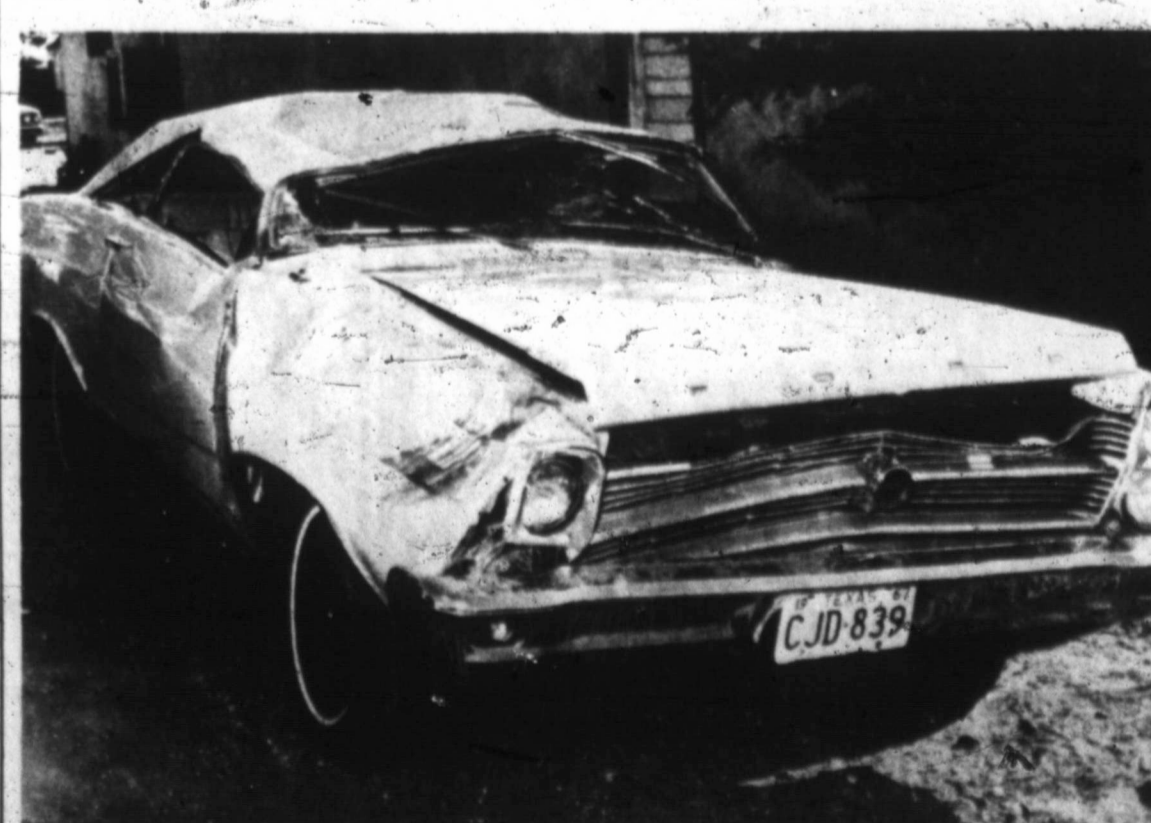

Tahoka Garden Club Tips

Now is the time to set out summer and fall blooming perennials. Then they have time to become established before time for them to bloom.

Most plants, need deep soil preparation. Therefore, prepare the soil well at least a full spade or shovel depth. Apply compost two inches deep over the soil and balanced fertilizer at the rate of five pounds for every 10 by 10 plot. Thoroughly mix them into the soil with spade or fork.

Water the area well and let it settle a week before planting. If possible, set the plants on a cloudy day and water at once. Shingles make good protectors for plants from hot sunshine and wind. Always group each kind fairly close together in clumps, not as single plants, for best effects.

For borders of flower beds, use low plants near the front. The dwarf Asters, Marigolds, white and purple sweet Alyssum, Artemisia, a felt like, gray dusty miller, and jugs with green, purple or silvery leaves and flowers of white, pink or blue.

For the middle of your bed you may use Geraniums, Periwinkles, Chrysanthemums, and Petunias in all colors and forms with good effect.

A few tall plants are hard Asters, Day lilies, Iris, double Shasta daisies, and Hardy Phlox of many colors.

May is time to: 1. divide and re-set Chrysanthemums. 2. Pinch the tops of mums when plants reach a height of six inches.

