The committee wishes to remind all gardeners that now is the best time for planting phlox, candytuft, poppies, sweet peas, larkspur and blue bonnets. Also that it is time for fertilizing and preparing soil for later planting. All citizens are urged to clear away dead weeds and grass from the side walks and ground between the street and side walks. Last year several beautiful yards failed to receive prizes because of the fact that between the street and the yard there were weeds and Johnson grass to mar the beauty of the general appearance of the premises. The committee is making plans for the exchange of flower seed. These plans and others for the distribution of prizes will be announced through the Junction Eagle at an early date.

### SCHOOL CHILDREN WILL HAVE TWO WEEKS HOLIDAYS

Christmas holidays for the Junction High School will go into effect this afternoon at 3:30, according to Superintendent Guy C. Moses. The holidays will start then in order that the teachers may meet Friday and Saturday for the County Institute, which will be held in Junction.

The holidays will close Wednesday, January 1, and classes will be resumed on Thursday morning, January 2. This arrangement allows the students two weeks of holidays.

### ONE ACT PLAY TO BE GIVEN LATER

The one act play, "Ten minutes by the Clock" and "The Dolly Dance" that were to have been given at the Texan Theater Friday evening, December 20th as additional numbers on the regular program, have been postponed until after the holidays, according to Mrs. Conde Hardeman.

The date of this production will be announced later. The two plays will be given by the original casts as published last week.

The postponement was caused because the Christmas holidays have conflicted with the practice sessions. The exact date will be announced after the holidays.

### Local Representatives Guarantee Junction's Quota

Secretary E. V. Stewart and Mr. E. A. Loeffler attended the regional meeting of District 9 of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in San Angelo Tuesday.

The purpose of the meeting was to outline the work for the coming year and to plan a method of financing the organization.

At the regular convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce held in El Paso this fall West Texas was divided into 10 regions or districts and Kimble County was placed in district 9 which comprises the following counties: Kimble, Sterling, Coke, Runnels, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Edwards, Kerr, Real, Bandera.

At the meeting Junction's annual quota was placed at \$200 or twenty members. This sum was guaranteed the West Texas Chamber of Commerce by Junction.

Representatives from 14 counties were present at the meeting and the regional quota was easily subscribed. Approximately 22 representatives were present. Secretary Stewart made an address before the body.

After the meeting was adjourned, the delegates were invited to attend a luncheon with the Kiwanas Club. Mr. Loeffler made an address at the Kiwanas Club luncheon and spoke concerning the conditions in Kimble County and this immediate section.

### POSTMASTER URGES PEOPLE MAIL NOW

Uncle Sam's force is laboring under the strain of the excessive mail caused by the Christmas mailing. Patrons of the local office could aid the employees greatly if they would mail their packages in the morning and avoid the afternoon rush, stated postmaster Earl Tracy.

It would be easier for many of the people living in Junction to mail in the morning rather than afternoon. Mr. Tracy urges the co-operation of the people in this respect.

## Kimble County Farm and Livestock Council is Organized at London

A group of London citizens Monday evening voted to have an organization to be known as the Kimble County Farm and Livestock Council and elected Edgar Lambert to represent them during the 1930 meetings.

County Agent R. E. Homann has planned this organization with a number of views in mind which he outlines as follows:

1. The council will serve as a method of getting county-wide cooperation in problems related to the farmers and the livestockmen.

2. Each community representative should feel directly responsible to the agent and his people. Through a concerted effort on the part of community citizens greater progress can be made; their desires and wishes more readily taken care of.

3. Demonstrations within communities should be more effective because of greater attendance at meetings. Results of work in a community should be measured.

The above organization has been planned with a view of

...serving more people; being more efficient and effective in the service and obtaining greater results for the service rendered. Individual or personal service work must be overcome if the work is going to be of the greatest value to the greatest number of people. An agent may demonstrate the proper method of running a terrace line and follow up with further instruction and demonstration in actually building a terrace. If 40 or a hundred community citizens are present all understand how it is done and they return to terrace their own land. If each of these 40 or one hundred individuals failed to attend the meeting the matter would be a personal service proposition and 40 or 100 days would be required to terrace each man's field.

It is desired to perfect this organization soon after the first of the year and start the year 1930 off with an organization that will speak for the needs of Kimble County.

Christmas Seals Picture Bell-Ringer

When the people of Texas this season purchase a supply of Christmas seals in the sale sponsored by the Texas Public Health Association, they will observe on each seal a design fashioned by a wood engraver of the old school.

The engraver is John W. Evans, 74 years old, of Baldwin, Long Island. His design will appear on 32,000,000 seals which are to be offered to the people of Texas this Christmas to help stamp out tuberculosis.

