogue between the audience and the panel members.

Since the life span of Blacks is shorter than Whites, several workshops were conducted on various phases of health as they concerned the Black community. These included diseases in which Blacks are highly susceptible—drugs, cancer, heart trouble, health hazards peculiar to the Black community, homicide, AIDS myths and the realities of its impact on the Black community, infant mortality and high blood pressure. In these workshops, strategies for survival were offered.

The Thursday morning plenary session was televised for America's Black Forum. The CBC members were questioned by Georgia State Senator Julian Bond, the Forum moderator. These members talked about major issues confronting Black America. While all Caucus members participate in all issues, each is assigned to take the lead in specific fields, so Mr. Bond questioned them about his or her special category. At the conclusion of the members' presentation there was participation by the audience. It was revealed that CBC has sponsored 300 pieces of legislation during the present 99th Congress.

Representative Cardiss Collins, the only Black female member of Congress, held a workshop on discrimination in the broadcast media and discrimination in advertising in minority media. It was highly emphasized that Blacks suffer from the unfairness of big businesses' advertising policies.

Mrs. Collins also conducted a workshop on the "Future of Black Women in Politics." This report revealed that in the spring of 1986, there were 146 Black women elected as state judges, mayors and legislators.

Representative Walter Fauntroy held a "Yam Brain-trust" workshop. On the panel were Malcolm Jamal Warner of the Bill Cosby Show and John Lucas, basketball player for the Houston Rockets and Washington Bullets. Drugs and teenage pregnancy were greatly discussed by the panelists with very interesting participation by the youth audience.

Mr. Fauntroy conducted a Voter Participation workshop. This pulled together the directors of national Black voter participation organizations. Information was exchanged about the goals and accomplishments of their respective groups. Black political empowerment was emphasized. It was learned that the Congressional Black Caucus will increase by two members and there are prospects that there might be an additional three new members. The prospects are Michael Espy of Mississippi, Bobby Scott of Virginia and Fay Williams of Louisiana. Participants were told that their enthusiastic voter participation could assure these persons' election. Ten present White, house members owe their election to the Black community.

The workshop on "The National Priority: Educating Black Children" hosted by Representative Augustus Hawkins, Chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee, was crowded. The panel was composed of teachers, school administrators and Althea Simmons of the NAACP. The different educational recommendations of Congress were discussed and the audience was given a blueprint that it could take back home and implement. Althea Simmons suggested that often just to have a Black face show up is very helpful. The entire workshop was very upbeat.

Just recently, a group of Blacks have brought a case against the State Department for discrimination in employment. In keeping with these unfair practices, CBC held a workshop on "The Role of Blacks in the Formulation and Execution of U.S. Foreign Policy: Obstacles and Challenges." It was clearly shown that the nation's foreign policy-making apparatus is handled by White males.

Representative John Conyers, who conducted a workshop on the Arts, assured the audience that there will be future Art workshops held in various communities throughout the country. When one panelist complained that the Black media gets its information about Blacks from the White press, which most often presents a negative view, a Black reporter

stated that Blacks usually call the big White press and give them the information while ignoring the Black press which, generally, has weekly newspapers, so the Black media is left with no alternative but to resort to the White press. It was emphasized that this was not the case with the Congressional Black Caucus. They always inform the Black media. However, at the Caucus Breakfast, Eugene Jackson was presented as the Black businessman who placed a \$50,000 advertisement in the White papers, denouncing Nakasone's insults against Blacks—but not one was placed in the Black newspapers.

John Woods of Florida said "there were many workshops—all of which were very informative and helpful. I wish I could have attended all of them."

Annie Finney of Virginia, who attended her first CBC Prayer Breakfast, said "If I'm able, I'll certainly be here next year. Rev. Moss brought tears to my spiritual eyes and Dick Gregory brought tears to my comical eyes." Rev. Moss said, "in your time and your space, with God's grace, you can make a difference."

Parren Mitchell, who is leaving Congress, was the keynote speaker at the awards dinner, and as usual, it was a very moving and dynamic address. He emphasized that CBC members have not just talked about issues, but that they have drafted solutions. He stated that despite the lack of recognition, criticisms and wrong accusations, "this Caucus endures, fighting for that which is right and just and good."

