State Capital NEWS

The Legislative Redistricting Board, its hands tied by a court order, has called for a staff research toward reapportionment of both the Texas House and Senate.

If the Board were permanently enjoined from action, the thorny reapportionment chore may be handed back to the Legislature in a special session this fall. Board was created in 1948 to redistrict where a legislature fails to do so in its first session after a decennial census.

Day before the five-member panel was to meet and begin work on Senate realignment, a task left undone by the Legislature this year, an Austin judge entered a temporary restraining order. At the same time, Judge Herman Jones set a hearing for September 2 on a petition for an injunction.

Rep. Fred Head of Henderson filed the suit to stop Board action, contending 1970 census figures are not yet all in, and that reapportionment should wait until the 1973 Legislature.

On August 2 Judge Jones declared the House version of reapportionment by the Legislature this year unconstitutional. Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has promised an appeal to the Texas Supreme Court.

Meanwhile, Martin who was named temporary chairman of the redistricting Board in absentia, left a message expressing hope that the panel will begin work "at the earliest possible date" on House reapportionment in event the High Court rules that it is its duty.

Gov. Ben Barnes, another member of the Board, also called for early staff attention to a House redistricting bill, although both he and Martin agreed Senate reapportionment is the first objective.

Board has 20 separate plans already submitted for recarving the Senate's 31 districts in line with the 1970 census and federal court rulings of substantially equal population for each.

"FREEZE" BRINGS SUMMER CHILL - The President's wage-price freeze continued to be the closest-watched and fastest-changing news event at the state capitol.

Gov. Preston Smith's proclamation to state agencies to disregard the presidential order and place pay raises for state employees in effect September 1 was quickly held invalid by Attorney General Martin.

Martin then went to Washington to plead for exceptions for state workers and school teachers who had been assured raises by legislative action and (in the case of teachers) valid contracts well before the freeze order date, August 14.

Meanwhile, Texas State Employees Association filed a formal petition for exemption of 80,000 state employees from the order and hinted at court action if refused.

Teachers kept close watch on Washington announcements to see if subsequent federal agency rulings would permit their raises covered by contracts signed prior to August 15 to be granted September 1.

INFO OFFICES OPENED -- Internal Revenue Service announced opening of nine offices in southern Texas to answer questions, study complaints and investigate alleged violations of the wage-price freeze.

Offices are located at IRS headquarters in Austin, Beaumont, Waco, Corpus Christi, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston, Arlington and McAllen.

Questions on new import surcharge will be referred to the Office of Customs in Houston.

LABOR DAY TOLL PREDICTED -- Fifty-two may lose their lives in traffic accidents during the long Labor Day weekend, predicts the Department of Public Safety.

If Texans can't drive more safely than that, Governor Smith told his traffic safety committee, serious consideration may have to be given to declaring a state of emergency on three-day holidays and calling out the National Guard

to supplement police activities. Smith's committee reviewed plans for an intensive Labor Day Safety campaign.

DPS Director Col. Wilson E. Speir urged motorists to refrain from drinking while driving, to avoid fatigue and to modify driving speed in accord with heavy traffic conditions.

All uniformed officers of DPS will be on highways Friday through Monday to enforce traffic laws. Maximum use will be made of radar and breath-testing devices. DPS special reports on fatal accidents will continue.

AG OPINIONS -- Public junior colleges may charge tuition in amounts greater than rates specified by the Legislature and may authorize additional fees, Attorney General Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

* Lessee or operator of a natural gas well on a state tract may not legally deduct from royalty due the state a portion of the cost of production, gathering, sale or delivery of gas.

* Provision that an owner may record and use more than one brand or mark to identify his livestock remains in effect.

* State employees can travel first class on airlines if no tourist class seats are available -- and are entitled to out-of-state travel expense up to \$35 a day.

* Two bills encompassing types of service now credited under state retirement system are constitutional and not in conflict.

* Legislation relating to eminent proceedings does not violate constitutional requirements of deposit of money. Bill aimed to provide condemnors "full benefits at any stage of litigation process short of a final adjudication."

CHILD COUNCIL FORMED -- Governor has established Council on Early Childhood Development to aid children under six.

Council will study early childhood programs and develop plans for strengthening them. It also will train parents and potential parents in the "art" of child care and guidance, and implement new programs for education, health and social services to children.

APPOINTMENTS -- Dr. James Richard Dolby of Waco was named acting director of community services for the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Luther B. Simmons of Orange is new general counsel of Texas Water Development Board, effective September 15.

Governor Smith appointed Mrs. Barbara Tomme of Fort Worth to the Advisory Council for Language Handicapped Children.

