

## Bulldogs Bite Rebs

The Rivercrest Rebels surprised everyone Friday night by scoring twice against the powerful Quitman Bulldogs in a game that ended 49 to 14 to the advantage of the home team.

Quitman, rated number one in the district, has previously held both Mount Vernon and Prairiland to one score, even against their second team.

The only team in the district which may give Quitman some trouble is Winnboro, and that game is scheduled for October 31.

Rivercrest's first score came against Quitman's big guns with 4:44 left in the first quarter of play, following two Bulldog touchdowns. The Rebels, quarterbacked by Clyde Brown began the drive on their own 30 yard line, and gained their initial first down via a Bulldog offside violation and an eight yard pass completion from Brown to Rebel Gary Neill. On the next play Milton Scales got loose around the right end and gained 27 yards to the Quitman 16. Before Quitman could recover from this violation of their territory, Brown hit Neill in the end zone with a high pass near the sideline. Neill, well aware of his position, was careful to hit the turf with both feet in bounds.

It was also in the first quarter that Quitman's first team was forced to punt against the Rebels, but this punt put the ball in play on the Rebel 16 yard line. Brown, faced with third down and twelve yards to go for a first down, went back to pass and was intercepted by Quitman's Kenzie Foley, who turned the interception into another Bulldog touchdown. At the end of the first quarter, the Bulldogs led 21 to 8.

Quitman pirated a pass from the hands of Gary Neill early in the second quarter to set up

their next score, but Rebel Bill Montgomery stopped another Quitman drive with an interception of his own. Quitman scored three times in the second quarter to bring the score at half time to 40-8.

Rebel Sammy Ellis was tapped several times in the third quarter, and carried a total of seven times for 43 yards during the game. Neill was as effective on the ground as a receiver, with six carries and 50 yards to his credit on the ground.

The Rebel's second score came in the middle of the third quarter on a pass from Brown to Kenny Stanley. The 29 yard play was the only score by either team in the second half,

but Rivercrest controlled the ball during the half, running 39 plays from scrimmage as opposed to 29 for the Bulldogs.

Other bright spots included a Bulldog fumble recovery by Randy Nolen.

Rivercrest will play Winnboro at Rebel Stadium Friday night at 7:45 p.m.