There were several social activities, which gave the attendees some time for greeting friends and relaxation from hours of long distance travel and intensive workshop participation.

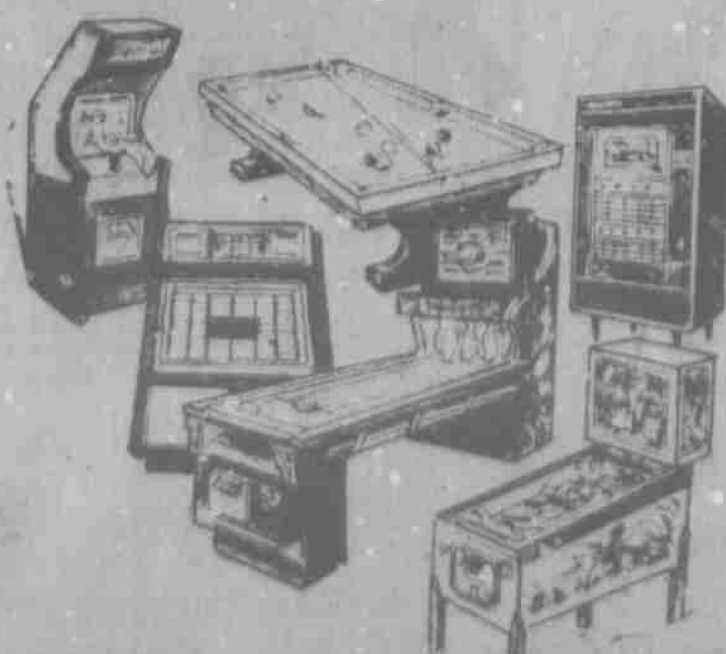

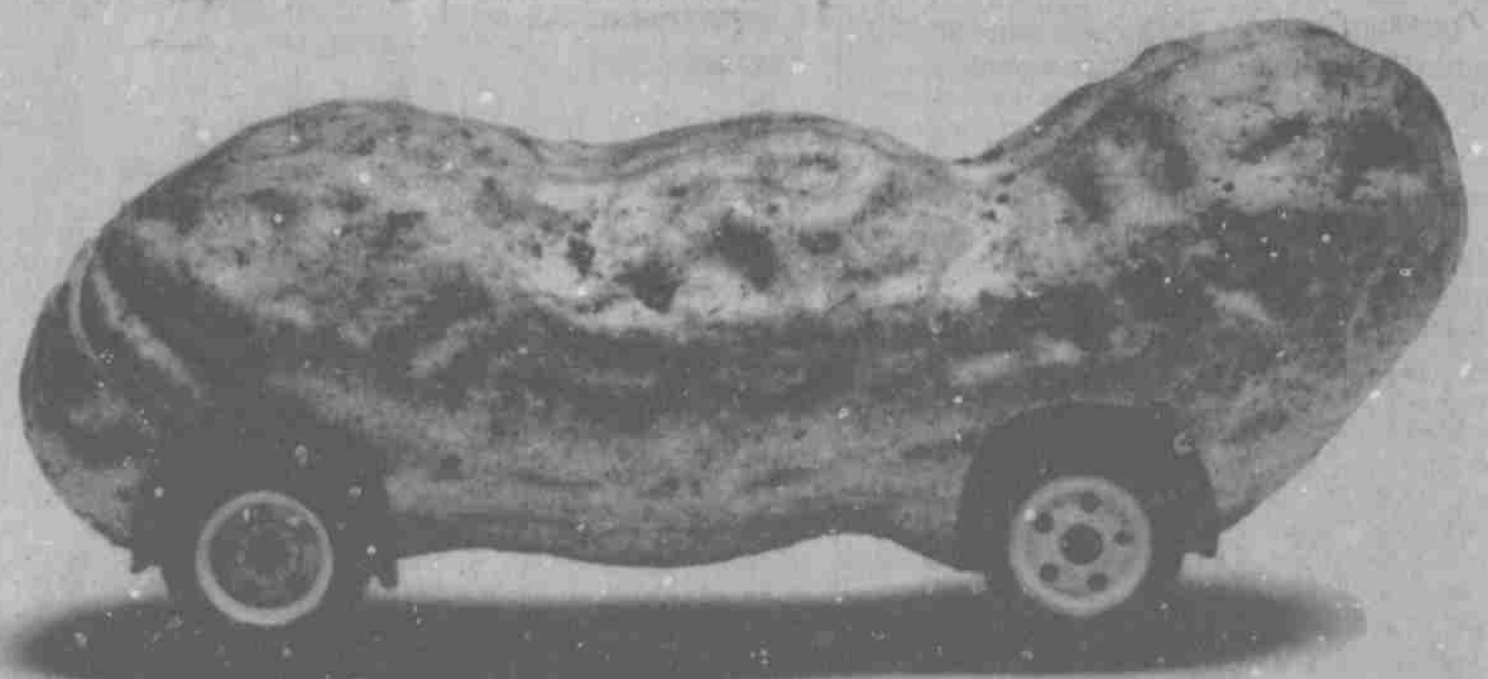

Is Your Company Headed For Bankruptcy?

A recent study by Dun & Bradstreet disclosed that the number of bankruptcies filed in the first half of 1982 exceeded all bankruptcies filed in 1981. These filings were not limited to small businesses; some of the country's largest corporations were among the victims. Though the legal definition of bankruptcy is closely tied to a company's financial position, factors which contribute to the chain of events leading to bankruptcy are not always of a fiscal nature.

High personnel turnover is a strong sign of upcoming trouble. Employees with specialized skills expect and deserve compensation equivalent to the market rate. Small businesses usually cannot afford the expense, so they hire mediocre or incompetent employees who will work for less. This practice increases the stress level of the company's competent key personnel, resulting in burnout. After a while, a sense of alienation replaces the friendly, congenial atmosphere most people come to a small business to experience. Once started, the process is difficult to stop, and results in a revolving door environment in which the company replaces its key competent personnel with less qualified staff.

High turnover usually

triggers a decline in business volume, as customers follow the departed employee to their new firm, with expenses remaining level. If continued, the company will first start earning less and less, then start losing money, ending in the invasion of its capital. At this point, bankruptcy is a matter of time. A second feature relates to the small business owner/manager. Bombarded by vendors, customers, and other matters, the owner/manager finds little time for adequate planning and the monitoring of the company's financial position. As a result, he/she loses sight of the company's downhill slide until he/she is forced to take drastic measures.