Smith also announced these recent appointments:

* Lyndon Olson of Waco to Brazos River Authority Board of Directors.

* Joe A. Myers of Stockdale and L. B. Davis Jr. of Longview (reappointments) to State Board of Morticians.

* John M. Scott of Fort Worth (reappointment), Henry E. English of Dallas and Avery Mays of Dallas to the Trinity River Authority.

POOR DISTRICTS TO GET AID -- School districts with the most children from low-income families will get \$822, 456 in additional federal aid under new grant allotments announced last week.

A total of 441 districts are eligible for aid to finance teacher hire, materials purchase and medical services. Allotments range from \$69, 995 for Houston to \$31 for Hamby district, Taylor County.

SHORT SNORTS -- Motorists no longer can stop and then pass a school bus loading or unloading children under a law effective August 31.

A 214-acre tract in Collin County has been donated for a state park.

Bowhunting will get a special chance at deer, javelina and wild hog during Aransas National Wildlife Refuge archery season Sept. 17-30.

Colonel Spier Asks Motorist Not To Drink While Driving

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents over the long Labor Day weekend will claim 52 lives in the state.

Speir called for motorists to avoid drinking while driving, avoid fatigue, and modify their driving speed in accordance with expected heavy traffic conditions.

In an effort to hold the toll down, the DPS and local law enforcement agencies, in cooperation with the news media of Texas, will conduct "Operation Motocide" -- a public awareness program designed to focus attention on the traffic problem. Special reports on fatal traffic accidents will be prepared at DPS Headquarters and released three times daily during the holiday period which runs from 6 p.m. Friday, Sept. 3 to midnight Monday, Sept. 6.

All available uniformed officers of the Dept. of Public Safety will be on the highways during the holiday to enforce state traffic laws, and maximum use will be made of radar and breath testing instruments. Speir said DPS personnel would do all possible to keep traffic flowing smoothly and safely on this final holiday weekend of the summer.

Information Center On Economic Actions Is ASCS Office

All residents of Gray county may obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential order of Aug. 15 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Gray county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, according to Evelyn Mason, County Executive Director, Gray County ASCS.

County ASCS offices throughout the U.S. have been chosen as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order which is designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy.

The Gray county ASCS office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in Gray county who wants or needs precise information should get in touch with the county office, Miss Mason stated.

The Gray county ASCS office is located 1 1/2 miles east of Pampa in the Courthouse Annex. The mailing address is Box 1621, Pampa, Texas 79065. In charge of the office is Miss Evelyn Mason, County Executive Director, Gray County ASCS.

Our and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas, Miss Mason stated.

Salvation Army Provides Camp Life

Nestled in the rolling hill country south of Dallas is resort styled summer camp designed for people who can't afford it. It's Camp Hoblitzelle, located near Midlothian, one of the most beneficial but least known services for the underprivileged sponsored by the Salvation Army.

It is enjoyed from May till Labor Day by more than 3,500 people of all ages, color and sizes. Those who at end are either poor, or people dedicated to work for and serve those less fortunate than themselves.

When schools close across the state, over 800 boys from the Rio Grande Valley to the Panhandle travel to the 370 acre camp for a full week of romping on the hillsides, horseback riding, boating, swimming, playing ball and learning crafts. The 8 to 14 year old youngsters arrive 200 at a time for four weeks, all sponsored by the Army's 328 volunteer service unit committees in Texas.

Then the girls take over, about 500 members of the Girl Scouts and Sunbeams, the Salvation Army's scouting programs. They enjoy the facilities for two weeks in July, and are followed by youngsters from boy's clubs and community centers from seven of the state's largest cities.

August is mostly reserved for Careworn mothers and their children, whole families from low income areas enjoying the trees and tranquility and Built-in child care. The families live in attractive redwood and brick cabins and are served meals in a spacious dining room, a welcome holiday away from their own kitchens.

Near the end of the month, elderly men and women come to change their outlook and escape the loneliness of rooming houses and the futility of old age without money or hope for the future. The camp session for the aged is newly organized to meet the needs of a growing number of people all too often forgotten.

Camp Hoblitzelle is run by Salvation Army officers and trained counselors. It was built with the donations of many generous Texans, enabling the religious-welfare organization to continue more than a half-century of summer camping opportunities for the underprivileged.

Now, because of the formation of the McLean service unit of the Salvation Army, there will be several lucky boys from the McLean-Alanreed area now eligible to attend the wonderful Hoblitzelle camp each year.

