Summer Youth Program Funded For 46 Workers

Mitchell County Commissioners Friday in a special meeting entered into a contract with the West Central Council of Governments to administer a program which will give summer employment for 46 young people.

The program in past years has been administered by the Neighborhood Youth Corps, part of the Office of Economic Opportunity, which no longer exists.

The program is being funded directly by the federal government through the council of governments.

County, city and school officials have been notified by

COG that 46 slots for young workers have been allocated for Mitchell County to hire young persons for nine weeks, a total of 256 hours at \$1.60 per hour.

Priority groups for the program are:

--Youths 14-22 from poverty

level income families.

--Vietnam veterans no older than 20.

--Students 14 through 18 between school years with preference to disadvantaged or handicapped.

--All persons who meet these requirements are urged by county officials to be at Colorado High School auditorium at 9 a.m. Tuesday, June 5 in order to make application.

Each applicant must bring social security number, and since eligibility will be based on family income for the past 12 months, applicants must have this income information when they come to apply, said County Judge Bill Carter.

Young persons who live in Loraine and Westbrook can apply at local school offices or come to Colorado High Tuesday.

Those who are hired will be allowed a minimum of 32 hours a week and a maximum of 40 hours per week for a total of 256 hours. Work will begin June 11 and end Aug. 11.

The work involved will include office work and maintenance for the county, the three school districts in the county and the three cities in the county.

The county will be the paying agent and will administer the program. The pay for the 46 youngsters totals \$18,841.60 which is about the same as in previous years.

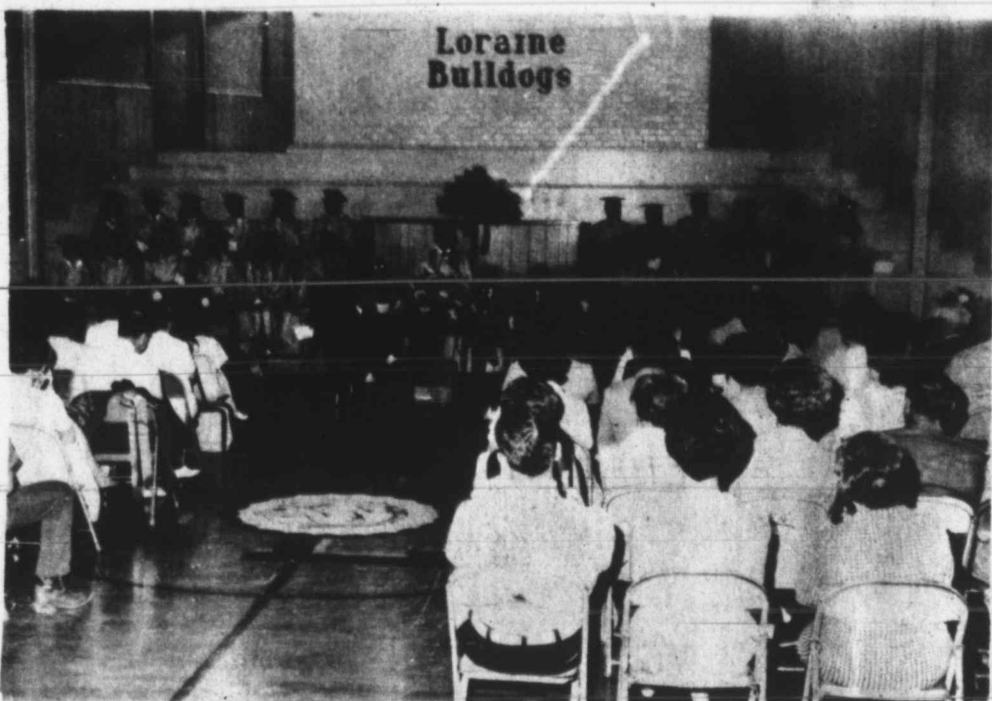

Mary Brownfield, science teacher at the high school, will accompany her to the symposium.

