(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—A
sharp refining of the list of possible
cities for the 1928 Democratic con-
vention was indicated today by
powers-that-be in the party on the
eve of the national committee meet-
ing and Jackson day dinner tomor-
row.

Some semblance of disagreement
on party affairs was found where
the committeemen and others gath-
ered in private conferences. While
none of the members would speak
for publication, it was said that a
move would be initiated for a
change in the present system by
which the chairman of the commit-
tee is chosen only once every four
years.

This followed reports that Clem
E. Shaver of West Virginia, the
present chairman, was contemplating
his resignation, which he de-
clined flatly. In the gossip going
the rounds of the hotel corridors
was a report also that some com-
mitteemen had contemplated a
move to ease Shaver but had de-
clined it in the interest of party
harmony.

Propose Change
Whereas in the past the chair-
man has been personally selected by
the party nominee for president, the
new plan would call for his selec-
tion by the national committee with

Woman Again In Governor's Race

Mrs. Edith Wilbanks, De-
feated In Last Campaign,
Once More Seeks Votes
Of People in Texas.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Jan. 11.—Mrs. Edith E.
Wilbanks, candidate for governor of
Texas at the last election, and a
member of the state legislature three
years ago, today announced she
would again be a candidate for
governor in the democratic primary
in July.

Her announcement
"Believing that the interests of
the State of Texas demand a wide
departure from the present method
of administering the affairs of the
state, and that especially should
there be a more careful and effi-
cient administration of the affairs
of the executive department than
has been evident recently, and be-
lieving that the people of Texas
have at last become awakened to
the fact that the office of Govern-
or of Texas should not be treated
about as a political prize to be
won by the marionette who re-
sponds most effectively to the wire
pulling of the political bosses, I
feel the time has come when the
people of Texas will look more care-
fully into the merits of the can-
didates, and will not listen so obedi-
ently to the voices of the paid politi-
cians, hence I again offer myself as
a candidate for the office of gov-
ernor, subject to the democratic
primaries in July."

URGE NAVY BILL

Navy Leaders Ask Congress
For Gigantic Program

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(P)—
Approval of the administration's
\$725,000,000 new warship construc-
tion program was urged upon con-
gress today by high naval officials
as necessary to the establishment
of an American Navy strong enough
to "protect" commerce, preserve
ocean trade routes, and provide ad-
equate national defense.

"We have not such a fleet at the
present time, was one of the con-
clusions of the navy general board
passed before the house naval com-
mittee by Secretary Wilbur.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(P)—
Nomination of Charles B.
Robbins of Iowa, to be assistant
secretary of war to succeed Han-
ford MacDonnell, resigned, was con-
firmed today by the Senate.

CRUSHED BY TRAIN Waxahachie Business Man Hit by Texas Special

WAXAHACHIE, Jan. 11.—(P)—
Jack R. Hood, 42, prominent Wax-
ahachie business man, was in-
stantly killed by the southbound
M. K. and T. railway's "Texas
Special" at a crossing here this
afternoon. Passerby said he had
stopped just after crossing the
tracks and was working on his
automobile.

Trainmen said Hood stepped
around the rear of the car and
in front of the train. He is sur-
vived by his wife. He was active
in civic, commercial and church
organizations and was a football
star at Trinity university some
years ago.

Lindbergh Will Extend His Tour To Other Lands

Flier's Greeting of Good
Will To Be Taken To
Venezuela, St. Thomas,
Haiti and Cuba.

BALBOA, Canal Zone, Jan. 11.—
Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh has
definitely decided to extend his
tour of Good Will Having virtually
completed his Central American
tour, he will fly to Venezuela, land-
ing as close as possible to Caracas.
He will go to Saint Thomas, one of
the Virgin Islands, and to Porto
Rico, Haiti, and Santo Domingo.

He will take off for Colon, on
the Caribbean side of the Isthmus
tomorrow morning. But his plans
have not been definitely decided
will regard to dates and the se-
quence of his flights.

BAND OF FIFTY IS ROUTED BY SOLDIERS

United States Force Moves
Into Town Once Held By
Sandino Forces, San Al-
bino.

(By Associated Press)
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 11.—
Five rebels were killed in an en-
gagement near Cule yesterday be-
tween followers of Gen. Augustino
Sandino and a joint patrol of the
United States marines and Nicara-
guan national guardsmen. Ma-
rine headquarters was informed to-
day.

