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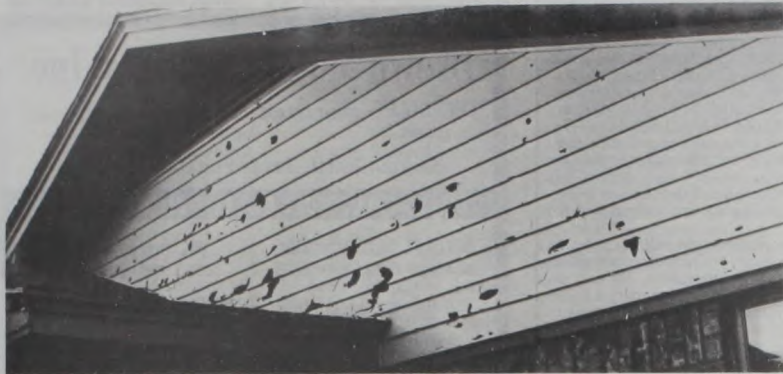

Mother Nature provides ethereal fireworks... Summer storms strike with lightning and hail damage

Twice within the last week severe thunderstorms menaced the Muenster area. On Thursday evening, June 30, and again on Tuesday evening, July 4, area residents witnessed spectacular electrical displays.

On June 30 lightning struck two oil tanks on the Rosalee Bayer farm north of Muenster. It blew the bottoms out of the tanks and sent smoke and flames billowing high enough to be seen for miles.

The Muenster Volunteer Fire Department responded. Fire Chief Herbie Knabe said, "We let it burn itself out. There wasn't much else we could do." He estimated property damage of up to \$5,000. to the tanks and fittings.

One tank was empty and the other contained several barrels of oil. WFW Well Service owns the tanks.

Quite a few insurance claims were filed due to Thursday's lightning damaging appliances.

Rain fell fast and heavy causing several roads in Cooke County to be closed. Some areas of the county reported between two and two and one half inches of rain.

Ominous clouds hung over Cooke County again Tuesday evening. Showers started around 8 p.m. dashing plans for fireworks displays at family parties. Storms seemed to come in waves all night with the worst hitting before midnight.

Hail pelted Muenster and areas to the east and south. Golf balls and larger size hail hit south of Muenster. Particularly hard-hit was a strip in the area of the Paul and Patsy Dangelmayrs, Denis and Della Walterscheids.

Della Walterscheid said that the turbulent weather seemed to come in waves, four of them, that formed around Forestburg. The first dropped hail the size of quarters mixed with a few that were golf ball size. The second wave was the

worst. It beat the area with high winds and hail stones as large as golf and tennis balls. She estimated the time of the worst storm to be between 10 and 10:30 p.m.

The Walterscheids had trees stripped of leaves, lost one large tree and their garden crop. Damage at the Dangelmayr home included three broken windows, large holes knocked in the vinyl siding, damaged window screens, a shattered truck window, and trees with shattered leaves. Patsy reported that one of the barns had a door on the north side blown off and torn up.

A soy bean crop of the Dangelmayrs was totaled. Their maize was shattered and knocked down, but only harvest will reveal how much was lost. "It could have been a whole lot worse," reflected Patsy. She recalled the tornado that ripped through Montague and Cooke County this spring.

Area moisture measures normal

With mild temperatures and plentiful rainfall through the winter and spring, the Muenster area can boast of one of the best displays of wildflowers in years. Pasture grass also flourished and hay crops have been excellent. For the first five days of July, Mary Moster, who keeps the official records of Muenster's rainfall, recorded .04 inches on July 1, .01 on July 3, and .83 on July 5. Some residents outside of Muenster are happily telling of getting two or more inches of rain during the night of July 4. Sadly some also received damage to crops, trees and gardens from hail that fell during the July 4 rain.