Choose Self-help Feature Clothes

A growing child wants to help himself, and clothes are a good learning device for this, says Ann Duncan, Home Demonstration Agent.

A garment which a child can put on and take off with little or no help from an adult is important to the child as well as his mother. Learning how to dress himself makes the child more independent and self-confident—and saves mother's time.

The age at which a youngster can manage his clothing depends on the individual child, his training and the construction of the clothes. Choosing clothes with self-help features will help a child help himself. Look for certain easy-dress features in children's clothing.

Front opening are much easier for a child to handle than back or side openings. Roomy neck openings or elastic bands that slip over the head are more manageable for the child.

Large buttons or fasteners are more convenient for the youngster than small ones; hooks and eyes are

much more difficult. One-piece garments are handier for the little ones than two-piece clothing.

Elastic inserts at the waistline rather than back sashes of hard-to-fasten belts are easier for a child; belts and sashes can also be attached to the garment to prevent loss.

If the back of the garment is easily distinguished from the front, it will save a lot of frustration and confusion for the child.

The wise homemaker will purchase children's clothing that both save her time and fulfills her youngster's need for independence.

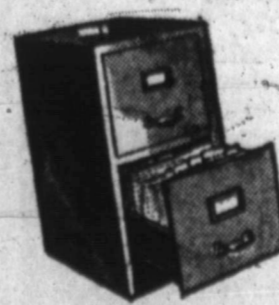

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.

It appears that cotton producers in some sections of the Plains this year may be forced by weather conditions to avail themselves of the "disaster relief" provisions of the current cotton program.

Under certain circumstances these provisions permit farmers to plant certain other crops on acreage for cotton production.

They apply when a farmer, after an "honest and workmanlike" effort, is unable to get or unable to keep a stand of cotton early enough in the season to allow for the expectation of a crop. Under these conditions the producer may apply to the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office for permission to plant certain other crops on the acreage intended for cotton.

With ASCS approval soybeans or other crops on which no marketing quotas or voluntary acreage reduction programs are in effect may be planted, harvested and sold on cotton land without loss of cotton price support and diversion payments.

The date after which a producer will not be expected to plant or replant cotton is left to the discretion of each individual ASCS county committee and will vary from one geographical location to another.

It is also the responsibility of the county committee to determine whether an honest and workmanlike effort has been made to plant and grow cotton.

Walter Wells, Lubbock County ASCS Manager, says the important thing for growers to remember is that an application must be made to the county office prior to planting another income crop on cotton land. Otherwise, both price support and diversion payments may be denied.

Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., is voicing almost unbridled optimism on the future of High Plains cotton production.

Businessman and farmer alike have a great concern for the well-being of this area's number one industry, and Johnson recently has been called upon again and again to assess the situation for banker, civic club and farmer groups throughout the 23-county area represented by PCG.

He leaves no doubt as to his personal opinions on the matter. He summed up his remarks on one such occasion by saying "The High Plains of Texas will supply a substantial, increasing portion of the U. S. and world markets for raw cotton fiber probably for so long as such markets exist."

His optimism stems primarily from faith in the area's superb physical production capacity, faith in the results of cotton breeding programs and other cotton research, and faith in the progressive, never-say-die attitude of Plains cotton producers.

To illustrate that his faith is not of the "blind" variety, he points to expectations that at least 25 percent of the area's production in 1967 will be in staple lengths of an inch or more, as compared to 13.7 percent in this category in 1966.

"This is a tremendous improvement in a single year, and it shows, without doubt that the Plains is determined to meet the demands of the textile industry, whatever those demands may be," he said.

Johnson also has confidence that the newly insured dollars-a-bale cotton research and promotion program will do great things for cotton markets and eventually raise cotton back to a more prominent position as a textile fiber.

Under the new program

growers across the nation have voted to assess themselves \$1 per bale to finance a vastly increased and improved research and promotion effort.

"It has invariably held true that whenever a fatal cotton-consuming in the world, the consumption of cotton in the shorter staples goes up right along with it, and the effect of the new market-building program will be felt right down to the grower of seven-eighths inch cotton, provided that cotton has the desirable characteristics," Johnson believes.

He points out that the varietal and cultural practice that have already been developed by local research, much of which is financed by PCG with its producer dues of 15 cents per bale and dues from cotton oriented businesses. Among these he lists on-the-bed planting (which has the net effect of giving farmers a longer season in which to produce crops); faster maturing varieties which are adapted to the area and which have been highly acceptable to textile mills; irrigation studies aimed at proper timing of water application to increase overall crop maturity; glandless cotton resistant to at least one of the most damaging cotton diseases; cold-tolerance testing of planting seed to assure adequate stands early in the season; and the diapause boll weevil control program, which, coupled with research is learning the elimination of boll weevils as a current or pending threat to the High Plains in the not too distant future.