The patrol was commanded by
Lieut. Satterfield. It is estimated
that 50 men were in the rebel party.
Lieut. Satterfield is not listed in
the navy and marine corps regis-
ter, but many marine corps non-
commissioned officers hold com-
missions in the Nicaraguan national
guard. Cule is not shown on avail-
able maps but much of the territory
where marines are in conflict
with Nicaraguan rebels is inade-
quately mapped.

Col. Louis Mason, Quirk, com-
mander of the marines in Nicara-
gua, said today that marines oc-
cupied San Albino Tuesday without
opposition. Sandino once worked
as a bookkeeper at a mine at San
Albino. He later captured the town,
worked the mine as long as he
could, and then destroyed it.

10, was brought back to the Hale
county jail at Plainview Wednes-
day.

Information to the Avalanche

fice was that no exact date had
been set for removing Hassell to
the penitentiary at Huntsville. This
probably will be done, however,
within the week, it was intimated.

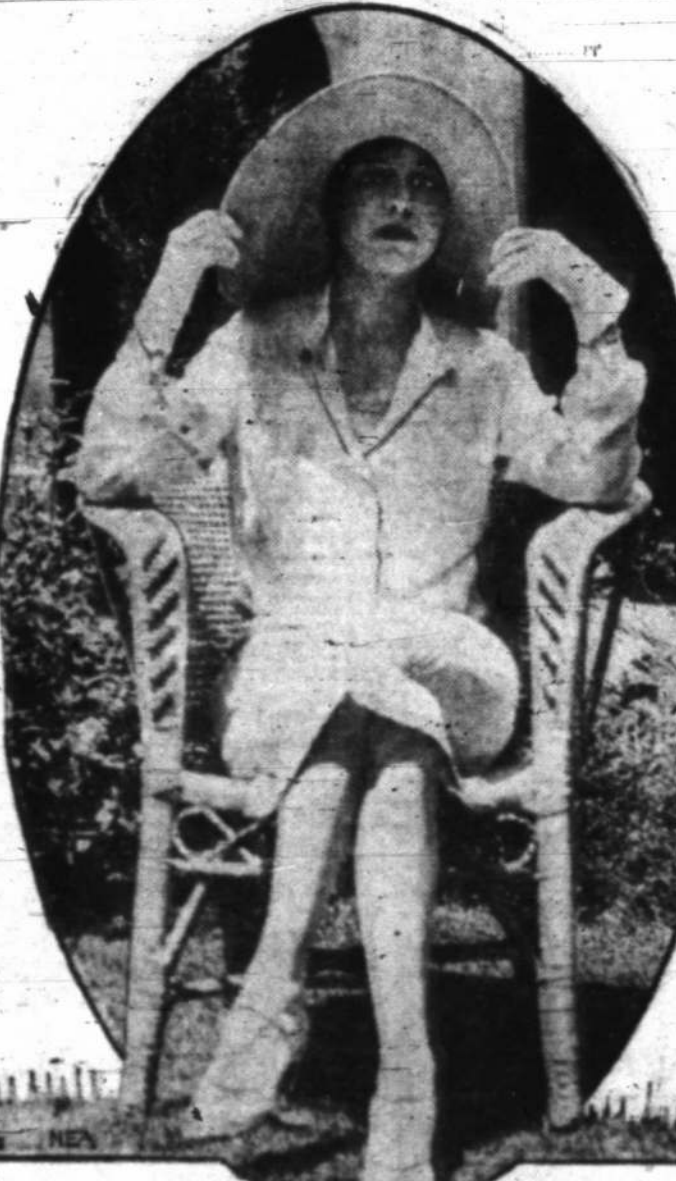

Thomas Hardy, Novelist, Is Dead

Famed English Writer
Passes Away At Home
Near Dorchester, An
English Beauty Spot.

(By Associated Press)
DORCHESTER, England, Jan. 11.—
Thomas Hardy, aged 68, one of Eng-
lish literature, died tonight at his
home here after a month's illness.
The famous 67-year-old novelist had
a chill December 12 and thereafter
his condition was alternately hope-
ful and then critical, but his age
imposed heavy odds against recovery.
Death came at 9 p. m., after op-
timistic reports today.

With Hardy's death one of the
greatest of the Victorian, scenes
of whose novels of English life were
laid in his beloved Wessex, where
he lived most of his eighty-seven
years, passed from the literary
world.

