Construction Started On Highway No. 30 Tuesday

Construction on Highway No. 30 began earnestly Tuesday morning with the arrival of a carload of steel late Monday afternoon. The big mixing machine was tuned up for a little while Monday afternoon and about 40 feet of concrete poured and then shut down on account of a shipment of steel that had not arrived. The shipment arrived Monday afternoon and was placed on the siding at Hatchel where trucks are stringing it along the right-of-way.

The mixer dumps the material inside the track at the rate of about \$7 worth of actual material at a time. The mixer spreads the material pretty well itself but laborers with shovels finish the job and the finishing machine stays right behind the mixer keeping all the concrete poured spread and ready for the hand finishers who keep up with the job.

A hinge is placed through the middle of the 18-foot stretch and every 80 feet a break is made and a one-inch piece of fabric is dropped into take care of expansion. The entire stretch of concrete is reinforced with steel and the edges are nine inches thick.

Many trucks are on the job running from the big dump at Hatchel to the mixer. At the station at Hatchel are mountains of sand, gravel and cement with machinery loading the trucks as fast as they drive under the loading racks. After receiving the necessary amount of sand and gravel, the cement is thrown on top and these sacks are emptied just before the truck unloads into the mixer. Each truck load represents one batch for the mixer.

A direct water line connects with the mixer from a pump station at the Coyote Creek bridge.

Several different crews are busy on the road, some working on the grade, some at bridges, others keeping the steel track ready for the machinery to work on, and it looked Tuesday morning as though the work would soon reach a good rate of construction each day.

Hatchel resembles a boom town in an oil field. The east side of the tracks looks like a city of tents and many people who are working on the road are camping there. With the gravel and sand pits there with loading machinery, cement storage houses and steel being unloaded at the station it gives a boom town appearance.

Mr. Thompson, contractor on the job, expects to continue without a shutdown if the weather remains good so that he can. He has plenty of laborers on the job and many trucks are operating, hauling both from the dump at Hatchel and from the dump to the machinery.

It is worth a trip there to see the work as it is being done and if weather remains good it will not take long for this stretch of road to be open to the public.

Mexican Auto Drivers Strike

LAREDO, Apr. 16.—Not a motor-driven vehicle in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, moved today as a result of a chauffeurs strike which went into effect at midnight as a protest against the excessive license tax charged by the Mexican government on automobiles of all kinds. One hundred pesos per year is demanded on all busses and service cars, with other cars ranging to slightly lower rates. Members of the barbers, waiters, butchers and bakers unions went out in sympathy with the chauffeurs.

Couple Drowned; Man is Found

HOUSTON, Apr. 16.—The body of a man believed to have been a salesman, was found in the ship channel several miles from Houston today. A search is being made for a woman who is believed to have driven off the roadway into the stream during the night. A ferry boat operator heard a woman screaming and saw her car plunge into the water.

Dawes Appointment Confirmed by Senate

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16.—Charles G. Dawes today was nominated and confirmed as ambassador to Great Britain. President Hoover sent his name to the senate soon after it convened and the senate speedily confirmed it without discussion. The nomination of ex-Governor Joseph M. Dixon of Montana as assistant secretary of the interior was also confirmed.

CAR OF CHICKENS IS SHIPPED FROM BALLINGER

The Abilene & Southern station was a busy scene Tuesday morning when the Runnels County Poultry Association loaded onto a car of poultry to Los Angeles, Calif. At one time there were 58 cars, trucks and trailers at the car, in the process of loading. The shipment was bought by the Mid-West Poultry Association and will be sent to Winters Tuesday afternoon where the car will finish loading.

The poultry car has a capacity of 20,000 live birds and 40,000 pounds. A keeper will go all the way with the car and look after the chickens until they are unloaded at Los Angeles.

Pres. Hoover Outlines Work Before Congress

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16.—President Hoover, in his message to the special session today, which was not delivered in person, made five recommendations to congress:
1. Enactment of a general farm relief measure on a basis which would be a federal farm board with wide credit powers.
2. Limited revision of tariff in certain schedules with increased powers for the federal tariff commission.
3. Suspension of the national origins clause of the 1924 immigration act which becomes effective on July 1 unless congress acts in the meantime.
4. Reapportionment of congress which all congressional sessions since 1920 have been evading, in defiance of the Constitution.
5. Legislation providing for a decennial census in 1930.