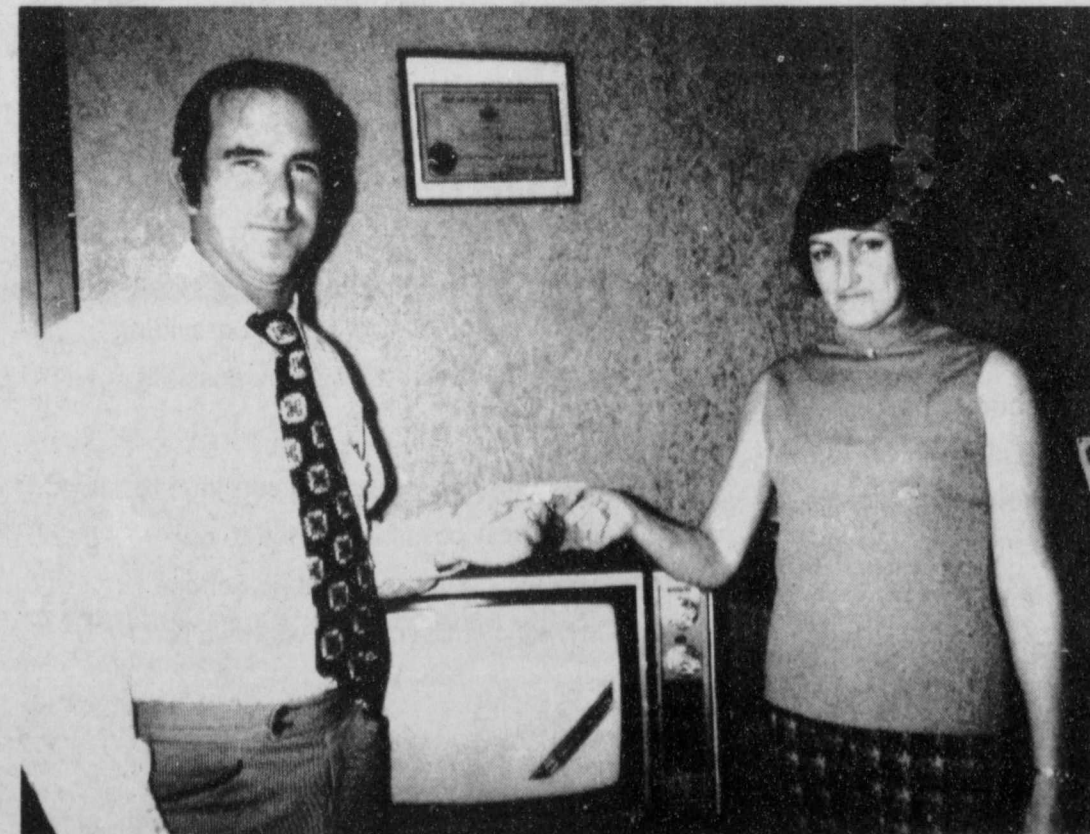

## USDA Serves All The People

The Department with all its agencies as we know it today, had its meager beginning in 1862 when President Lincoln signed the Congressional Act creating the (USDA) United States Department of Agriculture. About a quarter of a century later, USDA became the eighth executive department to gain cabinet rank. During those days, the Department served a population almost entirely involved in agriculture for a livelihood. A farmer in Lincoln's day produced enough for himself and three or four others.

Today the Department serves a Nation in which only five percent of the population lives on farms. However, each agricultural worker today

provides enough food and fiber for himself and over fifty others.

By looking at the broad responsibilities of the United States Department of Agriculture, one can see how it serves all Americans daily as it seeks to improve and maintain farm income, assuring maximum productivity of farm products for which there is a demand and developing and expanding markets abroad for agricultural products. One of the major functions of the Department is helping curb and cure poverty, hunger, and malnutrition. (A large portion of the Department's budget goes for food stamps). The Department also works toward enhancing the environment and maintaining our capacity to

produce food and fiber by helping landowners protect soil, water, forest, and other natural resources. This is accomplished with programs on rural development, rural credit, continuing education and cost-share assistance.

The Department's research findings are of benefit to all Americans as well as the inspection and grading services which safeguard and assure standards of quality in the daily food supply.

In conclusion, we have summarized in the broadest manner possible, the functions of the United States Department of Agriculture and in doing this, we attempted to demonstrate that the Department serves more people than just the farmer or rancher.

Her white Bible was topped

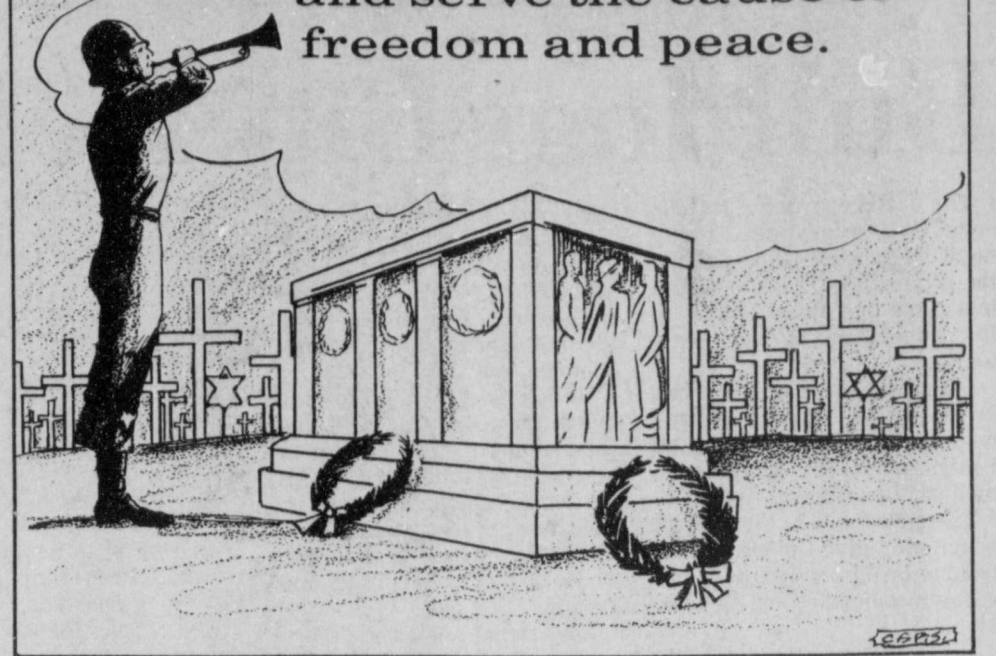

the election of new officers were included in the business session.

