58 Expected To Die On Highways

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents would claim 58 lives in Texas during the 102-hour July 4th holiday weekend from 6 p.m. Friday, June 30 to midnight Tuesday, July 4.

The DPS director said that if the holiday is typical, approximately one-third of the fatal accidents will involve only one vehicle.

Traffic law violations will contribute to many of the fatal mishaps with the major factors including speed too fast for conditions and driving while intoxicated.

In an effort to hold the toll down, Speir said the DPS local law enforcement agencies, and the news media of Texas will cooperate in a special "Operation Motorcade" program. Information on fatal collisions will be tabulated at DPS Headquarters in Austin and released three times per day during the holidays in an effort to increase driver awareness.

All available Department of Public Safety patrolmen will be on duty, placing special emphasis on drinking and reckless drivers. Across the state, many city police departments and county sheriff's departments will have extra personnel assigned to intensified enforcement efforts.

"I urge all Texans and visitors to put on their best driving manners and actively join in the 'Operation Motorcade' effort so that this July 4th holiday might be as safe as possible," Speir said.

Why Stand When The Flag Goes By?

At Texas A&M University home football games, the Corps of Cadets always marches into the music of the Aggie Band. At one of these events, recently, I heard a boy ask his Dad, "Why do the people stand up when the flag goes by?" I didn't hear the father's answer, but I began to wonder how I would have answered him.

I think I would have begun by pointing to the live oak trees around the university drill field planted in memory of Texas A&M university students who gave their lives in World War I. After the game I would have taken him by the Memorial Student Center Built in memory of over 900 Aggies, who names are on a bronze plaque at the entrance. They gave their lives in World Wars and those since I would have also pointed out other memorials on the campus, those that remind us of sacrifices in the most recent wars.

Later, when I could have a quiet time with him, I would talk about Concord's bridge, Shenandoah Valley, Flanders Field, St. Lo, Guadalcanal, Bastogne, Korea, and Viet Nam. I would mention to him my young Aggie friend James Ray '63 of Conroe, who has been a prisoner of North Viet Nam for more than five years. And, of course all the other young men imprisoned over there.

I would then talk of what our flag represents, what kind of country it flies over. I would remind him that America is the land of refugees, the land of "the huddled masses longing to be free," and a land dedicated to justice, tranquility, and the general welfare of its people.

I would tell him of the average man and woman and the hundreds who have conquered the mountains, prairies, and plains. I would discuss with him how the very lines of the maps have been marked by the blood of hundreds who plowed and planted and fought and planned, and whose offsprings have poured their abundance around the world to lift others.

Then I would talk of the slant eyes, black faces, Nordic color, Irish enthusiasm, Italian grace, German laughter, Baptists, Catholics, Methodists, Texans, Yankees, Republicans, Democrats, and a thousand and one other tall, short, fat and thin people who call themselves Americans.

We would discuss the "land of the free" "home of the brave," the opportunity to climb the ladder of success according to ability and desire. Then we would talk of the philosophy of "how you play the game" and about "not who your Mama or Papa is," but what's your "Life game plan." I would remind him how each man can worship God as he pleases, sing, whistle, dance, and cheer as his conscience dictates. Next we would discuss our

Yes, as I thought about how I could answer, as I began to enumerate why we stand when the flag goes by, I caught myself standing there in the quietness of my office. The thoughts caught me up in a reverent respect and I wanted to cry out how much I loved the land that has done so much for me. I thought of the nine boys in our company, Company G, 272 Infantry, 69th division, two of them black, who were killed in World War II. I thought of all the schools, jobs, homes, hospitals, and families that make our country not perfect, but far ahead of any other country in the world.

That is the reason why we stand, my boy. So we can get a good look at the red, white, and blue as it passes by, representing all of those sacrifices, all those hopes, all of those things we want for future Americans. This flag going by gives you the privilege to keep sitting, if you want to. But if you are part of the fabric of those who have made it possible for you to rise up in respect, you by your actions will trigger a standing ovation. So stand tall when the flag goes by, so it can always pass your way again.

Weekly Market Report

"To make the most of your
summer food dollar, follow
marketing tips in your area
this week," Mrs. Gwendolyn
Clyatt, consumer marketing
specialist with the Texas
Agricultural Extension Ser-
vice said.

According to Mrs. Clyatt,
pork prices generally
slide down somewhat,
but featured in grocery
store ads each week still
rank as best buys. Usually
one or more cuts are adver-
tised, so it's no problem to
plan an entire week's menu
around these featured cuts.