Rough sledding in a poor economy, whether the business is large or small, should be expected, particularly in a recession as deep as the present one. Adequate planning is central to survival. The first step is to determine which employees are pulling their weight and strive to keep them on

the team. It may result in across-the-board raises, but the retention of key personnel is of primary importance. The second phase of avoiding bankruptcy involves adequate financial planning.

The owner/manager must make the time to understand the "big picture" and evaluate all the variances from the plan. Leaving no stone unturned, the owner/manager is then advised of potential trouble before it becomes a major problem. As such, the small business owner can use the ounce of prevention with much greater effect than the pound of cure. Captains require good ships, a marketable product, and a good crew to successfully complete the voyage. With a good crew, the ship will sink, and the product, no matter how marketable, goes with it.

Quick & Easy Meals

As fall and winter descend upon us, with those cold north winds, there's nothing better for lunch than a hot cup of soup to go along with a sandwich.

This week's column features three hardy and delicious tasting soups, just right to take along in your thermos. The recipes are nutritious and guaranteed to stick to your ribs. All of you parents packing a lunch for the kids will feel especially good sending something warm and satisfying for lunch with them. Until then, good cooking.

HAMBURGER VEGETABLE SOUP

1 1/2 lbs. lean ground beef
1 can (10 oz.) tomatoes
1 can (8 oz.) unsalted tomato juice
1 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup thinly-sliced fresh carrots
1 cup diced raw potatoes
1 package (10 oz.) frozen cut green beans
1 package (10 oz.) frozen whole kernel corn
1 bay leaf
1/2 teaspoon dill weed
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon thyme
6 cups water

Brown meat in large skillet. Pour off fat. Add remaining ingredients. Bring mixture to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 1 hour or until vegetables are tender. Stir occasionally. Remove bay leaf before serving. Makes 8 servings.

