Suspect held, but most of loot missing in hijacking

Searchers fail to find \$500 bundle

The most intriguing angle to the armed holdup of the White Top Liquor Store on FM-651 in north-eastern Garza County Sunday night is that between \$400 and \$500 in cash reported taken in the robbery may be hidden somewhere within a few miles of the liquor store.

Crosby County Sheriff Fletcher Stark, aided by being in the vicinity due to a prisoner exchange and a quick report of the holdup via law enforcement radio, arrested Bobby Jack Kight, 23-year-old Lubbock cook, approximately five miles north of the liquor store within 15 minutes after the crime had been committed.

KIGHT is being held in the county jail here in lieu of \$10,000 bond pending grand jury action on his case. He has been charged with making an assault on Clay Lindsey, liquor store proprietor, and the theft of a case of beer and a sum of money over the value of a few miles of the liquor store.

Lindsey told Deputy Sheriff Bill Gordon that a man entered the liquor store, only a short distance from the Garza County line, between 10 and 10:30 p.m. Sunday night and ordered a case of beer.

When Lindsey turned around to get the beer, he said the man slipped a black stocking over his head as a mask and pulled out a snub-nosed pistol.

The bandit bound Lindsey's hands behind his back with tape, shot twice between Lindsey's legs not hitting Lindsey but breaking a jug of wine on the floor, Lindsey said.

LINDSEY SAID the man took his billfold, the case of beer, an estimated \$400 to \$500 cash, and a

cigar box containing \$12 Lindsey had left on the counter to use as change in opening the store the next day.

Lindsey broke his tape bonds, after the bandit drove away, and got to the nearest phone and called the sheriff's office here reporting the holdup and giving a description of the vehicle the man drove away from the liquor store.

The radio dispatcher radioed a report of the holdup to Deputy Gordon who was just starting to

return to Post from picking up a prisoner from Crosby County Sheriff Stark at a rendezvous point at the intersection of Farm Road 40 and FM 122.

Gordon immediately radioed the holdup report to Stark who was on his way back to Crosbyton. Stark cut across country and stopped Kight in a 1955 Ford panel truck on FM 651 four or five miles north of the liquor store within 15 minutes after the holdup had been reported.

A CASE OF beer, a black stocking, a roll of tape, a cigar box with \$12 and Lindsey's billfold containing some checks were recovered from Kight and the vehicle.

But there was no \$400 to \$500 in cash, as reported stolen in the robbery nor a snub-nosed pistol found. Monday morning a group of law enforcement officers and volunteers "walked" all over the countryside in the vicinity of the liquor store and nearby roads without turning up the missing money.

\$1,712,000 in government checks

'M Day' for farmers expected next week

"M Day" for Garza County farmers could come next week.

That's the day local mail carriers and rural carriers will deliver checks totaling over \$1,712,000 to Garza farmers from the ASC office here.

You guessed it—"M Day" means "Mail Day."

The record payout in federal funds is for price support payments for acres grown and payments for grain sorghum programs.

Mrs. Inez Hartel, manager of the ASC office, told The Dispatch this week that she hopes that all the checks will be placed in the mail

the same day. She predicted the day will come during the period beginning next Thursday, Sept. 15, through Tuesday, Sept. 20.

Mrs. Hartel explained that the heavy recent rains have delayed completing the necessary field work of checking out all acreages in the two programs.

She reported that no discrepancies have been reported, so the payout should slightly top the \$1,712,000 figure.

The \$1,712,000 payout of federal funds is \$1,463,800 more than the \$248,394 paid Garza farmers in federal funds in the two programs

a year ago. The big difference is in the diversion of cotton acreage. Garza farmers this year diverted 13,000 cotton acres and only planted 25,000 acres of the 38,000 allotted.

The cotton diversion program is an effort to reduce the huge cotton surplus. The government payments for non-planting of wheat virtually wiped out a huge and long standing wheat surplus.

All persons connected with the county's economic picture are looking forward to M Day when the area will get its biggest shot in the arm from Uncle Sam in farm program history.

Tax rate stays at \$1.50 level

City okays proposed budget of \$460,198

The Post city council Monday night adopted a proposed budget of \$460,198.33 for 1966-67 after setting the tax rate at \$1.50 per \$100 property valuation.

The council also set Sept. 19, at 2 p.m., as the date of a public hearing on the proposed budget, a copy of which may be examined at the city clerk's office between now and the public hearing.

