## Mrs. G. L. Jones Appointed Cancer Crusade Chairman

Mrs. G. L. Jones, who lives west of Wellington, has been named chairman for Collingsworth County in the Cancer Crusade to be held in April 1960.

Announcement of her appointment was made by Tom Williams, field representative for the Panhandle district of the American Cancer Society, in a visit here Monday, November 30.

Before the crusade opens, Mrs. Jones will name business and community chairman to help her in the drive.

The quota for Collingsworth County is \$1,100.

Mrs. Jones has lived here many years and was a long-time teacher in the rural schools. More recently she has been the agent for an insurance company.

April has been designated by Congress as Cancer Crusade Month, Williams said.

## Cotton Crop Reaches 32,978 Bales; Harvest Nearly Over

Reports of gins showed that Collingsworth County has ginned 32,978 bales of cotton through December 1, and the crop is between 90 and 95 per cent gathered.

At least 90 per cent of the cotton is being stripped now and a majority of the Mexican workers here for the harvest have gone home. In some communities, not more than one or two crews remain. Most cotton being hand pulled is scattered in the field.

Although the crop is almost out, one or two gins continue to operate on a 24 hour schedule and several others operate until midnight.

Most of the cotton now is grading strict middling and middling spot and low middling light spot. The grade has held up exceptionally well, and some gin operators see little change in grade in the last 30 days.

Both Dodson gin managers, Ed Crowder and Marvin Wynn, report

the crop about 95 per cent out.

Crowder said that the Co-op, which had been running all night, now catches up some time during the night.

Cotton around Wellington is generally estimated at 90 per cent out.

Dick Sweat, Farmers Co-op manager, pointed out that never before have gins had a crop that was almost altogether stripped. This faster method of harvesting has sent cotton to the gin at an unprecedented rate, causing it to pile up on the gin yards. Wellington gins frequently have had 500 bales weighed in and waiting to be ginned, and sometimes as much as 600 and 700 bales.

Sweat said his customers had been well pleased with the cotton grade this year, which he termed "good—very good." Part of the satisfaction is credited to the new cotton classing office at Memphis.

Not more than 15 per cent of the crop remains to be harvested at Lutie, according to Bill Oldham, and at Dozier, Dub Marchant estimates it is 90 per cent out.

Although most of the cotton remains of good grade, a falling off is noted in some sections, and grades of "wasty" and "barkie" have begun to come back from the classing office. This cotton and others in the lower grade brackets is being sold out-right, as the market price now stands at 50 to 100 points above the loan price.

Another surprise in this crop is the small amount of 13/16 inch staple that has been ginned. This is largely due to the county's turning to better types of cotton with longer staple. At Dodson, not more than a two dozen bales have been ginned, only a few bales at Wellington. Lutie Gin has had only one bale with a staple that short, and Dozier has not had a single bale.

## C. R. Dobbs, Early County Settler, Dies

C. R. Dobbs, 89, who helped to develop agriculture in Collingsworth County, then moved on to the Pains to grow the first cotton in Lamb County, died in Amarillo at 8 a. m. Sunday. After partially retiring from active farming four years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Dobbs moved from Olton to Amarillo and made their home with a daughter, Miss Shirley Ann Dobbs at 2200 Crockett.

Mr. Dobbs moved here in 1900 in a covered wagon and lived in a dugout near Wellington. He came to Texas from the Indian Territory.

In 1927, the family moved to Olton in Lamb County. At that time, Lamb County was pasture land and the crops were mostly grain sorghums and wheat. Mr. Dobbs was of the opinion that it was good cotton land and he planted a crop which was the forerunner of today's extensive cotton acreage of that county today.

Mr. Dobbs was one of the founders and first president of the Collingsworth County Home Protective Association. He served as a deacon in First Baptist Church here many years.

He was a deacon in Trinity Baptist Church, Amarillo, at the time of his death.

He was born April 11, 1870 in Tennessee.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Monday at the First Baptist Church at Olton by the Rev. W. B. Fitzgerald of Thalia. Burial was in Olton Cemetery.

