Attend Road Meeting In Breckenridge Last Thursday

Sam Richardson, president, Judge W. M. Yates, and A. G. Bearden, secretary of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce were in Breckenridge last Thursday attending a meeting of the executive committee of the East-West Highway Association.

The purpose of the meeting was to formulate a definite request for construction of Highway 15 to present to the State Highway Commission on November 15.

The morning session was called to order at 10:30 by Mr. Richardson. The introduction of members followed, with a number of them making short speeches. Those introduced were Col. R. A. Thompson, former chief engineer of the state highway department, now connected with the highway division of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce; Charles G. Cotton of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce highway division; C. E. Ellinger, division engineer of the state highway department at Brownwood; and Judge A. J. Morgan of Breckenridge.

The entire committee was entertained at the noon hour with a luncheon by the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce at the Breckenridge Y.M.C.A. building.

At the business session in the afternoon definite plans for the construction of Highway 15, were formulated. John M. Chamberlain of Mineral Wells, was appointed committee chairman to head the delegation to Austin on November 15, when the plans will be presented to the State Highway Commission. Mr. Chamberlain was also instructed to obtain facts and details concerning the unimproved section of the highway west of Roby, and with the assistance of the County Judges of those counties in the unimproved sections, to compile a brief of these facts to present to the state commission.

Mr. Richardson, Judge Yates, Mr. Bearden and J. E. Barron are the Lamesa delegates to the Austin meeting.

DAWSON COUNTY GINNINGS REACH 61,000 BALES

An unofficial survey of the gins of the county conducted Monday and Tuesday afternoons brought out that Dawson county had ginned approximately 61,000 bales from the 1937 crop.

The survey showed that the gins located in Lamesa had ginned approximately 26,546 bales at four o'clock Tuesday afternoon, while the rural gins of the county had ginnings totaling 32,069 bales at that time, giving a grand total of 60,615 bales for the entire county.

It is estimated by the cotton men of the territory that the cotton is between 40 and 75 per cent picked, with that in the north part of the county being somewhat later cotton than that in the south.

Early season forecasts of 100,000 bales for Dawson county are likely to be true prophecies, and the most conservative estimates give the county at least 90,000 bales for the county.

A slow falling rain Monday night and Tuesday morning kept pickers out of the fields Tuesday allowing a number of the gins to get caught up for the first time in over a month, but with clearing weather Tuesday afternoon the rush is expected to be in full swing again Thursday.

Farmers as a whole welcomed the moisture as pastures and wheat fields were getting rather dry. Also many were waiting for rain to plant wheat, and it is expected that many acres will be put in during the next few weeks.

This will be the intention of the Crosby county crew, and a real football game is likely to be the result.

O. Lambeth Gin Burns; Loss Set At \$25,000

ANNUAL RED CROSS ROLL CALL NOV. 11-26

The annual Red Cross roll call in Lamesa and Dawson county, will begin Thursday, Armistice Day, and continue through Thanksgiving, following the traditional roll call period, W. L. Marr, chairman of the local chapter stated this week.

Memberships will be received by any of the local workers during the above dates, but actual taking of memberships will start in the county on Monday, November 15, with Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum in charge, working with members of the rural schools.

Active taking of memberships in the city of Lamesa will be November 22 to 25, at which time Red Cross workers will canvass the city for memberships. Mr. Marr states that the county's enrollment quota has been raised to 355 members this year, 250 for the city of Lamesa and 105 for the rural communities. Last year's quota was only 152.

Excluding war days, the work done by the Red Cross during the past twelve months has never before attracted such favorable comment throughout the nation.

The disastrous Ohio River Valley flood, literally inundating cities, wrecking homes and laying large areas exposed to an epidemic of contagious disease that might easily have taken more lives than the flood, and the untiring efforts and skillful handling of the catastrophe by the American Red Cross, proved beyond any doubt, the worthiness of the cause.