Muenster residents rally against high tax appraisals

A public meeting was held on Wednesday, June 26 for anyone who wanted to learn more about increases in Cooke County property appraisals, particularly in Muenster. Phyllis Murrill, who until recently was the city of Gainesville's representative to the Cooke County Appraisal District, was present to explain property appraisals, a citizens rights, and how one should prepare before going before the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) to protest increases in his or her property values.

Ms. Murrill could also be hired by individuals to gather information that they needed to protest the increases.

The meeting inspired many who attended since they felt that they had gained valuable information. Others seemed down and felt that they had no option but to put up with the extreme increases. About 45 people attended.

City Council has busy agenda

Property cleanup throughout the City was again discussed. This matter was tabled from the June meeting to allow the new council members to review Ordinance #132 regulating junk, trash, weeds, etc., passed and adopted in 1972. All Council members agreed that the ordinance is very clear in its intent to safeguard the health and welfare of the citizens of Muenster and provisions for removal of trash, rubbish, weeds, grass, etc. It was the decision of the Council for City Hall to follow up on letters previously sent to residents to ensure compliance by them with the ordinance. Any future action necessary will be up to the decision

of the City Administrator. Work is progressing for the new well site. The land easement has been obtained and an access road and power lines to the well site are underway.

Preliminary cost figures to purchase a vehicle for the City Administrator were discussed. Action on this item was tabled until the next meeting.

City Attorney Chuck Bartush discussed the appraisal report prepared in regard to the requested alley closing for the expansion of Fischer's Market. The Council voted to proceed with the sale of the alley to Fischer's Market according to the terms of the appraisal. Fischer's

agreed to pay for the reroute of utilities as well as the legal costs involved in the alley closing.

The Council voted to install a flag pole in front of City Hall to display the United States Flag recently received from Senator Gramm's office.

An item on the agenda to consider closing the alleyway between 8th and 9th Streets brought concern from several of the residents who attended to voice their objection. This item was on the agenda due to an apparent misunderstanding and the residents were ensured that the alley would not be closed.

The Council voted to adopt a

resolution for the City to support and encourage the new library project.

Alderman Hennigan discussed the need to purchase a police vehicle and explained that used vehicles can be purchased from the State of Texas. Authorization was given to Alderman Hennigan and Chief Tompkins for the purchase of a vehicle.

Bills in the amount of \$42,249.72 were approved.

The condition of the City streets was discussed. Street commissioner, John Pagel, will work with the City Administrator to prepare a priority list and proposal for the next meeting.

Cooke County Crimestoppers, along with officers of the Muenster Police Department, Cooke County Sheriff's Office and the Office of the Texas Rangers, are attempting to gather information on a felony theft that occurred during the weekend of Germanfest, April 28, 29 and 30.

Chief of Police Helen Tompkins had reported to her, just after the Germanfest weekend, the theft of approximately \$37,000-\$40,000 from the Jaycees Beer Ticket Booth. This was publicized and since has caused the return of approximately \$34,670.00 and received at various locations throughout the city. This has all been done anonymously.

Officers, with the assistance of the Texas Rangers, are seeking information on the suspect or suspects who were involved in this criminal activity.

Anyone with information to the above-mentioned criminal activity is encouraged to contact Chief Helen Tompkins, Muenster Police, at 817-759-2236; Investigator Lewanna Wisian, Cooke County Sheriff's Office, at 817-665-3471; the Office of Texas Rangers, Department of Public Safety Office, 903-813-0538; or Cooke County Crimestoppers at 817-665-8477 or 1-800-448-0477.

Cooke County Crimestoppers is a nonprofit organization that offers cash rewards of up to \$1,000.00 for information leading to an indictment of the person(s) who commit felony crimes. By calling 817-665-8477 (TIPS), a caller, without their identity being revealed, can give information regarding a felony and can receive up to \$1,000.00 cash.

When a caller telephones Crimestoppers, the caller is given a code number. That number is known only to Crimestoppers and the caller. No names are used to identify the caller. No one at Crimestoppers will know the identity of the caller, only a code number. If the information given leads to an indictment, the caller will be eligible for a cash reward up to \$1,000.00.

