Local Leaders Favor Amendment No. 4

On May 18, residents of Aransas County will have the opportunity to vote on four proposed amendments to the Constitution of Texas.

Amendment No. 4, popularly known as the "Clean Water Amendment," is favored by most local leaders interested in the welfare of our community.

Here are some facts about the Clean Water Amendment:

1. What are the main reasons for the clean water amendment?
2. What will Amendment No. 4 Do?

The amendment would authorize the sale by the state of \$100 million in general obligation bonds for a self-liquidating program with the specific purpose of construction of public sewage facilities. In this way payments for sewage treatment facilities may be paid over the extended life of the plant with no rise in state taxes. This removes the need for large state appropriations.

Bonds would be issued at an interest rate not to exceed 6 percent. This rate would make the bonds marketable, and enhance the success of the program without a large state appropriation at considerable cost to the taxpayers.

Approval would allow the state to utilize a possible \$200 million in federal funds which would be brought back to Texas for the project. It is estimated that this activity in behalf of sewage treatment facilities for cleaner rivers, streams, and lakes, would benefit Texas workers economically with almost \$300 million in jobs. If the amendment does not pass it will mean a potential loss of millions of dollars to the state, as well as the loss of tremendous incentives to update our sewage treatment facilities.

3. Need for the clean water amendment:

Disposal of improperly treated wastes by public sewage systems throughout Texas is causing a serious threat to the quality of our rivers, streams, and lakes. Local governments are finding it difficult, if not impossible to continue providing new and

Voting School Set for May 11

On Tuesday night, May 11 at 7:30 p.m. in the Courthouse, a school of instruction will be held for all persons who will conduct the election on May 18 and for any other interested persons. The announcement was made by County Clerk Ruby Hart.

The May 18 election will be countywide and will give qualified voters the opportunity to vote for or against the legal sale of mixed beverages, popularly known as liquor-by-the-drink.

Also on May 18, there will be voting on the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of Texas:

No. 1. The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommended improvements and economy in the legislative process.

No. 2. The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature.

No. 3. The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

No. 4. The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum.

Risk Pool Insurance Bill Is Signed

At 10 a.m. on April 29 Governor Preston Smith signed the risk pool insurance bill which will affect all the coastal area of Texas and other parts of the state when a catastrophe of windstorm or hail strikes.

State Rep. Leroy Wieting states:

"I have a provision in the bill that will put the plan into immediate effect and it further states that the insurance Commission will set forth rates and procedures by May 14, 1971, if the Catastrophe Association does not have the procedures worked out by that date. This will assure coastal residents of insurance coverage for homes and businesses by June 1, the beginning of the hurricane season.

"I visited with the Insurance Commission and they have assured me that some of the forms and other material will be made available within the next few days informing people how to apply for this risk pool coverage."

Mayor Seeks Aid In Insurance Coverage

Mayor Delmar R. Hiller has sent the following letter to Judge Ned Price, chairman of the State Insurance Commission:

Please accept this letter as our "Notice" and "Application" to the Insurance Commission for the City of Rockport, Texas to be designated a "Catastrophe Area" (wherein windstorm and hail insurance is not reasonably available to a substantial number of owners of insurable property), as defined in the "Texas Catastrophe Property Pool Act," Section 3, Paragraph 1.

We further wish to be designated an "Inadequate Fire Insurance Area," (being an area wherein Fire and Explosion insurance is not reasonably available to a substantial number of owners of insurable property), as defined in the "Texas Catastrophe Property Pool Act," Section 3, Paragraph 1.

We earnestly seek your earliest possible action in implementing this act, continuing cancellations of the above forms of coverage has created a most critical situation in our community.

Adequate documents indicating the need for coverage in both the areas of windstorm and fire insurance can be provided to the Commission upon your request.

Your prompt action on our behalf will be greatly appreciated.

Maj. Roy DeForest Awarded Silver Star

Maj. Roy E. DeForest, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. DeForest, has been awarded the Silver Star Medal.

A member of the United States Marine Corps, DeForest's citation stated that he received the Silver Star Medal "for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action while serving as Operations Officer of the Third Battalion, Third Marine Division in connection with combat operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam."