Albaugh-Dewey Hogg Well Is Shut Down

Southeastern Dawson county saw a shut-down of the Ray Albaugh No. 1, Dewey Hogg, in the center of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 14-34-4n. T. & P. It was abandoned at 3,845 feet after encountering sulphur water at 3,810 feet. Small shows of oil were reported below the water marker.

Post Murder Case Scheduled to Start Here November 22

Mrs. Cloe Johnson, of Post, charged with the death of her husband, Robert Lee Johnson on last July 11, was freed from the Lamesa jail after posting a \$10,000 bond this past week.

Mrs. Johnson was brought to the local jail on October 31, when her murder trial was transferred here by Judge Louis B. Reed, on a change of venue. Her trial has been scheduled for Monday, November 22.

The trial of Wesley Northcutt, Post, will also be held here during this term of court. Northcutt was arrested as an accomplice to Mrs. Johnson in the murder of her husband.

Loss Partially Covered By Insurance

Fire which broke out about ten o'clock last Friday morning, completely destroyed the O. Lambeth Gin, located in the southeastern part of Lamesa, causing an estimated loss of approximately \$25,000, the loss being partially covered by insurance.

The fire started in the stands, and by the time the machinery could be stopped, had spread over the entire plant. By the time the first department reached the scene, the blaze was well out of control, and all that could be done was to prevent its spread to the compress, which is located just to the northeast, and to save the cotton that was in wagons and trailers on the gin yard.

A number of bales of lint cotton stored in the seed house were also burned, as were a number of bales that were so near the gin that they could not be moved in time.

All office records were saved, and Mr. Lambeth states that none of the farmers who lost cotton will lose money as there was blanket insurance on all cotton in the gin and on the yard.

Mr. Lambeth has placed a desk at the City Grocery and Market and will carry on all business in reference to the fire at this place. Mr. Edwin Matthews, will be in charge at this place, and will transact all necessary business.

This was the first serious gin fire in Lamesa in several years, and came as the season was just about half over.

O. LAMBETH TO BUILD NEW GIN

O. Lambeth has announced this week, that he has purchased the lots just south of the CCC Camp, and that work has been started on a new gin plant to replace the one destroyed by fire last Friday morning.

The contract for the gin plant has been let to the Murray Gin Co., of Dallas and they promise to have it ready for operation in 18 days. The gin is to be of the new Murray type, with all new and improved Murray machinery. Murray experts will supervise the erection of the gin and the placing of machinery, and when completed the new Lambeth gin will be one of the most modern and complete in this section of the state.

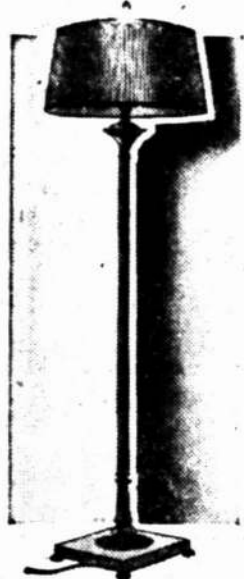

Unemployment Census Of Confidential Nature

Unemployed persons and partially unemployed who fill out and send in cards for the National Unemployment Census between November 16 and 20 need not fear that their names will be published or made public in any way. This pledge is contained in the instruction sent to all offices where the census is being taken.

"The confidential nature of the answers to questions on the Unemployment report card will be respected by the Administrator of the National Unemployment Census," the instructions state.

The information given by unemployed or other persons of the cards will not be used to their disadvantage in any way, such as in tax matters, question of citizenship or relief. The data in the cards also to be used for the purposes of the census. Further, positive action was taken to exclude from the census any supplementary enumeration or registration which might be imposed on the regular unemployment census by those seeking to take advantage of the government's undertaking for their own purposes.

Instructions went to all local committees in connection with the unemployment census, which read:

"It is quite possible that you will receive proposals for supplementary enumeration or registration projects, to precede or accompany the National Unemployment Census, and designed to provide special information for your community. However, commendable such proposals may be in themselves, we must urge you to discourage them or to request their postponement until after November 20.

