

Government Regulation Stifles TESCO Progress

Texas Electric employees can take pride in the fact that historically the company has been able to provide reliable service at reasonable prices, Texas Electric President Bill Marquardt said Monday night.

TESCO has been able to maintain its high standard of service despite obstacles imposed by the federal government, he said.

"In fact," Marquardt added, "instead of getting discouraged we've

taken it as a challenge. And we're meeting it, too."

Speaking at the company's annual Quarter Century Club banquet Monday night, Marquardt praised employees for contributing their "time, efforts, and good work beyond the call of duty."

The banquet at the Scurry County Coliseum was held in honor of three Sweetwater area employees recognized for completing 25 years service with the company.

New members of the Quarter Century Club include Don W. Delaney of Colorado City's Morgan Creek Plant.

Delaney, it was noted by Marquardt, also received the President's award for his action in saving a woman's life last year when she was choking on something she had swallowed while eating. The incident occurred in September 1978 at the VFW during a membership Bar-B-Q. Delaney used the Heimlich maneuver to dislodge the food particle from the woman's throat.

Also honored at the banquet was new Quarter Century Club member Jim Graves of Fort Worth, son of Mr. and Mrs. A.D. Graves of Colorado City. He chose to receive his honor during the ceremony in Snyder so his parents could be there. His father is retired from Colorado City's Morgan Creek Plant.

Others honored were M.E. Scott of Snyder and Dave Williams of Sweetwater.

In his address, Marquardt pointed to "government rules, regulations, and restrictions" as the blockades that are "keeping us from

solving the energy problem.

"They're killing us and our customers on price, too," he said. The bureaucrats are about the biggest reason we've needed recent rate increases.

"If we didn't have massive federal over-regulation, and runaway inflation fueled by federal policies, we wouldn't have needed the rate increases we've been asking for... And I bet you, we wouldn't have had the long lines at the gas stations last summer either."

He went on to commend employees for o-

vercoming these and other obstacles with the dedication and teamwork they have exhibited in sometimes unrewarding situations. To illustrate, he referred to linemen who, when outages occur, immediately begin restoring service, even in the most inclement weather.

"We are the public's 'silent partner.' Our job is to be there when people need us. And if we do a good enough job, they don't even notice us."

Marquardt expressed special thanks to the 25 year employees

Police Round-up

James Parker of Parker's Mobile Station will have his U-Haul truck returned and two persons are in custody after a chain of events which began in the south plains town of Floydada and stretched across Scurry County into Colorado City.

Thursday at midnight Bonnie Turnbull contacted city police stating three men were trying to burglarize her automobile, parked at Trucktown, Assistant Police Chief Jerry Cowin stated.

Officers answered the call and discovered the men had fled on foot, Cowin said.

A search of the vicinity revealed Mrs. Turnbull's purse tossed under a parked truck. A tear-

gas pistol and prescription drugs were missing from the purse, according to Mrs. Turnbull.

Upon further search, Cowin stated he located an abandoned 1966 Chevrolet Impala.

He ran a check on the vehicle which disclosed a traffic ticket had been issued on it in Snyder the day before. Further checks indicated the car had been stolen in Floydada.

Officers continued to search for the three persons until about 4 that morning, finding no trace of the suspects, Cowin noted.

Nothing new occurred until Saturday morning when Parker contacted police to report a missing U-Haul Truck

valued at about \$15,000, Cowin said.

Police issued an all points bulletin and were contacted by the Floydada Sheriff's Office. They reported they had apprehended the three persons and had the U-Haul truck.

 whose hard work has been "the heart of the business." The benefit of their experience over the last quarter century was instrumental in making TESCO's rates some of the lowest in Texas and in the nation today, he said.

Marquardt told employees that present and future company projects will help ensure the dependable service that customers have come to expect from TESCO.

The Comanche Peak nuclear plant will help provide good, reliable service, he said, and he also referred to the study being conducted by TESCO and Rockwell International to study the feasibility of converting one of TESCO's gas-fueled units into a partially solar-powered

generating system. "Although I know it's just a feasibility study now, I'm kind of excited about the possibility of generating part of our electricity from a solar installation."

Marquardt started his address by saying, "For a good part of the year, I've been across our service territory talking to local groups. One of the things I've talked about several times is a book called the FEDERAL DICTIONARY."

