HOOVER TALKS AGAIN TODAY

PRESIDENT IS TO BE
SPEAKER IN SOUTH
CAROLINA FETE

HOOVER SPECIAL TRAIN EN
ROUTE TO KING'S MOUNTAIN,
S. C., Oct. 7.—Happy over the
reception accorded him in Boston,
President Hoover was journeying
southward today to wind up his
extensive speaking tour with an ad-
dress at the semi-centennial cele-
bration of the revolutionary war
battle of King's Mountain.

There, in a natural amphitheater,
the President and Mrs. Hoover were
to join thousands of Carolinians
late in the day in commemorating
the battle of Oct. 7, 1780, between
the American militia under Col.
James Williams and a force of Brit-
ish and Loyalists under Lieut. Col.
Patrick Ferguson. The American
victory on that occasion was re-
garded by many historians as the
turning point of the war.

As in Boston, where he made two
speeches in four hours, another busy
round of activity was arranged for
the president's last day away from
Washington.

MILLER SPEAKS TO LIONS

FIRE PREVENTION IS
DISCUSSED; CITY'S
CREDIT CITED

J. Bryan Miller, Lubbock city
manager, was the principal speaker
before the Lions club today noon
at the Hilton Hotel, taking as his
subject matters dealing with fire
prevention in observance of National
Fire Prevention week.

Other speakers are to appear at
local luncheon clubs this week dur-
ing regular luncheon sessions, each
to speak along lines similar to those
taken by Mr. Miller.

Three Points Discussed
Three major points were covered
in today's address. What is fire
loss? Who pays this loss? What is
the cure for this loss? What is
the average loss in the United States
yearly, according to the speaker's
figures. Sixty per cent of this loss
occurs in the home with mercantile
districts ranking second.

Loss in premiums paid in Lubbock
during the past six years follows:
1924, \$66,555; 1925, \$52,106; 1926,
\$36,558; 1927, \$42,442; 1928, \$46,227;
1929, \$34,898. This will represent a
little more than 50 per cent of the
total.

PARKS PLANNED DEATHS

ONE LIFE LOST IN STORMS, FLOODS

TEXAS IS RECOVERING
TODAY FROM WEEK
END OF RAINS

(By The Associated Press)
A check-up today revealed that
Texas had come through a trio of
small tornadoes and heavy rains
which sent rivers and creeks from
their banks with the loss of but a
single life—a soldier who stepped
on a live wire blown down by a
heavy wind at Brownsville.

Brady, hardest hit of any section
by flood waters, today was straight-
ening up after the Brady river, nor-
mally unthought of as a dangerous
stream, had resumed its usual
peaceful course after sending water
into 40 or 50 business houses to
damage stocks to the extent of
\$300,000. About 50 small houses
were washed away making about
300 persons homeless.

Sun Shining
The sun was shining over the
vast area that had been drenched
by rains that assumed the propor-
tions of cloudbursts in many sec-
tions. Cattlemen and farmers who
had been through one of the state's
most prolonged dry spells, were pre-
paring to plow and plant and stock
their ranges anew.

The tornadoes struck at Latexo,
a village in Houston county, near
Crook where 20 persons were re-
ported slightly hurt and a number
of houses blown down. Houston,
where a street car was buffeted off
its track and a few houses damaged,
and at Beaumont, where slight dam-
age was done to a small area.

ACREAGE CUT PLAN IS UP

BANKS MAY BE ASKED
TO REFUSE LOANS
ONLY ON PLAN

(By Associated Press)
CORPUS CHRISTI, Oct. 7.—J. J.
Garrett, banker and cotton grow-
er of this area, will present a cot-
ton acreage reduction plan to all
interested persons of South Texas
at a barbecue here October 29.

Garrett's plan is for banks to re-
fuse financial aid to any grower
who would not reduce his next
year's acreage at least 25 per cent
under this year.

It is understood that plans are
under way to have representative
men of the group meeting here to
petition bankers of the state to call
a state bankers meeting to consider
and adopt the plan. Garrett has
declared that a large cotton crop
next year would result in six and
seven cent cotton.

"I DIDN'T BELIEVE HE'D DO IT!" VELMA HAYES PARKS, ON PAIN-RACKED BED, JUST "DIDN'T LOVE HIM," SHE EXPLAINS

Tortured with a haunting pain and mental pictures of a tragedy
not yet a day old, pretty Velma Hayes Parks tossed on her white bed
at the Lubbock Sanitarium this morning repeating "I didn't believe
he would do it—"

In a morgue a few blocks away lay the body of Orville Parks, to
whom she was married in May 1928 as a high school girl, and who
ended their marital career yesterday when he sent a bullet through
his brain after an unsuccessful attempt to end the life of his wife.

Tears Fill Girl's Eyes
"I had no idea he would shoot himself. He told me he didn't
want to live without me." Tears came to the little sufferer's eyes and
she turned to the wall for a few moments of silence—then pain again
tormented her into her recurrent wails.

"But I didn't want to live if I had to live with him," she an-
nounced, turning again from the wall. "I didn't love him."

She fingered the blood-stained bandages which encased her
swollen right arm and hand, grim reminders of the bullets which
were aimed at her yesterday after Orville Parks attempted to effect
a reconciliation at her room in the house at 1406 Avenue K. Two
shots entered her arm and wrist, a third entered her abdomen as she
fled.

"I knew he loved her and had said he would kill himself if she
didn't live with him, but I didn't think he meant it," Charlie Hayes, a
teacher in the Spur schools and sister of Mrs. Parks interposed,
fingering petals of red carnations which were drawn close to the
bed. "I didn't know he had left me a letter. But he liked me. I was
always trying to get him to go back together."

Here Since September
Mrs. Parks left her husband in August and came to Lubbock from
Spur in September where she has been cashier at the Tech cafe. She
used her maiden name of Velma Hayes here. Orville Parks came
here last Saturday and saw her, then threatened her life and his.

"But I didn't think he meant it. I might have done something,"
she tossed again with the racking pain as a white-clad nurse ad-
justed a pillow under her arm. "Can't I have a hypo?" she pleaded.
"It hurts so—"

The nurse went out.
"I didn't love him. I didn't want to live if it was with him," she
repeated.

Married In 1928
"We were married in May 1928," she continued after a time. "I
went on to high school after I was married. He was good. He was
all right. I just didn't love him." Her short sentences were accom-
panied by the ceaseless cries of pain—"Oh, I didn't know he would
do this."

"He was a good provider. He loved her," the sister again spoke.
Tears were in her eyes, too, as she hovered about the severe white
bed, nervously twisting the gay tulle bow with a stray end of raffia
on the flower basket handle.