CHEDDAR AND HERB SOUP

3 cans (10 1/2 oz.) Frito-Lay's® brand Cheddar & Herb Flavored Cheese Dip
1 can beef broth
1 can water
3 medium potatoes, cut in cubes
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped celery

Cook stirring regularly, for about 5 minutes over very low heat. Stir in milk gradually, keeping mixture smooth. Stir in blended tomato mixture into cream sauce. Taste and add correct seasonings. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

An Educator's Opinion

The Key to Training Quality Teachers

Some education reform initiatives make headlines. Some others only make sense.

Several weeks ago, dozens of education's most thoughtful leaders met in the nation's capital for one of those efforts that seldom catch the spotlight. Their agenda: ensuring that new teachers have what it takes.

These leaders—school board members, administrators, college deans, state officials, and teachers—were all board members of what may be the least-known significant group in all of education, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

NCATE is the only national agency that accredits—approves—programs for the preparation of teachers. It began in 1954 when the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the Council of Chief State School Officers, and NEA all joined forces to create a much-needed independent quality control instrument to revitalize teacher education.

NCATE isn't a government agency. It's a partnership of educators. In NCATE, faculty from a broad array of subject-matter disciplines work side by side with experts on how children learn. Together, they measure teacher-training institutions against standards that are both challenging and high.

The institutions that meet these standards earn the NCATE seal of approval. Many school districts look for this seal. They check to see if applicants for teaching positions have graduated from NCATE-accredited programs—because they know that teachers prepared by these programs have received a top-rate education.

NCATE is a voluntary body. The colleges and universities NCATE evaluates choose, on their own, to be evaluated. Teacher preparation institutions are under no legal mandate to seek NCATE approval. Perhaps that's why the majority of teacher preparation programs in the United States have never gone through the NCATE accreditation process. Of the almost 1,300 programs that train teachers, less than half have volunteered for NCATE review. Only 525 are NCATE-accredited.

State governments could change this situation by insisting that all teacher education pro-

grams meet NCATE standards. The education groups that make up NCATE have urged this action for years. We've argued that the nation can't afford second-rate teacher preparation programs that graduate teachers unsure of their subject matter and uncertain how to teach it.

More and more state policy-makers, fortunately, are embracing this message. They're realizing that excellence in education demands rigorous, comprehensive teacher preparation programs—programs that graduate teachers who know their subject and how to teach it, programs that produce teachers who understand what children need and how children grow.

NCATE accrediting aims to help all colleges and universities that train teachers reach these goals, and the institutions that invite NCATE inspection are usually glad they did. The evaluation experience forces institutions to come to grips—sometimes for the first time—with how they're doing and where they're headed.

Penn State went through the NCATE review process last spring, and it wasn't easy. The university first had to complete an institutional "self-study" that compared its performance to a long list of NCATE quality criteria.

The second step was an on-site evaluation investigating every aspect of Penn State's teacher preparation program. The NCATE evaluation team interviewed teachers, students, and administrators. They asked tough questions: Does Penn State provide prospective teachers with experiences in urban, rural, and suburban settings? Does the program teach students how to design instructional activities for pupils of varying racial and cultural backgrounds? Does the library offer adequate resources? Are practicum for student teachers closely supervised? Does the program prepare students to teach the handicapped?

In the end, after all the interviews and classroom visits, Penn State measured up. Penn State passed the test. But so many other institutions have never even taken the exam. That had better change. If we want a quality teacher in every classroom, we need quality training for every teacher.

THE ATONEMENT FOR SIN

The extreme importance of salvation is emphasized in our Confession of Faith. It is the subject of 5 (25%) of our 20 Articles of Faith.

- The word "atonement" is found in our English Bible only once in the N.T. (Rom. 5:11).
- The Greek word "KATALAGE" - noun; "KATALASSO" - verb; is translated atonement (1), reconciliation (2), reconciling (1), reconcile (6). This word "denotes reconciliation, a change on the part of one party, induced by an action on the part of another; in the N.T., the reconciliation of men to God by His grace and love in Christ." —Vine. God is never said to be reconciled. It is man that must be reconciled.
- The O.T. word for atonement "KAPHAR" (has to do with a covering), is translated 70 or more times "make atonement", and is translated "make reconciliation" 4 times. It is also translated a number of other ways — pacify, pardon, purge away, etc. It is definitely related to the N.T. mercy seat and propitiation.
- While it is helpful to consult word studies on atonement, reconciliation, etc., we must be careful not to take a restricted meaning of a word that may not harmonize with the overall usage in the Bible.