The proposed budget for the new fiscal year is nearly \$2,700 less than the 1965-66 budget of \$462,859.91.

The new budget anticipates an

increase of \$332.05 in ad valorem taxes, from \$87,192.95 to \$87,525. An increase of \$14,993.01 — from \$234,857.99 to \$249,850 — is anticipated in other receipts.

Total receipts in the new budget are anticipated at \$341,375 as compared with total receipts of \$323,357.91 in the 1965-66 budget.

The new budget shows a beginning balance of \$118,823.53 for 1966-67 as compared with a beginning balance of \$137,502 for 1965-66.

Total city expenditures are figured at \$334,852.05 in the new budget, a decrease of more than \$9-

000 from 1965-66 expenditures of \$344,036.08.

An ending balance of \$125,346.78 is anticipated for 1966-67, nearly \$7,000 more than the 1965-66 ending balance of \$118,823.53.

The general fund receipts for the new budget are figured at \$176,840 and water and sewer fund receipts at \$191,980. In the 1965-66 budget, general fund receipts were \$154,271.16 and water and sewer fund receipts \$189,449.34.

General fund expenditures in the new budget are tabbed at \$174,657.20 as compared with general fund expenditures of \$168,178.45 last year. The new budget figures water and sewer fund expenditures at \$135,245.35 as compared with total expenditures of \$141,888.40 in 1965-66.

Special permit clause

City votes to amend oil drilling ordinance

The Post city council Monday night voted to amend the city drilling ordinance to make it possible for application to be made for a special drilling permit before the first well on a drilling block is completed and on production, as required by the present ordinance.

In other action at its regular September meeting, the council also:

—Approved the current ad valorem tax rolls, levied the tax rate and tentatively adopted a city budget for 1966-67.

—Heard a discussion of the 1965-66 audit and reading of the 1966-67 budget by A. A. Davis, auditor.

—Voted to extend two sewer lines.

—Heard the police department's monthly report.

—Approved current bills.

The city council's action in adopting the new budget and the police department are covered in separate news stories in today's Dispatch.

Library hours due extension

Beginning next week, open hours of the Post Public Library will be extended an additional six hours to make the library open 28 hours weekly.

The new hours will be from 4 to 1 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays. These hours were selected for the convenience of school students.

With the addition of three more library volunteers to handle the two new shifts, the library now has 21 volunteer workers handling the library's operation.

Approval of the additional hours was given by the library board Tuesday night.

The council's action in voting to amend the drilling ordinance came after E. R. (Buster) Moreland, manager of Brown Bros., Et Al, told them that under the ordinance's provisions too much time is involved before a rig can be moved from a completed well to a new location when a special permit is required.

Moreland explained to the council that it sometimes takes several weeks to put a well on production after the drilling is completed and that rig time must be paid if the rig is tied up waiting to move to a new location.

The amended ordinance will provide that a special drilling permit may be applied for while drilling is still under way on the first well or after drilling is completed.

Under the ordinance, it is not

10th in current campaign

Drill application filed by oil firm

Brown Brothers, Et Al, yesterday filed application with the city to drill its 10th well in and around Post in its current drilling campaign launched with a new Glorieta discovery last fall.

The oil firm has completed seven wells and all but the discovery well are dual producers — that is producing from two different pay zones at the same time. Two others now are being drilled.

The new test will be the F. B. Robinson No. 60 and will be located just east of the Post Stampede rodeo grounds and north of US-84.

Fire extinguishers stolen from buses

Fire extinguishers and first aid kits were stolen from seven Post school buses just before a school started. Supt. William F. Shiver reported to police last Friday.

Shiver said the fire extinguishers had just been repaired at a cost of \$195 and replaced in the buses a few days before they were stolen.

The superintendent estimated the total loss at \$600, which he said it will cost to replace the fire extinguishers and first aid kits with new ones.

The local schools do not have a bus barn, but park the buses on the campus just south of the school cafeteria.

Police Chief Leidon P. Miller said schools at Pecos and Meadow had also reported the theft of fire extinguishers and first aid kits from school buses.

Burglaries solved by Garza arrest

The arrest of Michael Lynn Bilbrey, 17-year-old Lubbock youth, with a stolen motorcycle south of Post Friday on US-84 by state highway patrolman and Deputy Sheriff Bill Gordon has led to the solving of two recent Lubbock drug store burglaries.

Taken before Justice of the Peace D. C. Roberts here who set a \$1,800 bond, Bilbrey was released to Lubbock officers.

