Graduates Are Eligible For Benefits

High School graduates in the Bogata area are eligible for up to \$20,600 in college benefits through enlistment in the U.S. Army.

The program is eligible for bonafide high school graduates who score 50 or higher on the Armed Forces Qualification test and enlist for two, three or four years in one of the critical military job skills. Further, individuals must be nonprior service.

"There are two types of benefits available under this test program," explained Mayor Larry L. Raab, Commander U.S. Army Dallas District Recruiting Command. "The government will contribute \$1200 in tuition assistance for each year of service. This means \$2400 for a two-year enlistment, \$3600 for three years and \$4800 for a four-year enlistment."

"Additionally, recipients will receive \$300 a month in payments while in school. The number of monthly payments vary depending on the length of enlistment. In other words, a two-year enlistment would qualify for 18 monthly payments totaling \$5,400, three years for 27 payments totaling \$8,100 and four year

enlistment for 36 payments totaling \$10,800.

This means an individual who enlisted in one of the critical job areas could receive a total of \$15,600 following a four-year enlistment. The four-year enlistment may also qualify

for a cash enlistment bonus of up to \$5,000. With the cash bonus and educational benefits the total package could yield \$20,600. For more information, call your local Recruiters.

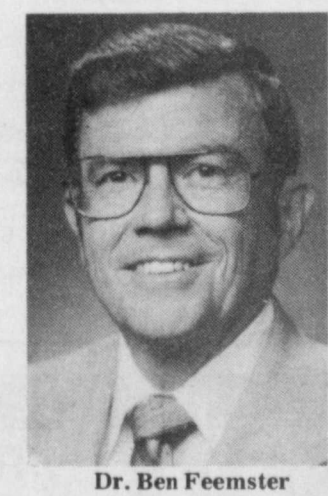
earmarked funds. These funds are to be used for water and sewer improvements.

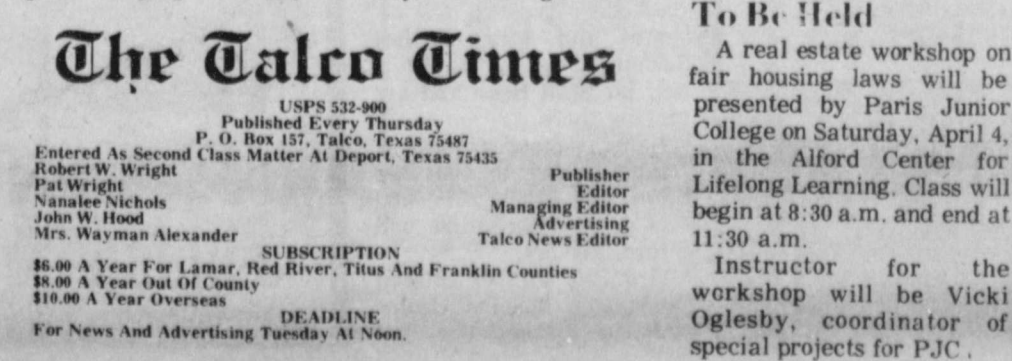

Old Gas Pump Brings Back Memories

There is an old landmark between here and Paris that takes me back to the days of my youth.

I don't know how often I've passed by and not seen it, but there it was the other day. It was an old gas pump. No electricity was used, instead the gasoline was pumped to the top of the glass cylinder and gravity fed it into the tank on the car.

There was once a store and gas station there, but the gas pump is the only thing left now.

Cars were just beginning to become popular when that pump was installed. Mostly horses, wagons or buggies were what folks traveled in.

Probably half the people owned cars, the others still used mules and horses.

I loved to go to my Granddad's just to play in his buggy back then. I loved

to bounce up and down in it, playing like I was driving in it. It had fringe around the top, and little side light to fill with kerosene for night driving. Back then folks took as much pride in their fine, pretty horses as people do of cars today.

They used to take them out to race on back roads, and of course, when the Model T's came out, the young men raced them. I thought we had some very snazzy cars back then too. There weren't any Thunderbirds, Regals or Mustangs, but we had Chevrolets, Dodges or Fords.

When I came back from World War II, I was still a country bumpkin, and I went to buy a car. When they asked if I wanted a Fairlane, I replied "No, I want a Ford or Chevy!"

Noone worried about gas mileage. Gasoline sold for from ten to eight cents per gallon. Of course, pay wasn't too good then. We could work all day in the field for about \$.75. Cotton picking or hoeing was awful hard work, too.

It came out about the same though, everything was cheap, even if salaries were too.

Don't Pay With Cash

Cash should never be sent through the mail to pay federal income taxes, the Internal Revenue Service says. If the cash payment should be lost, stolen, or destroyed, the taxpayer would have no record of payment.

