Bobbie Cawley Observes 25th Year With Red River Haven

On January 8th, 1993 Bobbie Cawley marked a special day...her twenty-fifth year with Red River Haven Nursing Home, now a part of Beverly Enterprises.

Mrs. Cawley joined the Red River Haven staff in 1968, as a medical clerk. At that time Red River Haven Nursing Home was a mere five years old...a dream come true from local businessmen who felt a need to serve the community.

In 1974 Mrs. Cawley was promoted to administrator of the 154 bed facility.

In 1983 Beverly Enterprises made Red River Haven a part of their organization.

Bogata City Council Meets

The city council of Bogata met in called session on Monday, January 18. They heard and discussed proposals from two companies. Southern Disposal, from Antlers, Oklahoma, represented by Clinton Lewis, and Waste Management of Northeast Texas that was represented by General Manager, Jackie Cannon.

The council heard both speakers and held a discussion as to the relative merits of each company. It was determined at this time to continue negotiations with Northeast Texas Waste Management.

With new EPA regulations going into effect on October 1, 1993 the landfill costs will increase and will result in the companies having to

pass the cost on to the city and it's customers. This additional cost is regrettable but new regulations are making the landfill operators conform to so many new methods of landfill operation that it is costing them amounts they can't absorb to come into compliance with these regulations. Therefore, this cost must be passed on to the customers.

Regardless of whether negotiations continue with this or another company or whether the city continues pickup under the present system, rates will substantially increase.

The next City Council meeting will be February 8 at which time the city hopes to finalize negotiations.

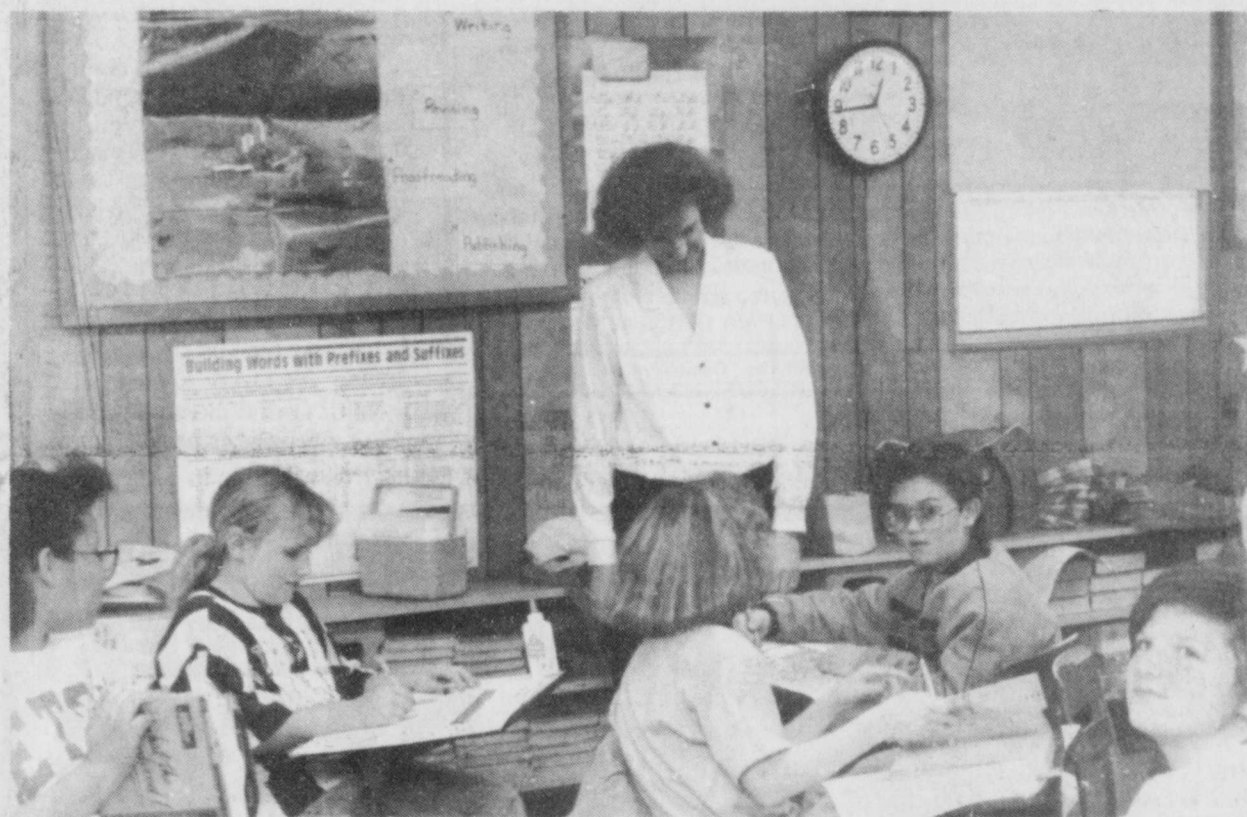
Maxine Scott graduated from Uvalde High School and attended Sul Ross University where she received her Bachelor of Science degree in 1964 and Master of Education

