In State Competition...



WINS MEDAL: The Regional 1A Girls Golf Tournament was held at the Levelland Country Club in Levelland, Texas on April 19 & 20, 1983. Fifty-five golfers representing 13 schools competed for medalist and team honors. The schools representing Region 1A were: Sundown, Rankin, Booker, Iraan, Meadow, Sudan, Follett, Vega, Claude, Happy, Highland, Greenwood, and Wheeler.

In the medalist honors, Wheeler's Mona Jennings carded a 36 hole score of 86-81=167 to win the 1A medalist crown. Cathy Caddell of Sundown posted a 86-89=175 for the second medalist honor. These honors won each a trip to the State Tournament on May 4, 5, & 6 in Austin.

In the team honors, Sundown carded a two day total of 756 to capture the 1A Championship while Rankin, was second with a total score of 769 earning a trip to Austin.

ton; she was unable to attend the All-Sports Banquet Monday evening. Coach Smith is shown here presenting the award Wednesday morning.



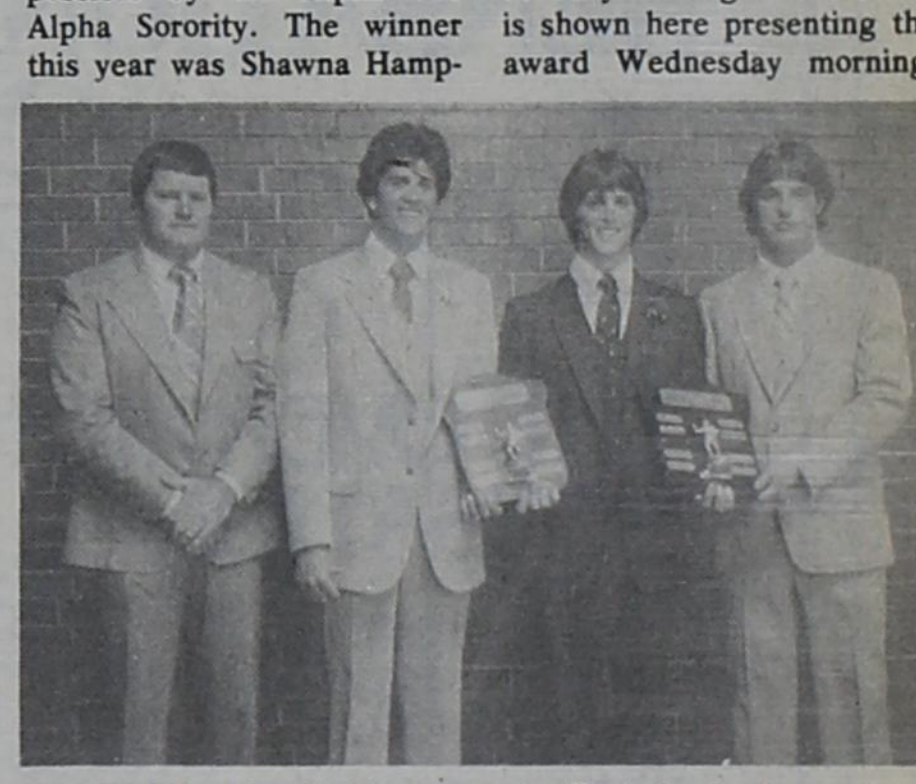

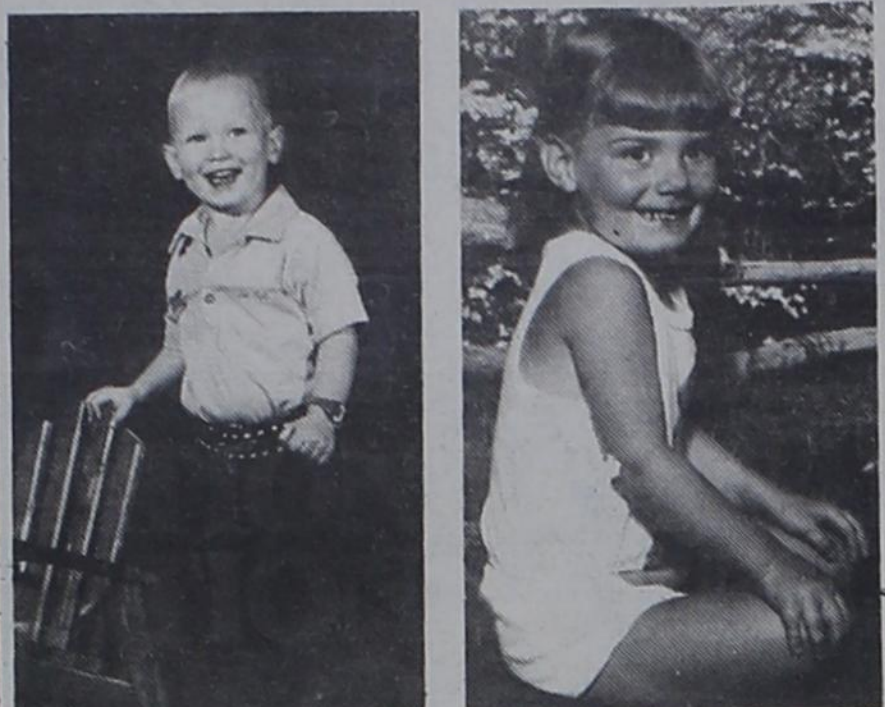

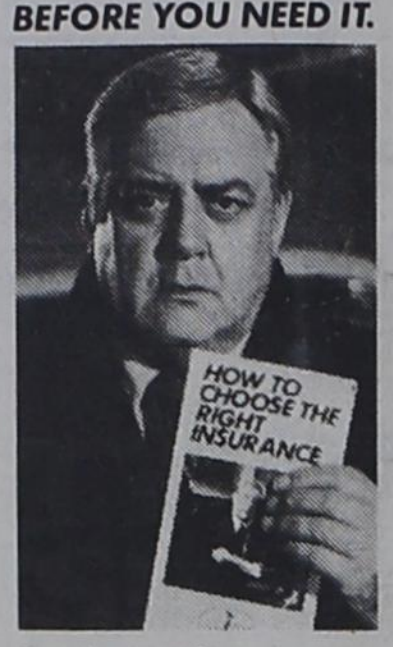

Mrs. Golda McIlhany attended a meeting of the Wednesday Study Club last week.

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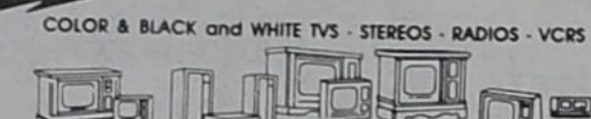
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Senior Citizens

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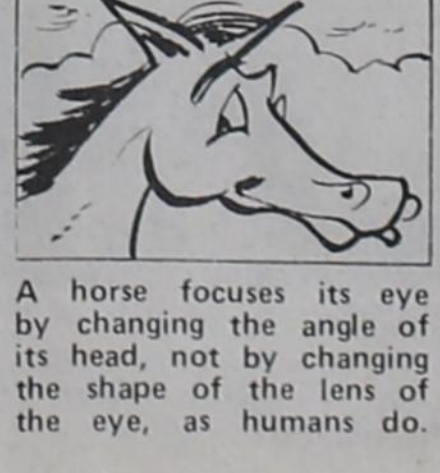
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Sweetwater News

