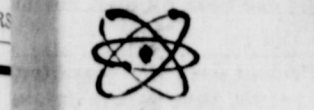

A FORMER Eastlander is-er aying the key role in an-er e exciting drama in the lifting-er of a big chlorine barge down-er Baton Rouge, La. Man-in-er charge is J. Ray McDermott, -er resident of a New Orleans-er company that bears his name-er and a former Eastland States-er il Corp. employee, well-er known by many here.

The barge and its 602 tons-er deadly chlorine liquid sank-er the Mississippi River, dur-er ing Hurricane Betsy Sept. 10. -er he President himself has as-er sserted that if the chlorine-er were released in a sufficien-er tly concentrated area, it could-er ill 40,000 to 60,000 persons. -er McDermott's firm will make-er an actual life government on-er contract bid of \$400,000 and-er the operation is expected to-er ke two hours. Twin booms, -er stories high, will pull the-er barge inch by inch from 60-er feet of muddy Mississippi wa-er r. Civil defense crews will-er e standing by, the state cap-er ital will be closed for the-er ay as well as public schools-er and the university. The bar-er ge lies offshore near the LSU-er campus.

Finding the barge after the-er urricane took only a few-er ays figuring out a way to-er aise it to the surface took-er early two months.

LIVESTOCK raisers will be-er alled on for some financial-er help next year in the war-er against screw worm flies, -er according to Chairman Oscar-er Schaefer of the Eastland Coun-er ty program.

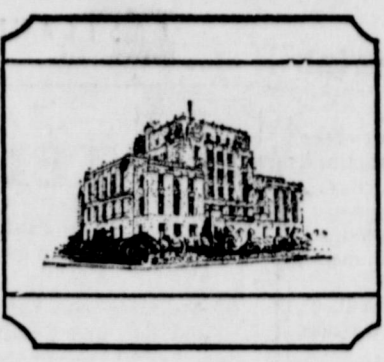
Dr. P. D. O'Brien Begins Revival at Baptist Church

The Eastland Mavericks, sparked by a dozen seniors suited out for the last time, put the finishing touches on a 4-2 season Friday night by besting the Cross Plains Buffaloes, 12-6, in Maverick Stadium.

The final win gave the Mavs a 6-3 for the season and proved an exciting clash to cap the 1965 grid season for the home fans.

The first two innings were scoreless, thanks to a penalty in the second quarter which nullified a TD run over by Cross Plains and through half-time the fans wondered if they were watching perfectly matched teams in action.

Since the eradication campaign got underway in 1962, the southwestern states have put up some \$7,500,000 and stock raisers have contributed about \$4,000,000 Mr. Schaefer said.

During the same period, the number of screw worm cases in Texas has decreased from 2,362 in 1962 to 14 in 1965.

"You can see that this is a real fine program for the livestock industry," Mr. Schaefer said. His committee has raised considerable money in the past three years to support the fight against the flies.

A special vote by cotton producers to approve or disapprove the sale or lease of cotton allotments will also be taken, Meredith stated.

The following polling places have been designated: Community A, Gorman, Smith Chevrolet; Community B, Eastland, ASCS Office; Community C, Carbon, Carbon Trading Co.; Community D, Cisco, Chamber of Commerce; Community E, Rising Star, Roach Motor Co.; Community F, Nimrod, Community Clubhouse.

Farmers should vote in the community where they are eligible.

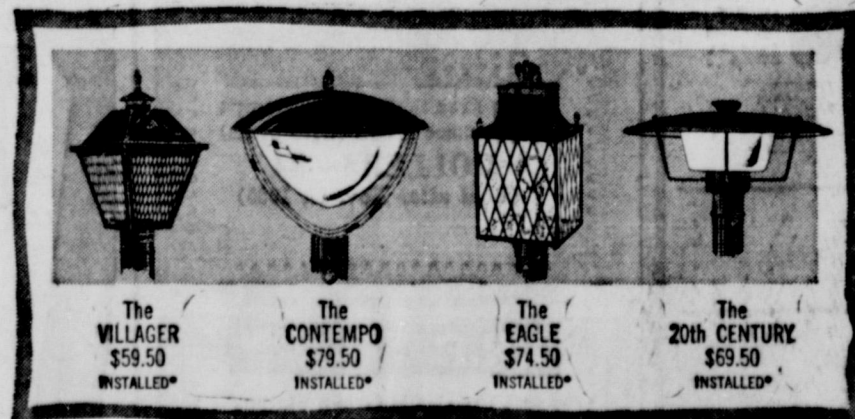

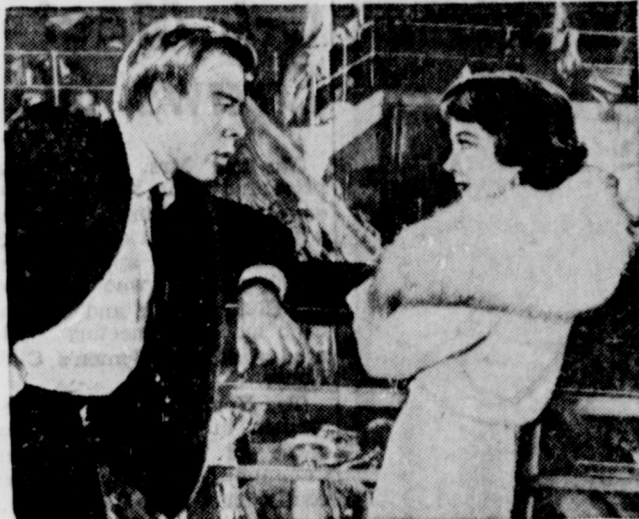

All members are urged to attend this meeting which will be the Thanksgiving luncheon.

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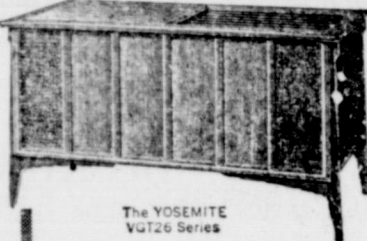
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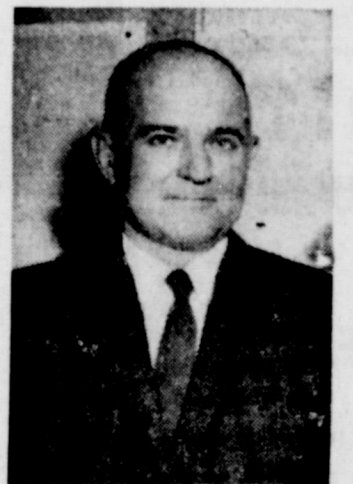
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BOUQUETS FOR TODAY'S BUILDERS
