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Grass Fires

Marshall J. J. Blackstone has warned the citizens of Burkburnett that apparently innocent grass fires can cause serious damage. Recently the department has been summoned to help control accidentally started fires of this nature. It has been dry for several weeks, and every possible precaution should be taken to prevent the possibility of property loss from such fires.

The first safety measure should be the cleaning up of vacant property wherever possible. There are dozens of empty lots within short distance of the business district. Many of these have been allowed to accumulate heavy growths of weeds and grasses. A carelessly discarded cigarette, a few matches in the hands of a child, or sparks from a trash fire could cause heavy loss.

Another feature that recommends the clearing of the vacant property is the matter of health. The weeds and grass serve as perfect breeding places for various types of insects. Disease bearing insects can accumulate rapidly in rank growths, even during the dry season.

However, when a grass fire starts, do not hesitate to call the department. The fire department would rather make an unnecessary run than to be called too late to save adjoining property. Loss of property is shared by the entire community in the insurance rates.

Albert G. Walker

Wichita and Wilbarger counties are delighted to hear of the appointment of Albert G. Walker, floratorial representative from the two counties to the state legislature, to the position as assistant attorney general. For six years Mr. Walker has served the district at Austin. His three victories indicate the confidence of the citizens of the two counties in his ability.

There is only one regret expressed by those who supported him during this period. It was hoped that he would become speaker of the house before he retired from the assembly. His friends in this district loyally supported him in the campaign for the position.

In his new work he will carry the best wishes of a large number of people from the two counties.

Old Age Racket

In every case that the government either state or national has attempted to aid a group of people in distress there always accumulate a group of racketeers to prey on the credulous. When bonuses or pensions are paid the pensioners are the object of high pressure artists that try to fleece the unfortunate. The very land on which Burkburnett is situated today was settled first following such a transaction. It was soldier scrip and won in a poker game.

Today in Texas heartless racketeers are preying on the credulity of the old men and women eligible for benefits under the pension laws. The legibles are being offered policies which sell for \$1 and which guarantee the holders that they will remain on the pension rolls or be compensated from the insurance.

Legitimate insurance is one of the most valuable possessions that any man can own, but such rackets as these are a detriment to legal enterprises.

The state government should be relentless in the prosecution of such men.

Democratic "Love Feast"

The Democrats met on Jefferson Island last week for a "Love feast". While eating sandwiches and other picnic items, the representatives chatted with the president. As the vote on the supreme court measure approaches and during the bitter discussion of the relief bill, the public is not generally fooled by senator Joe T. Robinson's statement that the meeting had no political significance.

A great deal of the president's power depends on his persuasive personality. The members of the legislative houses were a little restless and rebellious lately. The conferences probably will have definite reaction in the legislative policy during the next few weeks. While all was courteous interview and apparently a social occasion the riot act must have been read in the nice words to some restless legislators.

Texas And Tourists

There is one industry that Texas has neglected to a great extent. While other states have advertised to the whole world the advantages they have to offer tourists, with the exception of the centennial publicity little has been done by Texas to attract this highly profitable industry. Texas is a state that has everything. It has traditions, scenery, hospitality, climate that are just as marketable for hard cash as the cotton, wool, iron, and oil.

This is the second year of the world's fair business. And Texas finds that tourists are the second to largest industry of the state. \$446,000,000 was spent last year in the state by visitors, and only the oil industry with \$450,000,000 topped the tourist trade. And the tourists accounted for a large part of the oil industries income.

The result of this knowledge should be a high pressure publicity campaign. Texas newspaper, magazines, and other media of publicity should never pass an opportunity to advertise the state. The citizens will be enriched with the money of travelers.

HEADLINES

Germany and Italy get mad and decide to end the pretense of non-interference in Spain. They have withdrawn from the non-intervention pact. It is better that the pretense be abandoned. Under the pact every nation involved continued to aid and abet the side with which they had sympathy, and the non-intervention pact could have done nothing but cause trouble. Under the franker policy the trouble will reach a climax more rapidly. The evasions and pretenses of the pact were so numerous that they made no difference whatever on the ultimate results. Now Italy and Germany will send soldiers and materials openly. The only danger is that the nations will carry out their threat to blockade British and French ships. France and England have stood by the loyalists. France openly and England indirectly.