Hardy died in surroundings which,
he, no doubt, would have chosen
for his end. The historic country-
side of his home was to him the
most loved of spots. More than
forty years ago the novelist planned
and built a fine red brick and stone
country house, which has been his
home and sanctuary ever since. It
was in this home that he produced
some of the greatest literature of
modern times.

His estate is in a beautiful un-
dulating countryside about one mile
from the ancient Roman town of
Dorchester.

Given Life Term for Rob-

cence availed him nothing with a

LAREDO, Jan. 11.—Jose Camacho
Ramirez, 30, a soldier of the 43rd
Infantry, stationed at Nuevo
Laredo, surrendered to Chief of
Police Arnulfo de los Santos Wed-
nesday and confessed that he had
killed his wife Manuella, 18, with
a long-bladed knife Tuesday night
because she was "too pretty and too
young." He was mad with jealousy,
he declared.

ROBBERS KILL Woman Dragged by Hair In Mexican Raid

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 11.—(P)—
Margaret Winter, wife of a German
bookkeeper of Mexico City, was
slain, and her 1-year-old baby was
thrown on the floor and trampled
by robbers, when she attempted to
prevent the robbery of her home at
Coyoacan, a few miles south of Mex-
ico City, last night.

Mrs. Winter was nursing the baby
when the robbers broke into the
bedroom. Still holding the baby, she
attempted to seize a pistol on the
night table. In the ensuing struggle
the baby fell on the floor and was
trampled. The mother was dragged
to the street by her hair. There police
found her body, almost behead-
ed.

NO ACTION TAKEN ON BEHALF JUDD GRAY

Hour For Death Had Al-
ready Been Set When
Order from Judge Was
Received at Prison.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Mrs. Ruth
Snyder, whose execution for the
murder of her husband had been
set for tomorrow night was granted
a stay tonight until 10 a. m. Fri-
day by State Supreme Court Justice
Arnold J. Levy. This stay was granted
pending hearing of the suit brought
by the Prudential Life Insurance
Company to avoid payment of \$97,-
000 on the life of her husband,
Albert Snyder.

The application tonight to Su-
preme Court Justice Levy was an
unexpected move on the part of
Mrs. Snyder's attorneys as it had
been announced that a writ of
habeas corpus would be sought in
Federal court.

The application was said to have
been made in behalf of Lorraine
Snyder, who has been made de-
fendant in the insurance suit on the
ground that the execution of her
mother would destroy her defense.
The Queens village housewife was
convicted with her former lover,
Henry Judd Gray, a concert sales-
man, of the murder of her hus-
band, a magazine art editor. Snyder
was found slain in his bed March
20 last. Mrs. Snyder and Gray con-
fessed to the killing a few hours
after Snyder's body was found.

How and Why

REMOVING STAINS MECHANICALLY

Sometimes our hands acquire stains that seem to resist all ordinary methods of removal. Soap and water, oils and creams have no effect at all.

Two cleaners are at our service—mechanical and chemical. Which ever mechanical means is selected, the basic idea is friction. Rubbing with a coarse wash cloth, scrubbing with a stiff brush, scouring with powdered pumice stone, with a paste or soft soap in which sand, pumice or fine ashes has been incorporated and is the essential ingredient, are well known methods of removing the stains and grime caused by way of the ordinary occupation. When sand, pumice or fine ashes are used, we might term the action scouring. It is, of course, very severe, and should never be used by women whose hands are tender.

A small piece of sand paper, such as we find in the manicure sets on the market at present, is a very useful article for removing smaller stains. Use with care.

Hornsby Transfer Strengthens Fire Hot Stove League

Explanation That Trade Was to Preserve Harmony in Club Fails to Satisfy Public.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. (AP)—Instead of satisfying a startled baseball public with the explanation that Rogers Hornsby was traded to the Boston Braves "to avoid any future conflict in the management" of the club and for no other reason, the New York Giants today apparently heaped only fresh coals on the fire of debate.

The brief statement issued by Charles A. Stegeman, president of the Giants, not only was taken with several grains of salt by the assembled experts, but drew from Hornsby a sharp reply in which the famous second baseman disclaimed any controversy with manager John McGraw and denied any attempt last season to undermine the authority of the "Little Napoleon."

Seek Real Reason. While innocent by standers still were a trifle groggy from the shock of the deal which sends the League's highest-salaried star to a seventh-place club, in exchange for two little-known players, the "catcher" Frank Hornsby and outfielder Jimmy Welsh—the experts probed behind the scenes for the "real reason" prompting the transfer.