"Their effects would be to detract attention from the census and to confuse the public mind. The main objective in this national enterprise is to secure a complete, honest and accurate registration, and any competing interest of the same general character would detract from this objective. It would also be to the ultimate disadvantage of your community itself."

*Wednesday Date For Issuing Drivers License In Lamesa

Fifty specially trained examiners of the department of public safety will begin holding examinations in every county of the state next Monday for drivers applying for their first license. Col. H. H. Carmichael, public safety director, has announced.

Schedules outlined by drivers' license officials will permit each county seat city to be visited by two uniformed examiners one day each week. Applicants will be given physical and driving tests before they are issued a license. Eyesight examinations, including tests for color blindness, ability to read and understand highway signals and traffic regulations, and the operation of a vehicle under ordinary traffic conditions are the principal phases of the examinations.

Drivers who are learning to operate vehicles will be given a driving instruction permit which expires between 50 and 90 days after issuance. Chauffeurs' licenses are divided into three classes: A, B, and C, depending upon the types of vehicles the applicants propose to operate. Passenger and school bus drivers will be required to have class A or B licenses bearing a special endorsement of the department.

Not only will drivers be examined before a license is issued to them, but their vehicles must undergo tests for defective brakes, lights, horn and windshield wipers.

Daily testing schedules are arranged for 17 Texas cities in which highway patrol stations are maintained. They are: El Paso, Pecos, Big Spring, Lubbock, Amarillo, Abilene, San Angelo, Wichita Falls, Dallas, Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Tyler, Houston and Beaumont. Although these tests apply to drivers seeking their first permits, safety experts point to these types of examinations as a definite means of reducing the high mortality and accident toll on Texas highways.

Hardy Matthews, member of the State Highway Safety Patrol, will be in charge of the examinations for Lamesa and Dawson county, and will be in Lamesa next Wednesday morning from 8 a. m. to 10:00 a. m. to give the tests. Mr. Matthews will after that date be in Lamesa every Wednesday morning.

The U. S. crop reporting board of office here said the forecast compared with 2,933,000 bales grown last year. 2,956,000 in 1935 and 4,580,000 average for the five-year period through 1932.

Gins have been operating day and night in the northwestern portion of the state which is suffering from a shortage of pickers, the board said.

Texas ginnings up to Nov. 1 were 3,665,000 running bales, compared with 2,302,000 on the same date last year and 1,903,000 in 1935.

Unemployment Census As It Affects Farmers

EDITOR'S NOTE — The following article attempts to answer for the farmer, the farmer, and others living in rural areas, some questions about the national unemployment census which will be taken Nov. 16 to 20.

On Nov. 16, 1937, postmasters and mail carriers will deliver unemployment report cards throughout the United States. Every unemployed or partly unemployed person in the Nation is personally requested by the President of the United States to fill out and return one of these cards. No postage is required.

Since registration is voluntary and most persons will fill in the cards for themselves, it is important that they should have a clear understanding as to what is meant by unemployment and partial unemployment.

For purposes of this census a worker is any person who labors with his

hands or his brain for pay or for profit. The word includes the businessman, the doctor or lawyer, the farmer, the servant in a family and the man who works for wages or for some other kind of pay. The word worker does not include the housewife or her children who are engaged in domestic duties, or helping in a family business, store or on the family farm without pay.

It will be clear that a farmer who tends his own farm is a worker. But since he works for himself, he cannot, therefore, be considered as unemployed even though he does no work. He is essentially a businessman, obtaining his income for the sale of his crops or produce.

The farmer may have harvested his crops for the year, and have time to spare. He would not, however, be unemployed in such a case if he customarily supports himself and his family from the operation of his farm. The situation is similar to that of a teacher during summer vacation.

Of course a farmer may customarily work for pay or income in work not connected with his own farm, during his slack season, to supplement his income from the farm. In this case, if he is really looking for work for pay and has not yet found it, he may correctly regard himself as unemployed and therefore should fill in an unemployment report card. Similarly, he may ordinarily divide his time between his farm and some outside employment for pay.