Anti-Gambling laws

The Texas legislature brought to an end one of the bitterest controversies in the history of the state legislature when the special session repealed the horse racing law. The session ended last Friday and left a mass of laws related to gambling in various forms. The dog racing and anti-bookie bills became effective immediately with the governor's signature in as much as these laws received the two thirds majority. The law outlawing horse racing will not be effective for ninety days. The penalty voted for dog or horse racing was set at \$200 to \$500 fine and 30 to 90 days imprisonment. Book making violation brings 10 days to one year imprisonment and fines ranging from up to \$1,000. The action of the legislature made necessary the public sale of 250 blooded jacks and stallions that were bought from the race tax for breeding purposes. These animals will be sold or leaders to individuals.

Bank Nights

For a while it appeared that a definite law would be passed relating to bank nights and similar forms of business promotion. As the discussion reached the floors of each house the criminal court of appeals made such action unnecessary by the declaration of the status of illegality of such forms of business promotion. The bank nights were outlawed by the precedent-setting case from Bonham, and the legislature was relieved of a big responsibility. However, the case of the criminal court of appeals created another problem that will have to be settled eventually, what will happen to the community trades days? The outlawing of the bank nights brings up the question of the legality of the enterprises sponsored by clubs, businessmen and charity organizations. A more bitter fight is expected when the legislature reconvenes this fall in another proposed session.

An Apple Core

In China recently a patron of a small cafe tossed an apple core out of the window. The discarded core struck a member of the Japanese marines. A riot ensued and several people were killed—all Chinese shot by the angered Japanese. When the smoke had cleared away the proprietor of the shop was arrested and tried for his offense of allowing on of his customers to insult a Japanese officer. The punishment was meted out by the "justice" of the Japanese military board. This proprietor was instructed to look for the man who tossed the apple core for the rest of his life and report each afternoon to the Japanese commander the progress that he was making. The incident illustrates how silly and childish men can be when they play this game of war.

Ft. Worth Livestock Market Review

Through June 29, By Livestock News Service, Ft. Worth, Texas

The Fort Worth cattle and calf market declined considerably during the past 10 days but from appearances the bottom was reached on Tuesday of this week. In past years a break in the market has generally occurred in June but the unusually liberal receipts this year forced sharper declines than usual.

Plain and medium grade steers, yearlings, stockers and good and medium grade cows and calves were \$1 lower with some spots off as much as \$1.50. Low cost cows and calves were 25 to 35 cents off. The only classes not registering losses were good feed steers and yearlings, the better grade grass steers and the best grade stockers.

Hog prices Tuesday made a 25 to 30 cent rise to a top of \$11.50 to packers and \$11.60 to small killers—the last time these prices were paid at Ft. Worth was in August 1935. Wednesday's hog market was mostly 40 cents lower at \$11.10 and \$11.20.

For three days this week spring lambs and yearlings declined 25 to 50 cents. Aged sheep held around steady.

Fed steers and yearlings sold at \$10 to \$11.25—the latter price being paid for several shipment of steers. Good grass fat steers brought \$9 to \$9.50 and two cars at \$10. Plain cattle cashed from \$5.50 to \$7 with medium kinds around \$7.50 to \$8.25.

Fat cows sold at \$7 down with butcher cows from \$4.25 to \$5 and canners and cutters from \$2.75 to \$3.85. Bulls cleared at \$4 to \$5.50.

Fat calf prices were \$6.75 and \$7.50 with plainer sorts at \$5.50 to \$6.50 and common calves around \$3.50 to \$4.50.

Good stocker calves and yearlings were quotable around \$7.50 to \$8 with plain sorts at \$5 to \$6.50. Choice spring lambs sold upward to \$9.25 with the bulk clearing \$8.75 and down. Shorn yearlings cashed \$6.25 to \$7.00. Feeders sold \$6.00 to \$6.25 with occasional lambs \$6.75.

The Fort Worth Livestock Market will be closed Saturday, July 3. Supplies arriving that day will be properly cared for.

"Contour furrows help keep land in place, hold rainfall, and reduce damage from blowing."

The practice of terracing Texas farms, once confined largely to east Texas and designed primarily to hold soil in place, has spread rapidly to the west, north, and northwest sections of the State. The reason for terracing and contouring in the less humid areas of the State is not so much to hold the soil as it is to hold the rainfall. Wheat farmers of the northwest are reporting exceptional yields through the use of contouring practices, while fields not treated to hold rainfall are far behind in their per acre yield.

In the Texas Panhandle 1,738,762 acres were treated in the spring of 1936 to control wind erosion. Over the State as a whole more than 13 million acres have been terraced or contoured since 1916, of which almost 4 million acres were treated in 1936.

Contouring and terracing have spread from cultivated land to pastures and to ranges. At the Spur Experiment Station, it was found that contouring tripled the yield of grasses.

