Stovall was listed on the all-district offensive squad as an end and to the defensive squad as a cornerback. This is the second consecutive year Stovall has been named to the all-district squad.

Bob Wiman, tackle, was listed to the all-district offensive squad along with Robert Haseloff, a guard. Gary Erwin received honorable mention to the all-district offensive squad.

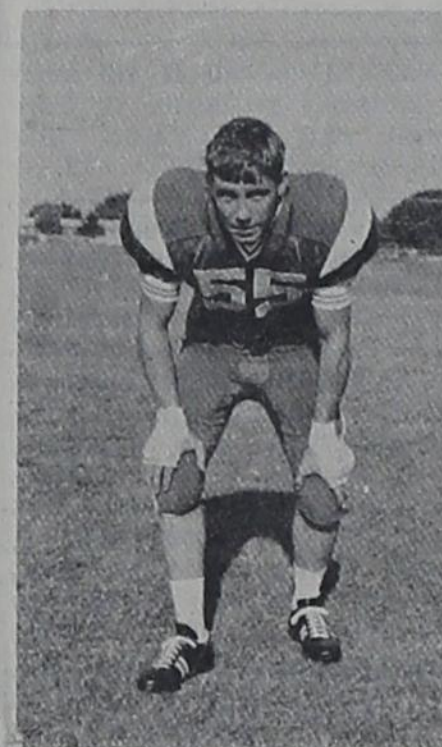

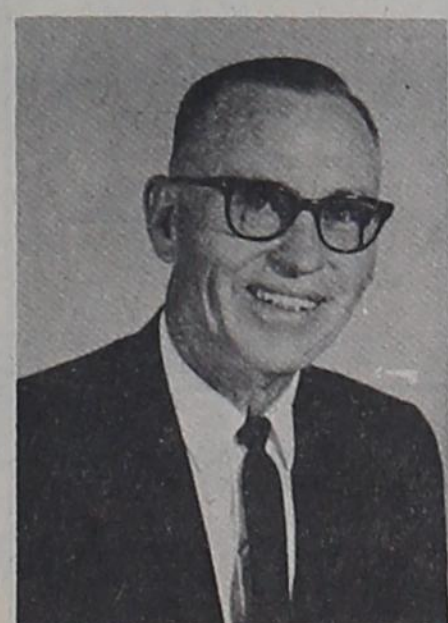

The Farwell Steers extracted a bit of revenge from Petersburg Tuesday night as they coasted by the Buffs 53-36. The Steer cagers put out a good overall effort as they led the entire contest with east, hitting 37% from the field and picking up 15 steals at the expense of the Buffaloes. Greg Hargrove was high point man for Farwell with 14 points, followed by Dean Stovall and Danny Prince with 10 each. Prince also led the rebounding with 12. Bobby Willis had 12 points to lead the Petersburg effort.

In summing up the last four games, Coach Vernon Scott stated that team progress to date has been satisfactory, but the team has not played an entire game up to its capabilities. However, one performance made by team member Dean Stovall needs to be noted, said Coach Scott, adding, "In the game with Morton at the Friona tournament, Stovall had a total of 27 rebounds and 29 points. I have never been associated with a team anywhere with a member turning in such a fantastic performance."

In the Tuesday night game

with Petersburg the first six minutes of play was great, said Scott, with the Steers performing well, however, after that time it was the same story - the boys just not playing the game they are capable of, the coach concluded.

The game with Nazareth has been cancelled for Friday night; however, Coach Scott is trying to line up a replacement. The Steers will play Harther Tuesday night, Dec. 16. "Hart has one boy who is 6'7" and another player who is 6'6"; therefore, we will have our work cut out for us," said Coach Scott in conclusion.

Regional Title Slips By Lazbuddie

Although they were hampered by injuries and illnesses to key players for the regional contest Friday night, the Lazbuddie Longhorns made a fine showing against the Throckmorton Greyhounds, the same team which beat them in the regional title game last year.

