## Annual Treasure Hunt Opens Christmas Shopping Season

## TEXAS SOIL MAY YIELD NEXT 'WONDER DRUG' FOR SCIENCE

AUSTIN, Dec. 2.—Will the next great "wonder drug" be found in the soil of Texas?

This week samples of soil from the campus of the University of Texas were on the way to Pearl River, N. Y., for assay by scientists of Lederle Laboratories. There it will be determined if they contain molds from which a new life saving antibiotic, such as aureomycin, may be produced. The samples of campus soil were prepared by Betty Lennon of Cisco, a pharmacy student at the University, and presented to Dr. Nestor Bohonos, director of Mycology Research at Lederle.

While there are no reliable formulas for predicting whether soils from here, or from any other

area, are likely to produce antibiotic molds, scientists are interested in the samples from the university campus because they represent a distinct type. And all types of soils are being tested in the world-wide search for new wonder drugs. Certain soils not recently tilled or disturbed are regarded as most apt to produce antibiotics.

Only a few years ago, another tiny sample of earth from Missouri was received by the Pear River scientists, who processed it just as they had tested thousands of earlier samples in their search for a new antibiotic.

But from this soil an interesting golden mold appeared. Test tube experiments produced startling results. The new mold effectively prevented the growth of staphylococci, and a variety of rod-shaped germs called bacilli. The latter property was most significant, for it acted against a wide variety of diseases in humans and animals.

The golden mold, aureomycin, has saved thousands upon thousands of lives since it became available to the public in 1948.

The quest for new antibiotics continues today with the testing of soil samples from every area of the earth. Scientists believe that somewhere, perhaps here in Texas, there may be soil with a strain of micro-organisms which will prove more effective in the war against disease than anything now known.

The Treasure Hunt, sponsored by Cisco business firms, attracted visitors from throughout this section. The large crowd inspected the Christmas merchandise of local stores during a two-hour open house period. Store windows were attractively decorated for the occasion.

The street decorations for the holiday season were in place for the opening. Colored light streamers decorate business district streets. Light standards contain additional decorations in the holiday flavor.

The Christmas season's next big event will be a visit by old Santa Claus and his real Alaskan reindeer for an afternoon parade on Saturday, Dec. 13. Plans for this event will be announced in detail in the near future.

A committee of Cisco business men needed to raise about \$200 more to complete the financing of the season's program. Manager B. A. Butler of the Chamber of Commerce asked committee workers to complete their assignments as soon as possible.

Mr. Butler told The Press that his office has received numerous compliments on the Treasure Hunt program. Some eighty business men contributed some \$2,000 worth of gift items for the event.

**THE PEOPLE WANTED A CHANGE**

Some people are still groping around wondering why the American people wanted a change from the New Deal-Fair Deal to a more sensible form of government, pay as you go policy. They point out that the country was a more prosperous one than we have ever had — more nice buildings going up, more improvements, more money to spend than ever before, and so forth.

The writers of these letters only take into consideration that it has all been done by public debt and still is to be paid. This reminds me of an old uncle of mine who attended an old time Fourth of July picnic and had a few dollars in cash. He decided he would buy the entire outfit. The first thing he bought was a small amount of stimulated water. He hadn't gone very far when he found he had gone about as far as possible. So he stopped at a fresh water spring running out from a mountain and decided to lay down to get a drink. He began vomiting, looked about to see if he was watched, and said in a loud voice, "Where has all my money gone?"

These men talking of good times are in the same category but do not realize they have spent their money in the same way and are now still owing this money. They have been spending and the public debt is about \$1,760 per capita for every man, woman and child in the United States.

There are \$262,000,000,000 in outstanding bonds that will have to be paid by future generations. Most of this money has been squandered and wasted in paying high salaries to people here and there, many of whom were not even on a pay roll, such as university presidents of whom we could name several, who have been drawing these high salaries — without giving any services whatever.

Check these figures, and, after doing so, think the situation over and see if you still think we have had such a prosperous period.

The writer forecast before the election that bonds and stocks would rise if Eisenhower was elected and they have risen every day. This is an incentive to business to go ahead, but if Stevenson had been elected we would have had the greatest bond sale in the history of the world which probably would have put the country in the hands of the receivers. 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## First Flowers to Bloom Gladden Hearts in Spring

The first flowers that blossom in the spring thrill the beholder, even though they might hardly rate a glance sixty days later. They are precious because of the promise that they bring, and the fact that they are all alone in the garden, after a drab winter.

