Ticket Sales Started

The Players Guild of Wichita Falls will be presented by the Burk Burnett Rotary and Lions Clubs as the annual benefit for the school fund of the two clubs at the high school auditorium Nov. 29. The Wichita Dramatic club will present the highly successful "Lena Rivers" that has been accepted favorably by audiences in that city.

The presentation of the play is part of a program that the two service clubs have carried on for the last eight years to supply the underprivileged children of the local schools with glasses, shoes, and clothes necessary to make their attendance at school possible. During the depression year hundreds of children have been able to attend school who otherwise would not have been able to do so.

Previously the club has presented a play using local talent or a minstrel playing the local prominent on the gridiron for a severe toasting. This popular form of entertainment was abandoned this year for the excellent production presented by the Wichita organization.

The committee making arrangements for ticket sales and advertisement in Burk Burnett is H. Lee Clifton of the Lions club and Oscar Kemp of the Rotary club. The sales campaign will start Friday afternoon. The posters and advertising cards will be made in the art department of the local schools.

Last Saturday the two clubs and the Boy Scouts of the city collected 600 pairs of old shoes which will be repaired for the children. The money raised on the play will be added to the collection to aid the children.

Uniform Cotton Adopted By Burk Farmers Tuesday

Majority of Farmers At Meeting Agree To Plant Pure Seed

Seed Ordered

Farmers of the Burk Burnett area have adopted the uniform Kasch seed almost one hundred percent according to the report at the general mass meeting of the cotton growers at the city hall Tuesday night. With both Burk Burnett and Oklahoma well represented at the meeting, the farmers continued the drive to sign up the growers in this district for a single breed of seed.

G. R. McNeill and W. C. Wilhoit, county officials from Wichita Falls, met with the farmers under the sponsorship of the Burk Burnett chamber of commerce.

The seed will be ordered in car load lots on consignment and will be available at both of the Burk Burnett gins. The Kasch agencies are allowing the local gins to sell directly to the farmers, and the price for this experiment will be greatly reduced. The local officials estimate that four car loads will be required for the planting next year.

Those farmers who have not signed for the cooperative effort have been requested to leave their name and the amount of acreage that they will plant at the chamber of commerce offices or at either gin.

The plans for a uniform seed are a part of the state wide campaign to increase the grade of Texas cotton. If 100 percent of the farmers sign before harvest season, the local gins will process this type of cotton exclusively.

The banquet decorations and program will be in keeping with the feature of the meeting. Exhibits, favors, and programs will hold the motif, the agriculture and industry combining to build the community.

The plans for the banquet were continuing to grow at a rapid pace this week with the feature speaker Ray Nichols of Vernon, Texas, publisher and editor of the Vernon Daily Record as the honor guest of the evening. The years work was completed Tuesday and the audit of the financial records will be made this week. The other portions of the program will be arranged in the near future.

Cardinals Invade Thrift Gymnasium Next Tuesday Nite

Two Powerful Teams Attract Wide Interest in Exhibition Game

Big Crowd Expected

The Carey Cardinals, state basketball champions and one of the most famous basketball teams in the state of Texas, will invade the gymnasium of the Fairview Bears, champions of this district last year for what promises to be one of the most attractive basketball games ever played in the region at the Fairview high school four miles west of Burk Burnett Tuesday night November 23.

The two championship teams which are probably almost intact in personel after winning titles last year will provide the lovers of the cage sport a juicy morsel. The meeting of the two teams will bring together two of the best quintets in North Texas.

Last year after a struggle with eligibility and league rules the Carey Cardinals recovered to win county, state, district, and regional title to represent this area of the state in its first state title. The Fairview Bears had a miracle team last year. While its scores were far below the average team, the Bears perfected a defense that in many cases prevented the opposition from scoring a single field goal.

This year the team is coached by Erwin Brand who has a veteran squad back ready to give last year's state champions a hard fought contest. The largest crowd in the history of the Fairview school is indicated by the interest in the announcement.

The Fairview Bears have continued their winning ways this year and won the first half of the Wichita Valley and Red River Valley league without a loss. Then repeated to win the championship by defeating Geraldine Wednesday night to secure the right to meet South Lockett league title next week.

The toughest opposition of the year was Harold Hornets Tuesday night in which the Bears were victors by 17 to 12. Wednesday night the score over Geraldine was 26 to 14.

