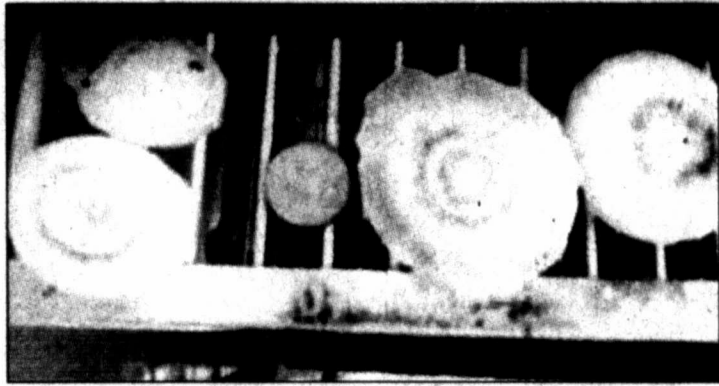

Hail storms pound area Monday evening



HAIL OF A WEEKEND — Memorial Day weekend came to a thunderous close Monday evening as Colorado City got pelted with hail twice. These four pieces of hail (cut in half to show rings) fell in Westbrook area and are placed here next to a U.S. quarter (center).

Colorado City got a taste of Mother Nature's fury Monday evening as rain and hail bombarded the city and surrounding area. On two separate occasions, hail measuring as small as marbles and sometimes as large as golf balls pounded roofs, cars and the occasional stray cat.

Rainfall seems to be making a home in Mitchell County so far this year, as another 1.75 inches was reported downtown, elevating the yearly total to 10.8 inches. 1.2 inches was reported in Westbrook, while sources around Loraine saw 1.4. Those southeast

of Lake Champion said they got 1.8 inches and a lot of hail.

During the first of the two hail storms, Mitchell County was placed in a tornado warning with a tornado being spotted 20 miles south of town, according to the Weather Bureau. Though the county remained in a tornado watch until midnight, the tornado warning expired at 8:30 p.m. with no reported damage.

Area cotton farmers are in the midst of planting season and the cotton which had already come up may have to be replanted after the storm.

Tuesday morning however, another storm arose, a storm of phone calls to the local insurance agencies. As of 1 p.m. on Tuesday, one local insurance company had already received 18 claims, mostly on roofs and broken windows in homes. Another insurance company was showing 10 claims on vehicles and three home owner claims, while yet another showed 12 claims, mostly vehicles. Things were a bit quieter at the final company called, as they had only received two claims, but the afternoon was just getting started.

Missing mother and daughter found, safe

Phones started ringing frantically in Colorado City Friday afternoon, when relatives were unable to locate Brittany Hill and her two year old daughter, Khole Wheeler. The two had not been seen since they left the home of Hill's mother on 6th Street in Colorado City.

Hill's boyfriend, Rosendo Gonzales was also not able to be located. According to a public service announcement sent out by the Colorado City Police Department, Hill had been assaulted on Monday morning, May 21. She was treated at Cogdell Memorial Hospital in Snyder for what was reported as injuries sustained during a fall.

When no one was able to find any of the three people, the police department was notified. According to Chief Roy Owens, Hill's cell phone was turned off and they were not able to get any

'pings' off of it. With no way of knowing if the young mother and her daughter were safe, the public was advised of the situation and asked to help.

According to Chief Owens, the phone was turned back on Saturday morning and they were finally able to get a location. She was near Galveston.

As police tracked and monitored the cell phone's calls and texts, they were able to determine Hill was travelling north on I-45 toward Dallas. The Colorado City Police Department got in touch with the Hillsboro Police Department, who in turn, were able to make contact with Hill. She was travelling with Gonzales and Wheeler and everyone was reported to be safe.

On Sunday afternoon, Rosendo was arrested on 6th Street in Colorado City for criminal trespassing.

Arthur retires as principal

Friday night was a special occasion in Colorado City as the senior class of 2012 graduated at Wolf Stadium before stands packed full of their friends and relatives. As they each walked

up to receive their diploma, their name was called over the sound system by Hutchinson principal, Kitten Arthur. They may very well be the last class to have that privilege, since Arthur is retiring

after 38 years in the education profession, 35 of which she spent with Colorado ISD.

How Mitchell County voted

The primaries are over and the numbers tallied. In the Republican presidential primaries, Mitt Romney led the way with 272 of the 411 votes in Mitchell County. David Dewhurst took the senator nomination with 244 of the votes. Mike Conaway ran away with the votes for U.S. Representative for District 11. He had 337 of the 402 votes.

