RUSSIANS APPEAL TO AMERICANS

Paris, March 28.—An unconfirmed rumor reaching here says that the Russian Premier Lenin has appealed to the United States to recognize the Russian Soviet government.

London, March 27.—The British staff, it is stated authoritatively, considers it impossible for War Minister Trotsky, of the Russian Soviet government to organize an army of a million men for a spring offensive on the bolshevik western front, as it has been reported he proposed to do. Military experts doubt if he could even be able to assemble that many while it would be impossible to equip and equally impossible to maintain such a force.

CLOSING HOURS FIXED AT SEVEN

A petition circulated Friday carries the names of practically all the business houses in the city in which the hour for closing business under the new time will be seven o'clock, instead of six o'clock.

The business men declared that the moving up of an hour with the clocks on the first of April, was a war measure, and while the time will be changed on the first of April, the unusually early closing which would occur if the six o'clock hour was observed under the new time, can be regulated by closing at seven o'clock.

Nothing is said in the petition about opening hour, and it is presumed that each individual business house will regulate this to suit themselves. The new time will go into effect next Tuesday and the seven o'clock hour will rule in closing, as will be seen from the following petition:

From the fact that all time pieces are to be run back one hour on March 31, we think it best to close our place of business at 7

TELLS EXPERIENCE IN ARMY HOSPITAL

Miss Cassie January, who has been the guest of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Bruce for several days, visited the Red Cross sewing room Thursday afternoon, and talked to the ladies present about the great need of Red Cross work in France, and among the other nations which suffered so on account of the war.

Miss January saw eighteen months service in the American hospitals in France. She was aid to surgeons operating in the American hospitals where wounded soldiers were brought from the battle front.

The trained nurse stated that she did not work in the civilian hospitals in France but knew some thing of their great need, and stated that the work now being done by the Red Cross Chapters in America would save much suffering among women and children in the war stricken country.

The sewing now being done by the local Red Cross Chapter is to supply garments for children in France, who have been robbed of parents, and support by the war.

Miss Lucile Spann is here visiting her grandfather, A. J. Spann, and other relatives, while en route to San Angelo where she goes to take up the extension work for the A. & M. College, that is she will be Tom Green County's home demonstration agent. Miss Spann formerly taught school in our county for four years, but for the last two years she has been attending school in Austin. San Angelo is to be congratulated in securing Miss Spann and we regret Rannels county hasn't one just like her.

TWO NATIONS U. S. FLAGS OBJECT TO ORDERED PEACE DELAY REPLACED

Paris, March 28.—English and French objection to any delay in perfecting peace treaty with Germany may prevent quadruple with Austria, Germany, Turkey, and Bulgaria, limiting the preliminary treaty to Germany and Austria.

The British and French believe that a quadruple treaty will take too long to complete, and these two nations are urging the great necessity for immediate preliminary peace with Germany.

DOYLE PARNELL AT HOME

Doyle Parnell, one of the Ballinger soldier boys, returned home a day or two ago and shows that army life agreed with him as he left home weighing 114 pounds and now tips the scales at 140.

Doyle says he enjoyed army life all right and has no "kick" coming, but says he, with the other boys had a pretty rough time. He was a member of the first arm artillery, 56th regiment and did detached service with the 57th regiment ammunition train. He landed at Boston en route home from France and says they enjoyed a royal occasion upon their reception in that city. He like all others from the overseas service says too much cannot be said in favor of the Red Cross and Salvation army, in that section.

Mr. and Mrs. Ben Matheison, of the Olfin country, were among the visitors in Ballinger Friday.

Budapest, March 28.—The Hungarian Soviet government ordered the United States flags and the British flags replaced where representatives of the two governments were making headquarters when the hotel owners ordered the flags removed.

The country is quiet with the new government apparently working efficiently in putting down threats of revolution. No violence has been reported today.

In an interview the foreign minister, Mr. Belakum, said that Hungary wishes for peaceful and friendly relations with the allies, but will fight if necessary to obtain justice.

London, March 27.—A Hungarian wireless communication dealing with the situation in Hungary was received here today. It was addressed "To All". The message says that complete peace and order reigns in Budapest and throughout the country and that the revolution was carried out entirely without bloodshed. Neither in Budapest nor the providence was a single person wounded, let alone being killed. The food supply of the capital and the country is declared to be adequate. Provision shops and markets are open and the population can obtain adequate supplies of food. Security for life and property has been guaranteed by government decree and the proclamation of martial law.