"The effects of these and other research projects are already being felt, and they are just the beginning of what can be done and will be done to circumvent the obstacles to the economical production of quality cotton on the Plains," Johnson stated.

On the declining supply of underground irrigation water, Johnson calls attention to the forming of Water Inc., which will lay the groundwork for importing irrigation water to the area, and says this is another example of how we are now spending more "working time" and less "worrying time" on our problems.

"It is widely known," he goes on, "that we have the largest and most fertile concentration of irrigated and irrigable land in the world. And when we have an adequate and assured supply of irrigation water, and I think we will have before we are too much older, our production capabilities will be almost unlimited."

"In view of these things and the growing world demand for agricultural production, pessimistic predictions about the future of cotton or other crops in this area obviously not taking into account cumulative scientific know-how, our determination, our willingness to work together toward problem solution and our ability to adapt our operations to the latest discoveries of research.

"It seems to me, in fact, that pessimism at this time can only be the result of letting a few real but by no means insurmountable problems stand as scraggly trees between us and the luxurious forest of our agricultural future."

A test in Borden County last year resulted in a lint increase of 250 pounds per acre with the use of 42-42-0 on a soil extremely low in both nitrogen and phosphorus.

A lint increase of 160 pounds per acre also was reported in Mitchell County with the use of 26-32-0 on a soil deficient in the two nutrients, adds Griffin. Similar results were reported in Dawson County in 1963 with the use of 20-20-0 and

40-40-0.

A lint increase of 234 pounds occurred in Lynn County in the Sandy Area in 1965, with an application of 24-30-0.

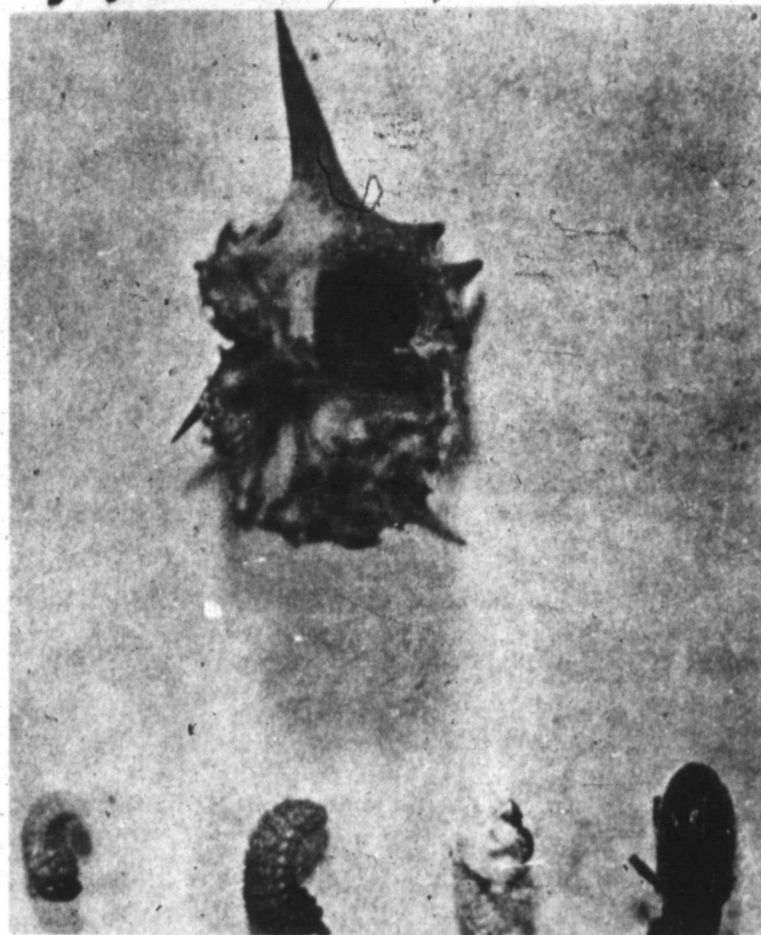
Griffin suggests that rates should be kept fairly low since there is always the possibility of drought conditions, depending on soil test values, looks promising on sandier soils.

Profitable response on the hardlands is unlikely under drier conditions due to the greater drought hazard.

