Re-numbering of houses in Big Spring, started today by the city manager, was certainly very difficult. Finding houses by the best known number has been very difficult. Many streets had duplications, houses in two blocks being numbers alike. Many other irregularities existed. This condition was caused by the rapid growth of the residential districts. It is an experience similar to that of several other growing communities of West Texas, one of which had to change the names of more than fifty streets at one whack to eliminate duplications and to prevent different sections of one street being called by different names.

A sample of this confusion is afforded by these addresses, taken from The Herald subscription records. All are in Jones Valley. They are 110 West Second street, 909 Jones Valley, 43 West Fourth street, House No. 27 Jones Valley.

Now, 43 West Fourth street could also be located in the first block west of Main on Fourth street. 110 West Second could be in the first block west of Main on Second. Vagueness of 909 Jones Valley, when Jones Valley is a section of town and not the name of a street, is obvious.

Here's another sample, "Next to Mr. Blank's across the road from Wamba Coffee Sign." Its been tough on the route boys, as well as a lot of other people.

The boys in the southwest part of the county, and in northern Glasscock are yelling for help in combating coyotes which are growing in numbers and are preying on sheep and goats.

You could hardly imagine rain falling at a more opportune time than that of the past two days. It soaked in and should have fixed practically every tilled acre in this and neighboring counties so that farmers who had not planted may do so, and those who had may benefit very much.

Although much of the land is reported yet unplanted, scattered patches of feed and a little cotton are reported already up.

Guests introduced were R. T. Piner, Prof. W. C. Blankenship, and Judge Brooks.

POLITICAL SITUATION CONFUSED

Announcement Of Houston Capitalist Surprise

AUSTIN, May 30. (AP)—Although declaring he "would not like to run against his friend," R. S. Sterling of Houston, Governor Moody in a telegram from Tergue, where he has a speaking engagement today, still left his attitude toward his candidacy for a third term in doubt.

Surprise

Announcement of Sterling, chairman of the state highway commission under appointment of Governor Moody, came as a surprise to capital followers of Texas politics. It had been taken for granted that Sterling, close to the Moody administration throughout and one of the governor's strongest partisans four years ago when he defeated Mr. Miriam A. Ferguson, Texas first woman governor, had no intention of aspiring to the apogee.

While the governor had not made his position clear, it was believed here he would not oppose Sterling.

"It had been my plan to announce for governor in Sunday's papers and file with the executive committee Monday for a place on the ticket," his telegram, addressed to the capital correspondents, said. "I had stated to friends that I intended to announce my candidacy. I had a number of speaking engagements, and I had been invited to make these speeches as governor of Texas. This caused me to feel that I should not announce until I had filled the last of these engagements tonight at Lancaster because I had been invited as governor and was expected to appear as governor and I did not want to appear in the character of a candidate."

"In addition to this, I did not prefer long campaigns and did not intend to publicly announce as a candidate until the time for filing on the ticket. Mr. Sterling has been a staunch political friend of mine and I would not like to run against him. My concern is to see a continuation of present well ordered, efficient and honest administration of the state government."

He reiterated his opposition to former Governor James E. Ferguson and former United States Senator Earl B. Mayfield.

Fred Olmstead, who is claimed by Ponca City as one of its leading figures, but who is about as familiar a figure in Big Spring as there, need not worry about his funeral expenses, whenever he passes across the Great Divide.

Fred was reported in the Ponca City press to have asked that the guarantee be written so that he might have it flashed on the morticians whenever it is needed. Apparently figuring that day will be so far in the future few of the extant embalmers will be able to remember the transaction.

SEEK DISTANCE RECORD IN FLIGHT TO BUENOS AIRES

HARTFORD, Conn., May 30. (AP)—The "K of New Haven," a plane built to try the first non-stop refueling flight to Buenos Aires, took to wing at 9:44 (E. S. T.) this morning, and an hour later it was making its first refueling contact between New Haven and Bridgeport.

The start was the second attempt, the return from the first having been due to mixed signals, depleted gas supply in the refueling plane, and shortness of the trailing hose used for passing gas from one plane to the other.

When word reached the field at 10:30 (E. S. T.) that the planes were contacting over Long Island Sound field officials regarded the start a success, and expected that the plane would be laid on a course southward, passing over New York City and hence to Washington.

The second take-off was without incident, the "K" and its consort circling overhead for fifteen minutes before disappearing in the direction of New Haven. Four army planes were in the escort.

