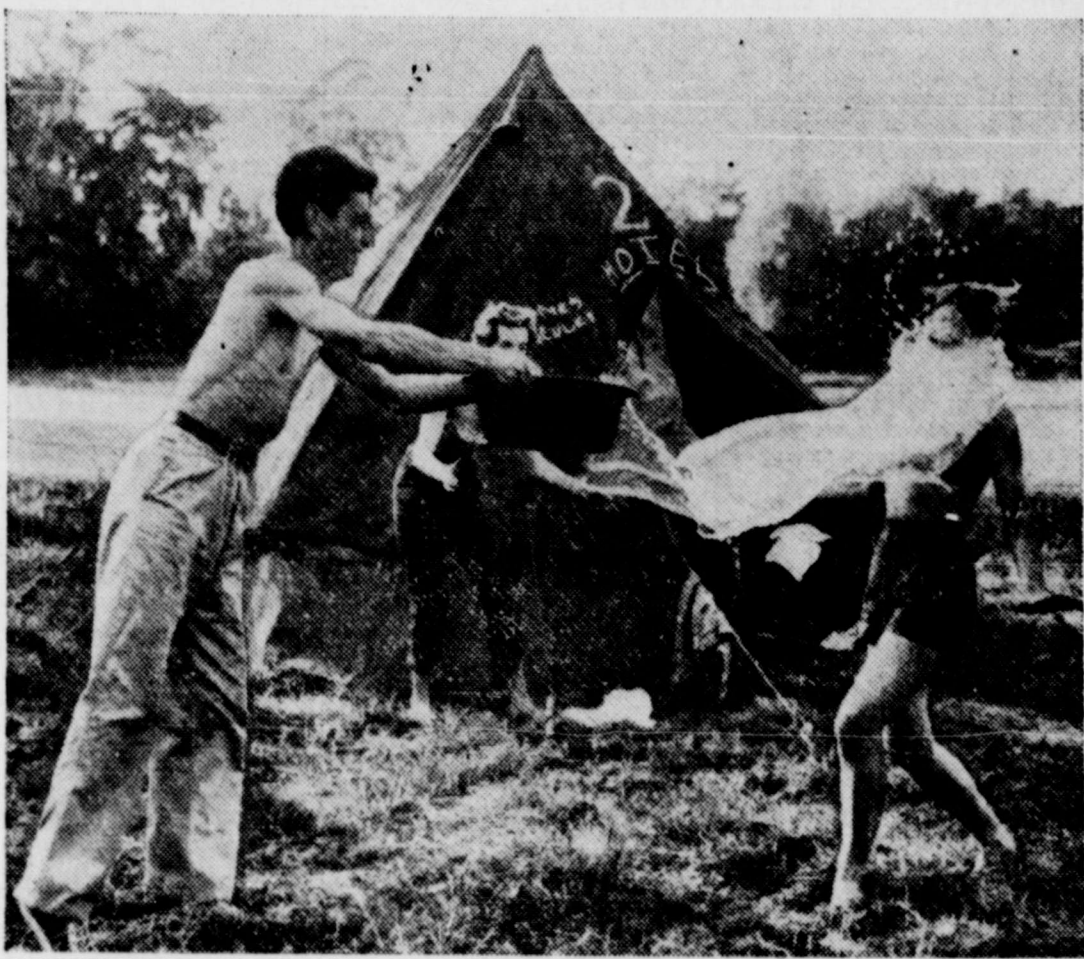

Eastland County Turkey Tour Set For Sept. 29th

The date for the annual turkey tour of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association has been set for Tuesday, Sept. 29, according to an announcement of the occasion by officials of the organization.

Seven turkey flocks totaling over 35,000 birds will be seen during the all-day tour in Eastland and Brown Counties, it was said.

All turkey growers and anyone interested in the progress of the industry in the area are invited to participate. Dr. Ben H. Bradley, Rising Star, president of the organization, advised in his invitation.

The group will leave from Terry's Cafe in Rising Star at 9 o'clock that morning and will visit the J. Elmo Smith, E. E. Winfrey, W. C. Witt, Cecil Carr and Dr. Ben H. Bradley places before lunch at a Rising Star Cafe. During the afternoon they will see the W. B. and Lee Starr flock near Scranton and also the Alvin Kincaid flock north of Cisco.

Both Baby Beef Bronze and Bronze and Beltsville White Turkeys will be seen in the different flocks. Some growers believe that the white turkeys are gaining in popularity.