Sacred Heart church steeple is removed. Sixty feet of the familiar tower were removed down to the bell housing. Built in 1898 the steeple was showing signs of weakening and pastor and church committee decided the building was safer without the additional height. The standing portion was covered with metal. Muenster receives first load of wheat brought in by Alois Trubenbach-second load brought in by John Bayer. Traditional ceremonies mark feast of Corpus Christi at Sacred Heart Church, with procession to the two small chapels east of church, Benediction at both

and in church and little children strewing flowers.

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Babbitt takes step to correct act

Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt's recent decision to exempt landowners with five or fewer acres from regulations contained in the federal Endangered Species Act is a good move, but it's only a starting point, according to Robert Klement, president of the Cooke County Farm Bureau.

In announcing the exemption, Babbitt said he hoped to correct inequities in the enforcement of the Endangered Species Act.

"I think what it shows is that the Secretary is aware of the fact that the Endangered Species Act is a

burden for many property owners," explained Robert. "And I think it really calls for the question, 'why stop at five acres?' The impact of the Act, whether you own five acres or five thousand acres, is much the same. If that burden renders your property unusable, you get the same net effect."

Robert said the Farm Bureau is looking to the reauthorization of the Endangered Species Act in Congress this year to ensure all of the law's requirements apply across-the-board to all property owners, regardless of acreage size.

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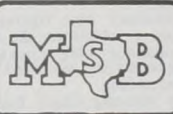

Texas Football reviews area schools

It's a hot summer in July, but once again high school football is the talk, as Dave Campbell's 1995 edition of *Texas Football* hits the newsstands. This year's 35th annual magazine is a real collector's issue with a special "Farewell to the Southwest Conference."

Of local interest, the contributing writers of *Texas Football* give the Sacred Heart Tigers the district 1-A lead. Coach John Nasche returns 18 lettermen from an 11-1 TAPPS state championship. Only 4 seniors were lost.

Players to watch include Scott Frost, Mike Becker, Brandon Bayer, John Klement and Toby Hess. Frost and Klement were also listed as returning statistical leaders in their class. Frost had 1,205 yards rushing last season in 9 games and Klement completed 32 passes for 485 yards. Other listed Tiger starters returning were Paul Swirczynski, Joseph McCoy, Jake McCoy and Scott Poole.

Fort Worth's Masonic Home was chosen for the 2nd place, led by Hugo Ramos, who moved to quarterback last year, averaging 106 yards rushing per game. Others returning from a 6-4 play team that lost 7 lettermen included Sean Moreno, Arthur Calcaterra and Dale Ellison.

Pantego Christian Academy of Arlington returns with a strong junior class. Nate Van Cleave threw for 1,305 yards and 14 touchdowns, while Mike Gunter was in on 129 tackles. The Panthers have 25 lettermen, 7-8 starters returning from a 4-5-1 team. Five lettermen were lost.

The Dallas Lakehill Warriors return with a tough defense, led by Dave Gafford (97 tackles) and Derrick Gordon (63 tackles, 9 sacks), that held their opponents to fewer than 15 points a game.

The Blazers of Dallas Temple end the district after a 2-7 season.

The other side of TAPPS class A include Fort Worth Southwest Christian, Waco Parkhill, Shiner St. Paul, Balch Springs, and Rockwall Christian Academy.

In a 1994 TAPPS review, Sacred Heart defeated Shiner St. Paul 26-7 in the semi-finals, then took the championship with a victory over Waco Parkview.

"The toughest thing about figuring out the playoffs in Texas private school leagues is, well, figuring out the playoffs," the article concluded. "No matter how often TAPPS tinkers with its playoff system, weird things keep happening." Last season TAPPS decided to change to the penetration/first downs/yards per game tie breaker without exception in all title contests. To Sacred Heart's advantage, the new rule gave them the class A title on first downs after a 14-14 tie.

