At White River Lake

Membership drive is on for country club

The future of the proposed White River Lake Country Club and golf course will be settled by a membership drive now being conducted in the four member cities of Post, Spur, Ralls and Crosbyton.

J. B. Potts, one of Post's two representatives on the temporary board of directors of the club, explained that the organization must obtain 160 members from the four

member cities if the organization is to qualify for a construction loan from the Farmers Home Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Proposed as a starter is a nine-hole grass greens golf course to be located in the neck between the two northern canyon prongs of the White River Lake.

Also planned is a club house, which could be expanded in the

future, a putting green, driving range, and swimming pool.

Estimated cost of the development would be \$159,000 with most of the funds for construction coming in a 40-year loan from the FHA.

While memberships from Lubbock and other nearby cities and towns can be accepted, the FHA requirement is for 160 members from the four member cities.

At a meeting at the filtration plant office one night last week, directors of the organization voted to launch a final two week membership drive to determine if the 160 member goal is within reach, or whether the project is to be dropped.

Club memberships cost \$150 with monthly dues estimated at between \$10 and \$15. Directors believe the loan could be retired and the club operated on \$10 monthly dues basis.

The course, designed by the golfing architectural firm of Cantrell and Bruns of Lubbock, would be a par 72 layout of 6,920 yards with one hole over water.

No White River water district funds would be used in the construction of the proposed facilities. (See White River CC, Page 8)

Oil operator, workers give \$384 to Library

The "big gifts" financial drive of the Friends of a Public Library Tuesday received a \$384 contribution from George R. Brown, Houston independent oil operator, and his 24 local employees.

E. R. (Buster) Moreland handed the contribution to J. B. Potts, chairman of the "big gifts" campaign Tuesday afternoon.

When Moreland was originally

contacted a few weeks ago concerning the drive by Dick Dickson, Moreland wrote Brown in Houston concerning the matter.

Brown replied that since the support of the Post Public Library would be basically local, he said he would match "dollar for dollar" all contributions made by his employees here.

Moreland contacted the employees, all of whom made contributions totaling \$128. Moreland wrote Brown of the \$128 given locally by firm employees and pointed out that there was a 100 per cent participation.

The support given the library so pleased Brown that he replied that he would double his contribution, since there had been such an excellent response. He enclosed his check for \$256.

Moreland, who through the years has been one of Post's most energetic boosters, told The Dispatch: "The library is such a wonderful project for Post that everyone should support it."

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57 wells drilled last year

More than \$151 million a year of economic stimulation for Garza County flows from its oil and gas wells each year, an annual study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association showed today.

"As one of the 206 producing counties in Texas, Garza County's economy is sensitive to fluctuations in the oil industry generally," commented W. A. Landreth, Fort Worth, Association president.

"Long range, the demand for oil looks strong and current production rates continue to provide Texas as a major source of its income.

On the other hand, Texas operators are beset by competition from other oil producing areas, government ceilings on natural gas prices, heavy tax payments, and a price for crude oil that is insufficient to encourage the amount of exploratory drilling that is needed to find future reserves."

Based on latest U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, Garza County in 1965 produced 5.1 million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$13.6 million and 707.6 million cubic feet of natural gas valued at

Burglar hides in store, 'breaks out' with loot

Man seen making getaway on foot

The United Super Market at 122 North Broadway was burglarized last night by a man who evidently had concealed himself in the building at the store's closing time and then was almost caught after he "broke out" at 10:15 p. m.

Two Post youths, Billy Max Gordon and Johnny Tom Bilberry, who were across the street at the Humble Service Station, saw the man leave the store after breaking out the plate glass at one of the front doors.

The youths called city police after seeing the man flee down the alley to the southeast of the store, "running like a race horse," as they described it to officers.

Sheriff L. E. (Fay) Claborn, who along with Night City Patrolman R. C. Stark investigated the burglary, said the intruder took \$48.15 from the store's Gold Bond stamp redemption center forcing two locks on a filing cabinet.

