## Answerline

(Q) I understand you can be fined for firing a gun in the city limits. What about air rifles and BB guns?

(A) The Colorado City Code Sec. 13-21. It is unlawful to discharge guns, air rifles, etc., at certain places in City. Any person who discharges any gun, pistol, or firearm of any kind, or who discharges an air rifle or air pistol, of any description, and capable of discharging shots, pellets, or any solid object at a velocity in excess of three hundred (300) feet per second, on or across any public square, street, or alley, or within one hundred (100) yards of any business house within the City limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Sec. 13-22. Unlawful to discharge guns, air rifles, etc., at private property, etc. Any person who discharges any gun, pistol, or firearm of any kind, or who discharges any air rifle or air pistol of any description and capable of discharging shots, pellets, or any solid object for a distance of fifty (50) feet or more from the point of discharge, on, across, through, into, or against any private property of any description within the City limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

## Big chill takes toll on bills

The two-and-a-half week cold spell witnessed by Mitchell County in late December and early January has been called the worst on record by long-time county residents.

However, the impact of the prolonged cold

spell was not felt until this week. Most residents found out just how cold it was during that period when they received their heating bills from either the electric company or gas company for last month.

Texas Electric main office spokesperson B.

B. Hardee said that just about everybody's bill was up from 50 percent to 100 percent for the same period last year.

"Not everybody's bill was up," Hardee said. "There are some exceptions. And then there were some bills that were up a lot higher

than 100 percent increase."

The Morgan Creek Power Plant at Lake Colorado City was operating full capacity during the cold spell, said plant superintendent Bruce Moore. The plant did have one unit inoperative. The unit was

down for long-term repair, he said.

The output of electricity was considerably up, Moore said. "The generation was way over what we would expect for that time of year," Moore said.

Colorado City Lone Star manager Byron Swank said that most of the gas bills for that cold period had tripled and even quadrupled from the previous month. However, the bills may vary since the gas bills are issued at different periods during the month.

The increase in the monthly bills was also compounded by the extra long December month. The bill issued for this month had 34-day service instead of the regular 30-day service, Swank said. Swank went on to say that the tem-

perature during January has been 10 to 15 degrees colder than the average annual temperature for this area.

The West Texas area and Colorado City had no problem with furnishing natural gas to its customers, Swank said. But the large commercial users were asked to cut back some of their consumption. The reason behind the move was to help ease the burden in East Texas. Swank said the Dallas area and its suburbs had some trouble with line pressure and getting gas.

City manager Rick Crowley said the figures for the damage caused by the harsh weather and numerous broken water lines had not yet been totaled. He said the estimate of the damage would be ready in a week.

## Barber seeking D.A. position

Colorado City attorney Dan L. Barber, 42, announced Friday that he is actively seeking the District Attorney spot for the 32nd District.

Barber will be vying for the seat to be left vacant by current District Attorney Russell "Rusty" Carroll who has said he will resign effective March 19. The 32nd District includes Mitchell, Nolan and Fisher Counties.

Barber said his philosophy of prosecution continues to be as stated upon that appointment.

"I believe in government by a body of law, not men," Barber said. "That lawful justice should be tempered with reason and mercy. I will enforce the law to the best of my ability."

Barber is a member of the Mitchell County Bar Association, the State Bar of Texas, the American Bar Association and the Texas Trial Lawyers' Association. Barber, who is also a Charter Life Member of the Baylor Law Alumni Association, has been named by the Association "Counselor" of the Baylor University School of Law.

Barber has also served as County Attorney for Mitchell County when he was appointed by the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court to the unexpired term of then County Attorney Frank Ginzel. Barber was appointed County Attorney January 1, 1971.

Upon graduation in 1959, he enlisted in the United States Army and spent the bulk of 3½ years of duty as an Artillery Surveyor in Germany.

Following his honorable discharge, he enrolled in Baylor University in 1963 and graduated in 1970 with Bachelor of Arts in Political Sci-

ence and Economics and a Juris Doctor degree.

While in law school, he qualified for Phi Delta Phi Honor Society and Baylor Law Review.

Barber was licensed to practice law on September 9, 1970, and being admitted to practice before the United States District Court for the Northern District of Texas on the 2nd day of October, 1970, he entered private practice with his father, Dell Barber of Colorado City.

The bulk of his practice has been Criminal Law.