Plant some of them, where you can see them from a window, and they will gladden your heart, no matter how few they may be.

The first flower to open when the ground begins to thaw is the snow-drop or galanthus. Its tiny white flowers are scarcely an inch across with petals spread out, but a clump of twenty-five peeping through the snow is truly beautiful to winter-weary eyes.

Scillas and chinodoxas, both blue, are next to bloom, much earlier than violets. They really carpet the ground with color, and like our climate and soil. Both will spread from seed dropped each spring, so start your first plantings where there is room to expand. Remember these early flowers come before there are any leaves, and may be planted close to shrubs, or in border spaces where taller neighbors, later in the season, would hide them.

Crocuses bloom before the daffodils; and they should be planted in groups, never in rows, and never in grass which will be mowed. The foliage of all bulbs must be allowed to turn yellow and dry up before the bulbs are lifted. If the leaves are cut off while still green the bulb cannot mature. Crocuses give us blue and yellow flowers which look well together, and may be combined in many pleasing patterns.

The first daffodils come after the crocuses, and then the hyacinths, early tulips and finally the tall, late tulips, which usually blossom two weeks before the irises, and are capable of a color display which cannot be surpassed the remainder of the year.



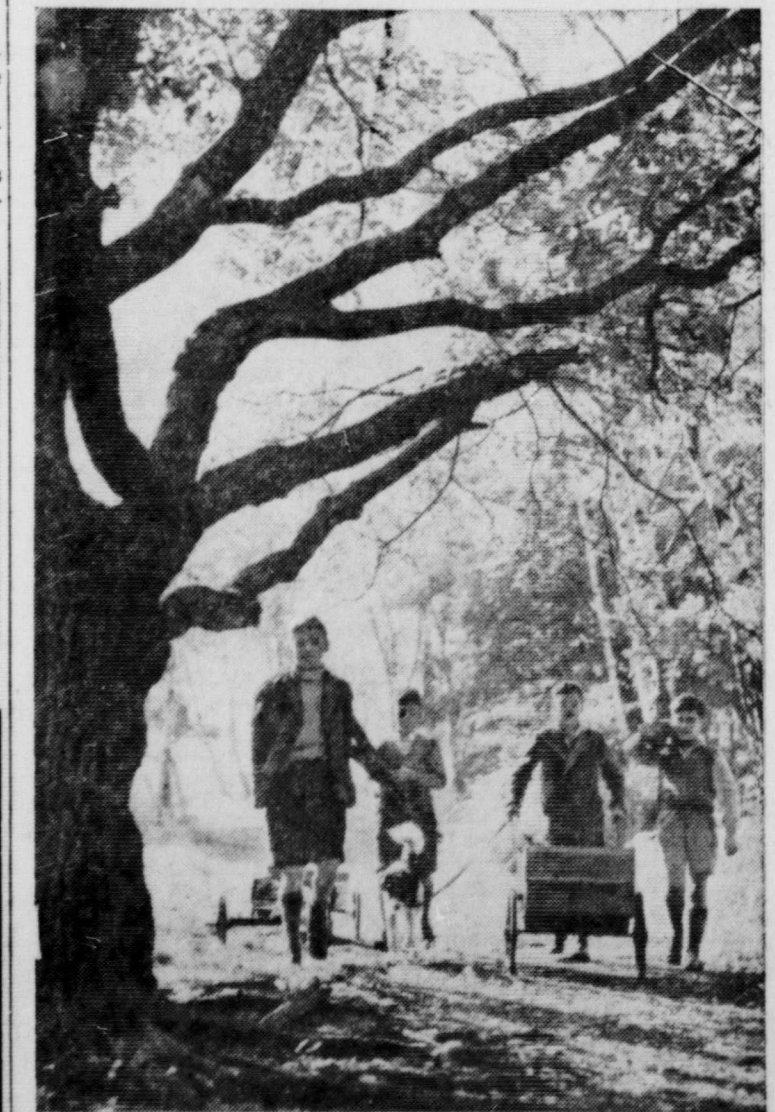

Ten children were included in the group which was the first to be repatriated en masse from Red China since the end of World War II. Most of the money for the trip was supplied by the Japanese government.