Nomination for the Place 2 Supreme Court Justice went to Steve Smith and the Justice for Place 4 went to David Medina.

Robert Duncan ran away with the nomination for State Sen. in District 28 with 328 of the 357 votes. In District 83, Charles Perry retains his seat, defeating Delwin Jones with 305 of the 385 votes.

Sylvia Clanton was unopposed in the primaries for County Tax Assessor. Ann Reed went unopposed as the District Attorney and Glen Harrison went unopposed for District Judge.

In the Democratic primaries, President Obama carried Mitchell County. County Attorney Ty Wood, Sheriff Patrick Toombs and Tax Assessor Faye Lee, County Commissioners Randy Anderson and Jesse Munoz ran unopposed. On the Democratic ballot, Propositions 1, 2 and 3 all passed in Mitchell County, as did propositions on the Republican ballot for School Choice, Repealing Obamacare, Public Prayer, Balanced Budget and Redistricting. There was standing room only in Wolf Stadium Friday night for the Colorado ISD Class of 2012 graduation, where 75 students turned a page in their lives.

A former CHS student, Nathan Smith, was the featured speaker for the night. Smith, a 2006 graduate, spoke to students directly, when he said, "It's time to get tough" and "the training wheels are off". Smith reminded the graduates that they will have to "go hard" to be competitive in

today's society. He also encouraged the young men and women to meet the challenges in their futures head-on. Smith is the son of Dwayne and Sheryl Smith of Colorado City.

Miranda Reyna, daughter of Henry and Sylvia Reyna, gave the salutatorian's address, naming lots of achievements made by the Class of 2012 during their years at Colorado ISD. She said her classmates were competitive, in a good way, with one another,

and CISD Superintendent Reggy Spencer agreed, saying that this class was graduating a very large percentage of honor graduates. Before concluding her address, Reyna quoted one of her favorite Bible scriptures, Isaiah 41:40.

Marisela Hernandez addressed the full stadium and her classmates as the valedictorian of her class. Hernandez spent much of her talk thanking those who had helped her through school, God, See 2012, Page 5

New city manager takes office this week

Colorado City's new city manager was in his office Tuesday to begin the official duties of the position. Fabio Angell had a full plate in front of him for his first day, as his itinerary had him scheduled for interviews with city council members, the mayor, the chief of police and even lowly newspaper editors.

The upbeat man from Del Rio was enthusiastic as he spoke about Colorado City.

"I love this town," he said. "All its history and heritage is remarkable."

Angell said he arrived in Colorado City Sunday night and has spent most of Sunday and Monday just getting to know the town itself, from Pine Street to Ruddick Park and along the remnants of a historic 2nd Street, a sight which impressed Angell greatly.

"Colorado City was known as the 'Mother City of West Texas'" he said. "I would like to build on that, use that history and heritage to rebuild it to its glory. I look at the buildings downtown and I see them completely restored, with people coming in and out and the cash registers ringing."

While driving around Colorado City Monday evening, Angell witnessed the rain that saturated Mitchell County. He followed the flowing water from Hickory Street, through the city until it finally disappeared into a line of trees west of Cherry Street.

"The engineering was amazing," he said. "The roads were designed in such a way that the water never stayed in any particular area. It flowed off rather quickly."

The one drawback, according to Angell, was just getting started. See ANGELL, Page 5