He later confessed to the burglaries of the Raff-Hall Drug Store burglary and that of the Rose Drug store, both in Lubbock. He led officers to garage where he had stashed four boxes of loot from the two stores.

Edward Lee Cook, another 17-year-old Lubbock youth, also was charged with Bilbrey in the two drug store burglaries.

Bilbrey also was charged with the theft from a Lubbock man of the motorcycle on which he was arrested.

Mrs. Ruth Holland, 64, who was found beaten to death Wednesday in the trunk of her car parked at El Paso's International Airport, was a sister of Tom S. Gates of 112 South Ave. N.

Mr. Gates, who is an employee of the State Highway Department, left for El Paso early this morning, accompanied by his son-in-law, Joe Bob Bumpass of Lubbock.

Mrs. Holland was the widow of the late Riley Allison, wealthy racing enthusiast who headed the corporation that built Sunland race track just north of El Paso. Since his death, Mrs. Holland has been married and divorced.

A search had been under way for Mrs. Holland since early Wednesday when her maid had found the house ransacked and discovered pools of blood in the guest bedroom and in the hall. Mrs. Holland lived at Fabens, which is near El Paso.

Two police sergeants found Mrs. Holland's body in her gold 1966 Cadillac parked in the airport parking lot.

Mrs. Holland had spent a week here about a year ago visiting her brother and Mrs. Gates. She is also survived by two sisters.

Enrollment up from last year

Enrollment in the Post schools this year has taken a 36 student jump over second week enrollment figures of 1965. Supt. Bill Shiver reported today.

The enrollment in Post schools Tuesday totaled 1,308 students, as compared to only 1,272 students in the second week a year ago.

First-day enrollment last Thursday was 1,250, which was the exact figure Supt. William F. Shiver had predicted a few days earlier. Shiver said the increase of 36 over the weekend was larger than he had expected.

The first two days of school were held last Thursday and Friday with students returning for the third day Tuesday following Monday's Labor Day holiday.

Of the 1,308 total Tuesday, 321 were enrolled in high school, 348 in junior high and 639 in the elementary grades — first through fifth.

The enrollment by grades: 1st, 120; 2nd, 141; 3rd, 125; 4th, 125; 5th, 128; 6th, 131; 7th, 119; 8th, 96; 9th, 133; 10th, 73; 11th, 53; 12th, 62.

Lake depth now at 46.7 feet

The new White River Lake has gained another two and one-half feet in depth since the last issue of The Dispatch and now stands at 46.7 feet at the dam.

Twelve more feet in depth will bring the lake to its normal capacity and start water flowing into the "morning glory" or concrete spillway in-take in front of the dam.

But the last 12 feet of depth will account for half of the lake's volume of 35,500 acre feet of water. The lake is now approximately half full.

White River dammen, held their September meeting at the lake last Thursday night and voted to issue boating permits for putting boats on the lake.

A daily boating permit will cost \$1. A boating permit for the remainder of 1966 will cost \$10 and an annual boating permit for 1967 and thereafter will cost \$20.

Some 40 boating permits were issued Sunday as boaters and water skiers took to the water for the start of the big Labor Day weekend.

Should be an interesting evening

Barring inclement weather — and the way things have been going, who can tell?—Antelope Stadium will be the most crowded place in town Friday night when the Post Antelopes and Hale Center Owls pry the lid off the 1966 football season.

The halftime ceremony is a big part of any gridiron contest and the opportunity of seeing two fine high school bands perform along with a football game between two top-notch Class AA contenders all adds up to an interesting evening. How not to get rid of mosquitoes

"Regardless of how much spraying the City does, we're going to have mosquitoes in abundance as long as we have weed-choked yards and vacant lots."

Those are the words of Mayor Harold Lucas in answer to numerous complaints that the City is not spraying enough to eradicate the mosquitoes.

As long as mosquitoes can find weeds and trash to harbor in, they can't be completely killed out even by continuous spraying.

The mayor says that the city's spraying program against mosquitoes could be nearly 100 percent effective if all the weeds were cut and the vacant lots cleaned up.

"It's just a case of the people having to help us in getting rid of the mosquitoes, but far too few of them have been doing so," the mayor said.

Most of the complaints about mosquitoes come from people with well-kept yards, but if some of these people will look around them, they'll see yards not as well-kept and vacant lots that are literally choked with weeds following the recent heavy rains.