The value of these soil and water conservation practices to the State as a whole and to individual farmers and ranchmen cannot be disputed. Under the Agricultural Conservation Program, farmers and ranchmen receive grants for terracing and contouring which carry part of the cost of the construction work.

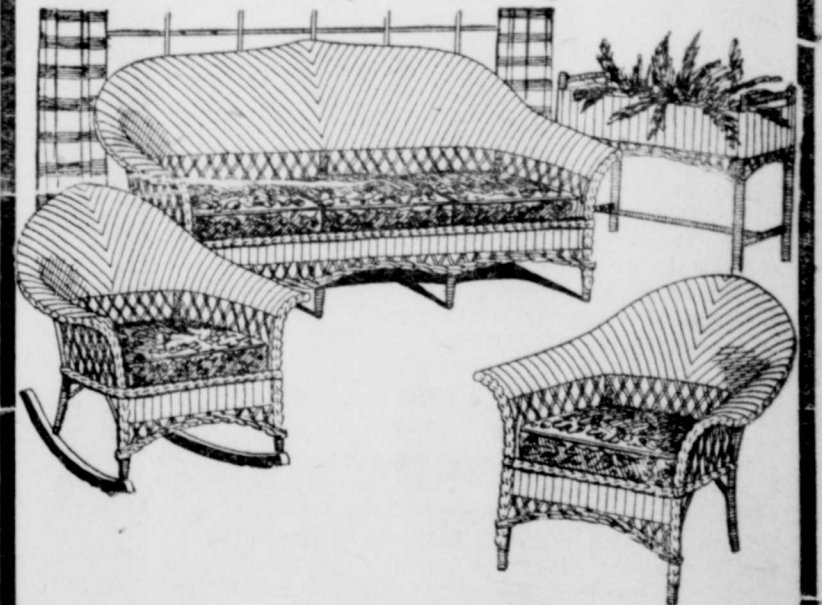

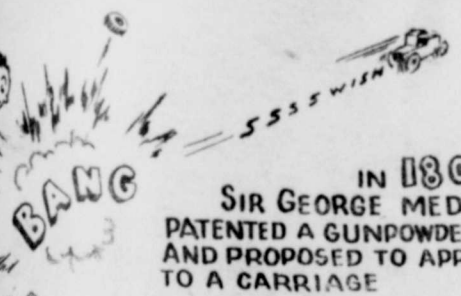

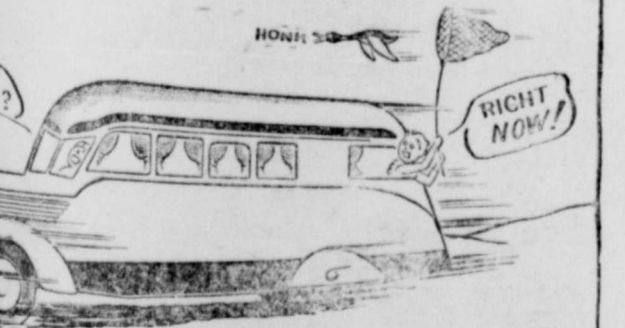

Capital News Letter

Congress Cannot Adjourn Its Obligations

The Seventy-fifth Congress is predominantly Democratic. It owes a sacred duty to the American voters who smashed political party lines and elected it. In all honesty and good faith this duty must be performed. That duty is to stay in Washington until Congress has passed a full program of progressive legislation calculated to give America, not merely temporary recovery, but to provide a firm basis for the permanent solution of her problems.

We have arrived at a social and economic crisis in America which involves the rights of every man and woman who serves his fellow men.

We recognize the community of interest of all the creators of wealth, the farmers, and the workers in factory and shop, mines, transportation and distributors of the things men use. Their interests are the paramount interests of life. To enact laws to increase their proportion of the national income is the primary duty of Congress.

In the past three elections, the people voted decisively to go forward, not backward. The attempt to limit our work to getting back to the prosperity of '29 is a mistake. That prosperity was temporary and more apparent than real. We must enact such measures as will assure us against future panics and depressions and provide private and public security.

Powerful interests are carrying on a propaganda of great intensity to get the Congress adjourned quickly without enacting the legislation to which every Democrat is committed. This is no time to bend to the demands of the enemies of constructive legislation or to listen to the counsel of timid friends. If we should retreat under this pressure we would be traitors to the people's interest and justly deserve the condemnation which we should certainly receive. This Congress cannot adjourn its obligations. The minimum legislative program which must be considered at this session of Congress is the following:

- (1) A federal minimum wage and maximum hour law.
- (2) As necessary companion-measure to the wages and hours bill the following measures for agriculture:

- (a) Indefinite extension of the 3 1-2 per cent interest rate on farm loans and mortgages.
- (b) Legislation assuring the farmer cost of production plus a fair profit.
- (c) Legislation which will at least provide a sound attack in solving the problem of farm tenancy.