Surviving Mr. Dobbs are his wife; two children, Miss Dobbs and Roy Dobbs of Olton. There is one grandson and one granddaughter, Roy Dobbs, Jr. of Olton and Mrs. Kenneth Parish of Spring Lake. One brother, Tom Dobbs of Wellington, survived. A son, Aubrey Dobbs, who published The Collingsworth Standard here more than 20 years ago, preceded him in death.

Treated in St. Joseph's Hospital for bruises were Mrs. W. A. Morrow and Mrs. H. E. Berg. Mrs. Berg's daughter, Mrs. Eugene Molton, and small daughter, were treated and released.

Police Chief Troy Marsh said the accident occurred at the corner of 9th and Dalhart Streets. Mrs. Morrow was driving a 1952 Plymouth 4-door sedan, while Mrs. Berg was riding in a 1950 Ford station wagon, driven by Mr. Berg. Both vehicles received considerable damage, Marsh said.

## Coyote Hunters Warned After Livestock Shot

Coyote hunters received a stiff warning this week from Sheriff Rainey, after one rancher reported a steer was shot and another told of a possible steer killing.

A number of sters, calves and

cattle were reported killed last season.

"Most of this stock is shot by hunters out for coyotes at night," Sheriff Rainey said. "Some people who go out at night use coyote calls then when they see a pair of eyes, they shoot."

Sheriff Rainey said that while everyone agrees they would like to get rid of the coyotes, many landowners do not want hunting on their places at night because of the danger to livestock.

There appears to be more coyotes this year than usual, he added. "Whatever time you go out to hunt coyotes, please be careful about your shooting, and don't shoot just because you see something move," the sheriff urged.

## From Bureau of Reclamation

## Engineers Arrive Monday for New Salt Fork Work

Another step toward getting a dam on Salt Fork came Monday with the arrival of two engineers to continue checking out that river.

Fred Windham, field engineer, and Davie Branstetter, engineer, both from the Bureau of Reclamation office in Oklahoma City, came Monday and they will be joined before Christmas by three other engineers, who will be taken off the Glen Canyon, Arizona, project to work here.

John Coleman, chairman of the Collingsworth County Water Control and Improvement District, said the entire river will be checked in the county, and this will cover sites proposed for a dam.

The first of these is the OM location, on which emphasis has been placed, second site west of the Highway 83 Bridge in the approximate center of the county, and a third site north of Quail.

Coleman and Paul Spillman met with M. G. Barclay, area engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation, in Oklahoma City, last week.

Core drilling probably will come during the latter part of the current phase of work, Coleman said. It was learned here this week that there has been discussion in the Bureau of Reclamation of at proposed dam at the OM site even larger than any heretofore considered.

It is projected in terms of a dam 125 feet high, backing up a re-

servoir of 212,000 acre feet of water. The largest structure for which A. H. Wolverton, project engineer, has drawn plans would back up 160,000 acre feet of water.

A 212,000 acre foot reservoir would back water over the Highway 83 bridge at flood-time, but this is not considered in any way detrimental to the structure by engineers. In fact, only two years ago heavy rains sent water over the bridge.

In such an event, traffic would be re-routed, possibly over the Salt Fork Bridge to be built north of Quail.

The 125-foot dam, as it is being discussed, would not have a spillway.

## We Have a Common Interest With Our Neighbor, Mexico

A while back a neighbor of ours paid a visit. He heads a country that is the neighbor of our country, but it was as friendly and informal as that.

Adolfo Lopez Mateos, president of the United Mexican States, came with good will and interest in problems that are ours as well as his.

Mateos and his people are closer to us in Collingsworth than any others outside our boundaries. They are as close as some of the men and women who pull our cotton, here from Mexico by permit, they are as close as the little Spanish boys or girls who sits next to your child in school. They are blood brothers or cousins of many loyal Texans.

One of Mateos interests should sound familiar here—the issue of conserving our water resources.