"On the afternoon of June 17, 1969 the Command Post and other elements of the Third Battalion were established in a defensive position near Gio Linh in Quang Tri Province when the Marines came under a vicious ground attack by a North Vietnamese Army force employing mortars, automatic weapons and rocket-propelled grenades. Rapidly assessing the situation, Major DeForest repeatedly disregarded his own safety to skillfully coordinate the firing of a variety of supporting arms with the defensive actions of the Marines.

"By his courage, bold initiative and steadfast devotion to duty during an extremely critical situation, Major DeForest contributed significantly to the accomplishment of his command's mission and upheld the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and of the United States Naval Service."

Ruby Hart Now County Clerk

Mrs. Ruby Hart, former chief deputy clerk, this week assumed here duties as County District Clerk or Aransas County.

She was appointed recently by the County Commissioners Court to serve out the remaining term of W. E. Beasley, who resigned effective May 1.

The Fulton Lions Club will hold a rummage sale Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoon at the Fulton Lions Club hall behind Circle K Grocery on Hwy. 35 North.

Another example of economic progress here is the announcement that Canterbury Construction Co. proposes to build 100 apartment units on 20 acres located on the northeast side of the intersection of Enterprise Blvd. and Sparks Colony Road.

Since this location is a short distance northwest of the city limits, S. B. Canterbury III appeared before the City Council this week and asked for assurance that he would be able to get city water and sewer service for the project.

The Council granted approval contingent upon completion of expansion planned for the sewage treatment plant which is expected to double the present capacity.

—Gave final acceptance of new warehouses and agreed to pay Paul Harris balance due for the construction.

—Set May 24 as the date to receive bids for the sale of the land on which the Little League Park is located. Agreed that contract would assure the park would remain available for Little League play all of the present season.

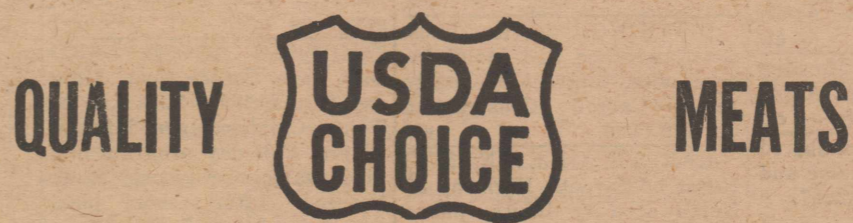

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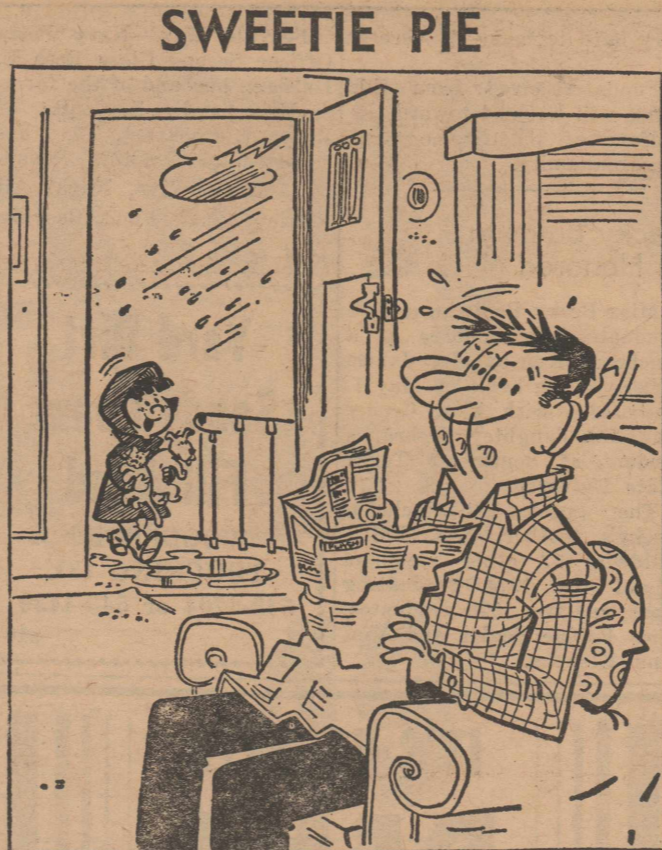
THE FAMILY LAWYER