- (3) A large-scale, national program of slum clearance and low-cost housing.
- (4) Constructive amendments to the Social Security Act, to broaden its scope and especially to liberalize its old-age pension provisions.

- (5) The president's suggested measure setting up eight regional authorities to plan and control the conservation and development of our natural resources in the public interest.
- (6) Government ownership of the twelve Federal Reserve Banks.

- (7) Adequate protection against floods to the people of the Ohio and Mississippi Valleys and other chronically flooded areas.
- (8) Legislation to advance the decennial census to 1938 and to provide that the census include definite data of employment and unemployment, and in addition to a factual survey and study of unemployment in the United States with a report to Congress as a basis for future legislation.

- (9) Passage of the most essential features of the President's plan for reorganization of the Executive Department.
- (10) We stand with the President for judicial reform.

In addition to this immediate legislative program, we believe the first duty of Congress for the next session will be the scientific revision of the Federal Tax Structure.

No adjournment till our work is done. Our aim is full production, full consumption, and a job for every man and woman who wants to work.

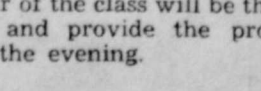
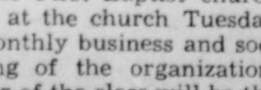
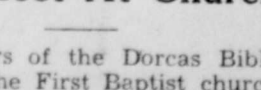
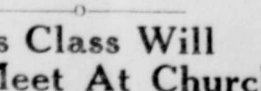
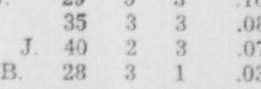
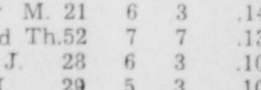
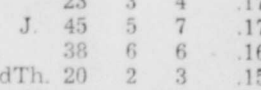
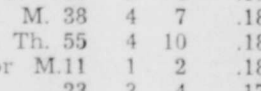
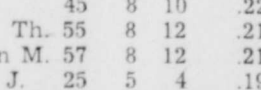
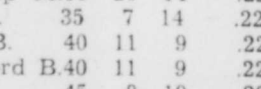
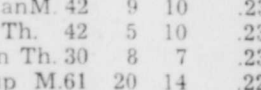
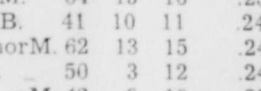
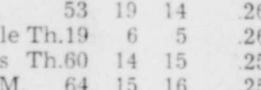
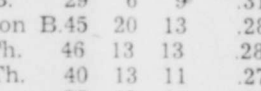
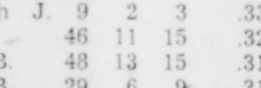
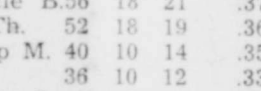
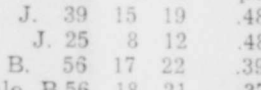
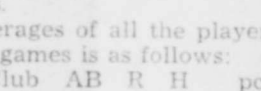
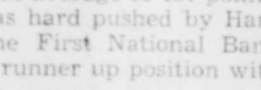
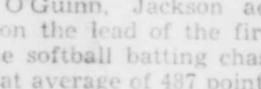
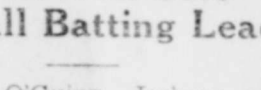
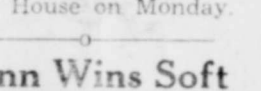
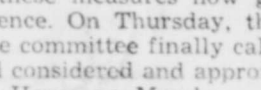
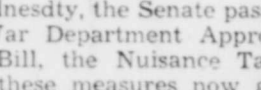
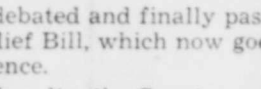
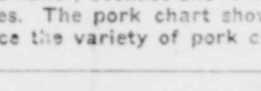
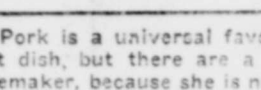
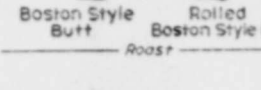
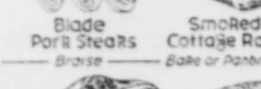
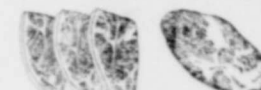
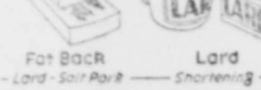
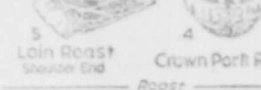
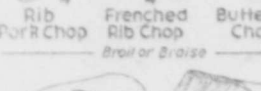