"I have called this special session of congress to redeem two pledges given in the last election—farm relief and limited changes in the tariff," said President Hoover. Despite the fact that the president did not deliver his speech in person, the galleries were packed.

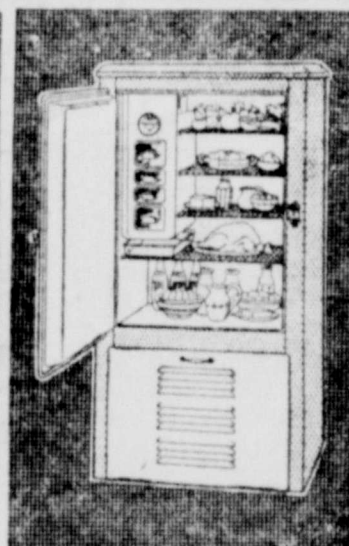

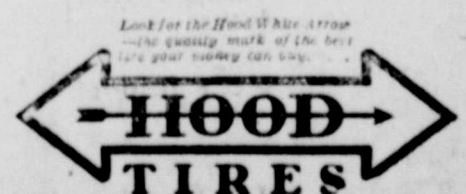

COKE COUNTY WELL HAS GOOD SHOWING

BLACKWELL, Apr. 15.—Mid-Kansas Oil Company's No. 1 W. E. Lackey, about two miles southwest of Blackwell in Coke county, was reported to have from 1,200 to 1,500 feet of oil in the hole after encountering the showing late Monday afternoon at a depth of 3,755 feet.

Water found at a lesser depth was said to have been shut off, and the well was entirely dry when the pay was struck. Gas pressure immediately after encountering the showing was estimated at 50,000 cubic feet.

Work was suspended after the tools had been drawn from the hole and the well capped to await a test tomorrow to determine the extent of the showing.

A bad cave-in well above the depth where the oil was found seemed likely to necessitate running a new string of pipe, it was said.

The location of the test is 330 feet north and east of the southwest corner of section 272, block 1-A, H. & T. C. Ry. Co. survey. The section on which it is located is a county line section, lying partly in Nolan and partly in Coke county. The well, however, is in Coke county.

Supervisor Reports On Local Schools

Supt. H. C. Lyon has received a report of the recent inspection of the Ballinger High School which was made by State Supervisor W. E. Garrett. The report lists a number of corrections recommended for the local school and among these is the care for the increase in the local school. This school has had a large growth in the past two years and this year it has been necessary to place a large number of children in some of the rooms and in the first grade half-day sessions were necessary.

In recommendation No. 4 the supervisor recommends that certain units be dropped and others reduced. For fear that the public will not understand this paragraph it is pointed out that the school has adopted other subjects in the place of the ones where units will be dropped. These subjects were dropped by the local school and others taken up to make courses stronger.

Following is a copy of the report sent to the local school:

1. That the plan of reorganizing the system for the purpose of better caring for the increased enrollment be given the immediate and careful attention of the official board.

It is a difficult task to plan for an abnormal increase in school even when class room space is available. It is confident that a system so modern as this will not continue to crowd fifty pupils into a grade room nor advocate half-time sessions for primary pupils.

2. That sufficient teachers be added under the reorganization plan to properly care for enrollment increases.

3. That modern playground apparatus be supplied at once for children of the lower elementary grades.

4. That credit in civics be reduced to one-half unit and credit in English, physiology and psychology be dropped.

5. That the Spanish department be provided with maps of the Spanish speaking nations and the commercial department with economic and geographic maps.

6. That material submitted for accrediting receive the careful attention of the examiners.

7. That commendations be expressed for:

(a) The original and impressive work done by Latin students.

(b) Retention of well trained and experienced teachers.

(c) The high type of work being done in all departments.

(d) Organization of board on commission plan.

The supervisor had an enjoyable day in the Ballinger schools.

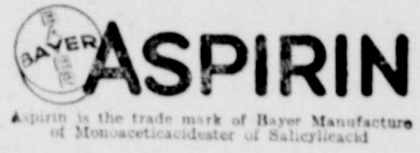