In Texas UIL class A football, the Lindsay Knights made the preseason Top 10. "The team from regional III is somewhat of a surprise, but the No. 10 Lindsay Knights have gotten accustomed to surprising people, blasting out of the past by running the old Notre Dame box/single wing" quoting the preview article.

The Knights, coached by Charlie Meurer, last season came out of a 2-5 start, to win their final 3 district games and two playoff contests before falling to Burkeville. Burkeville did not draw a top 10 spot because quarterback, Jeremy Brooks dropped out of school in the spring. Lindsay lost 7 lettermen from a 7-6 quarterfinalist team. Players to watch include Greg Dulock, Jeff Hale, Garrett Hellinger (preseason class A second team defensive back), Robert Sharp (returning stat leader with 6 interceptions) and T.J. Goldsmith. Other starters mentioned were Chris Escobedo, Shawn Hanks and Zack Bowman.

The Alford Bulldogs return from a 5-5 season with 6-6 starters. Players to watch include Brent Hancock, with 43 tackles and 31 assists as last season defensive end moves to linebacker. Also quarterback Preston Hartfield, Jason Barnes, Shawn Turlington and Mark Chancello. Last year's punter, Billy Baker made the '94 Texas Sports writers' first team.

With 4-time All-State wide receiver Barry Vannoy gone, the Collinsville Pirates move down to 3rd place in district 17A, but Eric Montoya (27 catches for 532 yards) is back to give junior quarterback Brent Vannoy (1,773 passing yards) "a reliable target."

Collinsville lost 6 lettermen from an 8-4 area championship team. Other players to watch include defensive lineman Phillip Weathers (preseason 1st team defense All-State), Hank Blair and Todd Edgar.

The Muenster Hornets, under the leadership of Coach Grady Roller, lost 10 lettermen from a 7-3 team. They return 10 with 6-6 starters. Players to watch are Darrell Charles, Cody Sicking (who ran for 690 yards in 7 games), James Klement, Matt Chisam and Jeff Flusche. Also Eric Miller who moves from wing back to quarterback. Last year's defensive lineman Maurus Hacker earned a position on the '94 sports writers 2nd All-State team.

Saint Jo Panther coach Rick Chalenburg says his backfield "will be as good as any in the district." Sixteen lettermen, 9-9 starters return from a 2-7-1 season where only 2 lettermen were lost. Watch out for Joseph Hennigan, Chris Borello, Chad Phippen, Chad Raymond and Bobby Underwood.

The Era Hornets round out the district. After losing 15 lettermen, only two starters return from a 6-4 team. Players to watch are Casey Harrington, Arlus Pierce, and Jody Wilson.

In district 13-A, Windthorst is predicted as the leader over Bryson, Santo, Throckmorton, Tolar and Perrin Whit.

Also of local interest in district 10-2A, Callisburg should get a district championship repeat, followed by Nocona, Valley View, Chico, Millsap, then Paradise. Celina, Pilot Point and Aubrey should lead 11-2A.

Gainesville is picked as class 3A district and regional leaders. "Coach (Mike) Russell faces a big rebuilding job, but the Leopards have plenty to choose from with one of the largest enrollments in 3A," states the article. Gainesville lost 21 lettermen from an 11-2 regional semi-finalist team. Only 2-2 starters return, Brad Wolf, Earl Frazier, Curt Henderson and Jason Parkhill. The Leopards' district includes Princeton, Frisco, Lake Dallas, Sanger, Little Elm, Pottsboro and Whitesboro. Whitesboro is looking for their first win since 1992 after back-to-back 0-10 finishes.

Campbell's *Texas Football* also included other stats and stories. One was the approximately 980 UIL coaches picked for probable state champions in their classification. These included class A, No. 1 Thorndale, 34 votes; Sudan, 16; Burkeville, 5; Crawford, 4; Bartlett, 3 and one each to Ranken, Iola, Robert Lee Hico and Roscoe. In class 3A Gainesville also received a vote.

