## Students Chosen Med. Program

Michael Paul Walker of Talco and Miss Dora Lindsey of Paris have been chosen to be students in the medical laboratory technician program offered by Paris Junior College in conjunction with St. Joseph's Hospital.

In addition to lectures and practice at St. Joseph's students receive paracticum experience at McCuiston Community Hospital. The students were selected because of their interest in the program and their outstanding grades. They will begin the program in the fall.

Parker, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. V. Parker of Talco, is a graduate of Rivercrest High School and will be a PJC sophomore in the fall. He completed his first year of work at PJC in 1972-73.

Initiated in 1969-70 the medical laboratory technician program is one of the College's 15 applied science instruction directed by Dr. Ross Alsop, dean of applied science instruction. The instructor is Dr. M. D. Daugherty, M.D., resident pathologist at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Upon completion of the two-year program, the student is granted an associate degree and is eligible for examination by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists for registration. After becoming registered, the technician serves as an assistant to the medical technologist and pathologist.

## Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas  
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

**REVENUE SHARING PAYMENTS.** The Treasury Department has apportioned revenue sharing funds for the second quarter of 1973 (April 1 - June 30) with the 110 eligible county and community governments in Texas' First Congressional District receiving a total of \$1,946,113, slightly up from the previous quarter. A breakdown of eligible East Texas governments with the funds allocated for each will be sent free to officials and other constituents upon request.

**WHO GETS THROWN OVERBOARD?** It is our firm tradition, certainly in the Southwest that women and children, the infirm, and the more helpless among us are protected by the stronger members of the community. It goes strongly against the grain therefore, to see powerful interests remain securely entrenched among their money bags while unemployment is increased, smaller businesses are pinched for capital, families of the less affluent are deprived of proper housing — and with escalating food prices, even subjected to improper diets. Raising interest rates to halt inflation is like throwing the women and children overboard to lighten ship. My recent speech on "The Need For Action On Interest Rates" as made on the Floor of the House will be sent free to constituents upon request.

**TRAVEL BOOM.** Expenditures by U. S. citizens for tourism more than doubled from 1960 to 1970 and are still urging upward — Americans will spend over a trillion dollars on vacation travel during the 1970's! While foreign visitors were spending \$2.5 billion in the U. S. in 1970, our own tourists spent \$4.3 billion overseas contributing heavily to our balance of payments deficit. This is a good reason to see America first — another is that more than 2.3 million Americans are employed in tourist-related businesses. Of course, the best reason of all is that there is more to see and do in America with more comfort and better value.

**SOCIAL SECURITY INCREASE.** The proposed 5.6% increase in social security benefits approved by both House and Senate has now been signed into law by the President. The raise takes effect July 1 of next year and will not be enough to compensate for price increases since the last benefit hike, but any larger amount would have met with a near certain Presidential veto.

**FEES AT FEDERAL RESERVOIRS.** Traditionally, Americans have enjoyed free access to recreation areas at Federal reservoirs which is only fair since they were acquired and developed with tax dollars. Unfortunately, the Corps of Engineers, misinterpreting a law relating to national parks and forests, imposed a schedule of fees (some plainly exorbitant) for use of everything from boat launching ramps to picnic sites. To clear up this misunderstanding, the House has approved H. R. 6717 which I supported, plainly prohibiting fees at Federal reservoirs for all but the most highly developed facilities. Early Senate approval is anticipated and I hope that outdoorsmen will soon have free access to the recreation areas they paid for with hard-earned tax dollars.

**GUNS ARE NOT A MAJOR HAZARD.** One of the nation's largest life insurance companies has published a report that firearms rate among the lowest in all causes of fatal accidents and that firearms are responsible for fewer accidental deaths among men than all other sources listed — such as fire and drowning. This will no doubt be surprising to people who are under the impression that guns are a major cause of accidental death — a form of propaganda deliberately spread by the anti-gun lobby.

## Good Rain Falls In Area Tuesday

Farmers and ranchers were wearing happy smiles Wednesday after the fine rain which fell in this area Tuesday. It was estimated at least two inches fell here and heavier amounts in the Cunningham and Halesboro areas. Cotton and pastures were needing the moisture and prospects are brighter for another good crop.



