Cotton crop needs rain!

This year's cotton crop could prove to be a bumper crop if...

It would only rain.

"If we can get one good rain - one to two inches - now, we might not need another rain again for a while," Mitchell County Extension Agent Bryan Limmer said.

"Once the cotton starts blooming, that's when it really needs moisture," said Limmer, adding that some of the earlier planted fields are now starting to bloom.

"The cotton really looks good good right now. It's surprising how long it's held up," said Limmer. "It's been 60 days without rain."

He said there is still moisture six to eight inches below the surface and that the cotton roots are down to the moisture. However, Limmer said that if there is no rain by mid-July, the plants will start shedding bolls and the chances of a good cotton crop will be diminished.

Extension Entomologist Dr. Tom Fuchs of San Angelo, who

conducted a turnrow meeting Friday morning for local cotton producers, agreed with Limmer.

"The cotton continues to hold up good, but we need rain pretty quick or it will start hurting," said Fuchs, who also gave an update on the cotton insect situation.

"We've got some fields where the root systems are not developed well," said Fuchs, noting that those fields will suffer first if "they don't get a good rain quick."

"As we start to see some moisture stress, we'll see a lot of younger squares turn brown and shed," said Fuchs.

As far as the insect situation is concerned, Fuchs said "overall, it's been light. Weevils are down 10-15 percent what they were last year."

He said there are very few flea hoppers in the dry land fields. He said the beneficial insects are the best in a number of years and recommended that producers stay out of the fields with insecticides unless "there's a good reason."

Loraine gridder to participate in all-star game

Shawn Finley, son of Mrs. Sue Finley of Loraine, will participate in the Texas 6-Man All-Star Football Game in Stephenville at 8 p.m. on Saturday, July 21, in Tarleton State University's Memorial Stadium.

Finley is one of only 32 6-man football players from the state to be selected to participate in the prestigious event. During the week of July 16-21, he will join the other 31 all-star football players in Stephenville where they will work out and participate in a wide variety of activities during the week preceding the game.

While a junior in high school, Finley received honorable mention on the all-state linebacker slot and all-district linebacker and fullback. In his senior year at Loraine High School, he was selected to all-area team, all-district fullback, linebacker and place kicker. His stats were very impressive having 123 tackles

and rushing for 1200 yards, and scoring 40 points in one game. Aside from football, he was a regular qualifier in the 400-meter

Wreck causes I-20 paint spill

The driver of an 18-wheeler escaped injury Friday when his rig ran into the back of a highway striping machine.

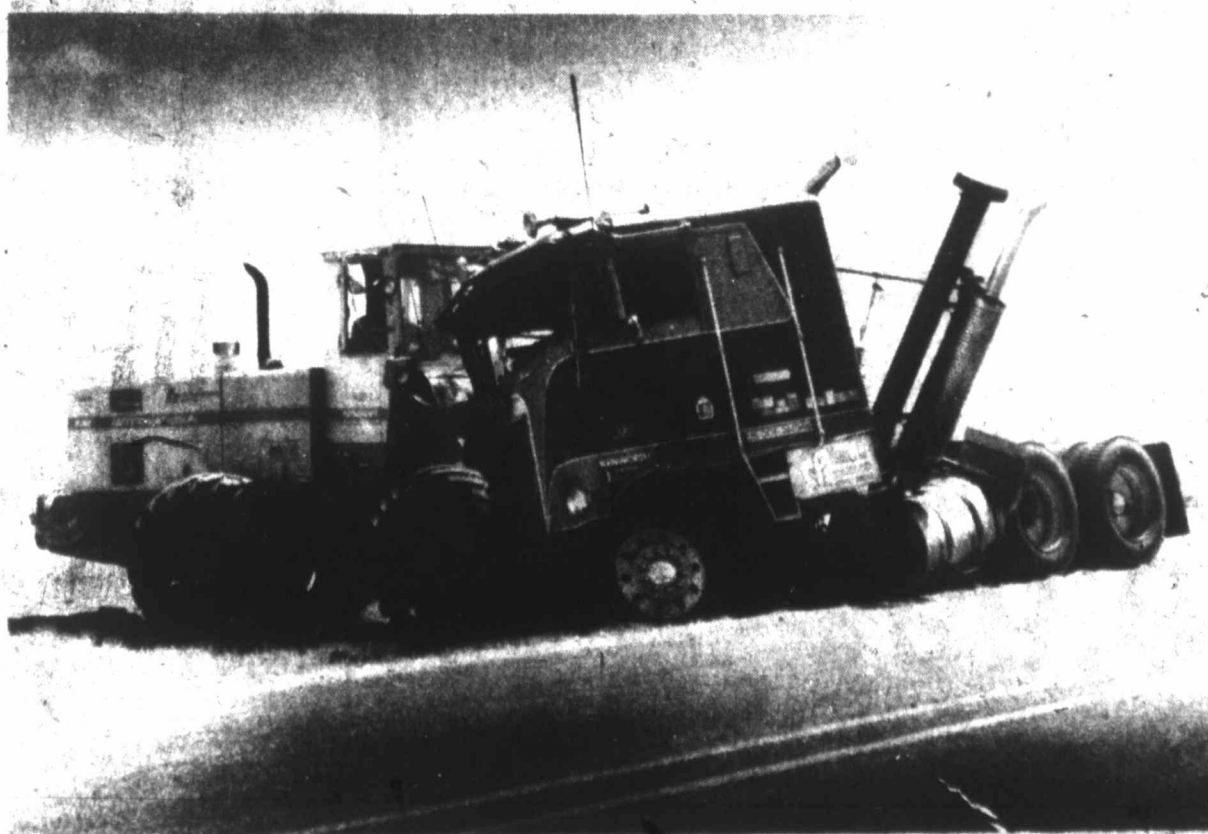
The incident occurred in the west-bound lane of Interstate 20 1.9 miles west of Westbrook, said DPS Trooper Tom Johnson.

