Homer of Wichita Falls, returned this week from a hunting trip near Blanding, Utah.

The party killed 41 large mule deer, which was their limit. Jack Winn took the honor of killing the largest deer, a 12 pointer that field dressed 246 pounds.

Approval Given For Improvement Of Highway 37

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$42,400.00 for the improvement of State Highway No. 37 extending from Clarksville to Bogata announced District Engineer L. D. Cabanis of Paris. The work will be under the supervision of B. P. Burtner, Senior Resident Engineer, Clarksville.

The District Engineer stated that the improvement to the 14.7 mile section of highway will include repairs to the base and construction of a seal coat.

This work is part of the 1962 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program just authorized by the Highway Commission. Under this program a total of 2,433 miles of U. S. and State Highways will be improved. Work will be done on 378 projects in 156 counties.

Purpose of the annual program is to continue the improvement and modernization of U. S. Highways of increased safety and convenience of travel.

The annual Safety and Betterment Program is one of the prime factors responsible for a significant 26 per cent drop in the number of traffic deaths on primary highways during the last seven years, the Commission said.

"Together with programs for new construction and careful maintenance, the Safety and Betterment program has helped achieve a meaningful reduction in traffic fatalities on the primary highway system," said Herbert C. Petry, Jr., Chairman of the Highway Commission.

Petry termed the Safety and Betterment Program as "not only desirable but essential for the safety and comfort of people who travel Texas highways in record numbers."

The program, he said, will "perpetuate and protect the taxpayers' investment of well over \$2 billion in the Texas highway system."

Talco Trojans Defeat Queen City 36 to 20

Talco's Trojans were victorious Friday night over Queen City Bulldogs. The Trojan ground game overcame the Bulldog passing advantage and Talco won 36 to 20. Presentation of the band sweetheart, Miss Janie Caudle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Hamilton, preceded the game.

Talco lost the services of a key lineman, Steve Buchanan, a senior guard, who suffered a broken arm early in the game. By the last quarter players on both teams were being helped to their feet after hard tackling and blocking.

Trojan Tackle Lank Easterling started things going for Talco when he recovered a Bulldog fumble on the 35 yard line. On the fifth play from scrimmage Sidney Bonds cut through tackle, and assisted by a key block from Monty Rogers, scampered 54 yards for the first Trojan touchdown. The try for extra points was no good and Talco led 6-0.

Queen City fired back taking the kickoff for a 26-yard run-back and then scored in six plays covering 46 yards. Scoring play was a pass from Don Fincher to Jack Kinney for 26 yards. They failed on the try for extra points and the score remained at 6-6.

The Bulldog kicker muffed on the kickoff and Talco covered on its own 40. The Trojans took eight plays to move the 60 yards to paydirt. The payoff play was a pass from quarterback Jimmy Clemments to Halfback Rodney Russell for 31 yards and a touchdown. Fullback Pete Dixon crashed over for the extra points to give Talco a 15-6 lead at halftime.

Talco received the kickoff to open the second half with Sidney Bonds making a fine 30-yard runback only to see half of it nullified by a holding penalty. A 5-yard offside infraction added to Trojan troubles and then they lost the ball to the Bulldogs on a fumble on the 27 yard line. The Bulldogs moved quickly for the touchdown with Fincher tossing to Yancey for the final nine yards. The extra point try was no good and the score was Talco 14, Queen City 12.

Russell made a fine 36-yard return on the kickoff giving Talco possession on the Queen City 49. The Trojans drove 17 more yards into Bulldog territory but the drive stopped when Yancey intercepted a pass on the 25. The Trojan defense made a stand and stopped the Bulldogs on the 14. The Trojans began their finest offensive display of the night from this point. Dixon, Clemmons, Russell and Bonds alternated on running plays to move the ball 86 yards to their third touchdown. Clemmons went over for the score but it was a team effort all the way, good blocking and fine running with the entire team clicking like a coach's dream. Clemmons also drove over for the extra points to give Talco a 22 to 12 lead.

The Bulldogs were held deep in their own territory on the next series of plays and a short punt out gave the Trojans the ball on the 29. Dixon was the big gun in the scoring drive with a nineteen yard run to the six and then on over on the next play. Russell carried wide for the extra points and the score was Talco 36, Queen City 12.

The Bulldogs proceeded to drive from their own 23 for 72 yards and their third touchdown. The extra point try was good and the final score was Talco 36, Queen City 20.

