Moisture More Than Six Inches Since Jan.

Total rainfall and other moisture received in Loraine since January 1, 1955 totals 6.60 inches. The record was up to and including May 11.

May has contributed 4.05 inches of the total amount of moisture received.

Planting season is adequate all over our territory and if summer showers will come this year, prospects are brighter for a crop than at this time of year since 1952.

Rain Monday night left .70 inch of moisture in town brought the total for May to 4.75 and for the year to 7.30.

Much heavier rains fell south of town Monday night, some reporting 2 to 4 inches. Terraces were badly washed in some fields. With several thousand acres under irrigation in our territory prospects for a big crop are the brightest in years.

Cover and Cash Crop Planted Together

Several cooperators of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District are planning a new wrinkle on their cropping systems this year. You've heard of double cropping land? Well, they're going to double crop their land, but both crops will occupy the land at the same time and in the same row.

The idea is to plant summer peas in with their milo—all in the same planting operation. The peas will not furnish much competition for the milo but will help shade the middles which in turn will help conserve moisture.

There are reports from those who have tried the practice that maize with peas outyielded maize without peas. One irrigation farmer on the plains who used the practice continuously for seven years, upped the yield of milo from 2500 to 7000 pounds per acre. Another used the same idea, planting peas with sudan for grazing. The same thing can be done in an ensilage crop.

Milo should be seeded at the regular rate. On irrigated land 6 to 8 pounds per acre of peas are recommended, while half that amount should be used in dryland maize.

For combine milo, the variety of peas to use are: new era, iron clay, whippoorwill, and brabham in that order of preference.

Most major implement dealers are making special box attachments to plant the two crops at the right rate in one operation. For information talk to your local dealer.

Those planning irrigated plantings of the two crops are W. A. Taylor and Royce Mahon. C. A. Pratt, Travis Turner, and Francis Winn are planning dryland trials this year.

The Loraine F. F. A. participated last weekend in the State F. F. A. judging contest held at Texas A & M College. All teams participating in the state contest had qualified prior to the contest. Teams that participated in the state contest represented the top ten percent of the schools in the state.

Loraine's dairy judging team, composed of Tommy Linam, Jerry Robertson and Ross Snyder, placed 54th in the dairy cattle judging contest with 162 points difference between the first place and 54th place. 80 teams participated in this contest.

Opal Narrell was salutatorian with a four year average of 91.17 and Billy Joe Hale was honor boy with a four year average of 90.675.

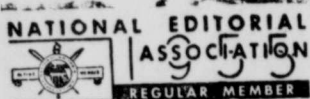