The striping machine, owned by Swenson Equipment Co., was parked and unoccupied at the time.

Driver of the 1979 Kenworth was Jose Estrada, 39, of El Paso who was hauling a load of sheetrock he had just picked up from Sweetwater. Owner of the truck is E.F. Building Materials.

Estrada's truck received extensive damage, but the striping machine escaped serious damage because it was equipped with an impact guard, said Johnson.

However, some 200 gallons of paint were spilled in the mishap which required a special cleanup because it was classified as toxic material.

County included in area

Sponsors of the Big Country Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Area has approved expansion of the area boundary to include a total of 12 counties, including Mitchell.

The board of directors meeting held June 19 at the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall in Sweetwater was well attended with 105 sponsors and interested parties registering.

The purpose of the RC&D is to accelerate the conservation, development and utilization of natural resources to improve the general level of economic activity and to enhance the environment and standard of living in authorized RC&D areas. Authorized areas are locally

sponsored areas designated by the Secretary of Agriculture for RC&D technical and financial assistance program funds.

Representing Mitchell County were Buddy Hertenberger, Edward Roach, Bob Reilly, Elmer Martin, David Stubblefield, Elroy Bodecker, Jimmy Harrison, Bobby Lemons, Mark Waldrup, Travis Turner and Kevin Wright. They discussed expanding the area and reviewed the current status of the application. The counties included following approval of the expansion are Borden, Fisher, Garza, Glasscock, Howard, Jones, Kent, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry, Sterling and Taylor.

The RC&D program was

created on the assumption that local citizens, primarily in rural areas, with coordinated assistance provided through the USDA, could develop and carry out an action-oriented plan for the social, economic and environmental betterment of their communities.

The updated application including the 12 counties has been delivered to the state office of the Soil Conservation Service for review and will be sent to Washington to request that the area be authorized and funded. A coordinator is provided by the Soil Conservation Service to assist the RC&D area in carrying out the objectives and goals they themselves establish once the project is authorized.

Spade to participate in roundup

The Renderbrook-Spade Ranch in Mitchell County will be among 11 of the state's historic ranches in a salute to the rough, romantic lifestyle of real Texas cowboys during the 10th Texas Ranch Roundup Aug. 17-19 in Wichita Falls.

Part family reunion and part cowboy showdown, the roundup recreates the "rodeo" of the Texas frontier. Entire ranch families - dads, brothers, cousins, hired hands and even moms - will put their cattle working skills to the test for the grand title, "Best Ranch in Texas". Renderbrook-Spade won the title both in 1985 and 1987.

During two fun-filled evenings of arena thrills and spills, working cowboys showcase team branding, wild cow milking and other everyday cow punching chores. Then, around noon Saturday, watch as ranch "cookies" circle up the chuckwagons for a cookoff that captures the flavor of the Old West. Also, browse through western art and award-winning photography displays by Texas ranchers. And let the younger cowpokes entertain you with home-grown skits during the talent competition. Arena competition starts at 7:30 p.m. both evenings in the Wichita Falls Mounted Patrol area. Other

events begin at 10:30 a.m. Saturday.