When it was desired to obtain a new idea for the Christmas seal sale this year, Evans was found at his bench, still at work as he was 50 years ago, producing reproductions of fine works of art such as he did for the Century Magazine until the process was abandoned in 1900.

Inventor Four Wheel Brakes Sells Cheaply

A million dollar invention sold for \$150 cash. That's what happened.

In the summer of 1916 a vacationist seated on a huge rock in the Ozark Mountains was gazing at the autos as they sped around a dangerous winding road. Two autos smashed head-on.

If those cars had been equipped with four-wheel brakes no accident would have occurred, he thought. When he returned to his home he immediately started to work to design a set of four-wheel brakes.

He applied for a patent in January, 1917, and it was granted to him in March. Then the inventor, Andrew B. Camden, set about to find a market for his wonderful invention.

"It is just as bad to be too far ahead as it is to be too far behind with your invention ideas," said Mr. Camden. "Those companies told me that they could not see any practical advantages of the four-wheel brakes, and, in fact, they would be only excess baggage."

Disheartened and discouraged he sold the patent at the first offer received, which was \$150. And now it is worth a million dollars.

**VACCINATE AGAINST BLACKLEG**

The germ responsible for the blackleg disease of cattle is very persistent, sometimes surviving for several years in pasture soil. Immunization of cattle by means of vaccination is the only practicable way of coping with the infection, thus preventing new cases of the disease. Blackleg has been reported from all parts of the United States except the Southern Atlantic and Eastern Gulf States, according to the Bureau of Animal Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture, and is most likely to appear in the spring and fall, usually affecting cattle between 6 and 18 months old. Carcasses of animals that have died of blackleg should be thoroughly burned or buried deep to prevent reinfection of pastures. Medical treatment has proved of no avail against this rapidly fatal disease. Pastures that seem to be permanently infected should be used for growing grain or other crops, and should not be used for grazing purposes.

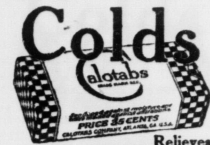

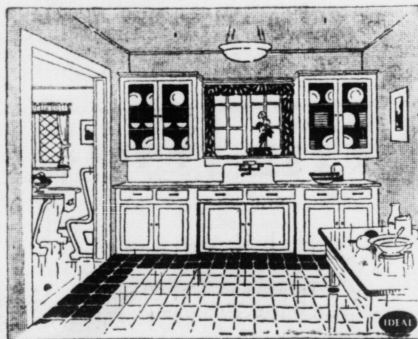

### Col. Goodnight, Famed Pioneer Of Texas, Dies

Charles Goodnight, "father of the Panhandle," and its first white settler, who died at 5:45 Thursday morning in Tucson, Ariz., was laid to rest beside the body of his first wife, within sight of his old ranch home at the town of Goodnight, 20 miles west of Clarendon.

This was made known by friends and relatives in Clarendon, where the 93-year-old frontiersman had been living during his last few years. Information from Arizona, where he had gone to spend the Winter, was that he had succumbed to recurrence of an attack of influenza.

His second wife, whom he married on March 5, 1927, was with him when he died.

Born on March 5, 1836, three days after Texas declared its independence from Mexico and one day before the fall of the Alamo, Goodnight of Macoupin County, Ill., was destined to take a large part in the development of the Lone Star State before his death.

Chance brought Goodnight to Texas. Five years after his father died in 1841 his mother remarried and the family moved to Milam County. All of Texas then was subject to Indian raids, the first house in what now is Dallas had been built five years before; the Fort Worth military post was not established until three years later.

While still in his teens Goodnight began farming, but in 1856 he decided Texas was not big enough for him. With J. W. Sheek he started overland for California. At San Saba Creek they stopped, having changed their opinions about Texas, and began raising cattle on shares. After a year's work the youngsters found they had made, as their share, \$96, or \$48 apiece. They had 32 calves worth \$3 each. That was in 1857, but in 1865 their herd had increased to 4,000 head and they bought out their employer.

During the Civil War Goodnight was a guide and scout for a frontier regiment, and while he was absent marauding Indians and the elements took their toll of cattle. He soon formed a partnership with Oliver Loving, and driving a herd over what became known as the Loving Trail the partners sold several thousand cattle at Fort Sumner, N. M., for 8 cents a pound. The business was so lucrative they drove a second herd over the same trail that year, but on the third drive Indians attacked them and stamped the cattle. Three hundred steers were lost, but the white men escaped.

A few days later, with one man, Loving went ahead of the herd to close a contract in Fort Sumner before the cattle arrived. Near what is now Eddy, N. M., he was attacked by a band of Indians and wounded in the arm. His companion went back to Goodnight for aid. Loving, surrounded by Indians, was hidden on a creek bank. The rescue party could not find him.