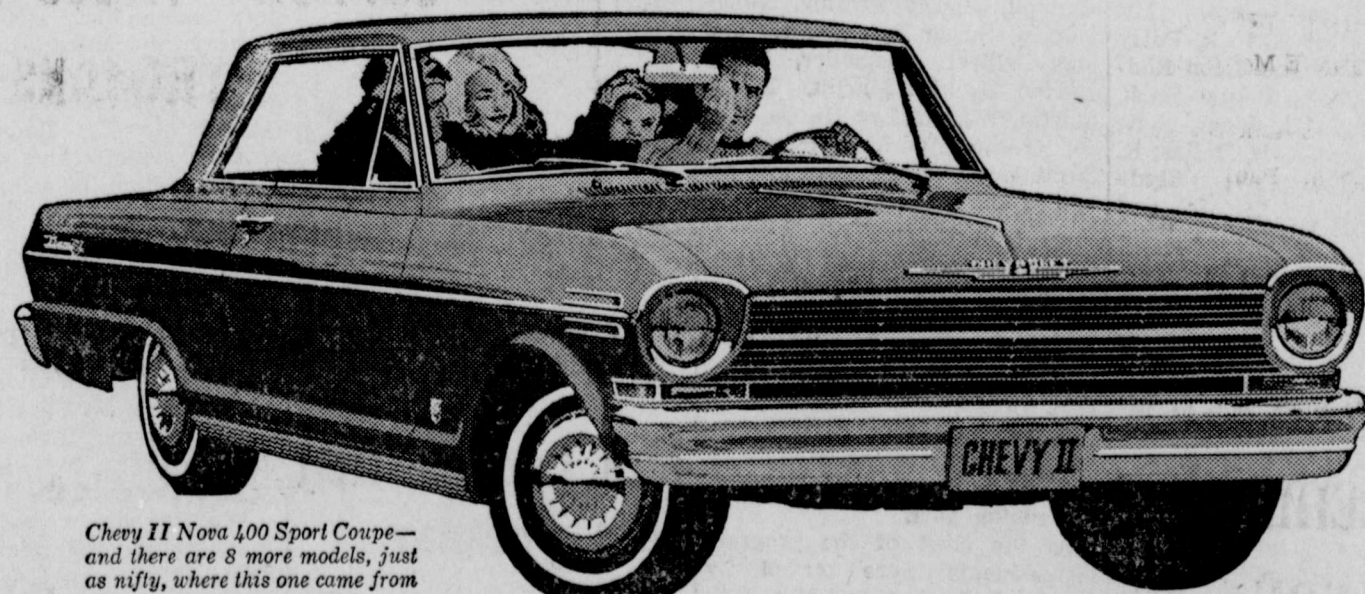