Gray is indicted for prison escape

Vote explained

TO THE EDITOR: On June 21, I cast the toughest vote in my 12 years as the elected representative for the 17th District of Texas. In response to the Supreme Court's ruling that burning the American flag is protected by the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, the U.S. House of Representatives decisively voted to respect the court's decision and did not amend the Bill of Rights. I voted for the Bill of Rights and against a constitutional amendment, and would like to take this opportunity to discuss my vote.

The reason this vote was so tough is because it makes me very angry when I see anyone, especially an American, exhibiting disrespect for our great nation. No adjectives are adequate to capture the temperature-raising, blood-pounding rage I feel when I think of a flag being burned.

Regardless of my emotions toward those who would defile the flag, I believe that the U.S. Constitution protects those few individuals who in their demented way must express their contempt for the government that gives them those rights. Conservative

Justice Anthony Kennedy stated it best when he wrote, "It is poignant but fundamental that the flag protects those who hold it in contempt."

I know that some people do not agree with the position I have taken on this issue, and that some will call my position un-American or un-patriotic. I disagree, but I respect their right to that opinion, and to disagree with their elected representative. That is a right which is uniquely American because of the Bill of Rights.

I deeply respect and am indebted to the thousands of men and women who have sacrificed their lives defending America's gleaming shores from oppression, intolerance and ignorance. Did they die protecting the flag? If they did, was it for a piece of cloth or for what that cloth symbolized to them? Did they not die to ensure that their children and their children's children would live in a free land protected by the Bill of Rights?

This is not an attempt to apologize or make an excuse for my vote against amending the constitution for the flag. I believe that the position I have taken is the correct one, and I believe it is the position the majority of my constituents have taken after reflecting on what the flag and, even more importantly, the Bill of Rights means to us all.

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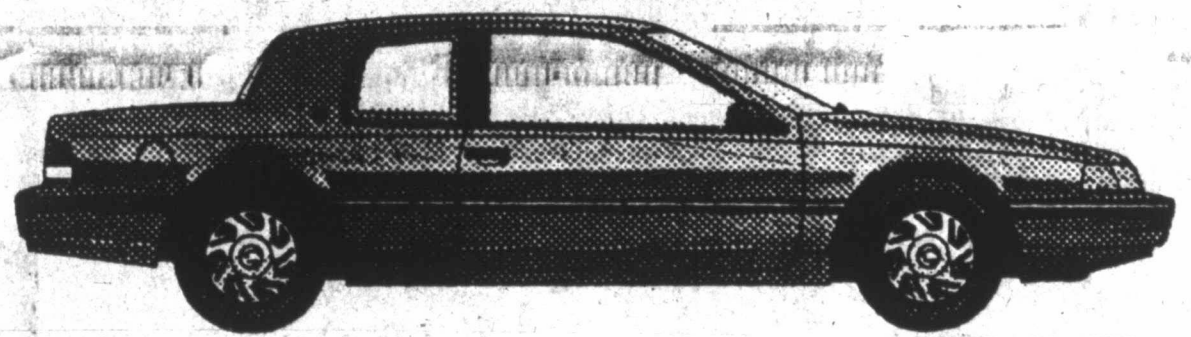
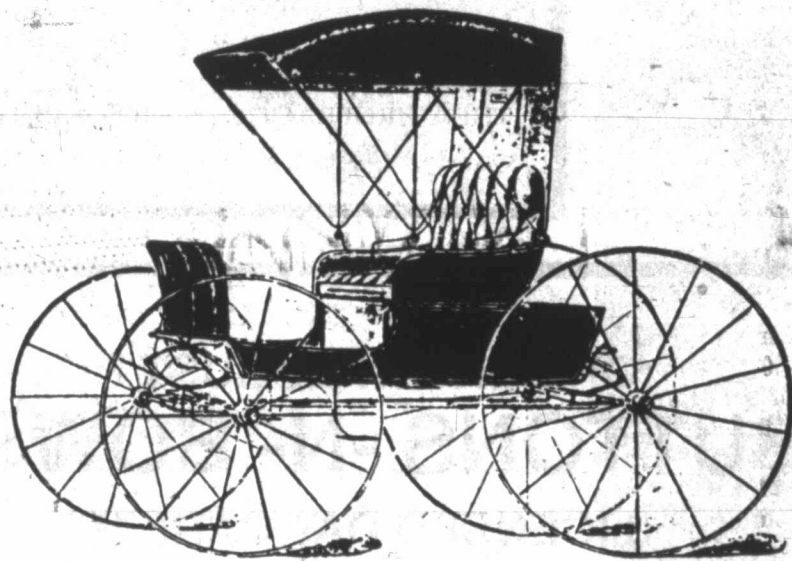