Halfway through the 90's, the Schulenburg Shorthorns (2A) is the biggest high school winner with 69 wins and 7 losses. Southlake Carroll (3A-4A) follows with a close 66-7 record. Pilot Point (2A) comes in 7th at 60-7-1.

The winningest active Texas high school coach is G.A. Moore, Jr. of Celina with 291 wins, 61 losses and 9 ties.

Texas again led the nation with 287 high school players signing Division 1A letters of intent to play. California high schools are closing the gap at 228.

Also of interest is a list of state and class records set during 1994. These include Collinsville's Barry Vannoy career records in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns. There are lists of ups and downs in wins, all classifications of district favorites, the '94 reviews, returning leaders, all-state teams and roads to the title for high school football.

The 1995 *Dave Campbell's Texas Football* also includes the Southwest Conference, Texas Colleges and a SWC commemorative SWC section for a complete look at Texas football action.

Texas aids New Mexico's fight to contain vesicular stomatitis outbreak in livestock

The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency, has acted to support New Mexico's effort to contain an outbreak of Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) within its state boundaries. Effective June 29, the TAHC is formally restricting the movement of livestock from infected areas and will require health papers on all New Mexico livestock entering Texas.

VS is a virus that causes livestock to develop blisters in and around their mouths, and on their tongues, hooves and teats. When the blisters break, the skin sloughs, and animals stop eating or drinking until the painful lesions begin to heal. The cycle of infection lasts about two weeks, and significant weight loss and production loss occurs in affected animals. New Mexico livestock authorities report that its VS outbreak started in horses and has now been diagnosed in cattle. A task force from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Veterinary Services is assisting New Mexico state personnel in answering calls from

producers, and investigating suspected cases and quarantining affected animals.

New Mexico has quarantined 50 premises and their regulations also restrict livestock within the surrounding 10-mile area from being moved across state lines. To support New Mexico in containing the infection and preventing its spread, the majority of western states, and Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas have issued similar restrictions on livestock from affected areas.

Until the outbreak is officially cleared up, New Mexico livestock may not enter Texas if VS infection has been diagnosed within 10 miles of the animal's home ranch or farm within the past 30 days.

If signs are noticed, producers should call their TAHC area office, or the headquarters in Austin at 512/719-0700, or the USDA at 512/482-5555. A trained disease diagnostician will be sent to the premise to assist in making a diagnosis.

Wildlife group fears CRP proposals

The recent Senate Agriculture Committee's proposal for changes in the Conservation Reserve Program in new Farm Bill legislation has several national conservation and wildlife groups concerned.

"Members of wildlife and conservation groups fear that the recent Senate proposal, which shifts eligibility to lands with only the highest index of erosion on only the most steeply sloping land in areas of more rainfall, will virtually eliminate most Great Plains States farmers from qualifying for the program," said Charles Lee, agricultural liaison for the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks.

The Senate Agriculture Committee's draft states: "The Secretary shall accept offers to enroll highly erodible land only on fields that cannot be farmed by using the best economically obtainable conservation system high potential for degradation of soil or water quality, and such potential degradation cannot be alleviated through conservation share or incentive programs."

The wildlife and conservation groups are concerned that the recommendation would force the U.S. Department of Agriculture to consider only program payments for land with an erodibility index of 15, or almost twice as high.

Recommendations include:
1. Remove the total acreage limitation under CRP and instead protect as many acres as possible under the \$1.8 billion limitation established by the Congressional Budget Office. Currently, 36 million acres are enrolled in under CRP. The wildlife and conservation groups feel it is possible to protect at least that many acres of highly erodible land and perhaps more for the same amount of dollars. Their primary concern is equity. They fear the new proposal could radically alter the present distribution of protected acres, benefiting some regions of the country at the expense of others.

