The Colorado City Kiwanis Club will have an open consignment farm equipment and related items auction on Saturday, March 20.

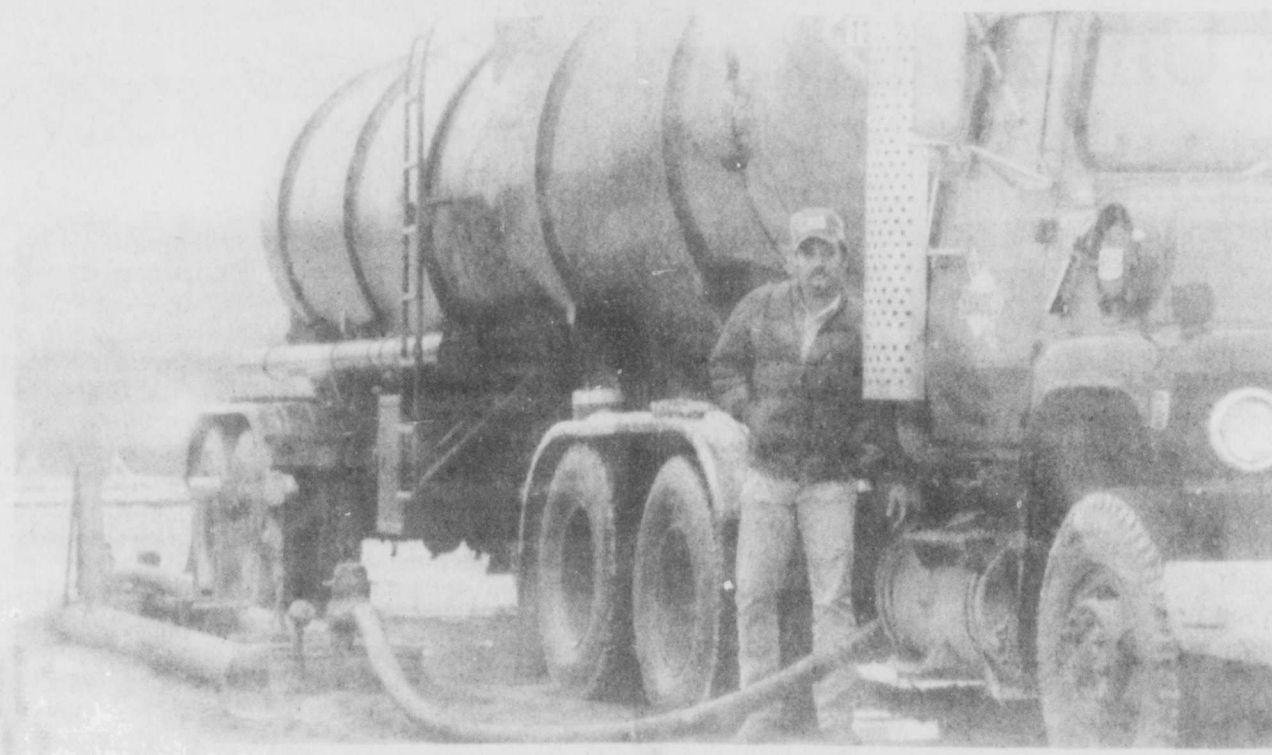

City Council Considers Park Request

Felix Franco addressed the Colorado City Council Tuesday evening when the City Council met in a called session.

Franco requested assistance from the city in building a park in the sands area, to be located on the corner of Fig and Principal Streets. The Council authorized Rick Crowley, city manager, to work with Franco to make some plans and figure an estimated cost of the project.

Crowley was also authorized to work with Dennis Copper a citizen living adjacent to the sewer treatment plant, to reach a purchase agreement of his block of land.

The Council approved the closing of streets and alleys in blocks 46, 47 and 48, original town of Colorado. After a petition of more than 20 percent of the residents was presented in opposition of a zoning change for lot one block 103, the Council disapproved the change. The zoning change request was to change it from a residential to commercial zone.

The Council passed ordinances 82 and 86 and established a public works department and a Director of Public Works, in which Buzz Rich was appointed the director.

Moore Shines At Conference

A standing ovation from some of Texas' top actors and play directors was given to Colorado City's Marsha Moore and two other amateur actresses for their work in a cutting from "Laundry & Bourbon" at the Texas Non-profit Theatres Conference which was held in Temple on February 19, 20 and 21.

The Colorado City Playhouse was represented at the conference by President Jolyn Mikow and husband, John; Carl and Marsha Moore, and Kent Womack. There were over two hundred actors, directors, designers, technicians and managers at the three day conference which had over 30 hours of workshops, lectures, presentations, meetings and entertainments. Featured at the conference was a workshop on acting techniques which was conducted by the well known comedian-actor, Shelley Berman.

Two thirty-minute scenes were scheduled for the Acting-Directing Marathon Workshop. The scenes, John Osborn's "Look Back in Anger" and Texas author, James McClure's, "Laundry & Bourbon," were cast at a huge audition session on the afternoon of Friday, February 19.