"Game of Chance"
 "Fifty cents per shot," said the sign at a certain golf course. "If you score a hole-in-one, you win \$5,000."
 Sure enough, a golfer eventually did come through with a hole-in-one. But the proprietor refused to pay the prize money. Haled into court, he argued that the contest was a "game of chance"—hence, not enforceable by law.
 However, the judge disagreed. Ordering the money paid, the judge said there was simply too much skill involved in a golf shot to classify this as a game of chance.
 In varying degree, gambling

is regulated in every state. Often under these regulations, it becomes necessary for a court to decide what is meant by the phrase "game of chance."
 Sometimes the answer is relatively easy. Thus, the throwing of dice has consistently been held a game of chance. So has roulette. So has matching pennies.
 On the other hand, chess and checkers and spelling bees have all been held not games of chance but games of skill.
 What about bridge? Most courts have classified bridge,

too, as a game of skill.
 "Although there is of course an element of chance resulting from the deal of the cards," explained one judge, "there is a continually recurring necessity in the bidding and play to make decisions which will ordinarily be determinative of the outcome."
 Does it "take the curse off" a forbidden game of chance if the stakes are very small? As a matter of principle, no. Consider this case:
 A restaurant owner was arrested on a charge of operating an illegal gambling device on his premises. Although he protested that the prizes were worth only a nickel, the court found him guilty anyhow.
 What the law is concerned about, said the court, is any device "designed to intrigue the unwary and arouse the latent cupidity of human nature into the notion that it could get something for nothing."

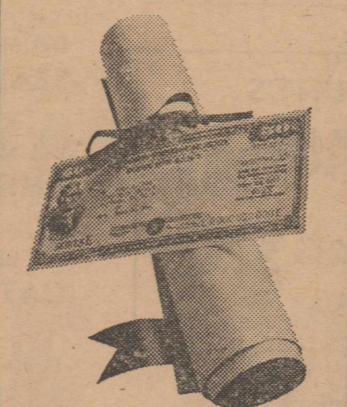

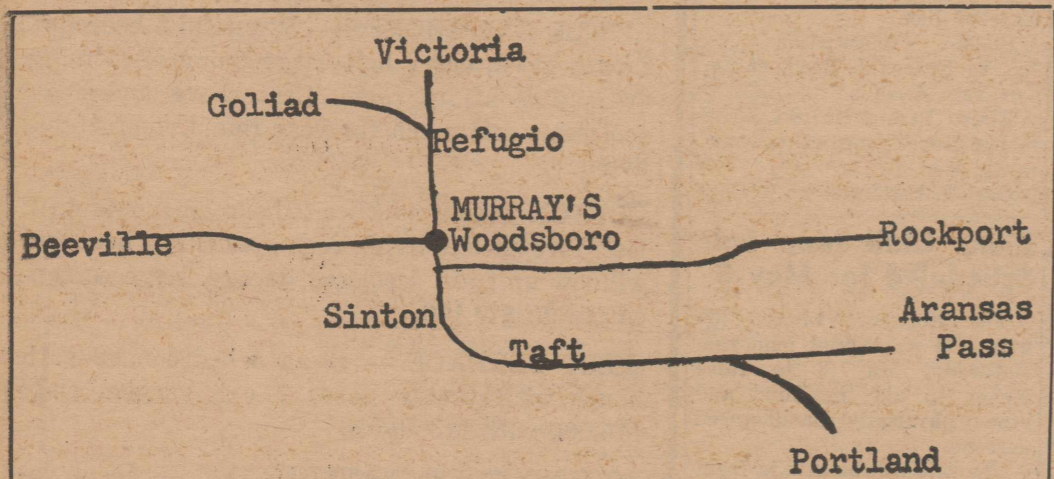

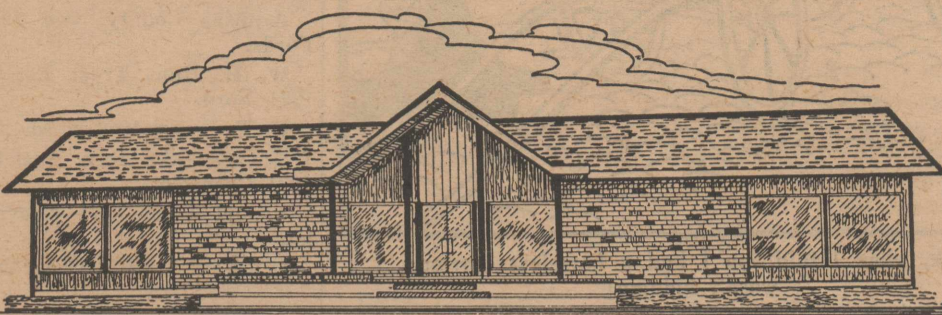

Improved adequate facilities under the present 67.33 percent local-federal matching program for construction of sewage treatment facilities.
4. What will the Amendment mean to local governments?
It means that instead of paying 67 percent of the costs of treatment facilities, local governments' share would drop to 45 percent, 25 percent of which will come from