"Fryer chickens continue
in abundance and still rate as
one of the best protein buys,"
the marketing specialist said.
"Demand rises during bar-
becue months. Although
specials are expected, they
will likely be tagged a few
cents higher. Larger supplies
of turkeys also stock markets.

Mrs. Clyatt pointed out
that dairy products are in
the spotlight since June is
National Dairy Month.
"There's not a more ver-
satile product in your kitchen
than milk and milk products.
Each time you use dairy food
you help insure better health
for your family.

Milk doesn't necessarily
have to be served in a glass.
The specialist said that one
and one-third cups of cottage
cheese or one ounce of Swiss
cheese equal one eight-
ounce glass of milk in terms
of dairy nutrition. Also
equal are one cup of oyster
sauce, yogurt or pudding
made with milk and corn-
starch.

"More local vegetables
appear in the market," Mrs.
Clyatt said. "And quality
good. Squash, corn, cab-
bage, head lettuce, potatoes,
carrots, and dry yellow
beans merit consideration.
In fruit sections, melons--
especially cantaloupes--num-
ber in larger quantity. Peach-
es, apricots, nectarines,
and seedless grapes
will have relatively high
price tags.

Information On Vitamin E

"Vitamin E has often been
called the elusive, myster-
ious vitamin," said the Texas
Agricultural Extension Service
foods and nutrition specialist
Sally Springer.

"The vitamin is very popu-
lar today. According to
one report, sale of vitamin
E surpassed that of vitamin
C last year.

Vitamin E, according to
the Texas A&M University
employee, is an essential
nutrient that naturally occurs
in nature. It's a fat-soluble
vitamin that's stored in the
body, along with the other
fat soluble vitamins, A, D,
and K.

Deficiencies of vitamin E
are extremely rare in man,"
Miss Springer said. "Many
scientists believe a deficiency
of the vitamin doesn't occur
naturally by itself, but only
in combination with deficien-
cies of other vitamins."

Vitamin E acts as an anti-
oxidant. In the body it pre-
vents the lipid and fat parts
of cells from oxidation or
defrad degradation.

"Other possible functions
and relationships may be
equally important," Miss
Springer said, "though until
now they haven't been thor-
oughly researched and prov-
ed."

Thus there's little basis
for claims that vitamin E is
the answer to sterility and
sexual impotence, disorders
of pregnancy, rheumatic
fever, heart disease and oth-
ers.

Dietary sources of vitamin
E include vegetables oils,
green leafy vegetables, le-
gumes, nuts, meats, and
eggs.

There's no evidence to support
the belief that massive sup-
plemental doses of vitamin
E are necessary for the aver-
age healthy person.

Children And Creativity

Creativity means more
than beautiful music, rhyth-
mic poetry and scientific
discoveries.

Everyone has the power to
be creative, according to
family life education spec-
ialist Jane Fleischer.

The Texas Agricultural
Extension service specialist
said that most people are
involved in creative exper-
iences and activities daily.

"We need to think of cre-
ativity in terms of ourselves
and our children," Miss
Fleischer said.

"Anyone
who lives with children must
continually look for new id-
eas and ways of helping and
teaching them."

And this involves creati-
vity in terms of ideas, feel-
ings and experiences. Being
creative means perceiving,
thinking and learning about
things in a new or unusual
way.

"It's an open, responsive
way of living--an exciting
way of life," the specialist
said.

Here are a few points Miss
Fleischer gave for consid-
ering children and creativity:

Each and every child is
creative in his own way.

Creativity means the abil-
ity to invent, discover, ex-
plore, innovate and place
elements in a way they've
never been placed before.

Children need to have the
right kind of situations and
materials to enhance the
possibility of creative exper-
iences. They need the right
atmosphere and environment
for creative thought and play.

Adults involved with child-
ren seem to set the atmos-
phere or mood. Children

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Legislators are moving along methodically toward completing work on a \$3.8 billion 1973 state budget and trying to stay within revenue available.

Presiding officers set a "before-July 4" adjournment target date, but whether they could make it or not remained to be seen.

Gov. Preston Smith stuck by his pledge--to submit no additional business to the special session until the appropriations act is agreed on. A representative's effort via resolution to persuade Smith to "open the call" was rejected, when the House failed to suspend rules (on a 62-55 vote) and permit consideration. Proponents of the resolution argued the session is costing taxpayers \$34,000 a day, but nothing could be accomplished while committees continued to process the appropriations act.