Mavornee Dwyer, artistic director at the Zachary Scott Theatre in Austin, cast Marsha Moore as Hattie in the "Laundry & Bourbon" scene. The scene was rehearsed Friday evening, all-day on Saturday, and then presented on Sunday morning. Moore brought roars of laughter from the potentially critical crowd. At the end of the scene, the Colorado City actress was swarmed with congratulations.

Carl Moore and Kent Womack attended sessions on auditioning techniques and publicity promotions.

Womack also attended the set painting technique workshop and the State Art Plan meeting.

John Mikow, who was also present at the publicity session attended a Community Involvement discussion session that was geared to the minority populations within a community.

President of the Colorado City Playhouse, Mikow, observed several sessions regarding funding and grant application and spent over two hours in a lighting technique workshop.

President Mikow also spent a good deal of time in person-to-person discussions with executives from other theatres who were interested in the methods the Colorado City Playhouse utilizes in operation without the benefit of paid staff. Mikow reported that the benefits of a paid staff manager-director is an aspect that she intends to research further as a possibility for our local group.

Besides the work, the conference participants were treated to the Temple Civic Theatre's production of Neil Simon's "Chapter Two."

Shelley Berman also circulated among the amateurs and very eagerly discussed techniques. He spoke at length with Mrs. Mikow and Moore on the aspects of using improvisation techniques within a rehearsal schedule.

The conference ended Sunday afternoon with a report that the next conference would be held in February of 1983 at the Alley Theatre in Houston. This conference will feature the Texas State Amateur Theatre Festival of One-Act Plays. The Colorado City Playhouse is presently discussing the possibilities of entering the competition.

Cotton Information Day Is Scheduled

All interested persons are invited to the Third Annual Pest Management Cotton Production Information Day today (Monday) in the Colorado City Civic Center beginning at 10 a.m., announced Mitchell County Entomologist Deanna Myers.

Ms. Myers stated the annual information day will feature several keynote speakers delivering presentations on weed control, planting date, fertilizer usage and cotton economics.

The meeting will wrap up at 2 p.m., and there will be a break at noon for a luncheon catered by Al's Bar-b-q of Sweetwater.

Ms. Myers also announced there will be a table set up at the cotton information day with information about the Intensified Scouting Program for 1982. She said that the Pest Management Steering Committee set the cost at \$2 and acre for the 1982 season, noting that the acreage signed up would be scouted once a week.

Ms. Myers added that persons would receive a report of each week's findings and this would help to know when the insects in a particular field were approaching economic infestation levels or levels where their presence would cost more money to leave them alone than it would to treat them.

In conclusion, she said that she would like to extend the invitation to everyone to attend.

Mark Cook of Colorado City reviewed the Home Mission Book "Challenge of the Cities," when Loraine Baptist Women met Thursday, February 18 at the church. Mrs. T. L. Holman, opened the meeting with prayer and read the prayer calendar. Mrs. Leach led the prayer for missionaries whose birthday was on this day.

Cook stated "This book gives a challenge to all Christians." We should ask ourselves what I can do to help these out-casts in large cities, to give them a better life and give them the gospel." The book was written by Mary Knox and photographed by Dan Martin and gives a clear description of what goes on in these large cities. Mugging attacks in Mahanttan, the Bronx, Queens, Brooklyn, all these places alive with people in every walk of life. Southern Baptists have work in all five New York bureaus, half of the churches are non-white. Cook brought a very graphic description of the loneliness, crime, cultural isolation, greed

and poverty in New York and how Baptists are facing these city needs and offering their help. They admit it is a God-sized task. Challenge of 250,000 unemployed, and 36,000 homeless.

He stated Miami, Florida is a city in transition, people there are black, white, brown and in-between. The faces reflect both joy and fear. That city has changed in the past two-three years with the many people coming in from other nations.

Cook stated "Challenge of the Cities" is very important for us. These unfortunate people need help. They need the Gospel. We in our safe homes, open churches, must indeed ask "what can I do." Christians must not take this challenge lightly.