When the final whistle had blown in the game played at Crosbyton the Throckmorton team was victor 20-8. However, no one could say anything disrespectful about the Lazbuddie Longhorns, the team that "just wouldn't quit!"

Derrill Matthews, Lazbuddie's top ground gainer half-back, was severely hampered by a serious ankle injury which he had prior to the Friday game. His injury was quite apparent as he could not move with his usual agility and speed which he

had displayed throughout the year, although he played the entire game.

In addition to the injury which hampered Matthews, the Longhorns were playing minus four players who were injured or ill. End Mike Casey had the

measles; fullback Larry Hodges had a dislocated shoulder which he received in the Lazbuddie-Groom bi-district game; half-back Arthur Graves had rib injuries, and end Charles Lee had the flu. Roque Flores was injured in the regional game and had to be replaced. Freshmen and sophomores did a fine job in replacing the ill and injured upper classmen, report the Longhorn coaches.

Lazbuddie scored two points in the first stanza with only

three minutes remaining following a Throckmorton penalty. The Throckmorton quarterback was trapped behind the goal line by Jimmy Noland and Terry Scott to give Lazbuddie a two-point lead.

Matthews managed to break through in the next few plays for a 35-yard gain before he was brought down from behind. Shortly thereafter Roque Flores, 135 pound guard, bombed the Throckmorton quarterback to bring up a 10-yard loss for the Greyhounds. A 15-yard penalty against the Longhorns helped to set up the first Greyhound TD. With only 1:08 remaining in the first half, Randy Nichols blasted over from the Lazbuddie one to make it a 6-2 game. Joe Whittaker put the pigskin between the goal posts to make it 7-2 for Throckmorton.

During the third period of play Throckmorton controlled the ball most of the way, holding the Longhorns in their own territory and without a first down. With 5:25 remaining in the third period Johnny Martin caught a Nichols pass from 20 yards out to make it a 14-2 game. This was following a called back TD by Throckmorton earlier in the third frame.

In the final period of play Johnny Jones broke loose at the Lazbuddie 36 and went all alone into the end zone for the final Throckmorton TD. Whittaker kicked the PAT and the Throckmorton scoring ended at 20.

A series of passes, combining brother talents, eventually set up the lone Longhorn TD in the waning minutes of the game. Two passes from Monte Barnes to Mark Barnes brought the ball downfield within the shadow of the goal posts.

Monte Barnes passed to Jimmy Noland, with Noland making a spectacular catch in the end zone to put the Longhorns on the scoreboard for six more points. Matthews attempted to go into the end zone for two additional points but was unable to hold onto the ball.

Lazbuddie threatened later in the game; however, Throckmorton intercepted the pass and managed to hold onto the ball until time ran out.

Season record for the Lazbuddie Longhorns ended 10-2, with their only losses during the season to Bovina of the Class 3-A district and to Throckmorton.

A new age limit for blood donors has been set by the American Red Cross and the American Association of Blood Banks. Blood now will be accepted from donors up to the 66th birthday.

The old age limit was 61. Healthier older Americans and an increased need for blood caused the change. Demand for blood is rising about 12 per cent each year.

Those giving blood must be in good health and meet the requirements for donors.

Shopping for a CHRISTMAS TREE always is exciting.

First, you decide where you're going to put the tree and what size it should be. Will a tall, stately fir look good in the living room or should you get a shorter, fuller tree like pine and put it in the family room?

Choose the spot carefully, because a Christmas tree shouldn't be near a fireplace, radiator, television set, or other source of heat. Then, with the perfect spot picked out and the size of the tree figured, you can decide about the kind of tree you want.

Scotch pine, a fast-growing tree that holds up well through the holiday season, is about the most popular Christmas tree. Most varieties of Scotch pine have bushy branches and long needles (up to 3 inches) like most other pine trees. Douglas fir, which has short, soft needles that are attached all around the twig, is second on the list of favorites. Balsam fir has short, rather rounded needles and twigs that grow at right angles to the branches so they look like crosses. Eastern red cedar, a relative of the juniper tree, looks graceful and feathery, with its small, scale-like

WHAT IS LIVESTOCK?
Livestock are animals that are bred and raised in the Western States to keep the producer broke and the buyer crazy. Livestock are born in the spring, mortgaged in the summer, pastured in the fall and given away in the winter. They vary in size, color and weight, and the man who can guess the nearest to the weight and market grade is called a livestock buyer by the public, a robber by the rancher, and a poor businessman by the banker.