Progress was possible toward better legislative rules as both houses marked time before the budget landed on new desks.

The senate adopted a new set of procedures, providing for fewer and smaller committees and permitting, for the first time, open floor debate on appointments matters.

The house also took a look at further rules amendments designed to reform the committee structure and improve legislative machinery.

Meanwhile, the Senate voted through confirmations of hundreds of interim appointments by the governor, occasionally finding one to reject.

COURTS SPEAK

Sentences of 250 years given three Dallas men in hoodings during robberies were upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The court also upheld the 6-year sentence of a Houston man in the fatal shooting of a pregnant woman.

A federal court suit charging discrimination against minorities at the University of Texas at El Paso has been moved to El Paso for trial.

DRAFT CALL SET

About 500 young Texans will be inducted into the army during August, State elective Service Melvin Lantz predicted.

Men in the first priority group with numbers of 75 or lower are subject to induction.

Those in this range were born in 1952 or before, have lost a draft deferment during 1972 and are now classified 1-A, 1-A-O, or 1-O.

There is no quota for Texas but Lantz noted an increase of 25 in the lottery number for induction from the July draft call. August induction orders will be issued between July 3 and July 28. LIVESTOCK EXPORT HALT THREATENED

The Mexican government, unhappy with quarantine facilities, threatens to halt exports of Texas livestock through major border cities, Agriculture Commissioner John White said.

White said the state faces possible closing of border gates to Texas cattle at El Paso, Laredo, and Brownsville, with re-routing of valuable state export market shipments through Miami, Fla.

Mexican officials insist on "adequate quarantine corrals." Such facilities are under construction at Del Rio and Eagle Pass. White said Texas has not had time and money to build the corrals elsewhere. He said the export halt would have a "serious impact" on a multi-million-dollar program.

AG OPINIONS

The University of Houston may not collect a voluntary fee from students to finance the Texas Public Interest Research Group, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

A driver who operates his car in a negligent, but not "grossly negligent," manner not in violation of a law or ordinance may be tried under negligent homicide statutes if he causes a death.

But one who causes death by "gross negligence" while violating a law or ordinance may not be tried for negligent homicide.

The State comptroller is not authorized to issue a warrant for overpayments of salaries to state agencies when he has knowledge the claim is in excess of the lawful maximum. Neither does he have authority to issue a warrant for an amount greater than that requested by another department head.

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation can make payment in cash to its employees who are subject to the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act for authorized overtime.

A court clerk or reporter is not required to prepare and furnish any portion of the record to individuals confined in state and federal penitentiaries under a pauper's oath in the absence of a court order.

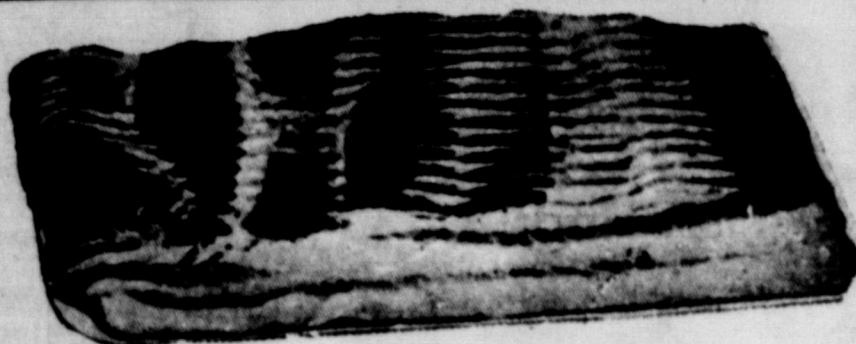

REVACCINATION URGED
Revaccination of horses immunized during the Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis outbreak in 1971 was advised by Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Texas Animal Health Commission.

TAHC and TVMA officials said, although no epidemic is eminent, revaccination is good insurance against the deadly form of sleeping sickness in horses. About 2,000 horses died in Texas during last year's epidemic, and 90 cases of VEE in humans was reported.

A new national program to help veterans make a smooth transition to civilian life was initiated here last week.

Mobile Vans staffed by six specialists in veterans' services offer information on education, training, jobs, loans, and medical care available to veterans. The vans later moved on to San Marcos and scheduled visits to New Braunfels, Seguin, Victoria, Corpus Christi, Kingsville, Galveston, Lufkin, Beaumont and Houston. **REFUNDS AVAILABLE**

In come tax refunds are available for prisoners of war, those missing in action and their families, Internal Revenue Service District Director R. L. Phinney announced.