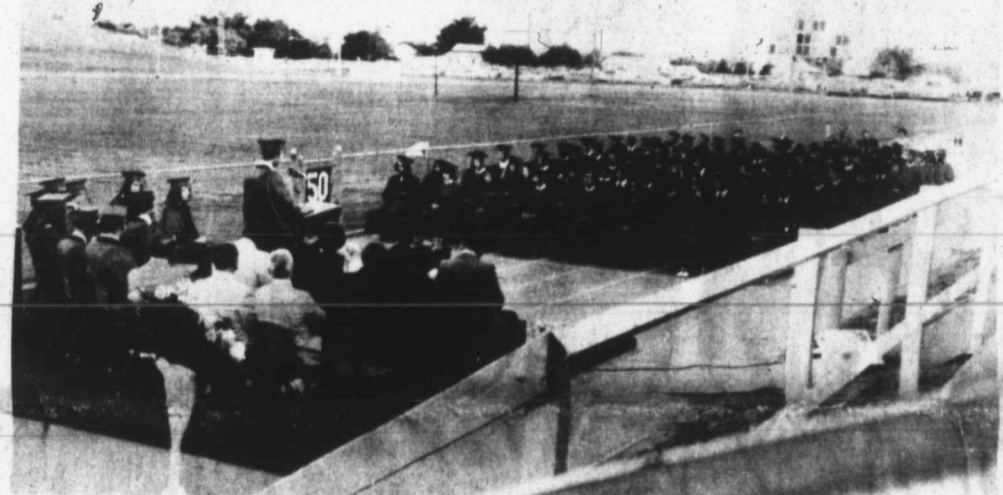
Texas Electric Service Co. a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation which is joining with the university in putting on the symposium will sponsor them.

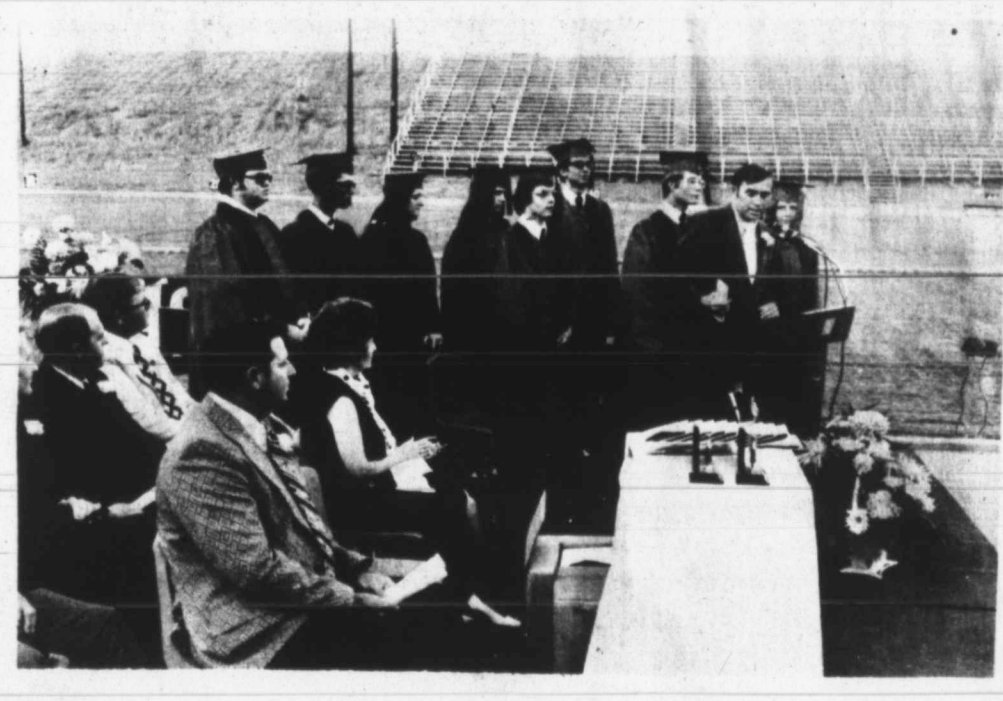

Only the championship flight will be required to play 27 holes while those in the lower three