Stop Flea Hoppers

Meetings of farmers are being held in various Texas counties this month to consider ways and means of stopping what is said to be the worst infestation of flea hoppers in years. The cotton flea hopper has become a pest in Texas, ranking with the cotton boll weevil and at times actually doing more damage than the boll weevil.

In Dallas County, for example, the 1935 cotton crop was cut more 50 percent by the flea hopper, which literally strips the cotton stalk. So the farmers are out to stop the hoppers' depredations. And apparently the best way of doing that is through the use of a mineral which Texas produces in enormous quantities: Sulphur.

Research of State and Federal agricultural authorities has developed the fact that finely ground sulphur dust is one of the cheapest, safest, and most effective insecticides for controlling the flea hopper. Sulphur ground so that at least 93 to 95 per cent passes a 325-mesh screen is of the proper degree of fineness. It may be obtained commercially in the conditioned and unconditioned forms. Conditioned sulphur contains from 1 1-2 to 2 per cent of a light fluffy material or conditioning agent to improve its physical qualities for dusting purposes; unconditioned sulphur and pure sublimed sulphur give satisfactory results when properly applied, but a good application may be somewhat difficult to obtain unless the dusting equipment is new or in first-class operating condition.

At any rate, coarsely ground or lump sulphur should never be used to control the flea hopper. Dusting should be started when it

At the same time we sincerely believe in the courtesy of Frederick people, and did not think that the whole would endorse the action taken by the officials. Rather than embarrass those officials whom we personally and respect, we restrained our impulse to the courtesy.

Frederick, who were in no way connected with the government, visited us the day following the trade show. We assured us that the reception was in no way representative of the attitude of the city. We believed that the publicity medium (the newspaper) was controlled by the city officials. We told them that such circumstances we did not expect an exceptional reception.

We did not believe that any newspaper, regardless of its political inclinations, could descend to such a low level to make a deliberate and unprovoked attack on a neighbor. Nor did we believe that any city or newspaper could openly pass approval by formal resolution of council on an act of positive rudeness.

It could have easily arisen from misunderstanding. An unprovoked assault by the newspaper is disillusioning. We had greater faith in the integrity of the profession.

They Started The Yelling

Now, they started the yelling. Their conduct wouldn't be quite. We repeat. We said nothing. No explanation. We asked for no apology. Had we content to just state facts without the deliberate attack on Burk Burnett and its citizens, we still would remain. But they have launched a well planned series of using their own discourtesy as the foundation of the incident and made political capital of pre-liminary falsehoods.

Mayor Robert Cull knew that the public would not believe the truth of the situation. So to justify a rudeness he has run three separate articles each of which attempt to show up the Burk Burnettians as "tactless," "boorish," "pique" and then implied that the liars.

He stated that the people of Frederick will never have the opportunity of really knowing the truth. It is a greater insult to the city council and mayor of that city allowed of one man (Blair) outweigh the testimony of 150

5,390 Claims For Old Age Benefits Filed

Dallas, June 23 — The Social Security Board announced today that 5,390 claims for lump-sum and death payments had been filed with the Bureau of Federal Old-Age Benefits, as of June 1. These claims were received from each of the 48 states and from the District of Columbia. None had been received from Alaska and Hawaii on that date.

The report, issued by E. L. Tutt, manager of the Dallas field office of the Social Security Board, showed that New York, with 776, and Pennsylvania, with 610, lead all States in the number of claims filed. In the southwestern region, 127 claims had been filed in Texas, 52 in Louisiana, and four in New Mexico.

Only 43 claims have been disallowed for payment out of all of those filed, according to the report.

"There has been little delay in the payment of claims," Tutt stated. "The average length of time for payment of lump-sum benefits to eligible employees at age 65 after the receipt of the claim is approximately 3 weeks. However, payments to estates of eligible wage earners take an average of about 1 week longer."

This difference in length of time, it was explained, is due to the necessary variations in procedures. A life claim, it was pointed out, involves little more than checking the name and account number and establishing the age

of the claimant and wages received. In the case of a death claim, State laws relating to priorities and exemptions, if funeral and last illness expenses have not been paid, must also be considered.