He feels, quite rightly, that progress of his nation depends on adequate use of the gifts that God gave it, and nothing is more important than water, Senator Lyndon Johnson remarked after the two had visited at the Johnson ranch.

"We Americans have learned much from our work in water conservation. By imparting the knowledge to others, we can strengthen them and improve their prospects of prosperity," Johnson continued.

"I think we should operate on the basis that the Western Hemisphere will be no stronger than its weaker nations. I believe we should realize that countries like the United States and Mexico and others should provide the leadership that will strengthen all of the countries of the hemisphere and make it invulnerable to the proud boasts of a communist dictator, that he's going to bury us—because he's not!"

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## There Are Devoted Men Behind the Boys Who Are Scouts

Just how big the Scouting movement is in the four-county area that makes up the Comanche District could be seen at the annual banquet in Wellington last week. This does not honor the boys—it pays tribute to the men behind the boys, the business and professional men who by their leadership make Scouting possible in their home towns and communities.

While the Scouters have several opportunities a year to get acquainted with each other it is only at a meeting such as this that the visitor, the average citizen whose support of Scouting consists of his check during the fund raising drive, sees what goes into the operation of the Boy Scout, Explorer and Cub units.

These Scouters are business leaders and busy men. There is none but has other community responsibilities—to his church, his civic clubs, or other organizations.

Recognition came to a lesser-known part of Scouting, the troops for Negro boys in several towns of the district. Their leaders, too, are the leaders of their communities.

In one sense, every person who contributes money to the Boy Scout fund drive, which was completed in such a commendable manner here recently, is a part of Scouting. This money, plus the time and devotion of men like those at the district banquet, make possible the boy-power of this fine movement.

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## Only Retiring Heavy Spenders Can Restore Fiscal Sanity

As long as the federal government continues its over-extended activities, there can be no equitable tax program, Houston teachers and businessmen were told by Leonard E. Read, Irvington, N. Y., president of the Foundation for Economic Education.

The proliferation of federal activities and spending was made possible by the progressive income tax which, as Read pointed out, was advocated by Karl Marx as one of the indispensable steps toward communism.

Many thoughtful men, realizing the evils and dangerous implications of the progressive income tax, are seeking to abolish it. But Read declares that its abolition would only result in greater inflation as long as the government persists in carrying on all the activities it now pursues. For it would raise the same amount of money in other ways that would be more inflationary.

Government now takes 35 per cent of the people's earnings, Read pointed out. Numerous sound economists have said that 35 per cent—some have said 30 per cent—represents the limit that government can take from the people without destroying private enterprise and bringing on a system of state capitalism.

Our federal government, with a debt approaching \$300,000,000,000, makes no effort to pay off any part of it but apparently has resigned itself to paying interest on the debt indefinitely. The interest bill alone now is about \$9,000,000,000 a year, and not only we, but to all appearances our children and our children's children, still will be paying it without reducing the principal.

The Russians, Read pointed out, do a more honestly dishonest thing. They compel the people to buy their government bonds, then cancel them.

The answer is popular action at the ballot box. If the people will defeat, say, 80 per cent of the heavy spenders for only two or three elections in succession, we will get fiscal sanity. If they won't, they will have only themselves to blame.

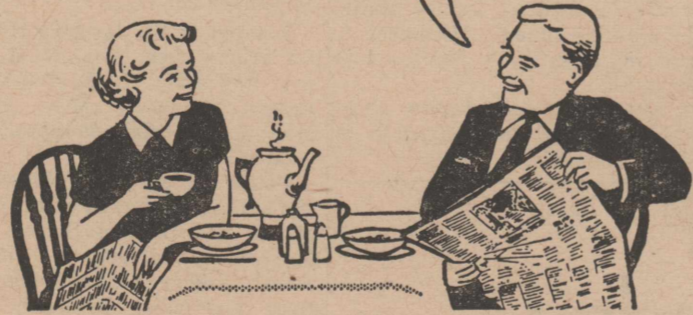
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## CROSSROADS REPORT