LARGE DELEGATION OF FANS TO ATTEND OPENING GRID CONTEST

A large group of local fans was expected to go to Eastland tonight to follow the Cisco High School Lobos as they open their 1953 football season against their traditional foes, the Eastland Mavericks.

A giant pep rally was to be held at the high school today and the school building was decorated in the school colors of black and gold. The cheer leaders planned the rally and some of the team members were to make short talks.

BRAZIL MISSIONARIES TO TALK AT WESLEY CHURCH ON SUNDAY

Dr. and Mrs. Daniel Betts, Methodist missionaries to Brazil for the last 34 years and now in the States on furlough, will speak at the morning service at Wesley Methodist Church this Sunday. They are parents of John Nelson Betts who is the special missionary to Brazil supported by the Methodist churches of the Cisco District.

Dr. and Mrs. Betts have had wide and varied experiences in Brazil where he served as pastor, district superintendent, builder of schools including the Passo Fundo Institute which is sponsored by the Methodist students at Texas State University. They were also closely associated with Porto Alegre College known as "Little SMU" because it was sponsored by students at Southern Methodist University.

These visiting missionaries are to be in the Cisco district for two weeks, speaking in as many churches as possible, according to the Rev. Leslie W. Seymour, district superintendent. They will be at Cross Plains tonight, at Scranton Saturday night, at Eastland Sunday night.

Wednesday night of next week they will be at First Church in Cisco for a church dinner occasion. Wednesday morning they will speak to a district-wide meeting in Ranger sponsored by the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Ralph Berry Is Winner Of Texas 4-H Club Contest

Election Due To Be Ordered By Commission Soon

The Lone Star Gas Company has joined the Cisco Gas Corporation in an offer to sell its local gas distributing facilities to the City of Cisco, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal announced today. The Cisco Gas Corporation earlier in the week made a formal sale offer to the city, and the new offer came Thursday.

The two companies have been selling gas to consumers in Cisco for some 15 years.

Mr. Rosenthal explained that some time ago the IbeX Company purchased several Hickok company properties in this area, including the Cisco Gas Corporation, and approached the City on the idea of selling the gas company.

It was decided, he added, that it might be advantageous to both companies, and Mr. Rosenthal wrote the Lone Star company regarding this idea, making an offer for the property. The agreement of the Lone Star Company came in response to Mr. Rosenthal's letter.

Lone Star Gas Company offered to sell its property here for the sum of \$125,000. The City received an offer from the IbeX Company to sell the Cisco Gas Corporation for \$150,000. Purchase of the two companies, if approved by the voters, would necessitate a revenue bond issue of about \$300,000, Mr. Rosenthal said.

The City Commission is expected to meet next week for conferences with Underwood and Company, a Dallas bond firm, and it is expected that an election on the gas question will be ordered at that time, Mr. Rosenthal said. The bond company has been studying the proposition in detail for several weeks.

The agreement of the IbeX Company to sell its facilities here includes a 25-year contract to furnish gas at the city gate, and this phase of the proposition has been turned over to engineers for study, the mayor said.

Chester L. May, vice president of the Lone Star Gas Company wrote the company's offer to sell in a letter to Mr. Rosenthal, in part as follows:

"Lone Star Gas Company hereby accepts the offer of the City of Cisco to purchase the company's present gas distribution system in the City. For clarification purposes, I wish to state that our distribution system begins at the outlet of our measuring and regulating station near the city limits and from that point includes all pipe lines, service lines, meters, valves, fittings, and other appurtenances used in distributing natural gas to the inhabitants of Cisco. It also includes all furniture and fixtures in our local distribution office there and stocks of pipe, meters, and fittings carried in the rear of our office building, but does not include merchandise and gas burning equipment displayed and stocked for sale to gas users in Cisco, nor any automotive equipment."

"We shall expect the City to assume the Company's liability on all contracts for the sale of gas to consumers and in that connection we will deduct from the sale price of \$125,000 the amount of customers' security deposits, plus accrued interest to the date of closing."

"The company's offer contemplates approval of the purchase by the City at the election and the final closing of the sale and purchase not later than Dec. 1, 1953."

AVERAGE TEXAS FAMILY SAVED \$260 THROUGH BUDGET CUTTING

HOUSTON, Sept. 11. — The \$12,700,000,000 cut from the 1954 Truman budget by the recent session of Congress saved Texas families an average of \$260 each in Federal tax liabilities. This was disclosed here today by Dan L. Grant, regional manager of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Mr. Truman's appropriation requests were in fact cut by \$14,100,000,000, Grant said, but explained that \$1,400,000,000 of the reductions applied to the budget for fiscal 1953.