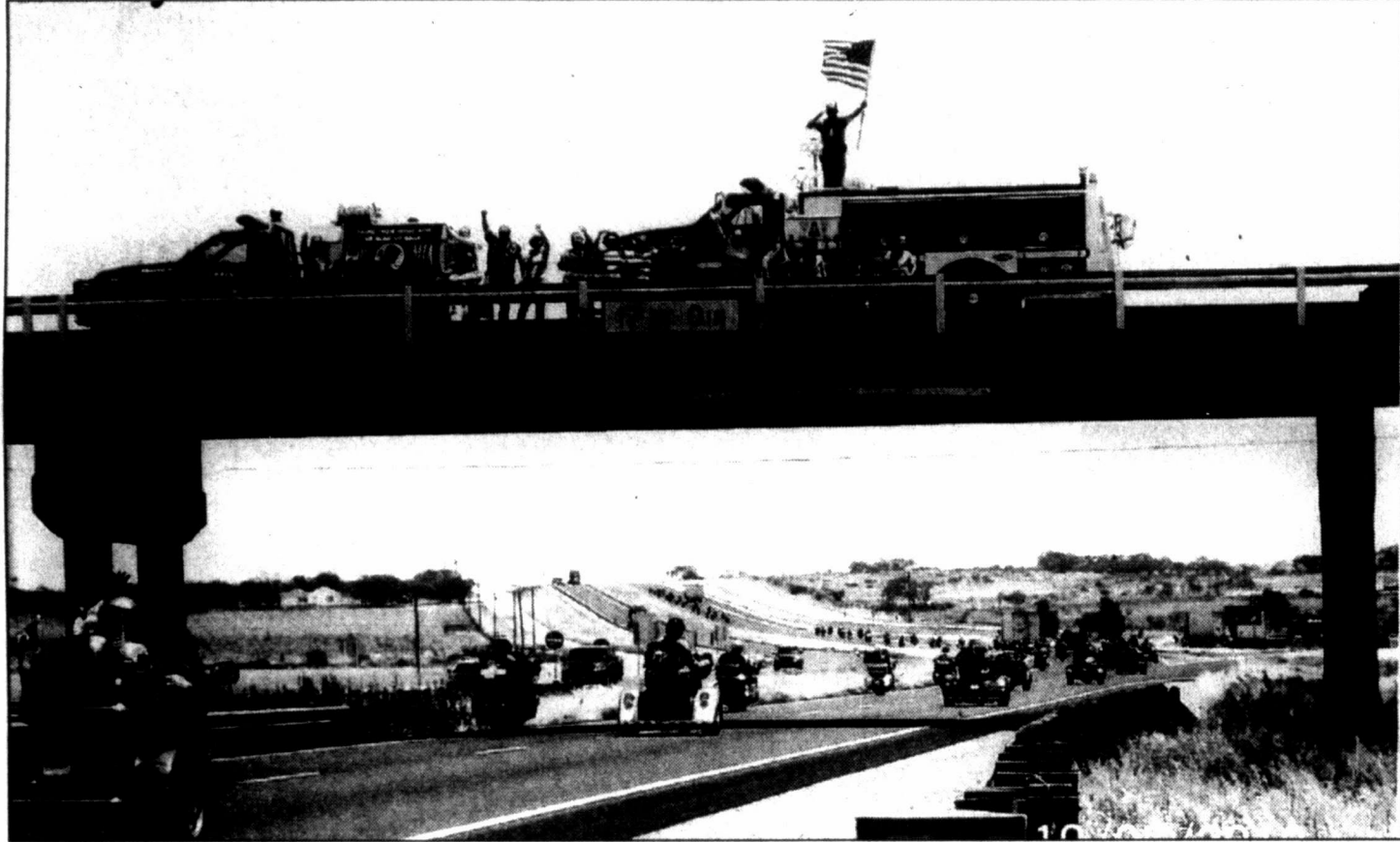

Last weekend's Run for the Wall event in downtown Colorado City was a phenomenal success, as it has been for 12 years running. In last week's edition, the *Record* focused on the riders and their mission, but as any veteran can tell you, nothing goes according to plan without all the rear echelon staff doing their part. In Colorado City, the same is true.

No one person or organization can take credit for the still unbelievable scene which thundered through the city.

"It would have been impossible to pull off without everybody working together," CMS principal Mark Merrell said. "From the prisoners from the Wallace Unit setting up the Railroad Building to the kids themselves, it was a great group effort."

But the list goes on, as long or longer than the line of bikes that rolled through C-City. The Kiwanis Club cooking the meat saw the largest crowd ever, according to Merrell. The students from Colorado Middle School, under the direction of Harold Sowa, stuffed over 1,000 jalapeño peppers for the event.

Activities were organized mostly by Robyn Hammond and the meals themselves were paid for by donations from many people in the community.

The Colorado High School Jazz Band performed during the meal, under the direction of Linda Clay and according to Merrell, put on a memorable show. "The Jazz Band was just great," he said. "Mrs. Clay and the kids were just wonderful."

Members of the Lions Club and Rotary Club were seen serving meals as well during the event, an event which has continually gotten bigger year after year.

"The first year, we had 86 riders," Merrell said. "It has just grown every year since then. A big 'thanks' goes out to the entire community for their help."

Even the American Legion in Snyder, Post Number 181, got into the act. As well as being a lunch stop, Colorado City was also a gas stop. The American Legion Post paid for the gas for all the riders while they were here. Though the total amount was not formally released, several people have told the *Record* it cost the American Legion between \$3,000 and \$5,000.