"It's a real problem," Mayor Lucas told this newspaper Monday morning, adding that the City Council planned to do something about it at Monday night's council meeting.—CD

Attend Friday's water hearing

The Water Committee of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., has announced that it will "carry the ball" for the High Plains at the hearing to be held in Lubbock this Friday by the Texas Water Development Board.

But PCG also says it will need "full stands" to add weight to its testimony on behalf of the High Plains.

The hearing, which is to be held at 9 a.m. in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium, is the last of a series being held by the Texas Water Development Board in connection with its "Water for Texas" plan.

Every Garza County citizen able to attend the hearing should be there and lend his support in behalf of the High Plains' water problems.

While stating flatly that the High Plains' need for water is among the most critical in the

state, the water board's plan makes no provision for the High Plains to share in the state's surplus surface water.

The current plan calls for sending water from the Sulphur River basin in northeast Texas through a 980-mile canal to South Texas—enough to supplement their current irrigation and irrigate 834,000 acres of land never before in cultivation. It would build a new economy in South Texas on new irrigation, leaving West Texas, already under irrigation, high and dry.

The PCG points out that the plan CAN be changed, but that it will take lots of people to change it. That's what hearings are for—to hear from people.

Farmers, ginners, businessmen—all who possibly can—should fill the auditorium at Friday's hearing, overflow it and fill the parking lot!—CD

"WHAT ARE YOU doing working on Labor Day?" someone standing on the sidewalk asked as I got out of the car and started into the office. As usual, I was inside the office before I thought of a good answer to the idler's question, and since it took me so long to think of it I'll just keep it to myself.

It looks good this Labor Day to see the flags flying in front of the business places and the sun shining — for a change.

THE MAN UP the street says some people's idea of progress is to improve everything but themselves.

Eleanor Cooke has brought us a copy of "What Is a Farmer?" which had come into the possession of her late husband, Attorney A. C. Cooke. The definition, which was authored by radio station KMA, Shenandoah, Ia., follows:

"A farmer is a paradox — he is an overall executive with his home his office; a scientist using fertilizer attachments; a purchasing officer in an old straw hat; a personnel director with grease under his fingernails; a dietitian with a passion for alfalfa, amino acids and antibiotics; a production expert with a surplus, and a manager battling a price-cost squeeze."

"He manages more capital than most of the businessmen in town. He likes sunshine, good food, State Fairs, dinner at noon, auctions, his neighbors, his shirt collar unbuttoned and, above all, good soaking rains when they're needed. He is not much for droughts, ditches, throughways, experts, the eight-hour day, weeds, grasshoppers or helping with the housework."

"Farmers are found in fields—plowing up, seeding down, rotating from, planting to, fertilizing with. Wives help them, little boys follow them, the Agriculture Department confuses them, city relatives visit them, salesmen detain them and wait for them, weather can delay them, but it takes Heaven to stop them."

"A farmer is both Faith and Fatalist — he must have faith to continually meet the challenges of his capacities amid an ever-present possibility that an act of God (a late spring, an early frost, tornado, flood, drought) can bring his business to a standstill. You can reduce his acreage but you can't restrain his ambition."

"Might as well put up with him — he is your friend, your competitor, your customer, your source of food, fiber, and self-reliant young citizens to help replenish your cities. He is your countryman — a denim-dressed, business-wise, fast-growing statesman of stature. And when he comes in at noon, having spent the energy of his hopes and dreams, he can be recharged anew with the magic words: 'The market's up.'"

(The author could well have mentioned the fact that the first job ever held on this earth was that of a farmer, because farming was man's first vocation for thousands of years after the creation of the human race.)

I'VE ALSO been handed an official-looking paper with the heading "Government Poverty Application." Form No. 7908 - 371 - 30 - MC - 495 - LBJ. It's addressed simply "Dear Citizen" and says:

"This form is being provided for your use if you have reason to feel you can qualify for a government poverty grant. May we ask that you carefully study the important questions on this sheet and answer them to the best of your ability. If it can be determined that you qualify as a poor person, a government representative will call on you to determine how much money you need."

The form asked five questions: Do you eat as well as some of your neighbors? Do you know of other people who have more than you? Do you need more money to spend?

Do you find it difficult to pay your monthly bills? Do you know of any reason why you should not be able to qualify for a poverty grant?

And then there's the proper instruction: "Please sign or place your 'X' in the space below."

In case there's confusion in filling out the form, it lists the proper answers: "No" to the first and last and "Yes" to the other three.

