## INJURIES, DAMAGE DOWN

### Free Way Lives up to Hopes: Saves People

Interstate 20's freeway section through Mitchell County is keeping us alive.

That's right. The modern highway artery with divided traffic lanes is saving lives every day just as predicted.

There is not better evidence for this fact than the highway accident investigation records of Mitchell County's 2 State Highway patrolmen — Buddy Hertenberger and Elward Rogers.

These records reveal the freeway in Mitchell County is:

1. Cutting the highway accident injury toll by two-thirds.

2. Saving lives in impressive fashion.

3. Trimming by more than 50 per cent the economic loss resulting from property damages in highway wrecks.

The Colorado City Record in 1954, as the county prepared to vote on the proposal to issue \$200,000 in bonds to pay for the multi-million-dollar freeway's right of way, published statistics and data predicting the freeway would save lives, money and injuries.

And the last year, 1959, when Mitchell County escaped without a single highway death (outside municipalities) more than meets those statistical predictions.

There were a total of 73 motor vehicle accidents on all highways inside Mitchell County during 1959 — including, the Interstate 20 freeway route.

In this total there were 27 personal injury wrecks — with a total of 38 persons injured.

How does that compare with pre-freeway years? The glaring fact is that in an 8-year period before freeway construction, Highway 80 alone in Mitchell County injured an average of 110 persons every year.

Last year with the Interstate 20 freeway route complete across the county except for the Colorado City by-pass, there were only 38 persons hurt on all Mitchell County highways.

In other words, the accident injury toll on Interstate 20 (U.S. 80) dropped enough in 1959 that injuries for all county highways were only one-third of the U.S. 80 average toll before construction.

Not a single person died on Mitchell County highways in 1959. But before freeway construction, U.S. 80 in Mitchell County in an 8-year period killed 46 persons.

Along with the 27 personal injury accidents there were 46 additional property damage motor vehicle accidents on Mitchell County highways in 1959 which did not cause injury.

Total damage to property in all these 73 accidents was \$92,242.

Eight-year average in property losses resulting from wrecks on Highway 80 before freeway construction was a whopping \$176,000 every 12 months. Total for the 8 years was \$1,408,000.

## \$1,700 Loss Reported in 3 Collisions

Three collisions on city streets here Wednesday and Thursday caused an estimated \$1,700 damage to cars, but no injuries.

A 1955 Mercury sedan, driven by Thomas Bob Long, 1644 Locust, and a 1956 Buick, driven by Miss Mildred Coleman, 724 Vine, were involved in a collision at noon Thursday at intersection of Hickory and E. 6th St.

Miss Coleman was driving north on Hickory and Long was proceeding west on E. 6th St. Approximately \$400 damage to the Coleman car and about \$250 damage to the Long auto resulted from the accident, police reported.

Mrs. C. B. Yost, 1304 Oak, was driver of a 1959 Oldsmobile which was in collision with a 1950 Chevrolet pickup on Walnut Wednesday at 7:33 p. m.

The pickup, which was parked, was knocked into a 1958 model Chevrolet sedan, according to police.

About \$350 damage was estimated by police for the Yost auto and a total of \$300 for both the pickup and sedan owned by M. A. Morgan.

## Rabbit Poison Is Available From County

The county is going to make rabbit poison available again this year to local farmers and ranchers at cost.

Commissioners Court authorized purchase of 500 pounds of the poison from rodent control service in Lubbock.

It will be sold to farmers and ranchers here at about 20 cents per pound — a price that will be enough just to cover cost of the poison, plus packaging and shipping.

Rabbit poison was obtained last year by the county and then passed on to persons who wanted to place the poison on their farms and ranches.

The project was successful enough to recommend again this year, according to County Agent Jack Burkhalter.

Burkhalter, who originally recommended that the county cooperate in the rabbit poisoning project, again will supervise the program this year.



## Defendant in DWI Case Pleads Guilty

E. L. Walker has pleaded guilty in County Court to driving while intoxicated.

He received \$50 fine with \$27.50 court costs and a 3-day jail term.

