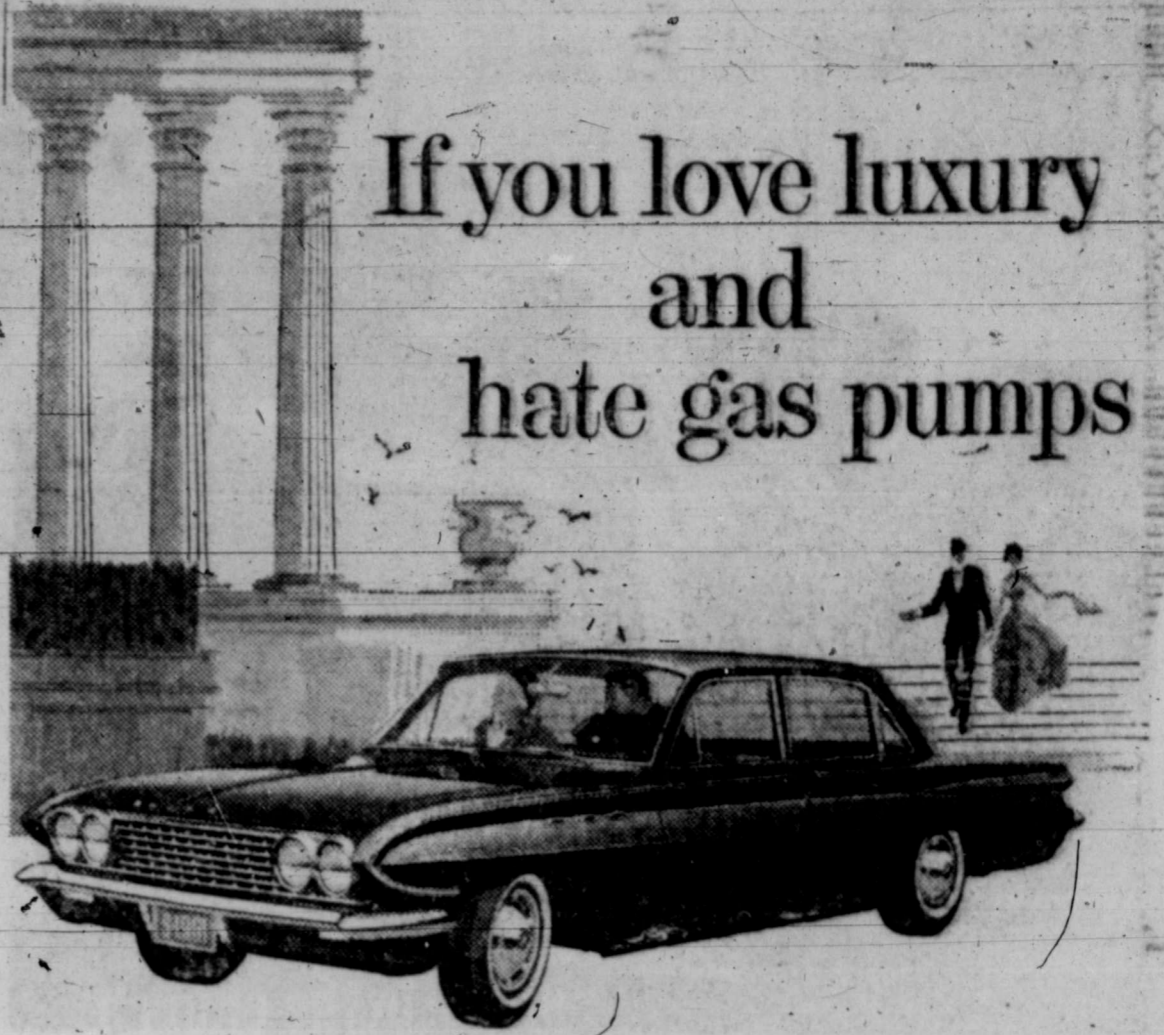

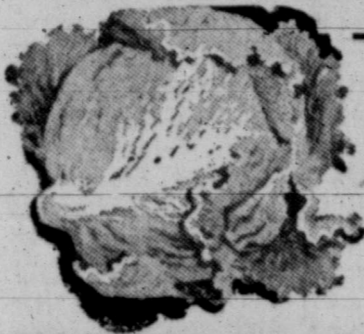

The novel being reviewed stands among a host of angry indictments of the "Way of the West."

In 1854, when Dickens began to write HARD TIMES, the Danish Christian Soren Kierkegaard wrote his famous ATTACK UPON CHRISTENDOM. Earlier, in 1848, Karl Marx had completed the now significant COMMUNIST MANIFESTO. Two decades later, another critic of the West was to arise, this being Nietzsche, the German philosopher-poet.