The price of livestock is determined in Chicago and goes up after you have sold and down after you have bought. A buyer from a Montana packer was sent to Chicago to watch the livestock market, and after a few days deliberation he wired his company to this effect: "Some say the market will go up and some say it will go down; I say the same, whatever you do will be wrong. Act at once." When you have light cattle the buyers want heavy ones;

when you feed heifers, you find they want steers and vice versa; when they're thin, they should be fat, and when your steers are fat, the buyer tells you the market on tallow is all shot. You got 'em too doggone fat.

Noyes County Bee Director

Jim Noyes, Bovina Junior High School principal, is the 1970 Spelling Bee Director for Parmer County.

Sometime before April 1, the Parmer County Bee will be held and the champion will go to Amarillo on April 25, 1970, for the annual regional Bee elimination to choose a regional winner. The regional winner will win an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D. C. the first week in June.

Last year Glenda Sublett whose guardians are Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Moss was the Parmer County Champion. She was an eighth grader in Farwell Junior High School.

The 1970 Golden Spread Bee will be co-sponsored by West Texas State University and the Amarillo Globe-News. L. J. (Jack) Edmondson, West Texas State University Director of Public Services, will be Bee Director for the Golden Spread. Again there will be a secondary contest -- unique only in the Golden Spread Bee -- open to contestants from the sixth and lower grades. These juniors will be guests of the Amarillo Globe-News at the Regional Bee on April 25, but will not spell unless they represent the senior division, also.

Tami Haseloff was the County Junior Champion for 1969. She is the daughter of Mrs. Jewel Haseloff and was a fifth grader in the Farwell School. The first place winner in the Regional Bee will go to Washington as the district champion. The Washington trip includes several sightseeing trips and entertainment, the annual Bee banquet and presentation of awards. The Golden Spread winner will also receive a traveling plaque to be placed in the winners school.

Other outstanding prizes will be available. They include a Zenith portable television, a 24-volume set of Encyclopaedia Britannica, a copy of the Lincoln Library, Britannica World Atlas, and cash prizes. Each County Champion receives an engraved plaque and gold pin. 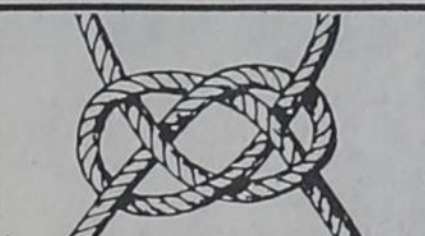

There's lots of table talk going around in decorating circles these days. The idea is, of course, to "do your own thing" when you set the table for breakfast, lunch or dinner.

As with fashion in clothing or home furnishing, the traditional is OUT, the innovative is IN at the table. At least, that's what makes the news these days.

For example, some of the best ideas are gleaned from the table settings at Tiffany's. Long famous for their unusual displays of fine china, crystal and silver combinations, they're considered the epitome of innovative dining.

Always understated (and expensive) but never stilted, their table settings feature such combinations as Wedgwood's Drab ware on a Chipendale table or on a butcher block table. The trick is to have color, textures, patterns in unexpected mixtures.

Typical would be a large silver bowl heaped with lemons as a centerpiece on a rattan table. Elaborate hand-painted floral china might bloom against a custom-made floral tablecloth. Or a demi tasse and saucer could appear as a cigarette holder and ashtray.

Castor Bean Research Continues

Funds will be available again for castor bean research in the Texas High Plains during 1970, according to Agriculture Commissioner, John C. White and State Representative, Ralph Wayne of Plainview.

The joint announcement was made recently from Austin following a study of the appropriations bill passed by the Legislature this past summer. The amount will exceed \$25,000, it was announced.