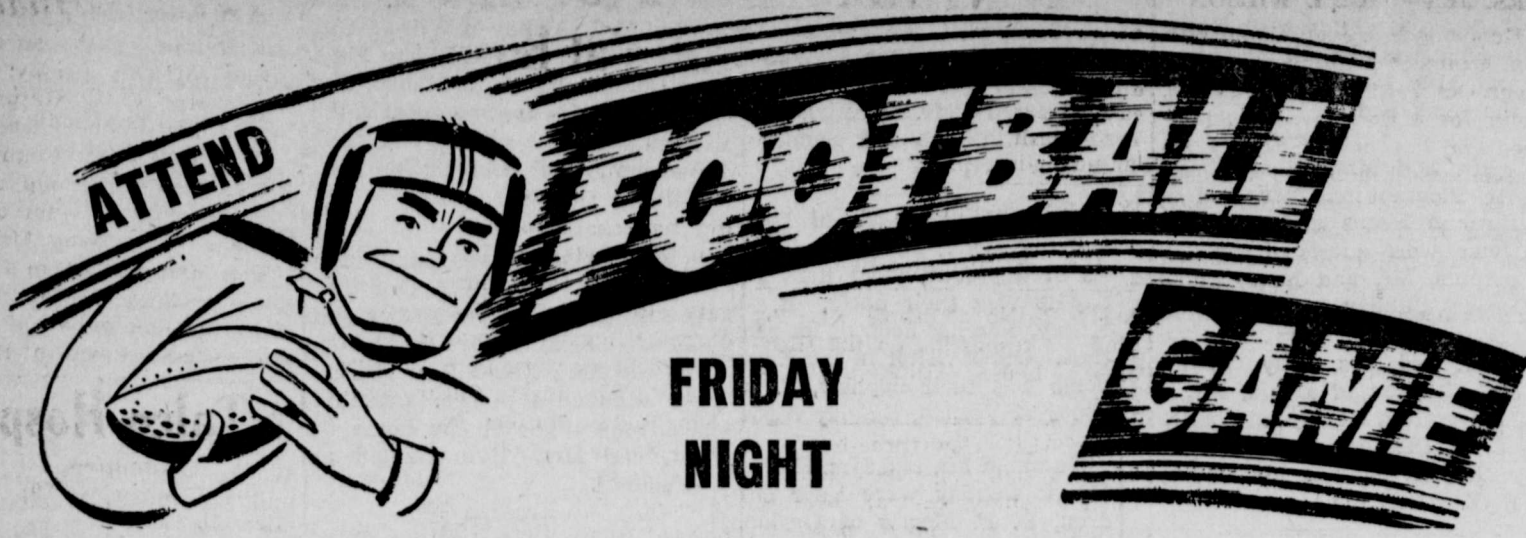

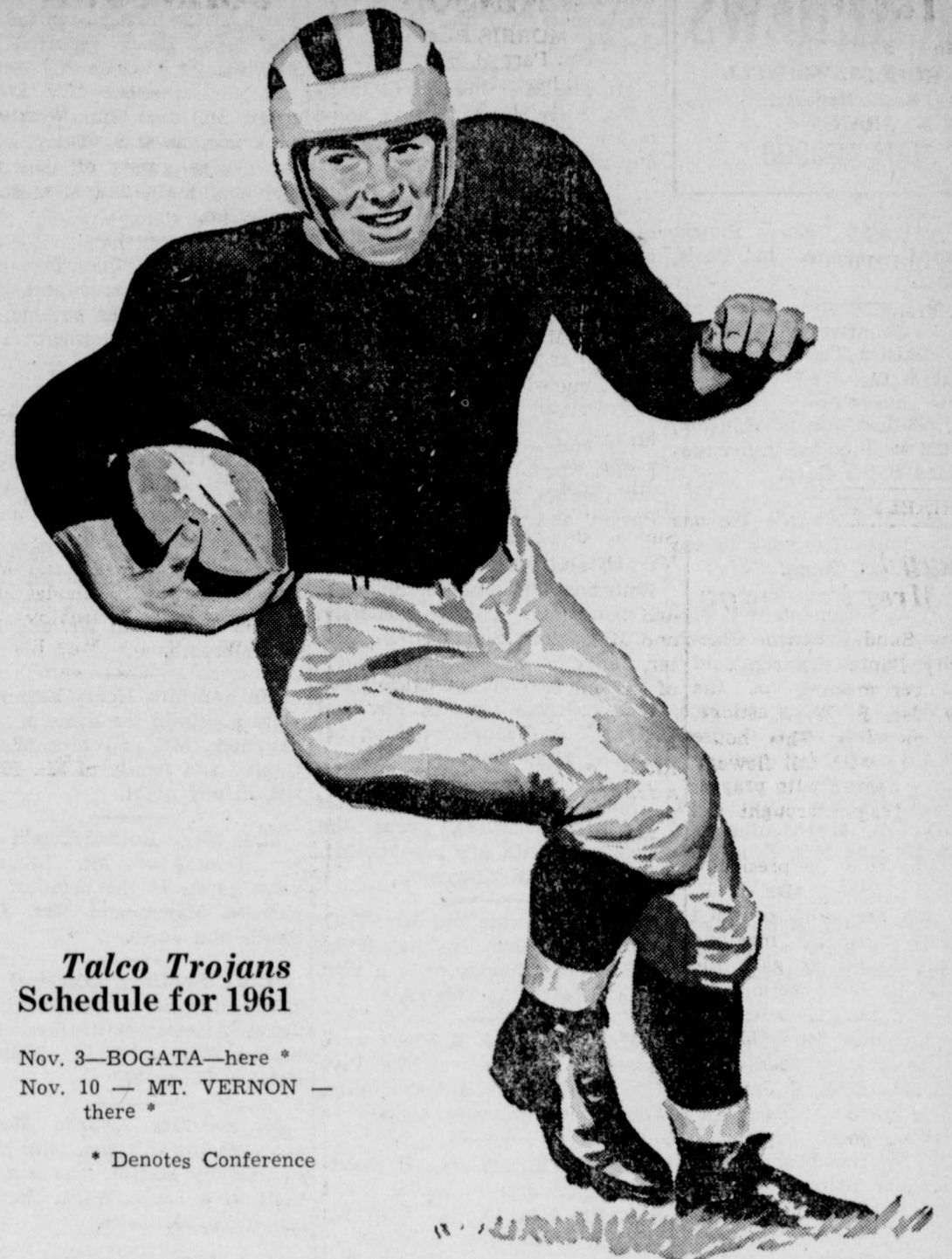