He also broke into the store's office, but the only thing missed there was a roll of stamps, which Claborn said he and Stark found laying on top of a box near the door through which the burglar made his exit.

The sheriff said the burglar apparently cut himself in breaking out of the store, as they found blood on the ground between the store and the alley down which the

robber fled.

Before successfully breaking out at the front of the store, the burglar had tried to make his exit by breaking out windows high up on the interior of the store, and also had attempted to get out the back door.

Gordon and Bilberry described the man they saw fleeing the store as "slender, bare-headed and blond, wearing light levis and a plaid shirt," the sheriff said.

Sheriff Claborn said he and Stark were able to track the man down the alley as far as to where it comes out on Avenue I, approximately one block from the store.

The "break out" at United followed two more burglaries here last week, one Thursday night and the other Friday night.

Wacker's Variety Store was burglarized Thursday night for the second time within a week. John the firm was hit "a little lighter"

than it was the week before when burglars made off with several hundred dollars in cash and merchandise.

The Post Pharmacy lost approximately \$150 from its cash register to burglars Thursday night, according to owner Frank Blanton.

Wackers again was entered from the rooftop with the intruders going in through the same air-conditioner aperture they had used

Oil valuations boost to aid school budget

A very welcome \$1,500,000 estimated boost in oil valuations will permit the Post school district to absorb the increased costs of a teachers' salary hike next year without a boost in the \$1.50 tax rate.

That was the good news, if all goes well, Supt. Bill Shiver had for Post school trustees when he presented his 1967-68 district budget to them for consideration Friday morning.

The proposed budget proposes expenditures of \$727,801.06 for the school district's operation, an increase of approximately \$50,000 over the current school year which ended Aug. 31. All of the budget boost is for a \$630 increase in salaries to teachers voted recently by the state and for increase in salaries through another year of experience increments to teachers returning to the system.

THE BUDGET was presented to trustees for their study prior to their future action. A public budget hearing is yet to be set for final action. The district's board of equalization is scheduled to meet July 5.

Shiver reported to trustees that the oil evaluation engineering firm of Pritchard and Abbott have estimated that oil valuations will jump from \$18,141,790 last year to \$19,641,790 this year.

If so, oil interests will pay approximately 55.5 per cent of school district taxes this year as the local property valuation is estimated at \$14,043,240, a drop of \$182,310 from

last year. Total property valuation for the district for the new year is estimated at \$33,885,030, as compared with \$32,397,30 for the current year.

SHIVER TOLD the board that the oil valuation boost is "a conservative estimate" which means it could go higher.

"The budget does not include the application of any surpluses from any previous year," Shiver told the board. "Therefore, it is anticipated that upon the transfer of all surpluses of the 1965-66 and 1966-67 school years to the time

warrant account, all remaining time warrants—some \$43,000 worth—will be purchased during the 1967-68 school year—three years ahead of schedule."

The school district issued \$148,000 in time warrants two years ago when Shiver moved into the superintendency to pay off a school district deficit.

The time warrants were set up to be paid off in six years but through tight fiscal management it now appears they will be paid off in exactly half of that time (See School Budget, Page 6)

Pioneer Gas asks hike in area towns' rates

Pioneer Natural Gas Company is asking Post and the other 54 cities and towns of its West Texas Distribution System for an 11.5 per cent increase in gas rates.

It would be the first boost in six years.

The gas utility firm in its request, released last Friday to news media, declares that "revenues are not now sufficient under the present rate . . . to yield the company a reasonable return on its investment."

"It is vitally important that the

company be allowed to earn a reasonable return to enable it to attract necessary capital and adequately meet the needs of its service area," the company says in presenting the requested rates and the reasons for asking for them.

The request will be made to Post's city council at its July meeting next Monday night by Angus O'Neal, manager of the firm's office here. Full information on the request already is in the hands of all council members for study.

Pioneer asks that the new rates become effective for all meter reading periods beginning on or after Aug. 15. This would mean the boost would first show up on customer billings mailed out around Oct. 1.