Marx, Kierkegaard and Nietzsche are mentioned along with Dickens because of an essential kinship between them: each of them attacked what was to them the "Western Way." The West, in contrast to the East, stood on three traditional foundations: Christianity, democracy, and capitalism. It was not that the West had resorted to these institutions that incurred the wrath of the 19th century reformers, but rather that the West had failed to realize the basic aims of the three essential institutions.

In a word, where Christianity, democracy and the capitalistic economy were by nature and living effect to aid in the restoration and preservation of Man, in Western society their proponents had used (or misused) them in precisely the opposite manner.

Christianity, was becoming synonymous with the secular culture; democracy was resulting in government by and

for the few, and the capitalistic economy, was being elevated to a situation of welfare for the few, and that being at the expense of the many.

Dickens, himself a Christian and firm believer in democratic procedure, saw this all-too-clearly. What invoked the greater pain, however, was the degradation of the working man. Whereas Christianity, democracy and the capitalistic economy were in living effect to restore and preserve Man, it was doing this only in a limited sense; a few were restored to prominence. They became the privileged.

Chesterton was thus accurate in terming HARD TIMES a very harsh book. The times were hard, the writer angry. Chesterton pointed accurately to the bitterness of HARD TIMES, all in the name of "a more human and hilarious view of democracy." "It may be bitter," he stated, "but it was a protest against bitterness. It may be dark, but it is the darkness of the subject and not of the author."

HARD TIMES appeared historically in relation to the seventeenth century, the Age of Reason. The Age of Reason was, in origin, the determined exploration by Man of his physical environment with the aim of controlling it. Through the scientific approach, human knowledge becomes practical. The result of scientific achievement was no less than progress; steam was harnessed, electricity was made a servant in speeding up communication, and in

lighting homes and streets. Surgery, was stripped of some of its horror through antiseptics and anesthesia. Germs, and ways to control or eliminate them, were discovered, thus eliminating disease to some extent, thereby reducing the death rate.

The knowledge and mastery of the physical environment led to great and helpful changes in the life of mankind. These changes made possible the industrial revolution, which covered parts of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Wealth grew, enabling huge fortunes to be accumulated by the few. Populations multiplied. Cities increased. A new kind of urban life was arising. According to Latourette, "It was the age of the urban middle-class, the bourgeoisie."

Capitalism, private enterprise, open competition, laissez-faire, the reduction of control by the state to a minimum, were the vogue and were believed by many to be indispensable to the rising prosperity. Praises were naturally heaped upon the merits of capitalism and the industrial order. Had they not done much for Man?

When writing HARD TIMES, Dickens was challenging the voices ringing in defense of what was the status quo. He could hardly be optimistic or satisfied with the fruits of the industrial order, for there was wealth, and comfort, but residing with it was grinding toil, sordid poverty, and moral and physical degradation.

Dickens pronounced the uncompromising negative in the face of his own society. Rather than the restoration and preservation of Man, he saw in the order of his day the human misuse of humans. He thus wrote HARD TIMES not to plea for the equal distribu-

tion of wealth, but rather to demand, and does the laborer Stephen Blackpool, "kindness and patience and cheery ways, that so draws high to one another in their money troubles, and so cherishes one another in their distresses w' what they need themselves."

HARD TIMES is a resounding defense of human personality. The result of the industrial order was the dissolution of personality; that is, employers viewed employees only as cogs in a machine or as names on a payroll. In this system, personality was injured and Man was degraded. This explains the lament of Blackpool, who holds that owners look upon workers "as so much Power," and regulate them "as if they was figures in a room, or machines; w'out lives and likes, w'out memories and inclinations, w'out souls to weary and souls to hope — when aw goes on quiet, reproachin' em for their want o' sitch humanly feelins in their dealings w' yo." "This will never do 'f Sir," he concludes, "till God's work is on-made."

The novel is about Coketown, an industrial community, and its inhabitants. While Dickens creates characters who belong to the lower regions of society, such as Sissy Jupe and Stephen Blackpool, he places the weight of his interest and ire squarely upon the shoulders of those making Coketown what it is, an area giving off "monstrous quantities of smoke." (This, one sees, is quite similar in tone and intent to Blake's rage over England's "black satanic mills.")