In one of the last writings ever undertaken by the aged pioneer, Colonel Goodnight recently told, in the Magazine section of the Star-Telegram and Sunday Record, how Loving slipped into the creek and waded past his Indian foes. He walked five miles north and was picked up by another caravan, but died shortly afterward from his wound and exposure.

The tragedy saddened, but the danger did not deter Goodnight. For three years more he drove cattle into New Mexico and sold them, surviving numerous brushes with Indians. In his last year on the trail, with John Chisolm, he made \$17,000, and in the same year, 1871, he married Mary Ann Dyer.

Dallas with thirty-four has the greatest number.

While some hunters bemoan the scarcity of game, Lochte is peeved because deer and turkey are always getting in his way and curtailing his sport. Last Thursday, while hunting in Western Kerr County, Lochte fired at a nine-point buck. The deer dropped, but failed to stop the bullet, which continued on its course to kill an eight-point buck which stood nearby, unobserved by the hunter.

The previous day, the deputy clerk killed two turkey gobblers with a single shot. True, he is due one more gobbler under the legal bag limit, but Lochte is afraid to go hunting any more this season for fear he may kill two turkeys instead of one and thereby violate the law.

M. W. Poole, Lochte's brother-in-law, accompanied him on the unlucky trip last week end, and witnessed the wholesale hunting.—Kerrville Mountain Sun.

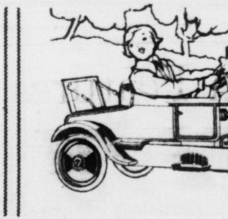

### CO-OP MARKET PLAN FORMED

Containing that the wool and mohair warehouses of Texas have been in the past, and still are the most practicable and feasible selling agency for wool and mohair, but expressing a desire to cooperate with the Federal Farm Board and the National Wool Marketing Association in putting into effect an orderly marketing system, the Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association of Texas was permanently organized in San Angelo recently, and immediately adopted a resolution outlining its attitude toward the farm board's co-operative selling plan.

**The Resolution**  
 "BE IT RESOLVED That, whereas, the situation in the marketing of raw wool and mohair has become serious in the last few years, resulting in price depression, and  
 "Whereas, the government of the United States has enacted laws and signified its determination to aid wool and mohair growers in stabilizing market for their products, and  
 "Whereas, the government, through its Federal Farm Board, has indicated its desire to have wool and mohair warehouses in Texas join their organization,  
 "Therefore, be it resolved, that the Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association of Texas hereby endorses the conscientious endeavors being made by the Federal Farm Board and the National Wool Marketing Association to improve the situation in our market and that it be cause our policy to make immediate, earnest and continued efforts to arrive at an agreement with the Federal Farm Board and the National Marketing Association covering some feasible plan acceptable to the warehouses and to the wool and mohair growers of Texas, whereby they might join in some national movement in the direction of orderly marketing, and that the directors and advisory council of our association be hereby instructed to work along these lines.

### THE FLAG

There are only two ways to display the American flag, according to a pamphlet which the army recruiting sergeants are distributing.

One is to fly it from a staff, freely unfurled, the stary field to the peak, and the other is to hang it vertically or horizontally with the field at the top and to the observer's left as he faces it.

Attempts to "improve" the appearance of the flag by other methods of display, such as fashioning it into a rosette, show a lack of respect, says the pamphlet. Here are some of the suggested rules:

To fly the flag from a staff, hoist it briskly to the peak, lower it slowly and ceremoniously, never letting it touch the ground.

Suspended across the street, the flag should be hung vertically with the union uppermost and to the north in an east and west street and to the east in a north and south street.

When flown at half-mast, the flag should be raised to the peak of the staff and then lowered to half-mast; before lowering for the day, it should be raised again to the peak.

At crossed staff with another flag, the American flag should be on the observer's left, the staff in front of the staff of the flag.

When forming a cluster with other flags, the American flag should be at the center of the group or at the highest point in the group.

In a procession the American flag should be on the marching right of all other flags, or in the forecenter of a line of flags. For decoration and festoons, bunting of the national colors is appropriate. Since the blue union is the flag's honor point, the bunting should have it uppermost.

When several flags are flown from staffs, the American flag should be flown from the staff on the extreme left of the observer, hoisted first, and lowered last.

International usage forbids the display of the flag of one nation over that of another in time of peace.

At unveiling ceremonies the American flag should form a distinctive feature of the program but should not be used as a covering for the statue.

The use of the flag for athletic uniforms, handkerchiefs, napkins or other purposes lacking in dignity and respect, while not strictly a violation of law, is offensive to persons of patriotic feeling.