Tragedy Is Evident
"But I didn't love him any more." Again the pain-ridden girl
turned from the wall. Tears welled again in anguished blue eyes;
tousled brown hair, grown into a long bob, framed her flushed face,
which pictured tragedy that had come to a twenty-year-old young
woman and a two-year-old romance.

"I didn't know he would do it, though. Oh—Oh—Can't they
do something? The pain—" she turned again to a nurse who was
shifting the pillow under red-stained bandage, victim of a love that
went astray.

FRED SIMS HURT IN ELEVATOR FALL

Fred Sims, of 2312 Main street,
was painfully injured about 8:30 o'-
clock this morning when he fell two
floors in an elevator after cable to
the machine had broken.

The accident occurred at the
Walker-Smith wholesale company
where Sims was employed.

He was taken to the West Texas
hospital in a Rix-Sanders ambu-
lance where examination by phy-
sicians revealed he suffered a frac-
tured back. Although Sims will be
unable to work for several months
physicians stated that his condition
is not grave. Examination showed
that there is no indication of pres-
sure on the spinal cord.

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TWO LETTERS LEFT REVEAL INTENTION

YOUNG WOMAN SAID TO
BE IMPROVING AT
HOSPITAL TODAY

That murder of his pretty 20-
year-old wife and a quick ending to
his own life was deliberately and
carefully planned by Orville Parks
was revealed this morning with the
discovery of two letters written by
the young man, one addressed to his
mother and the other to his wife's
sister.

With finding of the letters, first
opinions expressed last night that
Parks had become so angry that
the power of clear thinking was
lost, were confirmed.

Young Woman Improved
Condition of the young woman
this morning was said by hospital
attendants to be much improved and
her recovery is thought practically
assured. The young husband died
at 9 o'clock last night, never having
regained consciousness after the
shooting. His body is being held at
Rix-Sanders funeral home and will
probably be sent this afternoon to
Whitney for burial.

In the letter addressed to his
mother, Mrs. Flora Parks, 1128
South Eighth street, Waco, the
young man revealed that he had
been in ill health and that, coupled
with many worries, made it im-
possible for him to go on living.

Dated October 6
"Dear Mother," the letter, which
was dated October 6, began. "I
guess you think I am a coward and
not man enough to face my trou-
bles. Well, I guess I am but I am in
bad health and worrying so much
crazy before long."

"Velma and I have an insurance
policy apiece and they are both paid
up so you and Mrs. Hayes divide
them. Mine is made to Velma and
hers to me. So long, love, Orville."

Wishes Them Happiness
A short postscript carried the last
wish, "If the boys ever marry, I
hope them lots more happiness than
I have had."

Both of the letters were written
on tablet paper and in a hurriedly
peniciled scrawl.

The second missive, addressed to
Miss Charlie Hayes, teacher at
Spur, and sister of Mrs. Parks, read:
"Dear Charlie—Please forgive me
and please send my things that are
at Vera's to me— Here a word
was missing.

"Mine and Velma's insurance pol-
icies are in with the things. Love,
Orville."

Separated Two Months
The shooting occurred Monday
afternoon at 1406 Avenue K where
Mrs. Parks had been a roomer since
last Thursday. She and her hus-
band, married about two years ago,
had been separated for about two
months, according to statements by
friends.

Mrs. Parks was shot once in the
side, an intestine being severed, and
twice in the right arm and wrist.
Parks shot his wife, an employee of
the Tech cafe, twice as she fled
from her bedroom and once when
she returned to the porch after
running about crazily, leaving a trail
of blood.

First indication of trouble came
when Mrs. S. T. Pluke, a resident
at the house, said she heard loud
crying and screaming.

64, of Leyden township.

TWO ARMIES IN MOVE ON TWO BIG CITIES

RIO DE JANEIRO AND
SAO PAULO ARE TO
BE ATTACKED

(By The Associated Press)
MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay,
Oct. 7.—Revolutionary arm-
ies moved today toward the
two largest cities of Brazil,
gathering force as they
traveled for what their lead-
ers believed would be de-
cisive battles.

Leaders of the rebel movement
planned to divide the armies of
the state of Rio Grande do Sul,
which is committed to the revolu-
tion, sending one section against
Sao Paulo, coffee-exporting center,
and the other against Rio de Ja-
neiro. The second section will await
forces from the states of Minas
Geraes, Ceara, Pernambuco, Piaui
and Rio Grande do Norte before
attacking the capital city.

Vargas in Charge
Getulio Vargas, president of the
state of Rio Grande do Sul, and
defeated candidate for the presi-
dency in the national elections, has
delegated responsibilities of his
state office to Dr. Oswaldo Aranha,
minister of interior, and will take
personal command of the southern
revolutionary armies.

The newspaper Republicano at
Santa Ana da Livramento said to-
day that radiograms from the front
had announced arrival of the in-
surgent vanguard at the borders of
the state of Sao Paulo, not far
from where federal troops are gar-
dering for defense of the important
city. Troops from Santa Catarina
and Parana are assembling with
the insurgents for the invasion of
Sao Paulo.

Reports from Rivera, frontier
town, insisted that a battalion of
the sixteenth infantry at Sao Paulo,
had revolted. It was said also that
Fort Copacabana was assaulted Sun-
day by a group of rebels.

The Santa Ana Republicans said
\$50,000 volunteers had offered them-
selves for military service in Rio
Grande do Sul alone.

leader, took the stand yesterday in
fleeing mood and told how his
followers planned to establish a
"dictatorship of the proletariat." He
described his visit to Moscow three
years ago as a delegate to the
Fourth International and said
workers were far better off in Rus-
sia than in this country.

"To which flag do you pledge al-
legiance?" asked the committee.

IT HAS BECOME a commonplace that sports clothes, limited as they are by definite destinations, fluctuate less than any other garments with the sartorial tides that influence our silhouettes. This very limitation makes the bringing of a new note into the sports mode something of a tour de force, and it is by his solution of this delicate problem that one may judge the supreme creator.

Sports clothes still remain in these regions dedicated to real sport, to which we banished them a couple of seasons past, but in those regions they have undergone a definite, though subtle, evolution. They are more feminine, more daytime. Though a certain gaiety of cut and color is desirable, everything loud or crude has been rigorously eliminated.

Sports hems have followed the general downward trend of skirt lengths. I find 12 inches from the floor a good average level. As ever, I am opposed to arbitrary sartorial rules. In some cases, it is in the interest of harmony to make them a little longer—in some, a thought shorter—but in all, the knees will be hidden with a hem margin to spare.

Sports Silhouette Gives Freedom

The new sports silhouette is drawn along the same general lines as the daytime silhouette—with wide shoulders, a slender waist, slim but curved hips, a graceful length of limb. Exactly how these specifications are achieved depends largely upon the special sport to which one is addicted.