Phinney said new law provides that military or government pay may be excluded while servicemen or civilian employees of the government are imprisoned or missing, retroactive to Feb. 28, 1961.

SHORT SNORTS

The first bale of cotton in the U.S. was ginned June 20, at San Juan in the Rio Grande Valley.

Twenty five nominees from among 275 highway department maintenance foremen will compete for the third annual Lady Bird Johnson award for highway beautification.

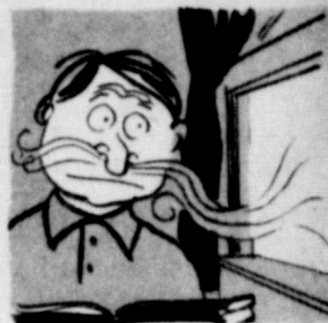

Neighbors at Odds

Grouchy Mrs. Baxter, an apartment dweller, had two reasons for cooking cabbage so often. First, she liked cabbage. Second, she liked to waft the cooking odors out of her open kitchen door, into the apartment of the new neighbors across the hall.



When the neighbors finally hailed her into court, Mrs. Baxter insisted she had a right to cook whatever and however she pleased.

But the court ruled that she was guilty of committing a nuisance, by maliciously inflicting discomfort on others.

Psychologists tell us that hostility grows as living space shrinks. One of the law's toughest tasks is to mediate between neighbors at odds. And, as the above case indicates, evil intent may make the big difference in court.

This is shown even more clearly by the law's changing attitudes toward spite fences. Such fences, erected deliberately to block off the daylight from a neighbor's house, used to be tolerated as a lawful exercise of property rights.

But now they are forbidden almost everywhere. As one court commented, in condemning a spite fence 11 feet high:

"The right to enjoy the sunshine is a natural one, and no man can shut out the light of heaven for no better reason than to gratify his malice toward his neighbor."

Nonetheless, when we choose to live in an urban environment, we are also choosing the reasonable degree of vexation that goes with it.

In another case, a family had a ventilating fan that blew cooking smells out of their kitchen, in the general direction of the house next door.

But this time, when the neighbors went to court to complain, the judge took due note of the fact that the houses were 27 feet apart. At this distance, he said, the degree of annoyance was too slight to awaken the law's disapproval.

The judge said he would not interfere "without some evidence that (the cooking odors) were revolting to a point beyond the effect of ordinary neighborhood exhalations."

Cotton--A Valuable Addition To Synthetics

The cotton-synthetic blend market knows the value of cotton's comfort, color and performance.

"As new fields clamor for the use of more cotton on the surface of double knits, cotton promoters strive for at least 60 to 65 per cent cotton in these new blends," Miss Roxanne Schnorr, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, reported.

The Texas A&M University specialist pointed out that blending of cotton reduces snagging and decreases price with higher contents of the number-one fabric.

"Higher cotton content fabrics are predicted for the near future with the development of new permanent press and chemical finishes for shrinkage control," she said.

According to Miss Schnorr, cotton blends, as well as 100 per cent cotton fabrics, are now on parade as popular corduroy and denim.

"The biggest market in boys' and men's wear for cotton has been jeans and casual slacks. Shirts rank as the single biggest growth market for knits of the future."

She added that while growth is important, better-performing end products are the goal of all fabrics sporting cotton.

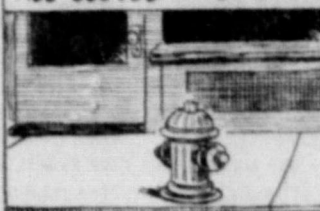

Sickle cell anemia is probably the most common inherited disease in the world, and the occurrence of the disease in Texas is of growing concern to state health officials. Although medical science has just recently begun to untangle the mysteries of this disease, sickle cell anemia has been around for a long, long time.

For generations, stretching back a thousand years or more, some families in black Africa have developed an extreme resistance to killing attacks of malaria. Their resistance was caused by a genetic trait they carried that affected their red blood cells. Those with the trait lived to pass this genetic defense mechanism on to their children.

Despite all its powers against malaria, this life-saving genetic trait also had death-dealing properties. For if two people carry that trait married, their children ran a one in four risk of getting sickle cell anemia--a killer in its own right.

Now, with malaria less of a hazard sickle cell anemia has become the major killer. It strikes mainly blacks.

