Plans Completed for Fifth Monthly Trades Day Event

OFFICERS ELECTED AT MEETING TUESDAY

At a meeting of the Dawson County Fair Association Tuesday evening in the Chamber of Commerce office at the City Hall, the following officers were elected: Owen C. Taylor, president; J. M. Peterson, vice-president; Phillip Yonge, secretary-treasurer; Alva Debnam, general manager. Directors of the association will consist of the representatives from each community.

The following communities were represented: Ballard, Woody, Weaver Munger, Fairview, Bartlett, McCarty, Hancock, Key, Klondyke, Patricia, Wilson, Liberty, Five Mile, Midway, Sparenberg, O. K. and others promised to come in on the fair.

The date set for the fair is September 22nd and 23rd. It was pointed out that this is as late in September as crops would permit to make a good showing this year.

The management is planning to appoint his department heads and superintendents as soon as possible, and make everything ready for one of the best fairs the county has had.

Livestock, agricultural products, can stuffs, clothing, curios, poultry, in fact everything will be shown at this fair, it was pointed out.

Stress was laid on the fact that not only was it desired that each community have exhibits, but that individual farmers would be given space this year to show farm exhibits.

Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Wallace Jr., received injuries and a badly damaged car last Friday night on the Snyder highway when their car collided with another.

Rev. and Mrs. Wallace were returning from Abilene and Anson, where they had been making moving pictures of McMurry College and its president J. W. Hunt, and in Anson had spoken at a Methodist church rally.

The accident occurred at 11:45 p. m. twelve miles this side of Snyder, at a very sharp hill. The other car was driven by C. D. Swan of Lubbock. Mr. Swan was going east up the hill, while the Wallaces were coming west off the hill. Neither driver saw the other car lights. The cars side swiped badly damaging each.

Rev. Wallace received a badly sprained arm and wrist, Mrs. Wallace was uninjured. Mr. Swan received knee injuries.

NOTICE TO VOTERS

All persons who vote in the second primary should make sure they are legal voters. Folks are being indicted in other counties for illegal voting. I cannot believe there has been very much illegal voting in this county but the percentage of poll taxes paid to the number of votes cast in a few of the boxes might indicate that we had some illegal votes cast. For instance one box had 254 votes with only 180 poll taxes paid, and another with 35 votes with only 23 poll taxes paid.

It seems that the overs and unders should not have increased the vote very much. The total votes in the county was 2488 with only 2336 poll taxes paid.

This is very unusual since the vote has always been heretofore less than the number of taxes paid.

I want to suggest that all voters in the coming primary bring their poll tax receipt, and this will make it easier on the judges to determine and discover the person, if any, who might attempt to vote illegally. Perhaps a few voters are not familiar with the fact that the judge in each election box keeps a list of all persons voting and it is a very easy matter for the grand jury to determine who has voted illegally by going over the poll list, and you, the illegal voter, if any, and I hope there is none, should think twice before attempting to vote.

IMPORTANT TO TAXPAYERS

The Commissioners Court have set August 29th as the day for the tax budget hearing. To those who pay only poll tax, and those who have plenty to pay with and are satisfied with taxes as they are or who might desire them raised, this hearing will probably not appeal to them.

To those of us who are having the struggle of our lives to make ends meet, and by the use of every economy, still do not see our way clearly ahead, this is a most important meeting and should be attended and participated in.

Our information is that every candidate for office in the recent election declared for lower taxes, and we feel that they were sincere. Now the taxpayers should show their appreciation and respond and participate in this hearing and let our commissioners know that we are with them in their efforts to save every penny of unnecessary taxation. We can only do so by meeting with them and lending them all of our assistance and encouragement.

Our county is fortunate, we have no road bonds, our court house bonds have been nearly half paid out, we have no bridges to keep up and the auto registrations are sufficient to keep the roads passable until times get better.

Our schools are not dependent on the county taxes for their support, as most of the county is in Independent School Districts. We have one of the most law abiding counties in the State and the Courts should not call for heavy expenditures. Under all of the circumstances, considering the decline in values during the last year Dawson county should have a reduction in values even greater than those counties that have reduced their valuations from 25 to 40 per cent. As heretofore stated the reduction of values is the key to saving, as one half of the tax money is sent to the State.

There are many reasons for reducing taxes, but the main one is that the saving is so badly needed by the taxpayers for other purposes, such as clothes, debts and other necessities, and other things, the quicker we get real low taxes the greater will be the influx of good citizens to acquire homes among us and thereby give us renewed faith in our equities.

This will be my last word on county taxation, and when the City completes its tax levy for this year I will consider my position as Chairman of the tax Relief Association, open for new officers.