Drop shoulder yokes and kimono outlines would render the free arm movement essential to both golf and tennis. Skirts may be either circular, flared, gored or pleated. They

Another Well Comes In Sooner City Area

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 7. (AP)—Surpassing other "gigantic" wells in the South Oklahoma City field which have set records for production of high gravity oil, the Number 1 Ross well of Oils, Inc., flowed 1,824 barrels in 81 minutes on a test last Monday or at the rate of about 140,000 barrels a day.

While numerous 100,000 barrel producers have been completed in Mexico and West Texas, their product has been low gravity oil.

The well, in the northwest part of the field, in SE NW 2-11-3W, was to be left on production until it fills the 15,000 barrels of storage capacity on the lease. Pipeline connections have been made to tankage on the lease and the crude was running to the Gulf State refinery, east of the city. State proration orders permit a 24-hour test of the well.

The initial flow of the well, maintained for 24 hours, would exceed by more than five times that of the famed "Wild Mary Sudik" which attracted national attention last April by blowing wild for eleven days. The Sudik well's first flow was only 25,000 barrels.

It is non-inflammable, minimizing fire danger, and it permits housing the engines in large rooms in the hull of the ship for the first time, making them readily accessible to repair and overhauling with the dirigible in flight.

FEDERAL FARM BOARD MOVES TO SET UP NIGHT CLASSES FOR FARMERS OF U. S.

EXTENSION WORK TO BE
JOINED BY SPECIAL
FARM CLASSES

BY MARGUERITE YOUNG

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—The
Federal Farm Board has joined
hands with the federal board for
vocational education in a program
to advance cooperative marketing by
teaching its theory and application
to farmers of the present and fu-
ture, in special classes at 4,000 cen-
ters in the United States.

Dr. C. N. Lane, director of vo-
cational agriculture for the educa-
tion board announced today that
the farm board had endorsed a
plan to utilize existing machinery
instead of creating a new organiza-
tion to carry out the agricultural
marketing act provision for extend-
ing cooperative marketing by edu-
cation.

Under the new program farm-
ers will be taught in evening class-
es while boys and girls will be of-
fered special courses in regular and
special part-time high school
courses.

The farm board will stand ready
to assist in the organization of
new cooperatives under its own
plan, Lane said, adding it anticipat-
ed the education program would
result in "many new cooperatives."

Lane said the program would be
carried through without employ-
ment of additional teachers.

Establishes Centers
Lane said the vocational education
board had established centers in
high schools through which approx-
imately 200,000 farm boys and girls
—already enrolled in vocational
agriculture studies—could be reach-
ed. He estimated at least 100 farm-
ers could be offered special courses
at each of the 4,000 established
centers.

Four regional conferences of field
representatives of the two boards
will be held with representatives of
existing cooperatives and state su-
perintendents of vocational educa-
tion. They will meet early next
month in Dallas, St. Paul, Chic-
ago, and Chattanooga, Tennessee.
Each conference will prepare for
extending the teaching of coopera-
tive marketing, with special em-
phasis on the products grown in the
region.

To Supply Texts
The farm board will supply texts
for teachers—up-to-date data base-
ing on specific problems in various
regions. This material will be dis-
tributed periodically by the educa-
tion board.

The plan involves six months' su-
pervision of applied practice of the
theories the farmers learn.

DETROIT WARNS UNEMPLOYED OF JOBS SITUATION IN CITY; GATES GUARDED

(By The Associated Press)

DETROIT, Oct. 7.—The City of
Detroit today was engaged, figuratively
speaking, in posting huge
"keep out" signs at the city's gate-
ways, directed to those who come
here looking for jobs.

The inflow of jobless has in-
creased materially, city officials
found, since the systematic pro-
gram of Mayor Frank Murphy and
industrial leaders interested in un-
employment has been placed in op-
eration. Those in charge of this
program pointed out that some
80,000 jobless Detroiters have been
registered, and that the most hope-
ful estimate of immediate employ-
ment contemplates relief for not
more than a third of this number.

To Be Informed
Federal Dodge, chairman of the
sub-committee on relief of the gen-
eral employment committee, an-
nounced today that drastic steps are
contemplated to keep out unemploy-
ed persons. One plan calls for
police to be stationed at bus
terminals and railway stations to
interview strangers. If they are
found to have come here looking
for work they will be told there is
no work for them and asked to
leave. If hungry, they will be given
food and a night's lodging. If they
refuse this service at a mission, Mr.
Dodge said, and are unable to show
financial ability to care for them-
selves police will be asked to arrest
them and get them out of town.

The unemployment committee has
adopted a plan of calling 500 of the
most needy registered men daily
to a central municipal agency where
such jobs as are to be had are to

FARM BOARD PLANS ACREAGE REDUCTION WORK CONTINUANCE

DRIVE OF LAST YEAR TO BE ENLARGED

GREATER APPEAL TO BE MADE TO FARMERS IN SOUTHLAND

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—A concerted drive for cotton acreage reduction and a determination on a "permanent land utilization" for the south has been outlined by the Federal Farm board.

Carl Williams, cotton member, announced the farm board, in co-operation with the state department of agriculture, would invite a series of conferences in each of the cotton growing states in an effort to reduce cotton planting to 40,000,000 acres. Land planted to cotton this year aggregated 45,800,000 acres.

Although in effect a continuation of last year's campaign for reduced cotton acreage, Williams explained that it was contemplated on a "more permanent basis" not only for next spring, but for ten years and 20 years hence.

"There are, of course," the announcement continued, "other steps for readjustment of the south's farming program besides reduction of the acreage of cotton. The south produces too much cotton of poor character and staple and too little of the better staples. There is too much unproductive and therefore unprofitable land planted to cotton. Too little land is planted to food and feed crops. There is too much high-run seed and too much mixing of varieties in the same community and even in the same bales."

To Change Programs
In each state the program will be somewhat different, depending on the different soil and farming conditions. Williams said they would be predicted largely "upon a basis of the needs and abilities of the states themselves."

Representatives of general farm organization, agricultural colleges, experiment stations, extension divisions and county agent groups, teachers of vocational agriculture, bankers, associations, land ownership groups and the cotton co-operators, will be included among those at the conferences.

One problem to be dealt with, Williams said, would be what to plant on the land taken out of cotton. The cotton cooperatives have now received 3.7 times as many bales this year as at a corresponding date a year ago.

Lamesa Merchants Holding Institute

LAMESA, Oct. 7.—Lamesa's fourth annual merchant's institute will be held here Tuesday with Alfonso Johnson, of the trade extension bureau of the Dallas chamber of commerce, delivering two addresses during the day.