Using a check or money order is much safer for two reasons, the IRS adds. First, either is hard to steal, and secondly, the cancelled check or money order receipt will serve as a record of payment.

Taxpayers should also be sure to write their Social Security number, the tax period and the form for which the payment is being made on the check or money order. In the event the payment is separated from the tax return, proper credit can still be given to the taxpayer's account.

Homemaker News

Get ready for home canning with inventories, tests, checkups and plans.

INVENTORIES
Inventory jars, lids, rings, freezer bags and any other equipment necessary for your special home canning projects.

TESTS
Test dial-gauge pressure canners every year.

For information on testing sites, call your County Extension agent. Tests should include making sure safety valves, petcocks and safety plugs are in good condition.

Replace any worn parts. Remove any corrosion by soaking in vinegar.

Finally, when testing the canner, be sure to look for steam leaks around the canner lid. If the lid has a rubber gasket, make certain it's clean and grease free. If the gasket leaks steam, turn it over, stretch it gently and replace it. If the rubber has hardened, replace it with a gasket.

CHECKUPS
Check jar rings. Discard any that are bent, dented or rusted. Estimate the number of lids you will need.

Check jars for chips or cracks. Chips along the jar mouth usually result in an unsealed project after processing. Cracked jars usually break in the waterbath or pressure canner.

PLANS
Make plans for clean storage areas, and plan ways to use leftover canned foods. Group "last years" canned foods so they are easy to reach and use—and so they are separate from "new" canning. Make sure the storage area is cool, dark and dry.

Following the distribution of books, program Chairman, Mrs. Ruby Cogburn gave a very interesting program on State Parks.

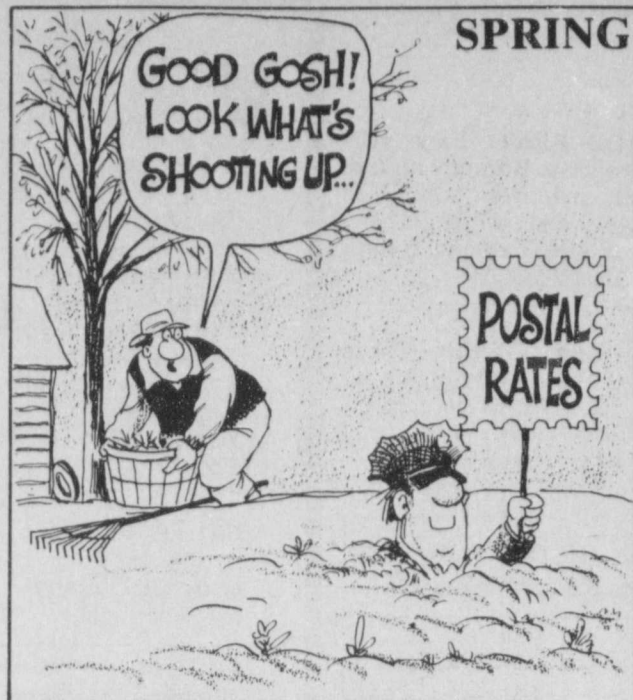

Fertilizer Users Receive Warnings

Spring time in Texas! It's time to plant and time to fertilize. It's also time, if you work with agricultural chemicals, to protect your eyes. If you don't, warns the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness, you risk serious eye injury, even blindness.

"Reports from hospital emergency rooms over several years show that chemicals have been responsible for nearly two-thirds of all agricultural eye injuries," says Elvin J. Schofield, Society president. "Yet with eye protection and proper precautions, 90 percent of these eye injuries could have been prevented."

"Anhydrous ammonia is the most powerful and dangerous of these chemicals," he went on. "In the soil ammonia means abundant crops; in the eye, however, it can mean tragedy for within seconds of contact it begins to destroy the cells and tissues of sight."

"For this reason, the Society urges that all who work around such chemicals wear safety goggles," he went on. "The goggles should fit snugly around the eye area and have hooded vents that will keep out liquids. For maximum protection a face shield should also be worn over the goggles."

In addition to urging safety eyewear, the Society has other safety tips for those handling agricultural chemicals.

Study the product's label for correct use and observe listed precautions.

Thoroughly understand how to operate any equipment prior to use.

Always store pesticides in their original containers, keeping them tightly closed.

Always carry at least five gallons of plain water on tractors and other farm equipment. Then, if an accident should occur, flush the eyes with water instantly, continuing for at least 15 minutes, with the eyelids held open.