The proposed new rates with the present rates in parentheses are as follows:

First 2,000 cu. ft. or less per month, \$1.65 (\$1.86); next 8,000 cu. ft. per month, 67.5 cents per thousand cu. ft. (60.5 cents); next 40,000 cu. ft. per month, 61 cents (53 cents); next 50,000 cu. ft. per month, 56 cents (50 cents); next 200,000 cu. ft. or more, 50 cents (45 cents).

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New state pay raise for teachers approved here

Post school trustees Friday morning approved for the 1967-68 school year the new state teachers' pay raise, which will amount to \$630 additional per year for all local teachers under 16 years teaching experience.

Teachers with 16 years or more experience received a proportionately greater state salary boost two years ago than teachers with less experience.

The Post Independent School District will continue to pay its teachers at a scale of \$400 over the salary set by the state. The raises will be extended to all the staff but the superintendent at the recommendation of Supt. Bill Shiver.

Shiver told trustees the pay raise will cost the school district \$16,800.

THIS IS because the entire increase must be paid by the district for the nine teachers on the staff in excess of state approved teaching needs and because of the state formula for state aid which requires all school districts to participate with tax money in the state aid plan.

Other actions taken by trustees at their regular June meeting included:

Giving Supt. Shiver the authority to negotiate on behalf of the board with the Post Jaycees for use of the school auditorium for the Jaycees' monthly Hootenannies.

Accepted the resignation of Mrs. Ada Buchanan, who in the spring announced her plans to retire from teaching here.

Adopted a school calendar for the 1967-68 school year which provides for the annual teachers' workshop, Aug. 28-29, the opening of the fall term Aug. 30, a Labor Day holiday for Sept. 4, Thanksgiving holidays Nov. 23-24, the Christmas holidays from Dec. 22 through Jan. 1, Easter holidays April 12-15, end of school classes for the year May 22, teachers' work days for May 23-24, and high school graduation May 24.

DECIDED to invite bids for the new school year for gasoline, oil, milk, master units, and ditto fluid.

Approved purchase of a 48-passenger bus chassis and a 36-passenger bus chassis from the state board of control.

Authorized Supt. Shiver to fill the vacancy as the second teacher in the new 12-month two-unit vocational agricultural department.

Left by the resignation of Gerald Wilke, who is going to Jarrell, Tex., next year.

Shiver told the board that Wilke's resignation had come only that morning and while he had several applicants he needed to make an immediate selection to begin work July 1.

Based on latest U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, Garza County in 1965 produced 5.1 million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$13.6 million and 707.6 million cubic feet of natural gas valued at

\$91,500, and ranks 74th among Texas counties in production.

A major distribution of income from sales of oil and gas went to county landowners in royalty payments totaling more than \$1.9 million.

In 1966, a year that saw drilling in Texas fall to its lowest level since 1947, oil and gas operators drilled 57 wells in Garza County. Of these 12 were wildcats seeking new fields.

The Association estimated that operators in the county spent more

than \$4.5 million in drilling last year, of which \$1.1 million was lost in dry holes.

Sharing heavily in the county's production each year is the State Treasury, which received \$695,370 in production taxes in 1965 paid by the producers and royalty owners. Crude oil production paid \$688,965 and natural gas production, \$6,405.

Texas Employment Commission figures for 1966 show that some 60 workers directly employed in oil and gas operations accounted for a payroll in excess of \$291,908.

Let's have some celebrations!

Next Tuesday will be another "grand and glorious" Fourth of July, but it will be that in name only here in Post, where nothing special is planned for the holiday.

More and more towns in this area are going back to the old custom of having something special on the Fourth of July, and we hope it isn't long before Post joins the parade. At Brownfield, for instance, where nothing special has been held on the Fourth for a number of years, they are having a Loyalty Day parade. Snyder and Hale Center are two other West Texas towns where Independence Day celebrations will be held, and there are a number of others.

Come to think of it—and the reason we did is because someone was in to ask us about it the other day—Post's Stampede and Junior Rodeo the second week in August is the nearest thing to a celebration we have here all year long.