In the Cary-Fairview game next Tuesday night the Fairview team will open its gymnasium at 6:30 for the fans, and its capacity is expected to be reached long before the game starts an hour later.

LOCAL SCHOOL OFFICIALS SEEK CORRECT DATA ON AGE OF BURK LEFT END AFTER CROWELL WINS

"We are just starting to fight" said coach Volney Hill this week when queried about the fact that John Blair had been declared ineligible because Crowell contended that he was five days too old to play this year and that the district 10-B executive committee had approved the Crowell contention. Burk Burnett's fiery coach hoped to re-open the case on basis of new evidence discovered since the hearing last Monday afternoon. If the case should be re-opened and the executive committee reverse its decision, Burk Burnett would be back in the fight for regional championship.

Cataclysmic disaster overtook the Burk Burnett Bulldogs Monday night when their conference record of six victories and no defeats was nullified by the decision of the district 10-B executive committee that their star right end is over age and that all the games in which he had played are to be forfeited.

Meeting in the Wichita county courthouse, the committee thrashed through conflicting evidence as to Blair's age and decided on the basis of the evidence ordered in the ledger of Dr. J. A. Collins of Gordonville, Texas, and other records that the player was 19 years of age before Sept. 1, 1937. In a previous hearing brought up by Throckmorton, an affidavit from Dr. Collins had been produced stating that records in his files showed he attended Blair's birth on Sept. 15, 1918.

After Dr. Collins' affidavit had been the principal cause for the action of the committee in refusing to disqualify Blair at the earlier hearing, Coach Grady Graves of Crowell and L. A. Andrews, member of the Crowell school board, visited the doctor's home and secured his ledger book. They found there an entry, the earliest documentary evidence possible, showing that Blair was born on Aug. 25, 1918.

Came as Surprise

The revelation came as a surprise to Burk Burnett's superintendent and coach, who had trusted the doctor's affidavit.

The protest was entered by Supt. I. T. Graves of Crowell, Texas, a member of the executive committee. However, both Superintendent Graves and Superintendent C. J. Dnucan of Burk Burnett were disqualified to vote on the resolution, being interested parties.

The executive committee also voted a resolution that C. J. Dnucan, as superintendent of the Burk Burnett schools was justified in certifying John Blair as eligible and did not deserve censure for his action. This resolution received a unanimous vote of the committee.

Both Victorious

Both Crowell and Burk Burnett had won all of their games this

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FOOTBALL CONSCIOUS

Burkburnett fans have become football conscious in a big way. Last weekend fans from this community attended games in nine different cities. The success of the Bulldogs in district 10-B has created a greatest interest in the game that our community has ever known. Never before has the whole community been so solidly interested in a single type of sport, or as far as that is concerned in any type of activity.

This week the local team meets the Crowell team at Crowell. The Ford county team is noted for its brilliant play and its steadiness in any crisis. Against relative weak teams the team manages to just get by with a point or two as a winning margin. Against stronger teams the Wildcats increase their power enough to win again. So regardless of comparative scores, the Burkburnett fans will find that they can not be too sure about the outcome next Friday night. This element of doubt has created keen interest in the game.

There isn't any doubt in the minds of the Burkburnett citizens about the ability of the Bulldogs to win the game. The local fans are sold on the team. They will back it from here to the north pole and back. However, they realize that the boys are meeting the final test in the championship struggle. The team is winning its second championship, but it is playing on a field where a Burkburnett team has never won a game.

So next Friday night let's close up the city and follow right behind those Bulldogs. The Crowell fans have sent an invitation and promise to turn the city over to us—Win, lose or draw.

A GOOD FUND WELL ADMINISTERED

For eight years the Burkburnett Lions Club and the Burkburnett Rotary club has held an annual benefit play at the high school auditorium to raise funds for the welfare of the two organizations among school children. The funds raised in these annual plays are used to buy glasses, clothes, and other necessities for the less fortunate children.

The annual report of the work of this fund appears in another place in this paper. Each year the Star takes pride in presenting this report because it is one of the most worthy and best administered funds in the city.