Gradgrind and Bounderby are the prime figures of Coketown. They have made and kept it what it is by stressing what was to them the in-

dispensable philosophy: reason over emotion, fact over fancy. Gradgrind himself declares, "You can only form the minds of reasoning animals upon fact: nothing else will ever be of any service to them." Gradgrind pursues with singleness his philosophy, and achieves what Dickens calls the "state of being eminently practical." He is much akin to the self-made success, Josiah Bounderby, called by Dickens "the Bully of Humility."

They have gotten where they now are by abolishing the nonfactual; that is, they rule out wonder or fancy, and term the life of wonder a "vulgar curiosity." Their aim (and that they achieve in Coketown), is to actualize in its entirety "what was severally workful." This they do by thriving on fact.

Dickens, seeing the end result of their philosophy in action, stresses Gradgrind and Bounderby so as to show the effect of the two on humanity. Gradgrind hammers his philosophy into the makeup of his children, Louisa and Thomas.

The children are aptly called Gradgrind's own "metaphysical Louisa" and "mathematical Thomas." In short, Louisa and Thomas, while excelling along the Gradgrind-Bounderby line, are failures whose lives are destined to end without purpose and without happiness. Louisa, told by her father never to wonder,

sees that she should, but now an—not. The natural and wholesome affections of the human heart her father has overcome and stamped out. She now can feel only the motions of resentment and remorse. "Your teaching, Father, will not save me," she laments.

This show-down between the girl and her father, along with the disclosure in public of Bounderby's secret, marks the point at which Dickens has been aiming. He must expose the Gradgrind-Bounderby philosophy, which, though it claims to help Man, does little more than contribute to his ruin. It is with satisfaction that the reader approaches these sections.

Why is it that Dickens enumerates to such an extent the philosophy of Coketown? He, being always the sensitive Dickens, must show that he who constructs his life upon reason and fact alone, ruling out in the process both emotion and fancy, is he who not only becomes artificial himself, but who also, in advocating his philosophy, artificializes the humanity he encounters.

This is obvious in the novels' best chapter, the class in school, supervised by Gradgrind and Bounderby and taught by M'Choakumchild. The chapter is aptly titled, "Murdering the Innocents."

To Dickens, Gradgrind seemed a kind of cannon, loaded to the muzzle with facts, and prepared to blow them clean out of the regions of childhood at one discharge. He seemed a galvanizing apparatus, too, charged with a grim mechanical substitute for the tender young imaginations that were to be stormed a way.

"But you mustn't fancy," he commands. "That's it! You are never to fancy. You

are to be in all things regulated and governed . . . by fact . . . This is the new discovery. This is fact. This is taste."

It is sadly necessary to say that Dickens was not a communist; neither was he the full-fledged socialist many would make him out to be. He was a humanitarian intent upon reforming society of its inhuman abuses.

He was "for healthy existence instead of struggling in convulsions," for "physical relief, relaxation, good humor, good spirits," for "recognized holiday," a "dance to a stirring band of music," and, above all, for "some occasional light pie in which even M'Choakumchild had no finger."

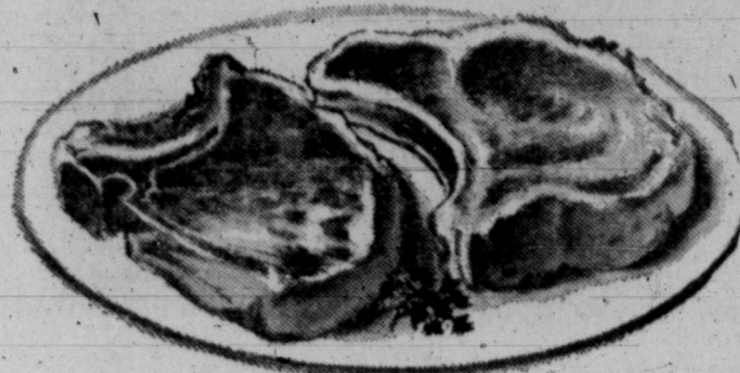
He would not tolerate the oft-repeated replies to his protests: "If they were ambitious, they would occupy our places!" They do not appreciate what we have done for them! and, "They're used to living like that. They don't mind it!"

Dickens was angry, as Western Christian Democratic Capitalistic Man should be angry.

Again we witness, while not the same industrial abuses and on such an extreme scale, the human misuse of humans, in which one person views another person as a means to the accomplishment of a certain end.

The end in mind, it will be declared, is a noble end. It will benefit the whole of humanity; this being said, the person now in mind as pure means may receive wage benefits, an increased standard of living and various fringe benefits; but as he is to be used, he in a sense is dehumanized. He, at the hands of the "eminently practical," who forbid feeling in others as they have little themselves, is workable, but no more.