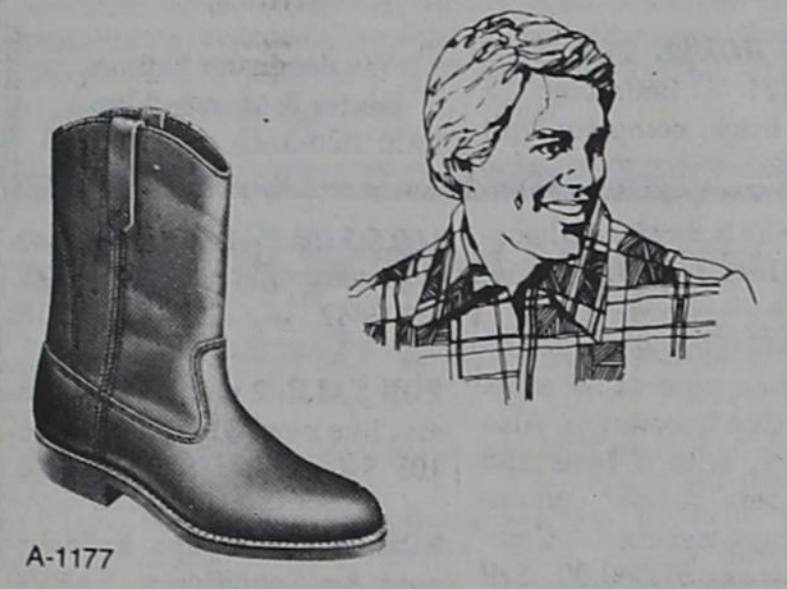

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TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Spider Mites: A Texas Garden's Worst Enemy

Spider mites are a problem in almost every part of Texas. These tiny, usually red mites attack both vegetables and landscape plants. Be on the lookout, for early detection and prompt treatment are your best weapons against them.

Spider mites, often called red spiders, most frequently attack vegetables like beans, corn, eggplants, and tomatoes, and ornamentals like boxwood and roses. They also damage cole crops, cucurbits, and onions. One of their favorite host plants is the marigold. Texans who interplant marigolds in their vegetable gardens may live to regret it, since spider mites often build up on marigolds and

then spread throughout the garden.

Spider mites reproduce very rapidly. They prefer hot, dry weather, and under these conditions can multiply to unbelievable proportions. Mites are generally found on the underside of leaves. On heavily-infested plants, you will see very fine webs, with eggs and immature mites underneath them.

Mite damage first appears as small, white or gray stippling on the leaves. As damage increases, entire leaves become stippled and lose color, and eventually turn yellow and fall off.

Eventually, the plant loses many leaves and dies.

To prevent infestations, inspect your plants weekly for spider mites. Examine the bottoms of leaves, especially on plants with a dull or off color. You can also shake leaves vigorously over a piece of white paper to dislodge and see the mites better.

If you find only a few mites, but see no damage as yet, reexamine the plants every 2 days. You need not immediately resort to miticides, because if beneficial insects are feeding on the mites, or if the weather conditions are not favorable for mite buildup, the mite population may stay below damaging levels and even decrease.

Light infestations can at times be controlled by spraying plants with water from a hose. Be careful not to damage tender foliage, however. If your infestation is confined to a few plants, you can try removing them, while keeping a watchful eye on the adjacent plants left in the garden.

If you have an infestation that is causing damage, you will probably need to use a miticide, like Kelthane. In choosing a pesticide, read the label carefully to ensure you are using the right chemical for your particular plants.

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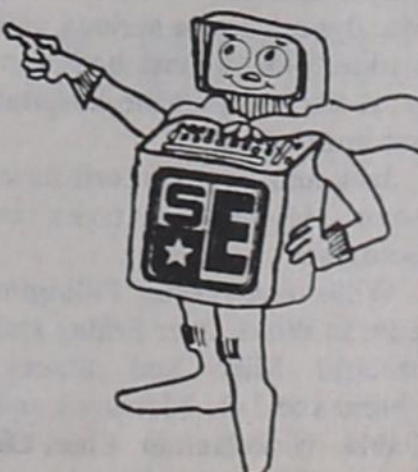

Int. Rates Lowered

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11.0 percent on farm loans and to 11.50 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans effective May 1, 1983, said Talmadge Porter, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Childress.

In addition, the Land Bank has reduced its Bank closed loan fees to 1 percent on farm loans and to 2 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans, according to Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas. These reduced fees are effective April 25, 1983.