Austin. — The State Insurance Board, as predicted, last week said it will order auto insurance reductions averaging 4.3 per cent for private cars and totalling at least \$25 million.

Even further savings may be allowed under new competitive rating effective September 1, which allows companies to deviate above and below standard rates set by the Board.

However, insurance industry spokesmen warned, other new laws going into effect may drive rates up substantially next year. Rates cited by the Board do not include, for example, effect of new optional additional coverage for medical expenses and wage losses (up to \$2500 for drivers and passenger). Actually, the coverage is added automatically unless the car owner rejects it in writing.

Industry officials estimated the \$2500 additional "personal injury protection" will cost from \$8 to \$23 a year, which would exceed the cost of savings on other coverage in the same territories. Changes in the "guest statute" — which will allow passengers other than members of the driver's family to sue in event of accidental injury — will add at least another five per cent to premiums, according to a top industry source.

The new comparative negligence statute will increase property damage liability costs at least 10 per cent, estimates the Texas Automobile Insurance Office, which represents companies writing 98 per cent of Texas auto coverage.

The guest statute and comparative negligence law changes will not be reflected in premiums ordered into effect August 27, since there is no experience to base calculations on.

Rates vary substantially among 40 rating territories. An average statewide cut of 11.2 per cent was ordered last year.

**6GAS RATE HIKE SOUGHT** — Lone Star Gas Company is applying for an increase in rates it can charge Texas cities to 51.86 cents per 1,000 cubic feet from the present level of 41.40 cents.

However cities served by the Company are seeking State Railroad Commission review of the Lone Star system's market value.

A rate increase by the Company got Commission approval three years ago following a value survey of its system.

Meanwhile, the Commission has postponed until July 23 a hearing on Coastal State Gas Corporation's Lo-Vaca distribution subsidiary for a rate hike.

**COURTS SPEAK** — Texas Supreme Court will review a case involving refusal by the mayor of Flower Mound New Town to call an election to disannex about a mile of territory.

In their recent decisions, the High Court:

- Agreed to review a dispute over whether a Van Zandt County farmer "voluntarily exposed" himself to a bite by a wild boar. The farmer sued a neighbor \$154,179 when the boar bit him.

- Reversed a \$17,000 award against a Dallas woman accused of making harmful remarks about a competitor in the field of removing body hair by electrolysis.

- Sent back a 1966 medical malpractice suit to an intermediate court in Houston.

- Set for review a controversy over value of land taken near the new Dallas-Fort Worth regional airport.

**AG OPINIONS** — Plucking of pigeons' tail feathers to make their flight erratic and then tossing them up to be shot in marksmanship contests might support convictions for torturing, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

- Public junior colleges can charge higher tuitions for non-residents, but disqualify themselves from state funds if they do.

- Positions of local hospital board member and city commissioner are incompatible, and a person shouldn't hold both.

- A negative vote on a county-wide local option election for sale of alcoholic beverages would not affect areas of a county already wet.

- Parks and Wildlife Department may capture and transport wildlife or fish for investigation, propagation, distribution or science and issue permits for others to do so.

- Cases before a court-appointed master instituted against judges by the Judicial Qualifications Commission need not be postponed because the judge's attorney is attending a legislative session.

- Animal Health Commission members have a lot of leeway in determining whether their actions are "official" and entitled to expense reimbursement from the state.

- Firebrick relining of steel furnaces may be deducted in computing franchise taxes.

**NEW GUARD PROGRAM OFFERED** — A new enlistment option in the Texas National Guard has been offered non-prior service personnel for a 90-day trial period.

Under the plan, non-veterans can enlist in the Guard for six years with the option of serving three in an active drill status and the final three in the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR) Control Group. No monthly drills would be required in the last three years, although summer training may be ordered. Texas is one of 16 states offering the option.

**TAX EXPERTS TO BE CALLED** — In the search for a solution to school revenue problems, the Legislative Property Tax Committee may be asked to bring in expert witnesses to discuss taxing of intangible property like bank accounts, stocks and bonds.

A House education committee sub-panel is exploring the intangible tax field in determining wealth of school districts, but has encountered little enthusiasm for taxing all such wealth.