a low interest loan from the state.
5. Who stands to benefit? Every Texan will benefit—through the assistance to his city or town, and through the assistance to his city or town, and through cleaner rivers, streams, and lakes in the state.
6. What percent of the Texas population will be directly affected?
Approximately 80 percent of our population, or more than 8.5 million people, live in areas that either have or soon will have inadequate

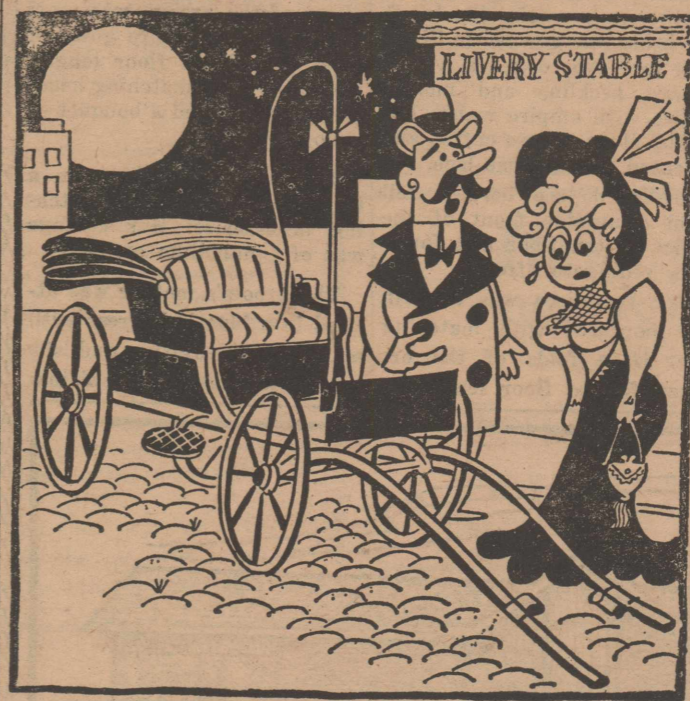
systems for disposing of their sewage.
7. Is public health involved? Yes. The amount of improperly treated sewage is growing as our population increases faster than treatment facilities can be provided. The amount of affluent increases with the population, but the amount of river water available to dilute the wastes remains constant. The result is an increasing water quality problem that can affect public health because of inadequate waste water treatment facilities.
8. What about conservation and the environment?
Concern for protecting our natural resources here in Texas indicates one of the greatest needs for the Clean Water Amendment. Adequate sewage treatment facilities can help avoid the fouling of our rivers, streams, and lakes in Texas by improperly treated sewage. Continued neglect of this problem could well endanger the wildlife in these rivers, as well as the waterways themselves.
9. What about enabling legislation?
These specific points are resolved in the enabling legislation.
A. The bond issue is dedicated exclusively to the construction of public waste water treatment facilities.
B. Proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be loans to the entity and are to be paid back by the users of the facilities.
10. Are new state taxes involved?
No, because of the conditions stated in No. 9 B, the proceeds from these bonds will be in the form of loans to be paid back by the users.
11. Is Environmental safety assured?
Yes, the Federal Environmental Protection Agency requires that, before a grant is made an "environmental impact statement" be issued before each facility is authorized. This statement is an assessment of the effect each project will have on the environment. Projects that adversely affect the environment will not be funded.
12. What percentage of waste water treatment facilities will need help?
In the next five years, an estimated 75 percent of all entities operating sewage treatment facilities will need new or expanded facilities.

Taxpayers Ask IRS

matters is provided by the U. S. Internal Revenue Service. This column of questions and answers on Federal tax and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—My employer is withholding less income tax from my paycheck this year. Does this mean that I might owe tax next year?

A—It could be. Income tax withholding rates are lower in 1971 mainly because the standard deduction was increased. Withholding is also lower for single persons because tax rates for this group were reduced.

But for some, withholding won't cover this year's liability; and under-withholding could result for those earning over \$11,500.

