## In November Supreme Court to hear Barber vs. CISD suit

A majority of the seven-member Texas Supreme Court agreed on Wednesday to review the Austin David Barber, et al., vs. Colorado Independent School District lawsuit. The court is expected to hear arguments from both sides on Nov. 16.

Tom Rees, the district's attorney, said Friday that "we are looking forward to getting a decision from the Supreme Court that grants local school boards the power and authority to control local school districts and that includes the dress codes."

Pat Barber, attorney for the plaintiff and his father, stated that "the Texas Constitution contains our bill of rights provisions defining fundamental relationships between the government, or its agents, and the individual citizen. These provisions establish legal lines which governmental agents may not cross. The adult plaintiffs in this lawsuit have never questioned the power of the school board to establish reasonable dress and grooming codes. They object to regulations which cross the constitutional line into protected areas reserved to the individual choice of the adult citizen."

Barber filed the class action lawsuit against the district in 1992 for a rule in the student handbook that forbids male students from wearing earrings or hair below their collars. In a one-day hearing held

in the 32nd District Courtroom here, State District Judge Jess Holloway ruled against the school district. However, a year later, the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland over-ruled Holloway's ruling. Justice Raleigh Brown wrote in the court brief that the CISD trustees had exclusive power to adopt resolutions as they deemed proper.

All during the appeals process, the school district has abided by Holloway's original ruling for male students 18 and over.

In Judge Holloway's ruling on Oct. 15, 1992, he granted a temporary injunction against the district to stop the CISD from

enforcing the grooming code for 18-year old male students as it related to hair length and earrings. He stated it was in violation of the Texas Equal Rights Amendment.

Pat Barber, the attorney and father of the plaintiff, addressed the CISD trustees on Sept. 14, 1992 and asked for changes in the dress code. He told the board at the time that "if you vote it down, we're contemplating a lawsuit."

Trustees voting to uphold the present code at the time were Roxie Strain, Jesse Munoz, Billy Bridgford and Larry Blassingame. Diana Garza and Yolanda Molina voted against.

## Summer program set to begin Monday at Kelley Elementary

Tuesday night, Colorado ISD trustees approved an Accelerated Instruction Camp to be held at Kelley Elementary beginning June 20 and running through July 20.

Principal Rita Hardegree said notice of the camp was sent out prior to the end of school and 31 students will be attending. It will be for students in kindergarten, first and second grades.

"This will help these students prepare for the next school year as we will emphasize improvement in reading, writing and math," said the principal.

Classes will start at 9 a.m. and last until noon. The students will

then be bused to the Middle School for lunch and then bused home.

Instructors for the program will be Adele Morgan, Jeannie Ellis, Pam Walker and Leah Daves.

In other business Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning, the trustees approved the resignations of three teachers and hired one.

Christy Dockrey, Glenda Stephens and Susan Hall had their resignations accepted while Kathy Wilson was hired to teach Spanish at Colorado High School.

Dockrey taught at CHS while Stephens taught at Kelley and Hall at the Middle School.

## County residents spend \$million yearly on lottery

Mitchell County residents have spent almost \$2 million on the Texas Lottery since its debut two years ago with per-capita sales set at \$246.

Scratch off tickets are the favorite here as \$1,273,500 has been spent for a chance at an instant win.

Texas Lottery representatives said that \$581,597 had been spent on the Lotto and \$38,293 on the newer Pick 3 game.

Nolan County residents have spent about the same as residents here as their totals equal \$1,897,514 for the two years with an average spending of only \$116 per individual.

With almost \$4.5 billion in lottery sales made throughout Texas during the past two years, the statewide per-capita average is \$257. Lottery officials say that statewide Lottery sales are continuing to run ahead of expectations. A total of \$1.4 billion has been transferred from the Lottery funds to the state's general revenue fund in the past two years.

Due to their close proximity to the New Mexico border, Gaines County has one of the highest per-capita Lottery sales figures in the state at \$886. It ranks only behind the border county of Pecos which leads the state in per-capita sales at \$897.

reminds those who lease land for hunting or charges a fee for hunting on property they own or control that a hunting lease license must be obtained.

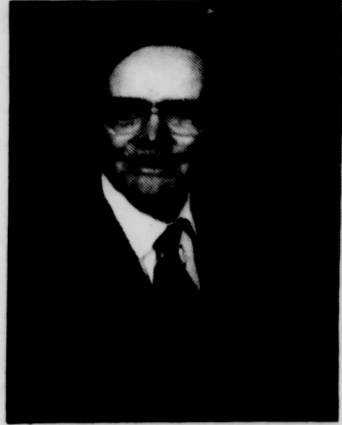

## Rule set to pay on Agent Orange diseases

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has published in the June 9 Federal Register rules that establish presumptive service-connection for multiple myeloma and respiratory cancers based on exposure to Agent Orange and other herbicides.

"Too many brave Americans have waited far too long for our nation to respond to their needs," said VA Secretary Jesse Brown. "This is one more step to right this wrong and to fulfill our country's commitment to those who served so faithfully."