In the first place the fund is for a worthy cause. During these eight years that it has existed it has been possible for many children to attend school who would not have been able or who would have been seriously handicapped in their school work without the fund. Children have the same pride that adults have, but during the school days when social contacts mean so much to the child, this pride is some times magnified. The aid has made possible this group to attend comfortably clothed.

Glasses are essential when they are needed. Nothing is more uncomfortable than attempting to do reasonably excellent work without glasses when the eyes are weak. Poor grades, bad behavior, and many other undesirable things result from weak eyes improperly cared for by good glasses.

The second reason that the Star desires to praise the fund and the two clubs sponsoring it is that the fund has been administered more efficiently than the majority of such funds. It has really been placed where it could do some good.

On November 29 the local clubs are bringing from Wichita Falls the play "Lena Rivers". It replaces the less entertaining minstrel shows that have been very embarrassing to many people. It is a high class performance presented by a talented group of people. The show deserves the support of every person in Burkburnett.

ELIGIBILITY CONTESTS

Possibly football is about the most prominent activity in Burkburnett. At least it causes more comment and more attention than any other community activity during the fall season. For that reason Burkburnett was stunned by the news this week that one of the players on the Burkburnett team was ineligible and that all the games played this fall would be forfeited to the opponents. The loss of the games leaves the team without victory except in the game awarded from Archer City.

This contest of eligibility may be over, or it may be opened again depending on the facts that local officials are able to uncover in the next few days. Regardless of how this contest eventually is decided, there should be some rearrangement of the protest rules.

It has been the contention of the Star that all protests should be made before a single game is played, and that a decision of the executive committee should be made before a conference game has been decided.

In district 10-B the directors meet every fall and look over the records of the players. They certify the players as eligible until some protest is made later. That meeting could easily be converted into a detailed examination of the players age, scholastic status, and eligibility on the basis of all other rules.

It has been unpleasant for the committee, unpleasant for Burkburnett team, fans, and school officials this week to face the possibility of the cancellation of the games.

During the last three years we have written three editorials on this same subject. Possibly now some decisive action will be taken to amend the rules of the district to make this suggestion a reality.

HEADLINES

Nineteen years ago last Thursday the hostilities ended in Europe, and the "victorious" army of the Allies marched into the occupation of the territory of the Central powers or marched back home. But neither the Central power nor the Allies were sure just who had won the war. There has been the gradually developing realization since that date that no one did win. The nations had fought to a stand still. The natural resources, the wealth, and the man power of both sides were near exhaustion. While the Allies received the nod of victory, they really had paid such a tremendous price for the recognition that the victory was not so sweet as it may have seemed during the days of the conflict. For generations these same nations will be almost bankrupt in order to pay for the struggle. In many cases the payment of the debts incurred were passed up, repudiated or simply forgotten.

A Bitter Lesson

To the reasonably minded person that would appear to have taught the Europeans the lesson that no one wins in a war. But it didn't. Today the headlines of almost every paper is "war" Italy finished a "war" on Ethiopia, and paid the price of several thousand men and many millions in money for an almost useless territory. In Spain, Italy, Germany, and Austria are lined up against France, England, and Russia. Every day fighting has the possibility of producing another world war. In the Orient, Japan continues the dreadful and merciless march on the Chinese. People are not so smart after all. If a monkey, a cat, or a dog, or even a little lowly earth worm is burned, either of these creatures will avoid the course of activity that caused the suffering. But not human beings. War scorched the morale, swept desolate the finances, murdered millions of men, and left barren countless millions of acres of land, but man still crazed by hatred sweeps along the same course.

Meddlers

We don't believe that the labor organizations had any business interfering with the proposed trip of the Duke of Windsor to the United States. What possible relation could his visit have to their welfare. They have enough trouble of their own without interfering with a purely courtesy visit of a foreign royalty. We feel definitely that the cause of labor lost a lot of respect in this interference. It is true that possibly we lost little or nothing by the Duke's failure to visit at this time, but that still doesn't justify the unwarranted meddling of the labor organizations.

Deep Oil

The success of the KMA sector has established more firmly the belief that there is deep oil in Burkburnett area. This oil ought to be there, and the local organization that is attempting to start the drilling should be greatly encouraged by the uniformity of the success of the structure. The resentment that this group has of

the publicity that has given would be a poor excuse for failure to pursue to success the proposals.