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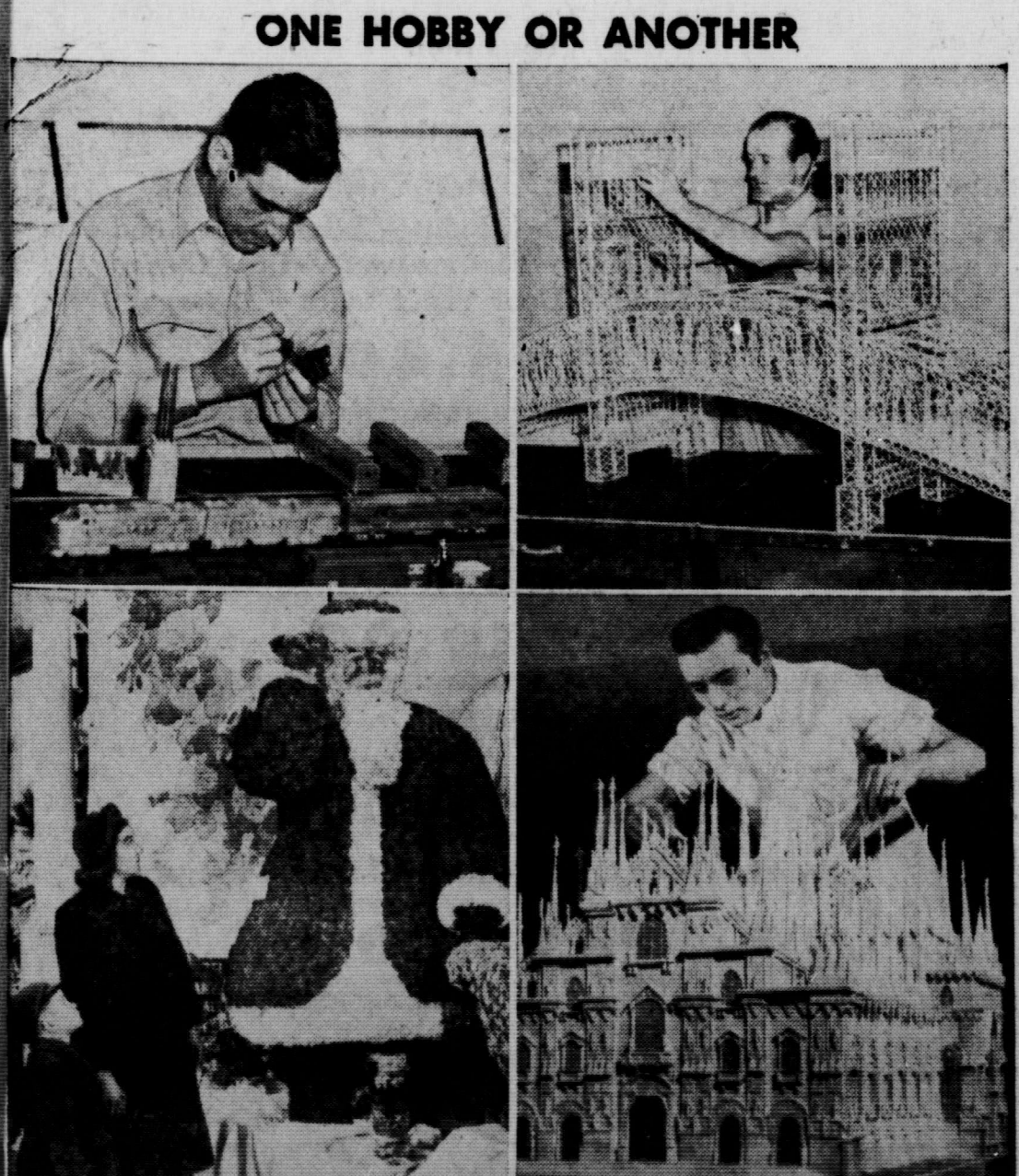