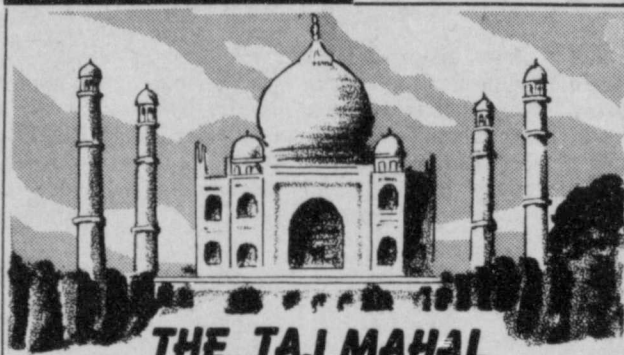

After prayer the meeting was adjourned until October, 1976 with the Macedonia Baptist Church, Pittsburg.

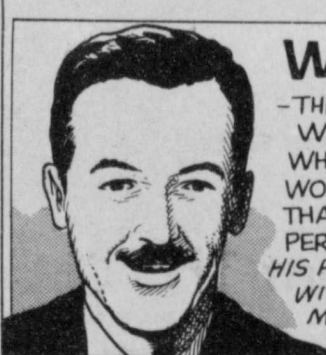

## Texas Among First Compliance Programs Federally Certified

The compliance programs of Texas, Ohio, and Virginia are the first such programs to be officially certified under the federal meat and poultry inspection acts, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced this week.

Through cooperative work plan agreements, USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) has been providing advisory assistance, financial and other aid to states for the develop-

ment of compliance programs to prevent and detect violations of state meat and poultry inspection laws.

According to APHIS, Texas, Ohio and Virginia have developed and are currently administering interstate enforcement programs, that meet the same standards as the federal system. The federal system covers meat and poultry products in interstate commerce.

Compliance staffs in-

vestigate the business operations of persons and firms that transport, store, handle and distribute both edible and inedible meat and poultry products. The check for products that may be uninspected, adulterated or misbranded. They also keep meat from animals that are dead, dying, diseased or disabled out of human food channels.

According to officials, USDA has signed cooperative work plan agreements with 32 state agencies and is working administratively with other states to aid them in complying with the Wholesome Meat Act of 1967 and the Wholesome Poultry Act of 1968. These Acts allowed states up to two years to provide meat and poultry inspection programs at least equal to the federal inspection program.

At the same time, the Acts required that related state compliance programs meet the same standards as the federal system. There was no deadline established, however. In the meantime, the federal compliance system continues to augment state programs in enforcing inspection laws, APHIS said.

The adequacy of the Texas, Ohio and Virginia programs was determined on the basis of the states' demonstrating effective operations and meeting required minimum standards. Individual reviews were conducted by the APHIS Federal Compliance Staff, APHIS said.

In commending the states, officials emphasized that in addition to performing a valuable service within their own states, cooperating compliance staffs are essential components of a comprehensive nation program, which is designed to protect the wholesomeness of America's meat and poultry supply.

Those residents who played "Magician of the Night" were Robert Scott, Herman Bond, Billy Boyd, Raviah Howison, Johnnie Ryan, and Zura Newsome. On conclusion of the program, Redwine played favorite musical selections on the piano and led singing.

## Clarification Given On School Fee Question

AUSTIN — A seven-point letter designed to answer questions raised by the recent Attorney General's Opinion eliminating many fees traditionally charged public school students will be mailed to school administrators across the state Friday, October 10, by Dr. M. L. Brockette, Commissioner of Education.

The opinion issued on October 1 by Attorney General John L. Hill covered three key areas: tuition for driver education, charges for school supplies and instruction and lab fees, and fees for extra curricular activities.

Hill's ruling confines itself to

the specific questions asked, Brockette's letter to the school superintendents points out. It also states that all areas addressed in the Opinion that are not permitted by law are prohibited.

"The following statements are submitted in response to the many questions from local school districts," Brockette says in his letter to some 1,100 district superintendents. "We hope the following will help you in implementing the Opinion."

1. The effective date is the date of the ruling, October 1, 1975. The Attorney General's Opinion did not cover fees collected prior to the date of October 1, 1975.

2. The ruling does not speak to students furnishing traditional supplies such as pencils, paper, etc.

3. Fees charged to buy such materials as workbooks, etc., are covered under the ruling. Fees for typing, labs, etc., are also covered by the ruling.

