1952 INTERNATIONAL FARM YOUTH EXCHANGE PRO.

College Station, January 30—Five Texas youths may participate in the 1952 International Farm Youth Exchange Program, announced Floyd Lynch, state 4-H club leader.

Through this exchange program, "grassroots diplomats" go to foreign countries and live with rural families—studying their farming methods and learning to better understand their ways of life.

For each delegate sent from Texas, two foreign exchanges will come to this state and live in Texas farm and ranch homes.

"Four of the 1952 delegates to foreign countries must be boys," Lynch said. "This number of boys was specified because the 1952 program calls for exchange with undeveloped regions of the world such as the Middle East, Africa, Latin America and Southeast Asia."

The age limit for out-going delegates has been set at 20 to 28 years. A delegate from Texas must be a former 4-H club member.

Former Texas 4-H club members who desire to participate in this program should contact their local county Extension agents, Lynch said.

Applications for participation in the 1952 summer phase of the program must be in the state 4-H club office by February 10. Winter phase applications must be in by May 1.

Dimes Drive In Final Week

As the 1952 March of Dimes campaign neared its close this week, national and local officials of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis joined in predicting that the American people would see to it that the March of Dimes overtake and keeps pace with the quickening march of polio.

Doubling of the March of Dimes period this year was necessitated by tripled incidence of polio during the last four years. Each year the National Foundation has gone into debt providing for patient care of children and adults stricken with polio—the only epidemic disease still on the increase in America.

Incidence during the last four years has been so high that an entirely new concept of polio has been developed, a concept geared to 30,000 cases a year instead of the ten to twelve thousand cases experienced during the previous decade.

Since scientists say it is likely that accelerated polio incidence will continue until the final answer to the disease is discovered it seems clear that the only way left open to cope with the challenge of this frightening new concept is to meet it squarely with a new concept of giving.

Only a new and enlarged concept of giving will enable the nation to cope with the three big increases that cloud the polio picture—increased incidence, increased numbers of carry-over cases requiring expensive long-term care, and increased costs of hospitalization, trained personnel and equipment.

On National Foundation records are cases that have cost upwards of \$30,000; and bills of \$5,000 to \$10,000 per year for many other patients are by no means rare.

All of these facts make clear why the 1952 March of Dimes must succeed and why its slogan this year is: "This fight is yours!"

Who Was VICTIM X?

Veterans' News

Questions and Answers

Q. Several years ago, I obtained a GI home loan, when the top guarantee was \$4,000. Now that the guarantee has been raised to \$7,500, may I use the difference to get another GI loan to go into business?

A. No. The additional guarantee may be used only in connection with a GI home loan.

Q. I was disabled in service in 1949. Would I be eligible for vocational training under the program that recently was set up for Korean disabled veterans?

A. No. One of the requirements of the law is that the disability must have occurred after June 27, 1950, the official date of the outbreak of Korean hostilities.

Q. I intend to apply for an increase in my pension to \$120 a month, since I'm so severely disabled that I need the regular aid and attendance of another person in order to get about. If the increase is granted, will it be retroactive to the date that I first got on VA's pension rolls?

A. No. If VA awards you the increase, it will become effective as of the date you filed your application.

Q. I'm a Korean veteran, hospitalized for a service-connected disability, and I'm now awaiting my final discharge. May I apply for vocational training available to Korean veterans?

A. Yes. Members of the armed forces hospitalized while awaiting final discharge may qualify for the training provided they meet all requirements. They may not receive subsistence payments however, prior to actual discharge or separation.

REMINDERS FOR GOOD YARDS FOR FEBRUARY

College Station, January 30—February is the last month for planting shrubs and trees in most of Texas. Remember this. Plant shrubs for screening out-buildings, barns, work areas and for windbreaks.

Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that the lawn should be leveled and fertilized. Make the grounds easy to mow by taking up scattered shrubs and flower beds. An unbroken lawn makes a good background against which all the landscape is seen. February also is time to plant grass, continues Miss Hatfield. There are several grasses which may be used for Texas lawns. With the wide variety of soils and climate, no one grass is best adapted to all areas. Selection of the grass desired may be based on personal preference. Consult the local county Extension agents for grasses best suited to particular areas.

Check the dusting and spraying equipment to see whether it is in working condition. If it is not repair or buy new ones. Learn where and when to use insect and disease controls such as sulphur, chlordane and nicotine sulphate (Black Leaf 40).

Recipe Of The Week

Whole Wheat Gingerbread

1/2 cup butter; 1/2 cup sugar; 1 egg; 1/2 cup molasses; 1/2 cup sour milk; 1 3/4 cup whole-wheat flour; 1/2 teaspoon soda; 2 teaspoons baking powder; 1 1/2 teaspoons spices; 1 teaspoon ginger; 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Cream the butter and add the sugar and continue creaming. Add the well beaten egg. Mix the milk and molasses together. Mix the flour with the soda, baking powder, spices, and salt. Add the dry ingredients alternately with the liquid, adding flour first and flour last. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 35 to 40 minutes.

Time Tips

1. Gingerbread made with whole wheat flour is nutritious and good.

2. Gingerbread is a popular dessert in many homes and the housewife may want to have a ready-mix on hand.

3. To make ready-mix combine all dry ingredients, cut in shortening, place in tightly covered container, label and store in a cool place. When ready to use, add liquids and egg.

4. Gingerbread may be served with butter or a sauce.

I should like to answer the first part of this question today, and the rest in future issues.

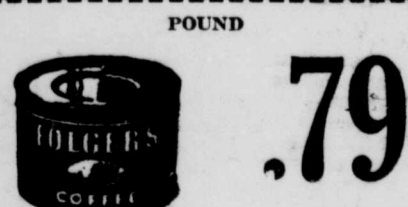

A.