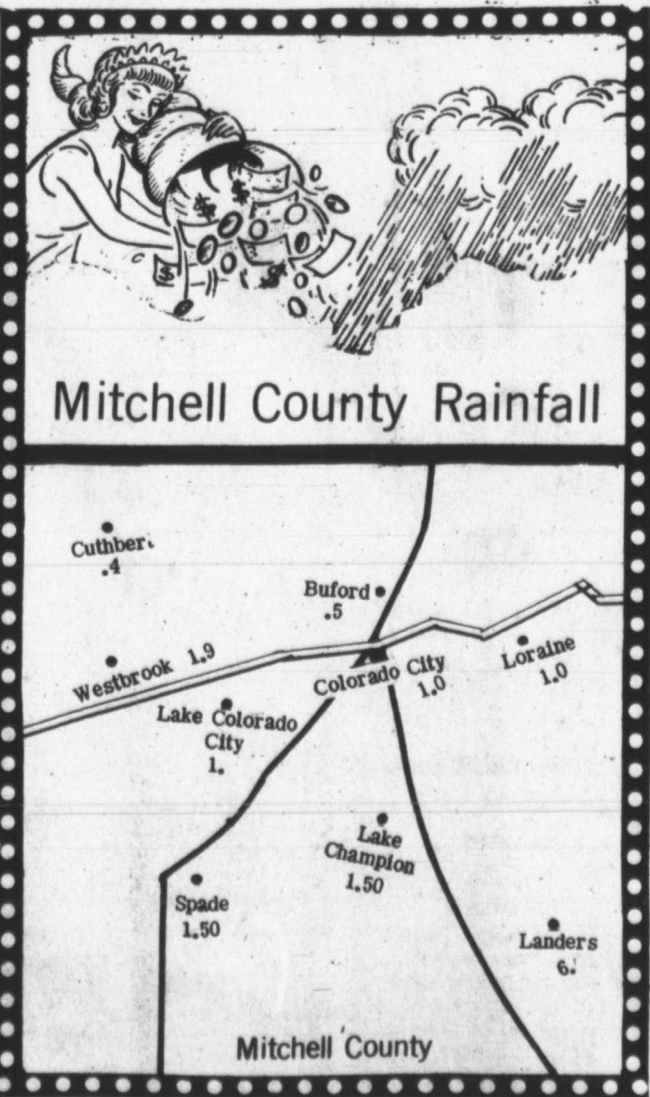
flights will play 18 holes.

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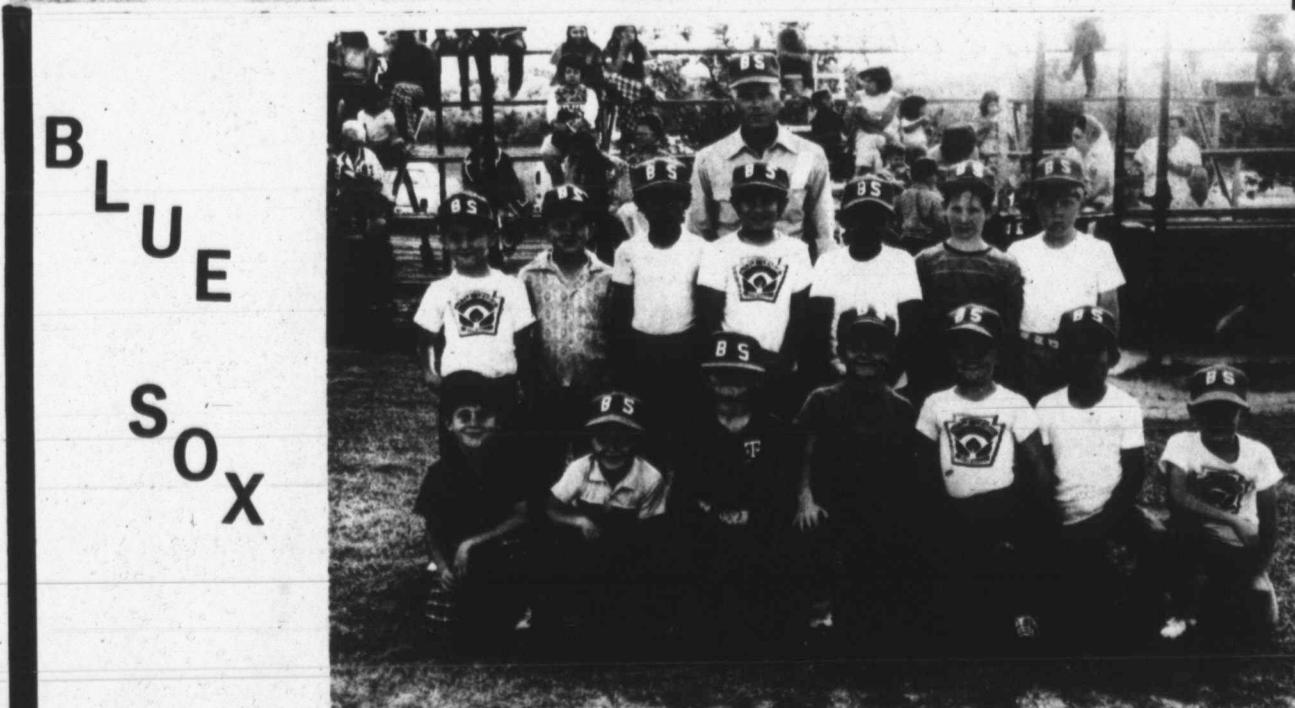