4. Materials necessary for the student to acquire basic skills in vocational education courses must be furnished by the school district. However, the school district may allow a student, at option, to furnish costlier or different vocational materials for approved projects undertaken for credit in such courses without incurring any obligation to pay for such materials, so long as the materials and the projects created from them remain the property of the student.

5. A school district may charge tuition for driver training if taught in the student's fourth quarter (summer school). This is one of the areas in which tuition may be charged as indicated in Texas Education Code 16.864.

6. A school district may charge non-participating students admission to extra curricular activities where attendance is voluntary.

7. A rental fee may not be charged for band uniforms. The opinion does not address the question of students furnishing their own uniforms and/or equipment.

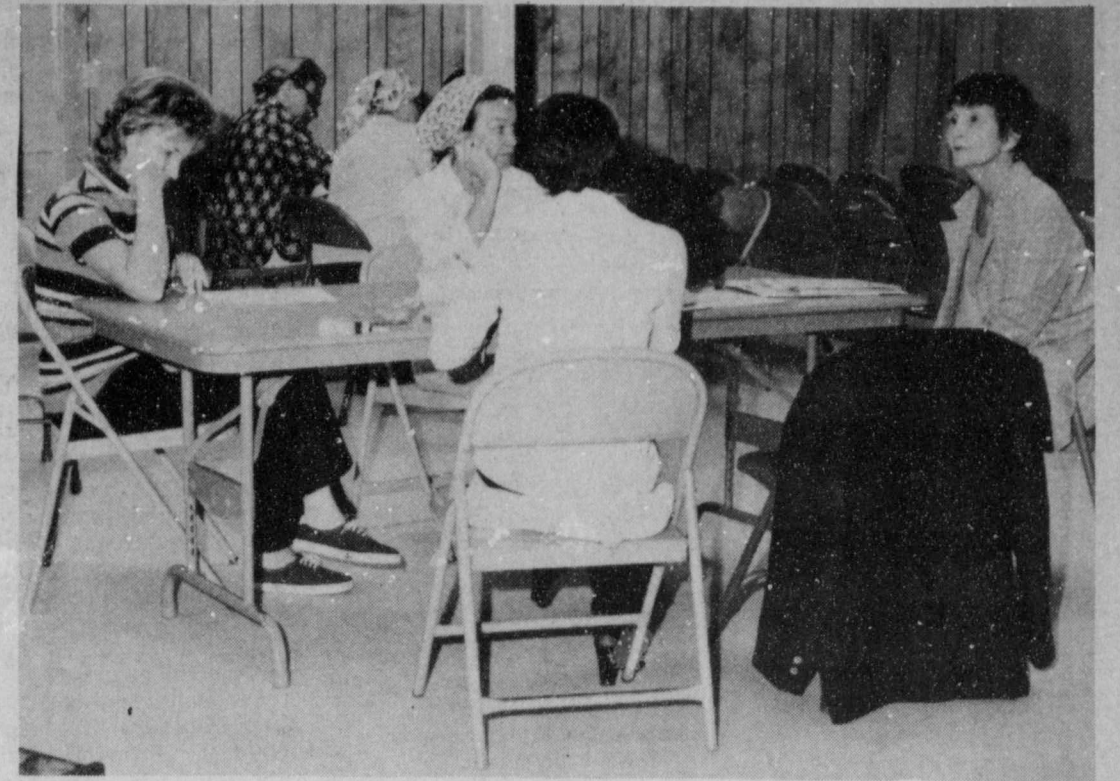

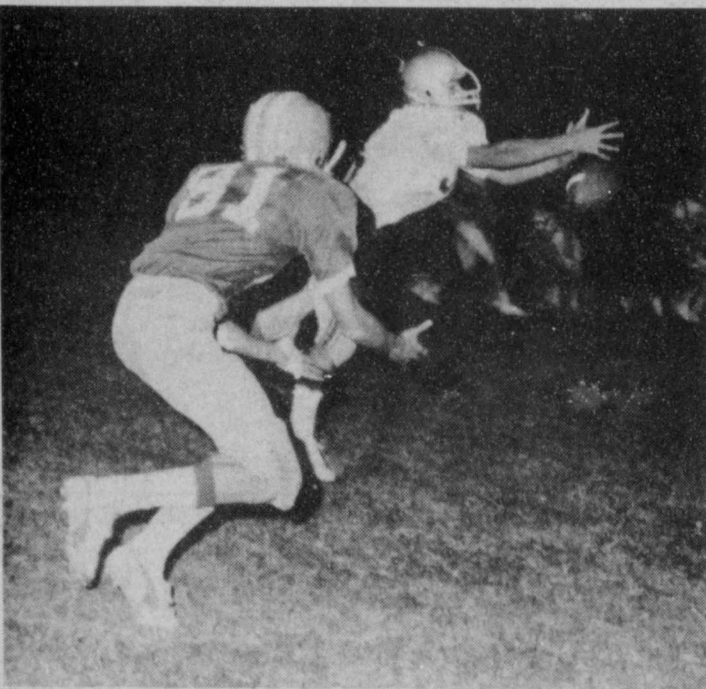

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## Get Technical Help On Conservation Plans

By Glen Sutton

District cooperators receive professional planning assistance from the Soil Conservation Service. Several landowners have been helped with conservation plans on their lands this year. They include Dean Ward, B. J. Atkins, Frank Stroud, Tom Currie, Mack Duce and Russell Carpenter.

The plan provides for protecting and conserving measures while the user increases production. When carried out, a plan will help the landowner reduce soil loss and promote better use of soil and water resources. A conservation plan will help a rancher increase quantity and quality of forage. Ranchers are helped with forage inventories and

grazing plans. The grazing plan shows which months are short on forage and periods of plentiful supply.

Many ranchers are feeding hay in October. To keep the cattle means six to seven months of feeding. It is impossible to realize a profit under these conditions. Yet, when cattle numbers and forage supply are balanced, feeding periods average about three months.

While assisting the landowner, the SCS planner will help identify conservation problems and opportunities. Alternative methods are presented, but the landowner makes the decisions. Many decisions may be on landuse, which crop or combination of crops, species of grasses and legumes to best solve the users problem.

The plans may need to be updated occasionally. As economics of crops change, landuse may change. Also, the landowner may make some changes or adjustments of the original decisions on existing landuse.

Landowners that recently updated their conservation plans are John Ward, Alvin Baird, Teddy Jones and Thomas DeBerry. They used professional help from SCS personnel. The SCS Office is located in the basement of the Clarksville post office.