The High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway, is recipient of these funds, Rep. Wayne announced. This is the third year the research foundation has received state funds for castor research.

Rep. Wayne praised Commissioner White and the Texas Department of Agriculture for their continued support of this project in the High Plains area.

"Purpose of the study is to develop castor beans into a meaningful cash crop for High Plains farmers. The bean is used extensively for oil products and can become an important addition to the state agricultural scheme," Wayne said.

A second goal of the research is to learn effective means of controlling the production so that it will leave a "clean field" for another crop the following season. "Castor beans can be a good crop in the field one year and then a nuisance the next if the land is planted to cotton or feed," Commissioner White pointed out. "So we have to determine the most efficient and economical ways to grow it -- and a good method of killing it."

Rep. Wayne noted that research also will be towards the usage of both "growth and control" chemicals, developing new uses for the bean, a study of best planting and harvesting periods, and a strengthening of castor bean varieties.

"Field work is conducted by Texas Department of Agriculture on a year-around basis. Information compiled will be of great benefit to the entire state," Wayne said.

4 cups peeled apple slices (about 1/4 inch)	2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

Heat oven to moderate (350°F.). Stir oats into briskly boiling salted water. Cook 1 minute for quick oats, stirring occasionally; cook 5 minutes for old fashioned oats. Cover pan; set aside.

Saute apples in butter over medium heat 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add sugar; cook over low heat, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat; stir in raisins and pumpkin pie spice.

Starting with the oatmeal and ending with the fruit mixture, alternate layers of oatmeal and fruit mixture in a greased 2-quart baking dish or casserole. Bake uncovered in preheated oven (350°F.) 20 to 25 minutes or until edges bubble vigorously. Serve warm with milk or cream.

*The oatmeal may be cooked ahead of time, covered and refrigerated until used. If cold oatmeal is used, stir oatmeal before layering in casserole and bake 30 to 35 minutes.

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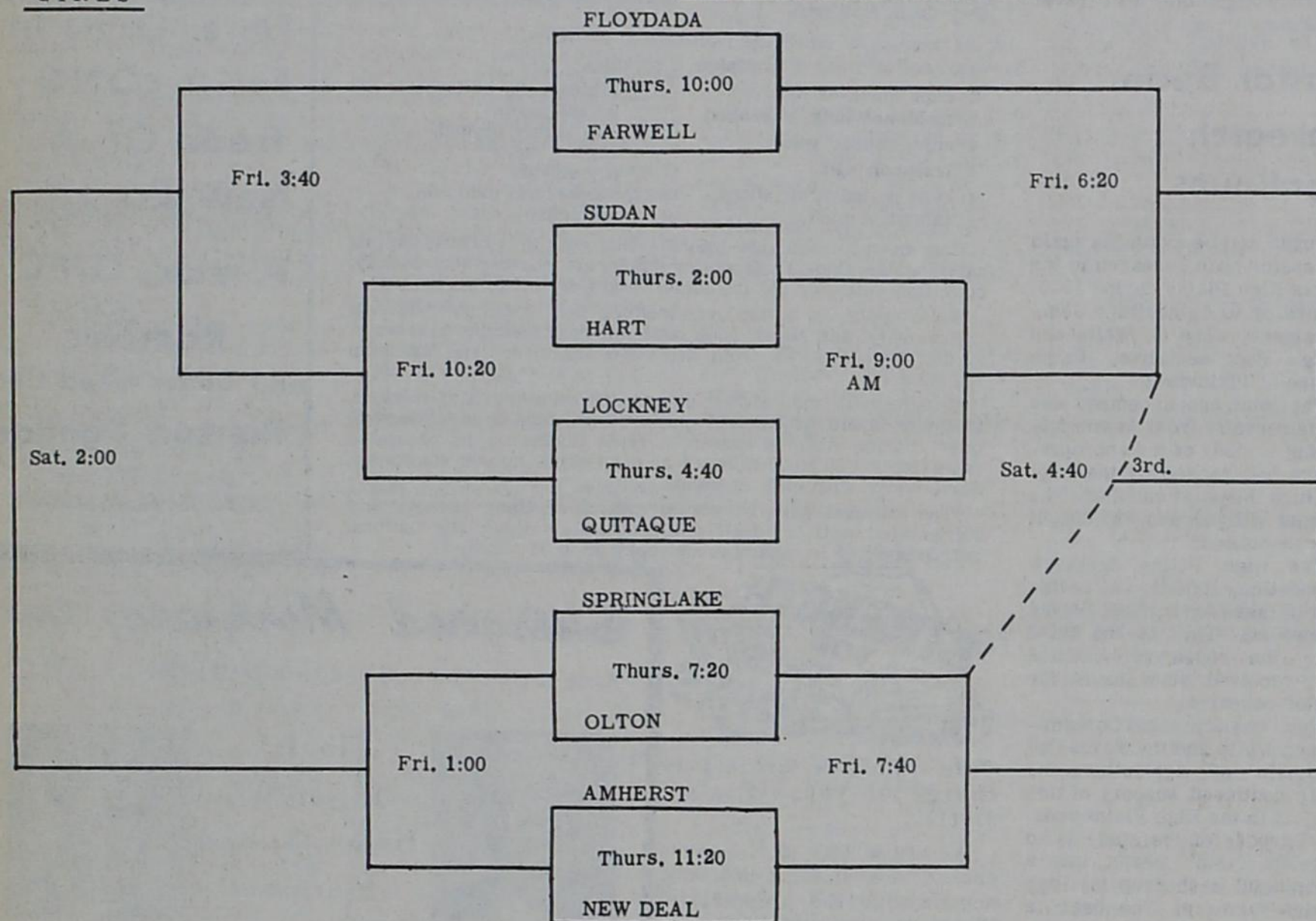