"The FEDERAL DICTIONARY is just about like any other dictionary...except it defines everything backwards."

Here, let me read a couple of definitions from it.

"For example, the word solve, to make more difficult to make worse. To complicate,

to mess things up so bad, nobody can handle it.

"That's pretty accurate. This spring and summer, we've all learned how well the government solved the energy problem."

"One thing they've recently tried to do is encourage more domestic oil production. Let's look up encourage to kind of see how they'll go about that."

"Here it is. Encourage, to stand in the way; to poke fun at; to dishearten; depress; downgrade; dismay, and...dampen, distrust, disparage."

"That's pretty much how the government has gone about encouraging oil companies. It's kind of like the way they're helping electric utilities

to use more coal and nuclear too.

"Now, from where I sit, this federal dictionary pretty well describes how too many government people think. And that could discourage a lot of people. But the thing about us is that it hasn't discouraged you and me. In fact, instead of getting discouraged, we've taken it as a challenge, and I want to tell you, we're meeting it, too."

"As a matter of fact, this federal dictionary makes a pretty good CONTRAST to the kind of work all of us do," Marquardt noted.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Work crews have yet to cap the off-shore oil well spewing barrels of crude daily into the Gulf of Mexico, but all the early indications of a courtroom collision between Gov. Bill Clements and Texas Attorney General Mark White apparently will be realized.

White told reporters last week he will sue SEDCO, the drilling company founded by Clements, and Mexican-owned company PEMEX sometime this fall. SEDCO is now run by the governor's son, B. Gill Clements, while the governor's stock is in a "blind trust." Through the governor may never appear in the courtroom, the political effect of the lawsuit will remain the same: one of the state's top Democrats will confront the top Republican state official.

WILL ALLEGE NEGLIGENCE
White said he will allege negligence on the part of SEDCO, which had leased the off-shore rig used by PEMEX to drill the blow-out well.

It (the blow-out) wasn't an act of God. This thing occurred apparently because of mismanagement, negligent operation, negligently maintained equipment, whatever, White said.

He added that SEDCO's subsequent sinking of the damaged rig in deep international waters on July 12 "cast grave suspicions on everything they (SEDCO officials) have said" about the company's role in the blow-out.

White said he expects to delay until after President Jimmy Carter and Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo meet Sept. 28 and 29.

CLEMENTS: IN YUGOSLAVIA
Clements, meanwhile, has been unavailable for comment while leading a Texas delegation tour of several Communist-block countries. Reports indicate he is optimistic about future joint U.S.-Yugoslavia ventures.

When he returns he will find a message on his desk from Speaker of the House Bill Clayton saying there is no political support for a special session of the Texas Legislature.

Clements had promised to call the legislators back to Austin to pass an initiative and referendum bill, among issues, but Clayton advises the legislators who failed to reach agreement on the issue last spring would probably not resolve the issue in a special session.

State Rep. John Bryant of Dallas, who heads the House minority bloc, thinks Clements should offer a pure initiative and referendum proposal or none at all.

DEMO CHAIRMAN RACE
In times past a Democratic Texas governor has always hand-picked the chairman of the Texas Democratic Party, but not this season.

With Republican Clements in the statehouse, the crucial Demo leadership post may be filled by a person emerging after a bona fide convention ballot, not one standing in the shadow of a governor.

Three prominent Democrats are mentioned for the job: State Rep. Luther Jones of El Paso,

John Wilson of La Grange. Wilson, who had long eyed the Speaker's chair, instead has mustered the opposition Patman incurred in the "Killer Bee" episode last session.

SHORT SNORTS
Billy Goldberg, the current party chairman, will not seek re-election. Instead, he has announced he will join the movement to draft Sen. Edward Kennedy for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, will retire on Dec. 31. The veteran law enforcement officer, 62, gave health pro-

blems and age as his reasons for stepping down.

A \$20 million miscalculation by the staff of the Public Utility Commission may result in a higher-than-expected rate hike for a telephone company.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company may now be granted the entire \$145.2 million hike it requested last month. THE PUC staff had recommended a \$145.2 million hike, but following discovery of the error, it changed its recommendation to \$156.4 million, about \$9 million more than the company can receive legally.

First round action saw the seventh graders lose to the Big Spring eighth grade "B" team with scores of 4-15, 15-10, 3-15.