## Bachman Completes Erosion Structure

Thanks to Curtis Bachman, less silt will be clogging streams and highways and flooding will be reduced.

Bachman recently completed a structure on his farm that will reduce erosion and control runoff from almost 200 acres. The farm is located two miles west of Clarksville on north side of U. S. Highway 82.

The structure was designed and staked by Soil Conservation Service personnel. A

good cost-share program on this practice provided by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service ASCS. The structure consist of an earthen dam containing 4,856 cubic yards and a pipe through the dam. The pipe consist of a 54 inch diameter riser and a 36 inch diameter barrel through the dam. About two surface acres of permanent water will be impounded by the dam. Also, several acre feet of flood storage is provided between the

top of riser and earth spillway.

Bachman was selected as the districts outstanding conservation farmer in 1968. He has continually carried out an outstanding conservation program. His 54 acres of cropland is completely parallel terraced. A well kept grassed waterway carries terrace water from the field. Crop residues are returned to the soil. Yes, Bachman is a good example of a Conservation Farmer.

## Texas Brucellosis Agreement Cancelled

An intensified cooperative federal - state effort to protect both human and animal health from brucellosis or Bang's disease has not been fully accepted by Texas, the nation's leading cattle-producing state, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) said Tuesday, October 7.

USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) reported that the Texas Animal Health Commission recently rejected certain proposed changes in rules which would require

branding of cattle exposed to infected animals and a negative brucellosis test of cattle moving into Certified Brucellosis Free areas in the states. The rules changes were recommended by industry representatives and veterinary officials of all 50 states and approved by USDA.

Because of the state's refusal to tighten brucellosis regulations, the USDA this week informed the Texas Animal Health Commission that federal funds to fight brucellosis in cattle may be withdrawn. In addition, Texas cattle may be placed under federal quarantine to prevent the spread of the disease to other states.

Counties in the state also would lose Modified - Certified and Certified Brucellosis Free status. Additional testing would be required in order to ship cattle interstate.

The action to remove federal brucellosis funds would become effective January 1, 1976, APHIS officials noted, when a cooperative agreement with Texas for brucellosis eradication would be terminated unless remedial steps were taken by the state.