El Paso Woman, 65 On Long Air Trip, Stops Here

A 65-year-old woman, experiencing her first ride in an airplane, was a passenger in a privately owned plane forced down at the Big Spring airport this morning on account of bad weather.

The woman, Mrs. Ernest Kohlberg, told the pilot and the owner of the ship she "didn't care to do things in a half-way manner." So when she decided the time had arrived to become air-minded, she took a long jaunt from Newark, N. J. to El Paso, her home.

The plane is owned by Alfred Kohlberg of Newark, who is making the trip. It is a Stinson-Detroiter, powered by a Lycoming motor.

On account of inclement weather the pilot, W. C. Sievert, brought the ship down here this morning. It was to remain grounded until the ceiling lifts, permitting it to continue to El Paso.

Mrs. Kohlberg is prominent in El Paso and state club affairs. She is a past president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs.

She had been visiting in Newark and desired to return home via plane. The party left Newark Sunday.

Piloted by Frank Hoyer, a Lockheed plane powered by a Wasp motor, landed at the Big Spring Airport last night, taking off this morning for Wichita Falls. The plane is the property of the Continental Oil Company. Two passengers were on the ship.

LIONS HEAR D P LINDLEY

"The Business Man" Is Topic At Service Club

"The Business Man," was the subject of the Rev. D. P. Lindley, pastor of the First Christian Church, in an address made at the regular luncheon of the Big Spring Lions Club, held in the Crawford Hotel annex dining room, today noon.

Rev. Mr. Lindley was the principal speaker on today's program. Using Biblical reference at intervals, he discussed the outlook of the present day business man on life.

"The average business man," he said, "interprets business in commercial terms. Personal gain seems to be the predominating factor. They are making life a place to make a living, and not a place to make a life."

"Some employ the cheapest outlook. Nothing appeals to them but a way to make a pecuniary gain."

"What this city needs, what every other city needs, is for business men to take another outlook upon life. They need to develop an interest in serious things that confront a community."

The service club offers these opportunities. Business men of every city should look more to the things these organizations are endeavoring to do, and less to ways and means of making money for personal gain only."

Three Locations Announced For Local Field

Throttled again, but three weeks after what was then viewed as the "bottom," the Howard-Glasscock county field found itself Friday facing a flat daily allowed production of 125 barrels of oil per well, regardless of potential output.

Effect of this decision by the pipeline companies was expected to be cut to about 20,000 barrels daily production from the projected field, which has a potential figured at 70,000 barrels per day.

Shallow Oil
The pipe line companies are taking about 6,000 barrels per day from the shallow field, where higher gravity oil is produced.

The Col-Tex Pipe Line company, which heretofore has taken nothing but shallow oil, is reported to have connected with three porous wells located on a lease from which it also runs sweet oil.

Col-Tex, it was reported here Thursday, was preparing to increase its daily runs about 1,000 barrels.

May 10 the wells were put on a 300-barrel daily quota.

Three new locations were staked during the week in the northern Glasscock area. They are:
Stamps No. 6 Coffee, 2,310 feet from the south and east lines of section 23, block 33, township 2 south, T&P survey.

California's No. 2 Baker, 2,310 feet from the south line and 1,655 feet from the west line of section 23, block 33, township 2 south, T&P survey, drilling in sand and gravel at 230 feet.

Near Cloudburst Is Forsan's Fall; 1.46 Here

Big Spring, Howard county, and surrounding territory received a second ground soaking rain Thursday night and Friday morning, according to reports received from outlying sections and communities.

Big Spring and vicinity received 1.41 inches of precipitation in the last two days. Of this amount .86 fell Thursday. The rest falling Thursday night and early Friday morning. In all sections the rain was slow and did not cause any damage to crops which have been planted.

They Get More

Ackerly, which received a heavy downpour Thursday, was visited again Thursday night by a heavy rainfall. The precipitation in that section and all territory below the town, including Knott, was placed at two inches for the two days of rain.

Forsan also reported a rain that bordered on being a cloudburst. Precipitation started there about 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon and continued through Thursday night, ending at seven o'clock Friday morning.

Cosahoma, missed by the rain Thursday morning, reported a very beneficial rain Thursday afternoon and last night. All sections surrounding Cosahoma received heavy rains during the afternoon and night.

Vincent reported an excellent rain both Thursday afternoon and night.

Stanton also received a light rain this morning, to follow the all-day rainfall of Thursday.