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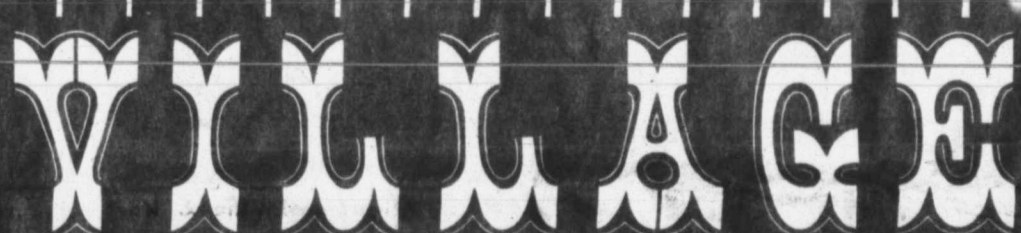


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Miss Thelma Stratton Becomes Bride Of William Oglesby

line accented by seed pearls completed the attire.

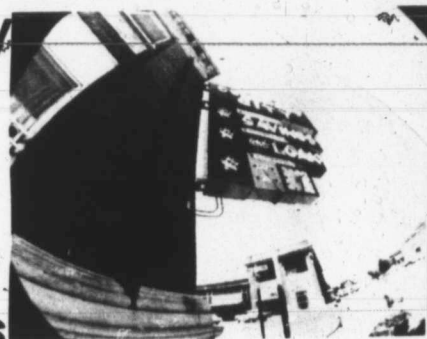
She carried a bouquet of medley spring flowers.

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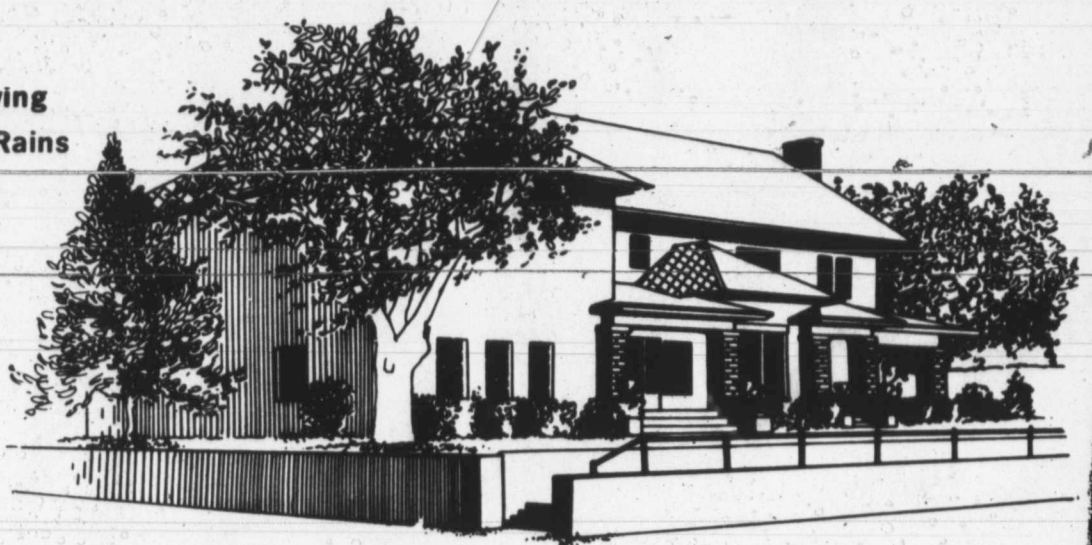