At noon Mr. Johnson will speak at a luncheon of heads of the business concerns. The luncheon will be held in the Williams hotel. Buster Yates, a hardware merchant, will preside.

The program is being given by the retail merchants division of the chamber of commerce. E. R. Yates, banker, is chairman of the committee.

ARIZONA SEEKS DECISION
WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Arizona asked supreme court permission today to file a suit to test the validity of the Swing-Johnson act for construction of Hoover Dam and of the compact in which the other states of the Colorado river valley supported the project.

HUGE FLYING BOAT GIRDS FOR ATLANTIC CROSSING SOON

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Oct. 7. (A.P.)—A gigantic power plant of the air, the world's largest flying boat, is tuning its 12 engines for a transatlantic hop to the United States.

So huge is the DO-X that an ordinary airplane could not lift the collection of instruments and mechanical devices carried to safeguard its crew and passengers.

Soon this mammoth aircraft, which requires a crew of 13 to operate it and weighs more than 50 tons when fully loaded, is expected to take off from Liebon for New York.

Last year the DO-X astonished aeronautical engineers by carrying 160 passengers in a test flight. Since then it has been remodeled and modernized still more.

Twelve Curtiss-Condor water-cooled engines, which supply an aggregate of 7,300 horsepower, have been installed in place of the original Siemens "Jupiter" engines. A central power room also has been created.

If some millionaire should buy the DO-X, he would find space enough on the passenger deck for a seven-room apartment. The 30-foot length of passenger space is divided into cabins for eight, 10 or 15 persons.

There is a smoking room with leather-upholstered chairs, a kitchen supplied with electricity, and a main lounge 23 feet long. A central gangway connects the rooms, which average 10 feet in width.

To feed the plane's power plant eight fuel tanks—two in the wings—can be loaded with 4,000 gallons of fuel, while three oil tanks hold 415 gallons. The plane's maximum speed is listed as 150 miles an hour.

Besides the flight commander, Capt. Friedrich Christiansen, 12 men will be required to operate the ship. Two pilots sit side by side in front of dual controls in the pilot room above the passenger deck.

Behind them in the navigation room is the navigation officer; behind him in the central power room is the engineer, while seven mechanics work in shifts on motors and a steward watches after passengers' comfort.

The ship's engineer keeps constant watch on performance of each of the 12 engines, and individual throttles of each engine may be coupled to a central throttle controlled directly by the pilot.

In addition to American gyroscopic equipment for "blind" flying, if necessary, the DO-X carries three lifeboats and an elaborate radio-sending and receiving station.

HYDE STATES PRICES VARY IN TEXAS

SECRETARY CITES USE OF SLACK METHODS IN DISTRIBUTION

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 7. (A.P.)—Farmers in drought stricken counties of Texas have been faced with a wide variation on the prices they have had to pay for hay, wheat, oats, barley and corn, Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde, citing reports received by his office, has wired O. B. Martin, director of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College extension service.

Martin is chairman of the Texas drought relief committee recently appointed by Governor Moody.

Indicates Slack Methods
The wide range in prices indicates "uneconomical methods of handling and distribution," Secretary Hyde said.

An offer of the Farmers' National Grain corporation of Chicago to ship wheat and coarse grains in carloads to drought stricken counties and feeding areas from elevators or principal terminal markets at minimum charges was cited by Secretary Hyde.

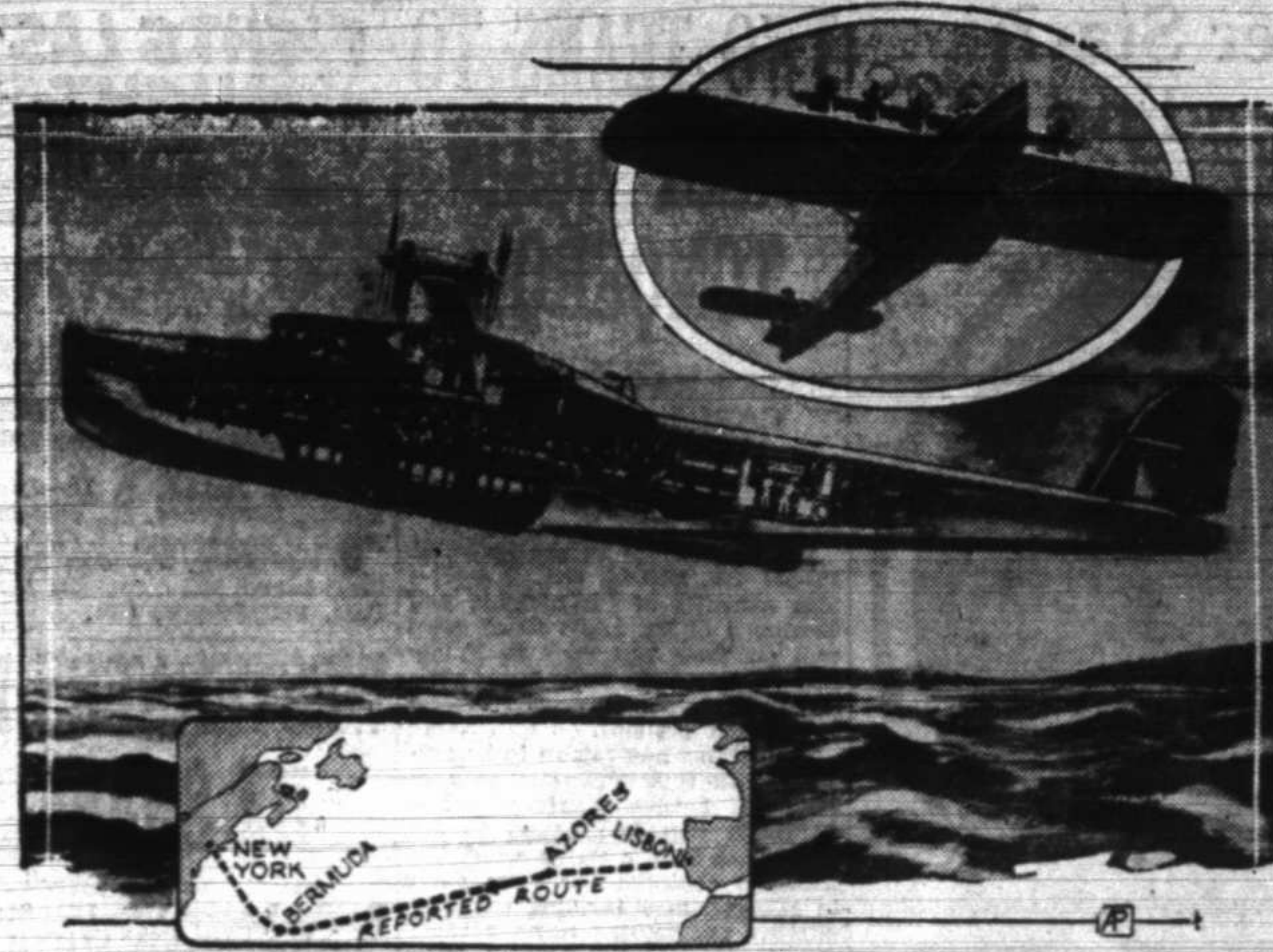
"We believe arrangements can be made with local dealers, elevators or co-operators to purchase wheat and other feeds in carloads from Farmers' National or other agencies at agreed reasonable handling charges," he wired Martin. "Please ask county agents to see regular trade agency and bankers and urge local action to save money for farmers. Prices paid for wheat in Texas range from 90 cents to \$1.30 and for corn from \$1.10 to \$1.35. This is probably due to inability of individual farmers to handle carloads."