Garden City reported a rain this morning which started about daylight and continued until 8 o'clock. A slow rain fell in that vicinity all day Thursday.

All of Dawson county was benefitted by a blanket of rain totaling one and one-half inches. The Chamber of Commerce of Lamesa reported that rain has fallen in that county for three successive nights. It fell slowly and greatly benefitted crops in that section.

Howard county farmers were jubilant today over the rain of the two days. They were making preparations to finish planting their crops, declaring the heavy rainfall had placed soil in ideal condition for that work. Coming as it has with some of the crops already in the ground, has aided the farmer materially.

No damage in Howard county has been reported. Despite the heavy rain of Thursday night, train, bus and airplane schedules were being carried out on time today.

GETTYSBURG, Pa., May 30. (AP)—Near the spot where sixty seven years ago Abraham Lincoln delivered his immortal Gettysburg address, President Hoover stood today and called for leadership of the nation tempered by the moderation and calm vision of the Civil War president.

"In weaving of our destiny, the pattern may change," the chief executive said, "yet the wool and warp of our weaving must be those inspired ideals of unity, of ordered liberty, of equality of opportunity of popular government, and of peace to which this nation was dedicated."

Looking down from the covered stand where he stood over the multitude that banded upon the hillside below, the president saw before him a colorful scene flanked by military uniforms. Behind him sat a few of the surviving veterans of the Union armies gazing out upon the graves of their fellow comrades and listening to the tribute which the 31st president of the United States bore them and the

ONE KILLED; VICTOR LED WHOLE WAY

Many Spills; DaPaolo Forced Out; 165,000 Present

SPEEDWAY, INDIANAPOLIS, May 30. (AP)—Billy Arnold, the 23-year-old favorite, won the 500-mile automobile race at the Indianapolis Speedway today. He led every lap except two. He had hit the 450-mile mark with a lead of ten miles, with Cantlon second, Schneider third, Louis Meyer fourth. Arnold's time at 450 miles was 4:28:52.61, averaging 100.418 miles per hour.

Numerous spills occurred. Sixteen of the 38 starters remained in the race at 400 miles.

Paul Marshall, Detroit, mechanic riding with his brother, Cy Marshall, died in a hospital from injuries received when their machine crashed into the retaining wall on the north turn and fell 25 feet to the ground below. His brother was in a critical condition.

SPEEDWAY, INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 30. (AP)—With a record smashing crowd of 165,000 viewing the spectacle, Billy Arnold, 23-year-old Chicagoan, was leading the 500-mile automobile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway today when the 200-mile mark was reached.

Arnold had reeled off the 200 miles in 1:57:28.81, averaging 102.143 miles an hour. William "Shorty" Cantlon, of Detroit was second, two and a half miles behind the speeding Arnold, and Louie Schneider, of Indianapolis third.

Accidents and motor trouble had knocked seventeen of the original thirty-eight cars out of the race at the end of 200 miles.

At 250 miles, the half way mark of the race, Arnold had a lead of five miles, with Cantlon second, Schneider third, and Ernie Triplett, Los Angeles fourth. Arnold's time was 2:26:59.18, an average of 102.050 miles an hour. Arnold was setting a blistering pace and came within a fraction of a second of equalling the record for the distance.

Mechanic Dies
Paul Marshall of Detroit, mechanic in the car which crashed into the wall and left the track, died of injuries this afternoon, according to word received at the track.

Cy Marshall, driver of the car, was reported to be suffering from a fractured skull. His condition was critical. The dead mechanic and the driver were brothers.

Arnold made his first stop at 275 miles, spending three minutes in the pits to take on fuel and change tires.

At 300 miles Arnold had a lead of five miles, with Cantlon second, Schneider third, and Triplett fourth. Arnold covered the distance in 2:59:53.57, averaging 100.058 miles an hour.

335 Miles
Arnold maintained his fast pace and at 325 miles was leading Cantlon by two laps. His time was 3:14:41.60, an average of 100.158 miles an hour. Schneider was third and Triplett fourth.

Arnold, maintaining his lead of five miles, covered the 350 miles in 3:29:30.80, an average of 100.222 miles an hour. Cantlon was hanging on to second place with Schneider third. Triplett, who had been riding in fourth place, was forced out by piston trouble, and "Wild Bill" Cummings, of Indianapolis

tion of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here.

The speaker reviewed the history of the farm relief movement, telling how the United States Chamber of Commerce had joined with other business organizations in urging help for agriculture.