When the flag becomes soiled, it may be laundered with propriety. This is best done in one's own home.

There is an old army custom whereby the flag, when damaged or frayed, may be withdrawn from service with due reverence. According to this custom, the union is first cut from the flag, then the two pieces of the flag which is no longer a flag are cremated and their ashes strewn over the parade ground.

### New Barber Law Works Hardships

The new barber law which went into effect December 1 has been causing much comment during the past two weeks.

The new law provides that they must pass a physical examination and be free from infectious or contagious diseases tuberculosis or communicable diseases and free from the use of any kind of morphine, cocaine or other habit forming drug, and not a habitual drunkard. They send in two signed pictures, also a \$10 fee for registration. One of the photographs must also be placed in a conspicuous place near the chair on which the barber is working.

Every barber must have had at least two year's experience before he can get a certificate, and if he does not have his application certified by December 1, he must take an examination before the state board.

The new law provides that after December 1, an applicant for a certificate must have completed the seventh grade in school, and had six months training at a barber school where he must have worked eight hours a day, before he can take an examination. If he fails in the examination two times he cannot take it again.

After he passes this examination, he is qualified as an apprentice barber and he can get a full-fledged barber's certificate after he has worked at the trade for eighteen months.

The new provides stringent regulations as to the sanitary requirements of barber shops. Among other requirements a razor, after being used to shave one person, must be sterilized before it can be used on another person, and hot towels can be applied on but one person, after which they must be sterilized.

### Money From Christmas Seals to Help Sick

Whenever you see the double-barred cross on Christmas seals, one may be assured that it represents the efforts of the Texas Public Health Association, their local affiliated association and the National Tuberculosis Association to stamp out tuberculosis in Texas and the nation.

During the present Christmas season 32,000,000 of these seals bearing the double-barred cross are being distributed and sold in Texas by the Texas Public Health Association and its affiliated agencies. Revenue derived from the seal sale is used in preventing tuberculosis.

The double-barred cross emblem was adopted for tuberculosis prevention work in 1902 during the International Conference on Tuberculosis and is now being used by almost every country in the world.

Everyone of the little Christmas seals, circulated by the thousands, in every community bears the double-barred cross with its message of hope, cheer and mercy. In the buying of Christmas seals, one helps to extend the influence of this emblem and thereby to prevent and control tuberculosis in Texas and the United States.

Interest in the pecan industry is growing with reports of good incomes from sale of the nuts. One San Saba County tree, top-worked eleven years ago, yielded \$200 worth of pecans. A Johnson County man with eighty trees of papershell varieties sold 4,000 pounds at 40c a pound or a gross income of \$20 a tree. The rapid increase in yields is shown by two trees that, budded in 1922, produced five pounds of nuts each in 1924 and in 1928 25 pounds to the tree, while a large tree budded in 1925 with 160 Halbert buds began bearing in 1927 and in 1928 yielded 50 pounds.

### J. D. Motley Receives Injuries in Wreck

Information from Abilene Wednesday morning stated that Corkill Motley, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Motley of Ballinger, former citizens of Junction, rested well Tuesday night following a serious injury received in an automobile accident Sunday afternoon on the Abilene-Ballinger highway. His two companions, Guy Jones and Otis Jacobs, were not so seriously injured as Corkill, who suffered a fractured skull.

The three Ballinger boys were returning from Abilene in a Chevrolet coupe, driven by Jones, when it swerved from the road down an embankment five feet high and became a mangled mass of metal. A car close behind stopped and its passengers dragged the three unconscious bodies from the wreckage to speed them to Abilene in a passing bus. Motley's condition was frightful, blood spurting from his nose and ears with every heart-beat, and his stentorian breathing audible through the hospital building.

No investigation of a complete nature had been made of Motley's broken skull when the last message was received here, due to the extreme danger of his injuries. Jacobs regained consciousness Monday, suffering from shock and an undetermined injury to his back, thought to be a severe strain. Jones was unhurt with the exception of

### TEXAS STANDS FIFTH IN MOTOR REVENUE

State revenues from the operation of motor vehicles, including gasoline and license taxes were far in excess in 1928 of the State appropriations required to match apportionments of Federal aid in road building during the fiscal year 1929, according to a table submitted to the House subcommittee on appropriations at a hearing on the Department of Agriculture appropriation bill for 1931, which has been reported back to the House of Representatives.

Texas stands fifth among the States in revenues collected from motor vehicle taxes and licenses collected in 1928, having received from these sources the sum of \$35,646,288. The amount required of the State to match the Federal apportionment for highway construction was small by comparison, being only \$4,502,576. This appropriation was, however, larger than that made for the same purpose by any other State.
