He also said he sure to return all billfolds to the pocket, preferably an inside pocket and be sure a purse is securely closed.

He suggested trying to keep yourself in position to avoid being accosted by someone who may be attempting to take your purchases, purse or billfold.

Chief Richards said to be sure your vehicle is always locked, whether or not you are in the vehicle, or inside a store shopping. Lock your purchases in an inconspicuous place, such as the trunk of the vehicle, or on the floorboard if a trunk is not available.

He said that if a person thinks they are being followed, just lead them directly to the police department. He also suggested

that if you are being followed, try to get a description, color and, if possible, the license number of the vehicle following you. Also, the police ask that any person seen in a vehicle, or attempting to enter a vehicle you know or suspect is not their own, report it to the police so they can check it out.

## Ag Commissioner Will Speak Here

John Gulley, manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, said this week, "I am pleased to announce on behalf of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, that the honorable Reagan V. Brown, commissioner of agriculture for the state of Texas, has accepted an invitation to speak at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet."

Gulley said the banquet is scheduled for Thursday, January 31, and explained that the time and location for the banquet, along with other details, will be announced at a later date.

Reagan V. Brown is a native of Henderson and spent his young days on a farm.

## State Sets Road Work For County

Bids for the improvement of various sections of highways in Bailey, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock, and Parmer Counties are expected to be received during December by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The work will consist of sealcoating the roadways with an application of asphalt and rock to promote waterproofing and help maintain roadway strength.

Lubbock District Engineer George C. Wall said sealcoating will be applied to portions of FM1731 and FM1760 in Bailey County along with portions of highways in the other counties listed.

Wall said the completed seal coat projects will provide a better riding and skid resistant surface for motorists. William M. Pope of Lubbock is the department's engineer in charge of the work.

After graduation from Henderson High School in 1939, Commissioner Brown worked his way through Texas A&M University. In 1943, he received a bachelor of science degree in marketing and finance. He later earned a master's degree in rural sociology in 1956 as well as a master's in educational psychology in 1965, both from Texas A&M.

He has also studied at Michigan State University, Colorado State University and Utah State University.

Commissioner Brown served from 1943-46 with the U.S. Army as a captain with combat and occupation duties in the European Theater. Returning to the United States, he owned a food, feed and fertilizer business in Henderson for two years.

In 1948, he began his long career with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, first serving as assistant county agent in Hunt County. He was county agent in Kaufman and Caldwell counties

The local group is part of a statewide delegation of more than 2,700 citizens who have voiced their approval of Governor Connally's effort, added Campbell. He said Charles Flowers of Muleshoe has been named Bailey County Campaign Chairman for the Connally campaign.

## Businesses, Homes Asked To Fly Flag

With the continuing crisis involving the 50 hostages who have been held at the U. S. Embassy in Iran, Muleshoe Jaycees and the City of Muleshoe have banded together in an effort to have a continuous reminder of the nation's involvement in the world situation.

Friday morning, Muleshoe Mayor Charles Bratcher signed a proclamation supporting a Jaycee resolution that all local businesses display the American flag daily until the current crisis is resolved and all the hostages have been returned to their homes here.

Effective Monday, December 10, chairman of the Jaycee Flag Project, Charles Moraw, and his crew will be putting flags out in front of all business firms in Muleshoe who subscribe to their flag service. They also encourage other businesses who do not subscribe to the service to display the flag in front of their business each day until the crisis is resolved.

On a first come, first serve basis, the Jaycees will have flags available for persons who do not currently have the flag service.

They indicate that in view of the crisis, they will not be attempting to capitalize on the current situation, but in the interest of showing a complete, town-wide support of the efforts to obtain the release of the hostages, they will make all the flags they have available for use locally.

During a board meeting of the Muleshoe Jaycees on Thursday, the flag project was adopted by the local Jaycees after receiving the nod of the state Jaycee officers and board members.

In Muleshoe this week is Jay Brim, state president of the Jaycees. The Austin attorney was present at the board meeting in Muleshoe Thursday, and joined the Jaycees Thursday and

Friday in a concentrated effort to acquire new members for the local chapter.