Texas' share of the \$12,700,000,000 bill would have been \$542,270,000, Grant estimated. Statistics worked out by the National Association of Manufacturers show, he said, that the average family's savings varies from a high of \$463 in New York

state to a low of \$118 in Mississippi, according to the percentage of the total Federal tax paid by each state. For each of the nation's 40,000,000 families, the average would be \$314, he added.

"Of course, the people of Texas, like those in other states, were disappointed because we didn't get a tax cut this year," the NAM official emphasized. "Relief was badly needed. Individual and corporate income taxes are higher than the economy can bear indefinitely and remain prosperous, and the excess profits tax is causing trouble for many companies — especially new and small concerns."

"However, the cut in appropriations was a step in the right direction. It cannot be expected to produce a corresponding reduction in Federal expenditures for 1954, because a large part of the rejected appropriations was scheduled for expenditure on aircraft and other 'hard goods' in 1955 or later. But the cuts will result in \$12,700,000,000 less Federal spending in 1954 or later years if none of them is restored."

Recalling that the government collected a record total of \$65,218,000,000 in revenue last fiscal year and at the same time ran up a record peacetime deficit of \$9,389,000,000 Grant said "Texans should be on the alert to see that, in addition to the cuts made in the lame duck Truman budget, non-essential government spending is further reduced."

"Spending in the last fiscal year — especially in view of the present Administration's efforts to economize — shows the extent to which Federal expenditures had got out of control," he added. "Congress must continue to cut spending until a balanced budget is obtained after promised and scheduled tax-cuts are made in 1954. That ought to be the chief objective in the next session."

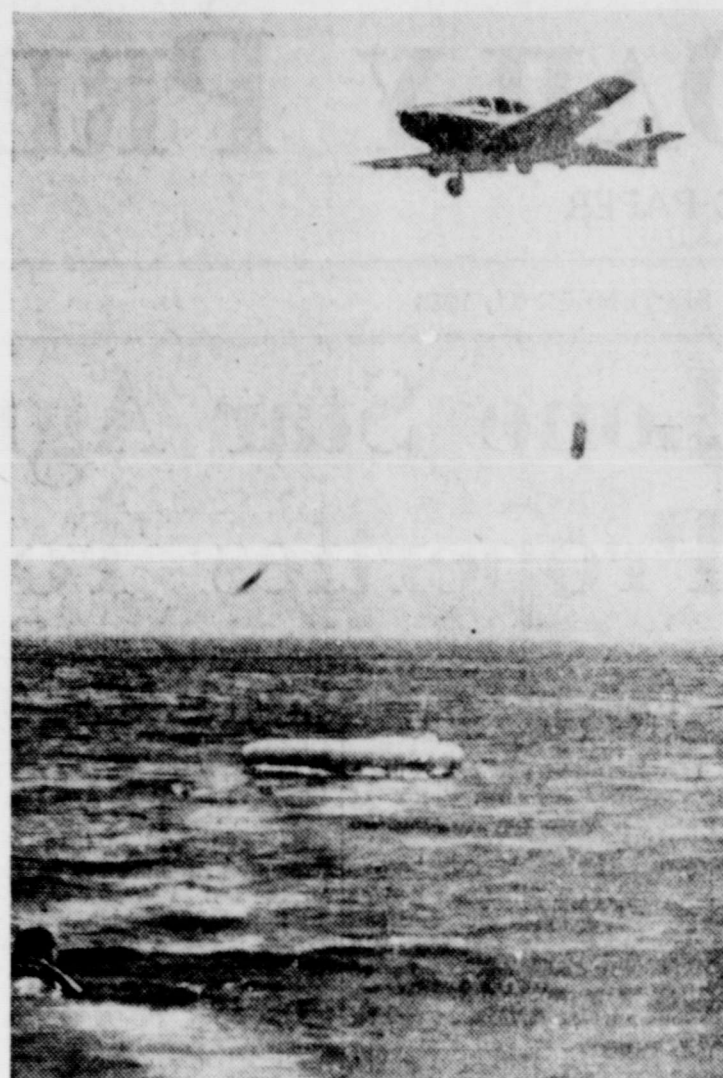

AMERICANISM WEEK PROGRAM IS PLANNED BY CLUB FEDERATION

WORTHAM, Sept. 11. SPL. — Too many G.I.'s don't know what they are fighting for, Mrs. Van Hook Stubbs of Wortham, state president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, explained the why of her organization's 100,000-woman strong observance of Americanism Week.