"The adjustments follow reductions made earlier this year," Benson said. On January 1, 1983, the Bank's interest rate on farm loans was lowered to 11.25 percent. The interest rate for rural residence and farm-related business loans was lowered to 11.75 percent. Bank closed loan fees subsequently were reduced in February from 4 to 2 percent on farm loans and from 7 to 4 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans. The fee reduction was made possible, Benson said, by the decrease in the Bank's cost of funds.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Childress makes long-term real estate loans in the counties of Hall, Cottle, King, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth and Childress.

1983 Spring Promotion

The fifth annual Spring Philatelic Promotion will take place April 18 through May 14, the U.S. Postal Service announced today.

"Get Carried Away with Philately-Discover Stamp Collecting" is the theme of this year's campaign. It will be promoted with the block of four Ballooning stamps issued March 31, which will serve as the focal point for several materials.

This year's month-long promotion will involve over 19,000 postal facilities nationwide. The principal objective will be to increase the number of young stamp collectors by concentrating on improving public awareness of the hobby and its benefits, such as learning about the people, places and events that have shaped the history of the United States, the Postal Service noted.

"Our research indicates that most of the estimated 22 million collectors in the United States began their hobby between the ages of 8 and 12," said Gordon C. Morison, Assistant Postmaster General for Customer Services.

Typically, it was an interested adult—brother, sister, parent, neighbor, teacher or scout leader—who initially conveyed the excitement and fun of collecting U.S. stamps to the young collector," Morison noted.

Postal Service plans for the 1983 Spring Philatelic Promotion include the use of post office lobby displays and the mail distribution of offers for free philatelic publications in 15 major cities. The publications to be distributed to interested hobbyists are the newest edition of "Introduction to Stamp Collecting" a 32-page beginners guide to the hobby, and the latest "Philatelic Catalog," covering all U.S. stamps and philatelic products available from the U.S. Postal Service via mail order.

Save On Property Taxes

Wheeler County Apprais. Dist. Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser for the Wheeler County Appraisal District, has announced the availability of an eight-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

According to Copeland, "Taxpayers' Right, Remedies, Responsibilities!" explains how the property tax system operates in Texas and highlights possible tax savings available to property owners.

The pamphlet is published by the State Property Tax Board under provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code. The information in "Remedies" applies to property taxes collected by all types of local government, including counties, cities and school districts.

The pamphlet explains in detail the residence homestead exemptions offered by various taxing units, Copeland said, including the amounts of each exemption and what it takes to qualify for and receive them.

For example, all homeowners in a school district are eligible for \$5,000 general

residence homestead exemption. Also, certain disabled taxpayers and those aged 65 or over may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homesteads. "A taxpayer who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year is also entitled to a tax freeze of ceiling on the tax bill from the school district on his home and yard," Copeland added. "This ceiling is established when a taxpayer receives the over-65 school homestead exemption."

The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that homeowners who received the elderly exemption and tax freeze from the school dist. last year need not apply again this year. Only those who became 65 during 1982 and those who have never been granted the exemption and freeze must apply for 1983.

Copeland noted that now any taxing unit may adopt a general "percentage" homestead exemption. Approved by Texas voters as a constitutional amendment in 1981, this exemption can be granted for any percentage up to 40 per-

cent off the appraised value of residence homesteads.

School boards, city councils and county commissioners must take official action for this exemption, after careful review of the taxing unit's needs and taxable property.

Owners of agricultural land which as taxed for 1982 on its productivity value under 1-d-1 open-space provisions do not have to reapply this year. However, applications must be filed by May 2 for landowners who have not previously received productivity valuation.

"More complete information on special land valuation, tax reductions and exemptions is available from the Chief Appraiser as well as in the pamphlet," Copeland said.

She said that the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about the appraisal review board (ARB) which serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet outlines the steps for making a protest to the ARB and suggests ways to prepare and present the appeal.

Another section deals with the process of initiative and referendum by which voters are now able to petition for an election to limit the amount of

tax increase by any taxing unit.

"District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and to make any applications required, in order to get all the tax relief to which

they are entitled. Remember, applications must be filed with the appraisal office by May 2 when the rendition period ends," the chief appraiser said.