69% Savings Bond Goal For Gray Co. Is Reached

Mr. George B. Cree, Chairman of the Gray County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H. United States Savings Bonds in Gray county totaled \$23,882 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$288,383 for 69% of the 1971 sales goal of \$420,000.

July sales in Texas amounted to \$16,810,210 compared to \$15,454,922 during the same period of 1970 -- an increase of 8.7%. Year-to-date sales were \$118,726,731, while 1970 sales totaled \$106,206,174 for an increase of 11.7%.

National sales during the months were \$458 million -- 16.3% above 1970 July sales. Sales for the seven-month period totaled \$3,243 million -- 17.4% above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$151 million were reported for the first seven months of 1971 compared to \$146 mil. exchanged in 1970.

SWCD To Have Fall Meeting

Curtis Schaffer, Chairman of the Panhandle Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, has announced that the fall meeting of the Panhandle Association of SWCD's will be held at the Gray County Courthouse Annex in Pampa, Texas on September 15, 1971.

The Panhandle Association is made up of 125 districts in the Area representing 25 Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Each District is a local political sub-division of the State, and is governed by an elected five man Board.

The meeting is being planned and sponsored by the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District.

TDPs Offer Special Identification Card

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that effective Sept. 1, Texans will be able to obtain a special personal identification card.

The card, which was authorized by the 62nd Texas Legislature, is laminated and contains a color photograph of the holder. It is the same size as a Texas driver's license.

Information appearing on the card will include the holder's date of birth, height, sex, and eye color. Each card will have a special identification number issued by the DPS.

Speir said the cards should be of value to those persons who don't hold a Texas driver's license, but who need some sort of official card to help establish their identity.

In order to obtain a personal identification card, the applicant must appear at a DPS driven license field office on or after Sept. 1, execute a special application form, present a birth certificate or other documentary evidence of identity and date of birth, be fingerprinted and pay a statutory fee of \$5.00. The special cards, which will be mailed from DPS Headquarters in Austin, will be dated to expire four years from the applicants' next birth date.

Also effective Sept. 1, certain persons having military service connected disabilities will be exempted from drivers license fees.

Speir said those individuals with a 60% or more service connected disability will be entitled to the free drivers license provided they meet other requirements which apply to all applicants. At the time of application for a new or renewal license, the disabled veteran must present the DPS drivers license office an official communication from the Veterans Administration Regional Office showing that he is currently receiving compensation from the Federal Government in connection with a 60% or more service connected disability.

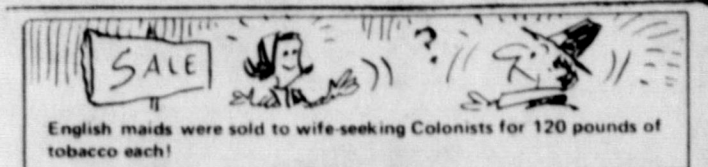

NOTICE Required Immunizations

Dear Parents or Students:
 Texas now has a new law that requires immunizations
 for all students enrolled in schools and institutions of
 higher learning, as shown below:

*None required after 12th birthday
 If the number of doses required have been received,
 but last dose was before time stated, then an
 additional dose of POLIO, DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS
 or SMALLPOX is required.

All immunizations should be completed by the time
 school is entered. However, if this is not possible, all
 students will be allowed to enter their respective
 school systems during the Fall 1971 term, with the
 provision that their immunizations against at least
 one of the aforementioned diseases will have been
 started by January 1, 1972 and all completed as soon
 as medically feasible.

Since many types of personal immunization records
 are in current use, any document listing each
 immunization received by year will be acceptable
 during the 1971-1972 school year for either initiating
 or updating school immunization records.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal
 records by physicians or public health clinics is
 recommended but not required until the Summer
 1972 Semester, after which validation of new records
 is required.

A new, standard Certificate of Immunization form is
 being developed; however, compatible documents will
 always be acceptable.

If you have any questions, contact your family
 physician or local health department.

A combined Measles-Rubella Vaccine is now available
 which requires only one injection. The age criteria for
 this vaccine is the same as indicated in the above table
 for Measles (Rubeola) and Rubella.
 We will appreciate your cooperation in this matter.

All Texas Brands Require Re-Recording New Law Went In Effect August 30

A new State law effective
 August 30 will no longer per-
 mit Texas motorists to stop
 and then pass a school bus
 which is loading or unloading
 children.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, di-
 rector of the Texas Department
 of Public Safety, said the new
 law, passed by the 62nd Legis-
 lature, applies in both cities
 and rural areas and requires
 motorists moving both direc-
 tions on the same roadway with
 a school bus to stop and remain
 stopped as long as the flashing
 lights on the bus are in opera-
 tion.