Most of the observers took one of the two views, either that some mysterious circumstance caused the sudden trade or that it was merely the fore-runner of another big switch in player talent by the Giants. The latter view is strengthened by the existence of a saying in the club which says that for which the club has only rookie talent to fill.

Hint, "Syndicate" Baseball. The suggestion that "syndicate baseball" was involved—in other words, that the Giants had an interest in strengthening the Boston club—was rejected by most observers. J. J. Tierney, secretary of the Giants, characterized this as "ridiculous," pointing to the new Major League rule which prohibits any club owner from having any interest whatsoever in any other team. Nevertheless, newspapermen recalled the long succession of deals between the Braves and Giants over a period of years as well as the fact that former Judge David F. Pichs, president of the Braves, is a resident of New York.

In the absence of Manager McGraw, however, officials of the Giants made it clear that the chief reason for parting with Hornsby was to keep harmony on the club and prevent the possibility of "two managers" trying to run the outfit. Stegeman's statement, though, admitted this, but neither he nor Tierney shed any light on exactly what prompted the prospect of such "conflict" or on what ground McGraw and Hornsby differed.

At forward the Aggies have Red Petty, letterman who plays from Decatur and who has been one of the Aggie mainstays in all the games this season; Davis Stephens, a boy who was one of the quintet last year; and one of the best prospects produced this year, Lockett. Lockhart boy whose speed and flight won him a numeral on the freshman team last year and who is putting in a strong bid for a varsity berth this year. Two More Bouts For Tunney Seen

Rumors In New York Say Gene Is to Battle Winner Sharkey-Heene Go, and Dempsey Again.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—With "absolutely nothing to say," Gene Tunney left New York tonight for a ten day stay in Brunswick, Ga., in the midst of well-substantiated reports that his quarrel with Tex Rickard is over.

In absolute variance with his attitude a week ago, when Gene came north from Florida to attend the "All Champions" banquet of Rickard's "600 millionaires" club, the heavyweight champion would say only that an "important announcement" would be made within a few days. Rickard admitted he had been in contact with the titleholder, Gene said only, "who saw us?"

Unofficially, however, it was made known at Madison-Square Garden that Tunney and the promoter who gave Gene \$1,000,000 to fight Jack Dempsey in Chicago last fall agreed to a summer program calling for two heavyweight title fights under Rickard's direction. The first would pit the winner of the Jack Sharkey-Tom Heene fight against the champion in June and the second would call Dempsey again to the lists for his third match with the big marine here in September.

Rickard declared vaguely that he had not reached an agreement with Tunney but that had an engagement to play golf with Gene in Miami, Fla. sometime after Jan. 18, when the promoter will leave for the Southland. "Johnny" Buckley, manager of Sharkey, who fights Heene here Friday night, announced in Boston yesterday that Rickard wished to discuss with him the possibility of a Sharkey-Tunney match next June.

While the promoter branded such talk as premature today, he declared himself ready to match Heene and the champion for a bout in London next spring.

Calles Assures of Mexican Air Route

Mail Line to Texas Border Promised Houston Good Will Delegation in Meet With President.

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, Jan. 11. (AP)—A telegram from Mexico City yesterday said that "on the eve of their return Houston's good will delegation saw their airplane flight to Mexico City bear fruit when President P. E. Calles, receiving them formally at Chapultepec castle, assured them that a Mexican air mail route will be established to the Texas border. Mexico and the United States joined hands at Chapultepec castle, the historic point stormed nearly four-score years ago by American forces who had invaded the Southern republic, when President Calles told the Houstonians, in a 15-minute interview how pleased he is with the present situation.

Highway Soon "He stated that a good highway will be completed within one year from Laredo to the Port of Avapulo, on the Pacific coast, via Mexico City.

The Houstonians were told Monday by Postmaster General Casimiro Hinojosa that the Matamoros-Brownsville-Houston air mail route is preferred to the Laredo route. The route probably will be via Queretaro, San Luis Potosi, Saltillo, Monterey and to Brownsville, he said.

"It is understood that Chicago, Dallas, Kansas City, San Antonio, Laredo, and other cities are joining in a movement to gain priority for a Central Mexican-American air mail route through Laredo.

Favors 'Feeder' Route "Mr. Hinojosa told the Houston men that the central route, with a feeder from Tampico to Mexico City and another from Tampico to Brownsville would be excellent. His department is negotiating with a Mexican aviation company of which George Rihl is president, for carrying mail via Tampico to the capital.