The fellow who was in to see us about special

observances in Post was compiling a list for the Garza County Historical Survey Committee, and we both were surprised, after giving it some thought, that Post and Garza County doesn't observe any of the holidays with special celebrations, unless you count the annual Christmas trades promotion event of the Chamber of Commerce as such.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars post sponsors the annual Memorial Day service, of course, and the American Legion post holds its annual Independence Day supper for veterans, but neither of these two observances can hardly classify as county-wide celebrations. Neither does the rodeo nor the annual junior livestock show and county fair, although we're all grateful for these events and for the groups that put them on.

What Post and Garza County needs is one or two old-fashioned county-wide, "everybody come" celebrations once or twice a year, and the Fourth of July is the best day we can think of for staging one of them.—CD

'Four-layer cake' for taxpayers

Best economic news in the last three years is the announcement that all valuations for the school district are "conservatively estimated" at a million and a half dollar increase for 1967.

This reflects all the drilling in and around the Post city limits during the last 12 months in which five or six new pay zones were opened to production by the George R. Brown oil interests of Houston and others.

This is the first time oil valuations have increased for the school district since 1964.

This is not just a one-layer tax cake, but a four-layer one.

It means that oil valuations for the city, White River water district, and county as well will be given a needed boost.

Just as the oil valuation increase appears sure to forestall the need for any school tax increase despite teacher salary raises, so the

boost to the city should enable the city and the water district to hold the line as well.

The county is in more serious financial difficulty than any of the other three local taxing units because despite a real property valuation upward last year the county fell short of the valuation it needed to make any serious cutback in its previous deficits.

The total oil valuation for the county may not rise as high as the school district either, as older fields in the county may lose production to offset the promising new gains in and around the city.

But regardless of this one "weak spot"—and it may not be as weak as we have indicated—the oil valuation boost should provide a pleasing shot in the arm to harried local taxpayers who no longer look forward to the fall, because that is tax paying time.—JC

Highway beautification setback

The Johnson Administration apparently has lost to a very powerful billboard lobby in its efforts to beautify the nation's highways. Or, to put it another way, commercialism has won again.

It was announced recently by Transportation Secretary Alan S. Boyd that he had agreed to defer to the states a large degree of control over highway billboards. This had been the aim of the billboard lobby, since state legislatures will be easier to influence than Congress.

In view of the promising, if late, start made

by this country to take advantage of nature's beauty and make our highways picturesque, it is unfortunate that the effort to keep commercial signs off the highways has suffered such a severe setback.

The recent abdication of authority which no doubt was necessary if the highway beautification act was to be renewed at all, means various states will have various standards for signboards along the highways and in some the standards almost certainly will not be what they should be.—CD

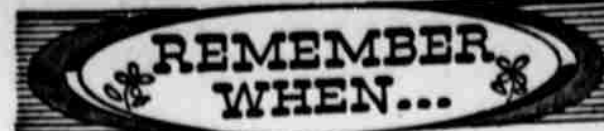
SOME COLUMNIST comes up with the observation that perhaps the only town in the nation that reads the same both upside-down and backside-foremost is that thriving Montana metropolis:

Decisions, decisions, decisions! That's what Sammie Kay Caffey and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Caffey Jr., have been faced with this summer as Sammie plans to leave soon for a five-week training course which will determine if she will become a volunteer in the Peace Corps. Sammie and 38 other trainees will report at Philadelphia, Pa., for a three-day session before leaving for Bolivia, South America, July 8. Extensive training will take place there and those who succeed will take their places as Peace Corps volunteers in that country.

Where do the decisions come in? Packing a two year's supply of clothing, cosmetics, including shampoo, etc., and shoes is no easy matter. Mrs. Caffey has been busy at the sewing machine for several weeks and has made several outfits for her daughter. These clothes must be suitable for work either in the Andes Mountains, the jungle or valley areas.