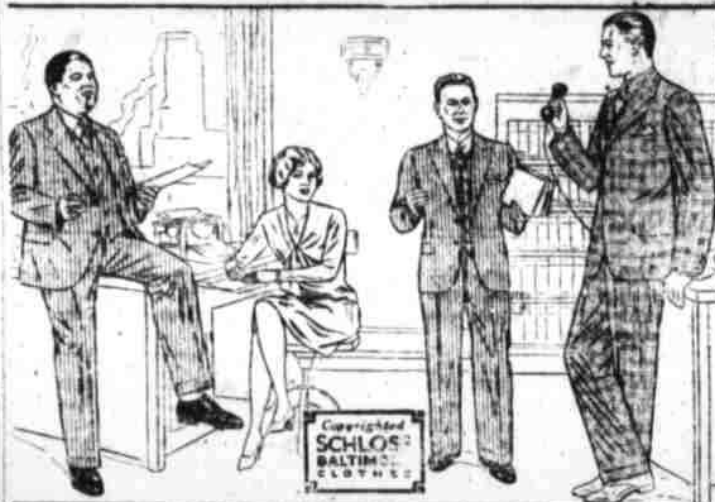
"I will make no reference to the more recent expressions of the United States Chamber of Commerce," he said smilingly. "I regret that there should have arisen any cause of conflict between farmers and the board on the one hand and certain business interests on the other. I regret any division on a matter which affects directly 30 per cent of the popula-

tion, and indirectly the other 70 per cent."

"Some people think all we have to do is wave a hand and surpluses will be controlled and production and price will be stabilized, but no chronic disease can be cured in that manner."

"Business men should work inside of farmers' organizations set up to put the federal marketing act into practice and not stand on the sidelines and say they are no good. The new piece of machinery may run hot, but we have plenty of money to order substitute parts."

Williams said that if the federal farm board had not exercised its every resource to keep prices of

agricultural products up during the stock market crash last fall this nation would have experienced the worst commodity panic in its history.

Ad

"The banks and financial leaders came to the aid of industrial stocks but the federal farm board was the only influential organization which thought of the prices of wheat and cotton and other farm products," he said.

The board member outlined plans of the selling organization being formed under auspices of the federal farm board whereby raisers of each commodity can organize themselves in their respective districts and states to sell through a giant national concern created for marketing of each product.

The American Cotton Co-operative Association, working in this state through the Texas Cotton Co-operative Association, is the national concern for the sale of wool and mohair, in which many of you West Texans are interested, already is beginning to function very efficiently," he said.

At the conclusion of his address, the convention adopted a resolution endorsing the work of the farm board.

C. C. Metcalfe of San Angelo, who moved for adoption of the resolution, said the board was being opposed by "gamblers on futures of our products" because one of the purposes of the board was to minimize speculation.

Given Hat

The Dallas Chamber of Commerce presented the board members with a "ten gallon" hat, familiar to residents of Texas.

A resolution by Representative Penrose Metcalfe endorsing the proposed constitutional amendment which would allow West Texas counties to tax University of Texas lands was opposed on the floor before it was adopted, 65 to 4. A referendum on the proposal is set for November.

Orville Bullington of Wichita Falls, vice chairman of the state republican executive committee, said the counties could raise sufficient funds through tax on mineral leases. Cliff Caldwell of Abilene, retiring district director, also questioned the advisability of the proposal.

Speeches in its support were made by Amos G. Carter of Fort Worth, Houston Harter of San Angelo and J. T. Robinson of Alpine. A resolution stating that West

Texas was not now represented in the legislature in proportion to its population and calling upon the next session of the legislature to district the state on the basis of the 1930 census was adopted unanimously.

Bureaus

A measure authorizing the creating of three bureaus in the organization to be known as development and industrial, publicity and service and protection and expansion also was passed by a viva voce vote. Harter championed that resolution, asserting that it would contribute greatly to the efficiency of the regional body.

A third resolution adopted asked for the state to provide for the financial support for junior colleges, authorized to be established in any sizeable city by the 40th legislature.

Reports that Lubbock would conduct the 1931 convention on strictly a business basis if named as the host city were declared erroneous by R. J. Murray, president of the Lubbock Board of City Development. "We will guarantee a genuine western entertainment to everyone," he said. Menard Wells and Sweetwater were the other cities seeking the next convention.