Applying of Auto Levy Soon Urged

State Highway Engineer Favors Application of 25 Percent Penalty by January 20.

(By Associated Press.) AUSTIN, Jan. 11. (AP)—County officials, charged with the responsibility of seeing that motorists pay their license tax were requested Wednesday by R. A. Thompson, state highway engineer, to begin enforcing not later than Jan. 20, the 25 per cent penalty provided for late registrations.

License and weight inspectors of the highway department, Mr. Thompson said, are being instructed to file complaints against owners of all unregistered automobiles, trucks and other motor vehicles, found on highways after January 20, with the view of enforcing the penalty provision of the registration law.

He quoted a recent opinion of the attorney general that no official or other person has authority to extend the time provided by law for registration of motor vehicles, or to waive any penalty for failure to register.

"County officials should bear in mind," Engineer Thompson said, "that counties will receive a very substantial part of the registration fees, including the penalty," paid approximately 50 per cent, for use in maintaining the county highways and it is therefore of material interest to the counties to see that this law is rigidly enforced."

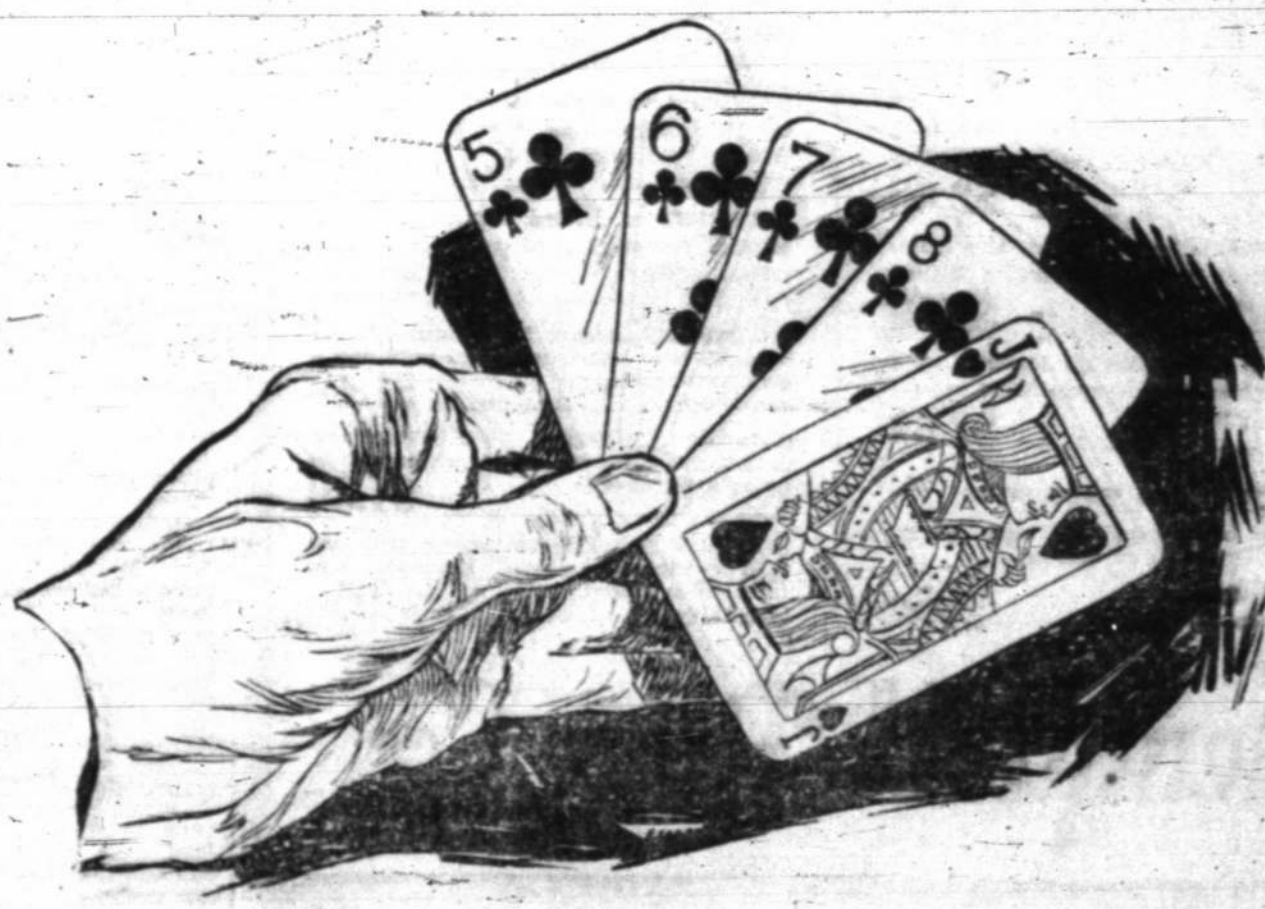

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—The daily average gross crude oil production in the United States decreased 40,700 barrels for the week ended January 7, totalling 2,379,050 barrels, says the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute today. Oklahoma 674,900, decrease 26,350. Kansas 107,300, decrease 350. Panhandle Texas 76,500, decrease 3,750. North Texas 74,650, decrease 350. West Central Texas 56,950, decrease 650. West Texas 258,900, decrease 1,700. East Central Texas 26,650, decrease 150. Southwest Texas 23,800, decrease 600. Arkansas 90,150, decrease 3,200. Coastal Texas 14,850, decrease 2,550. Coastal Louisiana 14,850, decrease 200. Eastern 110,000, decrease 500. Wyoming 57,450, increase 3,000. Montana 11,000, decrease 500. Colorado 6,550, increase 750. New Mexico 2,700, decrease 800. California 624,200, decrease 600. Total 2,379,050, decrease 40,700. Daily average imports of petroleum at principal ports for the month of December totalled 5,896,000 barrels compared with 6,574,000 barrels for the month of November and for the week ended January 7, 1,583,000 barrels compared with 837,000 for the previous week.

NEW PRODUCER

Fourth In Pecos Field On Dividing Line

SAN ANGELO, Jan. 11. (AP)—The fourth oil producer in the bed of the Pecos river on the dividing line of Pecos and Crockett counties and a failure near the river in Western Crockett county were reported here Tuesday. Allman and Bell's No. 5 Pecos river bed, 400 feet north of No. 4, a producer, topped the pay at 65 feet, flowed 200 barrels of half oil and half water hourly, and shut down.