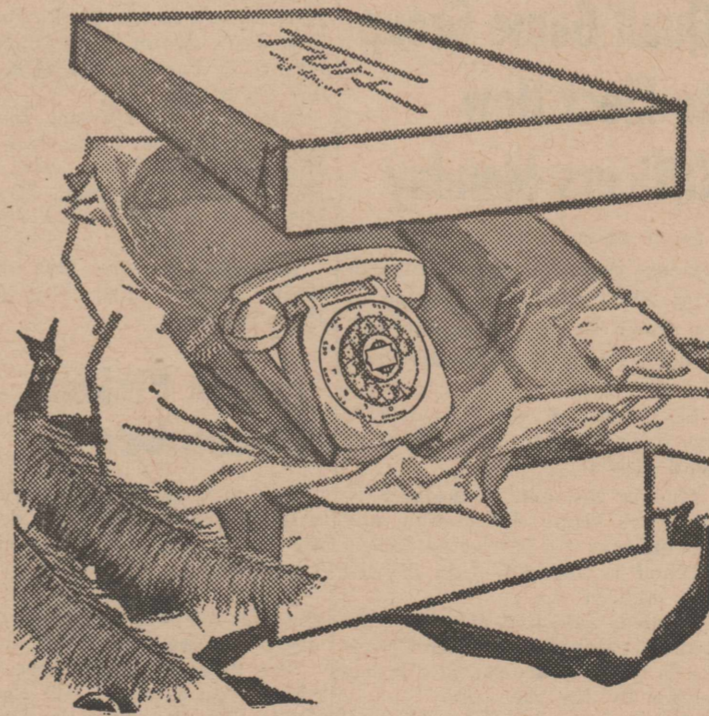

## Industry Sets out Requirements for Location

Representatives of a New York industry, here recently on a tour of area towns in search of a new location, asked for a building and other concessions that would have cost around a quarter of a million dollars, Chamber of Commerce Manager N. M. Higdon and Henry Sullivan, chairman of the C-C industrial committee have revealed.

The Wellington men said the company was reluctant to consider a town without an industrial foundation but assurance was given that the necessary funds could be raised when the time came.

The company would require an air conditioned building 184x268 feet in size, almost a city block.

This would be built under at lease-purchase agreement, but at the same time the company asked for stop-loss clause in the contract that would enable them to pull out if the venture proved unprofitable, the local men said.

It was the feeling of the Collingsworth Chamber of Commerce that it would not be profitable to pursue this prospect further.

