Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Cheek Observe 56th Wedding Anniversary Last Sunday

Sunday, August 24, marked 56 years of wedded life for Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Cheek, residents of Loraine since 1929.

Mrs. Cheek was, before her marriage on August 24, 1896, Corde Jane Crump, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. T. B. Crump, Mr. Cheek's parents were Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Cheek. They were born in Smithville, Miss.; Mr. Cheek on November 23, 1870 and Mrs. Cheek December 21, 1875.

Although luxuries as most people enjoy them now were not known in the days when they grew up, they were among those who knew some of the then known luxuries of life, both their parents owned their homes and enjoyed many of the everyday necessities that others were unable to afford. Although his parents owned their home, Mr. Cheek's father, hoping to get rich quick, took an offer from a wealthy relative to go into the swamps of Mississippi and manage a plantation. The move proved to be a tragedy in the life of the family for during the 7 years they lived there, the mother and four of the children contracted and succumbed to malaria. Mr. Cheek contracted the disease which took him years and cost him his earnings during many years to get over. Only Mr. Cheek who was 7 years old at the time of the move and his sister, who is now Mrs. J. C. Dunlap of Houston and the father survived, and they were glad to get back to the highlands of Smithville where a few years later he met and married the daughter of the town's doctor.

Mrs. Cheek's father was a medical and surgical doctor, and both of their fathers served four years in the Civil War. Mrs. Cheek had 9 brothers and sisters, all of whom have passed away. During these years in Mississippi their only way of travel was by wagons, buggies and two wheel carts. For recreation there was baseball which was very popular and neighborhood singings when all the family would go and take part. In the summer the family would attend camp meetings for two or three weeks at a time. It was at one of these camps that Mrs. Cheek was saved and joined the Methodist church. On that night, which is still very clear in her mind, there were 75 who joined the church and there was much shouting, rejoicing and playing on the old time organ which prolonged the service on through the night. Mr. Cheek joined the Methodist church at an early age, but they both later joined the Baptist church and have been consistent members of the Loraine Baptist church since moving here 25 years ago.

Because of his ill health, they left Mississippi and moved to Oklahoma Territory in 1902 and lived there to see it become a state. Because of debts accumulated during his illness he lost his farm in Mississippi and later bought a farm in Oklahoma, but the strike of the boll weevils caused him to lose that one, too. His health was restored by moving West, but about ten years ago he suffered a seige of skin cancers, which took him several years to get over.

Although Mr. Cheek has lived through three wars, he has never been in uniform. None of his three sons have served in the army although Mayfield had received his call and would have left peace before in World War I. They have eight grandsons who served in World War II.

To celebrate their 56 wedding anniversary, the Cheeks had all their children with them and enjoyed a noon lunch at Ruddick Park in Colorado City. A grandson, Rev. M. D. Cheek Jr., offered prayer. In the afternoon pictures were made of the couple and group.

Loraine's First Bale Ginned August 21

The first bale of the 1952 cotton came into Loraine on Thursday, August 21, the first of what perhaps will prove to be the short est crop Loraine has had since 1918.

The bale was raised and brought in by Loyd Brame who farms about 3 miles northeast of Loraine. 2050 pounds of lint cotton was gathered from approximately 35 acres and turned out a bale that weighed 502 pounds.

The bale was ginned free by Producers Gin Company, the only gin that will operate here this fall, and a premium of about \$60 was raised in town. Brame had not sold the cotton on Saturday.

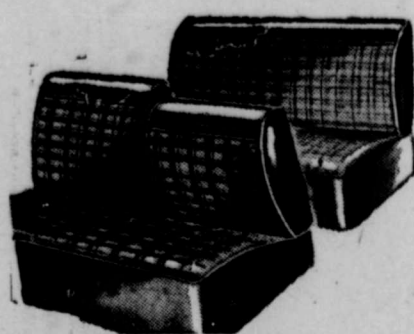