This is especially likely to be the case in certain parts of the country when the typical farm does not provide the operator with full-time employment. In this event if he is without the extra part-time job, and really wants one he should record himself as partly unemployed.

Young People's Position

Many young people who assist their parents on the home farm will be in one of the following groups:

If they have worked on the farm without pay and expect to continue to do so, they should not register. (They are partners in the family business.)

However, if they formerly had a paid job and are looking for a job for pay (although in the meantime they are helping on the farm) they should register.

A similar situation is that of the young man or woman who has been out of school for a number of months, perhaps years, who has been looking for a job and helps in the meantime with the farm work at home. Such a person who is able to work and wants work should register. He should report himself (in question 9 and 10) as a new worker.

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**South Plains Farmers
Have Well Filled
Pantry For Winter**

Farm families in Northwest Texas will have adequate diets this fall, according to reports from county home demonstration agents of that section, who state that farm home makers have been busily engaged in filling their pantries in readiness for the time when fresh vegetables and fruit are scarce.

"Keeping records of the home food supply gives me an idea of what I need to go with what I have to provide for my family a well balanced food supply," said Mrs. E. C. Airhart of Martin county. Mrs. Airhart, in the past, has been pantry demonstrator for the Brown home demonstration club. She has kept records of the production of her garden, dairy products, and chickens and eggs for several years. She keeps a well filled pantry at all times.

"I have added 46 quarts of beans from two gatherings," stated Mrs. W. S. Eagleston, home food supply demonstrator of the Farm Home demonstration club in Hockley county. Mrs. Eagleston planted four 50-foot rows of stringless green pod beans in June and the vines are still loaded.

The Porter tomato has proved to be more successful for Mrs. Ray Jennings, of the Ochiltree home demonstration club in Ochiltree county, than any other. She has canned 12 quarts, and has had all that her family could use fresh, with enough green tomatoes to make some pickles and relishes.

In spite of the grasshoppers making it impossible for her to raise a garden, Mrs. Jess Cudd, cooperator in the New Hope home demonstration club in Ochiltree county, has bought and filled 366 containers with plums, beans, peaches, grapes, pickles, peas, beets, apples, and pears.

**Compulsory Control
Bill, Says Con. Mahon**

Colorado, Tex. Nov. 13.—Congressman George Mahon, prior to his departure for Washington to attend the special session which convenes Monday, November 15, made the following statement concerning the prospects for farm legislation.

"I think it is impossible to predict just what kind of bill will be passed. In our district a strong preference for a compulsory control bill has been expressed by a great majority of the farmers with whom I have come in contact in farm meetings or otherwise. Most cotton producers favor adjusted payments equivalent to parity.

16 cents or above, on that portion of the crop produced for domestic consumption. They feel that a moderate reduction program is necessary, but that adjustment payments will be required in order to get a price for cotton domestically consumed commensurate with the American standard of living. In view of the tremendous foreign production they realize that American cotton sold abroad will have to be sold in competition with the world and at a low price. In each county they favor allotments to each farm on a uniform basis of equality regardless of the length of time the farm has been in cultivation. They favor no discrimination against new farms in areas where a normal development of agricultural land is taking place. They favor a program which will place the emphasis on a normal size in each locality. They favor a farm policy which will encourage operation of farms by tenants or occupant owners and which will discourage the displacement of tenants and large operations through hired labor methods.

"In the minds of the producers there is a wide variety of opinion as to what should be done. In Congress, which is made up of representatives from all sections of the nation, there will be even a greater diversity of opinion. However, I think it can be safely predicted that the new program will be an improvement over the old."

**New Drivers Must
Take Exams. To
Secure License**

Texas auto drivers applying for licenses after November 15 will find skilled examiners asking about their health, habits and ability.

On the above date approximately 50 trained examiners of the drivers license bureau will start enforcing the new license law requiring physical and driving tests, designed to keep from the roads inept drivers blamed by many for increasing roadside death.

In addition, vehicles used by applicants must undergo examination for proper brakes, lights, horn and windshield wiper.