Sammie is allowed 115 pounds of air freight and may carry 66 pounds with her on the plane. A few items can, of course, be purchased in Bolivia, Sammie said, but the cost is a bit prohibitive.

SAN ANGELO — Fleet-footed scaled quail are satisfactorily abundant throughout West Texas and are beginning a strong nesting effort, according to field reports from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Clutches of peanut-sized baby scaled (blue) quail are just now beginning to appear and sightings are expected to increase noticeably during the next few weeks.

Wildlife personnel throughout West Texas will not begin quail brood counts until next month but all are optimistic about the number of scaled quail seen thus far.

a considerable interest savings. Paying off of the emergency time warrants for the deficits three years ahead of schedule has been made possible financially by cutting down on the number of excess teachers (teaching positions not supported by state school funds) in the amount of \$27,550 annually.

BUDGET INCOME is based upon a 90 per cent tax collection. Slightly higher collections in recent years have enabled the district to come up with surpluses to pay off time warrants ahead of schedule.

The new budget does not include the government's Title I program under federal aid to education. Supt. Shiver told the board that Miss Valenzuela is under contract for the Title I program, financed by federal funds, for next year and that the state director of the program has indicated it will be in force for next year.

"This budget is presented with the attitude that too much 'cutting' can harm the instructional program," Shiver told the board. "It is my opinion that there is no extravagance in this budget. All expenditures are directed toward instructional effectiveness, including the beautification of both buildings and grounds."

Shiver noted that the proposed budget shows a \$2,283.62 deficit which must be corrected before final adoption. He pointed out that maintenance projects and additions to the school bus fleet are held until the final months of each budget year so they can be reduced if enough money is not available for them. This purchasing technique helps the district from getting into any new deficit fiscal situation should unexpected heavy emergency repairs be required during the school year.

OF THE \$725,517.44 receipts foreseen for the new budget year, \$457,447.50 will be raised through school district taxes with the remainder coming basically from state funds. County school fund investments and tuition for transfer students account for small amounts of additional revenue.

Approximately 68 per cent of the total school district budget—or \$494,232.30—will go for salaries of teachers, administrators, principals, secretaries, and maintenance personnel.

A total of \$120,030—or over 16 per cent of the total budget—will go for debt retirement with \$85,000 going on the retirement of bonds and time warrants and the remainder for interest on the debt.

The bulky 61-page budget is broken down in complete detail even including the number of such things as pencils, paper, audio visual materials, and typewriters ribbons each department of the school will need for the coming school year.

tion to employ Mrs. Frankie Robbins, wife of Post's new state highway patrolman, Jon Robbins, as a sixth grade teacher. She has had one year of experience in the Lubbock schools and comes well recommended, Shiver said.

AMENDED THE expenditure budget for the current school year to \$740,084.15 to account for the \$11,360.42 deficit caused by the purchase of time warrants from surplus of the 1965-66 school year, which funds were not included in the current budget at the suggestion of the auditor.

Approved the employment as a junior high teacher of Mrs. Carolyn Sawyers, wife of Ed Sawyers. Mrs. Sawyers has taught in the local schools before.

Took under consideration suggested changes in board policy for Post High School presented by Supt. Shiver and the principals involved.

These changes included:
Each high school student shall be required to enroll for four years instruction in English.

THAT THE school year in both junior high and high school be divided into four nine-week reporting or grade periods instead of six six-week periods as now in effect.

That each student shall be required to complete (with physical education counted as one credit) 23 credits for graduation in 1971 and subsequent years, 22 credits for graduation in 1970, and 21 credits for graduation in 1969.

The school administrator, explaining the final proposed change, said high school seniors can now secure their 20 required credits for graduation by the end of their first semester of their senior year and too many have a tendency to "goof off" the "nal senior semester.

Students won't like the stiffer requirements, Shiver said, but the students will be much better prepared for college if they have to make three additional graduation credits the final semester and work hard through their entire senior year.

THE BOARD WAS asked to "think over" the proposed changes and to take action on them at their July or August meetings.