Country Cooking

Until recently, I had always thought that the reason I could not stay slim and trim was because I could not stick with a diet. Now we learn that the diet is at fault. For the last 30 years, I have gone on the latest diets. I'd lose 20 pounds and gain back 30. This is called yo-yo-ing. I have yo-yo-ed myself to heights I could never have imagined. Donald and Tana also yo-yo. We are soon to start an un-diet. Actually, Tana has already started and is losing weight once again. Donald will start on a Monday. Donald starts everything next Monday. I'm still working on my frame of mind. Just as soon as I get my mind right, I plan to start on an eating program that I should be able to live with.

Experts have discovered that instead of having a large T-bone with a small salad and baked potato, we should have large portions of vegetables, fruits and breads with thin slivers of meat. The un-diet focuses on the absence of all but a small amount of fat grams and almost guarantees that I will never be hungry at

any time.

The foods which I should eat are all things that I like. There are also many new, almost fatless recipes. So what is the problem? Why should I have to work on my frame of mind if I know that I'm not going to be hungry? I guess this compelling craving I suddenly have for sausage, ham, avocados, olives and other foods which are filled with fat grams stems from the fact that the forbidden is so much desirable than the things which are allowed.

Come next Monday, or some other Monday, if you happen to see Donald or me, and we look gaunt and emaciated, please resist the temptation to offer us rich, delicious treats. You could be guilty of leading us astray from our un-diet.

The recipes this week come from a new cookbook I have. Most of the dishes are practically fat free. If you try one and it doesn't quite measure up, try to get satisfaction from thinking about how slim and trim we are going to be.

Tijuana Bean Dip
1-16 oz. can pinto beans, undrained, mashed
1 cup Alpine Lace or Kraft Free Cheese
Jalapeno peppers, chopped (to taste)
1/4 cup chopped green onions
1 medium tomato, chopped
1 Tbsp. salsa or taco sauce
1/2 tsp. lemon juice
Microwave beans, cheese, peppers, and onions in 1 1/2 qt. microwavable dish. Cover with waxed paper and microwave 4-5 minutes until cheese is melted. Stir after 2 minutes. Stir in tomato, salsa and lemon juice. Serve with Guiltless Gourmet Tortilla Chips.

Chinese Chicken Salad
2 cups cooked boned, skinless chicken breasts, cubed
4 oz. sliced water chestnuts, drained
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 lb. seedless green grapes
1/2 cup fat free sour cream
1/4 cup fat free Ranch dressing
1 tsp. curry powder
1 tsp. soy sauce
1 tsp. lemon juice
Mix chicken, water chestnuts and celery. Blend together the sour cream, fat free dressing, curry powder, soy sauce and lemon juice. Pour over chicken mixture. Stir in grapes. Chill several hours.

Homemade Low Fat Pizza
Crust:
1 pkg. dry yeast
1 cup warm water
1 tsp. sugar
2 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
Dissolve yeast in 1/4 cup warm water, add sugar and let stand 10 minutes. Add remaining water, flour and salt and beat well until dough is completely smooth. Dough will be sticky, but no kneading is required. Place dough in bowl sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Cover and let

rise until doubled. About 1 hour. Divide dough in half and let stand 10 minutes. Dough will be very elastic. Roll out into 2 8 inch crusts.
Basic Sauce:
1 can Chunky Spaghetti Sauce
1-6 oz. can tomato paste
1/2 lb. ground turkey (skinned and drained)
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
1/2 tsp. dried basil
1/4 tsp. dried oregano
1/2 tsp. thyme

Toppings:
1-8 oz. can drained mushroom pieces
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
2 cups grated non-fat Alpine Lace Mozzarella cheese
Place crust on cookie sheet sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Spoon sauce mixture on top of two crusts. Top with any combination of the above choices. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake at 450 for 8-10 minutes. (Check the fats in your ground turkey. Sometimes they don't differ from lean ground beef.)

Rich Fudge Brownies
1 cup packed brown sugar
3/4 cup sugar
1 cup all purpose flour
3 eggs beaters
1/4 cup applesauce
1/4 cup light corn syrup
1/4 cup cocoa
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup grape-nuts cereal (optional)
1/2 jar Braum's Lite Fudge Topping
Combine sugars, flour, Egg Beaters, applesauce, corn syrup and cocoa. Mix until well blended. Stir in vanilla and grape nuts if desired. Spread in a 13x9x2 inch glass baking dish that has been sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Bake at 350 for 25 minutes or until done. Cool in pan on wire rack. Frost with Braum's Topping if desired.