"Officers will be in every county seat at least once each week, more frequently," said officials of the safety department the past week.

Officials hope the license law qualifications, coupled with greater vigilance on thoroughfares will cut sharply into the mounting toll of highway carnage although the requirements touch only prospective drivers seeking their first license.

Permits already issued expire in 1939 and renewal will not involve tests unless ability to drive properly is doubtful.

Learner's permits, good for 30 to 90 days, will be issued inexperienced drivers seeking to qualify for a license. The principal phase of an examination consists of tests of eyesight with special attention to color blindness, ability to read and comprehend traffic signs and signals and operate a vehicle under ordinary traffic conditions.

The minimum age requirement for a private operator is 16 with signed consent of a judge or legal guardian. Otherwise it is 18.

An administrative change coinciding with enforcing the new law will be the change of permits by the bureau instead of county tax collectors.

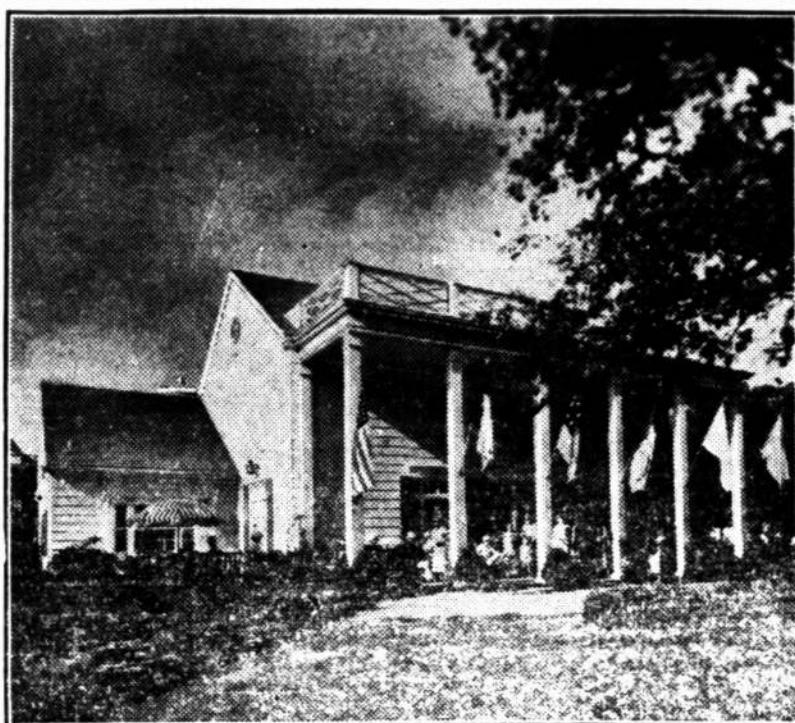

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"

By James V. Allred

A few of the big daily papers and Senator Shivers of Port Arthur have criticized me because I said over the radio that unless the Legislature provided revenues, pension payments would be stopped after November 1st. Now that the Board of Control has announced that payments will be made at least for the next two months these papers and this Senator are trying to make it appear that I misrepresented things.

If they wanted to be fair they would tell the people that before I made my radio speech the State Board of Control which handles pensions, made a written statement to the Legislature that payments would be stopped unless the Legislature provided money. These papers and this Senator know that I relied upon the statement of the Board of Control in making my appeal for aid.

But, in any event, it doesn't make much difference who made the statement first. The rest of the record is this:

For over a year now the Board of Control has owed \$1,626,000 to Dallas banks on warrants issued before the tax bills went into effect. I told the Legislature last January this would have to be paid. No provision was made for it. I told the Legislature again during the special session that this should be paid. Nothing was done about it. Meantime, however, the Dallas bank had been demanding its money and the Board of Control had agreed to pay it. They told the bank positively that they would take care of it if the Legislature didn't at the special session. This was the reason they issued the statement that payments would be stopped unless the Legislature provided more money. Now the Legislature didn't make provision for paying this money, which simply meant that if the bank continued to insist upon its money then the Board of Control would have to cut payments out completely for at least two months just as they said they would. However, the Board has prevailed upon them to accept payments of \$100,000 a month for November and December so that they can go ahead and make November and December payments. They are to work out other arrangements for paying the balance to the bank about January 1st.

