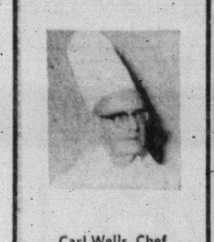

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Junior Editors Quiz on CHAMELEONS



QUESTION: How can a chameleon change color?

ANSWER: Sometimes a chameleon is bright green, the next moment gray black, or brownish black. The little creature can change its color rapidly, and it depends on this to help it escape its many natural enemies, such as birds and snakes.

The chameleon has layers of cells under its transparent skin, controlled by the nervous system, and by contracting and expanding these can make changes in its coloration.

While it may be slow in getting about, the chameleon can roll its eyes rapidly and independently, and it has a long tongue, sticky at the end. It can shoot this out at full length after insects at great speed.

The true chameleon is found only in Africa and a few other parts of the world. The American variety is another member of the family. The body is about six inches long and has a long tail. About 50 years ago there was a fad for keeping chameleons as house pets, but this did not last very long since everybody had to keep busy catching flies to feed them.

FOR YOU TO DO: Perhaps someone you know has a chameleon or three may be kept in the zoo. You will find them lively and interesting little things to watch, and the color change is always surprising to see.

BRAZZAVILLE, Congo Republic (AP)—President Kennedy has told President Abofe Fulberti Youlou that an ill-prepared summit conference could cause "profound disappointment in the entire world."

In a letter released here today, Kennedy declined a suggestion made by Youlou last August that the East-West leaders meet in Brazzaville to settle world problems.

He wrote Youlou that he appreciated the offer and "I beg you to be assured of the devotion of my government to the cause of peace."

Neutron Bomb Is Reported Objective

NEW YORK (AP)—The immediate goal of the United States in any resumption of nuclear tests would be development of a fission neutron bomb, according to published reports.

The New York Daily News quoted an unidentified Washington official as saying "It's a safe assumption that we will be testing the neutron bomb very soon."

The New York Journal-American reported it had learned the neutron bomb "is the prime objective of the United States."

The neutron bomb was described as producing death without destruction by blasting out neutrons, which neutrons that could penetrate three feet of concrete.

Essentially, the difference between neutron and other types of radiation is that they penetrate multi-layered structures and kill animals and human life inside without leaving the building or nearby ground saturated with the usual radio-producing contamination.

There was an impetuous comment from the White House, Pentagon and other sources in Washington on the report.

The late Thomas E. Murray, a former Atomic Energy Commission member, told the presidential candidates in an open letter during the last election campaign that such a bomb is feasible. He said "conceivable designs for such a weapon existed in American laboratories and would have been tested had it not been for the moratorium on nuclear testing."

Other candidates in the race for president in 1960 had also mentioned the neutron bomb. They included Richard Wilkins and William F. Buckley Jr. Jerry Voorhis and James H. Doolittle, third grade, Nancy Kubena and Clarence P. Brown, fourth grade, Allen Tate and John F. Kennedy, fifth grade, Robert F. Kennedy, sixth grade, Barry Goldwater, seventh grade, Chester C. Callahan, eighth grade, Charles W. Taylor and George H. W. Bush, ninth grade, and Robert F. Kennedy, tenth grade.

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Fallout Is Traced Over Peninsula

WASHINGTON (AP)—The weather bureau estimated today that the radioactive cloud from Russia's massive bomb-explosion Monday will pass over Siberia's Kamchatka Peninsula tonight.

Fallout expert Robert List said he expects the cloud to cross over the Aleutian Island chain Thursday and reach Alaska later in the day.

List said the winds started out at 41 miles an hour after the blast, increased to about 35 at today and night, reach 90 by Thursday.

Meanwhile, the Public Health Service said the highest measurements of radioactivity in the air in the country today was 25 microcuries per cubic meter at Montgomery, Ala.

The Montgomery reading had been the same on Monday, Gaston, N.C., which had the high reading Monday at 35.8 showed a measurement of 16.5 Tuesday.

In Alaska, Anchorage had a reading of 3.00 Tuesday and at Fairbanks the level was 1.1. Monday the figures had been 2.75 at Anchorage and 1.8 at Fairbanks.

The service says the highest radioactivity levels reached in this country during the recent Soviet test series, while undetectable, do not pose a public health hazard unless maintained over a long period of time. The highest reading reported was a one-day count of 10.5 at Little Rock, Ark.