Perhaps the biggest 'thank you' needs to go back to the kids themselves. Colorado Middle School has created an event which has outgrown them. It has become bigger than the school, possibly bigger than the city itself.

Jazz Band helps raise funds for Opera House

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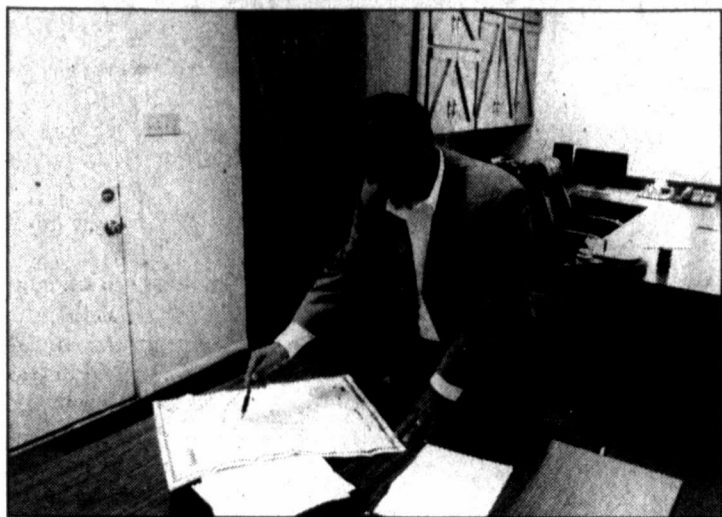

ing to Angell, was that the water seemed to be wasted.

"One of the big issues, as I understand it, is water," he said. "I would like to see if there is a way to collect the rainwater when we get an inch or two and use it."

For the most part, however, Angell said his main objective for the immediate future is to learn. He said he needed to talk with the people of Colorado City, the city council, the mayor and see what was important to them in order to get the direction the city needs to go in. He also mentioned the vision the city had already been working on and hoped to be able to help in that direction.

"I need to observe the lay of the land over the next few weeks," he said. The visioning process from a year ago is something I would love to sink my teeth into. It's not so much about someone coming in from the outside and saying this is what needs to be done; it's about what you all, the citizens, think is important."

Angell said he wanted to work side by side with the mayor and

city council to complete the tasks they have already put on paper and put them into action.

"I came with ideas, we all do, but I think that's secondary," Angell said. "We got to look at what it is our city council wants to do over the next three, five or ten years and extract from there a plan of action."

He talked about the possibility for a need to consult hydrologists, geologists and other experts to help the city determine the best course of action, especially where the water issue is concerned.

"We've talked about a lot of different subjects already, but I think what I want to do at this point is learn, learn, learn," he said.

"I need to find ways where I can serve the city council, because by serving the city council, we can work together as a team."

Fabio Angell will be at the Civic Center Thursday for a meet and greet from 4-6 p.m. All the citizens of Colorado City are invited to come out and meet the new city manager.