Walker, who was arrested by State Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger, entered his guilty plea Thursday.

Bond was set at \$500 for Willie Lee Barnett, who was charged this week in County Court with driving while intoxicated. The complaint was filed by Patrolman Hertenberger.

Facing a County Court charge of swindling with worthless check is a person identified as William M. Hamilton.

The defendant is accused of writing a worthless \$20 check at Fuller Foods Jan. 30.

Burrell Jameson and John Edly Reed were drivers of vehicles which collided in 200 block of W. Second Wednesday at 7:40 a. m., according to police.

Jameson was traveling east on W. Second in a 1951 Dodge sedan and Reed was driving a Clark Lumber Company truck which was backing into the street. Total damage was about \$250.

## OPENING STATEMENTS

### 6 Candidates Talk Campaigns

Commissioners Court Monday will appoint precinct election judges for Mitchell County.

The action will be the next step toward the Democratic Primary vote, which this year under new Texas laws, moves up on the calendar to an early May 7 date.

Stepping up the political pace also were opening campaign statements by six of the candidates who have filed for a place on the ballot.

Here are thumbnail background sketches of these 6 candidates and their announcement statements:

#### M. O. Hardegee

"After much consideration and encouragement by friends," said M. O. (Monte) Hardegee, "I have announced my candidacy for your county tax assessor-collector.

"I have been a resident of Mitchell County for 31 years," he continued, "and during 30 years of this time I was in the bakery business. I feel that my years of business have qualified me for this job.

"If elected by you, I will do my best to discharge my duties fairly and efficiently and to the best interests of the taxpayers of Mitchell County.

"I hope to see all my old friends and make new ones in the next few months. I earnestly solicit your vote and your influence for my election," Hardegee concluded.

#### Merlin O. Wilson

Merlin O. Wilson, who has resided 12 years in Mitchell County, is a candidate for county commissioner, Precinct 3.

The Spade stock farmer is married and the father of 3 sons. His family attends Plainview Baptist Church.

Wilson, who formerly has been employed in highway construction by contractor Harry Campbell, declared his candidacy this way:

"I am seeking this office upon my own qualifications and merits — not on any demerit of my opponent. I sincerely ask your interest and support for candidacy," Wilson added, "and pledge to you, if elected, honest and faithful service."

#### Ivan J. Barber

Ivan J. Barber, one of 4 candidates for Precinct 1 commissioner, has been a Mitchell County resident for 49 years. He was reared in Spade community, but has lived in Colorado City for the last 20 years.

For 17 years he was associated with Kiker & Son Funeral Home. He has been in other businesses dealing with the public and has a stock farm south of Colorado City.

#### TERMS EXPIRE FOR 2 SCHOOL TRUSTEES

Terms of 2 Colorado City school board members expire this spring.

Machinery will be set in action Monday night for the Colorado Independent School District election, April 2, which will decide the 2 board places.

Trustees whose terms expire are Dr. Oscar E. Rhoads, completing his second year term and his third consecutive year as board president; and Dr. H. John Steadley, who has been board secretary during his first year term.

Neither Rhoads nor Steadley have announced whether they will be candidates for reelection.

## Annual Safety Check Awaits 4,800 Autos

Approximately 75 per cent of all motor vehicles in Mitchell County remain to be inspected before the state deadline.

The deadline is only 11 weeks away, April 15, so that means car owners will keep a steady line moving in and out of garages during the next 2 months.

John A. Marion of San Angelo, with the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division of Department of Public Safety, checked the inspections in Mitchell County Friday.

He reported 1,048 motor vehicles inspected and tagged with the new inspection stickers.

However, the county has 4,800 motor vehicles registered.

That means the remaining 3,752 cars left to pass the annual safety inspection. A county to about 1,800 vehicles.

### Lake View Drops Wolves to Third

Lake View Chiefs were in Colorado City Friday night to defeat the Wolves, 51-43 in an important District 3-AAA basketball game.

The loss and Sweetwater's victory over Snyder left C-City and Snyder tied for third place in the district with 2 wins and 3 losses each.