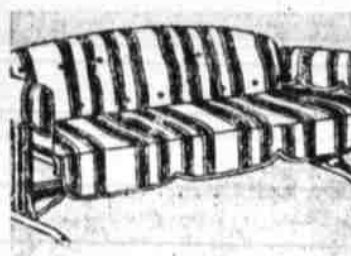

Connolly, former purchasing agent for the district. These seven were named also in the original indictments returned last month.

Bond was set at \$10,000 each by Chief Justice Denis J. Normoyle of the criminal court.

The recipes are as follows:

SPANISH CASSEROLE

Mrs. J. A. Hambrick, Route 1
2 cups spaghetti
2 lb round steak cut in cubes
2 onions sliced
1 clove garlic, minced
2 green peppers, shredded
3 cups tomatoes, canned or fresh
1 ts. salt
1-2 ts. pepper
2 ts. sugar
2 ts. butter
1-2 cup sliced stuffed olives
2 ts. grapejuice (optional)

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted
water until tender, drain. Put but-
ter or oil in frying pan, add onions,
pepper and garlic. Heat and add
meat rolled in flour. Add tomatoes
and sugar, salt and pepper. Trans-
fer to a casserole or roasting pan,
cover and bake slowly two hours.
Arrange on platter with meat in
center. Garnish with sliced olives.
Heap spaghetti around the meat.

This is delicious served with the
following cole-slaw. My family have
named it "Babe Ruth's Home Run."

Cole-Slaw

Finely shred enough cabbage
(terip) to make 2 cups; 3 large ap-
ples, chopped; diced pimiento; grad-
ed carrots; a few chopped nuts.
Moisten with plain French dressing
or cooked salad dressing. This slaw
competes the Spanish Casserole in-
to a balanced meal.

SPAGHETTI AND CRAB MEAT

Mrs. P. N. Allen, Box 442
2 lbs. chopped green pepper
2 ts. butter
2 ts. flour
1 ts. mustard
1-4 ts. salt
1-2 ts. Worcestershire sauce
Dash of cayenne pepper
1 cup stewed spaghetti
1 cup grated cheese
1 egg slightly beaten
3-4 cup milk
1 cup crab meat

Cook green pepper in butter five
minutes. Blend in flour; add sea-
sonings, spaghetti, cheese and egg.
Cook a few minutes. Heat the milk
before adding other ingredients.
Then the crab meat. Serve in patty
shells or on rounds of toast. Serve
with cheese sprinkled on top.

New Spaghetti Dishes
For Hungry Husbands

By JOSEPH E. B. GIBSON

Spaghetti in tomato sauce with
cheese, which can be purchased
ready to heat and serve, is a well-
known and favorable luncheon and
supper dish. But many women do
not realize the surprising number
of economical and savory "one-
dish dinners" that can be prepared
from just a can of spaghetti, plus
a bit of ground meat or a few
sausages with a touch of spicy sea-
soning. Even plain pot roast be-
comes a special treat when served
with a liberal portion of spaghetti.

Some evening when you want to
prepare a pleasant surprise for
your family, try stuffing green pep-
pers with spaghetti, instead of
with ground meat or rice. And
everyone is sure to like that old
southern dish—Creole pork.

The following spaghetti recipes
should go far in helping you solve
that never-ending problem of
"what can I serve today?"

Casserole of Meat and Spaghetti
—1 pound ground round steak, 1
medium size onion, 1 large green
pepper, 1 medium can Cream of
Tomato Soup, 1 medium can cook-
ed spaghetti, 1-4 pound American
cheese (grated).

Fry finely chopped onion in
bacon fat until slightly brown.
Add meat and cook until brown.
Then add cream of tomato soup
and chopped pepper and simmer
slowly for 30 minutes. Add cook-
ed spaghetti, mix thoroughly, and
add grated cheese. Heat in a
moderate oven until cheese is melt-
ed.

Creole Pork—1 small can cream
of tomato soup, 1 small can cooked
spaghetti, 1 pound ground round
pork, 2 onions, 1-2 teaspoon salt,
1-4 pound grated cheese, 1-2 cup
grated crumbs, 1 tablespoon but-
ter.

Chop onions fine and fry with
ground pork until brown, (in ad-
ditional fat). Drain off excess
fat. Add cooked spaghetti, cream
of tomato soup and grated cheese.
Turn into baking dish, cover with
crumbs and butter. Bake 30 min-
utes in a moderate oven.

