Lone Star Begins Completion Work On Daniels Well in Kleiner Field

Lone Star Producing Company began completion work today in their Daniels No. 2 in the hopes of giving Cisco's new Kleiner oil pool another good producer. Casing was cemented to a depth of 4,058 feet and it was being perforated. Officials expected to bring in the well Friday.

Nearby, Lone Star was running a drill stem test Thursday morning on their No. B-1 Kleiner. The hole was 3,789 feet deep in sandy lime. An oil and gas show was logged at 3,230 feet. Results of the test were not known at noon today.

Lone Star was drilling at 3,237 feet in their No. C-7 Mitcham in the Lake Sand pool seven miles north of Cisco.

The company announced plans to drill another test on their Mitcham Ranch tract nine miles north of town. A recent Ellenburger test was plugged after the Ellenburger yielded water. The new test will be some three-fourths of a mile southeast of the dry hole and it will be their No. F-2 G. P. Mitcham.

The Kemp an Alsbrook No. 1 Kleiner was drilling at about 3,600 feet in the Kleiner pool.

School For Boys Planned at Camp

The Texas diocese of the Episcopal Church will establish a school for boys on the old Camp Swift reservation near Bastrop. The school will be open for classes in September 1949.

The campus will be 137.58 acres in extent.

Establishment of the school was assured Tuesday when Col. Karl E. Wallace, southwest regional director of War Assets Administration approved the school's application for the site.

Colonel Wallace announced that the real property review board of the Grand Prairie office voted to approve the project this morning. In addition to the land, the preparatory academy, which has been granted a state charter as the St. Stephens Episcopal School will receive 34 Camp Swift buildings at full benefit discount. The agency's appraisers placed the value of the property at \$143,570.

Bishop John E. Hines stated the school will spend an estimated \$125,000 in converting the buildings for academic use in order to begin a full high school course in 1949. The school's executive committee, which includes Mrs. Dana X. Bible, wife of the University of Texas athletic director, contemplates an initial yearly operating budget of \$172,850, including the employment of 17 faculty members for a student body of 200 or more.

Large Number Of Volunteers To Aid In Poppy Sale

Organization of a large corps of volunteer workers to distribute memorial poppies on Poppy Day, Nov. 6, was announced by Mrs. Irene Hallmark, Poppy chairman of the Cisco Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary. "More than 16 members of the Auxiliary have offered their service as poppy workers," she said. The time was changed to the 6th instead of the 9th as previously announced.

The Poppy Day volunteers will be formed into teams and assigned to various locations in the city. They will be on duty throughout the day, offering poppies to be worn in honor of the dead of both world wars and receiving contributions for the welfare of disabled veterans and dependent families of veterans. Some will be able to give only a few hours to the work while others will give the entire day.

"The response to the call for volunteers for Poppy Day duty has been very gratifying," said Mrs. Hallmark. "Distributing the poppies is hard, unaccustomed work for most of our women and they deserve the highest credit for this patriotic service. They receive no pay or commission, of course, their only reward being the knowledge that they are helping keep bright the memory of those who died in the wars and aiding those who are in need because of war sacrifices."

The bi-monthly meeting of the Cisco Fire Department was dismissed early Tuesday night by Fire Captain H. O. Anderson in order that members might listen to the presidential election returns.

Bill Kendall, secretary and treasurer of the Department, read the minutes of last Tuesday's meeting before the group was dismissed.

Musical Program Given For Lions

A musical program was rendered by Misses JoAnn Scott, Coystall Smith and Bobby Jean Dean at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Cisco Lions Club at noon Wednesday at the College Cafeteria.

Dr. R. L. Clinkscales was in charge of the program. O. L. Stamey reported that the Lions Club Carnival held last Saturday night netted \$208.82 for the Junior college's scholarship fund.

Farmers Warned To Take Care of Swine During Winter

Chilly and changeable weather of fall and early winter can lead to serious losses among droves of swine, according to a warning to farmers issued today.

"Unless hogs are given the proper shelter," the American Foundation for Animal Health declared, "the farmer is taking a gamble with a possible outbreak of swine influenza. Flu losses this season could be especially costly."

Swine influenza is an acute, fast-spreading disease caused by the combined action of a virus and a germ, the Foundation explained. One of the chief problems with swine flu is the fact that it weakens pigs and makes them easier prey to cholera, enteritis and similar diseases.

"The virus and germ seem to cause trouble principally where swine are improperly housed, or unduly exposed to cold and dampness. Dry, well-bedded, well-ventilated, draft-free quarters are therefore vital precautions against this disease."

Farmers also were cautioned to watch their pigs for the first signs of an influenza outbreak—symptoms like listlessness, loss of appetite, coughing, labored breathing and watery eyes.

"Immediate diagnosis and careful nursing help to assure recovery, and also help prevent spread of the disease to the rest of the herd and help prevent deaths from secondary complications," the Foundation said.