**POLLUTION PLAN AIRED** — Texas Air Control Board held a series of news conferences in five metropolitan areas to air information on the federal government's plan to impose transportation controls.

The Board was told by its executive secretary proposed anti-pollution controls are unreasonable and would cost Texans \$300 million for auto emission controls that affect only one per cent of the pollution problem. The Board balked on a staff motion to test in court federal power to control auto pollution in the state.

Meanwhile, the federal Environmental Protection Agency scheduled July 17-19 public hearings in Texas to get reaction. Controls would go into effect August 15, involving gas supply, parking, car pools, anti-pollution devices and special road lanes for buses.

## Plans For New R. R. Co. Hospital Are Announced

James Baron, Administrator of Red River County Hospital, has announced plans for the new Red River County Hospital as presented by the hospital architects, Hewitt and Royer of Kansas City.

The new hospital will be constructed about one mile west of the Clarksville city limits on Highway 82. The 15 acre site was a gift of Dr. and Mrs. E. E. Brooks of Bogata.

Plans call for a three story complete service general hospital. The ground floor will provide for the business offices, diagnostic and treatment areas, operating rooms, and emergency out-patient care. Two large automatic patient/service elevators will connect this area with the second and third floors. Visitors will use a visitors elevator found in the entrance lobby.

The second floor will have 30 private rooms for medical-surgical patients and a special maternity and delivery area. One to four of the six maternity ward rooms can also be utilized as medical-surgical rooms when needed. The flexible use of these rooms permits additional medical-surgical beds and also is a factor in economic operation.

The third floor will provide 27 private medical-surgical patient rooms plus three rooms for monitored coronary/intensive care.

All patient rooms are exterior with glare reducing windows, individual room control for heating and cooling, and private toilet and bath facilities. Each room will be decorated in attractive, coordinated colors.

Special rooms will be provided as follows:

3 private rooms for monitored coronary/intensive care

2 private isolation rooms for patients with communicable diseases

4 private suites . . . patient room with adjoining sitting room

1 psychiatric holding room

Each patient floor will have a solarium at each end of the building for the use of visitors and ambulatory patients.

The chapel is located adjacent to the main lobby area.

Patients and visitors may park and enter the hospital through the front entrance. Emergency and out-patients will have a parking area near the Emergency entrance. All parking areas will be well lighted.

The entire building is fire-proof with special fire/smoke detection and extinguishing apparatus in storage and selected areas. An emergency generator will provide power for the emergency-patient care areas when the regular current is interrupted for any reason.

Baron stated, "Some hospitals are out of date the day they are opened primarily because they are not planned for a community's present and future needs as for the changes which take place in medical technology and patient care."

The hospital has been carefully designed so that it can be expanded either horizontally to keep abreast with changing medical technology, or vertically to provide a maximum of 96 beds. Any expansion can be made with minimum expense and disruption of services.

The hospital will be quiet, attractive and easily maintained at minimal cost through the use of vinyl wall coverings and special carpet in the halls.

