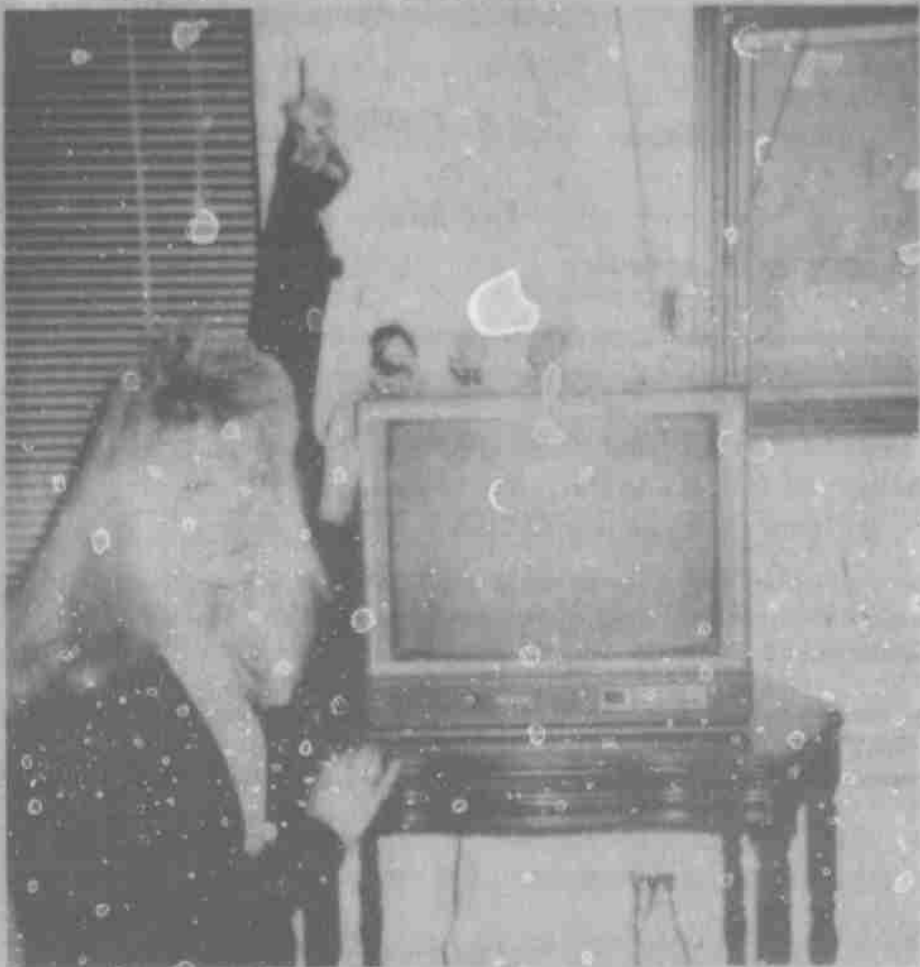

### Trial Continues In Farm Workers Suit For Economic Justice

On December 4, 1989, farm workers in class action lawsuit will continue seeking economic justice in the federal court in Lubbock. The first three days of testimony showed that farmworkers who hoed cotton for farmers in the Brownfield area were paid far less than the minimum wage during 1984, 1985, and part of 1986. The testifying farmers acknowledged they had paid less than the minimum wage of \$3.35 an hour.

After three days of testimony, Federal Judge Sam Cummings ordered a

one-day break and ordered that the case resume on Monday of this week (December 4, 1989) in the Bankruptcy Courtroom of the Federal Courthouse in Lubbock. Represented by Texas Rural Legal Aid in Plainview, the farm workers have almost completed presenting their side of the case against the crew leader and twenty-one farmers.

"We have had good community support for the stand these farm workers have taken in this case," said TRLA attorney D. Milo Mumgaard. "Many important members of the farm

worker community have attended the proceedings, and the farm workers have been encouraged by that support, especially since they have travelled many miles from their homes in

the Rio Grande Valley to stand up for their rights in court. If anyone wants more information about how to get to federal court, please call us toll-free at 1-800-356-5846."