Sweetwater, by defeating Snyder, moved into second place behind Lamesa, undefeated district leader. The victory gave Sweetwater its third win against 3 losses.

Lake View and C-City were well matched here Friday night as the game saw-sawed between the two teams.

But the Chiefs, who fell before Coach Caddo-Matthews' Wolves in Lake View last month, got revenge when Colorado City weakened in the final minutes.

The Wolves fell behind in the opening quarter, trailing Lake View 8 to 3. And at the half the deficit had expanded 1 point with the Chiefs still in front, 13 to 8.

But the Wolves warmed up after the half and took a narrow 32-31 lead at the third quarter end.

Lake View jumped 20 points in the final quarter while C-City fell behind scoring only 11.

That high scoring hour was won by Jerry Hales of C-City and Bob Mitchell of Lake View. Each made 21 points.

Mrs. Sparks presented the story in the absence of Mrs. Max Caddell, leader of the day.

Mrs. Sparks stated that at the time it was something new to call a girl Florence but within 50 years there would be thousands of girls all over the world christened "Florence" in honor of this baby; but in the summer of 1829, when Fanny Nightingale gave this name to her daughter — it was new.

Mrs. Sparks stated that Fanny Nightingale named her first daughter for her birthplace — Florence, Italy.

She stated that Miss Nightingale came from a rather wealthy family and her childhood was filled with garden to play in, ponies to ride and a succession of dogs, cats and birds to look after every day.

"Florence," she said, "grew into girlhood in a life that seemed all smoothness and peace, and yet beneath the surface there was no peace.

At the age of 18, Miss Nightingale was to be launched into society and to take an extended tour abroad — but at this moment in the midst of plans and discussion, Miss Nightingale received a call from God.

Mrs. Sparks said that Miss Nightingale's experience was similar to that which came to Joan of Arc.

# Time's Wasting for Pruning, Planting Roses and Trees

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles prepared for Colorado City Record by the local Garden Club in the interest of home and community beautification.)

Never spade the soil when it is too wet. Pick up a handful of it and squeeze it. If it forms a sticky ball, let the ground dry out before spading. If it crumbles, go ahead with the job.

Plant roses now in deep holes in which peat moss and well rotted barnyard fertilizer has been added.

Roses should not be planted too close to trees which form matted roots near the surface, such as elms or poplars. They should be planted where there is some air movement, but they must be

protected from high winds. Hedges, shrub borders, walls or fences will provide this protection.

Spring pruning on hybrid tea and floribunda roses should consist of the following practices:

1. Cut out dead wood.
2. Remove weak and spindly canes or stems.
3. Even the plants in the beds by pruning all good canes or stems to 24 inches to the ground.

These pruning practices are recommended for producing the greatest number of blooms in the rose garden and not for exhibition flowers. In general hybrid teas are pruned more severely than floribundas.

Plant spring flowering shrubs: bridal wreath, forsythia, flowering quince, lilac and mock orange.

Get trees planted as soon as possible. Some trees that do well in this section are the mimosa, cedar, elm, pecan and fruit trees.

Put in the first gladiolus corms now. Place bone meal and a little peat moss in the hole before planting these corms every two weeks until July.

Hang a piece of suit or an apple from the limb of a tree for the birds. Keep fresh water in the birdbaths to lure them to the premises.

Give slender young trees and shrubs support against high winds.

