OPEN ESTELLINE SCHOOL WITH PROGRAM

Neighboring City Is Looking Forward To Good Year

ESTELLINE, Sept. 2.—Al- though no official count was available at noon today, enroll- ment at the opening of Estelline schools will probably exceed that of last year.

Following first day classroom details, the entire student body and a representative number of school patrons met in the auditor- ium at 10 o'clock for the opening exercises.

Supt. J. T. Duncan presided. He was accompanied on the stage by B. L. Adams, president of the Estelline School Board.

The invocation was delivered by Rev. R. S. Watkins, pastor of the First Methodist Church. The audience then sang "America," "The Eyes of Texas," and "Home on the Range," with the gram- mar school children really "bear- ing down" on the last number.

Lyman E. Robbins, of Memphis, spoke briefly on "The Upper Red River Valley."

"It's ridiculous," Mr. Robbins said, "for me to come down here and attempt to tell you people about the Upper Red River Valley when you live right in the center of it. It might be likened to the neighborhood ice man going to Alaska to explain all about ice to the Eskimos."

The speaker recounted a num- ber of facts about Hall county that make it outstanding in this section of the country, urging the students to take advantage of ev- ery opportunity to boost their home town and county.

In an aside to a group of foot- ball players, Mr. Robbins said: "If any of our Memphis smart kids come down here and try to razz you boys, and tell you what a fine town Memphis is, all you have to do is remind them that Estelline has two state highways and two railroads. They'll shut up."

Supt. Duncan read a letter from Mrs. Daisy Kennedy, who had taught in Estelline for the past nine years. Ill health forced her to resign. After some time in a hospital she is now living with a son and daughter in McLean. The entire assembly rose as a mark of respect to Mrs. Kennedy while her letter was being read.

Mr. Duncan introduced the half dozen new members of the faculty and made a strong plea for the co-operation of patrons through- out the school year just begun.

Three Killed In Western Air Crash

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 2.—Three persons were killed last night in the fiery crash of a Western Air Express plane, just a few minutes after its take-off for Salt Lake City.

The dead are: George C. Sher- wood, 39, pilot; Fred Burlew, 35, co-pilot; Miss Naylor, 22, stewardess.

The plane was circling toward the field with the engines appar- ently missing, when it struck a high tension wire and crashed, flaming, against a ranch barn.

The plane carried 17 sacks of mail.

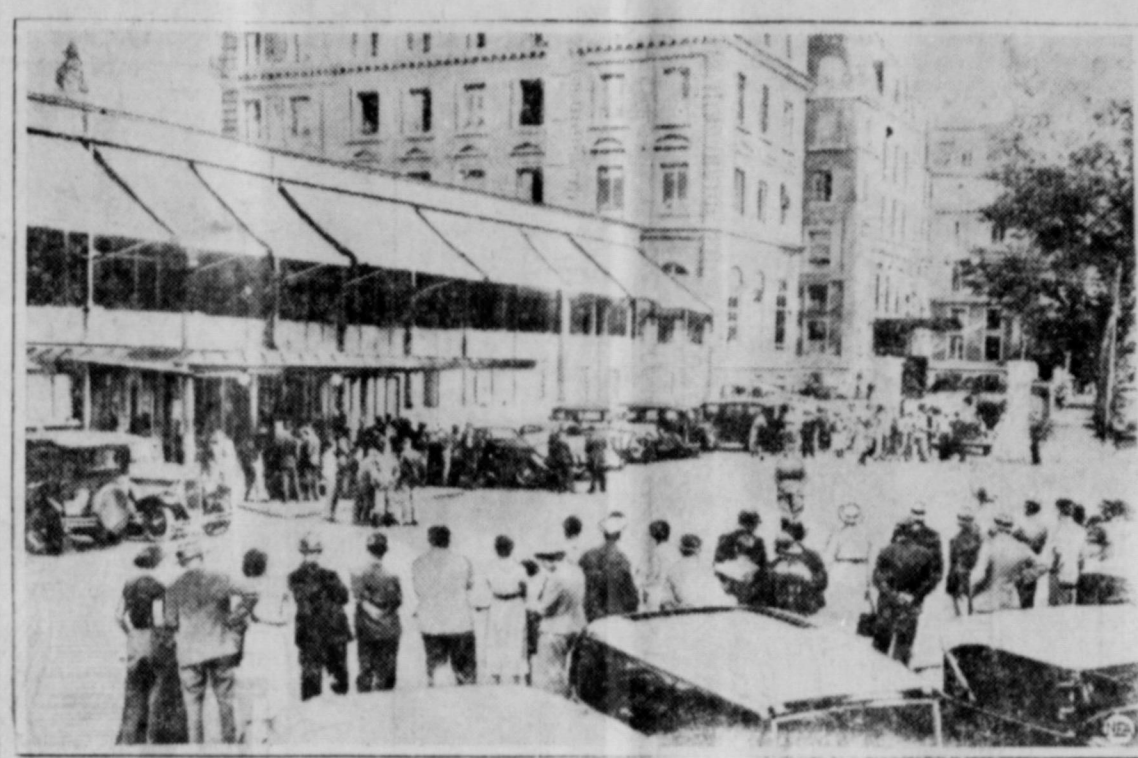

Where World's Hope Of Peace Is Centered



With hope all but abandoned that war between Italy and Ethiopia can be averted, the whole world turned its eyes to the seat of the League of Nations in Geneva as these statesmen led their delega- tions to the league's council meeting, Sept. 4, in a final effort to stave off the conflict which imperils world peace. At top is a general view in front of the League of Nations building as delegates arrived for a recent conference. Cast in leading roles in the diplomatic conclave on which hangs not only the peace of Europe, but possibly the life of the League itself, are: Premier Pierre Laval of France; Baron Pompeo Aloisi, Italian representative; Prof. Gaston Jeze of the Paris Sorbonne, representing Ethiopia; M. Teclé Havariath, Ethiopian delegate; Maxim Litvinov, foreign commissar of the U. S. S. R. and president of the League council; Capt. Anthony Eden, chief delegate of Great Britain. The League's annual assembly, at which all nation are represented, will follow five days after the coun- cil meeting.