More Counties Added
A telegram received by Martin from C. W. Warburton, director of extension work in the United States department of agriculture at Washington, advised that 26 Texas counties were being certified over the week-end for drought relief reduced freight rates and that the reduced rates would become effective as soon as the railroads could issue necessary tariffs.

The list includes counties which Governor Moody tried to have included among those receiving reduced freight rates. County agents have been asked to handle the certification of shipments and county judges, where there is no county agent.

The 26 counties are Palo Pinto, Jack, Brewster, Reeves, Pecos, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Culberson, Hudspeth, Glasscock, Martin, Howard, Edwards, Kinney, Val Verde, Upton, Crockett, Reagan, Real and Terrell.

LONGWORTH LAYS BLAME OF ECONOMIC DEPRESSION RECOVERY ON DEMOCRATS

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Speaker Longworth last night charged the Democratic party with being responsible for slow recovery in the economic depression.

Speaking over the National Broadcasting system, the Ohioan said Democrats in the senate succeeded in prolonging consideration of the Smoot-Hawley tariff bill for political purposes.

"Their one desire was to prevent the passage of the tariff bill until the last possible moment before election day; to prolong as long as possible business uncertainty for their political advantage," he said. "That they succeeded is evidenced by the fact that they were directly responsible for a continued tariff session of nearly a year and a half a period unexampled in tariff history."

"There can be no excuse for this prolonged delay, except an inexcusable one; and that was, the desire to profit in the coming election by preventing for as long as possible the recovery of business and industrial prosperity."

Longworth said the idea that the present increase in the tariff would damage foreign trade, "is too absurd to comment upon."

DAYLIGHT SCHEDULE TO BE PUT ON NEW AIR MAIL ROUTE ACROSS U. S.

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—A daylight schedule for the new western air mail route which will begin operation October 15 between New York and Los Angeles was announced today by the postoffice department.

With a night lay-over in Kansas City, this route will be in effect until lighted for night flying, probably about January 1.

To Amalgamate Schedule
When night flying goes into effect the St. Louis to Kansas City supplemental route will be amalgamated with the continuous transcontinental schedule.

Westbound planes leaving New York at 8 a. m. will stop at Philadelphia, Harrisburg, Pittsburgh, Columbus, Indianapolis and St. Louis, arriving in Kansas City at 7:00 p. m.

Leaving the next morning at 8:30 they will stop at Kansas City, Wichita, Amarillo, Albuquerque, Winslow, and arrive at Los Angeles at 8 p. m. reversing the route, planes leave Los Angeles at 8 a. m., arriving Kansas City at 8 p. m., leave at 8:35 a. m. and reach New York at 6:15 p. m.

On the supplemental route, planes leaving St. Louis at 10:35 a. m. stop at Springfield, Tulsa, and Oklahoma City arriving at Amarillo at 6 p. m. In reverse, they leave Amarillo at 7:35 a. m. and reach St. Louis at 2 p. m.

BAYLOR BEARS GIVEN HIGHER RATING IN CONFERENCE RACE

S. M. U. FROGS FAVORED TO BE AHEAD

JENNINGS' TEAM NOW TO BE WATCHED; TEXAS NOT WEAK

DALLAS, Oct. 7 (AP)—There has been a tendency to "low-rate" the Baylor Bears before their tussle with Purdue Saturday, but Coach Jennings' machine will have a hard time sneaking up on any Southwest Conference now. The battle put up by the Bruins was, without doubt, an outstanding feature of the mid-west invasion.

Southern Methodist did little more than its followers anticipated in holding Notre Dame to a single touchdown margin, but Purdue had been rated a top-heavy favorite over the Bears. The fact that the Baptists fought the Bollermakers on almost even terms all the way and lost only because their secondary failed to bat down a couple of passes will not be overlooked by conference rivals.

On the strength of their form to date, the leading contenders might be ranked: 1. Southern Methodist; 2. Texas Christian; 3. Baylor. The Bears, thus, are moved a notch above the University of Texas Longhorns, who yet have failed to show anything like championship class.

Observers have said for two years that Baylor's team would be a title contender when, and if, it ever found itself. Their form Saturday would indicate they at least are getting "warm."

Weakness Emphasized
The Aggies' defeat at Lincoln emphasized their one weakness—lack of a capable offense. Coach Bell's line functioned well, as was to be expected from such a veteran unit, holding the big Cornhuskers scoreless until it became worn down in the second half, but the inexperienced backfield could gain only now and then through the air.

Like a baseball pitcher, the stout Farmer line will have difficulty winning unless its backfield supplies some "runs." Coach Bell has only five working days in which to bolster his team for Saturday's clash with Tulane here.

Reaction Set In
In mid-October of last season, the University of Texas eleven looked like the most powerful thing in the southwest. Baylor's victory was tearing opposing lines to bits and the entire team, in fact, was going with all the verve of a four-alarm fire.

Then the reaction set in. The Longhorns were tied successively by S. M. U. and Baylor and beaten by the Horned Frogs. By the time they encountered the Aggies on Thanksgiving Day they appeared only a shadow of their October selves, and what a licking they took that day!

The point is, say friends of Coach Clyde Littlefield, that the entire scheme is being reversed this year. The Longhorn mentor is bringing his team along slowly, especially Shelley, holding things down in preparation for the conference race. By the time the Orange eleven meets Rice in its opener on October 25 at Houston, Littlefield hopes to have it going full speed.

That seems a plausible explanation of the Steers' indifference showing against Centenary Saturday, when they were held to a scoreless tie in the mud.

STREET CONFIDENT OF COPPING FLAG

Who'll Be Grid Year's Super Star?; Booth Looms As East's Leading Back

NEW YORK, Oct. 7 (AP)—Will another back-crash his way into the ranks of the super-stars this season?