Cause Strengthened

The Japanese position to make peace is stronger now than since the attack started on Shanghai two months ago. The success in the capture of the city places the Nipponese in a position to make terms. It will be much easier for them to have something to trade when the powers meet around a conference table later.

Bad Cotton

It has been noticed lately that the nations of the world buying United States cotton have specified in many instances that there be "No Texas" cotton in the purchases. The reason is that the Texans have adopted no uniform policy about raising cotton. The inferior grades, make the average incomes in Texas about \$13.00 per acre while the national average is about \$16.40 per acre. The movement that has been started in Burkburnett to make uniform cotton seed is what is needed all over the state to make the income of the Texas farms increase.

Hard To Drop

You have heard the story about the cowboy who roped a wildcat and had a hard time freeing the cat. Well that is just about the position of England. They roped a wild cat at the end of the war when they assumed the responsibility of establishing a nation for the Jews in the Holy lands. The Arabs resented the possession of the richest territory by the invading hordes of Jews. The trouble will never end until one or the other of the groups of nationalities is in complete control.

Local Delegates Attend Legion Meet

The 13th District Convention of the American Legion met at Denton, Texas November 8th and 7th and an exceptionally good meeting was held according to the delegates (Monroe Prinzing, Homer Gilbert, C. F. Johnson and Jimmie Boyd) from this post.

At 1:00 P. M. Saturday was registration followed by activities in the fine Denton Legion Hall. From 7 to 9 P. M. the members were entertained by the young ladies of the Music, Speech and Physical Education Departments of The Texas State College for Women.

Sunday morning after a short joint meeting of the Legion and Ladies Auxiliary, the Legion paraded through the streets of Denton in a column of squads to the First Presbyterian Church for a devotional and inspirational address by Dr. Wm. The drive for the registration of the unemployed started Tuesday morning as the committee appointed by Mayor Alvin Hill started the instruction of these eligible for the count, and the members of the local post office department distributed the cards for the signers.

Unemployed persons and partially unemployed who fill out and send for the National Unemployment Census, between November 16 and 20 need not fear that their names will be published, or made public in any way.

This pledge is contained in the instructions sent to all offices where the census is being taken.

"The confidential nature of the answers to questions on the Unemployment Report Card will be respected by the Administrator of the National Unemployment Census", the instructions state.

The information given by unemployed or other signers of the cards will not be used to their disadvantage in any way, such as in tax matters, questions of citizenship, or relief. The data on the cards is to be used solely for the purposes of the census. Further, positive action was taken to exclude from the census any supplementary enumeration or registration which might be imposed on the regular unemployment census by those seeking to take

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advantage of the government's undertaking for their own purpose.

Instructions went to all local committees in connection with the unemployment census, which read:

"It is quite possible that you will receive proposals for supplementary enumeration or registration projects, to precede or accompany the National Unemployment Census, and designed to provide special information for your community. However commendable such proposals may be in

themselves, we must urge you to discourage them, or to request their postponement until after November 20.

"Their effect would be to detract attention from the census and to confuse the public mind. The main objective in this national enterprise is to secure a complete, honest and accurate registration, and any competing interest of the same general character would detract from this objective. It would also be to the ultimate disadvantage of your community itself."

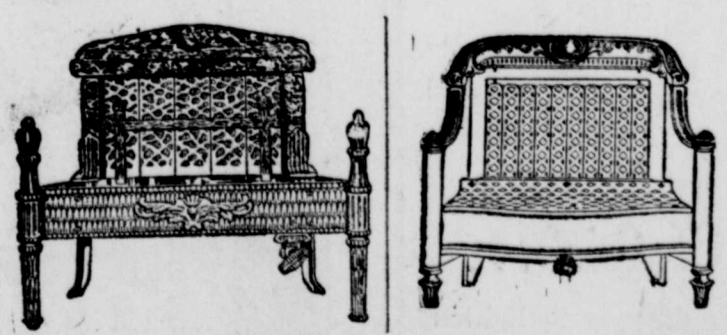

Bulldogs Invade Wildcats Home Field In Game That Will Draw Banner Crowd Of Class B Year

The climax of the year for Burk Burnett and Crowell, two extremely football-minded communities, will be reached next Friday night at the Crowell stadium when the Burk Burnett invade the Wildcats home field.