The potentially blinding effects of anhydrous ammonia are graphically presented in a film called "For The Rest Of Your Life". The film is available for loan without charge from Prevent Blindness, 3211 West Dallas, Houston 77019. More information on farm eye safety may also be had in the Society's brochure, "Blind-

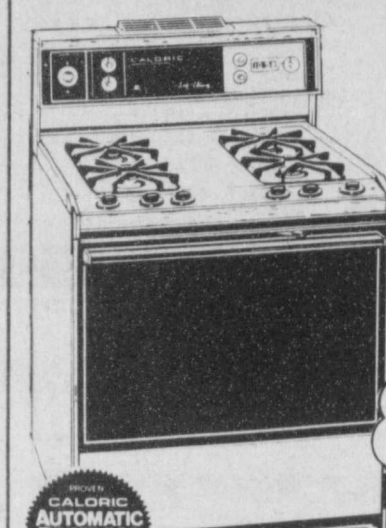

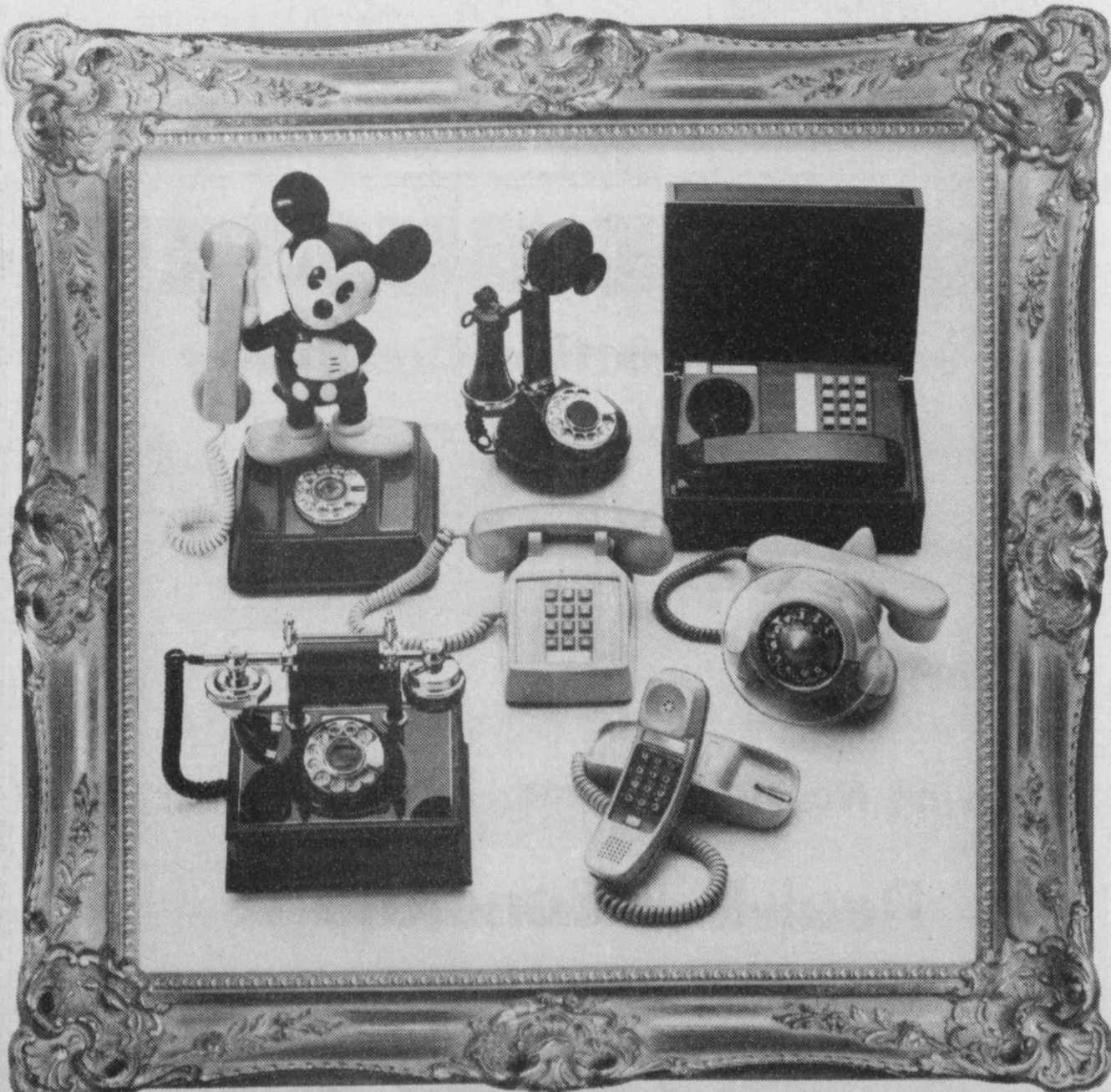