And if he does, will he capture the nation's imagination as Red Grange and Chris Cagle did?

Tough Games Factors
Only the "tough" games later in the season are apt to determine what performers, if any, will scale the heights of super-stardom.

And in the east it is little Albie Booth of Yale, who looms perhaps most formidably as an ace of aces. Though he achieved wide acclaim last year, particularly after the Yale-Army game, curiously enough it was Red Cagle, pacing the momentum of an earlier fame, who held most of the spot light.

Albie Booth Man
Yet it was Booth who, almost alone, defeated Cagle and the Army. Entering the game with the Army ahead, 13-0, he scored three touchdowns, drop-kicked for the extra points, and one of his scores came after a 70-yard return of a kick-off through the entire Army team.

Even as Yale expected big things of Booth last year, it expects bigger things this fall.

In his first year at Yale, Pat O'Brien, freshman coach, called him the "greatest back since Ted Coy." And even before then Yale had watched him as a high school star in New Haven, and later with Milford prep school.

Deceives Looks
This 144-pound quarterback looks like anything but a football player. He is only five feet six, and has no bulge to his shoulders or legs, but he's always been able to hold his own with the biggest of them.

He's not a fast runner, and a speedy man can overhaul him from behind. But from the front all the boys have trouble laying hands on him. His is the "stop-go" system of running—with many variations of pace.

Takes Short Steps
Like Red Grange, he takes short steps. Seldom is he hit solidly, even on line plunges. In the Dartmouth game last year, when big men took a terrific battering, Booth was unhurt.

Only once was he injured. That was seven years ago, in his kid days, when he was smacked down and got a cauliflower ear. Frequently his punts net 60 yards, and he also does a lot of passing. Booth's chief weakness is in defensive play and blocking—but so long as he gets off those long runs that won't matter to the headlines.

This year Booth took things easy in Yale's first game against Maine. Half a dozen times he carried the ball for gains, and casually made one touchdown and got off a 64-yard punt.

TAHOKA SEEKS TO WIN FROM LAMESA

TAHOKA, Oct. 7.—(Special)—Although Tahoka has not won a football game from Lamesa in six years, she hopes to turn the tables next Friday when the two teams meet on Lamesa's soil.

Last year, when Lamesa won the District Two championship, Tahoka out-played the victors until the last quarter; but this year Tahoka has a better team, and so has Lamesa if reports from that city are true.

Coach W. Washam is giving his charges some new plays this week and putting them through stiff work-outs in spite of the rainy weather.

Captain Jack Minor, Tahoka's star halfback who was on the bench with injuries when Tahoka lost to Brownfield 6 to 7 and won from Floydada 13 to 0, will be back in line-up for the Lamesa game, greatly boosting Tahoka's hopes for a win.

Though Lamesa has overwhelmingly defeated all the teams she has met so far, all of her opponents have been comparatively weak and no comparison of the two teams' power is possible.



Interest Is High In Coming Tech Game

TICKET SALES GOING GOOD; COACHES AT DILIGENT WORK

Cards Have Task
The Cardinals left Philadelphia last Thursday night two games behind the Athletics and they return only one in arrears, but still their task is harder. The Athletics have to win only one more to repeat their 1929 triumph and win the supreme prize of Connie Mack as a "great team."

The Cardinals must win two straight. Manager Mack today made no forecast of the ultimate end of the series except to say that he had faith in his "boys."

Street Optimistic
The "Gabby" general of the Cardinals, the weather beaten Charles Street, as always, was optimistic today.

"We can win two straight from the Athletics," he said, "and this is the series and we can do it again."

The final game in St. Louis, won 2 to 0 by the Athletics in the ninth inning when Jimmy Fox drove a home run high and far into the field bleacher seats among a group of disgusted customers, was a gripping struggle.

Grimes Works Well
For seven innings the 37-year-old Burleigh Grimes, a courageous, cagey pitcher, and George Earnshaw, younger, biter but no crafter, bailed out even, scoreless terms. The day was dark, with a low ceiling and rain threatening throughout, and all in all it was a pitcher's day; if ever there was a world's series stage set with scenery made to order for the sharpshooters of the mound.

Burleigh threw his famous "spitters," mixing enough fast balls and curves—with them to prevent the A's getting "set," while Earnshaw had a fast one, a curve, and a half speed ball that baffled the opposition by throwing the batsmen off their stride.

In the eighth inning Earnshaw moved out of the picture to make way for a pinch hitter. The non-bats were even with his rival for each had allowed two hits in seven chukkers. The pinch hitter got on but the Mackian strategy, pitched himself out of this hole.

Lefty Grove, the speed ball king of the A's, came in to succeed Earnshaw and as he held the Cardinals runless during the eighth and ninth innings and as the pitcher of record when Fox hit for the circuit, he was credited with the victory. This was compensation for a game he saved for Earnshaw in the last world's series when the big right-hander under the scoring rules was credited with the victory.