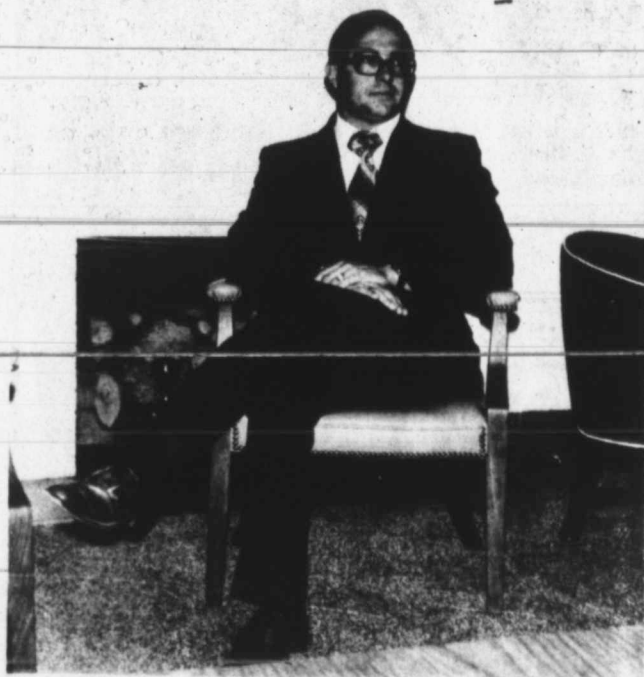

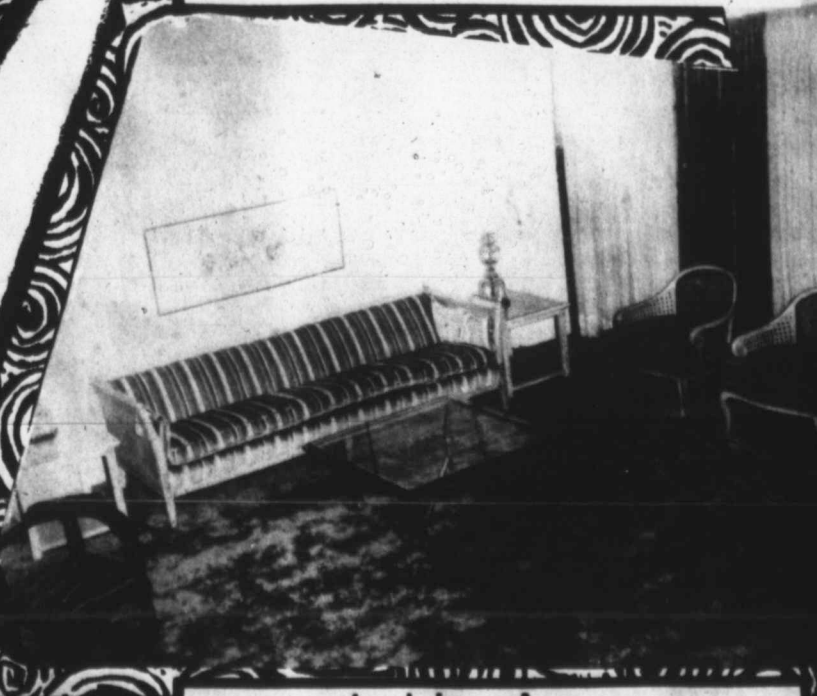

CONVERSATION CORNER

SOONER OR LATER -- and the sooner the better -- everybody is gonna run out of titles for books dealing with "How To..." telling how to do everything from curing a rash to building a fence and turning a brood of little heathens into perfect ladies and gentlemen.

It is, therefore, downright discouraging to find out there is another "How To" book on the literary market.

Published in New York by Pocket Books it is entitled "HOW TO READ A PERSON LIKE A BOOK". And it costs \$1.50 in case you're interested.

Heck. Who wants to go around reading a person like a book? It's a disturbing thought. Personally, don't even want to read ABOUT people in too many of our modern books full of human frailties, abnormal behavior and vulgarities.

DON'T know any such real characters and am happier for not knowing them. Most of us, though, already know "HOW TO READ A PERSON LIKE A BOOK" provided we are very close to them and often associated with anybody we care to read.