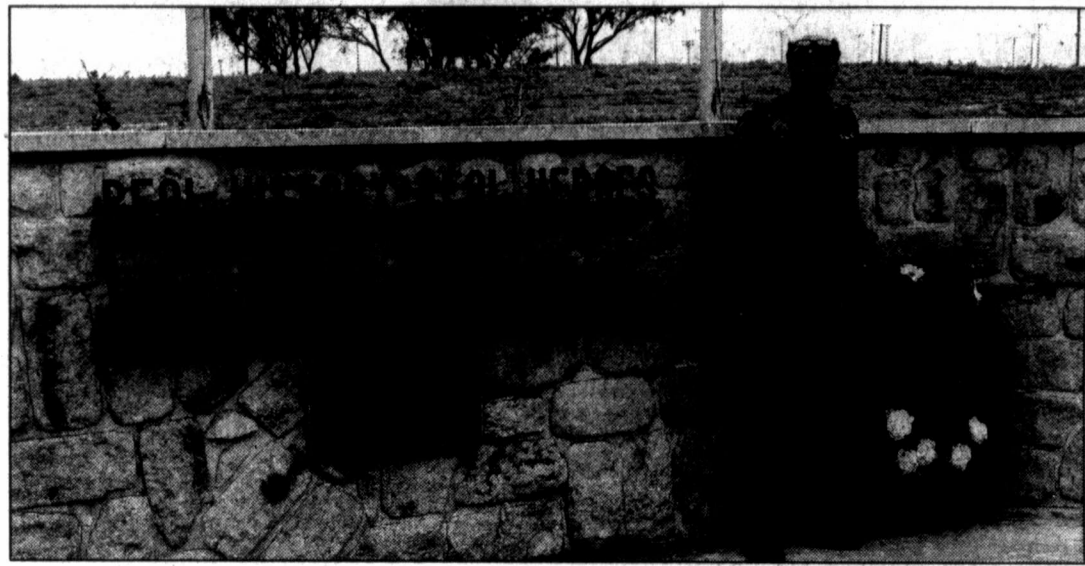

to spend some time with him," Arthur said. "The other reason I am retiring now is that we have some great people in this district. There are a lot of young people who are getting their degrees and it's time for some of us 'old folks' to step aside. It's time to put them in, I think."

Still wiping away tears, Arthur said she loved the district, the kids, but it was just time for her to retire.

"There are a lot of new ideas, new thinking. It's time for a changing of the guard," she said.

Arthur had the opportunity to work at different campuses in the district, including teaching English at the high school and acting as the curriculum director at the central office.

She also taught eighth grade Honors English before being moved to Kelley Elementary.

"I probably learned more from the teachers there than any course I ever took," she said. "They were so passionate about what they were doing."

Of course, some of the lessons came a little harder for Arthur.

"I remember my first day

as the principal at Kelley," she said. "I was greeting all the children and this little girl had what looked like a scrape on the end of her nose. I touched her nose and asked her what had happened. While working as the curriculum director, Arthur did a lot of work with the state and federal government. As a result, she will be working part time at the administration office during her retirement. She said her main job would be whatever superintendent Reggy Spencer and the principals need her to do.

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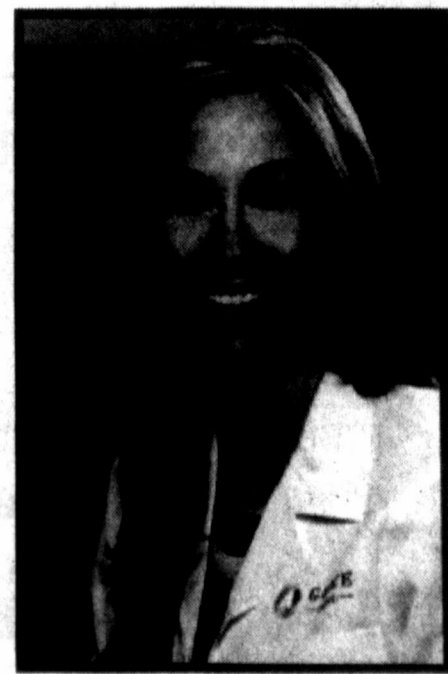

As fast as we seem to spend money in our speed-of-light lives today, it may often seem that your purse or wallet is coming apart at the seams! In today's tough economic times we are all scrambling to save every penny possible. The following areas are where you can cut your costs and put money in your pocket.

These ten saving areas are based on nationwide statistics, but I have researched the cost of these in Mitchell County and the final figures given here are Mitchell County specific. Over the next three weeks, I will be sharing tips and aideas to plus these holes.

Also, mark your calendar for Thursday, May 24 and Friday, May 25 and join met at the Mitchell County Extension Office Conference Room at noon. On May 24, we will dine at the dollar store and on May 25, we will coupon with the pros! Please call 325-728-3111 or drop by our office at 440 E. 2nd St. in Colorado City and reserve your spot. There will be a light lunch served. Cost for this program series is \$10.

ATM Fees: Nationwide it will cost you an average of \$4 to use the most convenient ATM location. It is estimated that consumers make five to 10 unnecessary

ATM withdrawals per month. So, on the "low end", you would spend about \$20 per month and on the "high end" about \$40 per month. Results for Mitchell County show that one of the banking entities in the county had no ATM card service, another had no ATM cards but charged \$2 per transaction if you used an ATM card from another bank at their location. Two banking locations charged \$2 for ATM service from another banking entity. Low end costs for Mitchell County were about \$10 per month and high end were \$20 per month. Total savings for the year: \$120 to \$240.

Lottery Tickets: It is often said you have a better chance of being struck by lightning than winning the lottery. U.S. consumers last year bought more than \$70 billion worth of lottery tickets! About \$38 billion was awarded in prizes. Most lottery players play \$10-\$20 per week, mostly on scratch-off tickets. In small towns and rural Mitchell County, we have five locations to buy lottery tickets. Since 1992, we have had one Lotto winner. Total savings for the year: \$520 to \$1040.