**Cooked Spaghetti in Tomato
Sauce with Cheese in Green Pepp-
er Cases**—Wash six large green
peppers, cut in half and remove
seeds. Place peppers in boiling
water, turn off heat and allow to
remain in water about five minutes
to remove their strong taste. Cool,
and fill the peppers with 1 medium
can of cooked spaghetti. Dust
lightly with salt, and cover with
buttered crumbs. Place in cas-
serole, add a small amount of wa-
ter, and bake in a moderate oven.

Spaghetti with Pot Roast—Pre-
pare a pot roast in the usual man-
ner. When it is done, add a can
or more of cooked spaghetti, ac-
cording to the size of your roast.
Simmer for a few minutes, adding
water to replace the gravy absorbed
by the spaghetti. In serving,
place the meat in the center of the
plate and heap the spaghetti
around it. Sweet mustard pickles
are very good with this.

**Brown Sausages and Cooked
Spaghetti in Tomato Sauce** with
Cheese—Brown one pound of saus-
ages. Drain off the excess fat and
pour in a large can of cooked
spaghetti in tomato sauce with

spaghetti is heated. Place the
spaghetti in the center of a platter
and surround with the brown
sausages. Garnish with parsley,
and serve very hot.

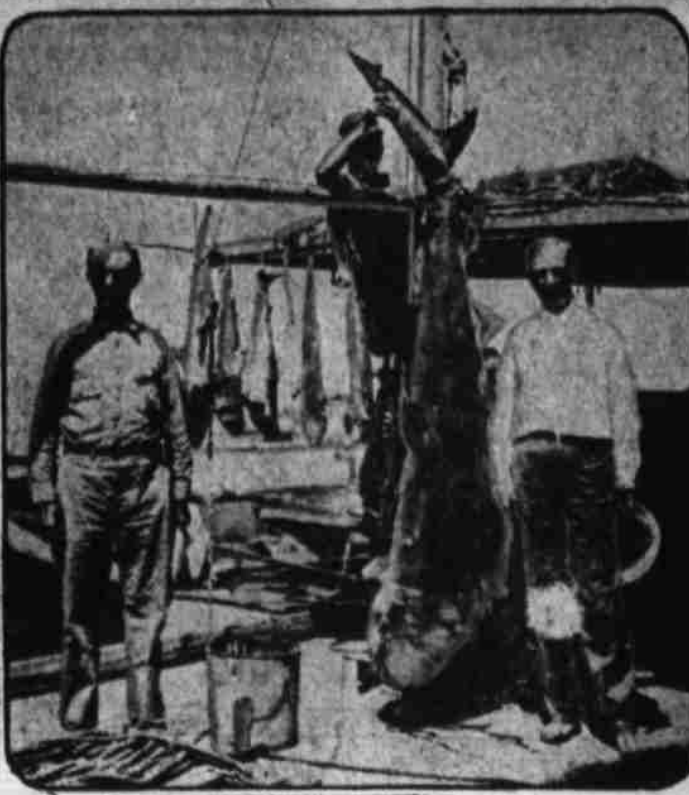

2 FORMER WINNERS START

500 Mile Race Expected To End At 3 o'Clock

INDIANAPOLIS, May 30. (AP)—Thirty-eight drivers, including two foreign stars, presenting the largest field since the inaugural of the race 19 years ago, wheeled their cars into position today for the start of the 500 mile automobile race over the Indianapolis motor speedway for prizes totalling \$115,000.

With prospects of clear, cool weather, indications were that a record making crowd in excess of 150,000 would witness the racing classic. The start was set for ten a. m. central standard time, and the drop of the checkered flag signaling the winner for soon after 3 p. m.

The two foreigners in the race, matching their driving skill with the cream of the American racing pilots, were Italians. They were Facon Boracchini and Letterio Cucinotta. They had cars of the same make, but one had 16 cylinders and the other eight.

Competing against the foreign invaders were thirty-six Americans, including two former winners of the classic, Peter DePaolo and Louis Meyer, both of Los Angeles. DePaolo won in 1925, setting a record of 101.13 miles per hour. Meyer, then a youngster in the racing game, was the triumphant driver in 1928.

Not since 1911 have so many drivers started the race and each entry carried two men—a mechanic having been added this year after contestants numbered 76.

Each year there are favorites, and the choice today rested among DePaolo, and Meyer, both former winners, and Billy Arnold a 23-year-old Chicagoan. Arnold had the pole position because of his achievement in setting the fastest pace in the qualifying trials.