Naturally I am pleased to know that according to the Board of Control's statement old assistance can go on through the next two months. One member of the Board of Control, Mr. John Wallace, testified that payments would not be stopped at all and there would be no reduction of the rolls. I had been hearing that they were going to cut off several thousand and was not surprised yesterday when Mr. Little testified before a legislative committee that this was inevitable since the Legislature had failed to provide more money.

Whether the board pays the debt of \$1,626,000 to the banks in installments or all at once, any school boy could figure out that the board has got to cut the rolls or cut the average of \$14 per month. For that reason I regret the ray of false hope which has been held out to the old people when the day of reckoning is inevitable.

I am opposed to dropping any more needy aged from the rolls. I think that many of the so-called border line cases should be put on the rolls rather than dropping them off, particularly during the coming weeks when winter will be setting in. The present \$14 a month payment is not enough for a pension, especially with the added suffering that will result from the winter months.

Another angle of suffering is the relief problem which is a real one for old age assistance. The aged who are being cared for by someone. If they turn to the relief rolls for help, they will find the lines swollen by an estimated

25,000 people. This figure according to the relief administrator compares unfavorably with the lesser number of 166,779 last January when public works projects removed many from indigent rolls.

Neither the state nor federal governments are able to supply money for direct aid but only relief in the form of surplus foodstuffs and some clothing. With the suffering of the aged people added to that of these unfortunates without employment, it is obvious the cry of the destitute will be heard over Texas in the midst of the rainy, cold winter months.

With these will be the needy blind and destitute children left holding an empty bag by the Legislature.

When this situation comes to pass, the question, "Why?" will be on the lips of every citizen.

That question will be directed at the corporation senators—Holbrook and company—whose job of scuttling the social security financing program cost the state a \$200,000 session but saved the wealthy natural resource groups from shouldering a humanitarian burden.

Their attitude "Am I my brother's keeper?" will be the target for those needy unfortunates whose faith was not kept.

State Health Officer Warns Public of Over Heated Rooms

Austin, Tex. Nov. 13.—"With colder weather on its way to Texas it's time to think about home temperatures during the winter months," states Dr. Cox, state health officer.

There is evidence that thousands of homes are constantly over-heated during the winter. In fact, many families tolerate indoor temperature during the colder months to which they would and do strenuously object in the summer. Such persons are not only uneconomical with their fuel supply, but are endangering their health as well.

Dr. Cox continued: "People living in homes with over-heated temperatures become soft, the system is weakened and is at a decided disadvantage in defending itself against the sudden change from a too great intramural heat to the penetrating cold."

"Consequently colds, bronchial troubles and pneumonia, taking advantage of the situation, step in and do much unnecessary and not infrequently fatal damage. You will agree that this is entirely too high a price to pay for a few extra degrees of unneeded heat."

"We all know families who are starting on their annual scourge of colds and sore throats. But this does not alter their affinity for super-heat. Texas Employers Contributing To Compensation Fund

Austin, Nov. 10.—Anniversary of the first year's administration of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act discloses \$17,000,000 contributed by Texas employers to the "Jobless Fund" for the qualified unemployed. Benefit payments from this fund will become payable on January 1, 1938.

Figures made available today by Orville S. Carpenter, chairman-director of the commission, disclose the cost of administration has amounted to two per cent of the collections. This cost is borne entirely by the Federal Government and is not deducted from the contributions of Texas employers.

Interest for the year amounts to approximately \$154,000.00, which is included in the total fund figure given above.

More than 12,300 Texas employers are contributing to the reserve fund for the 700,000 employees in the State covered by the act. If one lost his job, the Employment Service would aid him in finding another and, failing that, would pay to him a certain amount for a certain period of time. The amount and the duration of the benefits will depend upon the work record of the individual employee.