Brim discussed with the board members the upcoming legislative seminar in Austin in January. He expressed appreciation of the state organization to the local Jaycees for hosting the state officers in Muleshoe. The state president said 10 of the 16 state officers planned to attend an executive session in Muleshoe on Saturday.

Brim explained that for the legislative seminar in January, Vice President Mondale would be keynote speaker and that Governor Clements would close the session.

Five years ago, the Austin attorney said he was drafted into the Jaycees. He then became more and more interested because of the Jaycee Motto, "Young Men Can Change The World." He said he

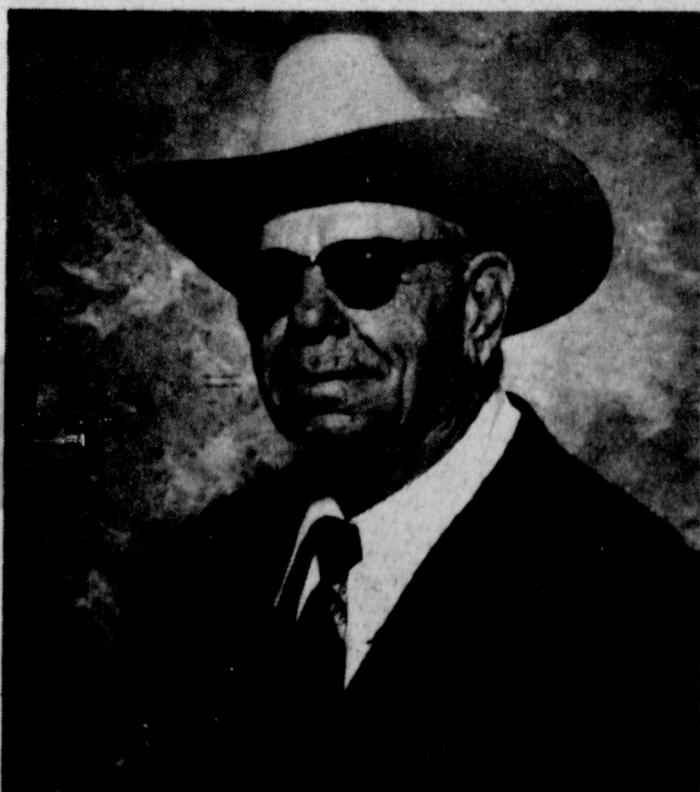
## Winter Illness 'Not Epidemic' In Muleshoe

Absenteeism is being reported on a continuing basis from local businesses and schools.

Both County Health Officer Dr. Gary Albertson and School Superintendent Neal B. Dillman report a slight increase over 'normal' for incidences of flu for this time of year, but said there is no epidemic at this time.

Dr. Albertson said the only preventative measure that can be taken are to avoid crowds, get flu shots from a person's personal physician, and see a doctor at the onset of congestion or a cold.

Although the hospital is reported to be full of patients, it is said to be no different at this time than two months ago, and the patients are hospitalized with a myriad of illnesses, not just flu and winter illnesses.

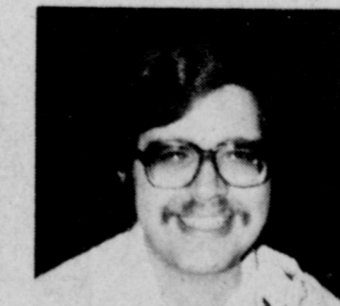

The new line will be single pole structures with two (2) crossarms and three (3) energized conductors, and one (1) grounded neutral wire. The proposed route for the six (6) miles of 69 K.V. transmission will be: taking off from a point at the north Muleshoe substation, it will go west for one (1) mile, then turning north up the existing section line, it will continue for five (5) miles and terminate at the proposed new substation sight. This is a two (2) acre trace located in the SW/4, Section 14, TWP-14S Survey, Range 3-E.

All construction will conform to standard R.E.A. specifications. It will be identical to the lines that the Cooperative has constructed, maintained, and operated in the area for forty years. No adverse effect on the quality of the environment is anticipated to result from this proposed construction.

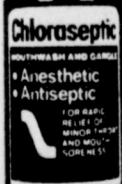