If your present withholding won't cover this year's liability, you can avoid owing money next April by dropping exemptions now or, if you are already claiming no exemptions, by asking your employer to withhold an additional amount.

Q—My income is low, and I never pay any tax although I file every year to obtain a refund. Is there anything that I can do to stop my employer from withholding taxes?

A—Yes. You should file a Form W-4E with your employer. This is a "Withholding Exemption Certificate" in which you can certify you did not have any tax liability last year and will not have any income tax this year. Your employer must stop withholding taxes.

Q—How long must I keep my records for income tax purposes?

A—You must keep your records as long as their contents may be material in administering any Internal Revenue law. The Internal Revenue Service cannot suggest a specific time, but certainly all records should be kept for at least three years and many

records, such as stock and property transportations, even longer.

Q—I am retired with a company pension and an annuity. Can I have tax withheld on these payments?

A—Yes. You may use Form W-4P to request the payer to withhold the whole dollar amount. However, the amount to be withheld must be at least \$5 a month and must not reduce the net pension or annuity payment to less than \$10 a month.

Q—I have received a gift from the bank because I made a long-term deposit. Must I pay taxes on this gift?

A—Yes. In general, the fair market value of property received for making a deposit or opening an account in a savings institution is income and must be reported as interest income in the year received.

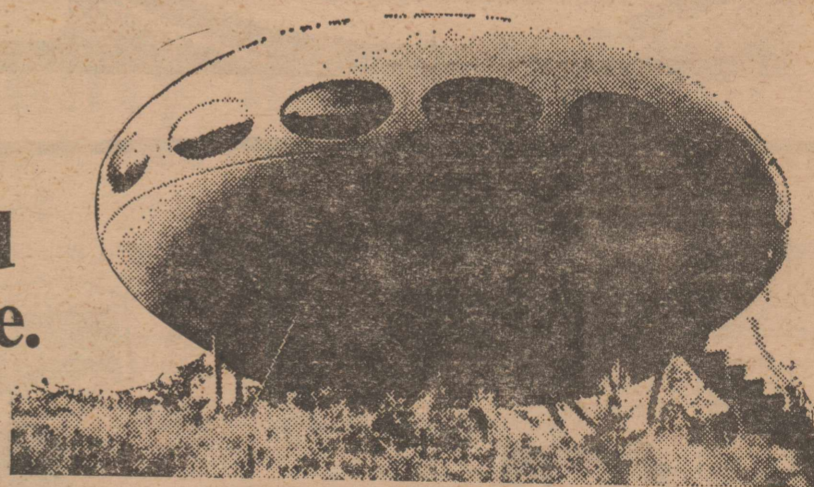

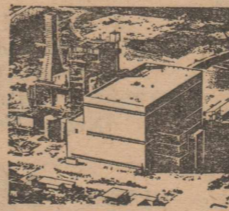

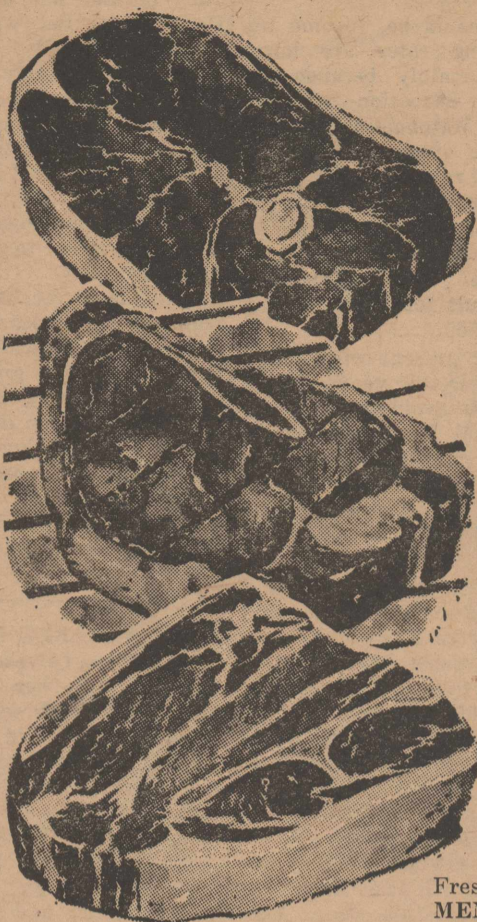