\$100 WAR STAMPS SOON TO APPEAR

For the first time War Savings Stamps in denominations of \$100 will soon be issued and will be available to the public upon the same terms as the \$5 W. S. S., now on sale at postoffices and agencies. Decision to issue the new style of W. S. S. was reached to make more simple the purchase of stamps. The ruling that no one person can have more than \$1,000 of War Savings Stamps of one issue still holds.

\$100 War Savings Stamps or Certificate will cost \$82.50 if put on sale during March; the price increases 20 cents each succeeding month, until the end of the year. The new stamps are now on the press and are about the size of a \$100 bond of the Fourth Liberty Loan issue. Decision to issue them was reached by officials of the Treasury Department as the result of suggestions by investors in W. S. S. who stated they found it irksome to amass a number of \$5 stamps and attach them to certificates.

Plans are also being formulated in the Treasury Department for the issuance of \$1,000 stamps or certificates in connection with investments in W. S. S. by "limit" buyers. The \$1,000 stamps will eliminate the necessity of carrying the ten W. S. S. certificates, each containing twenty W. S. S.

The one hundred and the one thousand dollar certificates will be a part of the 1919 series, and only stamps can be exchanged for them. Shortly a certificate will be issued for which 1919 stamps may be exchanged.

The campaign to raise funds for these war sufferers will be launched in the Southwest February 3 and continue for one week.

GERMAN CANNONS FOR LIBERTY MEDALS

Dallas, March 28.—Expenses incurred in advertising and promoting the sale of Liberty Bonds and war savings stamps are deductible on the part of individuals and corporations as a business expense in the computation of income taxes, according to advice given out by commissioner Roper of the internal revenue department at Washington. It is the intention of the government to show every consideration to those men and women who have given their time and means in previous loans and to whom it looks for assistance in putting across the final effort of the Victory Liberty Loan.

It further explains the effort on the part of the government to show its appreciation for the work of patriotic Americans is evidenced in the announcement that medals struck from captured German cannons are to be awarded all of the workers in the Victory Liberty Loan campaign which will open April 21st. The medals will bear on its front an embossed design of the Treasury Building at Washington, the reverse side will bear an inscription giving the history of the emblem with space for the name of the winner of the medal.

JAPS VALUE GOOD FEELING OF YANKS

Tokio, March 28.—The Japanese people beyond a doubt, consider the more friendly feelings, which has grown up between their country and America as one of the most important and most welcome of all the by products of the war. Acco'ing, each bit of evidence of better feeling and understanding on the part of citizens of the United States is regarded with no little satisfaction. The following from an editorial in the Asahi, one of the most influential newspapers of the Japanese capital, is a sample.

"According to a report recently received from Honolulu, a judicial authority in Hawaii openly declared in the course of his explanation regarding the new American naturalization law, that the Japanese subjects enlisted in the American army should be legally granted the right to naturalize and become citizens. The fact is an indication of a great change in the public opinion of America which was formerly antagonistic regarding the naturalization of Japanese."

"Another sign of pro-Japanese sentiment in America is the reported proposition to revise the anti-alien land law of California. According to a report from San Francisco a bill is to be presented shortly before the California legislature regarding the extension of the leases granted to the Japanese. This will be a great benefit to the Japanese farmers in the state, who since the promulgation of the present alien land law in 1913, have been suffering from great disadvantages due to the extremely short tenure of their lands. In fact, until recently, no one could imagine that such a radical change of public sentiment could possibly take place in California, which was popularly regarded as the hotbed of the anti-Japanese propaganda in the United States."

"Japan is now going to propose as one of her peace terms the recognition of the equality of races, and we are exceptionally pleased that the proposal may possibly be accepted by the allied leaders, especially by President Wilson and other American delegates who are exerting themselves for the establishment of a league of nations based upon the spirit of righteousness and universal brotherhood. The growth of friendly feeling toward the Japanese in America is welcome, as with this at their back, the leaders of Japan may be able to act fully and fearlessly in accordance with their conviction and faith."