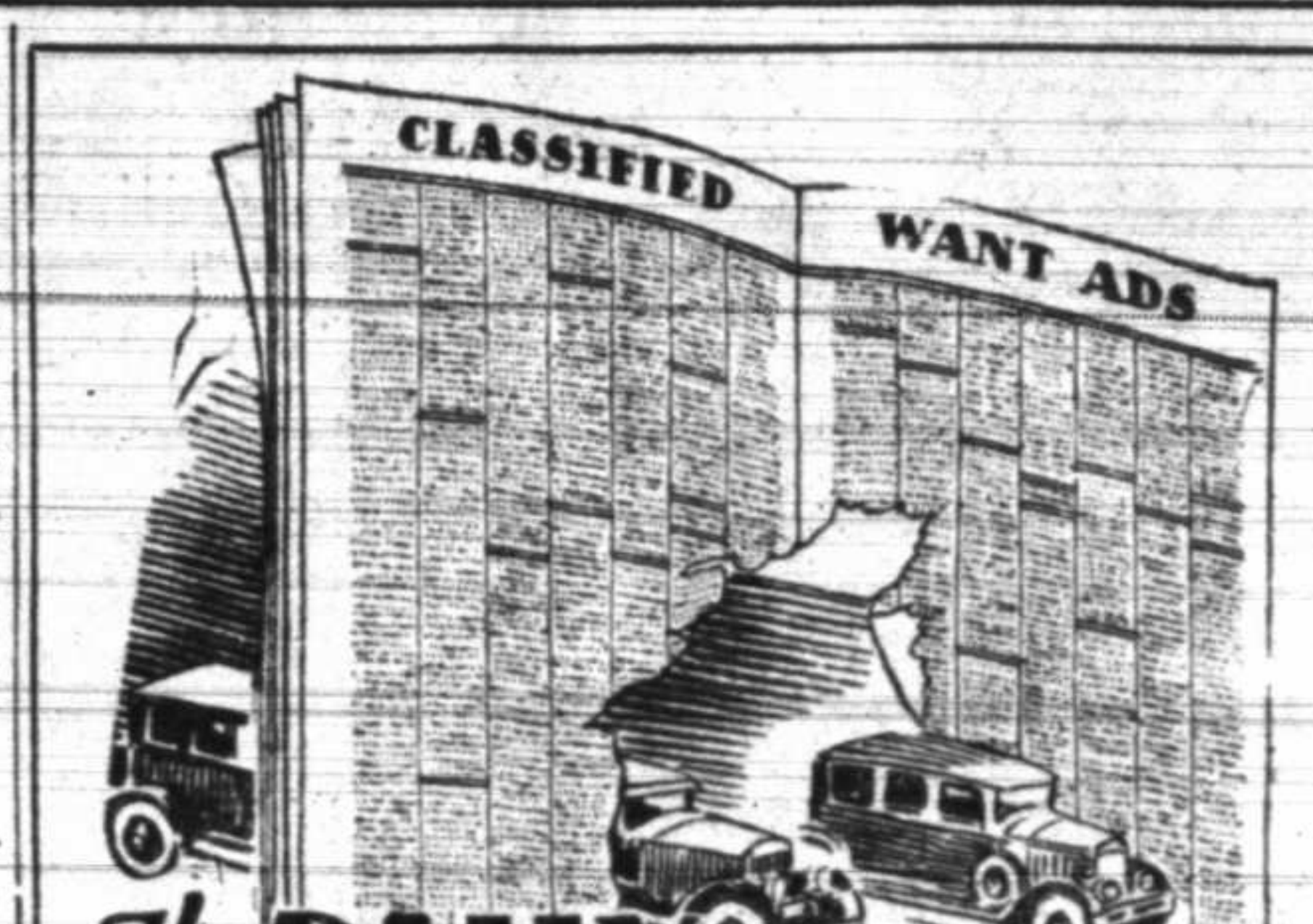

NEW METHODS IN BUYING ARE TOLD

WHOLESALE EXPLAIN CONDITIONS NOW IN USE BY SYSTEM

Gone are the days when a merchant in a small town or small city would go to market and buy thousands of dollars worth of ladies ready-to-wear or accessories or merchandise that had to be carried in stock sometimes until it became too shopworn to sell at a profit.

Now the merchant while buying closer, is also making more money on the amount of capital he has invested and he has to invest less under the new plan than the old plan.

Instructions Given
Wholesale houses instruct their men to advise merchants to do "light buying" instead of heavy buying—to buy more frequently and order direct from the house when they need an article quickly.

This has resulted in a change of credits. Merchants get better terms, they have less overhead, less expense of operation and they can turn their stocks more quickly and satisfy their customers with the latest modes.

Have Same Styles
Women of the smaller towns may have the same styles now that the women of New York or Chicago, Dallas, St. Louis or any other large city, have and as soon. Jake Ross, one of the pioneer ready-to-wear men of the South, declared. He added that with prompt delivery of merchandise in from two to four days out of Dallas, depending upon the type of service, freight or express, the merchants of the smaller towns can get their orders filled promptly.

"Many merchants now carry stocks of from \$12,000 to \$15,000 that formerly carried stocks of from \$18,000 to \$25,000," George A. Coffey, of the Dallas Wholesale Credit association, said. "They are making more money under this plan than under the old plan."

Can Make More
"We advocate light buying," he went on. "We do not advocate a depletion of stock, but to keep their stocks new and fresh. A man doing \$60,000 worth of business a year this way makes more money than he did under the other plan."

Mr. Coffey explained the operation of the credit association of which he is president. Its primary purpose is not as a collection department, but to aid the customers of Dallas wholesale men in handling their business affairs on a more economical basis.

The Dallas group has some 300 members. It is affiliated with the national association with more than 45,000 members throughout the United States.

New Methods Used
Rapid changes in styles, especially of ladies ready-to-wear lines, has been a factor in the change in business methods. Formerly, said Mr. Coffey, merchants bought largely by making long trips to market. The stock was out of date, and then sold at a loss. Wholesale men and manufacturers were unable to operate at an even keel during the year, but had rush seasons and quiet times, thus causing large turnover of capital and employees.

Now the manufacturers have a steadier business. They make up their orders as they come in, and with many merchants ordering smaller stocks frequently instead of much at one time and then for a long time without orders, the maker of items has a steady flow of business. Then too, styles change. The merchant under the new plan will send in a small order for new modes and get the order filled promptly. With many merchants ordering in small lots at a

ENFORCEMENT OF LAW TO BE MADE

BUSES AND TRUCKS TO BE WATCHED CLOSELY BY STATE OFFICIALS

Cooperation of the attorney general's department and the state highway department with the railroad commission in the enforcement of the statutes governing operation of motor trucks and buses, was announced in Lubbock Monday night by Lon V. Smith, member of the commission who was here holding a hearing on applications before his commission.

"We are now making a special effort to enforce the laws of the state governing operation of buses and trucks and the attorney general's department and the state highway commission is cooperating with us," Mr. Smith declared. "Heretofore, this is since the first of the year, we have been conducting a campaign of education to instruct truck owners and others in the meaning of the laws. We feel that they have had enough of this and now we will enforce the statutes."

Has Four Inspectors
"The railroad commission has four inspectors scattered over the state and these inspectors have been charged with the enforcement of the laws."

Enforcement will be along three lines, Mr. Smith said, by injunction proceedings in the courts to stop illegal operation, by cancellation of permits to operate and by prosecution in the courts for violation of the law.

Mr. Smith stated that the railroad commission had conferred with the attorney general's department and they had been assured of complete cooperation in "enforcing the statutes as passed by the legislature."

The highway commission, through its patrolmen and other officers will assist also.