Sickle cell disease, the most common inherited disorder in the U.S., is believed to be present in one of every ten black American, or more than two million black U.S. Citizens.

Although the disease occurs in a relatively benign "carrier" form in most of these two million, approximately one in every 500 black infants is born with the life-threatening disease. It is believed that almost three percent of the total black population in the United States suffers from this malady.

Such individuals undergo painful episodes called sickle cell crises, and quite often death.

The disease is due to a genetically determined defect in hemoglobin, the respiratory pigment in red blood cells which enable them to carry oxygen throughout the body. Under conditions of diminished oxygen supply of physical or emotional stress, the abnormal hemoglobin molecules become attached to one another in such a way as to distort the normally doughnut-shaped red cells into a distinctive crescent, a quarter-moon, or sickle-

shape. The inability of these sickled cells to pass freely through smaller blood vessels creates a "log jam" effect, blocking the flow of blood to surrounding tissues, thus causing the extremely painful and dangerous sickle cell crises.

Sickle cell anemia is actually one of the most common long-term illnesses of Negro children. Its incidence is much greater than that of some other well-known childhood disorders. In any city with 30 percent Negro population, more than twice as many children are born with sickle cell anemia as cystic fibrosis. It is nearly nine times as many as phenylketonuria. According to the 1970 census, seven of the ten largest cities in the U.S. have at least 30 percent Negro population.

The treatment of patients with sickle cell anemia remains a difficult problem, since there is no cure and no truly effective management. All doctors can do is ease the symptoms of the disease and try to control sickle cell crises when they occur.

New research programs are now underway to try to find improved treatment methods. New forms of treatment may make possible reversal of the sickling process, thereby shortening or even preventing the sickle cell crises and the resultant tissue damage.

Sickle Cell anemia, like cystic fibrosis or muscular dystrophy, is only one of some 1,545 identified hereditary diseases.

Texas Number One Again...Beef Cattle Still Not At Full Parity...Milk Production Remains Steady...Egg-Type Chick Hatch Down, Broiler and Turkey Hatches Increase...Hogs Sold Through Auctions Are Up...DDT Ban Analyzed

TEXAS is number one again in cattle feeding. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes that 2,045,000 head of cattle were on feed in Texas as of June 1. This is 22 per cent above a year ago and 11 per cent above the 1,848,000 on feed a month ago.

Texas replaces Iowa as the number one cattle feeding state in the nation. For the six-state cattle on feed-Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, and Nebraska-cattle on feed total 7,925,000 head.

BEEF cattle prices, although at new highs, are still not on an equal financing rating with the rest of the economy. Beef prices are now at 93 per cent of parity; calf prices are at 96 per cent of parity. In reality, cattle prices are only slightly higher than levels of 20 years ago, yet cattle production costs have more than doubled during that time.

Throughout the six-state cattle on feed report, numbers of cattle on feed increased. The 7,925,000 head as of June 1 is 12 per cent more than a year ago.

MILK production in Texas during May totaled 293,000,000 pounds. This is the same as in May, 1971, but one per cent below the previous month's production.

Milk production per cow kept for milk averaged 825 pounds per cow for the month of May. This is the same as a year earlier but five pounds below the previous month. Preliminary price for all wholesale milk for May was estimated at \$6.65 per hundredweight.

Nationwide, milk production is estimated during May at one per cent above a year earlier.

HATCH of egg-type chickens in Texas totaled 2,009,000, down 10 per cent from a year ago. The May hatch of broiler chicks increased five per cent from a year ago. The total of 18,163,000 was four per cent above the preceding month. The total turkey poult hatch for May at 1,436,000 increased nine per cent from a year ago.

Egg production totaled 240 million compared with 225 million a year ago. The 12.3 million layers averaged 62.8 eggs daily per 100 hens. Layers on hand were up four per cent from a year ago, two per cent below April.

Nationwide, egg production declined two per cent from a year ago. The daily egg production per 100 layers was slightly higher than for Texas at 63.7.

SALES for cattle and calves, sheep and goats were below year ago levels while hog sales showed an increase.

Cattle and calves marketed through auctions during May numbered 567,000 head, 13 per cent below a year ago. Sheep sales at livestock auctions totaled 167,000 head, 24 per cent below a year ago.

Hogs sold during May totaled 54,000 head, four per cent above a year ago.

NO SERIOUS problems for Texas are in prospect with the banning of most uses of DDT at the end of this year. Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said. The use of DDT in agriculture has declined drastically in recent years throughout the state.