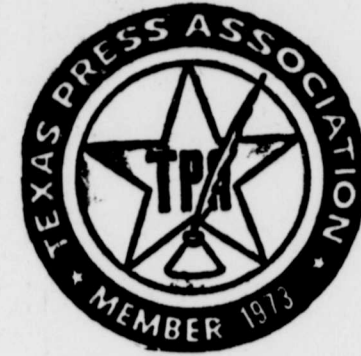

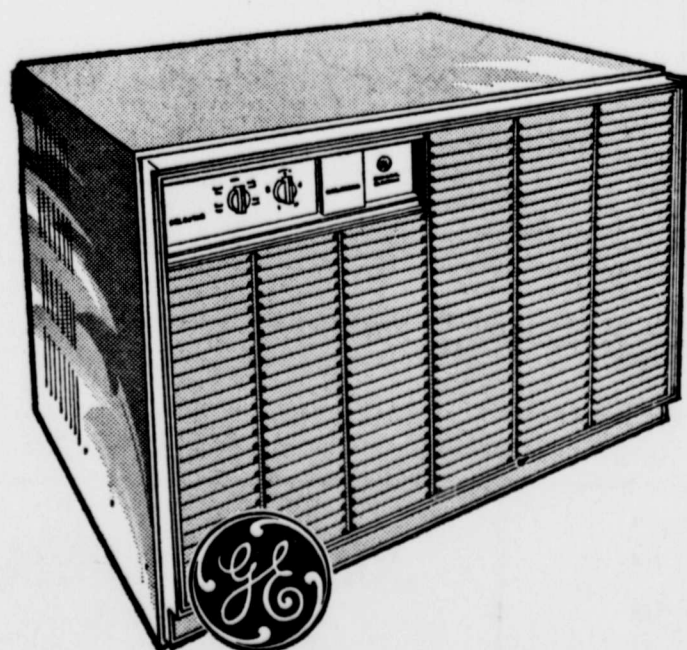

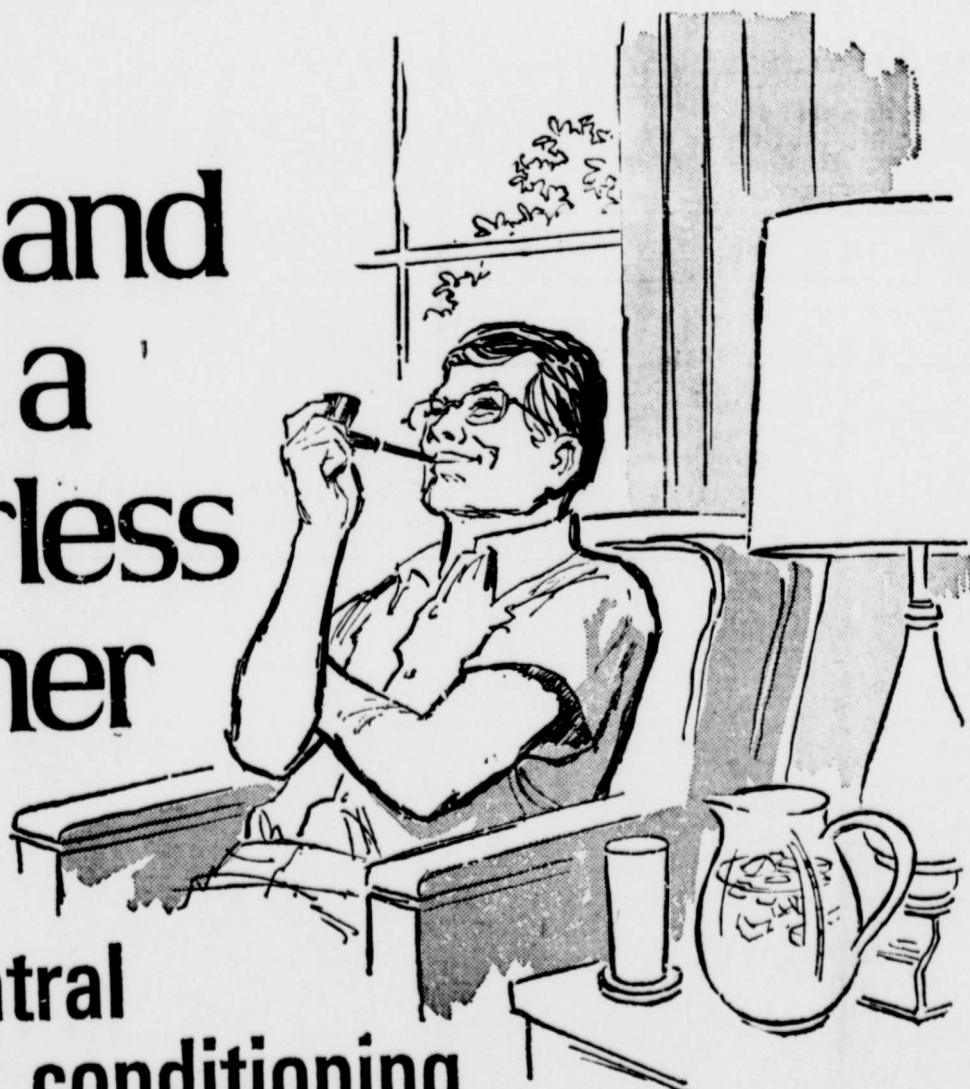