The time will be 7 p. m., please arrive early to be seated before the lights are dimmed and the program begins. Friday, Saturday,

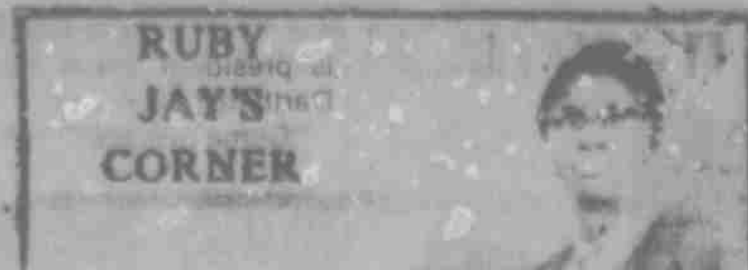

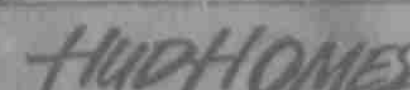

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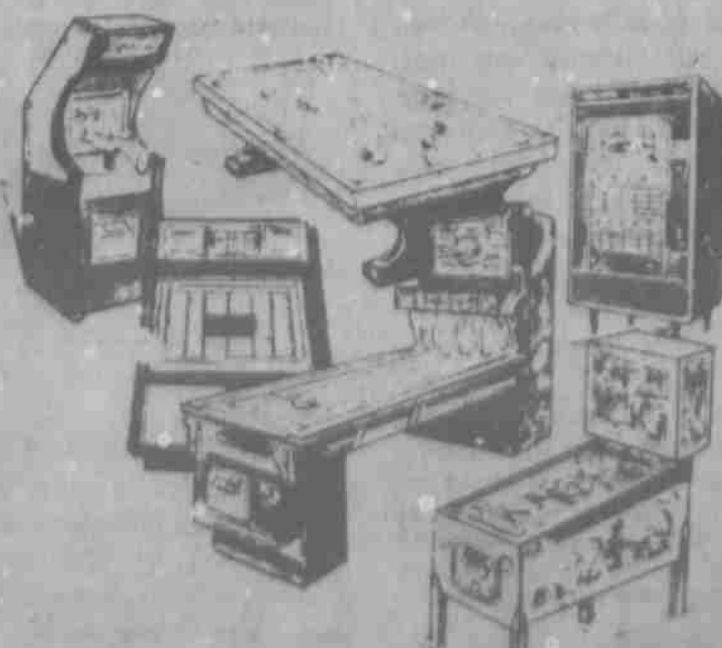

## Guest Editorial Let's Not Get In A Hurry?

Recently a ruling by District Judge Lucius Bunton of Midland has forced the state and local governments to change the way that District and County Court at law judges are elected from an at-large system to a single member district voting system. The Judge ordered that the system be changed by January 3rd or he would consider barring the 1990 election for judges in Lubbock and the other eight counties affected by the ruling.

Since the ruling many editorials and letters have been published first saying that the federal government and its judges have no right to tell us who is going to represent us and how we are supposed to elect them. Lawmakers in Austin are currently talking about change the way in which judges are elected by first freezing all elections until 1993 and then having them appointed by the governor and then approved by the voters in a "retention" election.

Lubbock's Senator John T. Montford, Lt. Governor Bill Hobby, House Speaker Gib Lewis and Governor Bill Clements all favor the idea. All claim that by freezing elections it would show a "good faith" to change elections as Judge Bunton has ordered.

In the words of Sen. Montford, "My feeling is let's not get in a hurry."

In a hurry? The ruling by Judge Bunton was hailed by minorities as a step toward justice and a step toward minorities finally getting what was guaranteed to us by the Constitution of the United States. To be represented by our own. It is a step that was long overdue.

It is not surprising that lawmakers are, after so many years of an unconstitutional system and as they are about to lose dozens of judicial seats which have been controlled by the majority, now want to keep control by now having them appointed in order to "have a better qualified, higher caliber and more representative judiciary," as the Lubbock A-J has stated.