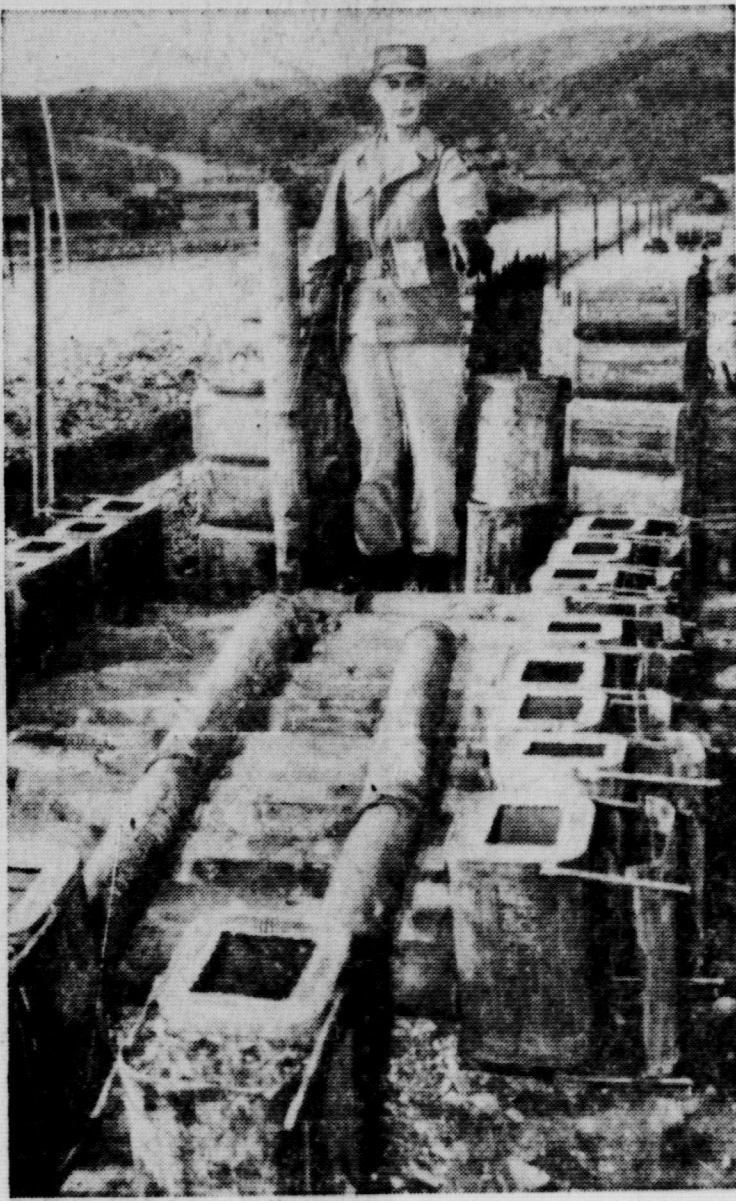

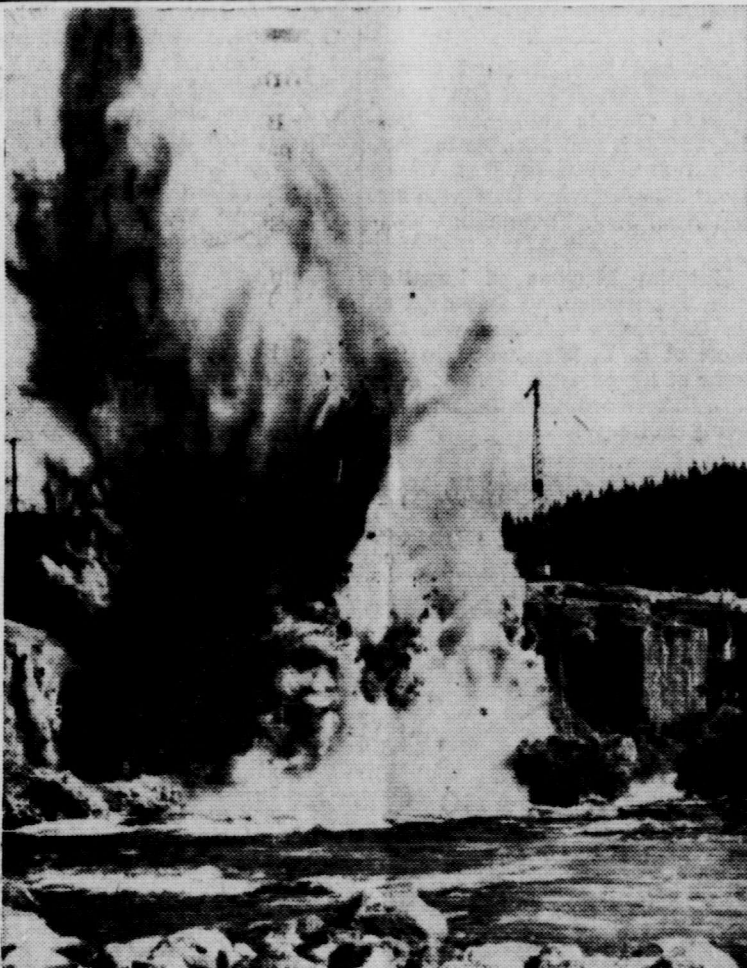

### HEALTH TALKS

A boil in the ear canal can be distressing. The canal is small and the skin normally is drawn tightly over the bone or cartilage; therefore, there is little room for the furuncle (as the boil is known in medical terms) to spread out. With a small boil even such simple movements as chewing or talking may cause a lot of pain.

Usually boils result from infection caused by bacterial, tiny disease-producing forms of vegetable life, but they also can follow infection with fungi, even smaller vegetable forms. One of the first signs is tenderness in the ear canal. Sometimes more than one boil occurs, and in some cases the canal swells shut. If medical treatment is begun early, the boil may not become very troublesome, but if it comes to a head and is badly swollen, it may have to be lanced.

In fungus infection, trouble usually starts after scratching the ear canal with something dirty. The chief symptom is itching. Also, there may be slight pain and soreness and a thin, watery, often musty smelling discharge. If