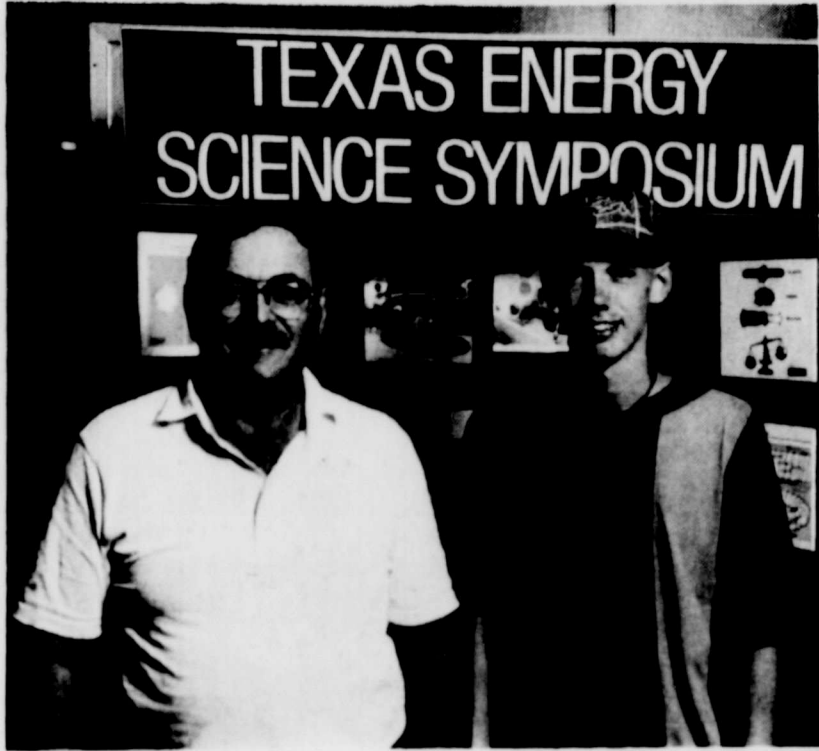
Under the rule, the VA will pay benefits to veterans exposed to herbicides and suffering from multiple myeloma (a cancer involving the bone marrow) and respiratory cancers (lung, bronchus, larynx and trachea).

Brown had announced on September 27, 1993 that the VA would move to compensate veterans who were exposed to herbicides and suffer from multiple myeloma and respiratory cancers, following a VA task force report on a National Academy of Sciences (NAS) study conducted for the VA.

Brown had previously announced on July 27, 1993 that veterans suffering from Hodgkin's disease and porphyria cutanea tarda (PCT), a liver disorder, would be added to those entitled to disability payments due to herbicide exposure. The VA published a final rule in February establishing presumptive service-connection for Hodgkin's disease and PCT. The VA already had recognized non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, soft-tissue sarcoma and the skin disease chloracne and has been paying compensation to Vietnam veterans for these conditions based on exposure to Agent Orange and other herbicides.

Brown said the VA will review previously denied claims of veterans with multiple myeloma and respiratory cancers as well as claims that have been on hold and now can be adjudicated with the publication of the final rule.

## Stenholm participates in energy meeting

Congressman Charles Stenholm participated in a White House meeting with President Clinton and a bipartisan group of members and senators working to address problems facing the domestic oil and gas industry. Stenholm worked closely with Senator David Boren (D-OK) in designing and presenting to Clinton a package of proposals to provide tax incentives and regulatory relief to the U.S. oil and gas industry.

"We had a very good meeting during which time the president listened, spoke and displayed an impressive knowledge of the industry," said Stenholm. "I was particularly impressed with his suggestion that the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) won't secure a true accounting of the costs of our assistance plan unless they consider the impact of lost revenues from stripper wells which are no longer producing."

The 1986 collapse in oil prices cost the industry 300,000 jobs and saw oil production drop by 1.7 million barrels per day. Oil imports account for 50% of domestic consumption and in 1993 the U.S. spent an estimated \$46 billion on oil and refined petroleum products. Following the oil price collapse that began in October 1993, more than 22,500 Americans in the oil and natural gas producing industry have lost their jobs.

"Over 100 of my colleagues in the House and Senate contacted President Clinton to request this meeting and 70 legislators from 27 states were represented at today's meeting," noted Stenholm. "I think this type of broad representation indicates that many members of Congress understand that what is good for the energy industry also benefits the U.S. in terms of job creation, increased economic activity and a lower trade deficit. And despite today's price of almost \$20 a barrel for West Texas Intermediate, we need to do something to bring some stability to the industry," added Stenholm.

Among the proposals submitted to the president were the following:

- A tax credit to preserve marginal production and encourage drilling.
- The continued expensing of

- geological and geophysical costs.
- Elimination of the net income limitations on percentage depletion.
- A tax credit to encourage deep water and frontier production.
- Administrative relief from excessive environmental mandates.

## OIL & GAS NEWS

TDC Engineering Inc. of Abilene has revealed plans to drill an 8,800-foot new pool wildcat well in Mitchell County's Hettie Field. The operator has 167 acres leased with drillsite in the H&TCRR Co. Survey. It has designated the venture as the No. 3 Wallace "R." Drillsite is 15 miles southeast of Loraine.

Operating out of Midland, Parker and Parsley Development Co. is preparing to conduct a plug-back nine miles southwest of Westbrook. The well is designated as the No. 225 Mary Foster and currently bottoms at a depth of 2,330 feet in the San Andres Formation.

The well was originally completed in 1987 by Mobil Producing, pumping 17 barrels of oil per day plus 334 barrels of water from Clear Fork perforations at 2,441 to 2,892 feet into the hole.

The well is in a 3,840-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey.

A new pool wildcat well has been brought on line in Mitchell County's Hettie Field, with T.D.C. Engineering Inc. as the operator.

Located one mile southeast of Loraine, the well is in a 289-acre lease in the H&TCRR Co. Survey A-1745. It is designated as the No. 2 Wallace.

On an 11/64 choke, it pumped 141 barrels of oil per day plus 130,000 CF gas and 28 barrels of water. Flowing tubing pressure registered 350 PSI.

The well bottomed at 7,940 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Odom Formation, 6,972 to 6,987 feet into the hole.