There is an incentive offer, too: "Do you know of three friends whom you think can qualify for a poverty grant? If so, please send their names and when these people qualify, we will send you another \$1,000 poverty bonus."

The fellow who handed the form to me didn't say whether it was official or a joke. I'm not sure.

Five-day week now in effect for State Highway Patrol personnel

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety announced today that all of its uniformed patrol personnel are going on a five-day week, effective immediately, in an effort to attract and retain adequate personnel, thus providing better law enforcement coverage and service over the state.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director, announced at the same time that there are some 125 vacancies in the patrol services, including Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection and Driver Licensing.

"Applications for these career positions are now being accepted, with an Oct. 17 deadline for the next statewide examination on Oct. 22," Garrison said. "The next training school will begin Jan. 3."

"The five-day week will apply during the training period also, and the training period has been extended from 16 to 18 weeks to cover the shorter school week."

Garrison said cadets at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin will receive \$400 per month while in training, and will be off Saturdays and Sundays. Upon graduation, they will be assigned to the field with salaries ranging from \$468 to \$484, depending on branch of service.

Q. Children of a deceased veteran may have some pension rights — do they forfeit these rights when their mother (the veteran's widow) remarries?

A. Eligible children of a deceased veteran retain their pension rights after their mother remarries until they become 18, or 21 if they are going to school.

Q. Under the terms of the GI loan benefit, can a veteran mortgage his present home to obtain money for other expenses?

A. Only for home improvement. GI Loans are not available to pay doctor bills, buy furniture, etc.

A. Yes. The law provides compensation for injuries incurred in line of duty by reservists during a drill or other period of authorized inactive duty training. Application should be filed with the nearest VA Regional Office, and should be accompanied by an official statement from the Unit Commander showing the date, circumstances, nature and line of duty status of the injury.

Weevil control program starts

The third year of the diapause boll weevil control program got under way in Garza and a few counties Monday with 18 aircraft spraying some 180,000 acres of cotton land.

Two planes are spraying in Garza County and were due in the Justiceburg area today after spraying at Kalgary and Grassbur on Monday. Canyon Valley and Verbena on Tuesday and in the Post area Wednesday.

The spray planes will resume operations Monday, following the same pattern as the first week. There are seven separate spray areas in Garza County.

County Agent Syd Conner said the planes are working off landing strips at Kalgary and between the Canyon Valley and Grassbur communities.

The first two applications will be at seven-day intervals and the other applications at intervals of from 10 to 14 days.

Approximately 1,500 acres in Garza County are being sprayed, the county agent said.

Texas mule deer killed in Kansas traffic after roaming from home

AUSTIN — A fine Texas buck deer, possibly doing a wrong-way-Corrigan got all the way to Kansas before it was killed in a traffic crash, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department was notified.

Lengthy time as well as great distance were key factors in documenting the vain search for the happy mule deer roaming grounds.

In March of 1965, the deer was trapped in the Trans-Pecos and trucked 600 miles straight northward to the Texas Panhandle for release in the Canadian River Restoration Area in northwestern Roberts County.

Came fall, and the touring season for romantic bucks, and Master Muley, stylishly dressed in ear tag

No. W-11556, packed up and left his new home. He apparently cut across the northwestern nub of Oklahoma and hustled on northeast into Kansas.

There, confused by the quickening pace of everyday life he tragically encountered a motor vehicle. But that mysterious Texas tag in McPherson County, Kansas, made him more than just a statistic.

At first, it was thought somebody had shot the deer in the Texas Panhandle and carted it back into Kansas as a macabre joke. But a Kansas Game protector noted that the animal was still warm, implying that life definitely existed at or near the scene.

Ordinarily, deer in their natural habitat travel only a very few miles. And ordinarily in the fall of the year a buck deer is usually cavorting romantically in the wake of a cantering doe deer.

Whether Mr. Buck got turned around trying to return to West Texas wide open spaces or was frantically courting a female deer is something locked forever in the mule deer happy hunting grounds.

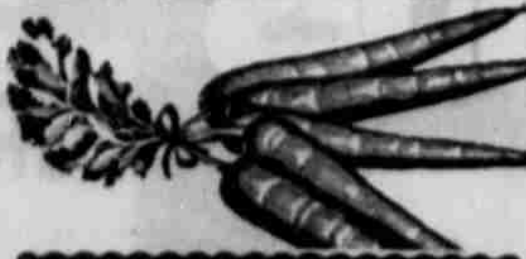