Learning What Happiness Means

Some of the most popular ideas about what makes people happy are incorrect.

Studies by psychologists have measured little difference in happiness between teenagers, males and females, the middle-aged and the elderly. Knowing whether someone is rich or poor, black or white, healthy or handicapped, does not make it possible to predict how happy that person is likely to be.

Generally, people are as happy today as their parents were 30 years ago. Researchers say that external circumstances have little effect on psychological well-being. They agree that the following four inner traits foster happiness:

SELF ESTEEM - Those who are happy like themselves. They protect themselves from anxiety and depression by feeling good about themselves. Those who believe positive things about themselves suffer less from ulcers and insomnia and are less likely to abuse drugs. They tend to be more resistant to pressures and to conform and are more persistent at difficult tasks.

PERSONAL CONTROL - Americans who have a strong sense that they control their own lives and feel satisfied and themselves are twice as likely to be very happy as the national average. Those who agree with statements like what happens to me is my own doing or the average person can influence government decisions typically do better in school, cope better with stress and live more happily than those who lack that sense of personal control. Those given little control over their environment, such as prisoners or even people in nursing homes, suffer from lower morale, greater stress and worse health.

OPTIMISM - Optimistic people tend to be healthier as well as happier. They suffer less from illnesses and tend to recover better. Positive thinkers get positive results, succeeding better in business than pessimists. However, unrealistic optimism can make people believe they are invulnerable and stop them from taking sensible steps to avoid danger.

SOCIALIZING - Those who are more sociable and outgoing tend to be happier and more satisfied with life than introverts. Extroverts are cheerful and high-spirited people who like themselves. When they meet strangers, they are confident the strangers will like them as well.

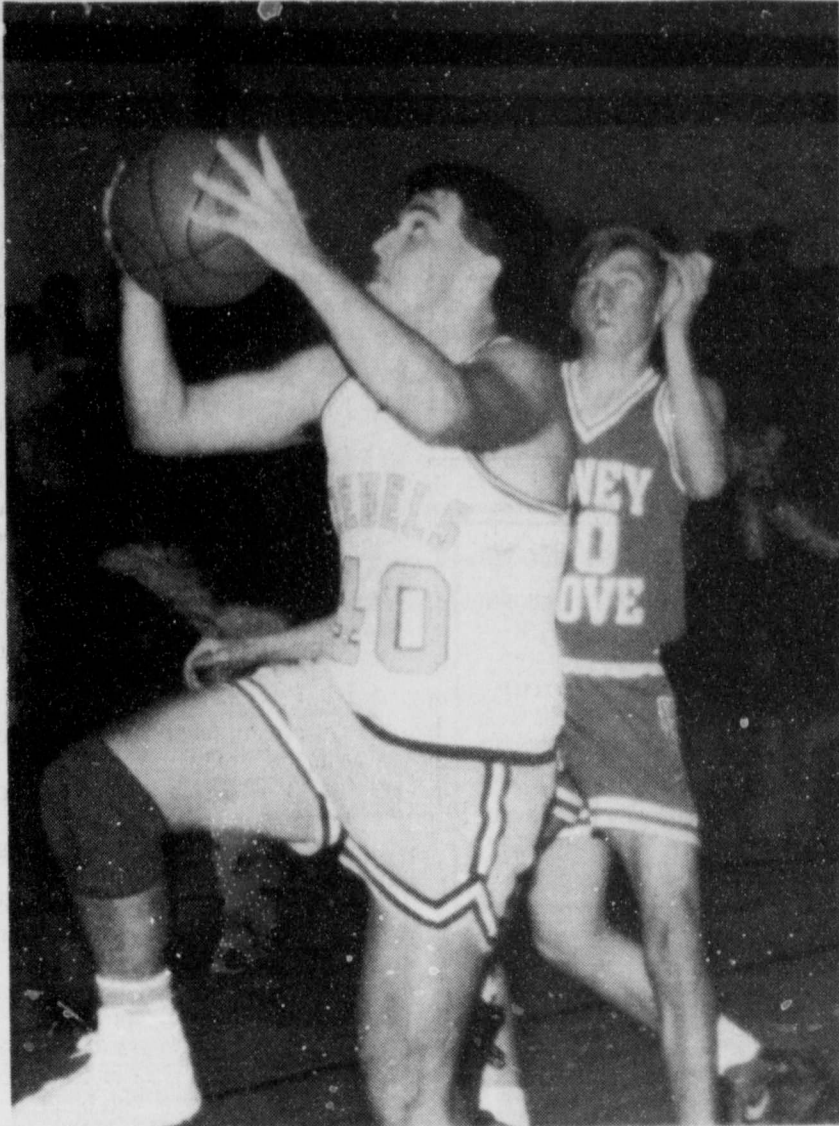
quarter as the Rebels pushed the lead to 36-30 at the half-time.