Simmons Oil company No. 1 Henry Half, 150 feet out on the northwest corner of section 68, block 1, T. 10 N. Halfway company survey, in Crockett county, struck sulphur water, marking it a failure, at 128 feet, and shut down after going five feet more. It is one mile southeast of Leon and Wrightman No. 1 Half, a gusher, in the northwest corner of part of section 30.

RECEIVERSHIP ENDS

Securities Necessary to Re-organization Issued

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. (AP)—Receivership over the Chicago, Milwaukee, and St. Paul railroad in effect was terminated today with the issuance of securities necessary to complete a reorganization. The new company, The Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railroad, was given permission to take over the old St. Paul system. It further was empowered to issue 1,174,500 shares of common stock without par value, \$119,845,000 in preferred stock, \$106,355,000 in five percent adjustment mortgage bonds, and \$162,993,000 in five percent adjustment mortgage bonds, all of which securities will be exchanged for obligations of the old St. Paul company, under terms of a plan prepared in the federal courts.

MORE WATER ISSUE

ABILENE, Jan. 11.—At the annual Abilene chamber of commerce banquet held here last evening at the Hilton hotel, Charles W. Borne was named president. E. Truett Comper, first vice-president, Omer E. Radford, second vice-president, and George L. Paxton, Jr., treasurer of the commercial body for 1928. The advisory board, executive board and directorate boards were also named. The task of obtaining a water supply sufficient for 100,000 to 150,000 people and the possibility that Abilene may soon obtain direct rail connection with San Antonio at the port of Corpus Christi were the two main issues impressed on the 250 people who attended the banquet.

Reports from officials of the past year's work of the organization reveal the fact that 1927 had been a useful and successful year for the Abilene chamber of commerce.

BONDS ARE SOLD

CHILDRESS, Jan. 11.—Childress county's bond issue of \$650,000, voted December 31, for the hard surfacing of the county's state highways, were sold Tuesday to C. W. McNear and company of Chicago for par plus accrued interest. Bond buyers stated that the price was the highest paid for similar bonds in Texas for the past ten years. The bonds were sold at public auction and the money will be available upon delivery of the bonds.

WANT NEW HIGHWAY

ABILENE, Jan. 11.—Arguments for the creation of a new highway in this section of West Texas, with state designation, were made here Tuesday by W. H. Ely, state highway commissioner, by delegates from the chambers of commerce of Sweetwater, Winters, and Coleman.