The judges' "qualifications" were never questioned until minorities have the right to elect them.

No, elections should not be frozen until 1993. Three more years of not being represented cannot be condoned. We must have our representation now and not be ignored as we have for so long.

We are not in a hurry. We have waited 200 years.

Washington, D. C. -- Reverend James L. Bevel, and hundreds of citizens in the nation's capital, have taken a major step to counter what they deem "a national problem of racial and religious discrimination." In their WAR against racism in the media, the Bevel-led Washingtonians Against Racism (WAR), has taken out full page ads in many of the city's new publications to highlight the discriminatory patterns of

Bill Regardie, the publisher of Regardie's magazine, a D.C.-based business publication. The paid advertisement provides examples of how Bill Regardie uses his magazine as a forum to espouse his brand of bigotry against people of different races and religion. The WAR ad seeks to enlist the aid of activists and business leaders.

According to WAR spokesman William Reed, "The Open Letter to the public ad documents a pattern of racist acts by the magazine and its publisher. We are asking local citizens and the influential business



community to direct their individual and collective actions to promote racial and religious harmony and cease any actions that would support the type of publication that Regardie has distributed."

"When Regardie's people state that they can't find any qualified blacks for their editorial staff in a city that has the highest concentration of educated blacks in the country, I say that's ridiculous," states Reed. "But what makes it even more sublime is that

they use a 'white only' editorial staff to speak to and for a city that is 70 percent black. Regardie's presents a plantation mentality that many of us Field Folk are not going to take anymore."

William Reed is a business journalist who chairs the Media Networking Forum in the World Media Association, and is co-chair to Rev. Bevel in the WAR group. Bevel is the former Chief Strategist to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

The WAR group is hoping that the "Open Letter" ad

will pressure Bill Regardie to seek editorial input from community and religious leaders for his publication; motivate business executives to contact Regardie about his magazine's policies toward the large consumer group he has offended; encourage

citizens to spend time visiting Regardie's advertisers; and garner contributions from citizens and businesses. The group also sent personal letters to Regardie's advertisers.

## Health Editorial:

### Sebaceous Cysts

Sebaceous cysts occur in hair-bearing areas and are found in the neck with some regularity. They are superficial, dome-shaped masses and are usually detectable on visual examination. Sebaceous cysts grow slowly and are painless unless secondarily infected. They range in size from a few millimeters to centimeters. Smaller cysts may have an enlarged pore on the surface. Some situated in the neck will be movable over the deeper structures because considerable mobility of the masses arising within the skin or dermis in this area.

Secondary infection is quite common and produces pain. Recurrent episodes of infection with enlargement of the cyst and purulent drainage are a common sequence of events. The sebaceous cyst may be differentiated from other cysts by the fact that they are located superficially in the skin. A sebaceous cyst is not a serious medical condition, but because of the simplicity of removal and the tendency toward secondary infection, excisional biopsy is recommended. This will also correctly identify the occasional skin tumor that could be clinically mistaken for a cyst. Suitable antibiotics should be administered if the sebaceous cyst is infected. Remember, lesions which occur in hairy areas of the head and neck may not always be as they seem. Seek professional treatment if something with your body doesn't seem normal.

When a brand new parking lot is striped, the charge isn't taxable because it's part of the original construction. But restriping is like remodeling, and remodeling services are taxable. So yes, you should pay sales tax.

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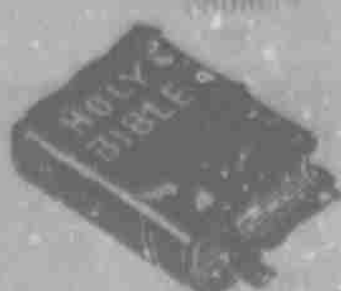

Trees provide many benefits — shade, beauty, windbreak, privacy, cleaner air, less noise, less glare and higher property values to name a few. But the key to these benefits is to select the right tree and plant it in the right place.

consider in selecting your trees, including temperature, moisture, light and soil conditions, and other factors such as pests and air pollution.