Two teams that have swept aside both conference and non-conference opposition will present a spotless record in the game, and the string of victories of one or the other will be broken. The championship of district 10-B, one of the fastest Class B districts of the state, will be at stake.

Two fine backfields will be matched in the contest. T. McKown, Evans, Willett and Bates for Burk Burnett and Joy, Orr, Meason and Simmons of Crowell are two combinations that have not been stopped this year. And only on few occasions have they been slowed down.

McKown, Willett and Evans provide the scoring magic for Burk Burnett. McKown is the power. He kicks, passes, runs, and is a powerhouse defense man. Evans provides the shocking drives at the line, and the spark of accurate passing. Evans extra points after touchdowns are as nearly perfect as has been seen in this district. Willett is unchallenged as the speediest man in the conference.

year and were to meet next Friday night at Crowell to determine the title of the district. However, the action of the committee Monday afternoon clinched the title for the Crowell Wildcats.

The resolution by the committee was read by J. F. Kemp, district chairman and superintendent at Seymour, Texas. It was signed by J. W. Hancock of Chillicothe and W. R. Bradford of Iowa Park.

The resolution stated that the committee found John Blair ineligible on the basis of the original birth records entered in the ledger of Dr. J. A. Collins of Gordonville, Texas, the doctor attending at his birth, on the census records in the Wichita county scholastic records at Wichita Falls, and on the census scholastic records in Cotton county, Oklahoma. In each of the records the age of the player was asserted to be 19 years before the date Sept. 1, 1937.

In making the protest, Supt. I. T. Graves of Crowell stated that he believed the Burk Burnett superintendent to be sincere in his previous demand for the decision on the player, and that there was no ill will on the part of Crowell toward Burk Burnett.

No Hard Feelings
The Crowell protest asserted that the Crowell authorities were not accusing Burk Burnett of trickery, but that more recent evidence

me that if necessary the district football executive committee, if they so desire, may have access to your records, as this procedure may be needed in establishing the eligibility of John Blair to play football during the fall of 1937. The individuals of the committee expressed complete confidence in his good faith in using Blair in games this year. Mr. L. T. Graves of Crowell stated specifically that he personally felt that there had been no attempt at trickery or subterfuge on the part of either Coach Hill or Superintendent Duncan.

The committee voted unanimously the following resolution: Motion made and seconded and carried unanimously that with the evidence in possession of the Superintendent of Burk Burnett that he was justified in certifying as to the eligibility of John Blair and that he is undeserving of censure in the matter. The committee's action Monday, Nov. 15, was due to evidence in Dr. Collins' ledger and not heretofore in possession of Mr. Duncan, nor seen by him prior to Nov. 15. I. T. Graves, W. R. Bradford, J. F. Kemp, W. E. Hancock.

When Mr. Duncan received this letter he wrote the following letter to Dr. Collins: "I have before me a certification signed by you before a notary public stating that John Pershing Foch Blair, son of Henry and Saletha Blair, was born on Sept. 15, 1918 at Willis, Okla., and that you have a record of his birth in your files made within a few days after he was born. 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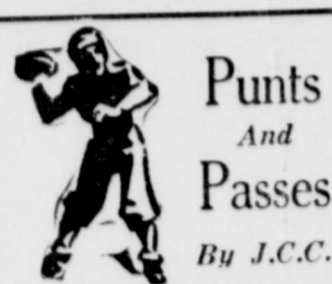

This is About Time That Coaches and fans start getting the jitters each year. Just one more game to be played. The championship game. Crowell's rampaging Wildcats have paraded through the opposition with about as much ease as the Burk Burnett Bulldogs. Now the game between the two teams looks like a natural. 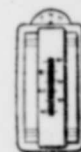