Gourmet Coffee: Spending a few bucks at the local coffee shop may seem harmless, but just think about all the money you could save. In large cities, Americans average about \$8.43 for a quick stop at an upscale coffee shop and average indulgence is 46 times per year. The total bill in large town USA for this indulgence is \$385.97. Daily drinkers average \$4 per day/\$80 per month and \$960 per year. In rural Mitchell County, a 20 ounce cup of gourmet Joe at our local convenience store will run you \$2. The only difference in consumption is that we, in rural America, are more likely to indulge ourselves on a more regular basis. Rural folks tend to enjoy their coffee! For the lack of confirmed data, we will use the same 46 times per year and a daily habit. Total cost for a casual coffee drinker in Mitchell County would spend \$480 per year.

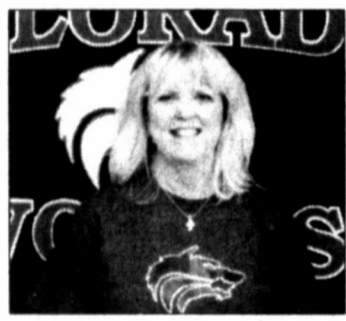

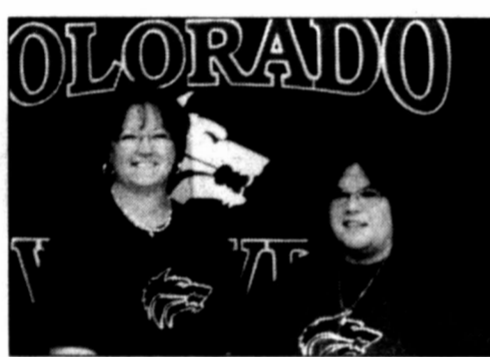

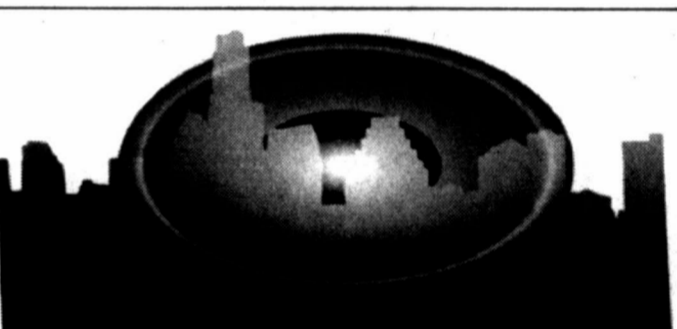

TUMBLEWEED SMITH The Hollywood of Johnson County

People all over the world want a postmark from Venus, Texas. "That's the planet of love," says Trish Fisher of the Venus post office, "so around Christmas or Valentine it's a good thing to have. That's when we get requests from all over the US and some foreign countries. They are mailed to them and the envelopes that come with the requests that have foreign stamps on them go to the mayor's office and they become part of the city's history. Some of the requests are from dedicated stamp collectors."

City Administrator Jerry Reed has fun with the name. "The book says men are from Mars and women are from Venus. I'm the exception, I guess, but don't read anything into that." He says the town was first called Gossip. It dates back to the 1880's and was incorporated in 1903.

"Somewhere along the way the name was changed to Venus. A prominent doctor in the town had a daughter named Venus, so the town was named for her."

Some big movies have been made in Venus. "Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway came and robbed both of our banks," says Jerry, "because the real Bonnie and Clyde had really robbed both banks at one time. They made a good portion of that movie here. Tom Cruise has been here for his 'Born on the Fourth of July' movie. Geraldine Page won an academy award for a movie filmed here called 'The Trip to Bountiful'. The first house that Chuck Norris ever blew up on 'Walker Texas Ranger' was one of our old houses here in Venus. I've tried to get him to come back because I've got four or five more I'd like to have him blow up. We think the reason there are so many movies made here is that if Hollywood producers want to make a movie and they need buildings from the time of the depression in Texas they can come here without doing anything at all to our town square.

He calls Venus the Hollywood Capital of Johnson County. "We've had more movies made here than any other city in Johnson County. We're going to re-do the town square and call it 'The Hollywood Square' and the history of the movies made here will be displayed there."

Jerry says Venus doesn't get many visitors. "Most of the people who are not from Venus fly right by on Highway 67. If they stop, they're lost and asking for directions."

The population of Venus is 3,000, but 1,000 of those are prisoners. The prison was recently annexed so the city is required to count as citizens. Jerry says that helps when the city applies for government grants because it has a low per capita income.