As a result of the brucellosis eradication program begun in 1934, over 99 percent of the nation's cattle are now free of

brucellosis. However, the one percent still infected causes millions of dollars in losses to the livestock industry through abortions, breeding problems, weakened offspring, and reduced milk production. The disease may be passed from animals to humans as undulant fever.

Currently the annual federal expenditures to eradicate brucellosis in Texas amount to \$3.7 million, \$2 million of which is for indemnities paid to owners of infected cattle and \$650,000 for cooperative agreements for herd testing.

According to USDA figures, Texas had 3,083 cattle herds under quarantine on August 31. This is about one third of the

9,452 infected herds identified nationally.

The new drive for final eradication was prompted by recent increases in the number of brucellosis - affected herds, primarily in the South. As a result, the USDA has given top priority to the program and has committed the necessary resources.

However, APHIS officials say that a successful eradication program depends on the support of everyone concerned — the Department, the states, the livestock producer associations, and others. Further, it requires that standardized and accepted methods and rules be enforced uniformly in all states.

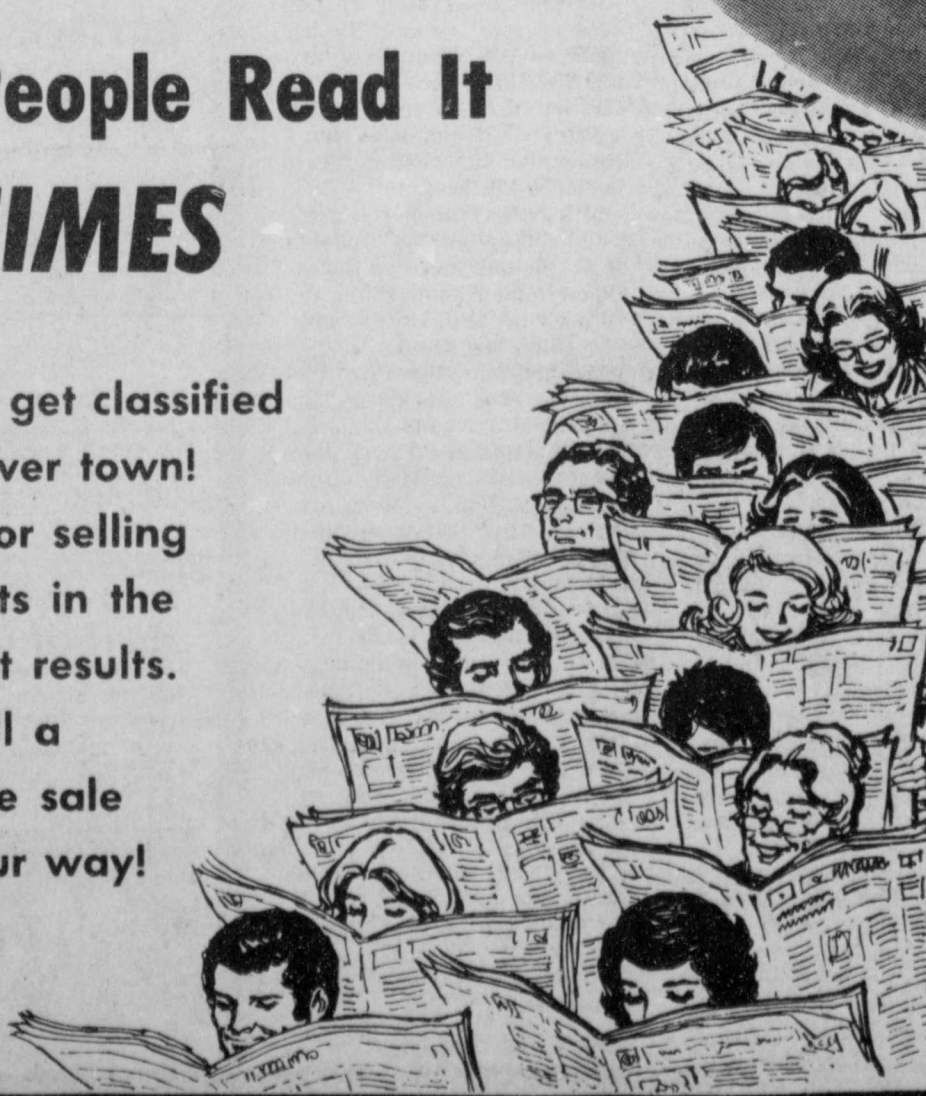