Long before the sun appeared in the eastern sky, thousands of racing fans, eager to witness a narrow escape or perhaps the death of a driver, lined up before the gates to rush through the turnstiles at the opening at six o'clock. Some of the hopefuls had been sleeping in their cars at the entrance of the gates since early Wednesday afternoon.

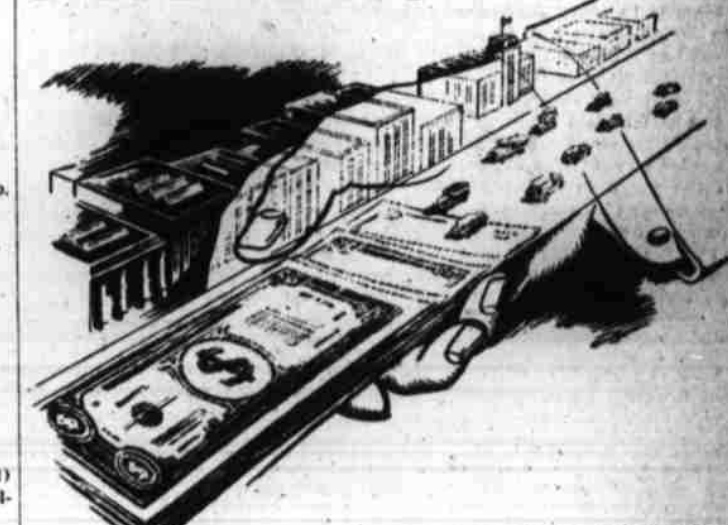

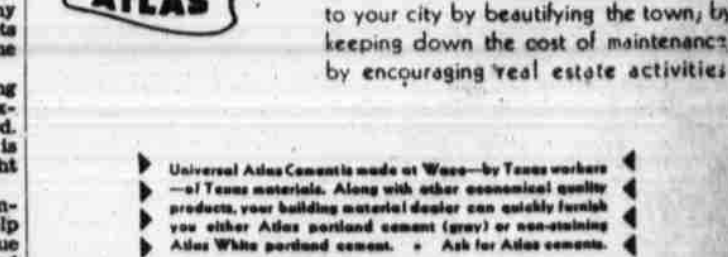

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A Sad Report

THOUGHTFUL people will be interested in the work of the child welfare committee of the League of Nations. To this committee a French woman, president of the international council of nurses, has made a secret report. It is learned that part of her report, on social and moral conditions in the United States, are sensational. She finds "depths of misery, moral and physical, such as would appall the most experienced of welfare workers." It is reported that one of the principal dangers to girls in the working class lies in a lack of family unity and that habit of seeking recreation outside the home. Quoting a judge of the juvenile court of New York, the report says: "The judge attributed a great deal of the increase in child delinquency to the prohibition law. Parents break the law and are in- vetebrate drinkers. The child becomes accustomed to seeing the law disobeyed. He is often employed by the parents to carry fermented liquors and sell them and, with these bad examples before him, he loses all respect for the law."

Well, there may be much in what the judge says, but there are few boys and girls employed by fathers and mothers to sell liquor. It would seem the judge is laying a great deal of stress on exceptional cases. There is, however, no doubt that the sight of law-breaking must gradually demoralize young people in the impressionable age of life.

Partition Of Texas

New York Times:
SHOULD the State of Texas avail itself of what Representative Garner says is its right to split into five commonwealths, a procession would instantly move on Washington to invoke interference. The parade would attract such sections as these:

1. Surviving G.A.R. veterans of the sort who protest paying any honor to General Lee.
2. Senator Grundy of Pennsylvania and members of the manufacturers' association of that state.
3. The governors of Rhode Island and Vermont with their staffs.
4. Weeping federal taxpayers from all other commonwealths.
5. New England chambers commerce.