2. Include wildlife conservation as a co-equal objective, equal to soil erosion and water quality improvement.

3. Allow cropped wetlands and Water Bank lands to be eligible for CRP enrollment. This would allow farmers to have greater flexibility and eliminate some objections to wetlands protection requirements now under Swamp-buster rules.

County Agent's Report by Craig Rosenbaum

AGRICULTURAL HERBICIDE TOUR

Producers are overwhelmed each year with a variety of herbicide selections to be used in their various crop and basic enterprises. In order to look more closely at these herbicide choices in comparison, we have set up a Corn, Grain Sorghum, and Pasture Herbicide Demonstration in the county. Producers will have an opportunity to view all of these plots on Tuesday, July 11.

The first tour stop will be at 8 a.m. at the Grain Sorghum Herbicide Demonstration located on the Billy Mac Calhoun Farm. This location is at the intersection of Interstate 35 and County Road 202. This location is on the west side of I-35 across from the north bound rest area.

The second stop will be at 9:30 a.m. at the Pasture Herbicide Demonstration located on the Glenn Hellman Farm near the intersection of FM 1630 and FM 373 south of Muenster.

The last stop will be at 11 a.m. at the Corn Herbicide Demonstration located on the Fuhrmann Brothers Farm on County Road 415 approximately two miles north of Highway 82. The plots worked very well this year and producers can have an opportunity to view both grass and broadleaf control.

Chemical company representatives will be on hand to answer questions and discuss cost and other production factors.

Two Continuing Education Credits toward recertification for Private Applicators will be offered at the tour. If you have any questions on

the times or locations, contact the County Extension Office.

BEEF PROGRAM

A summer Supplementation of Beef Calves Program will be held from 7 to 8 p.m., Tuesday, July 11, at the Cooke County Fairgrounds Meeting Room. Dr. Ron Gill, Extension Livestock Specialist, will be on hand to discuss various creep feeding programs for beef calves including summer supplementation, pre-weaning programs, and post-weaning programs to assist in getting calves on feed sooner and suffer less stress and weight loss. Cost of creep feeding programs is a great concern of cattlemen and Gill will discuss the more economical programs using high protein pellets instead of the high energy creeps. Other factors will include management of forage sources in order to utilize the new higher protein creeps.

Ron will also be discussing the upcoming 1995-96 Ranch to Rail Program along with nomination dates, shipping dates, vaccination and weaning options.

PESTICIDE DISPOSAL SURVEY

Agriculture producers who are Private or Commercial Applicators and who have renewed their applicator licenses in the last two years, will possibly be receiving a state-wide Pesticide Disposal Survey.

The object of this survey is to plan disposal locations for 1996 and beyond. It is very important that you fill out the survey and return it to the Waste Management Initiative Team as soon as possible.

The Waste Pesticide Disposal Program has been a joint project of the TNRCC, TDA, and the Extension Service.

Since 1991 the program has disposed of 737 tons of hazardous waste pesticide at no cost to producers. This survey will help identify areas that will receive this pesticide disposal program. For this reason, producers are urged to complete and return the survey.

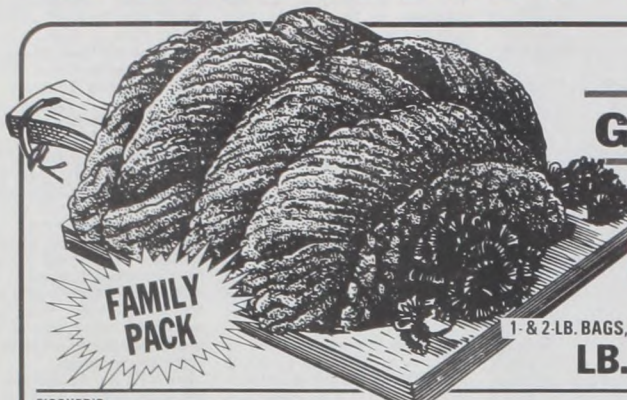