Barber, in the tradition of three generations of his family in Mitchell County, is actively engaged in Farming and Ranching. He has also since 1975 been an Independent Oil Producer.

He is married to Regina Barber, a 1966 graduate of Baylor University. They are the parents of one daughter, Kirby Lee, 13, and one son, Cameron, 11.

Barber is a Mason and attends All Saints' Episcopal Church in Colorado City.

His father, Dell Barber, has practiced law for more than fifty years in Colorado City, and his brother, Patrick Barber, has been County Attorney of Mitchell County since 1976.

## "Modern day cattle drive" to send dairy cows to Mexico

The path is almost clear for a "modern day cattle drive" that could send thousands of Texas dairy cattle to Mexico, Texas Department of Agriculture international marketing director Paul Lewis said.

Dairy farmers across the state have been sent specifications outlining the type of cattle the Mexican government wants to buy in its largest purchase of U.S. dairy cattle, Lewis said.

"The Mexican government, utilizing U.S. credit guarantees, is looking for 30,000 dairy cattle, and they want to give Texas dairymen the first opportunity to offer cattle for sale," Lewis said. "Texas dairymen who decide to reduce their herds under the federal dairy reduction program now have another option for the cattle that meet the Mexican requirements. Instead of sending good dairy cattle to slaughter, dairymen can negotiate with Mexican buyers for better prices."

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim High-

tower said the Mexican purchases will benefit dairy farmers who get a better price selling to Mexico than to the local slaughter market, while also helping ease the depressing effect of the dairy herd reduction program on beef prices.

"This program makes good sense all the way around—Mexico gets good quality Texas dairy cattle, dairymen get a better price than they could get on the slaughter market, and beef producers also get some relief as well," Hightower said.

Copies of the specifications and a participation questionnaire prepared by the TDA marketing staff are being mailed by the two large dairy cooperative associations, Associated Milk Producers, Inc. and Southern Milk Sales, to their membership. The information is also being distributed by major milk purchasers to independent dairy farmers, and is available at all TDA offices.

"The specifications the Mexican govern-

ment outlined are reasonable, and I think that a substantial number of dairy producers will want to consider this option," Lewis said.

"We should learn from the participation questionnaire about how many dairy cattle are available, and where they are located," Lewis said. "Interested dairy producers should complete and return the questionnaire, which is

not a sales contract or binding in any way, to their cooperative of TDA as soon as possible because the Mexican government is anxious to begin purchasing cattle.

"We hope to have at least some preliminary results from the survey within two weeks so we

can bring the buyers and sellers together and get this cattle drive on the road," Lewis said.