I. SALVATION IS BY GRACE.

A. God Saves Only Sinners.

(See Article "VI. Of The Fall).

- Man is a sinner by birth, nature and practice.
- Sin is transgression of the Law. I John 3:4. (Anything that is not in the will of God is sin).

B. Salvation Is Wholly By God's Grace.

- Grace is God's unmerited favor. No man merits it.
- It is wholly of grace. Not part grace and part works. See (a)-1-2-3

II. SALVATION IS BY THE SAVIOUR.

A. What The Saviour Did For Sinners.

- He became the mediator, the go-between who possessed the nature of both God and man. I Tim. 2:5
- He was appointed by the Father. (b)-1 John 3:16
- He freely took upon Him our nature, yet without sin. (b)-3 Phil. 2:7
- He personally obeyed all the Laws of God, and lived a life completely and perfectly in the will of God.
- By His death He made full and vicarious atonement for our sins. "Vicarious" means on behalf of, or in place of another. Through the sacrifice of Christ, God is propitiated and the sinner is reconciled unto God. See (b)-5-6-7-8-9

B. The Saviour Took The Sinner's Place.

- He was a perfect example, but it was not through His perfect example that men are saved. He did not die as a martyr.
- He voluntarily became our substitute. (c)-1-2-3
- He bore our sins in His own body. (c)-4 I Pet. 2:24; (c)-5 I Pet. 3:18
- His sacrifice completely satisfied the Father. (c)-6 Isa. 53:11; (c)-7 Heb. 10:2

C. He Is Now Our (Believer's) High Priest And Intercessor.

- He was raised from the dead. (d)-1 I Cor. 15:20; I Cor. 15:4
- He is now sitting at the right hand of the Father, making intercession for us. I John 2:1,2; (d)-3 Heb. 9:12-15; (d)-4 Heb. 7:25. See also Heb. 10:10-14 and Rom. 8:34-35.

We believe (a) that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace; (b) through the mediatorial offices of the Son of God, who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without sin, honored the divine law by His personal obedience, and by His death made a full and vicarious atonement for our sins; (c) that His atonement consisted not in setting us an example by His death as a martyr, but was the voluntary substitution of Himself in the sinner's place, the Just dying for the unjust, Christ, the Lord, bearing our sins in His own body on the tree; (d) that, having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven, and uniting in His wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfection, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate and

an all-sufficient Saviour.

*** (a) Eph. 2:8,9. "By grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God, not of works, lest any man should boast."

Acts 15:11. "We believe that through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ we shall be saved."

Rom. 3:24. "Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus."

*** (b) John 3:16. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

Matt. 18:11. "For the Son of man is come to save that which was lost."

Phil. 2:7. Christ Jesus "made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men."

Heb. 2:14. "That through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil."

Isa. 53:4-7. "Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid upon him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth."

Rom. 3:25. "Whom God hath set forth to be a propitiation through faith in his blood, to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God."

I John 4:10. "Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that he loved us, and sent his Son to be a propitiation for our sins."

I Cor. 15:3. "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures."

II Cor. 5:21. "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him."

*** (c) John 10:18. "No man taketh it from me, but I lay it down of myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again."

Phil. 2:8. "Being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross."

Gal. 1:4. "Who gave himself for our sins."

I Pet. 2:24. "Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed."

I Pet. 3:18. "For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God."

Isa. 53:11. "He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied: by his knowledge shall my righteous servant justify many; for he shall bear their iniquities."

Heb. 12:2. "Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God."

*** (d) I Cor. 15:20. "But now is Christ risen from the dead."

Isa. 53:12. "Therefore will I divide him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he hath poured out his soul unto death: and he was numbered with the transgressors; and he bore the sins of many, and made intercession for the transgressors."

Heb. 9:12-15. "Neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us. For if the blood of bulls and of goats... sanctifieth to the purifying of the flesh: how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your consciences from dead works to serve the living God? For this cause he is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance."

Heb. 7:25. "Wherefore he is able to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him, seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them."

I John 2:2. "He is the propitiation for our sins: and not for ours only, but also for the sin of the whole world."