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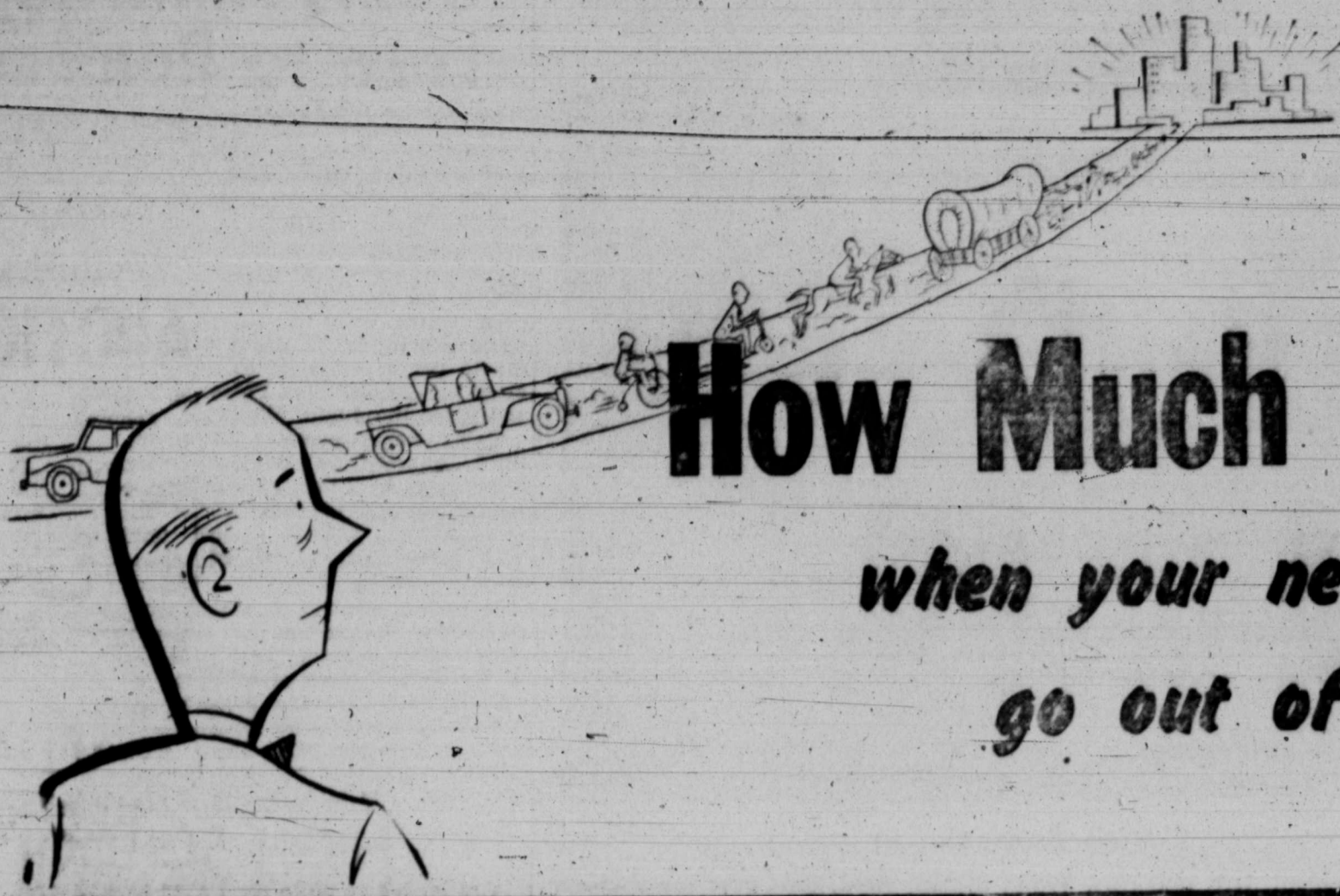

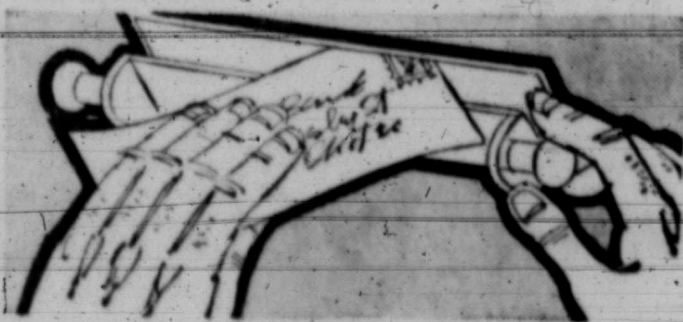
