Mrs. Clipper and Daughter Burned By Electric Wires

Mrs. Muri Clipper and 16-year-old daughter, Sharla of Buras, La., suffered severe burns from electrical shock recently when the television antenna they were attempting to dismantle, came in contact with live electric wires.

Mrs. Clipper and Sharla were working on the ground while a friend, Terry Dupre, was on top of the house. When a strong gust of wind brought the antenna in contact with an electric wire, they were knocked unconscious.

The girl, whose feet were burned so badly she is unable to walk, also suffered facial, hand and arm burns. The electric current was so strong, it melted a ring on one of her fingers.

Mrs. Clipper's feet, hands and legs were badly burned and one leg was lacerated. They were treated at a Port Sulphur, La., hospital and are scheduled to undergo surgery.

Relatives at Bogata had not heard of the incident until Thursday when Mr. and Mrs. Clipper and their children arrived here for a visit, and to escape the hurricane, Audrey. Paris Is Chosen Convention City For Judges Unit

Paris has been chosen as the convention city for the next session of the North and East Texas Association of County Judges and Commissioners next spring.

Titus County Judge Harry Taylor was elected president of the County Judges and Commissioners Association for the coming year. Other new officers are Judge Clayton Malone of Livingston County as second vice-president and O. H. Stroup, Collin County commissioner, as secretary-treasurer.

And a Lamar County commissioner, James Rheadasil of Precinct One, has been elected first vice-president of the huge association that takes in all of north and east Texas.

Rheadasil was elected Friday during the 1957 convention of the association in Tyler.

County Judge Henry Braswell and all four members of the Lamar County Commissioners Court—Rheadasil, Ollie Sims, Claude Roden and Dewey Vanderburg—attended the convention. Judge Braswell was chairman of the nominations committee and Rheadasil was a member of the convention city committee.

Bagwell Wildcat Reports Oil

Another wildcat test has produced oil in the Bagwell area, according to information by Charles Ware of Big J. Drilling Company, et al.

Ware said the Big J's Mary Garrison No. 1 wildcat a half-mile southwest of Bagwell recovered 1,600 feet of good oil in 18 hours after two perforations at the top of the Walnut Sand formation.

Gas Tax Refund Now Due Farmers

Farmers may obtain refunds of the Federal excise tax on gasoline which is used for farming purposes by filing a claim at any time after June 30 and before October 1, 1957.

Claims for the present Federal tax rate of 2-cents a gallon are to be made on Form 2240 and should be filed with the U. S. District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. Forms are available from county agricultural agents, and at some banks and post offices.

Initial refund payments will concern gasoline purchased and used during the first six months of 1956.

Farmers expecting to file claims should keep ample records to enable Internal Revenue to verify accuracy of the amount claimed.

Truck Freight Rates To Increase July 10

Austin—A 5 per cent increase in truck freight rates will go into effect in Texas July 10, the Railroad Commission announced on Tuesday.

The order will cost interstate shippers an estimated \$2,500,000 a year. It was the second general increase in a year.

The motor freight interests had requested a 7 per cent boost on less than truckload shipments. Rising costs were given as the reason for the increase request.

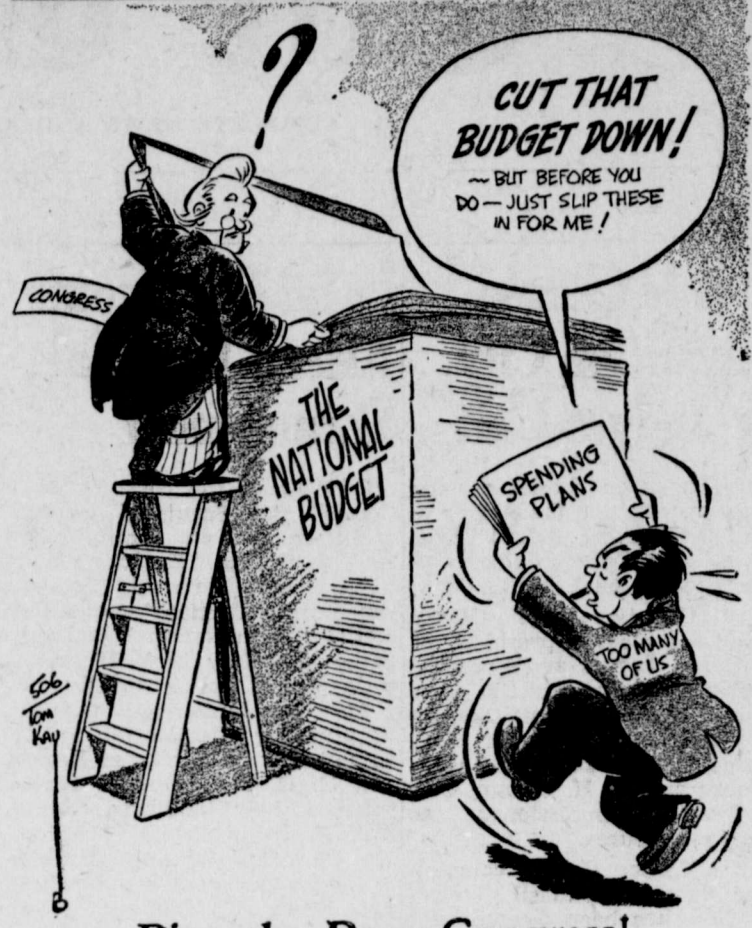

Solon Suggests New Dikshunary

Washington.—Rep. Harlan Hagen asked Congress to set up a national grammar commission that would simplify spelling and grammar.

He said he would introduce a bill that calls for the commission to prepare and edit a U. S. official dikshunary in which all words would be spelled as they sound.

What's more, the new spelling and grammar would be used in all federal documents, letters or printed matter of any kind.

The elimination of the most obvious inadequacies in spelling and grammar is needed, Hagen said.

One of the first things he would do, he said, would be to use F instead of PH. For instance, phoocy: would becom foocy.

The ground rules also call for avoiding unnecessary double letters—in fact, all unnecessary letters—as well as using WR where R would do just as well. For instance, Wretch would be retch.

Washington.—George D. Aiken (Rep.) of Vermont, said that the "non-farm population is getting aroused about what they regard as large subsidies to the nation's farmers."

"About two-thirds of that is earmarked for control of production and disposal of surpluses," he said.

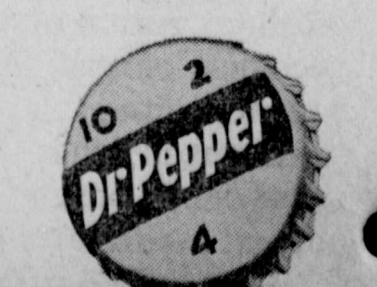

I tell you, we're treading on dangerous ground when we start talking about everybody relying on his own resources. I intend to buy a whole bunch of post-cards and write the entire United States Congress about this, just as soon as my next check from Washington gets here.

It Makes Sense!

Since it is in the government's civilian—not military—spending that economy can and should be achieved, Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey's call upon the public to force budget reductions makes very good sense.