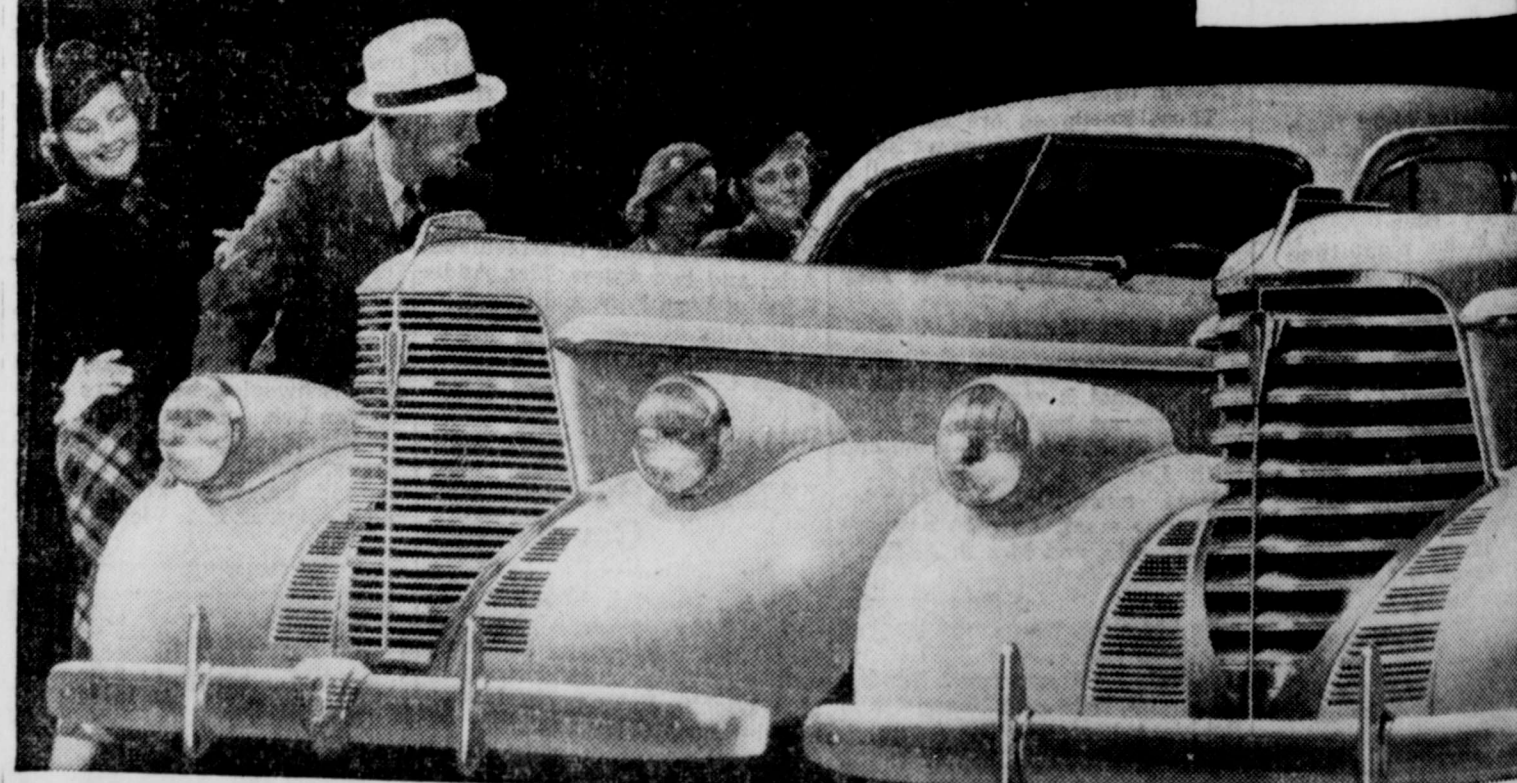

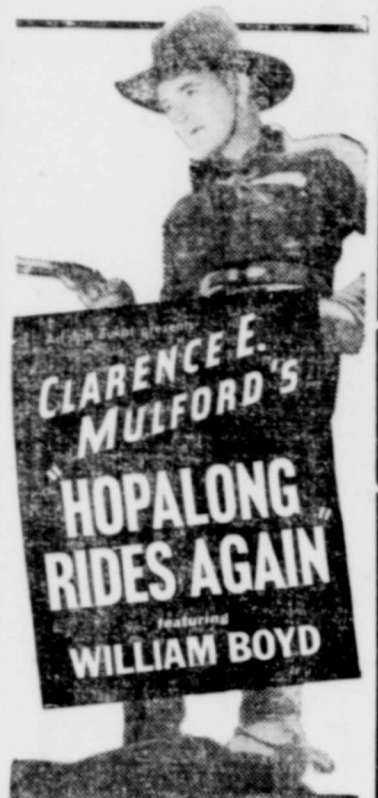