"We feel that is symptomatic of a country that no longer appreciates what it stands for," the TFWC head explained. That is why 1,200 Texas Clubs belonging to the organization she heads are backing state-wide observance of Americanism Week, September 13-19.

Governor Allan Shivers will join Texas Clubwomen heading the Americanism emphasis on Saturday, September 12, at 1:30 p. m. on a radio broadcast over the Texas Quality network that will initiate Americanism Week.

With Mrs. Newell Waters of Weslaco as chairman, the Texas Federation will sponsor observance of the week with programs and talks, both in their own clubs and before other civic groups. Clubs are asked to enlist ministers in the launching of Americanism Week September 13 from the pulpits.

Faith in God is the foundation from which respect for the rights of the individual and democracy's boundless opportunities for achievement rise, the clubwomen sponsoring the week, point out. Altogether, 6 million American clubwomen are mobilizing to back the week-long stress on a new awareness of America's heritage.

Each local club will sponsor assembly programs in the public

schools and provide speakers to stress the basic tenets of American democracy and acquaint today's children with their heritage. Mrs. Florence Johnson Scott of Rio Grande City, TFWC Americanism chairman, seconded the appeal for participation by clubs. She emphasized "We cannot afford to rest in smug self-assurances while Communism wages an active campaign for the minds of the world's young intellectuals."

Either by school programs, club forums, or civic activities, every federated club in the state will share in the educational program on what America stands for, and its advantages over Communism.

LEGAL NOTICE

An Ordinance Speedzoning U. S. Highway 80 Through The City of Cisco, Prescribing and Defining The Maximum Rate of Speed of Motor Vehicles in Each of Said Zones, Providing a Penalty for the Violation Thereof, and Repealing All Ordinances in Conflict Herewith.

Section 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, that an engineering and traffic investigation for speedzoning U. S. Highway 80 through the City of Cisco having been made, and the report of such investigation having been duly considered by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, the maximum rate of speed of motor vehicles on U. S. Highway 80 through the City of Cisco is hereby fixed and established as follows, to-wit:

From the West City Limit of the City of Cisco to Front Street the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 45 miles per hour.

From Front Street to Avenue I the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 40 miles per hour.

From Avenue I to Avenue C the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 30 miles per hour.

From Avenue C to Beach Street the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 40 miles per hour.

From Beach Street to the East City Limit of the City of Cisco the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 50 miles per hour.

Section 2. Any person violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be punished as provided in Section 9-b of Article 327a of the Penal Code of the State of Texas.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

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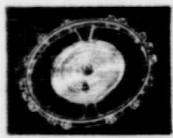

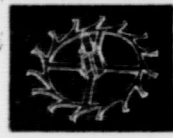

HEALTH TALKS

About the time a baby starts to walk, his parents may wonder whether or not his feet are normal. Of course, an obvious defect present at birth such as club-foot probably will receive early medical attention, but when weight is first borne on the feet in walking and standing, at least minor foot troubles may be suspected.

Many times a mother or father's concern over a baby's toeing in or out or over knock knees or bowlegs is needless. A baby learns to maintain his balance through trial and error and his muscles and bones must gradually be strengthened. In view of this, an observer shouldn't be surprised if the young child uses his feet and legs in what might seem a grotesque manner for awhile. However, many of these seeming peculiarities should disappear as he gains better muscle control.

The doctor caring for the child should be asked about any faulty foot positions which persist for any period of time. The earlier they are corrected, the better, both from the standpoint of ease of correction and the good results to be obtained from treatment. Methods usually include exercises

or prescribing shoe supports designed to correct a specific fault.

The selection of shoes for a young child is all important. Until a baby walks, he really doesn't need a shoe except for cover, a protection against cold. Furthermore, as long as he walks only on smooth surfaces, such as a floor, he needs no more than a soft-soled shoe. Once he begins to play outdoors on cement walks and rough ground, however, shoe soles should be thicker, although not inflexible. High-topped shoes are easier to keep on the smaller child, but for older children low-quarter oxfords are best for constant wear, as they are cooler and afford adequate protection.

Careful attention to the fit of children's shoes can prevent a lot of future trouble. A reliable shoe salesman will be more interested in a correct fit than in the wearability or looks of the shoe. When buying new shoes for their children, parents will find it wise to allow enough time for fitting. The feet should be measured each time because of the rapidity with which they may grow.