Factors such as the tree's purpose need to be considered as well. If a tree's purpose is to provide shade, tall wide-crown deciduous trees are best. The guide points out that you should plan for where you want the shade during the hottest time of the year and the time of day you desire the shade. Because the sun is located overhead during the summer, for example, shade trees planted to the south side of a building are generally less effective than those planted to the east and west.

One of the most common mistakes in selecting trees is mismatching the tree's ultimate size with the planting site. "The Right Tree for the Right Place" includes a spacing guide for a variety of common trees.

The guide also contains tips for selecting trees for accents and form, and shape, color and texture factors to consider.

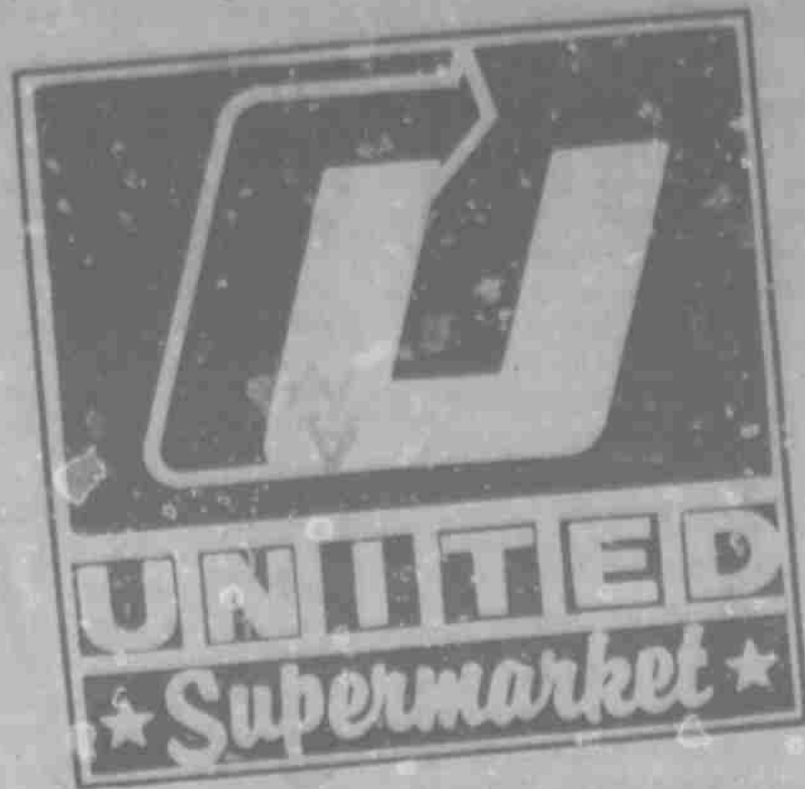

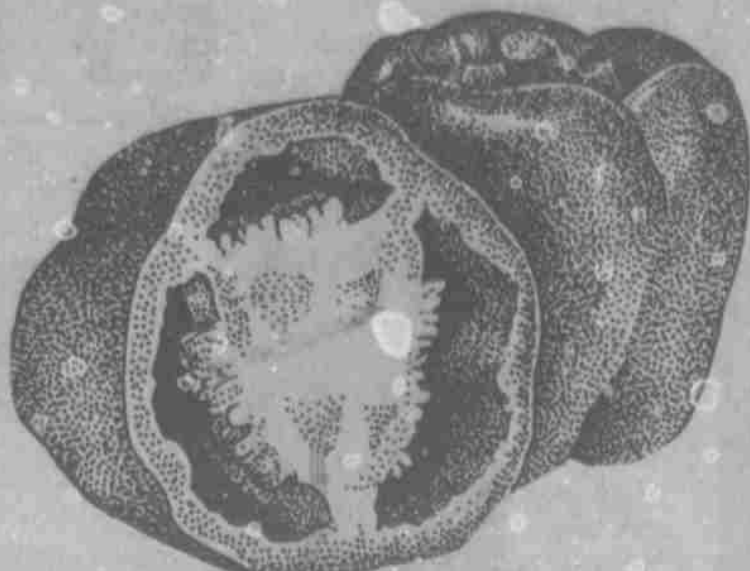