Most wives can read their own husband just by looking him in the eye while he is manufacturing a fib. It probably works both ways.

The new Pocket Book avers that you can't keep your thoughts a secret because your gestures are too revealing. Gestures, authors hold, are the "silent language" and far more important than what a person says out loud.

They call it "non-verbal communication" and after thousands of experiments and observations identify 15 basic emotions people express physically -- with gestures. That's what the book review says.

WHAT? Only 15 basic emotions to communicate by sign? The book review mentioned things like wearing a jacket buttoned or not, the blink, the stare, the slump, the flick of the wrist.

There must be at least 150 other ways to read people and rarely do two of the "silent language" things agree in meaning.

Take thumbing the nose. Didn't know until adulthood that the gesture has a few meanings. Parents and nobody else would tell. Thought it was a friendly gesture used only for good friends who bested you in an argument. And it still can be just that if the heart keeps pure. Best to skip it, however.

STOMPING can mean somebody is very angry. But it could

mean a pebble or a bug in the sandal. Slamming doors may signify a person is mighty mad. It also may mean a tricky night latch and a wind storm on its way.

Staring or blinking does not have to tell people -- readers you're bored or being rude. It's possible it may be near-sightedness and wondering who that somebody stared at is.

Wearing an unbuttoned jacket does not make you a slob. You might be plain hot. Shuffling the feet or slumping does not have to mean a person is lazy. He may be weary and down in the back.

Wringing the hands does not necessarily point to frustration or grief. Sometimes it's a quick way to hasten the drying of nail polish.

THERE ARE hundreds of ways to express contempt, insult. Only remember there are, too, hundreds of ways to communicate enthusiasm, friendliness.

Know one thing for sure. Try tying the hands of this writer-talker behind her back and she couldn't say a word. She'd have to resort to the "silent language" of going around kicking shins and sticking out the tongue. Then find a big rock to sit on and read "HOW TO SAY NOTHING NO WAY".

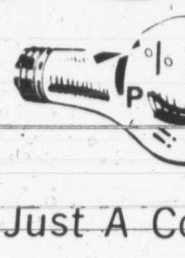

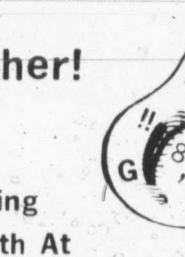

at the university, including those where experiments sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation are being carried on in thermomolecular (fusion) research.

"Attending the symposium will provide the students and excellent opportunity for learning more about the latest achievements in nuclear science," B.B. Hardee, manager of Texas Electric said. "We are pleased to make this opportunity available to them."

Included in the list of speakers during the symposium are Dr. W.E. Drummond, director of the center for plasma physics and controlled thermonuclear research at the University of Texas, and Dr. Harvey L. Cromroy, professor of entomology and nematology in the division of nuclear science at the University of Florida.

Also, Dr. Lon Morgan, president of Columbia Scientific Inc. of Austin; Dr. Dan Hightower, professor of veterinary physiology and pharmacology at Texas A&M; and John E. Tilton, research biologist for Texas Electric Service Co. in Fort Worth.

Three speakers are from the University of Texas Austin faculty, Dr. W.G. Davey, professor of mechanical engineering; Dr. Harlan K. Smith, chairman of the astronomy department; and Dr. T.A. Griffy, professor of physics.

Dr. Earnest F. Gloyna, dean of engineering at the university is chairman of the symposium.

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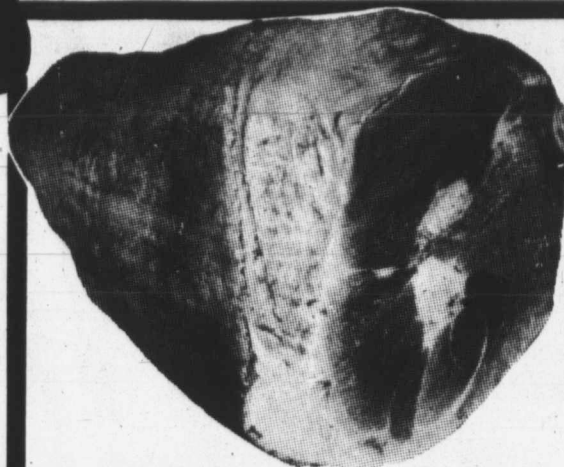