Under current law, which
 applies only in rural areas,
 drivers must stop for a stopped
 school bus, but may then pro-
 ceed around it at a speed of
 not more than 10 miles per
 hour if safe to do so.

The new law will not re-
 quire those vehicles on another
 roadway of a divided high-
 way to stop, and stops are
 not required if the bus has
 stopped in a loading zone of a
 controlled access highway
 where pedestrians are not per-
 mitted to cross.

Speir noted that provisions of
 the new law will be strictly en-
 forced to afford maximum pro-
 tection to the school children
 of Texas.

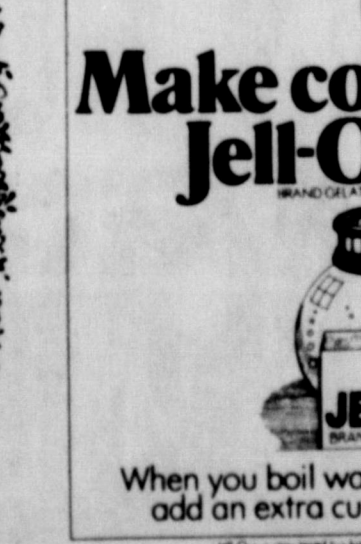

Accent on Health

One of man's most priceless possessions is his eyes, and help in conserving this treasure is on its way, reports the Texas State Department of Health.

This help is in the form of a federally-imposed requirement for impact-resistant lenses of laminated glass, heat-tempered glass or plastic. This seems like a simple solution to some of the eye injury problems. But it took years of effort by accident prevention experts to attain this ruling by the Food and Drug Administration.

Last year, reports the National Safety Council, there were 110,000 eye injuries in this country. It's obvious that only a fraction of this number came from broken lenses. Almost 11% of the injuries resulted in a permanent partial-blindness, which means that one or both eyes were damaged permanently. More than seven out of 10 persons suffering eye injury went through a period of blindness—even if only temporary.

While the impact-resistant lenses won't provide total protection from breaking, they will be a big step in the right direction. The FDA regulation will provide greater protection in tougher lenses. But they cannot be considered as providing an unbreakable shield against eye injury. The new regulation covers prescription and non-prescription glasses. If there is some reason why these impact-resistant lenses won't fulfill the visual requirements of a particular patient, regular lenses can be obtained.

The performance standard for impact-resistant lenses is based on American National Standards Institute specifications. Essentially, the standard

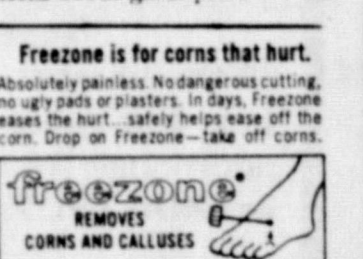
Cattle prices in feedlots are holding steady. Stocker calves have eased back a bit after making a rapid jump in price the past few weeks. In talking with one Eastern order buyer, he said heavier calves were off a good half dollar. Finished calves will hold at its present level throughout the fall. This will strengthen the stocker market over the fall period.

Right now millions of acres of wheat ground is being prepared and sowed to wheat. Watch the market ease back a little for the next three weeks. It usually does. Farmers and ranchers are just too busy to receive shipped in calves. This dulls the market in late August and early September. I don't see any severe set backs. I think it would be your best time to get calves if you are planning on wheat pasture or stalks. Should we have good rain any time in September, you will see another big surge in price of replacement cattle. This will take them to the highest level you have ever seen. Finished steers bringing \$33.00 will justify some higher prices for Stocker calves. I would advise you to lay in your stocker calves within the next three weeks. They are going to get way too high to buy in October and November if there is abundant wheat pasture throughout the Great Plains Area. A bumper corn crop will create a tremendous demand also. Don't ask me what might happen by mid summer 1972. It might be a good idea to have your inventory rather low. Play it by ear after March 1972.

GOPHER TRAP
Some time ago I loaned a real fine gopher trap to someone in the McLean vicinity. It wound up lost. We still have calls for the trap, which we never made any charge for its use. If anyone in this vicinity knows anything about the whereabouts of this trap I would like to have it back. fall. Many feel that milo will be much cheaper as a result of the large corn crop. There is less carry over of all feed grains than we have had in many years. This will tend to lessen the effects of a big corn crop.

Milo Production will be down due to the drought conditions earlier in the year. There is barely enough milo in storage in this area to meet feeding needs until harvest this fall. I can't see the elevator price

running much lower than \$2.00 cut.