Restrictions On Enlistment of 18 Year-olds Lifted

Lifting of enlistment restrictions of 18-year old men for service in the Army and Air Force is announced today by the Army and Air Force Recruiting Station in Eastland.

As a part of the recent Selective Service legislation, Congress authorized the enlistment of 25,000 18-year old men in the Army and Air Force to receive one year of training at a station close to home and prohibiting assignment to overseas theaters. Such men will be automatically exempt from draft which will require 21 months active service.

Men from this area enlisting for 1 year service will go to the 2nd Armored Division at Camp Hood for Army training or to Sheppard Field at Wichita Falls for Air Force training.

All 18 year olds interested in this short term enlistment and all those who will be 18 soon are urged to go to the Recruiting Station at 311 West Main Street in Eastland and file application before quota restrictions are again placed on this type of enlistment.

Cisco Man Named Head of County Livestock Body

A. V. Clark, Cisco rancher, was elected president of the Eastland County Livestock Association at the organization's 5th birthday party and barbecue at Eastland's city park Wednesday night.

An estimated 500 persons attended the event. Mr. Clark succeeds M. E. Fry, also of Cisco, who had headed the association for the past two years.

Other officers named were Clyde Grissom, vice-president, J. M. Cooper, secretary, and Fred Brown, treasurer, all of Eastland.

The association has plans underway for the annual Eastland County Livestock Show to be held in Cisco the last week in March, 1949. Plans are also being made to resume the annual beef cattle tour next year. The tour was not held last year due to dry weather.

Mr. Clark told the meeting that the association will try to expand other activities during the coming year. Brown, who presided at the program, credited the association with contributing much toward improvements in the quality of livestock in the area.

The association was formed five years ago to increase interest in improving the quality of livestock in Eastland County. The organization has more than 200 members.

Every city in the county was represented at the barbecue, which was cooked by volunteers under the supervision of Association Justice Milburn Long of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals.

District Governor Stresses Service, Fellowship in Talk to Rotarians

"The ideals of Rotary are found in the Book of Books," District Governor Bill Todd told members of the Cisco Rotary Club and their guests at a luncheon at the club room of the College Cafeteria at noon today.

"Those ideals are honesty and service to fellow men," he continued. He stressed personal honesty as an example to the world and particularly to the youth of the world. He commended the Cisco club on its attendance record and club fellowship. "If club service is the end and purpose of Rotary, fellowship is the means to that end," he stated, and stressed the importance of world and community service and fellowship as a means toward world peace and understanding.

He pointed out that fellowship was the hub of the Rotary Wheel and that service was the cardinal virtue of the club, and said that each one should be something worth while each day for the community, the world and for others. Football Contest To Be Climax Of Appreciation Day

Climaxing Wrangler Appreciation Day, Cisco Junior College will unveil its seventh 1948 football edition before the home-folks at Chesley Field tonight at eight o'clock.

What's to be a hot contest, the Wranglers will entertain the Henderson County Cardinals, undefeated in six major campaigns. The Cardinals coached by W. T. Johnson for the second year, were successful in routing Penola Junior College, 2-0; Allen Military Academy, 13-0; Weatherford, 28-0; Hillsboro, 19-0; Clifton, 7-0; and Texas Military College, 7-7.

Besides being the conference's leading power, undefeated and unscored on until their encounter with the Cadets last week, the Cardinals bolster a forward line that any coach would be proud to tell about in his after coaching days. From end to end, the Cardinals have an average of 202 pounds per man while in the secondary the average is 185 pounds.

Coach Johnson of Henderson, however, displayed little or no optimism over the forthcoming contest. He said he was somewhat displeased with his club's play against the Cadets (tied 7-7) and added that he was bringing a team to Cisco crippled with injuries sustained at T. M. C.

A Tuscola lad, Bud Inman, is the spark for the Cardinals and is ably assisted in the backfield by Judge Ramsey and Hoot Gibson. Inman is an artist at running, passing and helps with the kicking chores.

Wrangler Coaches took time out yesterday from pregame drills to serve notice that their boys, who staged a comeback in their game with the Decatur Baptist, 26-6, two weeks ago, weren't through for the season yet.

"The boys are showing some mighty promising scrimmage work, and we're getting better all the time," he said. "We're still a little green in places, but the Wranglers are coming along better in every game. It's going to be rough tonight, but I think we'll give them something to fight for."

Coaches Everett and Davis pointed out that the Cardinals are always primed for any contest, and especially away from their home port, and said it would be folly to underestimate their disadvantages.

As for the condition of the home team, the Wranglers are perhaps in their best shape of the season. Jack McGuire and Doug Garner, two line ripping back fielders who have been on the sidelines before the Decatur tiff, will be at their posts. Melvin Nobles has recovered sufficiently from his injuries. Jack Leveridge and Don Price appear to be in top shape and are listed as tentative starters for this evening's fireworks.

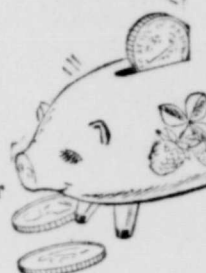
