SCHOOL FACULTY IS NOW COMPLETE

Corps of Well Qualified and Experienced Teachers Were Selected and Outlook for Successful Term is Bright

The Junction Public School Board, composed of Oren C. Reid, Fred E. Knetsch and J. D. Motley, recently completed the selection of a faculty for the local high school for the coming term to begin early in September. Other than superintendent and principal, no assignments of work have been made.

The scholastic enumeration shows 469 for this district, the total for the county being 986. Unless appropriations are made by the forth coming legislature the apportionment from the State will likely drop from \$14 to about \$10, which will seriously interfere with schools over the State, but more especially with those deriving most of their maintenance funds from the State. Under the \$10 apportionment, Junction School will receive \$4,690, which is about \$1,800 less than would be received under the apportionment of last year.

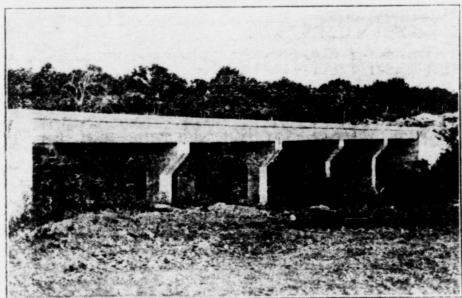
The next school term is near at hand and it is time for every one to get the school spirit and begin working for the interests of the school.

STATE CAPITAL NEWS

Important News Items From the Capitol are Reported Here Every Week.

From The Austin Statesman:

Guardsmen Mingle with Austin People in Dance.

Within the shadows of the Texas capitol civilian folk mingled socially with military folk when hundreds danced on the pavement on Colorado street to the strains played by the 141st Infantry orchestra under the direction of Sergeant Frank Hernandez. Hundreds of others watched the merry dancers as they tripped up and down the tarviated surface between Eleventh and Thirteenth streets west of the capitol.

In order to provide room for the dancers, military police were kept busy ordering back the interested spectators. Dancing was enjoyed from 8:30 until 'Home, Sweet Home' was played shortly after the midnight hour.

The affair was a farewell social courtesy to the National Guard troops by the Travis Post of the American Legion and the Women's Auxiliary to the American Legion. The Chamber of Commerce and Retail Merchants' Association co-operated in making the affair a success.

Reclamation Plan is Outlined by Neff.

Austin, Aug. 7.—"Four million acres of the finest land in the world can be reclaimed in Texas through a comprehensive reclamation program, and 500,000 horse power can be developed with a systematic plan of flood control," Governor Neff told engineers here today attending a conference on flood control and reclamation measures. "Flood control and the reclamation of land are the greatest state wide economic problems," he declared.

"Too long this problem has been delayed. We must solve it now. Enough water falls within the borders of Texas for all our domestic stock, and for agricultural and manufacturing purposes if properly conserved and wisely used. Texas rivers

discharge thirty million acre feet of water into the Gulf of Mexico during the average year. Only five per cent of that amount is now put to use.

"Already Texas has reclaimed 400,000 acres of land. Before reclamation, the land was worth fifteen dollars an acre. It now sells for \$250 an acre.

"By impounding a comprehensive of ditching and levee building, we can reclaim four million acres of land instead of 400,000. This area of land protected from the flood waters would add each year to the taxable values of Texas 200 million dollars worth of property."

School Apportionment May Be Curtailed

When the State Board of Education holds its monthly meeting next Thursday, for the purpose of making an apportionment of the available school fund for the fiscal year commencing September 1, indication is that it will be impossible to apportion in excess of \$10 per capita, based on approximately 1,350,000 scholastics which will be a decrease of \$3 per capita as compared with the present apportionment.

The matter was discussed at a conference held by Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction with Governor Neff. This decrease will be due in a great measure to reduced taxable valuations for 1922 as indicated by the estimates filed by the comptroller's department.

It is planned, however, to make an application to the legislature which meets next January, for an emergency appropriation of probably \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 for the schools which will supplement the apportionment to be made. This is the only way, it is pointed out, that provision can be made to maintain the schools properly and pay the teachers adequate salaries.

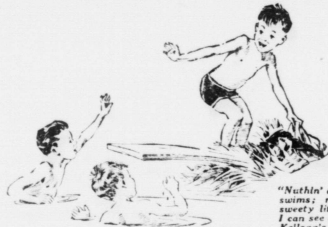

Republicans Named Full State Ticket.

Fort Worth, Aug. 9.—Condemnation of the Ku Klux Klan was expressed in the platform unanimously adopted by the Texas Republican convention at its closing session here this morning.

The convention, for the first time in its history, it was said, voted to place full ticket in the field to oppose Democratic nominees in the November election.

E. P. Wilmot of Travis county was nominated for United States Senator, and W. H. Atwell of Dallas for Governor.

Action on both the platform and slate was unexpectedly harmonious. That portion of the platform dealing with the Ku Klux Klan was approved amid loud and prolonged demonstration. It was set forth that "we condemn the Ku Klux Klan or any similar organization whose purpose is to restrain by force, threats, intimidation, or otherwise, the conduct of our citizens in the full exercise of freedom, whether in matters of politics, religion or occupation, or that discriminates between loyal Americans on the ground of religious belief or nationality.

The platform further declared that the Republican party "regards with apprehension the activity of any group, within or without the State, that directly or indirectly seeks to usurp, interfere with or to lessen the full authority and power conferred by the people upon their duly constituted agencies of government. We stand for a government of law and for vigorous and impartial enforcement of all laws, and we charge that the Democratic party in many portions of the State, if not in the entire State, is now

under the control and domination of the Ku Klux Klan.

H. Standke Funeral was Held in Mason Friday.

The funeral of Mr. H. Standke, age 61, a prominent farmer of the Art section, whose death occurred about 12 o'clock Tuesday night, is to be held this morning at ten o'clock and interment is to be made in the Art cemetery. Rev. G. Schulze and Rev. Henry Jordan are to conduct the services.

Mr. Standke had been in bad health since last June, but it is said he had been confined to his bed for the past four weeks. The cause of his demise is said to have been Bronchial pneumonia coupled with other ailments.

Deceased was one of Mason County's most successful farmers and was said to have been an exceptionally industrious worker. Although a native of Germany, he had been a resident of this county for the past thirty years.

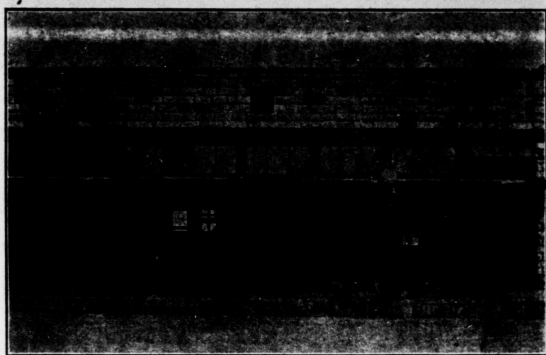