The men robbed a filling sta- tion at Childress and kidnapped the operator. After the robbery, they headed out of town toward Kirkland, and released the kid- napped man about three miles out of Childress, turning back at that point toward Childress again.

Officers at all nearby towns were notified, but at last report, the bandits had not been appre- hended.

One Killed; Many Wounded in Strike

PELZER, S. C., Sept. 2.—Mrs. Bertha Kelly, 21, mother of two children, was killed and at least fifteen people wounded in a short- lived but terrific gun battle at the strike-torn Pelzer Manufac- turing Company's mills here today.

The battle began when pickets attempted to break the picket lines about the mill property.

A second gun battle at another of the company's plants, a mile from the main plant, resulted in the probably fatal wounding of J. P. McDougal, who was taking his son to work.

Witnesses to the battle said that approximately 500 pistol and rifle bullets were fired during the two fights that lasted about five minutes.

What do you think of new street signs and house numbers for the city?

THE ANSWERS:
DELMER STARKEY: To the older residents of Memphis it is a simple problem to find their way around the city. If they do have an occasion to inquire for the whereabouts of a person they can stop in any store or ask most any person on the street and he will tell them the desired information in just about this language—"Well, you know where Tim Gus- feathers lives—well Joe Hair- brown lives in the house to the north of him." But this method is far from satisfactory for the newcomer to Memphis.

During the past six months, for one reason or another, we have had numerous new families move into Memphis proper and the sur- rounding country. For the con- vience and benefit of these people, we should erect new street signs and have all the houses numbered. The latter isn't as necessary as the former, as the majority of the homes are already numbered and

Accompanied by a mild electric display, the first big drops began falling at about 7:30 p. m., and soon turned into a veritable flood of moisture for a short time, to be followed by a gentle precipitation which continued most of the night.

LOCAL SCHOOLS OPEN TODAY FOR TERM

No Opening Program Planned Until Later

The Memphis Public Schools opened this morning for the 1935-36 term, with enrollment of stud- ents occupying the entire day. No formal opening program will be held, according to Supt. Davis, until after all students are enrolled in their proper classes, and every- thing has settled down to work.

This morning was devoted to enrollment and class assignments of Seniors and Juniors, and this afternoon the Sophomores and Freshmen will be enrolled.

With several new departments added to the local schools and one of the largest attendances in the history of the institution, Supt. Davis says he expects a most suc- cessful term.

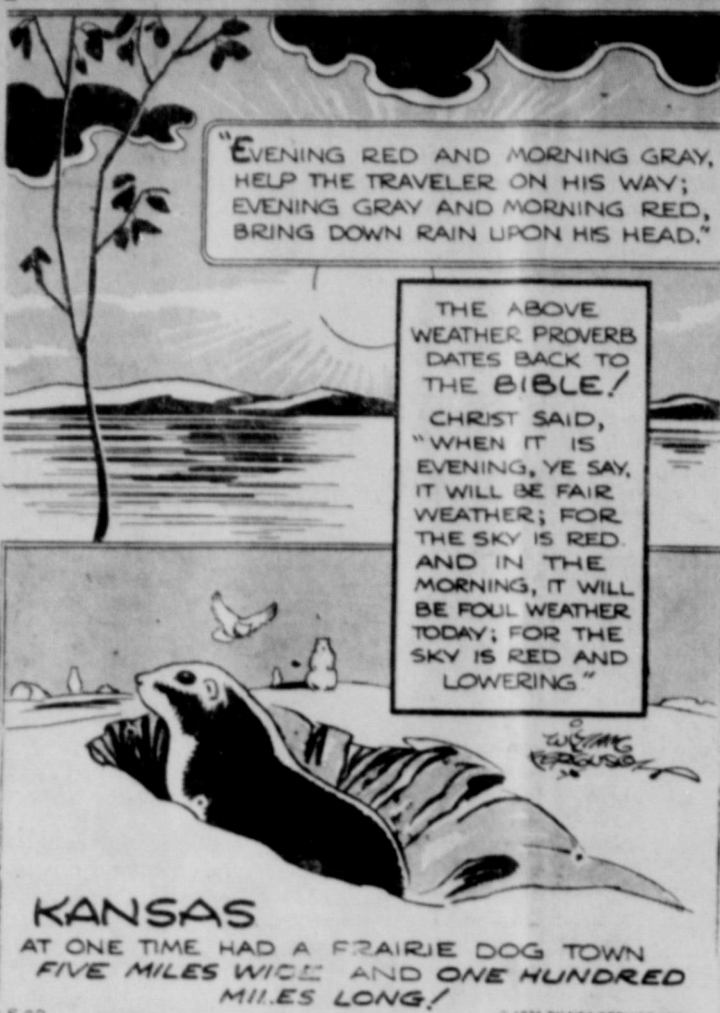

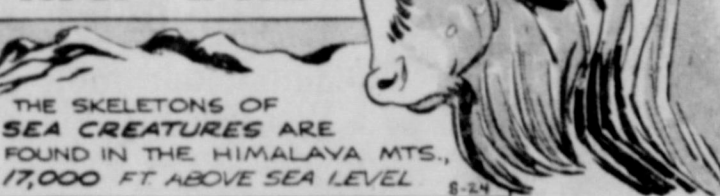