Another Version Of The Big Snow Storm

I really enjoyed C.W. Vinsons' write up on the Big Snowstorm April 7th, 1938. The way I remember it was just before our oldest son was born. April 18, but everyone around was expecting me to go to the hospital any minute. We had 2 incubators setting down in a cellar a little way South-west of the house. We had brought around 200 chicks out of the cellar and Colie would go down and then bring out a few more chicks hatched and check things until it got so bad he could not get in the cellar. The wind was blowing a gale, with snow and got colder and colder.

The one that witnessed that big blow act sure can bring back memories reading Clydes write-up.

After Colie could not get back in the cellar, we figured good by chicks, incubators, and canned stuff and cellar. But that was one time almost every egg hatched. They needed moisture and I guess they got it. The snow drifts got higher and higher. We were always wondering how chicks were. We figured the fire might run up too hot or burn up and all the rest of the chickens would die. It was 2 or 3 days that he could not get back in there. We had around 200 already hatched out in an old wagon bed South of the house with lanterns in it. I mean it had really been hot with all the fruit trees bloomed out, and all tree leafed out. Winter onions knee height, Locus tree leafed and blooming.

My mother was here, expecting to be here and help any minute Colie might have to take me to the hospital. We had to bring all those chicks in the house, put them in boxes. All the cheating made you unable to hear yourself think. Our daughter Zetha got hold of a baby chick, and squeezed it to death. She got rid of 3 or 4. My mother tried to make me whip her good. I did not whip children then. The 2nd night George and Claude Parker came over to see how we were. They were about frozen. They had to follow the fence to get here and back home. After they warmed they went back to Mr. Parkers, ½ mile away. They told Colie if I got sick, there was no way he could find his Dad's house, only by following pasture fence. And no reason to come. There was no way anyone could go or come here, for us to stay put. I told George and Claude I would get sick around 4 the next day (joking). Well, next morning around 4:00 I got sick and how. Mrs. Parker had brought us a big arm full of first winter onions and 2 or 3 big pans of homemade light bread buns ready to just let them rise and cook. We ate hot rolls and cow butter, plum jam and I ate several fresh onions that day. Well I started vomiting at 4:00. Mama thought I needed to go to the hospital I was cramping so sick. I kept telling mother it was from the onions and what I ate. I look back now poor mother, chirping chickens (around 200). Me so sick no way to go anywhere or get help in anyway. The wind finally died down, and every-time Colie went to the cellar to bring chicks up to the house. Then he would go get a handfull of canned things to eat. We had hogs buried in snow banks 4 or 5 days. Most all came over the fence as the drifts came up. We could walk over in our horse lot on top of drifts. It blew through the roofs. Colie had to take a shovel up in the loft, throw snow out, and it began to melt and drip on our beds. We set buckets all around. Rolled mattresses up and put them where the water was not coming down. Sheet rock ceilings fell in at some homes, and some drove holes through sheet rock to let water come on through and the ceiling not fall. It was all over and melted by the time our baby came and pretty hot. Our locuses were frozen back that year. The only year since 1934. Br. they have been beat back 3 times with hail. The cows tromped the snow down and packed it

Enough about that 1938 snow storm and chickens.

Oh yes, we were getting up in and we were buring kerosene for heat during that snow storm. We had 2 barrels with water caught in for our drinking water and all. They froze solid. Colie chizzled a little ice along and we melted it to drink. He brought snow in and we had water galore to wash dishes, clothes and bathe in. Real soft water, lathered real good from melted snow. I look back and I don't see how we stood up under so much work. Seems we were so tired at night we slept good at night. After things melted and cleared up, we had a little coop. We put a lantern under a hood, to keep those chicks warm at night. It was so warm in the day we needed very little fire to none. Had to watch the skunks at night. Deliver me from snow storms. Now how did I get on to this write up.

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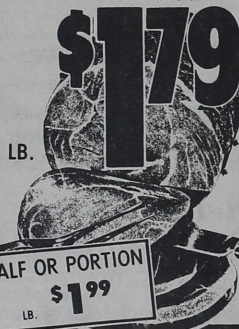