Of course, for best fertilizer results, Griffin recommends soil testing and points out that there is still time to have samples tested at the South Plains Research and Extension Center's soil laboratory at Lubbock.

Containers and instructions for submitting soil samples are available at this office, adds Griffin. This information was provided by Jim Valentine, area soil chemist.

Goathead Control Development

A new development in the eradication and control of the puncturevine, more commonly known as the "plain old goathead," has recently come to light in the State of Texas.

During 1962, the Puncturevine Seed Weevil, *Micro-larinus laevis* (Jac. du Val), was distributed in the Amarillo and Big Spring area and has now spread to a northern line extending from Wheeler to Lubbock and west to the New Mexico line. The southern boundary of infestation extends from New Mexico east to Midland and northeast through Abilene to Vernon. The weevils did not survive in the Amarillo or Dalhart areas even though several releases were made.

Included in the area infested with the weevils is the Tahoka and Lynn County area, although it is not known just how large a percentage of coverage the county has received.

In the fall of 1965, tests were made in various counties of the West Texas area with Lynn showing a 60 percent infestation and it is hoped that the percentage is higher at this stage.

According to studies made on the weevil, which attacks nothing but goatheads, it seems, the female weevil chews a small pit in the side of a young bur, deposits her egg and seals the pit with fecal cement.

A small grub hatches and feeds on the inside of the bur. The fully grown grub transforms to a pupa and

later an adult which bores itself out of the seed.

One, two or three weevils may complete their development within a single bur. The egg to adult cycle usually requires about 25 days. The longevity of the overwintering adult is about 1 year.

Adults will suck juice from puncturevine leaves and stems but do not cause appreciable damage by this type of feeding, main damage is caused by the implantation of the egg and the emergence of the adult, thus rendering the bur incapable of growing into a puncturevine plant.

Also, according to the survey results indicate that in certain areas of the state, the weevil offers promise of reducing but not eliminating puncturevine.

In areas of heaviest infestation, not all of the burs were attacked, usually leaving some healthy seed after burs are damaged.

The reason the weevil will not provide a 100 percent control of the goathead stems from the weevils' sole dependence upon puncturevine plants for their own survival.

CHDA Says:**

An allowance loses its educational value if a parent dictates exactly how a child is to spend his money, according to home management specialists.

The key to keeping nuts fresh is to store them in a cool place, nutritionists say. Nuts should be stored in tightly covered containers or aluminum foil packages in the refrigerator or freezer.

Never stack one hat atop another in a closet. The unseen grease on the inside of one can stain the crown of the hat beneath.

If you are on a weight-reducing diet, you should be sure your daily intake of vitamins, minerals, fats, carbohydrates, and proteins is adequate. Each is required to maintain the good looks and good health of your skin and other body tissue. Be sure that you drink enough fluids each day to prevent dehydration. From four to eight cups is generally recommended. Dieters also may benefit by applying an enriching lotion to moisturize and soften the skin.

Cooked sausage can be the answer to the busy homemaker's menu problems. Sausage can be broiled, baked, fried, or grilled, used in sandwiches or served for appetizers. Or, they can be used to flavor other foods. Try using them to add sparkle to scrambled eggs, baked beans, scalloped potatoes, or creamed corn.

Cotton mercerized thread, the all-time favorite for home sewing is extra-strong. If the thread should break in the sewing machine, check to see if the machine is threaded correctly. Breaking also may be caused by a bent needle, or a needle that is the wrong size for the thread.

Use cardboard from laundered shirts for fruit and vegetable cutting boards. They absorb juices well. They might also be used under paint cans to prevent drips on the floor.

If you wrap paint brushes in aluminum foil after cleaning them, they will stay soft and moist.

Nylons may soon lead runless lives, thanks to a new stocking finish that invisibly coats hosiery to prevent runs and snags. After a one-minute soak, the finish is said to last through several launderings.

The fibers of stainless steel are being blended with conventional textile fibers for household use. The metal fibers are said to eliminate static from nylon and acrylic carpeting and up-all be used in "heat conductive" carpets, curtains, and draperies.

The main reason that wool shrieks in washing is because of the way the fibers are constructed. Each fiber has scales on it similar to shingles on a roof. When wet, these scales swell. Then they are rubbed together, even during gentle washing, the scales interlock. This holds the fibers closer together and the fiber shrinks.

Hang brooms and brushes. This will allow them to return to their original size and keep bristles from spreading.