The board also discussed transfer of students with Lynn County schools. Shiver told the board it cost this district state funds for eight students this year by permitting a transfer on request.

He said if any such agreement is made it should be made in writing between the school trustees of the two districts and not as an oral agreement between superin-

tendents as superintendents change. Such an oral agreement, he said, is supposed to be in effect, but he did not make it. Loss of such transfers in recent years he pointed out has cost the Post school district \$5,000 annually in state school funds.

Supt. Shiver said the Post school system next year will lose one more teacher in state supported salary because of reduced average daily attendance.

He said this came about because during the first week of May, 31 Latin American students were withdrawn from school here by their parents for northern migration for the harvest season.

THE SUPERINTENDENT told the board he has attached a letter to his state average daily attendance report to the state asking that P. E. Hutchinson, director of finance for state school funds, take this under consideration and make some type of dispensation for this particular situation as local schools had to provide for the education of the 31 students for over eight months of the school year.

Contrary to "critical rumors," Shiver told trustees, the percentage of attendance for the school year just completed did not drop but actually increased 1.01 per cent as a total over the previous year.

Shiver added that the high school percentage did increase too and not decrease as rumors had it.

Post suffered a loss of five teachers at the start of the 1966-67 school year because of average daily attendance decreases in the 1965-66 school year.

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Mind Your Medical Manners

To help make relations between you and your doctor more pleasant and more productive, the American Medical Association has drawn up this guide. It spells out in simple terms what patient and physician can reasonably expect from each other. We earnestly recommend that you read it:

1. Keep your appointment (or notify the doctor's office when you know you can't be there). Even a few hours notice that you can't make it may be enough to allow another patient to take your place.

2. Be prompt but be prepared to wait. Unfair? Not at all. Diagnosis and treatment cannot be scheduled on an exact timetable. Some patients take longer than others. Emergencies arise that upset the doctor's schedule.

3. Be cooperative in giving your medical history. Illness or injuries in your past have a direct bearing on your present condition, on your reaction to tests and on how you respond to surgery or medical treatment.

4. Don't ask the receptionist or nurse for information about your condition. She is ethically bound not to discuss medical findings with patients. If you have questions, ask your doctor.

5. Fill in insurance forms correctly and completely before handing them to the doctor. Most forms are to be filled in partially by the patient. Save your doctor as much time as possible by reading the forms carefully beforehand and filling in as much as you can in advance.

7. Be business-like in financial arrangements. Don't hesitate to ask about the doctor's fee, and to discuss anything you don't understand. Also, your doctor has many business expenses to meet, and your prompt payment will help him maintain an efficient practice.

600 cu. ft. per month, 42 cents (33 cents); next 200,000 cu. ft. per month, 37 cents (33 cents); all over 500,000 cu. ft. per month 31 cents (28 cents).

Included among the 55 cities in the area, besides Post, are Plainview, Lubbock, Midland and Odessa. Pioneer operates its distribution plants serving the 55-town system as a unit "providing economies not available to independent operation."

The last rate boost was effective Jan. 28, 1961, and produced a 10 per cent increase in gross revenue. The company said the higher field cost of gas contributed heavily to the need for that increase.

The request for the increase in the present rate is primarily attributable to the increase which has been experienced in labor, materials, general taxes, and other operating costs, according to the company.

The company presents figures to show that operating and maintenance expenses and general taxes per customer in the last five years have increased from \$34.28 to \$40.15 per customer or 17.1 per cent. In the same period the distribution system investment per customer has gone up from \$160.29 to \$180.31, an increase of \$20.02 per customer or 12.5 per cent. Construction costs for the same period have increased from 12.2 to 17.9 per cent on various items.

Pioneer said the requested rate boost throughout its service area would produce \$1,378,771 additional annual revenue, which it said is substantially less than the \$2,164,158 deficiency in its present rate. Of the \$1,378,771, additional city franchise, state gross receipts and federal income taxes would take \$685,342.