Scouts Discover Old Mining Claim

Twelve members of Texico-Farwell Boy Scout Troop 200 joined Scoutmaster Gene Bitner the weekend of November 29 in hikes through the old mining country near Corona, N.M. As the temperature plunged to 13 degrees during the night, the troop "bunked" in Corona's Scout Cabin, which has been used each year by Texico-Farwell boys since 1966.

Highlight of the trip was the discovery of an old mining claim, which detailed positions for copper mining. The document, originally dated as December 24, 1938, was found by Scouts Alan McCleskey and Tim Bradshaw in an old Velvet Pipe Tobacco can. Found near the entrance to one of the many old shafts in the area, the paper designated "a mining claim upon the said vein, lode, or deposit, together with all its daps, spurs, and angles, to be named the Rio Tinto Mining Claim."

With the original entered in the mining records of Lincoln County by Jack A. Payne, the copy found in the tobacco can stated its location as "being 300 feet on each side of the middle of the vein at the sur-

face thereof, where this notice is posted in can, in stone and post monument." The notice had the official stamp of New Mexico Copper Mining Company.

Discovery and exploration by the Scouts required 8.5 miles of hiking which has been credited to their advancement. Several boys also earned partial requirements of their First Class and Merit Badge Cooking, by preparing meals for the entire troop. With the exception of "Sloppy Joes" prepared in two pots before departure Sunday afternoon, all meals were cooked on hot coals in foil. Troop members devoured 6.5 pounds of ground round, seven potatoes, six units of canned meat two packages of cheese, 132 cookies, one and a half gallons of punch, two gallons of milk, and assorted trimmings, including 24 hamburger buns. Attending the monthly outing

by Troop 200 were McCleskey, Bradshaw, Randy Stovall, Donnie Garner, Kent Gast, Kevin Ford, Scott Watkins, Phillip Jackson, Max Winkles, Terry Williams, Chip Craft, and Brad Owens.

Troop 200 is sponsored by Farwell First Baptist Church, and meets in the upstairs Scout rooms each Monday night at 7:30. Membership includes boys from Texico, Farwell, Oklahoma Lane, Lariat, and Clovis.