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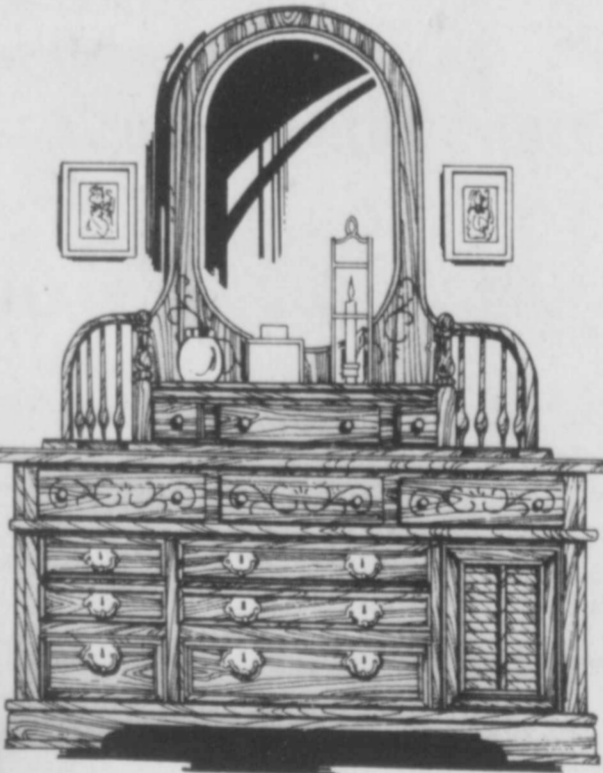
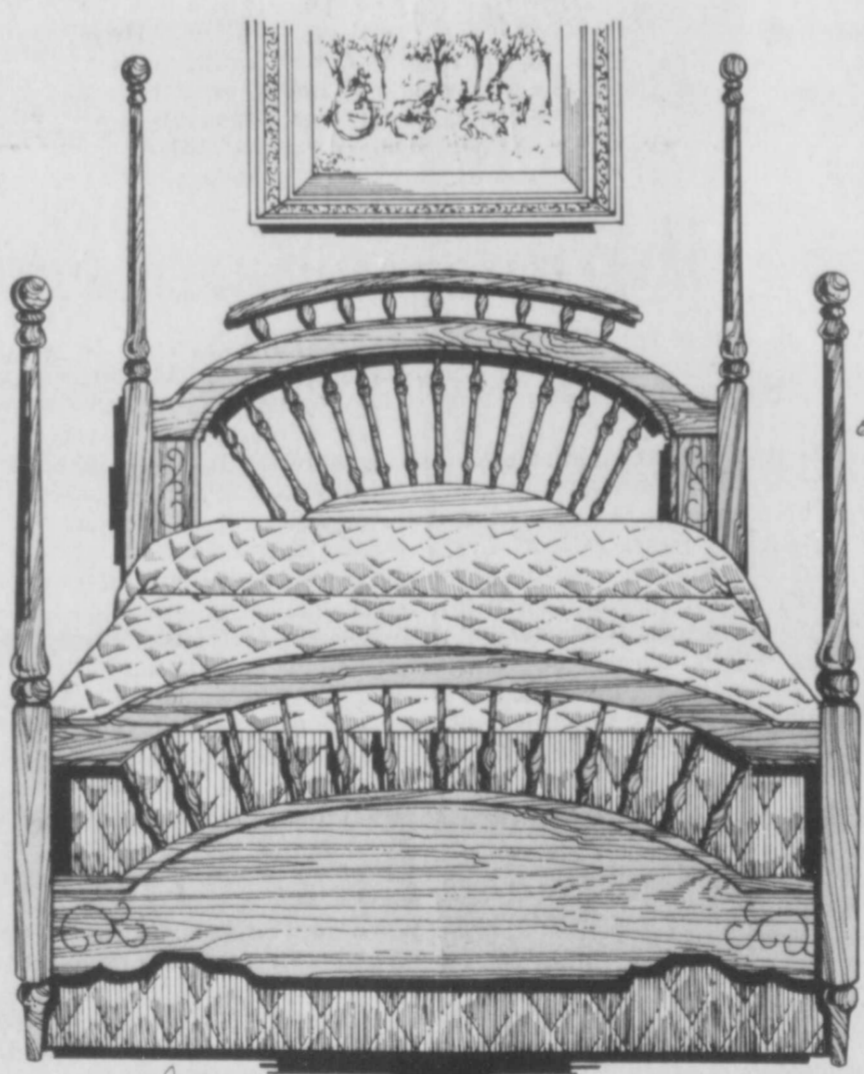

YOU AUTO KNOW
By Aaron Carpenter

Q. My car is backfiring. It is getting worse and I don't know how to fix it.
A. A rattle sound from the tailpipe or carburetor as you accelerate or decelerate usually indicates the spark plugs are firing at the wrong time or the carburetor is out of adjustment. Although no immediately serious, it will cost you money in poor gas mileage. A tune-up is usually required when backfiring occurs. However, before you pay for a tune-up, check the ignition wires for signs of cracking, and for indication: they may be touching each other. Also, check the performance of your coil. Finally check the distributor cap for indications of a crack. Most of these problems will indicate a tune-up including sparkplugs, coil, points, condenser and possibly sparkplug wire replacement as well as carburetor adjustment. This is another instance wherein if you listen, your car will tell you a lot.

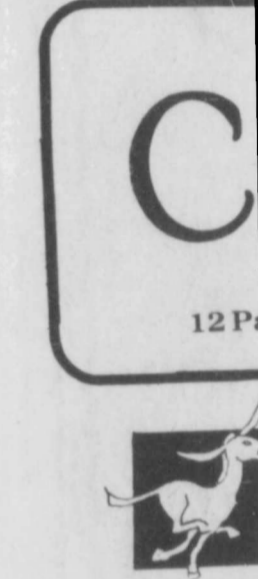