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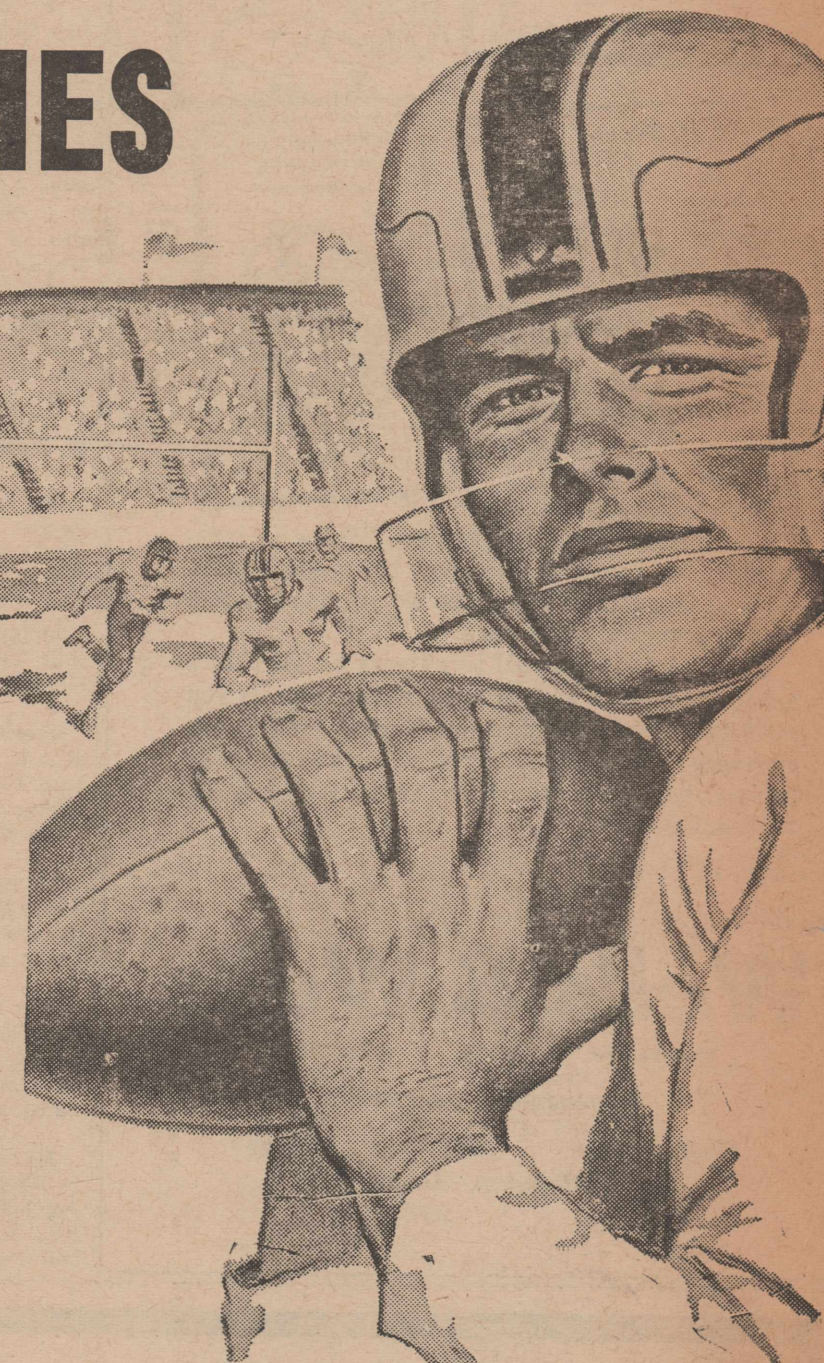
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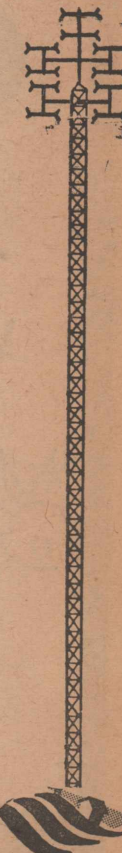
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## Youngsters Need SS Cards for Holiday Work

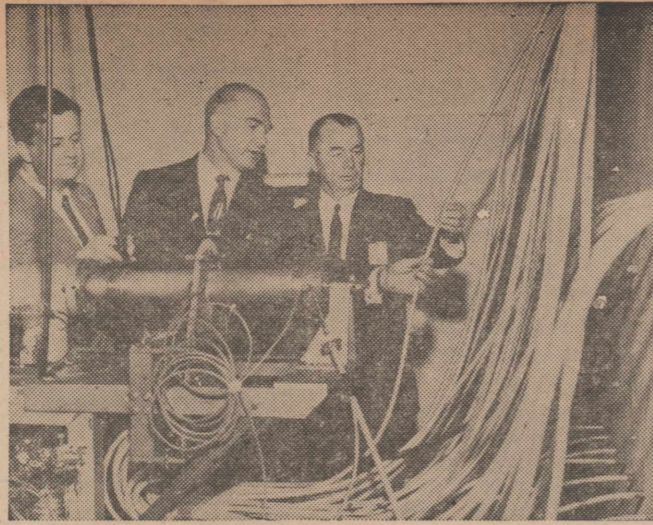

Locate the center at a kitchen table, a breakfast counter or a portion of the cabinet where you'll have room to work. A lapboard that pulls out of the counter works fine, too.

Keep supplies on a shelf or in a drawer near by. If space is a problem, store your equipment in a large bread box.