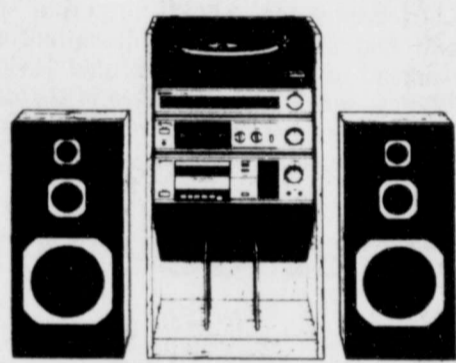

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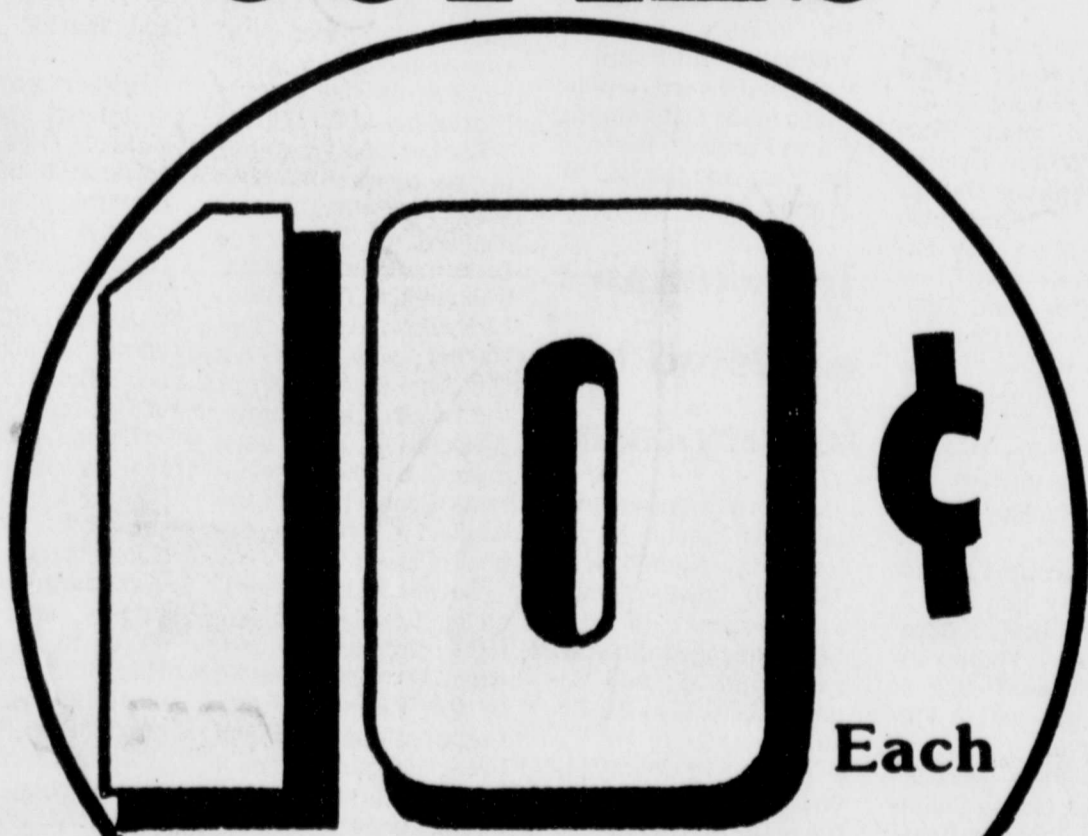

# Maxwell's favorite is baking bread

When Robbie Maxwell was a young girl, she always helped out in the kitchen.

She learned to cook from her mother and grandmother.

Her mother did a lot of outside work in the garden and she would get in the kitchen and cook meals. "I spent a lot of time running in and out. Out to the garden to ask my mother questions about what to do and back in the house to do it."

After she got into junior high and high school is when she started fixing family meals.

Mrs. Maxwell and her family moved to Colorado City from Winters last August. While they lived there, she had an in-home bakery.

She likes to prepare Mexican and Italian food, but her favorite thing to bake is bread, which she taught herself how to prepare.

When Mrs. Maxwell lived in Winters, she decided to enter some things in the Abilene Fair.

She decided to make one of her favorite bread recipes which is "Honey Whole Wheat Bread."

"It always comes out perfect. I could count on it to turn out everytime. Well, I mixed up a batch of bread, let it rise, and put it in the oven. When I put the bread in the oven it didn't look exactly right. After a little while, I went to check on the bread and it had fallen.

"I made up another batch right quick and put it in the oven. Everything was going fine, until I went to see about it and that loaf had also fallen. One of my boys picked out a loaf that didn't look too bad and I

went ahead and entered that loaf."

Well, out of all the items she entered, you guessed it—the bread won.

Mrs. Maxwell is married to Junior Maxwell and they have two sons, Monty and Cody. Her husband is a driller in the oilfield, so he is a pretty big eater.

Today, she is sharing three recipes with RECORD readers for hearty appetites.

**DEEP DISH PIZZA**

**Crust:**

- 1 pkg. dry yeast
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 2 tablespoons salad (vegetable) oil
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon onion salt
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt

Dissolve yeast in the 3/4 cup water with 1 teaspoon sugar. Add 1 cup flour and mix. Add oil, oregano, onion salt, garlic salt and 1 cup flour. Knead unused flour into dough, adding more if needed to keep dough from being sticky. Let rise in warm place until double. (Use plastic wrap over bowl to keep dough moist and free from drafts). While dough is rising, prepare tomato filling:

- 1 can (6 oz.) tomato paste
- One-third cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1-2 teaspoons sugar (to taste)
- 1 tablespoon onion flakes (or powder)
- 2 teaspoons oregano
- 1 teaspoon basil
- 1/2 teaspoon parsley
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic flakes (or powder)
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper (optional)
- 1 lb. ground beef or sausage, browned and drained

- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) Mozzarella cheese
- Mushrooms, green pepper, olives, onions, etc., optional

Combine tomato paste and one-third cup water. Blend until smooth. Stir in remaining seasonings; set aside. Pat dough out in greased pie plate, evenly. Spread sauce mixture over dough. Add meat and optional ingredients desired. Top with cheese. Bake in 425 degree oven 20 minutes or until cheese is lightly browned.