However, were Texans in the mood which Mr. Garner seems to be in, and were the revived right of Texas to make little ones out of a big one fully sustained, this gleam, despite its mournfulness, would not be able to accomplish anything. The five states would range themselves from the Louisiana to the New Mexico boundary. There would appear on the maps a new division of West Texas and East Texas. Perhaps the central portion would be permitted to retain the name "Texas" for itself. That would leave two commonwealths to be named, probably by a referendum conducted through the newspapers. "Houston" might emerge upon the starry field of the Union. The nation would not have known so much excitement since Fort Sumpter. Politicians, architects and builders would tumble over each other erecting four new capitals. From Texasiana to El Paso new troops of Rangers would be forming. How to compose the rival claims of Dallas and Fort Worth would probably be solved only by putting them in separate states and making each a capital. Jim Ferguson and "Ma" would emerge from their retirement at Temple. From San Marcos Albert

Burleson would hurl the draft of a liberal constitution for the state which surrounded him. Dallas would ring again with the thunderous voice of Joseph W. Bailey. (Editor's note: Give New York time and it will find out that Senator Bailey is dead) and at Waco Robert L. Henry would immediately demand to be made senator. Meadowland and mesa would bloom instantly with office-seekers while what is now the empire of Texas made ready to create a million new jobs.

With eight new Southern low-tariff senators in making to debauch upon Washington, there would be mass meetings and torchlight processions in Philadelphia, Boston, Brooklyn, Newark and Trenton. William M. Butler and the American economists would predict the destruction of America, and Samuel M. Vaulain would emigrate to Canada. At the Union League clubs in New York, Philadelphia and Chicago many black-bordered cards would appear on the bulletin boards. An expletive from the lips of Calvin Coolidge would rock Massachusetts like a temblor. No, Mr. Garner must not foster this calamitous thing. Contrasted with his proposed revenge on New England, Sherman's march would be pastoral.

BOTULISM

Botulism means a sausage, and botulism originally meant poisoning due to the eating of spoiled sausages. Now, however, we know that botulism may be due to other infected foods as well.

Botulism was first recognized by German scientists as far back as 1793, but its true cause remained a mystery until 1895. Then it was demonstrated that it is due to a germ known as bacillus botulinus, and the toxin or bacterial poison produced by this germ.

In further studies it was shown that botulism infects not only sausages, but also such preserved articles of food as string beans, ripe olives, peas, asparagus salad, spinach, corn, fish and canned meats. Botulism is never found in fresh foods. Most cases of botulism are caused by food which has undergone some preserving process such as smoking, canning or pickling. Home preserved foods which have been inadequately or improperly treated are especially liable to harbor the botulism bacillus.

The disease botulism is produced by the botulinus germ but more directly by the toxin or bacterial poison which it deposits in the spoiled food. This toxin is a deadly substance. It is recorded that in one instance a piece of preserved duck, the size of a walnut contaminated with botulinus toxin was sufficient to cause an illness which lasted eight weeks.

The toxin of botulism differs from the toxin produced by other so-called true toxin bacteria in that it causes disease when swallowed. Diphtheria or tetanus toxins will not prove poisonous when taken through the mouth.

Texas Gas Will Go To Arizona

TUCSON, Ariz., May 30 (AP)—The Arizona Daily Star today said a contract to pipe natural gas from Oklahoma and Texas into Arizona for use by mining companies was signed two weeks ago in New York City between Louis C. No lyricist was ever more gifted in the delineation of human love, both sacred and profane. Although it must be admitted that Burns' poetry occasionally violated the limits prescribed by good taste, he firmly believed in a Personal Deity and upheld the cardinal virtues of Truth, Justice and Charity.

That an Ayrshire plowman should have enthroned his country's ballad literature throughout a vast empire and a powerful republic is significant enough.

We are all indebted to Burns. His spirit has passed into the air we breathe and into the light by which we see.

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Lobbyists' Probe Is Summarized

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—An assertion that most Washington lobbyists are "simple parasites preying upon the public" was made today by Chairman Caraway of the senate lobby committee in a review of the accomplishments of the committee's seven-month investigation.

As the life of the committee neared an end, Caraway told newspapermen that the vast majority of the lobbyists are simply taking advantage of the "dupidity or desires of individuals and groups away from supporting these utterly disreputable and selfish interests."

Caraway explained, however, that there were groups which were honestly seeking to bring about helpful legislation or executive action, and he did not intend to reflect upon them.

"All agree," he said, "that every citizen has the right to present his views on any public matter to any branch of the government. To do so is not only a constitutional right but is a right that should be exercised."

"The investigation has given a fairly accurate picture of the leading groups who have infested Washington and sought to influence legislation and executive ac-

tion for a number of years.

"In most cases it pretty clearly appeared that the chief concern of the lobbyists was to find credulous people and induce them to contribute the funds which were alleged to be accumulated for the purpose of accomplishing ends they professed to seek."

"But in very many instances the contributors found their way into the pockets of the professional lobbyists."

Two New Orleans Trolleys Bombed