the fungus growth fills the ear canal, there may be deafness and ringing in the ears. In severe cases, much pain, fever, and a bad feeling in general may be complaints, and the canal may swell shut.

The treatment of fungus infection will depend upon the type of fungus present and the severity of the disease. When masses of fungus can be seen, they are removed with a small, scraping instrument called a curet. Wiping the ear canal with alcohol, then drying it, is helpful in some cases.

The patient to keep the disease from returning should avoid wetting the ear and canal under any circumstances, even in shaving and washing the face. He also must keep from scratching the canal with hairpins, matches, or like objects.

During World War II, when American troops served in tropical climates, a great many cases of fungus and bacterial infections of the ear canal were seen among them. Even after they returned to temperate climates, the infections returned, especially in summer or when the ear canal was wet for any reason.



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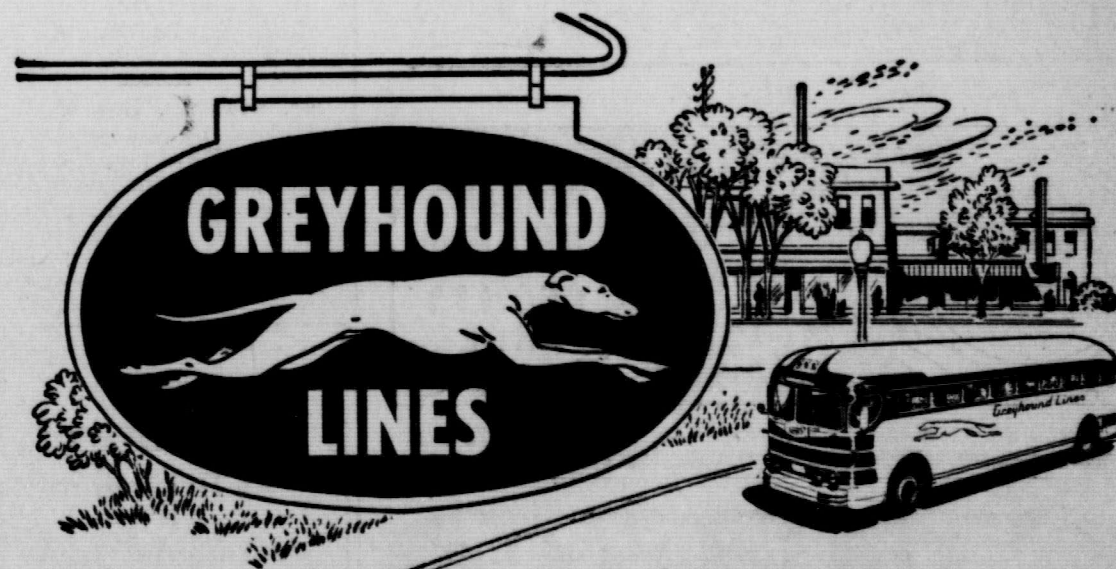