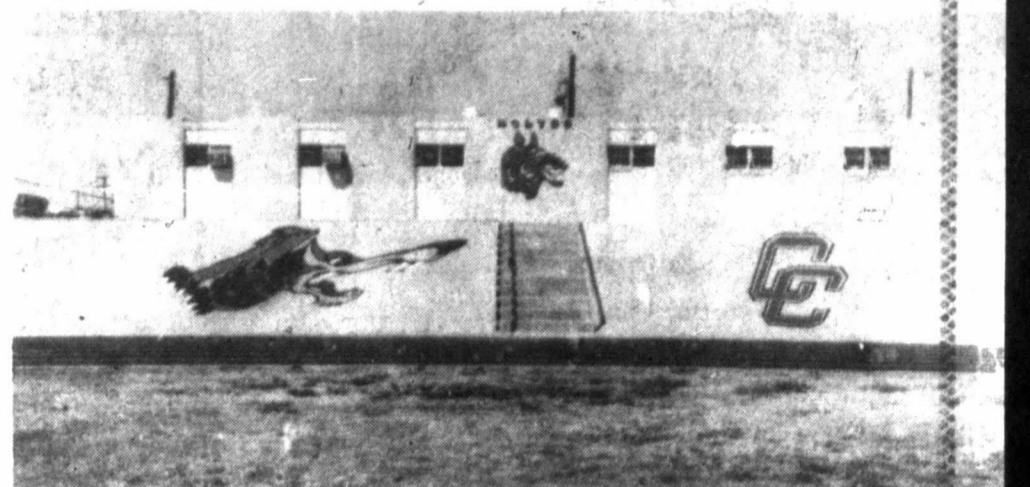
Two Colorado eighth grade teams were also in the tournament.

Hospital Board Sets Budget

Root Memorial Hospital will operate under a 1980 budget set at \$4,748 and amended an estimated \$8,000 reduction due to action taken during Tuesday's Board of Directors meeting.

The reduction came as a result of bids on liability and workman's compensation insurance.

Bids were submitted and presented by Bob Ratliff. He represented U.S. Fire with a bid of \$34,348 for workman's compensation and \$17,357 for liability and malpractice, using the Occurrence program.

Using a Claims Made program the liability and malpractice dropped to \$9,420.

Ratliff also represented St. Paul Insurance who submitted a bid for

workman's compensation for \$34,348 and a Claims Made liability and malpractice program for \$8,000. This was the program the board voted to accept.

A total of \$27,600 is included in the new budget for physicians recruitment expenses.

Hospital Administrator Charles Root reported to a board a prospective doctor who is interested in coming to Colorado City. The doctor is currently in residency at Big Spring.

The board appointed a committee headed by Murrell Blassingame and consisting of Herbert Mearse and Willie Landau to consult with the prospect and try to enlist his services when he becomes available next year.

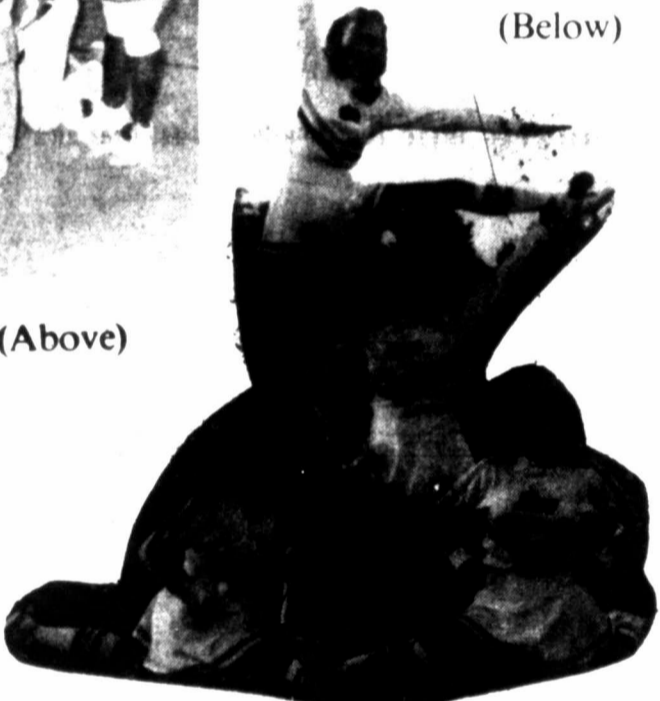