COTTON season is underway with the first bale of cotton of the 1972 crop having been ginned recently at San Juan in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Indications are the Valley crop is a good one.

CATTLE PRICES

On May 15, 1972 nationwide cattle prices on all classes of cattle stood at \$33.10 per CWT. If cattle had been standing at parity price, they would have been bringing \$36.40 per CWT. Another way to say this, "If cattle prices had gone up as much as the things farmers buy to keep their ranches going, the price of cattle would be \$36.40." The base figure the Government uses to set forth the parity figure is 1909-1914. All items were given a figure of 100. So what we are saying is, cattle prices were bringing only ninety-one per cent of what they should have been bringing as of May 15, 1972. The parity price on calves was \$43.70 per CWT. Calves were bringing an average of only \$42.80 as of May 15, 1972. So, even calves stand at slightly less than ninety-eight percent of parity. To my knowledge this is the first time farmers and ranchers have come close to getting parity on any product.

The parity ratio on all farm products stands at only 73 per cent as of May 15, 1972.

For over two decades, following World War II, cow-calf operators received less than two percent return on their investments.

For the first time they are about up to what is considered a fair return on their investment. They deserve the price they are getting today. They stocker and feeder operator are in the same straight jacket they have always been in. They are faces with the highest prices they have ever faced for replacement cattle. Also, unrestricted meat imports and the possibility of Government controls over farm products that have not even attained parity prices.

SCREW WORMS

Screw worms have been confirmed in Oldham and Swisher counties. McLean area ranchers should carefully check their herds for possible worm infestations. Should you have what you believe to be a case, collect several of the worms and place in alcohol. Pick up a mailing tube at the McLean News. These mailing tubes are self-addressed and postage free. There is a small glass vial in each one that has a preservative and a short questionnaire for you to fill out. As I understand it, should a positive determination be made in a new area, there would be some sterile fly drops made. Other measures from the state level would be employed to help contain the screw worms.

GRASSHOPPERS

Grasshoppers are beginning to invade many gardens and yards in the Pampa area. These hoppers are real small. Weather has been ideal to hatch hoppers in the fence rows. Sometime ago a representative on the Federal level brought survey maps by my office. They have us inked in as an area that could have moderate infestations of hoppers for this season. You might want to check your fence rows now. Many times they can be killed with a minimum of effort by spraying the fence row and a band around your fields or ranges

by taking this action. Malathion is now the main chemical used for grasshopper control. This is an excellent insecticide to use around gardens since it is much safer than the older insecticides used for hoppers.

Sewing Course To Be Taught In Pampa

A short course on making men's pants from double knit polyester fabrics will be conducted in July by Jimmie Lou Walmscott, Gray County Home Demonstration Agent, at the Court house Annex east of Pampa on Highway 60. Any person who is interested is invited to attend.

The first meeting will be on selection of pattern, fabric, notions, and measuring for size and type of pattern. The second meeting will be on pattern alterations, preparation of fabrics and findings, cutting and marking. The final meeting will be on construction details of fly front, pockets, seams, waist finishes, and hems.

Miss Walmscott stated the cost of the pants completed would range from \$6.00-\$12.00 depending on the cost of the fabric so, money-wise, the homemaker can save money as well as pleasing the men in her life. An additional incentive in making men's pants if obtaining a good fit.

Again, the first session is at 2 p.m. on Thursday, July 6 at the Courthouse Annex east of Pampa on Highway 60. Anyone who is interested is invited to attend.

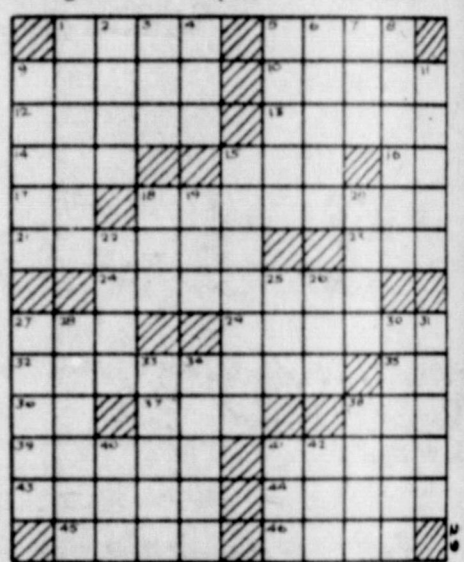