The proposed highway would connect Sweetwater with Coleman via Winters, branching off state highway No. 76 at a point 16 miles

south of Sweetwater and proceed in a southeasterly direction through Nolan, Hyatt, Wingate and other points not now on a state designated road.

Judge Ely told the delegation that J. B. Early, division highway engineer, would look over the project, but that the designation cannot be considered at this time, as the state department is \$4,500,000 short on maintenance fund, as it will lose 23 1-3 per cent of registration to the various counties, and after September 1, it will lose \$4,000,000 on the gasoline tax.

SILVERTON ISSUE

SILVERTON, Jan. 11.—A \$35,000

bond issue to provide a water system for this city passed here Tuesday by a vote of 131 to 5. It was the city's first bond issue and the issue provides for a standpipe and storage tank, to comply with the state fire insurance requirements. City officials met after the bonds carried with engineers to work out a program of activity so that the installation of the system may be complete as soon as possible.

BORGER, Jan. 11.—More smoke will be added to the Borger Rotary club's slogan, "Follow the Smoke of Borger," on January 15, with the opening of the Kosmos Carbon

company plant of seven units.

The plant will convert residue gas from the Borger oil field into carbon black for use in rubber tires, printers' ink, carbon paper and innumerable other articles.

The seven units of this new industry here will have a daily output of one and one-half cars of carbon per day, consuming 20,000,000 cubic feet of gas, and will be sold at 61-2 cents per pound.

GAS IN SUBMARINE

Deadly Percentage of Carbon Dioxide Found

BOSTON, Jan. 11. (AP)—A deadly percentage of carbon dioxide had poisoned the air in the torpedo room of the S-4, before rescuers could convey a supply of oxygen to six men imprisoned in the sunken submarine, the naval court of inquiry investigating the S-4 disaster was informed today. The tests, made at the Boston navy yard, revealed seven per cent of carbon dioxide. "Life could not have existed when the carbon dioxide reached this percentage," Dr. Klotze said.