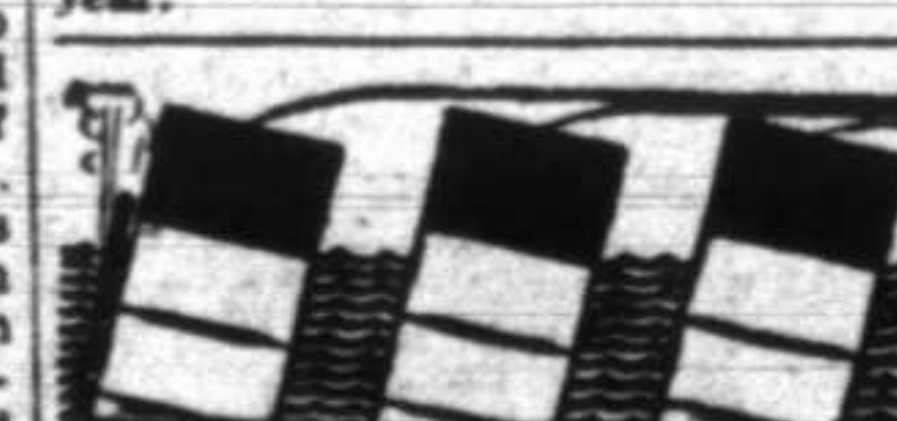

VETERAN SALESMAN RECALLS EARLIER DAYS MAKING TRIPS ON PLAINS; TOOK NINE DAYS TO MAKE EIGHT-TOWN CIRCUIT

"The first time I came to Lubbock, back in 1904 or 1905, it took me nine days to drive in a hack from Plainview through Lockney, Floydada, Matador, Dickens, Jayton, Post, Tahoka, and Lubbock and back to Plainview," E. D. Garrett, St. Louis, representing the Rice-Stix Dry Goods company, said in discussing early days on the South Plains for traveling salesmen.

"I guess I am about the oldest man now traveling here in point of years of service," he continued. "I have been making this country since 1895. We used to have to make it from the railroad towns with a hack. There were no railroads down this way then and I didn't make it often."

Few Railroads

Mr. Garrett said when he began to visit this part of West Texas, about all the towns he visited were along the railroad. The Fort Worth and Denver City from Fort Worth to Amarillo and Dalhart and on north into Colorado was the only railroad in this section. South of here was the Texas and Pacific from Fort Worth towards Big Spring and El Paso.

"When I first came to Lubbock one of my customers was the Lewis Dry Goods store, located in the block where Ross Edwards was located before the

fire," he went on. "It was around on Broadway."

Looked Like Palace
"The only hotel here then was the old Nicolett, now the Broadway. After traveling through some of those early towns, that old place looked like a palace to me."

"We traveled in a hack. That was the only way we could get around away from the railroads. When the house shipped the bill they had to send to the nearest railroad point and then ship from there by wagon."

Mr. Garrett recalled the first traveling man in this territory to use an automobile in his work. "He paid a man \$25 to drive an automobile from Plainview to Lubbock and back," the salesman recalled. "We used to pay \$6 a day for a hack. It took us one day to drive from Plainview to Lubbock, one day to get our business over and a third day to go back. Sometimes we made it in two days. The salesman said that it was worth \$15 to him to be able to come to Lubbock and back in one day instead of using three days."

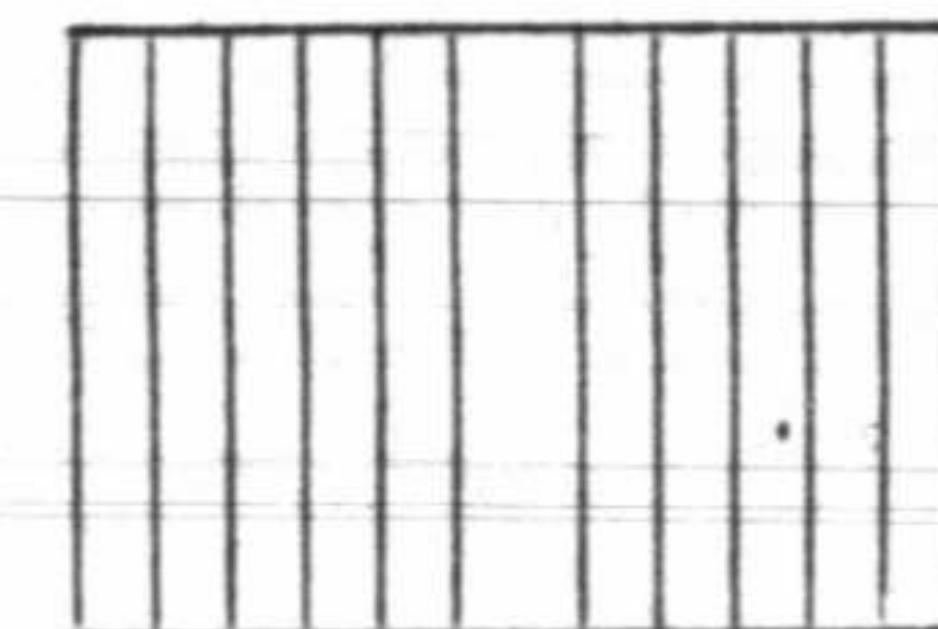
Another change according to Mr. Garrett is the number of trunks traveling men of today handle. "I have carried as high as ten or fifteen trunks to show my line of dry goods," he re-

marked. "Now I don't use half that number."

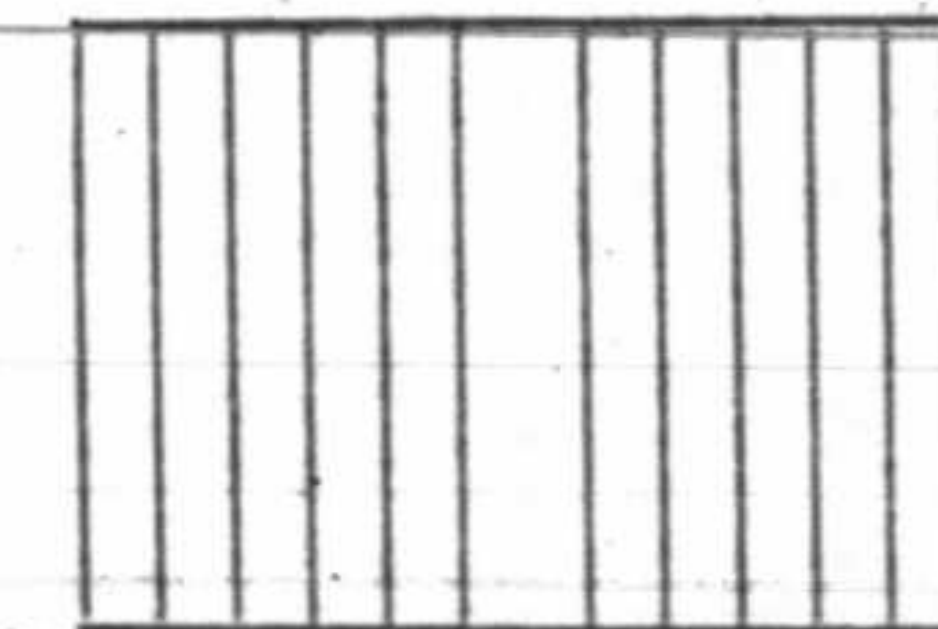