The rate increase would boost the firm's net operating income from \$639,952 — a 2.35 per cent rate of return on capital — to \$1,333,381, or a 4.90 per cent return on investment.

George R. Brown oil interests reported completion of potential tests on Kirby Oil's new dual producer, the No. 3G. Completed in the B and D zones of the San Andres it made 84 barrels of oil daily plus two per cent water from the B zone and 73 barrels of oil plus 25 per cent water from the D zone.

Food spending rose in 1966

COLLEGE STATION—Total food expenditures last year increased seven to eight per cent, according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Texas A&M Extension consumer marketing specialist. Mrs. Clyatt added that disposable personal income during 1966 was up approximately eight per cent, so the actual percentage of income spent on food is about the same as in 1965.

The cost of food, like the cost of many other things, will continue to edge upward in 1967. The increase will not match that of 1966, however.

The specialist pointed out that reduced beef supplies will probably mean higher prices, especially after mid-year. Dairy prices, too, are expected to rise. Consumers may also expect higher prices for cereal and bakery products. Fats and oils may cost more; potato prices should remain about the same.

On the brighter side, Mrs. Clyatt forecasts generous supplies of pork, poultry, and eggs and lower prices on these items. Citrus fruits, too, should be less expensive in 1967.

Prison inmates printing money

HUNTSVILLE — Printing money in various denominations is no problem for inmate printers at the Huntsville Unit, Texas Department of Corrections.

In 1966, they printed \$325,000 worth of \$7 bills designed to promote the annual Texas Prison Rodeo held here each Sunday in October.

This currency proved so popular that rodeo officials decided to carry the theme a step further for the coming 1967 rodeo series.

Now inmate printers are busy producing two bills. One is a \$3 "Rodeo Wampus" bill; the other, a \$4 bill labeled "Convict Loot."

Both bills inform the holder that "This note and \$2.40 will get you into the Prison Rodeo Stadium."

Although the money printing business is strictly legal, prison officials point out that this cleverly designed currency cannot be exchanged for cash.

However, persons who still have the \$7 bills have this alternative. They can exchange them for this year's \$3 and \$4 denominations by writing Prison Rodeo Office; Box 32; Huntsville, Texas 77340.

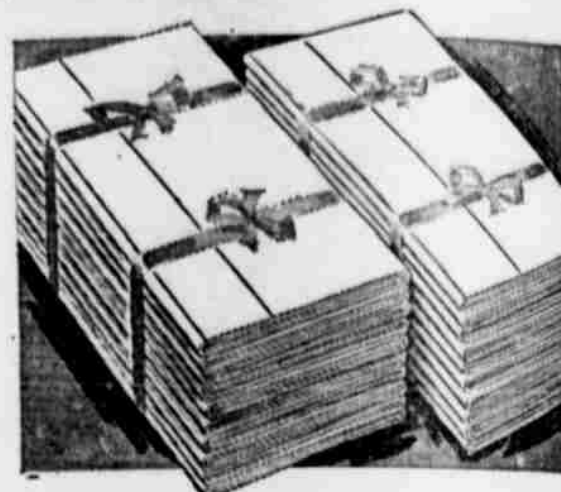

Post woman's grandson is world's top juggler

Norman Crider of Socorro, N. M., grandson of Mrs. Lydia Crider of Post, has become the first American to win the Restelli Trophy for the International Juggler's Festival held in Bergamo, Italy, in May.

The 29-year-old Crider is a baton-twirling champion of national and international fame. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Crider of Socorro. Walter Crider and Mildred Wuborn, both of Post, are his uncle and aunt.

The trophy won at Bergamo, Italy, is awarded the "world's greatest juggler" and is considered by Crider to be "the prize" among his 75 national and international trophies. Crider was the only representative from the United States, competing against entries from China, Bulgaria, Denmark, Italy and Spain.

Crider was born in Lordsburg, N. M. He attended high school in Carrizozo and college in Las Cruces at New Mexico state University.

His interest in twirling began at the age of 11 and by the time he was 13 he was New Mexico state champion. He attended NMSU on a scholarship and was the college's featured twirler.