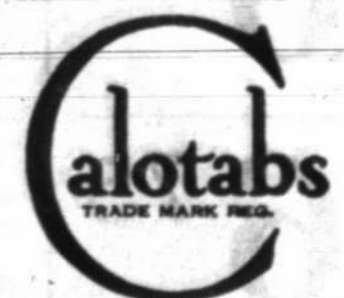

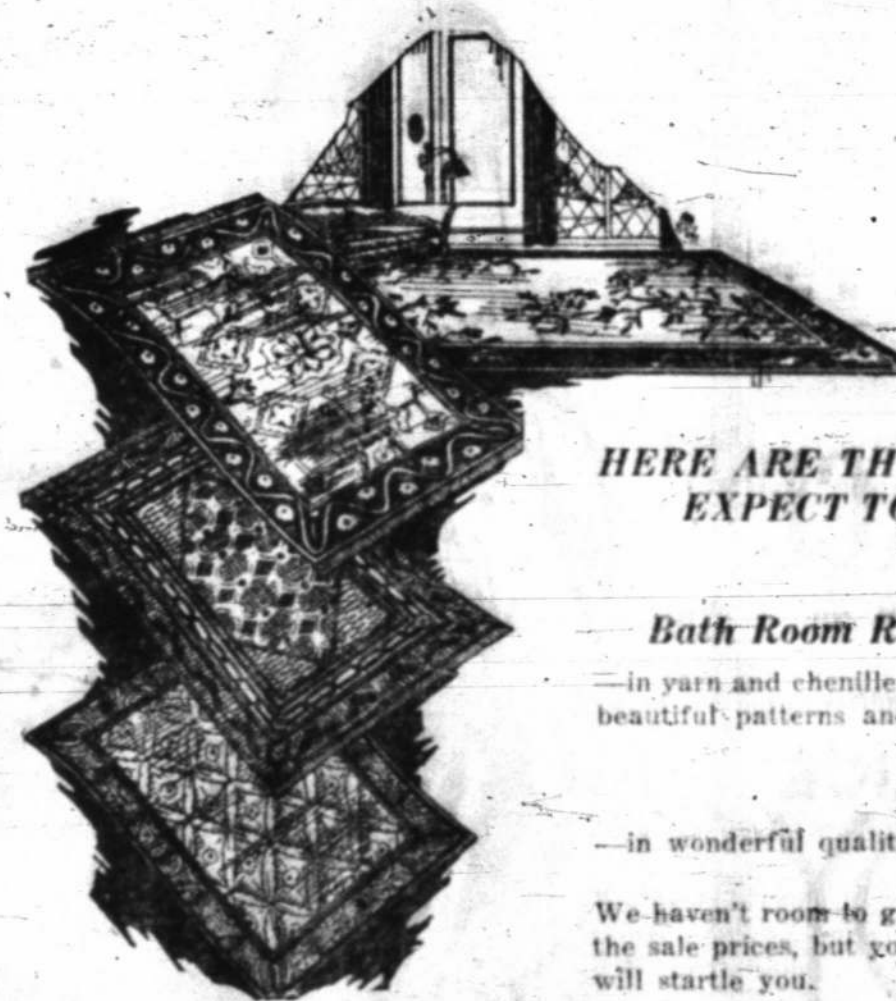

DAIRY OUTLOOK BRIGHT

Good Spring Season Expected at Lockney

(Special To The Avalanche)
LOCKNEY, Jan. 11. — Four hundred and fifty dollars was the amount paid to the farmers in the Lockney trade territory for their cream on January 7, and dealers state that prospects for a good spring dairying season are very bright at this time.

Farmers of this section are stocking heavier with good milk cows and a movement is now on to replace the scrubs with pure-bred animals.

Mr. D. L. Hannifin, agent for the Beatrice Creamery company, stated in a recent talk at Lockney, that the cream and milk produced on the plains of Texas were superior to all others due to the ideal weather conditions suitable to dairying and the lack of insects and pests that hinder the industry.

Cattle Comes Back

In Lockney Region

LOCKNEY, Jan. 11.—The historic "Cattle Baron" is a man of the past on the South Plains of western Texas and his herds have given way to the cotton and wheat farmer in recent years. But with the adoption of a diversified farming program by the farmer of fewer acres cattle feeding is again becoming a very important industry in this section.

Cheap grain sorghums, ideal weather conditions, cotton-oil mills, and a good price for cattle have been the determining factors in the "come back" staged by this industry.

Many of the farmers in this territory have bought and raised beef cattle on smaller scales than the "old timer," but they too are profiting from their enterprises.

More than 600 head of cattle are now being fed at the Lockney Cotton Oil company's feeding pens, near Lockney, by Meriwether and Shurbet, pioneer cattle men of this city.

WATER FIGHT ECHOES

Rice Growers Along Colorado Oppose Permit

AUSTIN, Jan. 11. (AP)—Rice growers along the lower Colorado river, aligned against the Brownwood water district's "fight" for large water developments permits, may support the state board of water engineers in a mandamus suit filed against the board by the district, State Senator A. J. Wirtz, Seguin attorney, said today.

Brownwood seeks to force the granting of permits along the Colorado greater than the board is willing to consider.

Senator Wirtz, although he has been unable to give the matter detailed attention as yet, may file some sort of cross action allying his clients with the board, he said.

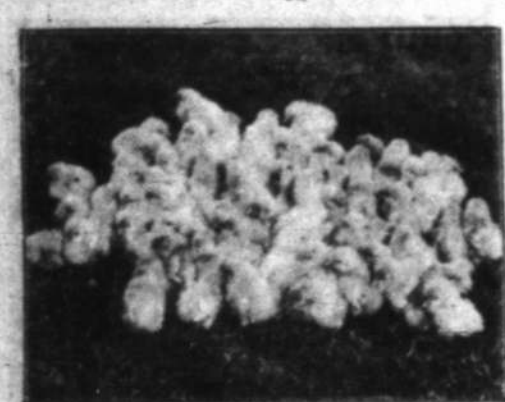

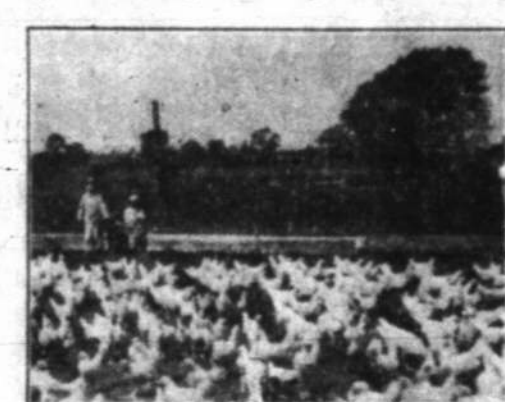
