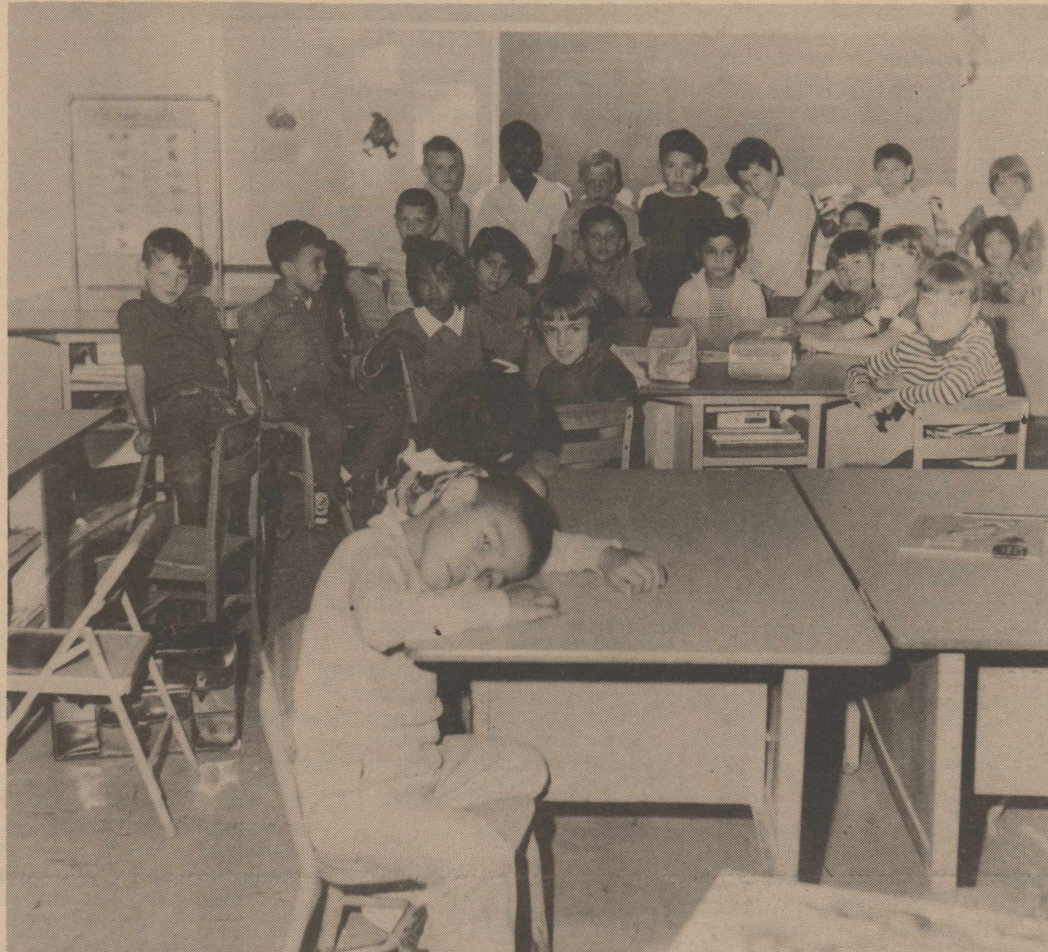

Producer-Director Election To Be Held At Sept. 10 Meet

Castro County cotton producers and agribusiness men will elect a producer-director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in a meeting called for that purpose at 8 p. m., Sept. 10, in the Community Room of the First State Bank, Dimmitt.

Announcement of the meeting comes from Edd McLeroy of Dimmitt, businessman director of the 25-county commodity organization, and Ray Joe Riley

of Hart, Producer director. All farmers and businessmen are eligible to participate in the election of PCG directors. Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a cotton producer and the other a businessman. They serve two-year terms, with businessmen directors elected on odd years and producer directors on even years.

In addition to the election,

the meeting will include a report from the PCG staff on the status of farm legislation this year in Washington. "There is nothing on cotton's horizon right now of greater importance than getting a cotton program passed," Riley stated, "and every cotton-minded person in Castro County should be vitally interested in what his cotton organization on the Plains is doing in that regard."

Also urging that all interested people be on hand for the meeting, McLeroy said, "Directors to PCG are the men who determine the organization policy on legislation, research, promotion, finances and other matters which play a big part in the Castro County economy."

Savings Bonds Sales Told

Judge R. E. Wilson, Chairman of the Castro County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Castro county totaled \$2,285 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$22,831 for 38 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$60,000.

July sales in Texas amounted to \$15,434,922 compared to \$15,058,788 during the same period of 1969 --- an increase of 2.4 per cent. Year-to-date

sales were \$106,206,174, while the 1969 sales totaled \$104,261,845 -- a 1.8 per cent increase.

National sales during the month were \$402 million -- 1.2 per cent above 1969 July sales. During the first seven months sales were \$2.9 billion for 62 per cent of the national goal of \$4.7 billion. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Savings Bonds amounting to \$23 million were reported for July, compared to last July's \$19 million.