After two years, Crider left college to become a professional twirler, and in 1961 performed throughout Europe. He has performed abroad continuously since then, appearing twice in the London Palladium and before hundreds of theatre, night club and TV audiences.

During his years in Europe, Crider has also earned a reputation as a collector and an authority on rare old books, art prints, ceramics and statues. He plans to leave show business in 1968, return to the States and open a shop in New York City.

Crider's father is a retired teacher and elementary school principal and his mother is employed by the Farmer's Home Administration.

Post Marine in combat training

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — Marine Pvt. Roy D. Britton, son of Mrs. Gay Britton of 613 West 13th St., Post, Tex., was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here.

He will now undergo about three weeks of individual combat training, and then, after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.

The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival techniques, both at sea and ashore, to develop self-confidence and endurance. Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and the 45-calibre pistol are equally stressed, and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.

A thorough study of basic military subjects; hygiene; first aid and sanitation; and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join Marine combat forces.

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\$1 per bale collection forms being mailed out

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Forms and instructions for collecting \$1 per bale of upland cotton from growers to finance a cotton expansion program under Cotton Research and Promotion Act are being mailed this week to the Cotton Board.

Board Chairman G. C. Wright Jr., Rolling Fork, Miss., said the forms are being mailed to growers and other potential "collectors."

The assessment is applicable to all bales of upland cotton produced from cotton harvested and ginned on or after June 10, 1967.

A separate covering letter to ginners explains the collection of the \$1 per bale and the use of the gin if it does the form may also be distributed to buyers who might have not received a supply.

Instructions for use of the forms are provided on the cover sheet of the pad. An order card for additional forms also is enclosed.

A separate covering letter and a copy of the Cotton Board regulations went to cotton buyers, shippers, and warehouses.

"We have tried to make these forms as simple as possible yet complete enough so that, coupled with the gin reports, we can assure collection on every bale handled," Mr. Cortright notes in this letter.

Within the next two weeks, he also explains, gins will receive the required forms for use as "reporting handlers." One form is a pre-paid postcard for reporting the number of bales ginned during the month. The other is an end-of-season report containing an alphabetical list of producers, their addresses, and the number of bales ginned for each.

He said the Cotton Division, Consumer and Marketing Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, this week completed assigning code numbers to Texas gins and that gins in other states would be given numbers within the next few weeks. This code number is required by the regulations for record keeping purposes.

The regulations require that the collecting handler give the producer a receipt when collection is made on each bale. Mr. Cortright points out that the Cotton Board does not provide receipt forms and that no standard receipt form is required.

This receipt, however, must contain the following information: (1) name and address of the collecting handler, (2) gin code number of gin at which the cotton was ginned, (3) name and address of the producer who paid the assessment, (4) number of bales on which the assessment was paid, and (5) the date on which the assessment was paid by the producer.

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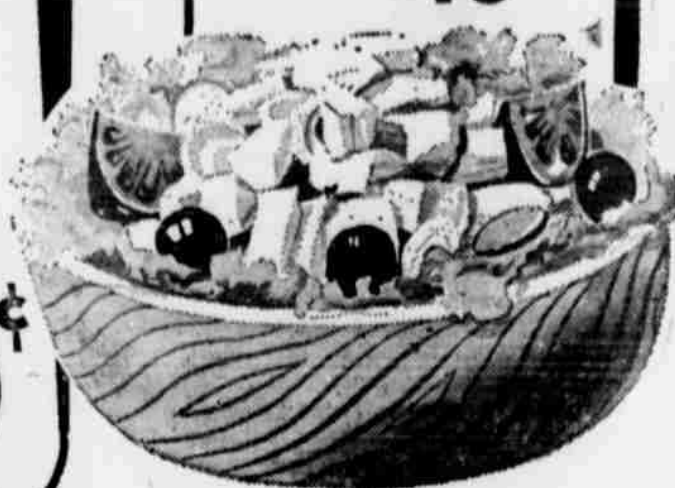