**COFFEE CAN BREAD**

- 4 cups flour
- 1 pkg. dry yeast
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- Cinnamon and sugar (1/4 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons cinnamon)
- Raisins (optional)

Measure 2 cups flour into large mixing bowl. Sprinkle with yeast. Combine the water, sugar, margarine and salt in saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring, until

margarine is melted. Remove from heat and stir in milk to cool mixture. Add milk mixture and eggs to flour mixture, stirring until yeast is dissolved. Add remaining flour; mix well, adding more flour if mixture is too sticky. Turn out onto floured surface. Knead until soft and elastic. Divide dough in half. Pat or roll each portion in 9x12 inch rectangle. Sprinkle each with cinnamon-sugar, nuts or raisins. Roll up as for jelly roll. Drop into oiled coffee cans, (1 lb.) Cover with aluminum foil. Let rise until foil rises one inch above tops of cans. Bake in preheated 400 degree oven for 20 minutes with foil on top. Remove foil and bake for 10-15 minutes longer, or until golden brown. Cool for about 15 minutes before removing from cans. (Bread is very tender and will fall apart if removed too soon).

Variation: Rolled dough may be cut into one-inch pieces and placed in mixture of three tablespoons melted butter, three tablespoons corn syrup and one-third cup packed brown

sugar in bottom of baking pan. Bake in 375 degree oven for 25 minutes. Invert onto plate immediately.

**ALMOND TEA COOKIES**

- 1 cup soft butter
- 1/2 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 2 1/4 cups flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup finely ground almonds or pecans

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In large mixing bowl mix butter, sugar and flavorings. Add flour and salt to butter mixture and continue beating until thoroughly mixed. Add ground nuts and blend. (The cookie dough will be a little crumbly). Take a piece of dough about 1-1/2 inches in diameter and place on ungreased cookie sheet; flatten just a bit with fingers without making an indentation. Bake for 6-8 minutes. (Do not let cookies over-brown!) While slightly warm, shake cookies in paperbag with confectioner's sugar to coat. Yield: about 5 1/2 dozen.

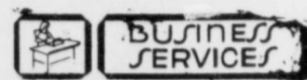

# Final deadline next week for property tax

An important deadline occurs next week for property owners in Texas. Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, reminds Texans that local property taxes assessed for 1983 are due by the end of January.

"Taxes not paid before February 1 are delinquent and begin to accrue penalty and interest," Patterson says.

He points out that delinquent 1983 taxes will incur a six percent penalty and one percent interest charge on February 1. Charges continue to add up at the combined rate of two percent per month or portion of a month that the taxes remain unpaid, until they reach a total of 18 percent on July 1.

After that, interest accrues at one percent a month. Taxes delinquent for a year would incur penalty and interest charges of 24 percent of the original tax.

In some taxing units, tax bills may have been mailed after January 10, or a successful tax-rate rollback election may have necessitated mailing corrected tax bills by a unit other than a school district. In both cases, the delinquency date is postponed and the new date must appear on the most recent tax statement, but penalty and interest will be added if taxes aren't paid before the new date.

Further penalty can be incurred by a tax delinquent on July 1. If a private attorney—rather than the city, county or other public staff attorney—is contracted to collect delinquencies after July 1, up to 15 percent of the total tax, penalty and interest may be added to defray the cost of those collections.

Patterson notes that the Property Tax Code does provide some relief for taxpayers who are

unable to pay delinquent taxes, penalty and interest all at one time.

A property owner aged 65 or over may file a sworn affidavit with the appraisal district to defer paying any or all delinquency amounts on his homestead. However, the amounts are still owed on the property and continue to increase until paid or until the property changes hands.

Another option, but one which must be in a written agreement between the tax collector and property owner, is to pay delinquent tax, penalty and interest in installments over a period of not more than 36 months. With this option, too, the tax is still considered due until paid, and penalty and interest accrue on any unpaid balance.

Under certain conditions, a tax collector may choose to follow steps allowed by law to

seize personal property, which is then sold to satisfy delinquent taxes. Property owners should contact their appraisal districts or local tax offices with any questions about delinquent

taxes or payment and to find out if collection for taxing units in the appraisal district may have been consolidated in the appraisal office or in a particular tax office.

#### Aiding the appearance of microwave foods