Some cheese spreads, canned tuna fish, meats, dried fruits, pickles, olives, etc., can be stored on shelves above the center. Keep some good "munchers," such as cheese crackers, canned potato sticks, and canned nuts on hand, too.

If you have a freezer, keep a wide variety of breads on hand—hamburger buns and frankfurter rolls, pumpernickel, rye or nut bread. Some types of sandwiches can be made ahead of time and frozen.

To check on sandwich fillings and other prepared foods that freeze well, get a copy of the extension bulletin on "FROZEN FOODS," from your county home demonstration agent.

## Texas to Have Nearly Half 1960 Cotton Acreage

College Station — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has proclaimed a national marketing quota of 13,133,000 bales (standard bales of 500 pounds gross weight) and a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres for the 1960 up land cotton crop.

Texas' share will be 6,761,512 acres with an addition 55,965 acres for the national reserve. The Secretary also announced his determination that alternate—Choice (B)—farm allotments for the 1960 upland cotton crop will be 40 percent larger than the "regular" Choice (A) allotments for the same farms.

An acreage allotment of 22,243 acres will be in effect for the extra long staple cotton grown in Texas in 1960. The national marketing quota will be 66,590 bales with a 64,776 acre allotment.

December 15 was set as the date for a growers' referendum on marketing quotas for both upland and extra long staple cotton. At least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to remain in effect.

If the quotas are approved, Choice (A) will include "regular" farm allotments with price support at not less than 75 percent of parity available to growers who comply with their regular allotments. Choice (B) includes 40-

percent-larger farm allotments and price support to growers who comply with their Choice (B) allotments at 15 percent of parity less than under Choice (A). Individual farm allotments under both Choice (A) and Choice (B) will be made available to producers prior to the referendum.

Benson added that if marketing quotas are not approved for the upland cotton crop, only the "regular" Choice (A) allotment program will be in effect and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 percent of parity, as provided by law. If quotas are turned down by extra long staple producers, support to eligible growers will drop to 50 percent of parity.

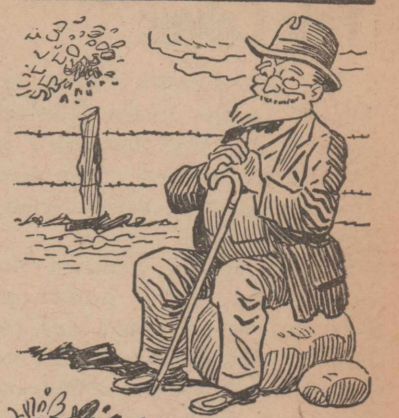

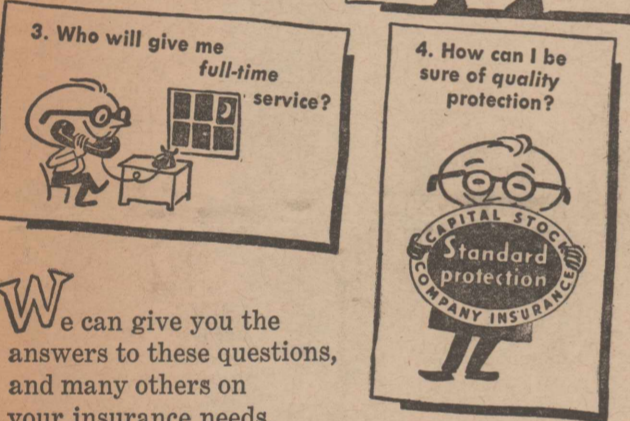
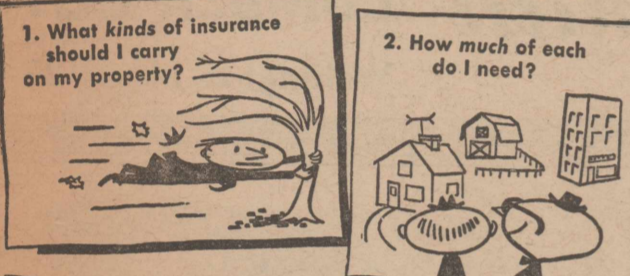


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