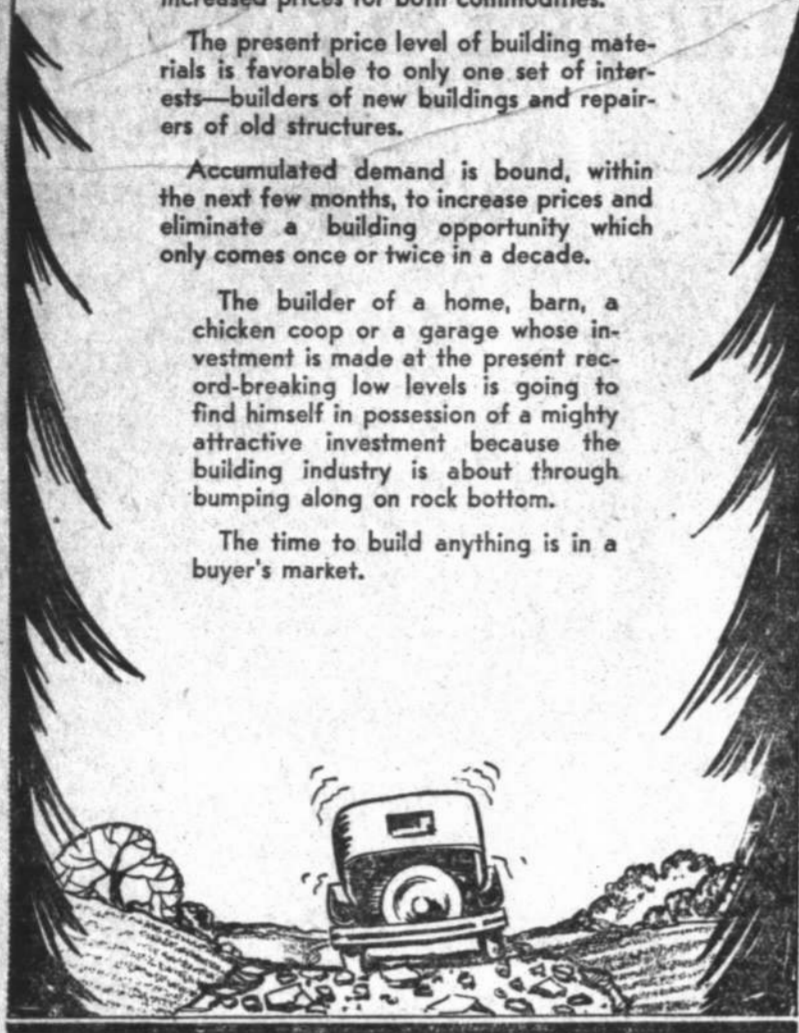

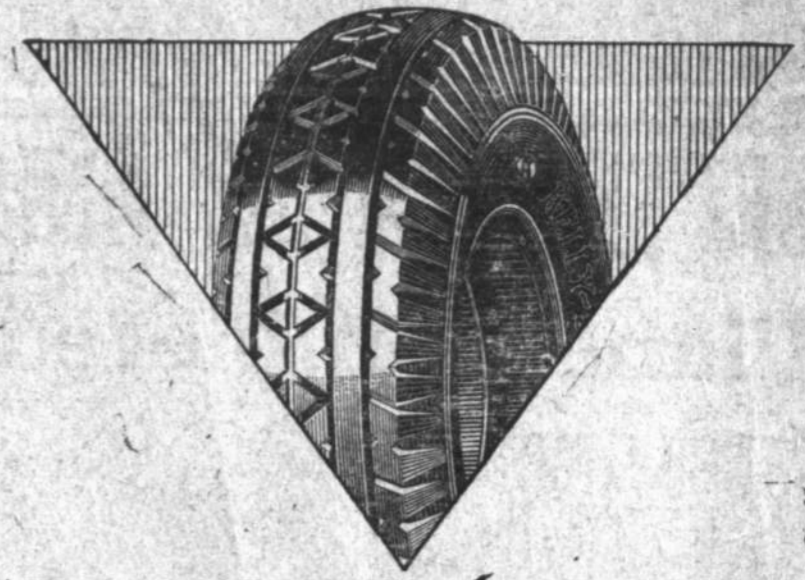

M. J. R. No. 1.
PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas should be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and lunatics.

Third: All paupers supported by any county.

Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exception as the Legislature may make.

Fifth: All soldiers, marines and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States; or retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election; General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt, for such works and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932.

When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of the State, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 41st Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made or hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided, that the one-tenth of the alternate Section of the lands granted to the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in, or constitute a part of, the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which the taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis:

(1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) per cent of the aggregate total;

(2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding fifty (50%) per cent of the aggregate total."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.
